Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE PAPER BOARD.

NOTE.—(1) This Determination on the 21th August, 1925, applied to the whole of the State of Victoria.

„ (2) On the 4th July, 1916, the Paper Board was given exclusive power to “determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person employed as storeman, packer, or sorter in connexion with making paper, cardboard, carpet felt, or any similar products.”

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board appointed to “determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any persons employed making paper, cardboard, carpet felt, or any similar products,” has made the following Determination, namely:—

(1) That on the 24th August, 1925, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

Apprentices.

PROPORTION (in any factory or place).

MALES.

One male apprentice to every three or fraction of three male workers receiving not less than 87s. per week of 48 hours.

FEMALES.

One female apprentice to every three or fraction of three female workers receiving not less than 45s. 3d. per week of 48 hours.

Improvers.

PROPORTION (in any factory or place).

MALES.

Three male improvers to every five or fraction of five male workers receiving not less than 87s. per week of 48 hours.

FEMALES.

One female improver to each female worker receiving not less than 45s. 3d. per week of 48 hours.

(3) OVERTIME.—Any employee who works for any time in excess of 48 hours in any week shall be paid for such extra time at the rate of time and a quarter for the first two hours and thereafter time and a half.

(4) SPECIAL RATES FOR SUNDAYS AND PUBLIC HOLIDAYS.—Double time shall be the special rate payable for all work done on Sundays, and time and a half for all work done on New Year's Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Eight Hours Day (21st April), Christmas Day, Boxing Day, and Foundation Day (26th January); but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.
