DETERMINATION OF THE BRICK TRADE BOARD.

Note.—(a) This Determination, on the 20th June, 1923, applied to the whole of the State of Victoria.

(b) On 21st February, 1911, the powers of the Brick Trade Board were extended, so that it might fix "the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of sand, lime, or cement brickmaking."

In accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board appointed to "determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of brickmaking (including clay-digging)," has made the following Determination, namely:—

(1) That on the 20th June, 1923, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

PIECE-WORK PRICES WHICH MAY BE FIXED BY AN EMPLOYER. (8) The Board determines, under the provisions of section 144 of the Factories and Shops Act 1915, that any employer may fix and pav pirce-work prices to any person employed in fire-brick making, or as a clayboleman, machine driver, machine rigger, wheeler of green bricks, or trucker, provided that any such employer shall base such piece-work prices on the earnings of an average worker working are fixed by the Board for such work.
