Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE MUSICAL INSTRUMENTS BOARD.

NOTE.—This Determination on the 1st November, 1919, applied to the Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts; the cities of Ballarat, Bendigo, Geelong, and Warmambool; the towns of Ballarat East and Sandringham; and the boroughs of Eaglehawk, Geelong West, Newtown and Chilwell, and Sebastopol.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts the Special Board appointed to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any persons employed in manufacturing any musical instrument of which wood forms a part has made the following Determination, namely:—

(1) That this Determination shall come into force and be operative on and after the 1st November, 1919.

⁽³⁾ OVERTIME.—Any person employed in excess of 48 hours in any one week shall be paid for such extra time at the rate of time and a half.

⁽⁴⁾ Casual Labour.—Any person casually employed during any week for not more than 24 hours shall be paid at the rate of time and a quarter.

⁽⁵⁾ SPECIAL RATES.—Double time shall be the rate for all work done on Sundays, New Year's Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Eight Hours Day (21st April), Christmas Day, or Boxing day; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rates shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.

⁽⁶⁾ PIECEWORE.—The Board determines under the provisions of section 144 of the Factories and Shops Act 1915 that any employer may fix and pay piecework prices to any person employed in manufacturing or repairing pianos or in manufacturing gramophones provided that any such employer shall base such piecework prices on the earnings of an average worker working under like conditions, and such piecework prices shall be fixed so that an average worker can earn not less than the wages that are fixed by the Board for such work.
