#### PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable Sir William Hill Irvine, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Sunt George; Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia &c., &c.

I, THE Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria in the Commonwealth of Australia, do by this my Proclamation prorogue The Parliament of Victoria until Thursday, the thirtieth day of September, 1920.

Given under my Hand and the Scal of the State of Victoria aforesaid, at Melbourne, this twenty eighth day of September, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and twenty, and in the eleventh year of the reign of His Majesty King George V.

# PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable Sir William Hill Irvine, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c.

WHEREAS the Legislative Council and the Legislative Assembly, called "The Parliament of Victoria," stand adjourned until Tuesday, the fifth day of October, 1920: And whereas it is expedient to dissolve the Legislative Assembly: Now I, the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria in the Commonwealth of Australia, in exercise of the power in me rested in this behalf, do by this my Proclamation discharge the Homorable Members of the Legislative Council from their meeting and attendance on Thursday, the thirtieth day of September, 1920; and I do dissolve the Legislative Council from their dissolution to take effect on Thursday, the thirtieth day of September, 1920: And I do hereby declare that I have this day given Order that Writs be issued in due form, and according to law, for the election of Members to be duly returned to serve in the Legislative Assembly.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the State of Victoria aforesaid, at Melbourne, this twenty-eighth day of September, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and twenty, and in the eleventh year of the reign of His Majesty King George V.
