

(3) TIME OF BEGINNING AND ENDING WORK .-

Time of Beginning.

.. 12 noon on the day on which the half-holiday is observed, and 5.15 p.m. on the other working days of the week.

Time of Ending.

- (4) OVERTIME.—The following rates shall be paid for all work done:-
 - (a) Outside the hours fixed as the times of beginning and ending work

 (b) Within the bours fixed as the times of beginning and ending work in excess of 44 hours in any week } Time and a half
- (5) Special Rates.—Double time shall be the rate for all work done on New Year's Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Eight Hours Day (21st April), Christmas Day, or Boxing Day, but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rates shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.
- (6) Time Wages.—Any person employed on time wages for less than the number of hours fixed for an ordinary week's work shall for each hour worked up to 22 hours be paid at the ordinary wages rate with an addition of forty per centum.
