Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE HEADWEAR BOARD.

Note.—This Determination, on the 5th day of April, 1920, applied to the following parts of Victoria, namely:—The Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts; the cities of Ballarat, Bendigo, Geelong, and Warrnambool; the towns of Ballarat East and Sandringham; and the boroughs of Eaglehawk, Geelong West, Newtown and Chilwell, and Sebastopol.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board appointed to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any persons employed in the trade of—

(a) Making males' or females' hats, caps, or bonnets, (b) Trimming females' hats, caps, or bonnets,

provided that persons subject to the Felt Hatters Board or the Knitters Board and persons employed making machine-made straw hats shall not be subject to this Board, has made the following Determination, namely:—

(1) That on the 5th April, 1920, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

One male apprentice to every three or fraction of three male workers receiving not less than 70s. per week of 44 hours.

Females.

One female apprentice to each female worker receiving not less than 38s. 6d. per week of 44 hours.

Males.

Two male improvers to each male worker receiving not less than 70s. per week of 44 hours.

Females.

Three female improvers to each female worker receiving not less than 38s. 6d. per week of 44 hours.

TIME OF BEGINNING AND ENDING WORK.

(3) That the time of beginning and ending work shall be-

Time of Beginning. Time of Ending.

1 p.m. on the day on which the half-holiday is observed, and
6.p.m. on the other working days of the week. 7.30 a.m.

OVERTIME,

(4) That the following rate shall be paid for all work done:-

(a) Outside the hours fixed in Clause (3)
(b) Within the hours fixed in Clause (3) in excess of 44 hours in any week

Time and a half.

(5) Special Rates.—Double time shall be paid for work done on Sundays, Now Year's Day, 26th January (Foundation Day), Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, 21st April (Eight Hours Day), Christmas Day, and Boxing Day; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.

(6) PIECE-WORK.—The Board determines, under the provisions of Section 144 of the Factories and Shops Act 1915, that any employer may fix and pay piece-work prices to any person or persons or classes of persons employed at any work for which the Board has fixed the minimum wage, provided that such employer shall base such piece-work prices on the earnings of an average worker working under like conditions, and such piece-work prices shall be fixed so that an average worker can earn not less than the wages that are fixed by the Board for such work.
