## DETERMINATION OF THE BEDSTEADMAKERS BOARD.

NOTE.—This Determination on the 14th February, 1936, applied to the following parts of Victoria, namely:—The Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts and the Order in Council thereunder, and such portions of the City of Sandringham as are not within the said Metropolitan District; the cities of Ballarat, Bendigo, Geelong, Geelong West and Warrnambool; the towns of Newtown and Chilwell; and the boroughs of Eaglehawk and Sebastopol.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board appointed to “determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons (including the moulders of bedsteads and excluding the moulders of fenders) employed in the process, trade, or business of a maker of metal bedsteads or fenders, or parts thereof,” has made the following Determination, namely:—

(1) That on the 14th February, 1936, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

DEFINITION.—*Juvenile Workers*—Persons under 21 years of age (other than apprentices or improvers) who, if females, are employed as wrappers, or, if males, are employed in (a) chipping or casting; (b) wrapping, packing, or moving material; or (c) cleaning, heating, or closing tubes, angle or bar-iron.

(3) *Overtime*.—Any employee who in any week works for any time in excess of the maximum number of hours fixed for a week's work shall be paid for such extra time at the rate of time and a quarter.

(4) *Special Rates*.—That double time shall be the special rate for all work done on Sunday, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Christmas Day, Boxing Day, New Year's Day, Australia Day, 3rd June (King's Birthday), but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.

(5) *Piece-work*.—The Board determines, under the provisions of section 150 of the *Factories and Shops Act 1928*, that any employer may fix and pay piece-work prices to any person employed at any work for which the Board has fixed a minimum wage, provided that such employer shall base such piece-work prices on the earnings of an average worker working under like conditions, and such piece-work prices shall be fixed so that an average worker can earn not less than the wages rates fixed by the Board for such work.
