## DETERMINATION OF THE MUSICAL INSTRUMENTS BOARD.

Note.—This Determination on the 20th March, 1925, applied to the whole of the State of Victoria.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts the Wages Board appointed "to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any persons employed in manufacturing or tuning any musical instrument of which wood forms a part" has made the following Determination, namely:—

(1) That on the 20th March, 1925, the previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

<sup>(3)</sup> OVERTIME.—Any person employed in excess of the maximum number of hours fixed as a week's work shall be paid for such extra time at the rate of time and a half.

<sup>(4)</sup> Special Rates.—Double time shall be the rate for all work done on Sundays, New Year's Day, 26th January (Foundation Day), Good Friday, Easter Monday, Eight Hours Day (21st April), Christmas Day, or Boxing Day; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rates shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.

<sup>(5)</sup> PIECE-WORK.—The Board determines under the provisions of section 144 of the Factories and Shops Act 1915 that any employer may fix and pay piece-work prices to any person employed in manufacturing, tuning, or repairing pianos or in manufacturing gramophones provided that any such employer shall base such piece-work prices on the carnings of an average worker working under like conditions, and such piece-work prices shall be fixed so that an average worker can earn not less than the wages that are fixed by the Board for such work.
