*Marine Act 1915.***Regulations for the Examination of Masters and Mates for Certificates of Competency.**

In pursuance of the powers conferred upon it by the *Marine Act 1915*, the Marine Board of Victoria, with the consent of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of Victoria, acting by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby make the Regulations following, that is to say:—

1. Short Title.—These Regulations may be cited as “The Regulations for the Examination of Masters and Mates, 1921.”

2. Commencement and Repeal.—These Regulations shall come into force on the 1st day of February, 1921, on which date all previous Regulations relating to the Examination of Masters and Mates shall be and stand repealed.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

3. Certificates—to whom granted.—Certificates of Competency will be granted to those persons who pass the requisite examinations and otherwise comply with the requisite conditions.

4. Time and Place of Examinations.—Examinations may be held at the offices of the Marine Board, Melbourne, or at such other place and at such times as the Board may from time to time direct.

5. Application.—A person desirous of obtaining a certificate shall make application for examination on the proper form, which may be obtained at the Marine Board Office; such application form properly filled in, together with the candidate's testimonials and discharges, as hereinafter specified, must be lodged with the Secretary at least two clear days before the date of examination, which date will be notified to the candidate on his obtaining the form of application.

6. Gaps in Service.—Every candidate must properly account to the satisfaction of the Secretary for any gaps in his service before he is allowed to present himself for examination.

7. Nature of Service determined by actual position on board Ship.—
(a) Sea service, in the Foreign or Home Trade, cannot be regarded as qualifying for examination for Certificates of Competency unless it can be verified by reference to the articles of the ship on which it was performed, *e.g.*, service claimed by testimonial or otherwise to have been as mate when the actual rating as shown by the articles was only that of boatswain or other petty officer will not be accepted where officer's service is required. Where service as first (or second) mate is required to qualify for examination the candidate must actually have held the executive position next (or next but one) to the master.

(b) In every case where a candidate for a Master's Certificate of Competency for foreign-going vessels claims service as Second Mate, he must make a declaration upon his form of application to the effect that during his service as Second Mate he had only one officer over him, or, if more than one, that a Third and Fourth Mate were also carried; if the service claimed is as “Auxiliary Second Mate,” the candidate must state the number of officers who served in a junior capacity.

(c) A candidate with First Mate's service must make a declaration upon his form of application to the effect that he was a senior officer under the Master, or, if not, he must satisfy the conditions of Regulation numbered 105.

8. Minimum Service.—The amount of service prescribed by these Regulations for each grade of certificate of Competency is the absolute minimum that will be accepted, and unless a candidate can show that he has performed the full period of service required he will not be permitted to undergo examination.

9. Age.—Should any doubt exist as to the age of a candidate he will be required to produce a certificate of birth or baptism, or other satisfactory evidence of age.

10. Testimonials and Discharges.—Applicants will be required to produce, in addition to the official forms of discharge, testimonials to the satisfaction of the Board as to sobriety, experience, ability, and general good conduct for (at least) the twelve (12) months of sea service immediately preceding the date of application for examination, and no person will be examined unless such forms of discharge and testimonials be produced.

11. Penalty for Misconduct.—Candidates who have neglected to join their vessels after having signed articles, or who have deserted their vessels after having joined, or who have been found by a competent Court guilty of gross misconduct on board, will be required to produce satisfactory proofs of two (2) years' subsequent service and good conduct at sea, unless the Board, after having investigated the matter, should see fit to reduce the time.

12. Physical or Mental Disability.—If during the progress of an examination the Examiner finds that a candidate is afflicted with deafness, with an impediment in his speech, or with some other physical or mental infirmity, and he is satisfied upon further investigation that the degree of deafness or of the impediment or other infirmity is such as to render the candidate incompetent to discharge the ordinary duties of a mate or master at sea, he shall immediately discontinue the examination of such candidate, and report the circumstances to the Board, and the examination fee paid by the candidate shall be returned to him by the Secretary.

If the candidate subsequently produces a medical certificate to the effect that his hearing, speech, or physical or mental condition has improved, or is normal, the Board will take into consideration the question of allowing the candidate to present himself again for examination.

13. Foreigners must know English.—Foreigners must prove to the satisfaction of the Examiner that they can speak and write the English language sufficiently well to perform the duties required of them on board a British vessel. If a candidate fails for ignorance of the English language he will not be re-examined until after a lapse of six months.

14. Issue of Certificate.—When an applicant has passed his examination, and has complied with requisite regulations, he will be notified to that effect by the Secretary, and will subsequently receive his certificate of Competency from the Board. His testimonials will be returned to him with his certificate.

15. Service found to be insufficient.—(a) If, however, a candidate has passed his examination, and it is subsequently discovered that his services are insufficient to entitle him to receive a certificate of the grade for which he has passed, it will not be granted to him; but, if the Board are satisfied that the error in the calculation of his services did not occur through any fault or wilful misrepresentation on his part, he will be allowed to go up for re-examination without payment of further fee when he has performed the amount of service in which he was deficient.

(b) If, in such a case, the applicant's services are sufficient to entitle him to receive a certificate of a lower grade, provided as aforesaid he has not wilfully misrepresented the amount of his services, an inferior certificate may be granted to him, and the difference, if any, between the fee paid by him for the superior certificate and the fee payable for the inferior certificate may be placed to his credit.

(c) In such a case, when the applicant has by further service made up the amount in which he was found to be short, he must, before he can receive the higher certificate, be re-examined in all the subjects, unless the Board see fit to dispense with the re-examination.

16. Failure in Examination.—In all cases of failure to pass any of the examinations hereinafter in these Regulations prescribed the candidate must be examined *de novo*. If a candidate fails in seamanship, he will not be re-examined until after a lapse of *six months*. Whether the whole or part of this period must be served at sea must depend upon the subjects in seamanship in which the candidate failed, but what amount, if any, of sea service will be required will be determined by the Board.

The Examiner in making out his report, should state what amount, if any, of further sea service the candidate should, in his opinion be required to perform, and he should also insert this information on the application form of the candidate.

17. Failure in Navigation.—If a candidate fail three times in navigation within three months, he will not be re-examined until after a lapse of *three months* from the date of the *last failure*.

18. Failure in Extra Examinations.—A candidate for an Extra Master's Certificate or for an Extra Master's Certificate for Steam-ships will not be allowed to present himself for examination more than three times within a period of *twelve months*.

19. Candidate failing may be examined for a Certificate of lower Grade.—(a) If a candidate has failed in his examination, but the subjects in which he has failed are not included in the subjects required for a certificate of a lower grade, he may, if he so desires, proceed with the examination for the lower grade certificate without further formal

application or payment of fee, but in this case he will be required to complete the whole of the work prescribed for such lower grade, those subjects for the lower grade in which the candidate has passed (if any), in connexion with the examination for the higher certificate to be credited as passed for the certificate of the lower grade.

(b) If a candidate fail for the Extra Certificate, he may also, without further formal application or payment of fee, proceed with the examination for the Ordinary Certificate, but, in this case, the whole of the examination prescribed for the lower grade will have to be completed irrespective of any work which may have been done under examination for the Extra Certificate. The subsequent examination for the lower grade may, if time permits, be taken during the current week, but should the time be insufficient, the candidate will be allowed to sit at the next following examination.

(c) No part, however, of the fee paid by any candidate will be returned to him, and on presenting himself, when entitled, for re-examination for the higher grade of certificate he will be required to pay a further full fee.

20. Failure in Seamanship.—If a candidate fail in seamanship, *so far as regards the management of square-rigged sailing vessels*, in his examination for an Ordinary Certificate, he may, if qualified as to service, without further formal application or further payment of fee, proceed with the examination for a Certificate of Competency for foreign-going or home-trade steam-ships, as the case may be, or for fore-and-aft rigged vessels. And if a candidate fails in the same manner in his examination for an Extra Master's Certificate, he may, under the same conditions as above, proceed with the examination for an Extra Certificate for steam-ships only.

21. Payment of Fee.—The fee for examination shall be paid, prior to examination, to the Secretary to the Marine Board.

22. Penalty for Bribery.—No candidate shall prior to examination, or during the course of any examination, offer directly or indirectly or cause to be offered any sum of money or other thing whatsoever by way of reward or bribe to any Examiner or other officer of the Board for the purpose of influencing him in any manner in regard to such examination; if any candidate offend against this regulation, the Board may refuse to permit such candidate to be examined, or, if the examination have already commenced, may forbid him to proceed with such examination, and the Board may forfeit any fee paid by him, and may also debar such candidate from presenting himself at any future examination for a period not exceeding twelve months from the date of the offer of such bribe or reward.

23. Fee not returned on Failure.—If a candidate fails in his examination in navigation or seamanship, no part of the fee he has paid will be returned to him.

24. Scale of Fees.—The fees for examination shall be as follows:—

25. Duplicate of Certificate.—When any certificate issued by the Board has been lost or destroyed, and satisfactory proof of such loss or destruction has been furnished, a duplicate may be issued on payment of a fee of Five shillings, provided, however, that the Board may waive the payment of such fee in any case where the Board is satisfied that the loss or destruction of a certificate is not attributable to carelessness on the part of the holder. A declaration as to such loss or destruction must be made by applicants on forms to be obtained from, and returned to, the Secretary.

No fee will be charged if the applicant can prove that the Certificate was lost through shipwreck or fire.

26. First Aid to the Injured.—Every candidate for a Certificate of Competency for the grade of Master or Mate of a foreign-going ship, or of a home-trade ship exceeding 100 tons gross registered tonnage, will be required to show that he possesses a knowledge of First Aid to the Injured, and proof thereof must be given by means of a certificate to such effect granted by either the St. John Ambulance Association or the St. Andrew's Ambulance Association obtained within three years of the date of the examination for the certificate as Master or Mate, and has been obtained when the candidate was not less than sixteen years of age.

27. Resort to the Regulations of the Board of Trade.—In any case not provided for in these Regulations it shall be competent for the Board if it sees fit, to apply to any applicant for a foreign-going Certificate of Competency of any grade, any of the provisions contained in the Regulations made by the Board of Trade of the United Kingdom and for the time being in force relative to the examination of Masters and Mates for Certificates of Competency.

SIGHT TESTS.

28. (a) Every candidate for a Certificate of Competency must pass the prescribed sight tests before a certificate can be issued to him. If circumstances render it necessary for him to proceed with the examination in navigation and seamanship before undergoing the sight tests, he should be informed that the examination in navigation and seamanship will be cancelled in the event of his failure to pass either of the sight tests.

(b) Form Vision Test.—Every candidate for a certificate must pass the form vision test. If he obtained a Certificate of Competency before 1st January, 1914, he will only be required to possess half normal vision using both eyes together. Otherwise he must pass a higher standard, viz., normal vision using both eyes or either eye separately.

Any candidate who has obtained his first certificate under these conditions may obtain his higher certificates, provided that he has normal vision using both eyes or either eye separately.

(c) Colour Vision Test.—Every candidate must undergo the colour vision test on every occasion on which he presents himself for examination for his first Certificate of Competency; but, if he then passes, he will not be required by the Board to undergo the colour vision test on any subsequent occasion.

No person who holds a Certificate of Competency should be examined in colour vision.

(d) A candidate who fails to pass the prescribed form vision test may present himself for re-examination at intervals of three months, but a candidate who fails to pass the colour vision test cannot be re-examined; it is open, however, to any candidate who has failed to pass the colour vision test to appeal to the Board, who may, if they think fit, remit the case to a special Examiner, or body of Examiners, for final decision.

(e) The expenses of candidates who are examined by such special Examiner or body of Examiners, and are reported by him or them to have passed, will, under certain circumstances, be paid by the Board, at a rate which will be notified to the candidate, but no payment whatever will be made towards the expenses of candidates who, upon their own application, are examined by the special Examiner or Examiners, and are reported by him or them to have failed, unless the Board consider that the particular circumstances of the case justify such payment. The special examinations will be held in Melbourne only.

(f) When a candidate fails to pass the colour vision test, the Examiner will point out to him the conditions under which he can appeal. Appeals are to be made through the Examiner, and forwarded to the Board with the Examiner's remarks.

(g) Only Examiners who have themselves passed the colour vision test are to undertake these examinations.

(h) The fee paid for examination for a certificate of Competency includes the fee of One shilling for examination in form vision and colour vision, and if the candidate fails to pass those tests this fee will, with the exception of One shilling, be returned to him.

(i) No additional fee will be charged to any candidate for examination on appeal against failure. If, however, a candidate who has been reported by the special Examiner or body of Examiners as having failed, is still dissatisfied, he may, if he so desires, present himself for a second special examination on payment of a fee of Five guineas, provided that he brings with him a friend to witness the examination; this second examination will, however, be entirely voluntary, and will form no part of the Board's examination for a Certificate of Competency. The Board, will, however give consideration to the result of such examination in determining whether a certificate shall be granted.

(j) Any person serving or intending to serve in the Mercantile Marine, if desirous of undergoing the form vision and colour vision tests *only*, must make application to the Secretary to the Marine Board on form to be obtained therefrom, and must pay a fee of One shilling. This fee will be payable on each occasion upon which a candidate is examined in form vision and colour tests *only*.

QUALIFICATIONS REQUIRED FOR THE VARIOUS GRADES.

CERTIFICATES FOR FOREIGN-GOING SHIPS (ORDINARY CERTIFICATES).

29. Square-rigged Service required.—A candidate for an Ordinary Certificate of any grade in the Foreign or Home trade who has not previously held an Ordinary Certificate of a lower grade must prove that he has served twelve months in the foreign trade, or eighteen months in the home trade, in a square-rigged sailing vessel.

30. Value of Ordinary Certificates.—Ordinary Certificates will entitle the holders to go to sea as Mates or Masters (as the case may be) of any vessel, sailing or steam.

SECOND MATE.

31. Qualifications.—A candidate must be not less than eighteen years of age, and must have served four years at sea.

32. Examination in Navigation.—A candidate for a Second Mate's Certificate will be required:—

- (a) To write a legible hand and spell correctly. For the purpose of testing his ability the candidate will be required to write a short essay on some suitable subject.
- (b) To show a competent knowledge of the first five rules of arithmetic and the use of logarithms.
- (c) To answer questions on elementary plane trigonometry.
- (d) To work a day's work complete, correcting the courses for leeway, deviation, and variation.
- (e) To find the latitude by the meridian altitude of the sun.
- (f) To work any practical problem in parallel sailing.
- (g) To find the true course and distance from one given position to another by the Mercator's method; also the compass course, and deviation being given.
- (h) To find the amplitude of the sun and the error of the compass therefrom; also the deviation, the variation being given.

- (i) To find the longitude by chronometer from altitude of the sun by the usual methods, computing the daily rate of chronometer from errors observed, when required; also to find the true azimuth of the sun, and the error of the compass; and the deviation, the variation being given.
- (j) To find the true azimuth of the sun by the "Time Azimuth" tables; the error of the compass; also the deviation, the variation being given.

Note.—The candidate will be required to give a figure and explanation for each problem worked, and give a written explanation of any of the terms used in navigation or nautical astronomy that may be asked.

- (k) To find on a chart or plan the course or courses to steer and the distance or distances from one given position to another; to find the ship's position together with the set and drift (if any) on the chart or plan from cross-bearings of two objects; to find the ship's position from two bearings of the same object, the course and distance run between taking the bearings being given, making due allowance for a given tide or current; also, the distance of the ship from the object or any given position at the time of taking the second bearing; to find on a chart or plan the course to steer by compass in order to counteract the effect of a given tide or current, and find the distance the ship will make good towards a given point in a given time; to fix a ship's position on a chart or plan by horizontal sextant angles, using a station pointer; and to work out practically the correction to apply to soundings taken at a given time and place to compare with the depth marked on the chart; and give a method of finding approximately the time of high water at any given place without the aid of the Admiralty or other Tide Tables.

He will be examined orally in the following subjects:—

- (l) The Morse and British movable semaphore alphabets, the International Code of Signals, and the "Allied Signal Manual." He will be required to attain a minimum speed of eight words a minute in semaphore and five words a minute in Morse flashing and flag waving.
- (m) The use and adjustments of the sextant, read off and on the arc, and the mode of finding the index error by both horizon and sun.
- (n) The construction, use and principle of the barometer, thermometer and hydrometer. Also the use and care of a chronometer.
- (o) Weights and measures.
- (p) The markings, signs and abbreviations on Admiralty charts or plans.
- (q) The General Notices published in the Board of Trade Summary of Notices to Mariners.
- (r) Elementary questions on the main parts of a ship's construction.

33. Examination in Seamanship.—He must understand and give satisfactory answers on the following subjects:—

- (a) The standing and running rigging of ships.
- (b) Bending, unbending, setting, reefing, taking in, and furling sail.
- (c) Sending masts and yards up and down, &c.
- (d) Management of a ship when under canvas.
- (e) Management of ships' boats in heavy weather.
- (f) Dunnaging and stowing cargo, &c.
- (g) The rule of the road as regards both steam-ships and sailing vessels, their regulation lights and fog and sound signals.
- (h) The signals of distress, and the signals to be made by ships wanting a pilot, and the liabilities and penalties incurred by the misuse of these signals.
- (i) The marking and use of the lead and log lines. Also care and use of sounding machines and mechanical logs.
- (j) The use and management of the rocket apparatus in the event of a vessel being stranded.
- (k) Any questions appertaining to the duties of a Second Mate that the Examiner may think necessary.
- (l) Also questions on the additional subjects specified in the rules of examination for Second Mates' Certificates of Competency for foreign-going steam-ships. (Vide Regulation 45.)

ONLY MATE (ORDINARY).

34. Qualifications.—A candidate must be not less than nineteen years of age, and have served five years at sea.

FIRST MATE (ORDINARY).

35. Qualifications.—A candidate must be not less than nineteen years of age, and have served five years at sea, of which—

One year must have been in a capacity not lower than Fourth Mate of a foreign-going vessel whilst holding a Second Mate's certificate for foreign-going vessels;

If his service was as Third or Fourth Mate proof will be required that he had during the whole year *charge of a watch* (*vide* Regulation 104).

36. Examination in Navigation.—In addition to the work for the Second Mate's Certificate, a candidate for the Only or First Mate's Certificate will be required:—

- (a) To answer questions on right angled spherical trigonometry.
- (b) To compute the time at which a given star will be on the observer's meridian. (Occasionally by inspection.)
- (c) To determine what bright stars will be within a certain hour-angle from the observer's meridian, above the pole and above the horizon, at any given time; also the hour angle, east or west, of each of the stars, and whether they are to the north or south of the observer's zenith when passing the meridian.
- (d) To compute the approximate meridian altitude of a star, for setting the sextant.
- (e) To find the latitude from the meridian altitude of a star.
- (f) To find the longitude by chronometer by altitude of a star.
- (g) To find the true azimuth of a star by the "Time Azimuth" tables, and get the deviation therefrom.
- (h) To find the latitude by ex-meridian altitude of the sun or a star.
- (i) To find the line of position and the true bearing of the sun, and the ship's position, by Sumners' method by projection.

NOTE.—The candidate will be required to give a figure and explanation for each problem worked, and give a written explanation of any of the terms used in navigation or nautical astronomy that may be asked.

- (j) To answer certain questions on meteorology.

He will be examined orally in the following subjects:—

- (k) How to keep a ship's log book.
- (l) How to calculate the capacity of a given bunker or hold.
- (m) How to calculate a freight and its commissions.
- (n) The measurement and equipment of ship's life-boats and number of persons allowed to be carried in each class of boat.
- (o) Testing of life-buoys and life-jackets.
- (p) The screening of ship's side lights.
- (q) More advanced questions on the main part of a ship's construction and general use.

37. Examination in Seamanship.—In addition to the qualifications required for a Second Mate's Certificate, an Only or First Mate will be required to show a knowledge of the following subjects:—

- (a) Shifting large spars, rigging sheers, taking lower masts in and out.
- (b) How to moor and unmoor ship; to keep a clear anchor; and to carry out an anchor.
- (c) How to manage a ship in stormy weather, and to cast a ship on a lee shore.
- (d) How to secure the masts in the event of accident to the bowsprit.
- (e) How to rig purchases for getting heavy weights, anchors, machinery, &c., in or out.
- (f) How to dispose various kinds of cargo and weights in a stiff and in a tender vessel.
- (g) The ventilation of holds, and the stowage of explosives.
- (h) The stowage of grain cargoes.
- (i) How to rig a sea anchor, and what means to employ to keep a vessel, disabled or unmanageable, out of the trough of the sea, and lessen her lee drift.
- (j) How to get a cast of the deep sea lead in heavy weather.
- (k) Accidents, and how to deal with them.

- (l) Any other questions appertaining to the duties of an Only or First Mate which the Examiner may think necessary to ask.
- (m) Also questions on the additional subjects, which are specified in the rules of examination for Only and First Mate's certificates of Competency for foreign-going steam-ships (*vide* Regulation 49).

MASTER (ORDINARY).

38. Qualifications.—A candidate must be not less than 21 years of age, and—

- (a) He must have served six years at sea, of which one year must have been in a capacity not lower than Only Mate of a foreign-going vessel, whilst holding a certificate not lower than an Only Mate's Certificate for foreign-going vessels, provided that, if this service as officer was not performed whilst holding a First Mate's Certificate for foreign-going vessels, the candidate will also be required to prove the officer's service prescribed for that grade (*vide* Regulation 35); *or*
- (b) He must have served six years at sea, of which one year and a half must have been in a capacity not lower than Only Mate of a home trade vessel whilst holding a certificate not lower than an Only Mate's Certificate for foreign-going vessels, provided that, if this service as officer was not performed whilst holding a First Mate's Certificate for foreign-going vessels, the candidate will also be required to prove the officer's service prescribed for that grade (*vide* Regulation 35); *or*
- (c) He must have served six and a half years at sea, one year of which must have been in a capacity not lower than Second Mate of a foreign-going vessel whilst holding a First Mate's Certificate for foreign-going vessels, provided that, if this service as Second Mate was performed under an additional or auxiliary First Mate it will only be accepted if a Third or Fourth Mate were also carried, *and* one year and a half not lower than Third or Fourth Mate of a foreign-going vessel *in charge of a watch* whilst holding a Second Mate's Certificate for foreign-going vessels (*see* Regulation 7); *or*
- (d) He must have served nine years at sea in the home-trade, of which three years must have been as Master, *or* one year as Master and three years in a capacity not lower than that of Mate, provided that, in either case, he has served in such capacity with the requisite certificate and that he has served twelve months in the foreign trade, *or* eighteen months in the home trade in a square-rigged sailing vessel. (See Regulations 29 and 102).

39. Examination in Navigation.—A candidate for an Ordinary Master's Certificate will, in addition to the work prescribed for the grades of Second and First Mate that may be given him by the Examiner be required :—

- (a) To write an essay on some technical subject.
- (b) To find the latitude by the altitude of the Polar star at any time.
- (c) To find the latitude by the meridian altitude of the moon.

NOTE.—The candidate will be required to give a figure and explanation for each problem worked, and give a written explanation of any of the terms used in navigation or nautical astronomy that may be asked.

- (d) To find the magnetic bearing of any fixed object when at sea or at anchor from bearings of the object taken with the ship's head on equi-distant compass points, and to compute the deviation therefrom; to construct a deviation curve upon a Napier's diagram which will be furnished by the Examiner, and show that he understands its practical application; to give satisfactory written and oral answers to certain practical questions as to the effect of the ship's iron upon the compasses, and the method of determining the deviation, and show how to compensate the deviation by magnets and soft iron by the aid of Beall's Compass Deviascope.
- (e) Questions on ship construction and naval architecture and a few elementary questions on stability.

He will be examined orally in the following subjects :—

- (f) The law as to the engagement and discharge and management of the crew, and the entries to be made in the official log.

- (g) How to prevent and check an outbreak of scurvy on board ship.
- (h) The law as to load-line marks, and the entries and reports to be made respecting them.
- (i) Invoices, charter party, bills of lading, Lloyd's agent, nature of bottomry, bills of exchange, surveys, averages, &c.
- (j) The prevailing winds and currents of the globe.
- (k) The trade routes.
- (l) Tides.

40. Examination in Seamanship.—In addition to the qualifications required for the grades of Second and First Mate, an Ordinary Master will be required to show a knowledge of the following subjects:—

- (a) Construction of jury rudders for both wooden and iron vessels, also rafts.
- (b) Resources for the preservation of the ship's crew in the event of wreck.
- (c) Management of ship in heavy weather.
- (d) Rescuing the crew of a disabled vessel.
- (e) Steps to be taken when a ship is on her beam ends, or in any danger or difficulty, or disabled or unmanageable and on a lee shore.
- (f) Heaving a keel out.
- (g) How to proceed when placing a ship in dry dock, and directing repairs, and when putting into port in distress with damage to cargo and ship.
- (h) Any other question appertaining to the management of a ship which the Examiner may think it necessary to ask.
- (i) Also questions on the additional subjects which are specified in the rules of examination for Masters' Certificates of Competency for foreign-going steam-ships (*vide* Regulation 52).

CERTIFICATES FOR FOREIGN-GOING FORE-AND-AFT RIGGED VESSELS ONLY.

41. To Whom issued.—(a) Certificates for the grades of Second Mate, Only Mate, First Mate, and Master of fore-and-aft rigged vessels will be issued to candidates who have not complied with the regulation which requires them to have served at least one year in square-rigged sailing vessels, or who prove in course of examination that they are ignorant of the management of square-rigged ships. In other respects the qualifications for examination for such certificates are the same as for Ordinary Certificates.

(b) The examinations for the grades of Second Mate, Only Mate, First Mate, and Master, of fore-and-aft rigged vessels will be precisely the same as for the Ordinary Certificates, excepting that in seamanship a knowledge of the management of square-rigged vessels is not required.

(c) A certificate for fore-and-aft rigged vessels will not entitle the possessor to act in any case in which a certificate for square-rigged vessels is required. Amongst square-rigged vessels are classed full-rigged ships, barques, brigs, barquentines, brigantines, and steam-ships carrying square sails.

(d) A candidate possessing a certificate for fore-and-aft rigged vessels, and desiring to be examined for an Ordinary Certificate must prove that he has served at sea at least one year in a square-rigged sailing vessel, unless he has previously held an Ordinary Certificate of a lower grade.

CERTIFICATES FOR FOREIGN-GOING STEAM-SHIPS.

42. To Whom issued.—(a) Certificates applying only to steam-ships are issued to candidates who are either unable to comply with the regulation which requires them to have passed one year in square-rigged sailing vessels or who prove in course of examination that they are ignorant of the management of square-rigged sailing vessels. All the qualifying service prescribed for these certificates may have been performed in steam-ships.

(b) These certificates will entitle the holders to go to sea as Masters or Mates of foreign-going steam-ships but will not entitle them to go to sea as Masters or Mates of foreign-going sailing ships.

(c) There will be no distinction in these certificates between fore-and-aft rigged steam-ships and square-rigged steam-ships.

SECOND MATE (STEAM-SHIPS).

43. Qualifications.—The qualifications as to age and service are the same as for an Ordinary Second Mate's Certificate, excepting that the whole of the service may have been performed in steam-ships and that no service in square-rigged sailing vessels is required (*see* Regulation 31).

44. Examination in Navigation.—The examination in navigation for a Second Mate's Certificate for foreign-going steam-ships will be precisely the same as that prescribed for an Ordinary Second Mate's Certificate (*vide* Regulation 32).

45. Examination in Seamanship.—The candidate must understand and be able to give satisfactory answers on the following subjects:—

- (a) The standing and running rigging of steam-ships.
- (b) Bending, unbending, setting, taking in, and furling sail.
- (c) Sending masts and yards up and down, &c.
- (d) Seeing everything in readiness and clear for getting under way, and the precautions to be then observed with regard to steering gear and connexions, engines, propeller, &c.
- (e) Care and usage of mechanical logs and sounding machines.
- (f) Management of ships' boats in heavy weather.
- (g) Dunnaging and stowing cargo, &c.
- (h) The rule of the road as regards both steam-ships and sailing vessels, their regulation lights and fog and sound signals.
- (i) Signals of distress, and signals to be made by ships wanting a pilot, and the liabilities and penalties incurred by the misuse of these signals.
- (j) The marking and use of the ordinary lead and log lines.
- (k) The construction, use, and action of the sluices, and of the water-ballast tanks.
- (l) Engine-room and other telegraphs used on board ship, and deck appliances generally.
- (m) Use and management of the rocket apparatus in the event of a vessel being stranded.
- (n) Any other questions appertaining to the duties of the Second Mate of a steam-ship which the Examiner may think necessary to ask.

ONLY MATE (STEAM-SHIPS).

46. Qualifications.—The qualifications as to age and service are the same as for an Only Mate's Ordinary Certificate, excepting that the whole of the service may have been performed in steam-ships and no service in square-rigged vessels is required (*see* Regulation 34).

FIRST MATE (STEAM-SHIPS).

47. Qualifications.—The qualifications as to age and service are the same as for a First Mate's Ordinary Certificate, excepting that the whole of the service may have been in steam-ships, and that no service in square-rigged vessels is required (*see* Regulation 35).

48. Examination in Navigation.—The examination in navigation for an Only or First Mate's Certificate for foreign-going steam-ships will be precisely the same as that prescribed for an Ordinary First Mate's Certificate (*vide* Regulation 36).

49. Examination in Seamanship.—In addition to the qualifications required for a Second Mate's Certificate, an Only or First Mate will be required to show a knowledge of the following subjects:—

- (a) Shifting large spars; rigging sheers; and taking lower masts in and out.
- (b) How to moor and unmoor ship; keep a clear anchor; and carry out an anchor.
- (c) Management of a steam-ship in stormy weather.
- (d) How to rig purchases for getting heavy weights, anchors, machinery, &c., in and out.
- (e) How to dispose various kinds of cargo and weights in a stiff and in a tender vessel.
- (f) Ventilation of holds, and the stowage of explosives.
- (g) Stowage of grain cargoes.
- (h) The effects of the screw race upon the rudder; and the effect produced on the direction of the head of the ship by going (ahead) (astern) with a (right) (left) handed screw when the rudder is (ported) (starboarded); also, the effect of twin screws under the same conditions, and when going ahead with one and reversing the other, &c. &c.
- (i) How to rig a sea anchor, and what means to employ to keep a steamer, with her machinery disabled, out of the trough of the sea, and to lessen her lee drift.
- (j) How to turn a steam-ship short round.
- (k) How to get a cast of the deep sea lead in heavy weather.
- (l) Any other questions appertaining to the duties of a First Mate of a steam-ship which the examiner may think necessary to put to him.

MASTER (STEAM-SHIPS).

50. Qualifications.—The qualifications as to age and service are the same as for a Master's Ordinary Certificate for a foreign-going ship, excepting that the whole of the service may have been performed in steam-ships, and that no service in square-rigged vessels is required (see Regulation 38).

51. Examination in Navigation.—The examination in navigation for a Master's Certificate for foreign-going steam-ships will be precisely the same as that prescribed for an Ordinary Master's Certificate (*vide* Regulation 39).

52. Examination in Seamanship.—In addition to the qualifications required for the grades of Second and First Mate, a Master will be required to show a knowledge of the following subjects:—

- (a) Construction of rafts and jury rudders suitable for screw steam-ships.
- (b) The preservation of the ship's crew in the event of wreck.
- (c) Management of steam-ships in heavy weather.
- (d) Rescuing the crew of a disabled ship.
- (e) Steps to be taken when a vessel is on her beam ends, or disabled and on a lee shore.
- (f) How to use steam appliances in the event of fire.
- (g) Economy in coal consumption.
- (h) The best arrangement for towing vessels under different circumstances.
- (i) Placing ship in dry dock; directing repairs; and the mode of procedure when putting into port in distress with damage to cargo and ship.
- (j) Any other questions appertaining to the management of a steam-ship which the Examiner may think it necessary to put to him.

53. Steam-ship Certificates, how changed.—A candidate possessing a certificate for foreign-going steam-ships, and desiring to be examined for an Ordinary Certificate, must prove that he has served at sea at least one year in a square-rigged sailing vessel, unless he has previously held an Ordinary Certificate of a lower grade.

EXTRA CERTIFICATES.

(A) CERTIFICATES FOR FOREIGN-GOING SHIPS.

54. Value of such Certificates.—(a) An Extra Master's Certificate for foreign-going ships will entitle the holder to go to sea as Master of any vessel sailing or steam.

(b) The examination is voluntary and intended for such persons as wish to prove their superior qualifications and are desirous of having certificates of the highest grade granted by the Board.

(c) The extra examination may take place when the candidate is qualified to go up for examination for an Ordinary Master's Certificate, or at any time subsequent to his having passed the examination for that certificate.

55. Examination in Navigation.—In addition to the work for the Ordinary Certificate, the candidate must also be prepared to be examined in any of the following subjects, showing the construction of all the problems:—

- (a) To find the latitude or position from double altitudes of the sun or of a star.
- (b) To determine, from simultaneous observations of two different stars, the position of the ship; and the true bearing of the stars, by Sumner's method. The candidate may either determine the four longitudes from the two assumed latitudes which will be given, or solve the question in any other way he may choose.
- (c) To find the error of a chronometer from the altitude of the sun or of a star, observed with an artificial, or with the natural, horizon.
- (d) To explain clearly in writing the principles of (1) Great Circle sailing; (2) Windward Great Circle sailing; (3) Composite Great Circle sailing; and their advantages and disadvantages.
- (e) To show approximately on a terrestrial globe the Great Circle track and the distance from one given position to another; also the latitude and longitude of vertex; and the longitude from vertex; and to explain how the track can then be transferred to a Mercator's chart. Occasionally the candidate will be required to lay the track down on a chart.

- (f) To determine the initial Great Circle course, and the distance, from one given position to another, the latitude and longitude of vertex, the longitude from vertex and the latitudes and longitudes through which the Great Circle will pass; laying the track, composite or otherwise, down on a Mercator's chart, and explaining briefly how the course and distance from one point to another on this track is then found. This problem may, subject to the decision of the Examiner, be solved either by calculation, or by any tables, graphic method, or Great Circle chart, known to and preferred by the candidate, and it will usually be set so as to leave the choice of method to the candidate.
- (g) To draw a figure, and write down the trigonometrical ratios.
- (h) Right-angled plane trigonometry; deducing and writing down the formula for each computation in the problem given.
- (i) Oblique-angled plane trigonometry; deducing and writing down the formula, or the rule, for each computation in the problem given.
- (j) To give Napier's rules for circular parts for the solution of right-angled spherical triangles, explaining clearly how the different angles and sides are considered in deducing the formulæ.
- (k) Right-angled spherical trigonometry.
- (l) To answer a paper on magnetism as relating to the compass.
- (m) To construct a plan or chart on Mercator's principle and solve a given problem thereon.
- (n) To answer a paper on Naval Architecture, including ship construction and stability.
- (o) To answer a paper on general knowledge, including shipping business, imports and exports, astronomy and general elementary science (except chemistry).

He will be examined orally on the following subjects:—

- (p) The leading principles of the construction of the sextant and vernier; mechanical logs and sounding machines.
- (q) The civil duties of a shipmaster, in which he will be expected to show a more extensive knowledge than a candidate for an Ordinary Master's Certificate.

In signalling he will be required to attain a minimum speed of twelve words a minute in semaphore, ten words a minute in Morse flashing; and six words a minute in Morse flag waving.

The construction of the problems mentioned above, and of the compass problems, must be shown as follows:—

- (a) A circle should be drawn projected on the plane of the horizon—unless the problem can be shown better otherwise—and a correct figure drawn in it, the magnitude of the sides and angles being estimated approximately by the eye.
- (b) The sides and angles used in solving the problem should be marked by distinguishing letters in the figure, and the candidate should over each fresh computation write down clearly what is given and what he is required to find, together with the formula which he proposes to use.
- (c) Opposite each quantity in the computation he should put the letters denoting the part of the triangle which it represents, writing "comp." before the letters when the quantity is the complement of that part of the triangle.

Candidates will not be required to enter into the mathematical investigation of the rules and formulæ used in the solution of problems involving oblique-angled spherical triangles, but credit will be given to any candidate showing such knowledge. When, however, a problem or part of a problem is solved by right-angled spherical trigonometry, the simple process of deducing the formula from the figure, by Napier's rules for circular parts or other method, must be shown.

Where a problem is solved by right-angled plane trigonometry, the simple process of deducing the formula from the figure for each of the computations in it must be shown.

The rule for finding the latitude by meridian altitude must be proved by the figure.

Protractors must not be used in the chart construction problem either for setting off variation or laying off positions. All sketches and drawings required in the paper on Naval Architecture should be neatly done on paper supplied by the Examiner.

56. Examination in Seamanship.—In addition to the qualifications required of an Ordinary Master, an Extra Master will be expected to give satisfactory answers to any questions in practical seamanship that the Examiner may put to him.

(B) CERTIFICATES FOR FOREIGN-GOING STEAM-SHIPS ONLY.

57. Value of such Certificates.—(a) Extra Certificates for steam-ships will be issued, subject to the examination described below, to officers who can show the necessary service in steam-ships. The certificates will be marked "For steam-ships only," and will only entitle the holders to go to sea as Masters of steam-ships.

(b) The examination is open to all who are qualified to go up for a certificate as Master of a foreign-going steam-ship, or who have already obtained that certificate. It is open also to candidates who have failed, in the examination for an Extra Master's Certificate, to show the requisite knowledge of the management of square-rigged sailing vessels, provided they can prove the necessary amount of officers' service in steam-ships (*see* Regulation 20).

58. Examination in Navigation.—The examination in navigation for an Extra Master's Certificate for steam-ships will be precisely the same as that prescribed for an Extra Master's Certificate.

59. Examination in Seamanship.—In addition to the qualifications required of a Master of a foreign-going steam-ship, a candidate for a certificate as an Extra Master will be expected to give satisfactory answers to any questions appertaining to the management of a steam-ship that the Examiner may put to him.

HOME-TRADE CERTIFICATES.**(A) ORDINARY CERTIFICATES FOR HOME-TRADE SHIPS.****Mate.**

60. Qualifications.—A candidate for examination as Mate of a Home-trade ship must be not less than nineteen years of age, and have served four years at sea, of which he must have served twelve months in the foreign trade, or eighteen months in the home trade in a square-rigged sailing vessel. (See Regulation 29).

61. Examination in Navigation—He must write a legible hand and spell correctly, and understand and work out sums in the rules of compound addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division; he must be able to work a day's work, correcting the courses for deviation, leeway, and variation. He will be required to find the latitude by meridian altitude of the sun; he must be able to take a bearing by compass, and be conversant with the use of Mercator's chart, and be able to find, on a chart or plan, the course or courses to steer and the distance or distances from one given position to another; to find the ship's position, together with the set and drift (if any) on a chart or plan from cross bearings of two objects; to find the ship's position from two bearings of the same or different objects, the course and distance run between taking the bearings being given, making due allowance for a given tide or current; also the distance of the ship from the objects or from any given position at the time of taking the second bearing; to find on a chart or plan the course to steer by compass in order to counteract the effect of a given tide or current and to find the distance the ship will make good towards a given point in a certain time, and to work out practically the correction to apply to soundings taken at a given time and place, to compare with the depth marked on the chart; also, to fix the ship's position by horizontal sextant angles, using a station pointer for plotting it on the chart or plan, &c., and give a method of finding approximately the time of high water at any given place without the aid of the Admiralty or other Tide Tables. He will also be required to explain orally the markings, signs, and abbreviations on Admiralty charts and plans, the use of the sextant, to be able to observe with it, to read *off* and *on* the arc, and to find the index error by the horizon. He will also be required to attain a minimum speed of eight words a minute in semaphore and five words a minute in Morse flashing and flag waving, and to have a good working knowledge of the International Code of Signals and "Allied Signal Manual."

62. Examination in Seamanship.—He must give satisfactory answers to questions as to the standing and running rigging of ships; as to bending and unbending, setting, reefing, taking in, and furling sail; as to shifting large spars, rigging sheers, taking lower masts in and out; as to the management of a ship's boat in heavy weather; how to moor and unmoor ship, and to keep a clear anchor; to carry out an anchor; how to rig purchases for getting heavy weights, machinery, &c., in and out; he must give satisfactory answers as to the ventilation of holds, the storage of explosives, and the dunnaging and stowing of cargo generally; he must have a thorough knowledge of the rule of the

road as regards both steam-ships and sailing vessels, their regulation lights and fog and sound signals; he must be able to describe the signals of distress and the signals to be made by ships wanting a pilot, and the liabilities and penalties incurred by the misuse of such signals; he must be able to mark and use the lead and log lines; he must also understand the use and management of the rocket apparatus in the event of his vessel being stranded; he must also have a knowledge of the character of the lights and dangers within the limits of the Home trade. He will also be required to give satisfactory answers to questions as to his knowledge of the additional subjects (applying more particularly to steam-ships) which are specified in the rules of examination for Mates' Certificates of Competency for Home-trade steam-ships only.

Master (Home-trade Ships).

63. Qualifications.—A candidate for examination as Master of a Home-trade ship must be not less than 21 years of age and have served five years at sea, of which—

- (a) One year must have been as a Mate of a Home-trade ship of not less than 100 tons gross registered tonnage while in possession of a Mate's Certificate for Home-trade ships; or
- (b) One year must have been in a capacity not lower than Second Mate of a foreign-going ship while in possession of a First Mate's Certificate for foreign-going ships; or
- (c) Two and a half years must have been in a capacity not lower than Second Mate of a Home-trade ship in charge of a watch, while in possession of a Mate's Certificate for Home-trade ships or a Second Mate's Certificate for foreign-going ships.

64. Examination in Navigation.—In addition to the navigation qualifications required of a Mate of a Home-trade ship, the candidate must show that he is able to observe and calculate by inspection the amplitude of the sun, and to find the error of the ship's compass therefrom; and also the deviation, the variation being given. He must be able to observe the sun's azimuth, and to find its true bearing from the "Time Azimuth Tables"; to find the error and deviation of a ship's compass, the variation being given. He will be required to answer in writing the questions regarding the deviation of the compass.

65. Examination in Seamanship.—In addition to the qualifications required for a Mate of a Home-trade ship, the candidate must know how to rig a sea anchor, and what means to apply to keep a vessel which has become disabled or unmanageable out of the trough of the sea, &c., &c.; how to get a cast of the deep-sea lead in heavy weather, &c.; he will be examined as to his resources for the preservation of the passengers and crew in the event of wreck, and the steps to be taken if his vessel is disabled and drifting towards a lee shore; he must be able to construct jury rudders for both wooden and iron vessels, and also rafts. He must explain the mode of procedure when placing a ship in dry dock, directing repairs, and when putting into port in distress with damage to cargo and ship. He must possess a sufficient knowledge of what he is required to do by law as to entry and clearance of vessel, the engagement, the discharge, and management of his crew, and as to infliction of penalties and entries to be made in the official log, and the law as to load-line marks and the entries and reports to be made respecting them. He must answer any questions appertaining to the management of a ship which the Examiner may consider it necessary to put to him. He will also be required to give satisfactory answers as to his knowledge of the additional subjects (applying more particularly to steam-ships) which are specified in the rules of examination for Master's Certificates of Competency for Home-trade steam-ships only.

(B) CERTIFICATES FOR "HOME-TRADE STEAM-SHIPS ONLY."

66. Value of such Certificates.—(a) Certificates of Competency will be issued, subject to the examinations hereinafter described, to candidates who have served in steam-ships or who prove in course of examination for Ordinary Certificates that they are ignorant of the management of square-rigged sailing-vessels, provided they are qualified as to service.

(b) These certificates will entitle the holders to go to sea as Masters and Mates of Home-trade steam-ships, but will not entitle the holders to go to sea as Masters or Mates of Home-trade sailing ships.

(c) There will be no distinction in these certificates between fore-and-aft rigged and square-rigged steam-ships.

Mate (Home-trade Steam-ships).

67. **Qualifications.**—A candidate for examination as Mate of a Home-trade steam-ship only must not be less than nineteen years of age, and must have served four years at sea.

68. **Examination in Navigation.**—The examination will be the same as that prescribed for Mates of Home-trade ships (*vide* Regulation 61).

69. **Examination in Seamanship.**—In addition to the examination prescribed for a Mate of a Home-trade ship (*vide* Regulation 62) in so far as such may apply to steam-ships, he must give satisfactory answers to questions as to a steam-ship getting under way, either from a berth at a wharf, &c., or from an anchorage, and as to the precautions to be then observed with regard to engines, propeller, &c.; as to the management of a steam-ship when under canvas; he must also understand the construction, use, and action of the sluices, and of the water-ballast tanks, engine-room telegraph, &c., and any questions appertaining to the duties of the Mate of a Home-trade steam-ship.

Master (Home-trade Steam-ships).

70. **Qualifications.**—A candidate for examination as Master of a Home-trade steam-ship must be not less than 21 years of age, and have served five years at sea, of which—

- (a) One year must have been as Mate of a Home-trade steam-ship of not less than 100 tons gross registered tonnage while in possession of a Mate's Certificate for Home-trade steam-ships; or
- (b) One year must have been in a capacity not lower than Second Mate of a foreign-going steam-ship while in possession of a First Mate's Certificate for foreign-going steam-ships; or
- (c) Two and a half years must have been in a capacity not lower than Second Mate of a Home-trade steam-ship in charge of a watch, while in possession of a Mate's Certificate for Home-trade steam-ships or a Second Mate's Certificate for foreign-going steam-ships.

71. **Examination in Navigation.**—The examination will be the same as that prescribed for Masters of Home-trade ships (*vide* Regulation 64).

72. **Examination in Seamanship.**—In addition to the qualifications prescribed for Masters of Home-trade ships (*vide* Regulation 65) in so far as such may apply to steam-ships, he must show that he understands the management of a steam-ship in heavy weather. He must be able to describe the effects of the screw-race upon the rudder; and the effect produced on the head of the ship by going ahead or astern with a right or left handed screw when the rudder is ported or starboarded. He must know what means to apply to keep a steam-ship with machinery disabled out of the trough of the sea, and lessen her lee drift; he must know how to use the steam appliances in the event of fire, and the best arrangement for towing vessels under different circumstances; he must be able to answer any questions appertaining to the management of a steam-ship that the Examiner may consider necessary to put to him.

CERTIFICATES FOR MASTERS OF FORE-AND-AFT RIGGED HOME-TRADE SAILING SHIPS NOT EXCEEDING 100 TONS GROSS REGISTERED TONNAGE.**Master.**

73. **Qualifications.**—A candidate for examination for a Certificate of Competency as Master of a fore-and-aft rigged Home-trade sailing ship not exceeding 100 tons gross registered tonnage must be not less than twenty years of age, and must have served five years at sea as a deck-hand in sailing vessels of not less than 15 tons gross registered tonnage, and must prove that he has served in such capacity at least twelve months within the three years immediately preceding the date of his application to be examined.

74. **Examination.**—He must write a legible hand, and have a knowledge of notation and the first four rules of arithmetic. He must be able to take a bearing by compass, and be conversant with the use of Mercator's chart, and be able to find on either a true or magnetic chart the course to steer, and the distance from one given position to another, to find the ship's position on the chart from cross bearings of two objects; from two bearings of the same object, the course and distance run between taking the bearings being given; and also the distance of the ship from the object at the time of taking the second bearing; and he must be able to properly keep a ship's log. He must give satisfactory answers as to the management of fore-and-aft rigged Home-trade sailing vessels under all conditions of weather, and as to the dunnaging and stowing of cargo generally. He must have a thorough

knowledge of the rule of the road as regards both steam-ships and sailing vessels, their regulation lights and fog and sound signals. He must be able to describe the signals of distress and the signals to be made by ships wanting a pilot, and the liabilities and penalties incurred by the misuse of such signals. He must be able to mark and use the lead and log lines. He must also understand the use and management of the rocket apparatus in the event of his vessel being stranded. He must also have a knowledge of the character of the lights and dangers within the limits of the Home-trade, and answer any questions appertaining to the duties of a Master of a fore-and-aft rigged Home-trade sailing ship not exceeding 100 tons gross registered tonnage which the Examiner may consider necessary to put to him.

**CERTIFICATES FOR MASTERS OF SAILING SHIPS UNDER
100 TONS GROSS REGISTERED TONNAGE IN THE RIVER
AND BAY SERVICE.**

Master.

75. Qualifications.—A candidate for examination for a certificate as Master of a River and Bay sailing ship under 100 tons gross registered tonnage must be not less than twenty years of age, and must have served three years as a deck-hand in sailing vessels of not less than 15 tons gross registered tonnage.

76. Examination.—He must write a legible hand; he must know thoroughly the rule of the road, and show that he possesses the requisite local knowledge of the bays, lakes, or rivers for which he desires to be examined; he must also be acquainted with the port signals of Victoria, and answer any questions appertaining to the duties of a Master of a sailing vessel engaged in the river and bay service that the Examiner may consider necessary, particularly as to the management of fore-and-aft rigged vessels.

77. Exchange of Certificates.—The holder of a Master's Certificate of Competency for a River and Bay sailing ship, desirous of being qualified to take charge of a river and bay steam-ship of less than 100 tons gross registered tonnage, may have his certificate exchanged therefor, on his producing satisfactory evidence of his having been employed as a deck-hand in a river and bay steam-ship for a period of not less than six months while in possession of such certificate as aforesaid; he must also show, on examination, that he has acquired the knowledge necessary for a person to take charge of such a steam-ship, and that he has a knowledge of notation, and the first four rules of arithmetic.

**CERTIFICATES FOR MASTERS OF STEAM-SHIPS UNDER
100 TONS GROSS REGISTERED TONNAGE IN THE RIVER
AND BAY SERVICE.**

Master.

78. Restricted Limits.—A candidate for examination for a Certificate of Competency as Master of a River and Bay steam-ship under 100 tons gross registered tonnage will, on his passing the examination hereinafter prescribed, receive a certificate for such waters as his previous experience and service may entitle him to, namely (if limits restricted):—"Port of Melbourne," "Port of Geelong," "Western Port," "Gippsland Lakes," "River Murray," &c., and his certificate will be indorsed accordingly; the holder of such Certificate of Competency, as Master for restricted limits, shall be deemed competent to act as Mate of any River and Bay steam-ship of 100 tons gross registered tonnage and upwards.

79. Qualifications.—Such candidate must be not less than twenty years of age, and must have served four years as a deck-hand in sea-going or River and Bay steam-ships of not less than 15 tons gross registered tonnage, of which one year must have been on steam-ships plying in the waters for which he desires to obtain a certificate, and must prove that he has served in such capacity at least twelve months within the three years immediately preceding the date of his application to be examined.

80. Examination.—The examination will be the same as that prescribed for Masters of steam-ships of 100 tons gross registered tonnage and upwards (*vide* Regulation 88).

81. Exchange of Certificates.—The holder of a Master's Certificate of Competency for River and Bay steam-ships under 100 tons gross registered tonnage desirous of being qualified to take charge of a River and Bay steam-ship of 100 tons gross registered tonnage and upwards, may have his certificate exchanged therefor on his producing satisfactory evidence of his having served as Mate of a River and Bay steam-ship.

of over 100 tons gross registered tonnage for a period of not less than six months while in possession of a Master's certificate as aforesaid. He must also show on examination that he has acquired a knowledge of the management of the larger class of River and Bay steam-ships.

82. Unrestricted Limits.—Any candidate who is in possession of a Master's Certificate for River and Bay steam-ships *under* 100 tons for restricted limits (*vide* Regulation 78), and is desirous of obtaining a like certificate for the River and Bay service generally (*i.e.*, without restriction as to limits), will require to produce satisfactory evidence of having served for a period of not less than six months as a Mate or deck-hand of a River and Bay steam-ship of not less than 15 tons gross registered tonnage plying in "Port Phillip Bay," and will require to show on examination that he has acquired the necessary local knowledge.

83. Certificates issued by other Authorities.—Any candidate who is in possession of a Certificate of Competency as a Master of a steam-ship issued by any competent authority recognised as such by the Marine Board of Victoria (the said certificate being in the opinion of the Board equivalent in value to a Victorian River and Bay Certificate for a similar grade), and who is desirous of obtaining a certificate of such grade applicable to Victorian waters, may make application (accompanied by the prescribed fee) to the Board, who will cause such candidate to be examined as to his local knowledge.

Upon passing such examination a Certificate of Competency as a Master of a River and Bay steam-ship under 100 tons gross registered tonnage may be issued to such candidate.

CERTIFICATES FOR STEAM-SHIPS OF 100 TONS GROSS REGISTERED TONNAGE AND UPWARDS IN THE RIVER AND BAY SERVICE.

84. Restricted Limits.—A candidate for examination for a Certificate of Competency as Mate or Master of River and Bay steam-ships of 100 tons gross registered tonnage and *upwards* will, on his passing the examination hereinafter prescribed, receive a certificate for such waters as his previous experience and service may entitle him to, namely (if limits restricted):—"Port of Melbourne," "Port of Geelong," "Western Port," "Gippsland Lakes," "River Murray," &c., and such certificate will be indorsed accordingly.

Mate.

85. Qualifications.—A candidate for examination for a certificate as Mate of steam-ships of 100 tons gross registered tonnage and *upwards* must be not less than nineteen years of age, and must have served three years as a deck-hand in sea-going or River and Bay steam-ships of not less than 15 tons gross registered tonnage, of which one year must have been on steam-ships of not less than 100 tons gross registered tonnage plying in the waters for which he desires to obtain a certificate, and must prove that he has served in such capacity at least twelve months within the three years immediately preceding the date of his application to be examined.

Provided that a candidate who is the holder of a "Foreign-going" Certificate of Competency as a Second Mate may be deemed to be eligible for examination for a certificate as Mate of a "River and Bay" steam-ship if on a consideration of his case the Marine Board is of opinion that his previous service is equal to the qualifying service prescribed by this Regulation.

86. Examination.—He must write a legible hand, and have a knowledge of notation and the first four rules of arithmetic; he must know thoroughly the rule of the road, how to mark and use the lead line, and be acquainted with the port signals of Victoria; he must show that he possesses the requisite local knowledge of the ports or rivers for which he desires to be examined, and answer any questions appertaining to the duties of a Mate in the River and Bay service that the Examiner may consider necessary; provided that the examination of a candidate for a certificate restricted to the River Murray shall be confined to subjects pertaining to the navigation of a steam-ship trading on the River Murray.

Master.

87. Qualifications.—A candidate for examination for a Certificate as Master of steam-ships of 100 tons gross registered tonnage and *upwards* must be not less than twenty years of age, and must have served four years in sea-going or River and Bay steam-ships, of which one year must have been as Mate of a River and Bay steam-ship of not less than 100 tons gross registered tonnage, during which service as Mate he must have been in possession of a Mate's Certificate, or of a certificate as Master of steam-ships under 100 tons gross registered tonnage.

88. Examination.—In addition to the qualifications required for a Mate he must understand the first four rules of compound arithmetic; be able to take a bearing, and ascertain therefrom the position of a ship by cross bearings, as well as find on a local magnetic chart the course and distance to steer by compass between any one given point or place and another; he must have an intimate knowledge of the rivers, lakes, or bays for which he desires to obtain a certificate, and also of the International Code of Signals, and the use and management of the rocket apparatus in the event of the vessel being stranded; he must also be able to answer any questions appertaining to the management of a River and Bay steam-ship that the Examiner may consider necessary; provided that the examination of a candidate for a certificate restricted to the River Murray shall be confined to subjects pertaining to the navigation of a steam-ship trading on the River Murray.

89. Unrestricted Limits.—Any candidate who is in possession of a River and Bay Certificate as Master for restricted limits (*vide* Regulation 84), and is desirous of obtaining a certificate for the River and Bay service generally (*i.e.*, without restriction as to limits), will require to produce satisfactory evidence of having served for a period of not less than six months as a Mate or deck-hand of a River and Bay steam-ship of not less than 100 tons gross registered tonnage plying in "Port Phillip Bay," and will require to show on examination that he has acquired the necessary local knowledge.

EXAMINATIONS IN COMPASS DEVIATION, SIGNALLING, AND IN STEAM.

90. Voluntary Examination in Compass Deviation.—Any person holding a certificate of any grade in the Foreign or Home-trade who wishes to pass a voluntary examination in compass deviation can at any time be examined upon filling up the usual form of application, and the payment to the Secretary to the Marine Board of a fee of One pound. If the candidate passes such examination, a statement to that effect will be duly made upon the certificate as Master or Mate held by him.

91. Voluntary Examination in Signalling.—(a) The examination in Signalling as prescribed for candidates for the Extra Master's Certificate is open as a voluntary examination to all persons holding, or who have passed for, or who are candidates for, a Certificate of Competency of any grade.

(b) If the candidate passes, the fact, with the date and place of passing, will be recorded upon his Certificate of Competency.

(c) Candidates may be examined at any time upon filling up the usual form of application, and payment to the Secretary to the Marine Board of a fee of One pound.

(d) No fee, however, will be charged for this examination if it is taken at the same time as that at which a candidate is examined for any Certificate of Competency.

92. Voluntary Examination in Steam.—A candidate who is possessed of a Certificate of Competency of any grade for Foreign-going or Home-trade vessels may be examined as to his practical knowledge of the use and working of the steam-engine, and such examination will be conducted at such time and place as may be appointed for the purpose.

93. Examination in Steam: How to Apply.—Any Master or Mate as aforesaid desiring to be examined in steam must fill up and lodge with the Secretary the usual form of application, accompanied by a fee of One pound; if the applicant has a Certificate of Competency, such certificate must be delivered with his application. He will also be required to produce testimonials for sobriety and good conduct for at least the last eighteen months preceding the date of application to be examined; he will then be informed of the time and place at which he is to attend to be examined.

94. Examination in Steam: Indorsement of Certificate.—If the candidate pass, Form Exn. 15, together with a written report of the examination, should be forwarded by the Examiner to the Secretary; the words "Certified to have passed in Steam," with the date and place of examination, will then be entered on the certificate, and returned to the candidate.

The indorsement of a Master's or Mate's Certificate for "Steam" does not, however, imply that he is qualified to perform the duties of an Engineer.

95. Examination in Steam: Failure.—If the candidate fail to pass, his certificate will be returned to him at once, but no part of the fee he has paid will be returned, and he will not be permitted to present himself for re-examination until the expiration of three months from the date of failure.

REGULATIONS FOR ESTIMATING SEA SERVICE.

96. Discharges.—Sea service shall be reckoned from the commencement to the termination of a voyage, and certificates of discharge may be accepted as proof of sea service, but the Secretary will be careful to see that such discharges have not in any way been tampered with, and in any suspicious case shall report the matter to the Board.

97. Verification of Services.—Services must be verified in all possible cases by original discharges, but in cases of shipwreck or other unforeseen causes where the discharges have been lost a proper affidavit or declaration made and produced by the candidate may be accepted in lieu thereof.

98. Sea-service for Foreign-going Certificates.—For Foreign-going Certificates the term "sea-service" shall mean, unless otherwise stated, service performed in foreign-going ships.

99. Officers' Service : Home Trade.—Service in a lower grade than First or Only Mate in the home or coasting trade will not be recognised as officers' service towards qualifying a candidate for examination for a Foreign-going Certificate.

100. Service in the Home Trade.—Service in the home trade will be accepted as equivalent to service in the foreign trade for certificates for home-trade ships, but for Foreign-going Certificates service in the home trade will only be accepted as equivalent to two-thirds of the same time served in the foreign trade.

101. Foreign-going Certificates.—Where a Foreign-going Certificate is required in order to qualify a candidate for examination, the certificate may be either an ordinary certificate, or a certificate for fore-and-aft rigged vessels, or a certificate for foreign-going steam-ships.

102. Officers' Service.—Officer's service, to be recognised as such, must be performed with the requisite certificate as specified in these Regulations. The officer's service performed by men who have been duly promoted during the course of a voyage (*vide* Regulation 106), or who in consequence of serving in vessels plying between ports abroad, have been unable to obtain the necessary certificate may, however, be recognised, provided that it is in other respects satisfactory.

103. Foreign Officers.—Foreign officers who wish to apply for a Certificate of Competency under these Regulations must in all cases have performed their qualifying officer's service with the requisite certificate as specified in these Regulations. The service may have been performed in foreign vessels if the candidate can produce satisfactory testimonials as to conduct and character, and is able to prove that the service has been in the required capacities, and that during the period of service he has held a Certificate of Competency of the grade required by the Regulations issued by the Board of Trade, London, or by some authority duly recognised thereby (*see also* Regulation 107).

104. In Charge of a Watch.—When service in charge of a watch in either the foreign or home trade is specified in the Regulations, candidates for Certificates of Competency as First Mate must be able to prove that during eight months at least of their service they have kept full regular watch *during the whole voyage, i.e., from port to port*, which, if in the foreign trade, must amount to not less than eight hours of each twenty-four hours' service. Where a candidate can prove eight months of such full service, service performed in cases where watches were doubled at any time during the voyage will be accepted as equivalent to half the same period of full watch-keeping service. No amount of occasional service will, by itself, be accepted as qualifying service. Candidates for Certificates of Competency as Master will be required to have served during the whole of the time specified by the Regulations in full charge of a watch, and no service performed under the system of double watches, except as the senior officer, will be accepted as qualifying service for a certificate of this grade; unless the candidate produces a clear and satisfactory testimonial, specially setting forth the above facts, from the Master or Owner of the vessel in which the service was performed, it will not be accepted.

105. Additional Mates.—Service as additional or auxiliary First or Second Mates, in large foreign-going vessels, when, in both cases, Third and Fourth Mates are also carried, will count as First Mate's or Second Mate's service, as the case may be, provided that the candidate was entered on the articles in one of these capacities, and that he produces the necessary certificate (*vide* Regulation 104) showing that he was in charge of a watch or watches during the whole time claimed (*see also* Regulation 7).

106. Promotion during Voyage.—Whenever a man has, from any cause, been regularly promoted on the occurrence of a vacancy in the course of the voyage from the rank in which he first shipped, and such promotion, with the reason for which it has been made, is properly entered in the articles and in the Official Log Book, he will receive credit for his service in the higher grade for the period subsequent to his promotion on his producing a discharge in evidence of such service.

107. Evidence as to Service in Foreign Vessels.—The testimonials of service of foreigners and of British officers and seamen serving in foreign vessels which cannot be verified in any Mercantile Marine Office must be confirmed either by the Consul of the country to which the ship in which the candidate served belonged or by some other recognised official authority of that country, or by the testimony of some credible person on the spot having personal knowledge of the facts required to be established. The production, however, of such evidence will not of necessity be deemed sufficient, and in each case the Board reserves to itself the right of dealing with any application made under this regulation as it may see fit.

108. Auxiliary Screw Ships.—Service in auxiliary screw whaling ships and other vessels with auxiliary power, which use their screws only in calms or during light winds, is considered as service performed in sailing vessels.

109. Service as Carpenter, Sailmaker, Cook, Steward, Wireless Operator, &c.—(a) Candidates whose service has been performed in capacities other than apprentice, midshipman, cadet, ordinary seaman or able seaman—*e.g.*, men who have served as carpenter, or sailmaker, or as cook in small vessels where cooking is only part of a man's duty—will be required to satisfy the Board that they have during the whole time claimed performed deck duties in addition to their own particular work, and that they have a good knowledge of seamanship. The latter may be proved by the production of satisfactory certificates from the Masters with whom the candidate has served; but such service will only be accepted as equivalent to two-thirds of the time served as ordinary deck-hand. Failing satisfactory evidence, the candidate will be required to perform additional service in the capacity of seaman. Service as cook (under other conditions than the above), or as steward or purser, will not be accepted.

(b) If a candidate has been engaged on Articles of Agreement as seaman, or in any seaman rating, and has served both as a seaman and as a wireless operator, the service may be counted as qualifying service in full.

(c) If a candidate has been engaged on Articles of Agreement as a wireless operator, and has served as such, one-quarter of the service up to a maximum of twelve months, may be counted as qualifying service.

110. Service in Fishing or Pilot Vessels.—Service performed exclusively in trawlers and other deep-sea fishing vessels, or in pilot vessels, will not qualify a candidate for examination. He must, in addition, prove the following service:—

- (1) For a *Foreign-going Certificate*, service for at least eighteen months in an ordinary trading vessel in the foreign trade or the equivalent period (27 months) in the home-trade.
- (2) For a *Home-trade Certificate*, service for at least twelve months in an ordinary trading vessel in the foreign or home-trade.

111. Service in Tugs.—Service performed in tug-boats employed outside partially smooth water limits may be accepted as sea service for qualifying for a Mate's or Master's Certificate for home-trade steam-ships.

112. Service in Light-ships or Engine Room.—Service in light-ships or in an engine room of any steam vessel will not be accepted as sea service for a Master's or Mate's Certificate of Competency.

113. Service on Rivers.—Service performed on rivers, no matter of what size, or in smooth or partially smooth water will not be accepted as qualifying service for Certificates of Competency for foreign-going or home-trade ships.

114. Training Ships.—Half of the time served on board a training ship, officially recognised as such, will be allowed to count as service at sea up to a limit of one year (*i.e.*, no length of service will be allowed to count as more than one year at sea), provided that the candidate can produce amongst his testimonials a certificate to the satisfaction of the Board that he has conducted himself creditably, and passed a good examination in seamanship so far as practised in the training ship

as well as in other matters down to the time of his leaving the ship, but this service will not be accepted as equivalent to service in square-rigged vessels.

115. Apprentices.—(a) The whole of the time served under indentures of apprenticeship (unless the same are cancelled through some fault of the candidate) will be accepted as actual sea service to qualify for a Second Mate's Certificate, provided that the applicant has served at sea four-fifths of the time claimed as apprentice (*i.e.*, that he has not spent more than one-fifth of the time claimed in home ports), and provided also that his indentures are indorsed by the Owner or Master to whom he has been bound, to the effect that he has performed his service faithfully during the time he remained apprentice. In cases where an apprentice may be qualified for examination before the expiration of his indentures (or for any other satisfactory reason) a letter from the Owner or Master will be accepted in place of this indorsement.

(b) In the event of the candidate being short of the required four-fifths of his apprentice's time he will be required to show sufficient additional sea service, either as seaman or junior officer, to make up the four-fifths of the time claimed as apprentice.

116. Midshipmen and Cadets.—The whole of the time served in the mercantile marine by midshipmen or cadets who may not have been bound by indentures will be accepted as actual sea service under the Regulations, and as counting towards the service required for the examination of a candidate for the grade of Second Mate, provided that in every case such service has been continuous, and that the applicant has served at sea four-fifths of the time claimed as midshipman or cadet (*i.e.*, that he has not spent more than one-fifth of such time in port).

REGULATIONS FOR THE CONDUCT OF THE EXAMINATIONS.

117. Time Allowed.—The examinations will begin at 10.30 a.m. on each day. A regular luncheon interval will be given each day between 1 p.m. and 2 p.m., the *viva voce* and practical parts of the examination being taken at such times as may be convenient. The time allotted for each written part of the examination for each grade of certificate will be as follows:—

Candidates for Foreign-going Certificates—

Second Mate.—Paper on Navigation and Nautical Astronomy, 3 hours; Nautical Astronomy and Trigonometry, 2 hours; Chart work, 3 hours; Essay, 1 hour.

First or Only Mate.—Paper on Navigation and Nautical Astronomy, 3 hours; Nautical Astronomy and Trigonometry, 2 hours; Chart work, 3 hours; Sumner problem, 2 hours; Meteorology paper, 1½ hours.

Master.—Paper on Navigation and Nautical Astronomy, 3 hours; Nautical Astronomy and Trigonometry, 2 hours; Chart work, 3 hours; Meteorology paper, 1½ hours; Compass Deviation, 1½ hours; Naval Architecture, 1½ hours; Essay, 2 hours.

Extra Master.—Paper on Navigation and Nautical Astronomy, 3 hours; Nautical Astronomy and Trigonometry, 2 hours; Chart construction, 3 hours; Chart work, 2 hours; Naval Architecture and Stability, 3 hours; Magnetism, 3 hours; General Knowledge, 2 hours; Essay on Meteorology or other subject as may be selected, 2 hours.

Candidates for Home-trade Certificates—

Candidates for Home-trade Mates' Certificates must complete the whole of their arithmetical, chart, and other papers within 8 hours, and candidates for Home-trade Masters' Certificates within ten hours.

Candidates for River and Bay Certificates—

Candidates will not be restricted to any specified time, but will be allowed such time to complete their examination as may at the discretion of the Examiner be deemed sufficient.

118. Candidates to be punctual.—Candidates are required to appear at the examination room punctually at the time appointed.

119. Loose Paper and Books removed.—Before commencing the examination, the tables or desks must be cleared of all scraps of paper or books that are not used in the examination.

120. No Strangers Admitted.—No person will be allowed in the room during the examination other than those whose duties require them to be present.

No instructors will be allowed on the premises.

121. Books and Papers Strictly Forbidden.—Candidates are prohibited from bringing into the examination room books, papers, or memoranda of any kind whatever. The slightest infringement of this regulation will subject the offender to all the penalties of a failure, and he will not be allowed to present himself for re-examination for a period of three months.

122. All Work to be Shown.—(a) No candidate will be allowed to work out his problems on a slate or on waste paper, or to write on the blotting-paper supplied for his use in the examination; violation of this rule will subject the candidate to all the penalties of a failure.

(b) A sheet of blotting paper should be issued to each candidate with the first examination paper, and it must be returned to the Examiner when the last paper is completed each day. The Examiner will be careful to see that the blotting-paper has not been used by the candidate in solving his problems, or for conveying information to other candidates.

123. Instruments are Provided.—All instruments necessary for use in the examinations are supplied by the Board.

124. Leaving Room or Building.—No candidate may leave the examination room without permission and without giving up the paper on which he is engaged. Under no circumstances will a candidate be allowed to leave the building while the examination is proceeding. Violation of this rule will subject the candidate to all the penalties of a failure.

125. Copying, &c., to be Prevented.—Candidates should be so placed as to prevent one copying from the other, and no communication whatever between the candidates should be allowed.

126. Penalty for Copying, &c.—(a) In the event of any candidate being discovered referring to any book, paper, or memoranda, or copying from another, or affording any assistance or giving any information to another, or communicating in any way with another, during the time of examination, or copying any part of the problems for the purpose of taking them out of the examination room, he will subject himself to all the penalties of a failure, and will not be allowed to be examined for a period of six months.

(b) A candidate guilty of a second offence will not be allowed to be examined until twelve months have elapsed.

127. Injury to Books.—In the event of any candidate being detected in defacing, blotting, writing in, or otherwise injuring any book or books belonging to the Board, he will be required to pay to the Secretary such amount as may be necessary to replace such book or books. He will not, however, be at liberty to remove the damaged book, which will still remain the property of the Board; he will also subject himself to all the penalties of a failure.

128. Silence.—Perfect silence is to be preserved in the examination room.

129. Penalty for Breach of Regulations.—Any candidate who may be guilty of insolence to any Examiner or of other misconduct will render himself liable to the postponement of his examination.

130. Examination in Navigation.—The whole of the written portion of the examination will be taken on the marks system. The candidate will be furnished with sheets of the blank ruled paper which is supplied for the purpose, and will be required to work or write only on one side of the paper, and to answer in a clear and legible hand each of the questions on the paper, and to commence each answer by writing down the number of the question to which it relates in the margin. Marks will be allotted for each question, and candidates will be required to obtain 75 per cent. of the total marks in order to pass for an ordinary certificate, and 85 per cent. for an extra certificate. Papers will not be handed back to candidates for correction.

131. Compass Deviation.—In answering questions on the tentative method of compass adjustment, the candidate will be tested by Beal's Compass Deviascope.

132. Barometer, Tides, &c.—The examination on the barometer, thermometer, and hydrometer, prevailing winds and currents of the globe, trade routes, and tides, will be conducted orally, and the questions asked by the Examiner, which will be constantly varied, will be confined to and based on the information given in the Text-books which may

from time to time be prescribed by the Board; candidates will be required to have a fair and intelligent knowledge of the contents of those books.

133. Sextant.—Every candidate will be examined orally and practically in the use of the sextant; he will be required to measure both vertical and horizontal angles, and will be examined practically as to his knowledge of the adjustments and the use of the various screws; he must be able to read correctly on and off the arc, and must also be able to find the index error both by the horizon and by the sun.

134. Corrections by Tables.—The corrections by inspection from tables given in works on navigation will not be allowed. Every correction must appear on the papers of the candidates.

135. Degree of Precision required.—Degree of precision required in the solution of the problems:—

- (a) Candidates are expected to work their problems to the nearest half-minute of arc and to the nearest second in time.
- (b) In interpolating for the correct deviation to be applied in solving the chart questions, it will be sufficient if the candidate works throughout with the nearest degree of deviation taken from the deviation card; and even in cases where the deviations may vary but little, the nearest half degree used throughout will be sufficiently precise.
- (c) In calculating the correction to apply to soundings the candidate is not required to work to the exact inch. It will be sufficient if he brings his answer within half a foot or so of a precise result.

136. Candidates may use Own Method.—Candidates will be allowed to work out the various problems according to any method they have been accustomed to use.

137. Supplementary viva voce.—Candidates will be examined orally as to their knowledge of all their written and worked papers.

138. No Candidate to be Examined Twice in a Week.—A candidate will not be allowed to undergo examination twice in the same week, unless, under very special and urgent circumstances, the Secretary, after reference to the Examiner, should see fit to relax this rule.

139. Reports of Examinations.—Reports of examinations, together with the examination papers, must be forwarded by the Examiner to the Secretary immediately the examinations are completed.

The foregoing Regulations were made and passed at a meeting of the Marine Board of Victoria, held this sixteenth day of December, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and twenty.

REGULATIONS FOR THE CARE, PROTECTION, AND MANAGEMENT OF
ALEXANDRA GARDENS.

WE, Henry Weedon, Frank Stapley, Charles Edwin Jeffries, Joseph Martin Reed, John Cronin, and Francis Grenville Clarke, the duly appointed Committee of Management of the land temporarily reserved by Order in Council of 21st May, 1907, as a site for ornamental plantation in the city of Melbourne, known as the "Alexandra Gardens," having framed the following Regulations for the care, protection, and management thereof, and for the preservation of good order and decency therein, and also for the collection and receipt of tolls, entrance-fees, and other charges for entering therein or thereupon, submit the said Regulations to the Board of Land and Works, to be made by such Board, in pursuance of the powers conferred by section 181 of the *Land Act* 1915.

REGULATIONS.

1. No person in a state of intoxication, or who is disorderly or is not decorously dressed, shall enter or remain in the Gardens, and no person shall commit therein any nuisance or any indecent or offensive act.

2. No person shall interfere with, remove, damage, or destroy the seats, trees, shrubs, grass, flowers, statuary, fountains, fish, or any property in the Gardens, or throw stones or other missiles, or light fires therein, or leave in the Gardens any bottles, fruit peel, paper, cast-off clothing, litter, or refuse of any kind.

3. No person shall climb on or jump over the seats or fences in or around the Gardens, or lie on the seats or grass, or stick bills on the fences, gates, seats, trees, posts or other structures, or cut names, letters, or marks on the trees, seats, gates, posts, or fences, or other structures, or otherwise deface the same, or write thereon.

4. No person shall bring into the Gardens any dog, unless held by a chain or cord.

5. No person except workmen employed in the Gardens shall enter any plots therein which may be enclosed for plantations, or for other purposes.

6. No assemblies for *fêtes*, picnics, or concerts, or for the purpose of public worship, preaching, or public speaking of any kind, or meetings of a like character, shall take place in the Gardens without the permission in writing of the Committee first obtained.

7. No person, unless authorized by the Committee in writing, shall offer or expose for sale in the Gardens any article, fruit, or merchandise.

8. No person shall bring or allow to remain in the Gardens any cattle, sheep, pigs, goats, fowls, or other animals, and any such found therein shall be liable to be destroyed.

9. No person shall make or cause to be made any violent outcry, noise, disturbance, or sound, or shall play upon any musical or noisy instrument, or sing in the Gardens, nor shall any person preach or declaim, harangue or deliver any address of any kind to members of the public in the Gardens without the permission in writing of the Committee first obtained.

10. No person shall give out or distribute any handbills, placards, notices, advertisements, books, pamphlets, or papers in the Gardens, or shall litter the same by scattering or throwing down handbills, placards, notices, advertisements, books, pamphlets, or papers.

11. No person shall play at or engage in any game, athletic sport, or gymnastic exercises in the Gardens.

12. No children under five (5) years of age shall be allowed in the Gardens unless in charge of adult friends or nurses.

13. No person shall without the consent in writing of the Committee carry, use, or discharge any firearms in the Gardens.

14. No person shall in any part of the Gardens wilfully obstruct, disturb, interrupt, or annoy any other person in the proper use of the Gardens, or wilfully obstruct in the execution of his duty, or insult or neglect to obey the lawful directions of any keeper or other servant of the Committee.

15. No person shall spit or expectorate on the paths or seats, or any structure or erection within the Gardens.

16. No booth, tent, or other structure shall be erected within the Gardens without the consent in writing of the Committee.

17. No person shall interfere with or remove any plants, flowers, seeds, or other property from the Gardens or injure any property therein, and any person offending shall be liable to be removed from the Gardens.

18. No delivery cart, tradesman's motor vehicle, or cart, dray, lorry, waggon, van, truck, or harrow shall be allowed to enter or pass over or through the Gardens.

19. No vehicle, motor car, or motor cycle shall be allowed to enter or pass over or through the Gardens except on the portions thereof specially provided for wheeled traffic.

20. No passenger vehicle carrying more than six persons, or built to carry more than six persons, shall be allowed to enter or pass over or through the Gardens.

21. No vehicle shall be driven along any roadway in the Gardens at a speed exceeding 10 miles per hour, and when entering or leaving the Gardens, or passing over any crossing, the speed shall be reduced to such limit as will not be dangerous to the public.

22. No horse with a rider shall be allowed to enter or pass over or through the Gardens except on the portions thereof specially provided for equestrians.

23. No horse shall be broken in or trained in the Gardens.

24. No horse uncontrolled shall enter or pass over or through the Gardens.

25. No person on foot shall enter or pass over or through the portions of the Gardens specially set apart for equestrians, except to cross through the openings provided for access from one part of the Gardens to another part thereof, as indicated by notices in the Gardens.

Every person offending against these Regulations shall, in accordance with the provisions of section 181 of the *Land Act* 1915, for each offence be liable to a penalty of not more than Five pounds (£5), and every person who knowingly and wilfully offends against any such Regulations, and who, after he has been warned by any Bailiff of Crown Lands or by any member of the Police Force, does not desist from so offending, may be forthwith apprehended by such bailiff or member of the Police Force and taken before some Justice, and shall be liable to a penalty of not more than Ten pounds (£10).

REGULATIONS FOR THE CARE, PROTECTION, AND MANAGEMENT OF THE ALEXANDRA PARK IN THE CITY OF MELBOURNE.

WHEREAS by section 182 of the *Land Act 1915* it is enacted that in the case of any land which under the provisions of any Act relating to Crown lands the Governor in Council either before or after the commencement of this Act has reserved from sale permanently for any public purpose whatsoever or for any of the purposes specified in section 10 of the said Act or the corresponding section of any repealed Act and has vested such land in trustees or jointly in the Board of Land and Works and trustees it shall be lawful for the trustees of any such land with the approval of the Governor in Council to make rules and regulations for all or any of the purposes mentioned in sub-section 1 of the first-mentioned section. And whereas under and by virtue of a Crown grant dated the 18th day of December, 1917, the land in the city of Melbourne, known as the Alexandra Park, became vested in the Board of Land and Works and the Mayor, Aldermen, Councillors and Citizens of the City of Melbourne. Now therefore the Board of Land and Works and the Mayor, Aldermen, Councillors and Citizens of the City of Melbourne (hereinafter called "The Trustees") do hereby make the following Regulations in respect of the said Alexandra Park:—

REGULATIONS.

1. No person in a state of intoxication, or who is disorderly or is not decorously dressed, shall enter or remain in the Park, and no person shall commit therein any nuisance or any indecent or offensive act.
2. No person shall interfere with, remove, damage, or destroy the seats, trees, shrubs, grass, flowers, statuary, fountains, fish, or any property in the Park, or throw stones or other missiles, or light fires therein, or leave in the Park any bottles, fruit peel, paper, cast-off clothing, litter, or refuse of any kind.
3. No person shall climb on or jump over the seats or fences in or around the Park, or lie on the seats or grass, or stick bills on the fences, gates, seats, trees, posts or other structures, or cut names, letters, or marks on the trees, seats, gates, posts, or fences, or other structures, or otherwise deface the same, or write thereon.
4. No person shall bring into the Park any dog, unless held by a chain or cord.
5. No person except workmen employed in the Park shall enter any plots therein which may be enclosed for plantations, or for other purposes.

No person shall make or cause to be made any violent outcry, noise, disturbance, or sound, or shall play upon any musical or noisy instrument, or sing in the Park, nor shall any person preach or declaim, harangue or deliver any address of any kind to members of the public in the Park without the permission in writing of the Trustees first obtained.
10. No person shall give out or distribute any handbills, placards, notices, advertisements, books, pamphlets, or papers in the Park, or shall litter the same by scattering or throwing down handbills, placards, notices, advertisements, books, pamphlets, or papers.

11. No person shall play at or engage in any game, athletic sport, or gymnastic exercises in the Park.
12. No children under five (5) years of age shall be allowed in the Park unless in charge of adult friends or nurses.
13. No person shall without the consent in writing of the Trustees, carry, use, or discharge any firearms in the Park.
14. No persons shall in any part of the Park wilfully obstruct, disturb, interrupt, or annoy any other person in the proper use of the Park, or wilfully obstruct in the execution of his duty, or insult or neglect to obey the lawful directions of any keeper or other servant of the Trustees.
15. No person shall spit or expectorate on the paths or seats, or any structure or erection within the Park.
16. No booth, tent, or other structure shall be erected within the Park without the consent in writing of the Trustees.
17. No person shall interfere with or remove any plants, flowers, seeds, or other property from the Park or injure any property therein, and any person offending shall be liable to be removed from the Park.
18. No delivery cart, tradesman's motor vehicle, or cart, dray, lorry, waggon, van, truck, or barrow shall be allowed to enter or pass over or through the Park.
19. No vehicle, motor car, or motor cycle shall be allowed to enter or pass over or through the Park except on the portions thereof specially provided for wheeled traffic.
20. No passenger vehicle carrying more than six persons, or built to carry more than six persons, shall be allowed to enter or pass over or through the Park.
21. No vehicle shall be driven along any roadway in the Park at a speed exceeding 16 miles per hour, and when entering or leaving the Park, or passing over any crossing, the speed shall be reduced to such limit as will not be dangerous to the public.
22. No horse with a rider shall be allowed to enter or pass over or through the Park except on the portions thereof specially provided for equestrians.
23. No horse shall be broken in or trained in the Park.
24. No horse uncontrolled shall enter or pass over or through the Park.
25. No person on foot shall enter or pass over or through the portions of the Park specially set apart for equestrians, except to cross through the openings provided for access from one part of the Park to another part thereof, as indicated by notices in the Park.

Every person offending against these Regulations shall, in accordance with the provisions of section 182 of the *Land Act 1915*, for each offence be liable to a penalty of not more than Five pounds; and every person who so offends, and who after he has been warned by any Bailiff of Crown Lands or officer or servant of the Trustees, or by any member of the Police Force, does not desist from so offending, may be forthwith apprehended by such bailiff, officer, or servant or member of the Police Force, and taken before some Justice, and shall be liable to a penalty of not more than Ten pounds.

BY-LAW No. 41.

A By-law of the City of Caulfield made under sections 286 and 313 of the Health Act 1919, and numbered 41, for prescribing fees to be paid to the Council for registration and renewal and transfer of registration of certain premises.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the Health Act 1919, the Mayor, Councillors, and Citizens of the City of Caulfield order as follows:—

1. The fees to be paid to the Council for each registration or renewal or transfer of registration of and in respect of the several classes of premises hereunder specified shall be those set-opposite to such classes of premises respectively, namely:—

Nature of Premises.	Fees Payable for Registration or Renewal.
Offensive trades premises	Five pounds.
Boardinghouses	Ten shillings.
Common lodginghouses	Ten shillings.
Eating-houses	Ten shillings.
Premises (whether a licensed victualler's premises or not) on which are manufactured or prepared for sale ice-cream, ginger-beer, hop-beer, or any similar beer, lemonade, cordials, soda water, lithia water, or other mineral water, or any artificially aerated water	Five shillings.

For any transfer of registration of any of the above named, Two shillings and sixpence.

2. This By-law shall apply to and have operation throughout the whole of the municipal district of the City of Caulfield.

Resolution for passing this By-law agreed to by the Council the 5th day of October, 1920, and confirmed the 16th day of November, 1920.

Notwithstanding anything contained in the Council's By-law No. 20, made under the Health Act 1919, the occupier of every hotel, restaurant, eating-house, or other like premises where food is sold to or consumed by the public shall cause all refuse and scraps of foodstuffs intended to be sold or used as pigs' or fowls' food or otherwise, and all other refuse subject or liable to putrefaction, to be placed with the least possible delay in a separate receptacle of the kind hereinafter

specified or in so many of such receptacles as may be necessary for the purpose, and such receptacle or receptacles shall be kept on the premises or in such other place as the Council's surveyor may from time to time direct in writing, and shall be removed at the expense in all things of such occupier each day before the hour of Eight o'clock in the forenoon to a place outside the city or to such place or places within the city as the Council's surveyor shall approve of in writing.

3. Every such receptacle shall be of a size not exceeding three cubic feet in content, and shall be constructed of galvanized iron properly riveted and soldered so as to be water-tight, and shall be maintained in good order and condition, and each receptacle shall be fitted with handles for convenience of moving and emptying same, and also with a close-fitting metal cover of a construction approved of by the Council's surveyor.

4. Every person who shall commit a breach of this By-law shall for every such breach be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds and not less than Five shillings.

5. This By-law shall apply to and have operation throughout the municipal district of the City of Caulfield.
