Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE COUNTRY WOODWORKERS BOARD.

Note.—This Determination, on the 1st day of April, 1918, applied to the following parts of Victoria, namely:—The whole of the State outside and excepting the Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts, the Cities of Ballarat, Bendigo, and Geelong, and Towns of Ballarat East and Warrnambool, and the Boroughs of Eaglehawk, Geelong West, Newtown and Chilwell, and

N accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Special Board appointed to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed as—

(a) Carpenters, joiners, or boxmakers;

(a) Carponers, joiners, or boxmakers;
(b) Stackers, sorters, loaders, or unloaders of sawn timber;
(c) Sawnill, timber yard, box factory, or joiner's workshop employees,
but not including persons under the jurisdiction of the Carponters, Agricultural Implements, Country Agricultural Implements, Picture Frame, or Wood Workers Boards or persons engaged in shipbuilding or the erection of bridges, wharfs, or similar structures, has made the following Determination, namely:—

(4) OVERTIME.—The following rates shall be paid for all work done :---Within the hours fixed as the time of beginning and ending work in excess of 48 hours in any week

Between 1 p.m. and 5.30 p.m. on Saturday or the day on which the weekly half-holiday is observed

Later than 5.30 p.m. or earlier than 7.30 a.m. on any working day.

(5) Special Rates.—Double time shall be the special rate for all work done on Sunday, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Christmas Day, Eight Hours Day (21st April), but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.

(6) The Board determines, under the provisions of section 144 of the Factories and Shops Act 1915, that any employer may fix and pay piece-work prices to any person employed at any work for which this Board has not fixed piece-work prices but has fixed a minimum wage, provided that such employer shall base such piece-work prices on the earnings of an average worker working under like conditions, and such piece-work prices shall be fixed so that an average worker can earn not less than the wages rate fixed by the Board for such work. work.
