- (b) All work done within the times of beginning and ending work in any week in excess of the number of hours determined for a week's work shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first two hours and double time thereafter.
- (7) ALLOWANCES.—The following allowances shall be paid to persons employed on work away from their employers place of
 - (1) The fares, exceeding 4d. per day, necessarily expended in going from and to the employee's residence to and from his work.
 - (2) For work done at a distance from the employer's place of business, if the employee is unable to return to his home the same night:—
 - (a) 6s. per day for the first seven days, and thereafter 30s. per week extra.
 - (b) Freight necessarily incurred for transport of tools to or from work.
- (8) Public Holidays and Sundays.—Double time shall be the special rate for all work done on Sundays, New Year's Day, 26th day of January (Foundation Day), Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, the 21st April (Eight Hours Day), Christmas Day, and Boxing Day; but, if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted. Provided that the Metropolitan Gas Company shall have the right to substitute King's Birthday for Easter Saturday.
- (9) Casual Labour.—Casual employees (i.e., persons employed during any week for not more than one-half the maximum number of hours fixed in this Determination as a week's work) who have not been summarily dismissed for misconduct or incompetence, or who have not voluntarily left their work, shall be paid at the rate of 3d. per hour extra.
- (10) Tools and Appliances.—If any employee is required to provide any of the following tools:—Dogs and cramps of all descriptions, augers of all sizes, bits not ordinarily used in a brace, all hammers except claw hammers, glue pots and brushes, dowel plates, tamels, hand and thumb serews, spanners and soldering irons, 6d. per hour, in addition to the ordinary rates fixed by this Determination, shall be paid by the employer.
 - (11) PAYMENT OF WAGES .-- All payments of wages shall be made not later than the hour of ceasing work on Friday of each week.

Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE AGRICULTURAL IMPLEMENTS BOARD.

Note.—This Determination on the 13th September, 1927, applied to the following parts of Victoria, namely:—The Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts; the cities of Ballarat, Bendigo, Geolong, Sandringham, and Warrnambool; the towns of Geelong West and Newtown and Chilwell; the boroughs of Eaglehawk and Sebastopol; and such portion of the Shire of Braybrook as is not included in the Metropolitan District.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board appointed to "determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of a maker of—

(a) agricultural machinery or implements;
(b) parts of agricultural machinery or implements;
(c) bag-filling machinery, bone-crushers, butter-making machinery, chaff-cutters, corn-crushing machinery, cream separators hay presses, horse works, iron feeding troughs, lawn mowers, machinery for treating flax or hemp, maize shellers windmills,"

has made the following Determination, namely :-

On 21st December, 1910, this Board was given power to fix rates for persons "employed in assembling or putting together, any parts of machinery or implements of classes or kinds (whether the same have been made inside or outside the State) same or similar, to those for which the said Board has power to fix prices or rates."

DEFINITIONS-

Juvenile Workers-

Persons under 21 years of age (other than apprentices or improvers) employed—

(a) Finning, pointing, heating, and cutting off.

(b) Screwing and tapping bolts in any department.

(c) Holding up.

(d) Striking for apprentices to blacksmithing.

(e) Working ungeared drilling machines, drilling holes up to and inclusive of A in. diameter

Assembler-

Any adult person employed in putting together any of the classes or kinds of machinery or implements affected by the Dotermination, and which have been previously fitted or so standardized as to require no fitting; but shall not include any adult person employed in cutting or shaping the material of which such machinery or implements are

(3) OVERTIME.—Any employee who works in excess of 48 hours in any week shall be paid for such work at the rate of time and a half.

(4) Special Rates.—Time and three-quarters shall be paid for all work done on Sundays, New Year's Day, 26th January (Foundation Day), Eight Hours Day (21st April), Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament of Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall be payable only for the day so substituted.

(5) PIECE-WORK.—The Board determines under the provisions of Section 144 of the Factories and Shops Act 1915 that any employer may fix and pay piece-work prices to any person employed at any work for which the Board has fixed a minimum wage, provided that any such employer shall base such piece-work prices on the earnings of an average worker working under like conditions and such piece-work prices shall be fixed so that an average worker can earn not less than the wages rates that are fixed by the Board for such work.
