DETERMINATION OF THE BRICK TRADE BOARD.

Note.—(a) This Determination on the 7th December, 1927, applied to the whole of the State of Victoria.

(b) On 21st February, 1911, the powers of the Brick Trade Board were extended, so that it might fix "the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of sand, lime, or coment brickmaking."

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board appointed to "determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of brickmaking (including clay-digging)," has made the following Determination, namely:—

- (4) OVERTIME.—(a) Any employee who works for any time in excess of the maximum number of hours per week fixed by this Determination shall be paid for such extra time at the rate of time and a half.
- (b) Any employee (other than a burner, machine driver, machine rigger, or pan or crusher attendant) who works outside the hours fixed in clause 3 shall be paid for such time at the rate of time and a half.
- (5) SUNDAYS AND HOLIDAYS.—Time and a half shall be the Special rate for all work done on Sundays, and double time for all work done on New Year's Day, Foundation Day (26th January), Eight Hours Day (21st April), Good Friday, Easter Monday. King's Birthday, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day:—but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.

PIECE-WORK PRICES WHICH MAY BE FIXED BY AN EMPLOYER.

(7) The Board determines under the provisions of Section 144 of the Factories and Shops Act 1915 that any employer may fix and pay piece-work prices to any person employed in fire-brick making, or as a clayholeman, machine driver, machine rigger, wheeler of green bricks, or trucker, provided that any such employer shall base such piece-work prices on the earnings of an average worker working under like conditions, and such piece-work prices shall be fixed so that an average worker can earn not less than the wages rates that are fixed by the Board for such work.
