Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE STRAW HAT BOARD.

Note.—This Determination on the 23rd February, 1923, applied to the following parts of Victoria, namely:—The Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts; the cities of Ballarat, Bendigo, Geelong, and Warmambool; the towns of Geelong West and Sandringham: and the boroughs of Eaglehawk, Newtown and Chilwell, and Sebastopol.

In accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board appointed to "determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of the manufacture of straw hats," has made the following Determination, namely:—

(1) That on the 23rd February 1923, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

- (3) OVEETIME.—Any employee who works in any week for any time in excess of 44 hours shall be paid for such extra time at the rate of time and a half.
- (4) TIME RATE.—Any person employed on time wages for less than the number of hours fixed for an ordinary week's work shall for each hour worked up to 22 hours be paid at the ordinary wages rate with an addition of thirty-three per centum.

 (5) Special Rates.—That double time shall be the special rate for all work done on Sunday, 26th January (Foundation Day), Good Friday, Easter Monday, 21st April (Eight Hours Day), King's Birthday, Christmas Day, Boxing Day, New Year's Day; but, if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be navable for work done on the day so substituted payable for work done on the day so substituted.

(7) The Board determines, under the provisions of section 144 of the Factories and Shops Act 1915, that any cap are may fix and pay piece-work prices to any person employed at any work for which this Board has not fixed piece-work price but has had a minimum wage, provided that such employer shall base such piece-work prices on the carnings of an average worker working under like conditions, and such piece-work prices shall be fixed so that an average worker can earn not less than the wages r to fixed by the Board for such work.
