Factories and Shops Act 1928 (No. 3677).

DETERMINATION OF THE STOREMEN, PACKERS, AND SORTERS BOARD.

This Determination on the 10th February, 1933, applied to the following parts of Victoria, namely:—The Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Act 1928 (No. 3677), and the Order in Council made thereunder extending such Metropolitan District, such portions of the city of Sandringham as are not included in the said Metropolitan District; the cities of Ballarat, Bendigo, Geelong, Geelong West, and Warrnambool; the boroughs of Eaglehawk and Sebastopol; the town of Newtown and Chilwell; and such portion of the area vested in or under the control of the State Electricity Commission as is within a radius of one mile and a half of the Yallourn Post Office:

- (4) OVERTIME.—The following rates shall be paid for all work done :-

- (5) SPECIAL RATES FOR SUNDAYS AND PUBLIC HOLIDAYS.—Double time shall be the rate for all work done on Sunday, New Year's Day, Australia Day (26th January), Good Friday, Easter Monday, Eight Hours Day (21st April), Anzao Day (in industries named in the second schedule to the Anzac Day Act 1928), King's Birthday (3rd June), Christmas Day, or Boxing Day; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the days so substituted.
- (6) Time Rate.—Any person (other than those in potato or onion stores, on wharfs, or in wharf sheds, customs railways sheds or fumigating sheds) employed on time wages for less than the number of hours fixed for an ordinary week's work shall for each hour worked up to one-half the maximum number of hours fixed in this determination be paid at the ordinary wages rate with an addition of fifty per centum.
- (7) RESTRICTION AS TO FEMALES LIFTING HEAVY WEIGHTS.—The maximum weight to be lifted by any female over 18 years of age, employed in an Egg Store, shall be thirty pounds.
- (8) TERMINATION OF EMPLOYMENT.—Seven days' notice of termination of employment shall be given by either employer or
- (9) PIECE-WORK.—The Board determines under the provisions of sub-sections (1) and (2) of section 150 of the Factories and Shops Act 1928 (No. 3677), that any employer may fix and pay piece-work prices for wholly or partly packing or sorting any articles for which wages rates are fixed, provided that such employer shall base such piece-work prices on the earnings of an average worker working under like conditions, and such piece-work prices shall be fixed so that an average worker can earn not less than the wages rate fixed by the Board
