BOARD OF INQUIRY INTO CERTAIN MATTERS
AFFECTING THE STATE COAL MINE.

 - (b) What changes, if any, should be made in the methods of keeping such accounts;
 - (c) What changes, if any, should be made in the form of the published accounts;
 - (d) Whether the apportionment of expenditure to capital, depreciation, and working expenses is a proper one, and whether, in this connexion, any amendment of the *Coal Mines Regulation Act 1928* is required;
2. Whether the practice of charging the cost (including depreciation) of the electricity generating plant and the town and railway lighting system against the cost of production of coal is justified;
 3. Whether the method of determining the value of coal produced by fixing the price of coal supplied to the Railway Department on its relative value as ascertained by the Department in comparison with the first-grade coal obtained sea-borne from New South Wales is a proper one; and
 4. Whether there was in fact, for the period of ten and one-half months ending the twenty-first day of May, 1930, "surplus coal" amounting to 8,950 tons, for which the mine authorities received credit, and for which the miners did not receive payment, and, if so, what is the explanation for such surplus.

ROAD DEVIATION.—ORDER CONFIRMED.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by sections 521 and 525 of the *Local Government Act 1928*, the Council of the Shire of Warrnambool do hereby order and direct that all that piece of land containing 3 acres 2 roods 28 perches or thereabouts, being part of allotment 55, Parish of Laang, in the County of Heytesbury, commencing at a point bearing east 34 chains 92 links and 4-10ths of a link from the north-west corner of the said allotment; thence by a line bearing east 100 links and 1-10th of a link on the east by other part of the said allotment bearing south 2 deg. 30 min. east 37 chains 1 link and one-half of a link; and thence by a line bearing north 65 deg. 10 min. west 1 chain 12 links and 7-10ths of a link and on the west by a line bearing north 2 deg. 30 min. west 36 chains 54 links and 2-10ths of a link to the commencing point, which has been purchased by the said Council, shall be a public highway from and after the publication of this Order in the *Government Gazette*, in lieu of the existing Government road in the Parish of Laang aforesaid, between said allotment 55 and allotment 23 in the said parish, containing by admeasurement 4 acres 1 rood 14 perches or thereabouts, commencing at the north-east corner of said allotment 55; thence by a line bearing south 72 deg. 30 min. east 1 chain 6 links and 4-10ths of a link on the east by said allotment 23, being a line bearing south 2 deg. 30 min. east 43 chains 45 links and 3-10ths of a link on the south by a Government road bearing north 65 deg. 10 min. west 1 chain 12 links and 6-10ths of a link and on the west by said allotment 55, being in a line bearing north 2 deg. 30 min. west 43 chains 30 links to the commencing point.

RAILWAYS CLASSIFICATION BOARD.

AWARD No. 28, OF 24TH APRIL, 1931.

Relating to an emergency deduction of 10 per cent. from the margins over the basic salary or basic wage which were operative on 3rd October, 1930.

THE Railways Classification Board, in pursuance of the powers in that behalf conferred by sections 180 to 197 inclusive of the *Railways Act 1928* (No. 3759), hereby determines and awards as follows (that is to say):—

1. Until otherwise determined—
 - (a) As from 15th February, 1931, the margins over the basic salary or basic wage payable to officers and employees shall be those prescribed in the schedules of rates applicable on 3rd October, 1930, subject to an emergency deduction of 10 per cent. of such margins.
 - (b) As from 15th February, 1931, the rates of salary or wage payable to junior officers, junior employees, and female employees, and the rates payable to employees paid at hourly rates, shall be those prescribed in the schedules of rates applicable on 3rd October, 1930, adjusted from time to time in accordance with the method of cost-of-living adjustment then in force, subject to an emergency deduction of 10 per cent.
 - (c) As from 15th February, 1931, any provision contained in the memorandum dated 27th February, 1931, issued pursuant to the provisions of paragraph (b) of sub-section (1) of section 192 of the *Railways Act 1928* (No. 3759) which conflicts with the provisions of the foregoing sub-clause (b) is to that extent repealed.
 - (d) As from 15th February, 1931, adult male gatekeepers with free quarters shall be paid a rate 7d. per day below the basic wage.
2. The amount of the deduction made under the provisions of the foregoing clause shall be calculated to the nearest pound or the nearest penny (as the case may be).
3. As from 15th February, 1931, the provisions of Award No. 27 of 27th February, 1931, except clause 3 thereof, are hereby repealed.

THE State Rivers and Water Supply Commission, in pursuance and exercise of the powers conferred by the *Water Act 1928*, and in accordance with the provisions of an Order in Council bearing date the 28th April, 1931, and published in the *Government Gazette* of 29th April, 1931, do hereby make the By-law following:—

1. The following rates are hereby made, and shall be levied upon the occupiers or owners of all lands and tenements within the respective divisions of the Waterworks District of the Carrum Waterworks Trust, as the same are respectively set out and described in the said Order in Council bearing date the 28th April, 1931, and published in the *Government Gazette* of 29th April, 1931, that is to say:—

That the respective rates in the pound of the valuation of such lands and tenements in the said several divisions shall be—

For making and levying such rates the valuation for the time being of such lands and tenements for the municipal rate of the municipality in the municipal district of which such lands and tenements are situate shall be deemed and taken to be the valuation of such lands and tenements respectively; but if any of such lands and tenements are not included in a valuation in force for the municipality in whose district they are situate, or if there is no such valuation, the net annual value thereof may for the purposes of such rates be determined by a Police Magistrate.

HIS Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, and pursuant to the petitions of the Councils of the Shire of Maffra and the Shire of Benalla, doth by this Order, under the provisions of section 148 of the *Local Government Act 1928* (No. 3720) direct that the provisions of Division 13 of Part V. of *The Constitution Act Amendment Act 1928* (No. 3660) applicable and severally hereinafter set out, shall apply to the elections of councillors for the said municipalities with the alterations of such provisions set out hereafter, and same being alterations deemed necessary for the purpose of carrying into effect such provisions as so applied.

The Constitution Act Amendment Act 1928.

COMPULSORY PREFERENTIAL VOTING.

(Part V.—Division 13.)

How Votes to be Marked by Voter.

259. When at any election for the municipality a person receives a ballot-paper he shall mark his vote on the ballot-paper by placing the figure 1 opposite the name of the candidate for whom he votes as his first preference, and shall give contingent votes for all the remaining candidates by placing figures 2, 3, 4 (and so on as the case requires) opposite their names so as to indicate by such numerical sequence the order of his preference.

Marking of Ballot-paper where only Two Candidates.

260. Notwithstanding anything contained in the last preceding section, at any election where there are only two candidates the requirements of this Division as to the marking of ballot-papers by electors shall be deemed to be sufficiently complied with in the case of any ballot-paper marked so as to indicate the elector's first preference only.

Invalid Ballot-papers.

261. (1) A ballot-paper shall be rejected at the close of the poll if it does not indicate the elector's first preference for one candidate, and in the case of any election where there are more than two candidates his contingent votes for all the remaining candidates.

Ballot-papers not Invalid.

(2) Except as otherwise expressly provided, a ballot-paper shall not be rejected for any reason other than the reasons enumerated in this section, but shall be given effect to according to the elector's intention so far as his intention is clear.

Procedure where only Two Candidates.

262. At elections where there are only two candidates section 144 of the *Local Government Act 1928* shall have full force and effect.

Procedure to Ascertain the Number of Votes where more than Two Candidates.

263. At an election where there are more than two candidates the procedure by the returning officer and deputy returning officers for each ward or riding (as the case may be) to ascertain the number of votes for each candidate shall be as follows:—

- (a) Immediately upon the close of the poll the returning officer and every deputy returning officer at the polling booth at which each presides shall, in the presence and subject to the inspection of such of the scrutineers as choose to be present and the poll clerk (if any) and of no other person—
 - (i) open each ballot-box at such polling booth;
 - (ii) arrange the ballot-papers by placing in a separate parcel all those on which first preference is indicated for the same candidate and the full contingent votes are also given for all the remaining candidates, omitting ballot-papers which require to be rejected;
 - (iii) count all such first preference votes given for each candidate respectively;
 - (iv) make and keep a record of the number of votes counted from each ballot-box; and
 - (v) abstain himself from inspecting the writing upon the back of the ballot-papers and take care that the same is not seen by any person.

Duties of Deputies.

(b) Each deputy shall in respect of the polling booth at which he presides—

- (i) certify a list of the number of such first preference votes given for each candidate verified as well by the signature of the deputy and the poll clerk (if any) as by the signatures of such of the scrutineers as are present and consent to sign the same;
- (ii) make out an account verified as aforesaid in which such deputy shall charge himself with the number of ballot-papers originally delivered to him specifying therein the number thereof delivered to and used by voters and the number not so delivered or left unused and the number set aside for separate custody and the number cancelled as spoilt;
- (iii) make up in one parcel the ballot-papers which have been used in voting at his polling booth during the election; in another separate parcel the ballot-papers which have remained unused thereat; in another separate parcel the ballot-papers which have been set aside for separate custody thereat and also the ballot-papers cancelled as spoilt; and in another separate parcel the certified copies of rolls supplied to the said deputy signed by him or (as the case may be) the copies of rolls certified by the said deputy, and all books, rolls, and papers kept or used by him during the polling;
- (iv) seal up the said several parcels and permit any scrutineer who desires so to do to affix his seal to such parcels;
- (v) endorse the said parcels severally with a description of the contents thereof and with the name of the province or district, the name of the division or subdivision and polling booth, and the date of polling, and sign his name to such endorsement; and
- (vi) transmit such list and such account and such sealed parcels to the returning officer as required by section 144 of the *Local Government Act 1928*.

Duties of Returning Officer at Polling Booth at which he Presides.

(c) The returning officer shall in respect of the polling booth at which he presides—

- (i) make out a list of first preference votes given for each candidate and a like account of the ballot-papers as herein required, in the case of deputies duly verified by the signatures of the returning officer, the poll clerk (if any), and of such of the scrutineers as are present and consent to sign the same; and
- (ii) seal up in separate parcels in respect of the said polling booth the ballot-papers, books, rolls, and papers used by him during the polling, and endorse the same in like manner as is herein required in the case of deputies.

(d) The returning officer shall as soon as practicable—

- (i) ascertain from the list made out by himself as aforesaid, and from the certified lists received from the deputies, the number of first preference votes given for each candidate; and
- (ii) add the first preference votes so given for each candidate to the first preference votes given for each candidate by allowed postal ballot-papers, so as to ascertain the number of first preference votes given for each candidate respectively.

Where Results Ascertained on First Count.

(e) The candidate who has received the greatest number of first preference votes, if such number constitutes an absolute majority of votes (including the casting vote of the returning officer if necessary), shall by the returning officer be declared duly elected as hereinafter provided.

Declaration as to Defeated Candidate and First Distribution of Preferences.

(f) If no candidate has an absolute majority of votes the returning officer, upon receipt of the several sealed parcels from the deputies and with the assistance of such officers as he deems necessary, shall, in the presence and subject to the inspection of such of the scrutineers as choose to be present, and the poll clerk, (if any), but of no other person—

- (i) open all the sealed parcels containing used ballot-papers; and

- (ii) arrange such ballot-papers, together with the allowed postal ballot-papers, by placing in a separate parcel all those on which a first preference is indicated for the same candidate and the full contingent votes are also given for all the remaining candidates, omitting ballot-papers which require to be rejected, and shall declare the candidate who has obtained the fewest first preference votes to be a defeated candidate; and the ballot-papers counted to such defeated candidate shall be distributed amongst the non-defeated candidates next in order of the voters' preference.

After such distribution the number of votes given to each non-defeated candidate shall again be ascertained.

Further Declarations and Distributions of Preferences.

- (g) If no candidate then has an absolute majority of votes (including the casting vote of the returning officer) the process of declaring the candidate who has the fewest votes to be defeated and distributing his ballot-papers amongst the non-defeated candidates next in order of the voters' preference, shall be repeated and the votes recounted after every such redistribution until one candidate has obtained an absolute majority of votes (including the casting vote of the returning officer if necessary) and such candidate shall be declared duly elected as herein-after provided.

Provision for Equality of Votes and Casting Vote.

- (h) If on any count two or more candidates have an equal number of votes and one of them has to be declared defeated, the returning officer shall decide which is to be declared defeated, and if on the final count two candidates have received an equal number of votes, the returning officer shall in such case have the casting vote, but, except as provided in paragraphs (e) and (g) and in this paragraph, shall not vote at such election.

Adjournment of Count of Votes.

264. (1) If on the date of the polling at any election the count of the votes by the returning officer cannot be completed he shall adjourn such count and inform the scrutineers and the officers appointed to assist him at such count as regards the time and place when and where such count will be continued and conducted by him.

(2) The count of the votes may from time to time be adjourned as the returning officer deems necessary until it has been duly completed; and each adjournment shall be announced by the returning officer to the scrutineers and the officers assisting him.

Before Adjournment Ballot-papers, &c., to be Sealed in Ballot-boxes.

- (3) Before every adjournment of the count of the votes—
 (a) all ballot-papers and other documents connected with such count shall be placed in one or more ballot-boxes; and
 (b) the returning officer shall then, in the presence of such scrutineers and officers as are present, seal such ballot-box or boxes, and before recommencing the count the seal on such ballot-box or boxes shall be exhibited, unbroken, to such of the scrutineers and officers as are present.

Declaration of Election.

265. In declaring a candidate duly elected the provisions of sub-section (5) of section 144 of the *Local Government Act 1928* shall have full force and effect.

Separate Parcels to be Enclosed in Packets According to Class, and Sealed, &c.

267. At the conclusion of the count of votes the returning officer shall comply with the provisions of section 145 of the *Local Government Act 1928*.

Deposit Moneys.

205. The moneys paid to the returning officer by or on behalf of the candidates shall be dealt with in manner provided by section 154 of the *Local Government Act 1928*, altered as if in the said section for the word "votes" wherever occurring there were substituted the words "first preference votes."

Mode of Voting by Means of Postal Ballot-papers.

280. The following directions for regulating voting by means of postal ballot-papers shall be substantially observed:—

- (1) The elector shall exhibit, his postal ballot-paper (in blank) to an authorized witness.

- (2) The elector shall in the presence of the authorized witness, but so that the witness cannot see the vote—

First write on the ballot-paper the surname of the candidate for whom he votes in the first instance and write the figure 1 against such surname; and also write the surnames of all the remaining candidates and record contingent votes for such remaining candidates, numbering them 2, 3, 4 and so on in the order of his preference.

Provided that where there are only two candidates the elector's first preference shall be deemed to be sufficiently indicated if the surname of only one candidate is written by him on the ballot-paper.

- (3) In the case of more candidates than one having the same surname the elector shall also insert in the ballot-paper the christian or other names of the candidate for whom he votes, and if the surname and christian or other names of two or more candidates are the same they shall be distinguished by the addition of their residence and occupation.
 (4) If the elector's sight is so impaired that he is unable to vote without assistance, the authorized witness, at the request of the elector, shall mark his vote on the ballot-paper, and shall (if the elector so desires) mark the same in the presence of another person.
 (5) The elector shall then refold the ballot-paper and fasten the same.
 (6) The elector shall then sign his name in his own handwriting on the counterfoil in the place provided for the signature of the voter.
 (7) The authorized witness shall then sign his name in his own handwriting in the place provided for the signature of the witness and shall add the title under which he acts as an authorized witness, his residence, and the date.
 (8) The elector shall then place the ballot-paper, with the counterfoil attached, into the envelope addressed to the returning officer, fasten the envelope in the presence of the authorized witness, and post it.

Ballot-paper.

276. The ballot-paper (with counterfoil attached) to be in the form or to the effect of the Twenty-sixth Schedule.

His Excellency the Governor in Council doth by this Order further provide that the provisions of Division 15 of Part V. of "The Constitution Act Amendment Act 1928" relating to voting by post, made applicable to election of councillors of the

Shire of Maffra and the Shire of Benalla

by Orders of the Governor in Council, on the twenty-eighth day of January, 1930, and the twenty-eighth day of April, 1931, respectively, under the provisions of the "Local Government Act 1928," shall have full force and effect in the said municipalities where the provisions relating to voting by post apply by virtue of the said Orders in Council dated the twenty-eighth day of January, 1930, and the 28th day of April, 1931, respectively.

- (a) The elector shall exhibit his postal ballot-paper (in blank) to an authorized witness.

(b) The elector shall, in the presence of the authorized witness but so that the witness cannot see the vote, first write the name of the candidate for whom he votes in the first instance and mark the figure 1 against such surname, and also write the surnames of the remaining candidates numbering them 2, 3, 4 and so on in the order of his preference.

(c) In the case of more candidates than one having the same surname, the elector shall also insert in the ballot-paper the christian or other names of the candidate for whom he votes; and if the surnames and christian or other names of two or more candidates are the same they shall be distinguished by the addition of their residence and occupation.

(d) If the elector's sight is so impaired that he is unable to vote without assistance, the authorized witness, at the request of the elector, shall mark his vote on the ballot-paper and shall (if the elector so desires) mark the same in the presence of another person.

(e) The elector shall then re-fold the ballot-paper and fasten the same.

(f) The elector shall then sign his name in his own handwriting on the counterfoil in the place provided for the signature of the voter.

(g) The authorized witness shall then sign his name in his own handwriting in the place provided for the signature of the witness, and shall add the title under which he acts as an authorized witness, his residence, and the date.

(h) The elector shall then place the ballot-paper, with the counterfoil attached, into the envelope addressed to the returning officer, fasten the envelope in the presence of the authorized witness, and seal it.

(i) This ballot-paper cannot be counted in the election unless it is received by the returning officer before the closing of the poll.

Instructions to Authorized Witness.

The authorized witness shall—

- (a) see that the foregoing directions are substantially complied with;
- (b) refrain from looking at the vote given by the elector, except where the elector cannot vote without assistance and the elector requests his assistance;
- (c) not disclose any knowledge officially acquired by him touching the vote of the elector, save in answer to some question which he is legally bound to answer or in compliance with the express provisions of the law relating to municipal elections.

An authorized witness shall not—

- (a) visit any elector for the purpose of witnessing the signature of such elector to his postal ballot-paper;
- (b) witness the signature of any elector to his postal ballot-paper in any place other than the ordinary residence or place of business of the authorized witness; or
- (c) witness the signature of any elector to his postal ballot-paper unless the authorized witness has satisfied himself as to the identity of the elector, and has seen the elector sign the counterfoil in the elector's own handwriting;

Provided that if any elector has received a postal ballot-paper and is unable, on account of ill health or infirmity, to present himself before an authorized witness, any member of the Police Force or other authorized witness, when so requested by any such elector in writing, may visit such elector for the purpose of witnessing his signature to such postal ballot-paper.

Every authorized witness guilty of a contravention of any of these instructions to authorized witnesses is liable to a penalty of not more than One hundred pounds, or to imprisonment, with or without hard labour, for a term of not more than three months.

Regulations Prescribing the Form of Ballot-paper and the Forms for Recording the Distribution of Preferential Votes.

210. For the purposes of giving effect to the election of councillors for the several municipalities firstly described in this Order under the provisions of *The Constitution Act Amendment Act 1928* relating to compulsory preferential voting at elections, the Governor in Council doth make the Regulations following prescribing the form of ballot-paper and the forms for recording the distribution of preferential votes:—

Aborigines Act 1928 (No. 3631).

REGULATIONS.

At State Parliament House, Melbourne, the sixth day of May, 1931.

PRESENT:

HIS Excellency, the Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, and in pursuance of the provisions of section 6 of the *Aborigines Act, 1928* (No. 3631), doth hereby rescind the Regulations heretofore in force under the *Aborigines Act 1915*, and doth make the Regulations following, in lieu thereof, that is to say:—

PLACES OF RESIDENCE.

1. The following places are prescribed as places where aborigines may reside:—Coranderrk (Healesville), Elliminyt (Colac), Framlingham (Purnim), Lake Condah, Lake Moodemere, and Lake Tyers.

CONTRACTS AND CERTIFICATES.

2. No contract with any aborigine for any service or employment for a longer period than three (3) months shall be of any validity as against such aborigine, or as an exemption from the penalty imposed by section 12 of the Act, unless such contract is approved by the Board or the aborigine at the making and during the continuance thereof holds a subsisting certificate issued as hereinafter provided; but this Regulation shall in no way affect the validity of any such contract as against the person entering into it with the aborigine.

3. Any person desiring the approval of the Board to any such contract shall apply therefor by transmitting to the secretary to the Board, or to the manager of the Lake Tyers Aboriginal Station, or to the local guardian of aborigines nearest to the district in which the applicant resides, an application signed by him in the subjoined form (hereinafter referred to as the contract):—

Particulars of contract submitted for the approval of the Board for the Protection of the Aborigines.

Name, residence, and occupation of employer.

Name of aborigine.

Nature of work or service to be performed.

Date from which service under the contract is to commence or has commenced.

Money payment as wages or otherwise, and the time or times when payable under the contract.

Rations (if any) to be given in addition to money payment (if any) and quantity and quality of rations to be supplied.

Name and address to which the applicant desires communications in reference to this application to be posted.

Date of application.

Signature of applicant.

4. The secretary to the Board, manager of the Lake Tyers Aboriginal Station, or local guardian concerned, after making such inquiries as the Board may think necessary, shall submit the contract, with report thereon, to the Board.

5. The Board, if satisfied of the propriety of approval, will cause the approval signed by the secretary to be endorsed on the contract, and will return the same to the local guardian concerned, or to the manager of the Lake Tyers Station, and post a copy thereof, with such approval endorsed, to the address mentioned in the contract.

6. The Board may modify any such contract when considering same by directing that all or any part of the moneys payable to the aborigine shall be made to the secretary to the Board or other person specified in that behalf instead of to the aborigine himself, and shall in such case endorse the contract accordingly.

7. Any deduction so made shall be paid into a trust fund in the name of the aborigine concerned, and shall be applied and expended as may be directed by the Board for his benefit and/or the benefit of his dependants.

8. The Board may, at its discretion, grant to any aborigine able and willing to earn a living by his own exertions a certificate in the subjoined form, signed by the secretary, which certificate shall not remain in force for more than six (6) months from its date or the date of its last renewal; and any such unexpired certificate may be renewed for a further period not exceeding six months by the endorsement of the date of renewal and signature of any member of the Board, the secretary, or any person duly authorized by the Board:—

Certificate under the *Aborigines Act 1928* (No. 3631).

This certificate was issued on the _____ day of _____ 19____, to an aborigine named _____, aged _____ about _____ height about _____, and known or distinguishable by the following peculiarities (state

if any), he having represented himself as able and willing to earn a living by his own exertions. The effect of this certificate while in force is as follows:—

It authorizes him to enter into a binding contract of service for any time during which this certificate remains in force.

It permits a European to harbour him without incurring any penalty.

It does not authorize any person to sell or give him any intoxicating drink or affect the penalty for so doing, or confer any other exemption from penalties under the said Act.

From the wages earned the sum of _____ shillings and _____ pence per week shall be remitted to _____ for the maintenance of his wife and children.

This certificate will not remain in force after the day of _____, 19____, unless renewed in the meantime by the date of renewal and signature of some member of the Board for the Protection of the Aborigines, its secretary, or any person duly authorized by the Board.

EARNINGS AND MONEY RECEIVED.

9. When a number of aborigines are located on a reserve and cultivate fields and gardens, or raise and keep live stock, or otherwise by their labours produce marketable goods, the Board may from time to time order the sale of any produce, or live stock, or goods. All money so received shall be paid into a trust fund kept in the Treasury termed the "*Aborigines Board Produce Fund*." Any moneys received from the leasing of reserves, sale of timber, wattle bark, or contracts for the sale of any commodities shall also be paid into the above fund. The Board may from time to time from this fund pay to the aborigines who have laboured on reserves such sums as it may determine, having regard to the kind and amount of labour performed by each. The Board may also pay from this fund such accounts as it deems right for the purchase of stock, materials, goods, &c.

10. Every able-bodied aborigine, half-caste, and other person resident on one of the Board's reserves shall be required to do a reasonable amount of work, as directed by the manager, and while so engaged shall be remunerated at a rate to be arranged by the manager and approved by the Board. Any one persistently refusing to work when required to do so shall be reported to the Board, and may have all supplies for himself or/and his family withdrawn until he resumes work, and/or will be liable to be removed from the reserve.

11. Every manager of a station, local guardian, or other person entrusted by the Board with the distribution of any stores or materials, or the application of any moneys received from the Board, or from the employer of any aborigine, shall furnish the Board with a monthly statement in detail of all stores and material received and distributed, and of all moneys received and disbursed, and showing the balances on hand of stores or materials and of moneys unexpended up to and inclusive of the last day of each calendar month.

CUSTODY OF CHILDREN.

12. The Governor in Council may, for the better care, custody, and education of any aborigine or half-caste child, order that such child be transferred to the care of the Children's Welfare Department.

13. Every aborigine or half-caste child under the age of fourteen years resident anywhere in Victoria shall, when so required by the Board or the person in charge of the nearest reserve, attend any school at or near such reserve as may be directed by the Department of Public Instruction.

14. Every aboriginal male under fourteen years of age, and all unmarried aboriginal females under the age of eighteen years shall, when so required by the person in charge of any reserve, reside and take their meals and sleep in any building set apart for such purposes.

CONDUCT OF BUSINESS.

15. The Board shall meet for the despatch of business at such times and places as they appoint, and shall deal with all matters brought before them relating to aborigines. Three members of the Board shall form a quorum.

16. Every question shall be decided by a majority of votes of the members voting on that question. In the event of an equality of votes, the chairman for the time being shall have a second or casting vote.

17. A vice-chairman shall be elected by the Board as early as practicable after the first day of July in each year. Due notice of the meeting for such election shall be given to each member of the Board.

18. The vice-chairman or any three members may, in writing, direct the secretary to convene a special meeting of the Board on any day and hour to deal with special business. Notice of such business shall be given to each member of the Board.

19. Any member may resign his office by letter addressed to the Chief Secretary.

20. There shall be an inspector and secretary to the Board. His duties will include visitation and inspection of reserves and station as directed by the Board, the preparation of business papers for each meeting of the Board, the taking and recording of minutes of the proceedings of same, the preparation of reports, conduct and registration of correspondence, keeping of all books of accounts, vouchers, reports, documents, plans and charts, the giving of instructions to officers and persons appointed under the Aborigines Act as the Minister or the Board may direct or as the Regulations prescribe, and generally to fulfil zealously and to the best of his ability all duties and obey all directions imposed on or given to him by the Board.

DUTIES OF THE BOARD.

21. With the consent of the Minister it shall be the duty of the Board—

- (a) To apportion, distribute, and apply as may seem most fitting, any moneys voted by Parliament, or any other moneys under the control of the Board, for the relief of aborigines.
- (b) To distribute blankets, clothing, and relief to aborigines at the discretion of the Board.
- (c) To provide for the custody, maintenance, and education of the children of aborigines.
- (d) To manage and regulate the use of reserves.
- (e) To exercise a general supervision and care over all matters affecting the interests and welfare of aborigines, and to protect them against injustice, imposition and fraud.

22. (1) It shall not be lawful for any person other than an aborigine, or an officer under the Board, or a person acting under the Board's direction, or under the authority of the Regulations, to enter or remain upon or be within the limits of a reserve upon which aborigines are residing for any purpose whatsoever.

(2) The Board may remove from a reserve any aborigine who is guilty of any misconduct, or who, in the opinion of the Board, should be earning a living away from the reserve.

(3) Any building or improvement erected on a reserve shall be vested in and become the property of the Board, also all cattle, horses, pigs, sheep, machinery, and property thereon purchased or acquired for the benefit of aborigines. No stock shall be permitted to remain on a reserve without the sanction of the Board.

(4) The manager of the Lake Tyers Aboriginal Station may, with the consent of the Minister and the Board, arrange for the election of a local advisory committee. Such committee shall be representative of all aborigine and half-caste residents on the station. Such committee may investigate any complaints which may be made to the manager, and, after due hearing, report to the manager the result of inquiries, and may recommend such action as it deems appropriate. The manager shall forward all recommendations of the committee to the Board for consideration.

LOCAL GUARDIANS.

23. The duties of guardians shall be to issue to aborigines orders on the storekeepers concerned for the supply of rations, to visit the settlement at least once in two weeks, or as directed, to exercise general supervision over and to attend to the welfare of aborigines, to forward reports as desired, to forward lists of clothing and goods required by aborigines, and to institute proceedings for offences under the Act or Regulations as may be directed by the Board.

MANAGEMENT OF STATIONS.

24. All stations shall be under the control of managers appointed by the Board.

25. The duties of a manager shall be—

- (a) To have the general management and control of all persons on the station under his charge, buildings, stock, and other property, to supervise the good order and conduct of the station, and to devote all his energies to the moral and social welfare of the aborigines resident on such station.
- (b) To report in the prescribed form, at the end of each month, for the information of the Board, as to the general condition of the station, i.e., the number of aborigines located thereon, and the daily average for the month, distinguishing in all cases the sexes and the full bloods from the half-castes; the number of children attending school, the nature and extent of the work done during the month, and what work is in contemplation; the number of births and deaths during the month; information as to the general health of the aborigines; and any other matters of interest.
- (c) To discourage any further introduction of half-castes, which shall be allowed only on the conditions set out in the Act and Regulations.
- (d) To keep a diary of all occurrences of note at the station under his charge, together with returns and statistics as directed, and submit the same as required for inspection by members of the Board or its officer as authorized.

- (e) To exercise supervision of the aborigines at the station, to restrain them from leaving the station and visiting public houses, and to endeavour to see that they do not squander their earnings.
- (f) To be accountable for all rations, clothing, medical comforts, medicines, &c., and their distribution as directed by the Board.
- (g) To keep account of all money and supplies received and disposed of, and to furnish to the Board monthly abstracts of same.
- (h) To forward all moneys received to the Board immediately after the end of each month, or as directed, accompanied by a statement showing the various items.
- (i) To submit requisitions for supplies of rations, clothing, stores, medicine, and all requirements of the station.
- (j) To submit to the Board applications by aborigines at the station who desire to occupy blocks of lands to be cultivated by them to earn a livelihood thereon for themselves and their families, and to report fully as to the locality and suitability of the land applied for, the character of the applicant, and the desirability of granting same.
- (k) To assist in and supervise the erection of and repairs to buildings, fencing, &c., where required by the Board, and the cultivation of the land; and to do his best to make the aborigines as comfortable and contented as practicable; also to take an interest in their work and recreations.

26. (a) Managers shall be personally liable for any expenditure incurred without authority from the Board. They shall take stock of all Government property on the station on the 30th June of each year, and furnish a return thereof for the Board's information. They shall also take stock monthly of rations and other stores on hand, and furnish returns showing clearly the quantities received and used during the month, and the quantities on hand.

(b) Application for leave by managers or other officers must be submitted to the Minister.

(c) All correspondence must be attended to promptly and recorded for inspection.

27. (a) The matron shall have the oversight of all the women, with special charge of young girls and children; shall visit the dwellings of married and unmarried women, and give instructions in cooking and washing and other domestic duties, and shall be responsible to the manager for the cleanliness of the women and children, together with the buildings they occupy.

(b) The sewing mistress shall supervise the cutting out of material and making of all garments for women and children. She shall assist the matron as directed by the manager.

28. Rations according to the undermentioned scale will be issued to managers and other officers on the Board's stations, viz. —

Flour, 8 lb. per week; or bread and/or flour to an equal weight, viz., 8 lb.; tea, $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. per week; sugar, 2 lb.; meat, up to 7 lb.; potatoes, up to 7 lb.; soap, 1 lb.; butter, 1 lb.; or jam, 2 lb.

Baking powder, candles, coffee, cocoa, cornina, currants, curry powder, mustard, oatmeal, peas, pearl barley, pepper, raisins, sago, salt, and treacle may be issued to the manager, &c., as determined by the Board. Where butter can be made and vegetables grown on the station, these may be distributed from station supply.

29. (a) Similar rations shall be given to the aborigines on Luke Tyers Station. Children under ten (10) years of age shall be allowed half the above quantities. At depots, &c., natives shall be allowed the following:—Flour, 8 lb.; tea, $\frac{1}{2}$ lb.; sugar, 2 lb.; rice, 1 lb.; oatmeal, 1 lb.; tobacco, 2 oz.; soap, 1 lb., may be given each week to each adult. In special cases these rations may be added to as in Regulation 28.

(b) A monthly return of all rations issued shall be furnished to the Board.

30. Clothing will be supplied to aborigines throughout the State as may be considered necessary.

31. All supplies must be obtained upon requisition under contracts approved by the Tender Board, or under Regulations under the *Public Service Act 1928* relating to the "mode of obtaining supplies," receipt, custody, and issue of stores, &c., which must be observed as far as possible. In all cases where articles are not obtainable under contract, offers in writing should accompany requisitions.

HALF-CASTES.

32. On the recommendation of the manager of a prescribed station, the Board may, in cases of illness, infirmity, or other necessitous circumstances, issue a licence signed by the secretary to the Board to any half-caste or child of a half-caste to reside for a period of three months upon any prescribed reserve, and the Board may renew such licence for any period not exceeding three months as often as it thinks fit; and may at any time cancel such licence.

33. Any half-caste or child of half-castes who may be permitted under a licence to reside at a prescribed reserve shall be under the control of the manager of such reserve, and shall strictly adhere to the Regulations of the Board for the management of such reserve.

34. (a) Any half-caste or child of half-castes may, with the approval of the Board, be dismissed and removed from any prescribed reserve for misconduct on the advice of the manager of such reserve.

(b) In order to maintain discipline, the manager of a reserve may at his discretion deal with any breach of good behaviour and minor offences on the part of any aborigine, and inflict a fine not exceeding Two pounds (£2) sterling. It shall be the duty of the manager to report forthwith to the Board any such penalty inflicted, furnishing at the same time full particulars of the case. Any aborigine so punished shall have the right to appeal to the Board, and the Board may allow such appeal, reduce the fine, or confirm the decision of the manager.

35. Any half-caste who may be permitted to reside on any prescribed reserve shall receive a supply of rations on the same scale as in Regulation 29.

36. Any half-caste or child of half-castes who may be permitted to reside on any prescribed reserve shall be supplied with such clothing, blankets, medical attention, and comforts as may be granted by special permission of the Board.

37. Every able-bodied half-caste and aborigine residing on a prescribed reserve shall do a reasonable amount of work, and any one persistently refusing to do so when required shall have his supplies stopped until he resumes work, or may be directed by the Board to leave the station.

38. If any aborigine or half-caste having his supplies so stopped use the supplies of any other aborigine or half-caste, or in any way deprive any other aborigine or half-caste child thereof, he shall be reported to the Board.

39. The granting of railway passes to aborigines or half-castes shall be limited to urgent and needful cases only, and travelling discouraged and prevented as much as possible.

40. Before any half-caste can receive any assistance from the Board to select or acquire Crown lands or private property, or to improve the same, the Board must be satisfied that he is sober, honest, and industrious; and if living on a prescribed reserve, he must produce a certificate to that effect from the manager of such reserve, or from a respectable householder if not living on a prescribed reserve.

41. The Board may licence or apprentice in a lawful manner to any trade or occupation any male or female half-caste over fourteen years of age to any person or persons of approved respectability.

42. Girls shall not be apprenticed or sent to service to single gentlemen, or hotel or boardinghouse keepers.

43. Half-castes licensed to serve and apprentices shall be provided with female protection and sleeping accommodation to be approved of by any officer of the Board authorized to inspect them.

44. All persons to whom boys or girls are licensed or apprenticed shall properly feed and lodge them, and also provide them with medicines and medical attendance when necessary, and also see that their persons, clothing, &c., are kept clean and healthy.

45. One-half of the wages of every half-caste child licensed to service and of every apprentice shall be paid by the employer to the secretary to the Board as directed. Such money shall be placed to the child's credit in a Savings Bank, and paid to such child at the end of his or her service or apprenticeship, and the other half shall be paid to the child as arranged in the contract.

46. Apprentices and half-castes licensed to service shall be allowed, when practicable, to attend divine service and Sunday school, and their moral training shall be duly cared for by their employer.

47. If within three months after the execution of any indenture the employer shall not be satisfied with the apprentice, the child may be returned to the Board and the indenture shall be cancelled.

48. In the event of any change of residence by any employer, written intimation thereof shall be given by him at once to the secretary to the Board.

49. Every employer shall forward to the secretary as often as the Board requires written reports on the conduct of any child in his service or apprenticed to him, and shall allow such child to write to the Board at such times as are deemed necessary.

50. In the event of any child becoming seriously ill, dying, absconding, leaving, or meeting with an accident, information shall at once be given by the employer to the secretary to the Board, and in the event of the child absconding information shall also be given at once by the employer to the local police so that immediate steps may be taken for the recovery and return of the child.

51. The Board shall provide a printed form of application for the use of those who desire to obtain children as apprentices or servants, and such form shall contain the following particulars:—

Form of Application.

- (a) Name, address, profession or occupation of applicant
- (b) Whether married or single.
- (c) Religious denomination and family of applicant.
- (d) Age of male members of family.
- (e) Particulars of sleeping accommodation.
- (f) Name of child applied for.
- (g) Description of work to be performed or trade to be learned by child.
- (h) Reference to two reliable persons (one, if possible, a minister of religion), as to the respectability of the applicant.

53. Any member or officer of the Board may from time to time, for the purposes of inspection and report, visit those receiving assistance under Regulation 40, or those licensed out to service or apprenticed or those in any way under the control of the Board.

54. Any aborigine who has been removed from any station or reserve under the provisions of Regulation 22 (2) and who is found entering or remaining upon any station or reserve without the express permission of the Board shall be guilty of an offence.

55. Any aborigine resident on any station or reserve knowingly harbouring any expelled aborigine shall be guilty of an offence.

56. All half-caste, quadroon, and octoroon lads on the Board's station and reserves of or above the age of eighteen (18) years shall leave same on a notification from the Board, and shall not again be allowed upon a station or reserve, except for a brief visit to relatives, periodically, at the discretion of managers of stations. In all cases such visits shall not extend beyond ten (10) days, and a report shall forthwith be made of permission so granted. Any person violating this provision shall be guilty of an offence.

57. Every person who violates the provisions of any of the preceding Regulations shall be liable to the penalties set forth in section 13 of the *Aborigines, Act 1928* (No. 3631).

REGULATIONS FOR THE STORAGE OF PETROLEUM,
ETC., CITY OF HAWTHORN.

*At State Parliament House, Melbourne, the sixth day of
May, 1931.*

WHEREAS by section 656 of the *Local Government Act 1928 (No. 3720)* it is enacted that the Governor in Council may make Regulations applicable to the whole of Victoria, or to such municipal districts (including the City of Melbourne and the City of Geelong) as are specified therein for or with respect to regulating the keeping and storage of petroleum, or any product of petroleum (including kerosene), turpentine, or other volatile or inflammable liquids, and carbide or other combustible substances: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the said section of the said Act and all other powers him enabling in that behalf, doth hereby make the following Regulations, and doth provide that the said Regulations shall apply and have application throughout the whole of the municipal district of the City of Hawthorn, and furthermore that such Regulations shall be deemed to be in substitution of any By-law or By-laws made by the said Council of the said municipality for the purpose for which these Regulations are now made, and shall take effect from the first day of June, 1931.

REGULATIONS.

Storage of More than 50 Gallons of Petrol, &c., or More than 250 Gallons of Kerosene, &c.

1. Every person who shall keep, store, or retain in or upon or about any buildings or premises more than 50 gallons in the aggregate of the volatile fluids mentioned in the Schedule hereto or more than 250 gallons of petroleum or any products of petroleum, turpentine, or other volatile fluids that will flash or emit an inflammable vapour at not below 73 deg. Fah. Abel close test shall comply with the following requirements:—

- (1) The site of all buildings shall be first approved of by the Council.
- (2) The buildings shall be constructed with walls of brick, concrete, iron, or other non-inflammable material except that in the case of a galvanized-iron structure the lower portion of the walls must be in brick.
- (3) The floor of such buildings shall be made of earth, concrete, or brick. The roof of such buildings shall be constructed of incombustible material.
- (4) To prevent outflow the lower portion of all walls to be without break or opening, the capacity of such enclosed space to be at least 25 per cent. of the total volume of volatile fluids kept, stored, or retained in any such buildings.

Storage of Less than 50 Gallons of Petrol, &c., or Less than 250 Gallons of Kerosene, &c.

2. Every person who shall keep, store, or retain in or upon or about any buildings or premises less than 50 gallons in the aggregate of the volatile fluids mentioned in the Schedule hereto or less than 250 gallons of petroleum or any products of petroleum, turpentine, or other volatile fluids that will flash or emit an inflammable vapour at not below 73 deg. Fah. Abel close test shall comply with the following requirements:—

- (1) In quantities not exceeding 50 gallons in the aggregate of any of the volatile fluids mentioned in the Schedule hereto if such volatile fluids are kept in substantial vessels of metal or other approved material including winchesters, so securely closed that neither liquid nor vapour can escape therefrom, and if all due precautions are taken to prevent accident by fire or explosion and to prevent the escape of any such volatile fluids into a sewer or drain, and if the position of storage is free from other easily combustible goods and will not menace exits, stairways, or adjoining premises except that a reasonable quantity not exceeding 12 gallons in the aggregate of the said volatile fluids may be kept in separate glass or earthenware vessels each containing not more than 1 pint so securely

closed or stopped that neither liquid nor vapour can escape therefrom and if the position of storage is free from other easily combustible goods and will not menace exits or stairways.

- (2) In quantities not exceeding 250 gallons of petroleum or any product of petroleum, turpentine, or other volatile fluids that will flash or emit an inflammable vapour at not below 73 deg. Fah. Abel close test provided such volatile fluids are kept in substantial vessels of glass, earthenware, or metal, and are suitably closed or stopped, and the position of storage will not menace exits, stairways, or adjoining premises.

Precaution to be Taken when Volatile Fluids are Stored in Bulk Containers.

3. Every tank or other container used for the purpose of the storage or keeping of any volatile fluids shall when not in use be kept tightly closed to prevent the escape of such fluids or any vapour or gas emitted therefrom.

Precautions to be Observed in Buildings.

4. Whenever any person shall have in or upon or about any building or premises more than 50 gallons (or more than 12 gallons if kept in glass or earthenware vessels each containing not more than 1 pint) of the volatile fluids mentioned in the Schedule hereto or more than 250 gallons of petroleum or any products of petroleum, turpentine, or other volatile fluids that will flash or emit an inflammable vapour at not below 73 deg. Fah. Abel close test he shall observe the following precautions against fire:—

- (1) One 2-gallon carbon tetra-chloride or other approved chemical fire extinguisher shall be kept in such a position as to be easy of access at all times in the event of fire and to be under the supervision of the Metropolitan Fire Brigade where practicable.
- (2) At least two iron buckets or other suitable containers each having a capacity of not less than a quarter of a cubic foot, filled with dry sand, shall be kept in position in different parts of the building so as to be easy of access at all times in the event of fire.
- (3) Dry sand shall be used for absorbing all volatile fluids spilt or thrown upon the floor and shall after being so used be forthwith removed from the premises.
- (4) The use of sawdust for absorbing the said volatile fluids is prohibited.

Containers to be Labelled for Retail Sale.

5. Any person who for retail sale fills into small containers on premises any of the volatile fluids mentioned in the Schedule hereto shall have the fire-fighting appliances as mentioned in the preceding section and shall clearly label such small containers with the name of the contents and with the following words:—"Highly inflammable. Beware of the vapours. Keep fire away."

Regulations not to Apply to Storage of Alcoholic Spirits.

6. Nothing herein contained shall apply to the storing of alcoholic (other than methylated) spirits.

Conditions to be Observed in the Construction of Tanks.

7. Every person who shall erect or construct any storage tank for the storage of more than 250 gallons of petroleum or any products of petroleum, turpentine, or other volatile fluids shall comply with the following requirements:—

- (1) The site of all storage tanks other than underground tanks not exceeding 1,000 gallons capacity shall be first approved by the Council for that purpose.
- (2) Underground tanks not exceeding 1,000 gallons capacity shall be constructed of galvanized steel plate not less than 14 gauge, and be placed not less than 2 feet below the surface of the ground or the lowest floor of any building. Sand shall be filled in over the tank to the level of the ground or floor as the case may require. Tanks shall be adequately ventilated and fitted with safety devices to the satisfaction of the engineer. Filling pipes may be placed where the engineer approves, but so as not to cause any obstruction to the traffic when the tanks are being filled.
- (3) Storage tanks which are erected upon or above the surface of the ground or partly below and partly above the surface of the ground shall be enclosed by a wall of brick, stone, or concrete, or an earthen dam of approved construction: such wall or dam shall be in no case of less height than 2 feet higher than the level to which the oil would rise should it

escape from the tanks. An opening may be made in the enclosing wall to permit access to the tank but such opening shall contain a liquid-tight door either sliding or opening inward, made of incombustible material, and of sufficient strength to resist any pressure which may be brought to bear on such door by the bursting of the tank enclosed in such wall.

Power to Enter and Inspect.

8. Any officer authorized by the Council may for the purpose of securing the due observance of and compliance with the provisions of these Regulations enter and inspect any building or erection at all reasonable times and do therein all such acts and things as are reasonably necessary for the purpose aforesaid, and any persons who shall in any manner interfere with such officer in the execution of his duty shall be guilty of an offence.

Offence.

9. Every person who shall contravene or fail to comply with any of the provisions of these Regulations shall be guilty of an offence.

Power to Enter and Inspect.

8. Any officer authorized by the Council may for the purpose of securing the due observance of and compliance with the provisions of these Regulations enter and inspect any building or erection at all reasonable times and do therein all such acts and things as are reasonably necessary for the purpose aforesaid, and any persons who shall in any manner interfere with such officer in the execution of his duty shall be guilty of an offence.

Offence.

9. Every person who shall contravene or fail to comply with any of the provisions of these Regulations shall be guilty of an offence.

Penalty.

10. Every person guilty of an offence under these Regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds, and in the case of a continuing offence to a further penalty of Two pounds for each succeeding day after a written notice of the offence from the Council.

Exemptions may be Made by the Council.

The Council may, if it considers reasonable care will be observed, exempt from any one or more of these Regulations inflammable liquids when kept for private use, provided the store is exclusively used for inflammable liquids, and not less than 50 feet intervene between the store and other buildings or an adjoining property boundary.

NOTE.—Private use does not include inflammable liquids kept for sale or for purely business activities.

Definitions.

In these Regulations, unless inconsistent with the context, "approved" means approved in writing by the engineer for the time being of the said City of Hawthorn or any deputy appointed by the said Council of the said municipality to act for him. "Council" means the Council of the said municipality. "Person" includes firm, corporation, or company; and "volatile fluid" includes any of the volatile fluids mentioned in the Schedule hereto, and also includes petroleum or any products of petroleum, turpentine, or other volatile fluids mentioned in these Regulations that will flash or emit an inflammable vapour at not below 73 deg. Fah. Abel close test if such are stored in immediate contiguity with the volatile fluids mentioned in the Schedule.

SCHEDULE.

Methylated spirits, benzine, petrol, naphtha, or any other products of petroleum or other volatile fluids that will flash or emit an inflammable vapour below a temperature of 73 deg. Fah. Abel close test.

And the Honorable John Percy Jones, His Majesty's Commissioner of Public Works for the State of Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

FURTHER AMENDMENT OF PLUMBING AND GASFITTING REGULATIONS (No. 3).

WHEREAS, in pursuance of the *Apprenticeship Act 1927* (No. 3546), the Governor in Council did, on the 12th day of February, 1929, make Regulations entitled *Plumbing and Gasfitting Regulations (No. 3)*: And whereas it is expedient to amend the said Regulations: Now therefore, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon him by sub-section (3) of section 29 of the *Acts Interpretation Act 1928*, and of any other powers him thereunto enabling, His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby amend the said Regulations as follows, that is to say:—

In Regulation 4, for the minimum rates of pay set out in paragraphs (a) and (b), the following minimum rates shall be substituted, and shall commence on the 18th day of May, 1931, on, from, and after which date all indentures of apprenticeship heretofore executed under the provisions of the Act and the Regulations made in respect of the aforesaid trades shall be deemed to be amended accordingly:—

- (a) In respect to the term of apprenticeship of six years:—

1st year—at the rate of 14s. 4d. per week.
 2nd year—at the rate of 20s. 3d. per week.
 3rd year—at the rate of 26s. 7d. per week.
 4th year—at the rate of 36s. 2d. per week.
 5th year—at the rate of 47s. 10d. per week.
 6th year—at the rate of 66s. 0d. per week.

- (b) In respect to the term of apprenticeship of five years:—

1st year—at the rate of 20s. 3d. per week.
 2nd year—at the rate of 26s. 7d. per week.
 3rd year—at the rate of 36s. 2d. per week.
 4th year—at the rate of 47s. 10d. per week.
 5th year—at the rate of 66s. 0d. per week.

And the Honorable John Lemmon, His Majesty's Minister of Labour for the State of Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

- (b) Cattle sale-yards—Five pounds.
- (c) Dangerous trade premises—Five pounds.
- (d) Boardinghouse—Ten shillings.
- (e) Common lodginghouse—Ten shillings.
- (f) Eating house—Ten shillings.
- (g) Premises (whether a licensed victualler's premises or not) on which are manufactured or prepared for sale ice cream, ginger beer, hop beer, or any similar beer, lemonade, cordials, soda water, lithia water, or other mineral water, or any artificially aerated water—Five shillings.
- (h) For transfer of any registration—Two shillings and sixpence.

Such fees, as set out above, shall be paid to the Town Clerk of the said City by any person making application for such registration, renewal, or transfer.

3. This By-law shall apply to and have operation throughout the whole of the Municipal District of the City of Essendon.

DEFINITION OF JUVENILE WORKERS.

(3) Persons under 21 years of age (other than apprentices or improvers) employed at the following classes of work:—

Hard Fibre Department.

Males employed at opening hemp (other than manilla); taking away from softener; parting and weighing hemp; balling binder twine; packing binder twine; balling lashing and box-cords; spooling and traverse reeling of binder twine; stencilling bags; swooping or as attendants to the following machines:—At delivery end first spreader feeding and delivery subsequent spreaders; drawing frames; automatic spinners; box-cord machines; laying machines and strand formers; house, horizontal and vertical machine making rope under 2 inches circumference and reelers for same; waste cleaner; light traveller drivers on cords and lines not exceeding 1½ inches circumference; or as winders and reversers; bobbin bank hands; rope walk attendants; twisters of hay lashing; strand forming and laying of box-cords; or lappers, strippers or finishers of clothes lines.

Tow Department.

Females 17 years of age or over employed at delivery end breaker card, or feeding and delivery other cards and drawing machines.

Soft Fibre Department.

Males employed at opening fibre and attendants to softener; making paper cores for spooling; or as attendants delivery end of cards and rovings; dressing machine attendants; scourers; lappers or card laying machine attendants.
Females employed at delivery breaker and finisher cards; drawing frames (feeding and delivery); roving frames (feeding and delivery); doffing, piecing, and spinning; twist and cord frames; reeling and spooling shop twines; balling shop twines; parcelling shop twines; reeling or as lappers.

Cordage Department.

Males employed on winch for drum polishing; at hanking and parcelling plough reins and sash lines; as layers of lines or cords in walks; as twisters and layers of yarn in walk; at making and finishing fish lines; as hand reelers; at opening, plaiting and finishing halters; at making shanks for halters; at weaving webbing for halters; at warping or at splicing and clamping cordage.

Females employed at hanking and parcelling plough reins and sash lines; at making nets from small rope, twine and cord; at hanking, making up, parcelling fish and other lines; at braiding and plaiting; at finishing halters; at making cores for spooling machines; at covering cordages with canvas and paper.

Mat Department.

Males employed as mat makers on hand looms; mat makers on frames; winders; carders; cop winders or plaiters.

Females employed as learners mat making on looms; mat making on frames; or making bordered mats; or as winders, carders, plaiters or cop winders.

(4) SHIFTS.—That—

(a) The hour of beginning and the hour of ending each shift shall be as follows :—

(b) The higher rates to be paid for each hour or fraction of an hour, worked by any employee before or after his shift shall be time and a quarter for the first two hours, and thereafter time and a half, calculated on the rates fixed for the day shift.

(5) SPECIAL RATES FOR SUNDAYS AND PUBLIC HOLIDAYS.—All work done on Sunday, New Year's Day, Good Friday, or Christmas Day shall be paid for at the rate of double time, and on 26th day of January, Easter Monday, Eight Hours Day, or Boxing Day at the rate of time and a half; but if any other day be, by Act of Parliament or Proclamation, substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.

Factories and Shops Acts 1928 (No. 3677).

DETERMINATION OF THE DISPENSARIES BOARD.

NOTE.—This Determination on the 1st June, 1931, applied to the whole of the State of Victoria.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board appointed to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any persons employed in dispensing, compounding, or selling medicines, drugs, or medicinal preparations in a Friendly Society's or Hospital Dispensary has made the following Determination, namely:—

(1) That on the 1st June, 1931, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

(5) CASUAL LABOUR.—Any person casually employed during any week for not more than 23 hours shall be paid at the rate of time and a half.

(6) SPECIAL RATES.—Time and a half shall be the special rate for all work done on Sundays, New Year's Day, Foundation Day (26th January), Good Friday, Easter Monday, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, then the special rate shall be payable only for the day so substituted.
