Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE PLATE GLASS BOARD.

NOTE.—This Determination on the 21st March, 1927, applied to the whole of the State of Victoria.

In accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board which since the 5th November, 1924, has had the power to "determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any persons employed in the trade of—

- (a) designing, bevelling, cutting, embossing, glazing, painting, silvering, or otherwise working all kinds of plate, sheet, or stained glass, or glass lenses or prisms;
- (b) fixing in position all kinds of plate, sheet, or stained glass, or glass lenses, or prisms;
- (c) packing all kinds of plate, sheet, or stained glass, or glass lenses or prisms;

including any labouring work in connexion with any of such operations,"

has made the following Determination, namely:-

(1) That on the 21st March, 1927, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

(5) OVERTIME.—The following rates shall be paid for all work done:—

(6) Special Rates.—Double time shall be the rate for all work done on Sundays, New Year's Day, Foundation Day (26th January), Good Friday, Eight Hours Day (21st April), Easter Monday, or Christmas Day; but if any other day is by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day or mutatived. so substituted.
