Fectories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE BOILERMAKERS BOARD.

Norg.-This Determination on the 26th day of July, 1926, applied to the whole of the State of Victoria.

In accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board which now has power to "determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any persons employed in the trade of—

(a) Boilermaking; (b) Iron or steel working in connexion with-

Ship or bridge building,
 Girder, tank, wagon, or truck making,
 Wrought iron or steel pipe making,
 Structural iron or steel work,"

has made the following Determination, namely :-

(1) That on the 26th day of July, 1926, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by

Any person who is employed in any of the above capacities outside a workshop and is placed in charge of six or more adult workers shall be paid 1s. per day above the ordinary rate.

Electric or Oxy-acetylene welders or cutters employed on repair work outside a workshop 2s. per shift or part of a shift. Employees engaged outside a workshop who are unable to journey to and from their work daily 6s. per shift.

Provided that if the employer engages and pays suitable board and lodging for the employee he shall not be required to pay this allowance.

Travelling Time. - Persons employed on work away from the workshop shall receive-

- (a) The fares necessarily expended in going to and fro.
 (b) Payment at rates fixed in Clause 2 for the day shift for time occupied in travelling during the usual working hours of the factory.
 (c) On new work—Payment at rates fixed in Clause 2 for the day shift for time occupied in travelling before or after the usual working hours of the factory (over and above the time usually occupied in travelling between the factory and the employee's residence).
 On repair work—Payment at the rates fixed in Clause 2 for the day shift for the time occupied in travelling before or after the usual working hours of the factory.

(4) Shifts.—(a) The hour of beginning and the hour of ending each shift shall be as follows:—

All the above rates to be calculated on the rates fixed in Clause 2 for the day shift.

(5) Special Rates.—Double time shall be the rate for all work done on Sunday, New Year's Day, Foundation Day (26th January), Good Friday, Easter Monday, Eight Hours Day (21st April), Christmas Day, or Boxing Day, but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.
