Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE PLASTERERS BOARD.

NOTE.—(A) This Determination on the 17th July, 1936, applied to the whole of the State of Victoria.

(B) Plastering was proclaimed on 28th November, 1928, as an apprenticeship trade under the *Apprenticeship Act 1928* for the Metropolitan District.

Full particulars of the apprenticeship regulations for these trades may be obtained on application to the Secretary, Apprenticeship Commission, Treasury Gardens, Melbourne. (Price 3d.)

(C) On the 13th December, 1927, the Plasterers Board powers were extended to include persons employed as plasterers in finishing—

- (a) granolithic flooring or flooring of which cement forms a part, or
(b) magnesite flooring.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board appointed to "determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons (other than labourers) whosoever employed in the process, trade, or business of a plasterer," has made the following Determination, namely:—

(1) That on the 17th July, 1936, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

(3) ALLOWANCE.—The following allowance shall be paid to any person employed on work away from his employer's place of business if such employee is unable to return to his home the same night, 6s. per day extra, but not exceeding 36s. in any week.

(4) TIME OF BEGINNING AND ENDING WORK.—The time of beginning and ending work for persons (other than underground sewer or tunnel plasterers) shall be—

7.45 a.m.	12 noon on Saturday.
7.45 a.m.	5.15 p.m. on the other working days of the week.

(5) OVERTIME.—That the following rates shall be paid to—

- (a) Persons employed on underground sewer or tunnel plastering—
 - For work done in excess of 44 hours in any week Time and a quarter.
- (b) Persons employed on any work other than underground sewer or tunnel plastering—
 - For work done within the hours fixed in clause 4 in excess of 44 hours in any week .. Time and a quarter.
 - For work done on Saturdays—
 - Between midnight and 7.45 a.m. Double time.
 - Between 12 noon and 5 p.m. Time and a half.
 - Between 5 p.m. and midnight Double time.
 - For work done on any other working day—
 - Between 5.15 p.m. and 10.15 p.m. Time and a half.
 - Between 10.15 p.m. and 7.45 a.m. Double time.

(6) TERMINATION OF EMPLOYMENT.—Except where the conduct of an employee justifies instant dismissal, one hour's notice of termination of employment shall be given by either employer or employee, or one hour's pay shall be paid or forfeited in lieu thereof.

(7) CASUAL LABOUR.—Casual employees (i.e., persons employed during the week for not more than one-half the maximum number of hours fixed in this determination as a week's work) shall be paid at the rate of 2d. per hour extra.

(8) FARES.—Where an employee is engaged on a job more than ten miles from the "centre" and is able to return to his home each day, he shall be paid the daily fares, not exceeding six shillings, actually and necessarily incurred in travelling to and from the job. "Centre" means the Flinders-street railway station or the principal post office of the cities of Ballarat, Bendigo, or Geelong, whichever is nearest to the employer's principal place of business.

(9) SPECIAL RATES.—Double time shall be the rate for all work done on Sunday, New Year's Day, Australia Day (26th January), Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day (21st April), Christmas Day, and Boxing Day; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.
