Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE BAG MAKERS BOARD.

Note.—This Determination on the 1st October, 1918, applied to the Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts; the Cities of Ballarat, Bendigo, Geelong, and Warrnambool; the Town of Ballarat East; and the Boroughs of Eaglehawk, Geelong West, Newtown and Chilwell, and Sebastopol.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Special Board appointed to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to persons employed in making or repairing jute, hessian, or cotton bags has made the following

(1) That on the 1st day of October, 1918, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination. (2)

TIME OF BEGINNING AND ENDING WORK. Time of ending—

12.30 p.m. on the day on which the half-holiday is observed locally.
6.30 p.m. on the other five working days of the week. Time of beginning-7.30 a.m. 7.30 a.m. The following rates shall be paid:

For all work done within the hours fixed as the times of beginning and ending work in excess of 48 hours in any week, and

For all work done outside the hours fixed as the times of beginning and ending work ...

Time and a half. SUNDAYS AND PUBLIC HOLIDAYS. That double time shall be paid for all work done on Sundays, New Year's Day, 26th January (Foundation Day), Good Friday, Easter Monday, 21st April (Eight Hours Day), Christmas Day, and Boxing Day; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted. PIECE-WORK. The lowest piece-work prices to be paid to any person for doing work of the description referred to in the following Schedule Hand repairing ordinary bags (employee to provide twine)

Hand repairing mill, coal, lime, or hide bags (employee to provide twine)

Machine repairing ordinary bags (employer to provide twine)

Machine repairing mill, coal, lime, or hide bags (employer to provide twine)

Machine repairers on piece-work shall also be paid 9d, per hour for any time

cognitied in cleaning machines or cutting retches 9d. per dozen. 1s. 41d. per dozen. 4d. per dozen. shall be 9d. per dozen. occupied in cleaning machines or cutting patches. PIECE-WORK WHICH MAY BE FIXED BY AN EMPLOYER.

The Board determines, under the provisions of Section 144 of the Factories and Shops Act 1915, that any employer may fix and pay piece-work prices to any person employed at repairing by machine bags other than those for which the Board has fixed a piece-work price (employer to provide twine), provided that any such employer shall base such piece-work prices on the earnings of an average worker working under like conditions, and such piece-work prices shall be fixed so that an average worker can earn not less than the wages rates that are fixed by the Board for such work.
