Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE GROCERS BOARD.

Note.—This Determination on the 27th May, 1918, applied to the following parts of Victoria, viz.—The Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts, the Cities of Ballarat, Bendigo, Geelong, and Warrnambool, the town of Ballarat East, and the Boroughs of Eaglehawk, Geelong West, Newtown and Chilwell, and Sebastopol.

N accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Special Board appointed to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons wheresoever employed in the business of a grocer, including a seller of tea, has made the following Determination, namely:—6

(1) That on the 27th May, 1918, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

OVERTIME.

(4) The following rates shall be paid for overtime:—

Stablemen—
For all work done in excess of 51 hours

. Time and a half.

All others—

Outside the hours fixed in Clause 3

Within the hours fixed in Clause 3 in excess of the number of hours as fixed for a week's work...

CASUAL LABOUR

(5) Casual employees (i.e., persons employed during any week for not more than one-half the maximum number of hours fixed in this Determination as a week's work) shall be paid at the rate of time and a half, provided such payment shall not in any week exceed the ordinary weekly wage as fixed in this Determination.

SPECIAL RATES.

(6) Time and a half shall be the special rate payable for all work done on Sunday, 28th January (Foundation Day), Good Friday, Easter Monday, 21st April (Eight Hours Day), 3rd June (King's Birthday), Christmas Day, Boxing Day, New Year's Day; but, if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall be payable only for work done on the day so substituted.
