Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE TENTMAKERS BOARD.

Note.—On the 11th day of November, 1913, the powers of the Tentmakers Board were extended to enable it to fix the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any persons employed in the process, trade, business, or occupation of a maker of—

Horse rugs; Cow rugs; Water bags; Outside blinds (except Venetian blinds); Canvas or duck filters; Canvas or duck mail bags.

This Determination on the 22nd January, 1921, applied to the following parts of Victoria. namely:—The Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts; the cities of Ballarat, Bendigo, Geelong and Warrnambool; the towns of Ballarat East and Sandringham; and the boroughs of Eaglehawk, Geelong West, Newtown and Chilwell, and Sebastopol.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board appointed "to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any persons employed in the process, trade, business, or occupation of a maker of tents, tarpaulins, sails, or flags," has made the following Determination, namely:—

(i) That on the 22nd January, 1921, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this

One male apprentice to every three or fraction of three male workers receiving no less than 78s, per week of 48 hours
One female apprentice to every three or fraction of three female workers receiving not less than 37s. 6d. per week of 48 hours.

Improvers.

One male improver to each male worker receiving not less

One male improver to each make worker receiving not less than 78s. per week of 48 hours.

One female improver to each female worker receiving not less than 37s. 6d. per week of 48 hours.

Provided that one female improver in lieu of one male

improver may be employed.

(7) Piece-work.—The Board determines, under the provisions of Section 144 of the Factories and Shope Act 1915, that any employer may fix and pay piece-work prices to any person or persons or classes of persons employed at any work for which the Board has fixed the minimum wage, provided that such employer shall base such piece-work rices on the earnings of an average worker working under like conditions, and such piece-work prices shall be fixed so that an average worker can earn not less than the wages that are fixed by the Board for such work.
