Factories and Shops Act 1928 (No. 3677).

DETERMINATION OF THE SLATERS AND TILERS BOARD.

NOTE.—This Determination applies to the whole of the State of Victoria.

IN accordance with the provisions of the *Factories and Shops Act 1928 (No. 3677)*, the Wages Board appointed to "determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons whosoever employed in the process, trade, or business of a slater, roof-tiler, ridger, shingler, or cement tiler (other than a tiler laying verandah or flooring tiles)" has made the following Determination, namely:—

(1) That on the 9th June, 1931, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

(3) TIME OF BEGINNING AND ENDING WORK—

8 a.m. 5 p.m. on five days in the week.
8 a.m. 12 noon on the other working day of the week on which the half-holiday is locally observed.

(4) OVERTIME.—All work done outside the hours specified as the times of beginning and ending work, or for any work done within such hours in excess of 44 hours in any week, shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.

(5) SPECIAL RATES.—Double time shall be the rate for all work done on Sunday, New Year's Day, Foundation Day (26th January), Good Friday, Easter Monday, Eight Hours Day (21st April), Christmas Day, and Boxing Day; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.

(6) PIECE-WORK PRICES.—That the lowest piece-work prices payable to any person engaged in the following kinds of work shall be:—

(7) DEFINITION.—Slater's or tiler's measurement is the net square measurement of the roof with 1 square foot extra for every lineal foot of eaves, hips, valleys, gutters, and gables.

Factories and Shops Act 1928 (No. 3677).

DETERMINATION OF THE SHOPS BOARD No. 2 (BOOT REPAIRERS).

NOTE.—This Determination on the 10th June, 1931, applied to the following parts of Victoria, viz.:—The Metropolitan District as defined in the *Factories and Shops Act 1928 (No. 3677)* and the Order in Council thereunder, and such portion of the city of Sandringham as is not included within the said district; the cities of Ballarat, Bendigo, Geelong, Geelong West, and Warrnambool; the town of Newtown and Chilwell; and the boroughs of Eaglehawk and Sebastopol.

IN accordance with the provisions of the *Factories and Shops Act 1928 (No. 3677)*, the Wages Board appointed to “determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any persons employed in the trade of a Boot Repairer,” has made the following Determination, namely:—

(1) That on the 10th June, 1931, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

PROPORTION (IN ANY PLACE).

Apprentices.

One apprentice to three or fraction of three workers receiving not less than 85s. 3d. per week of 44 hours.

Improvers.

One improver to every four workers receiving not less than 85s. 3d. per week of 44 hours.

(3) **TIMES OF BEGINNING AND ENDING WORK.**—The times of beginning and ending work for any person shall be:—

Time of Beginning.	Time of Ending.
8 a.m. 	1 p.m. on Saturdays, and
8 a.m. 	6 p.m. on the other working days of the week.

(4) **OVERTIME.**—The following rates shall be paid for all work done:—

Outside the times of beginning and ending work	Time and a half.
Within the times of beginning and ending work, in excess of 44 hours in any week	Time and a quarter.

(5) **PAYMENT FOR HOLIDAYS.**—All employees shall be entitled to the following holidays without deduction of pay:—New Year's Day, Foundation Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Eight Hours Day, King's Birthday, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day.

(6) **SPECIAL RATES.**—Double time shall be the rate for all work done on New Year's Day, Foundation Day (26th January), Good Friday, Easter Monday, Eight Hours Day (21st April), King's Birthday (3rd June), Christmas Day, or Boxing Day: but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.
