By His Excellency Major-General Sir Winston Joseph Dugan, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished
Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Companion of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, and
Companion of Our Distinguished Service Order, Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies
in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS His Majesty has been graciously pleased, by Commission under His Royal Sign Manual and Signet bearing date at His Majesty's Court, at St. James's, the second day of May, 1939, to appoint me, Winston Joseph Dugan, to be Governor in and over the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia: Now therefore I, the Governor aforesaid, do hereby proclaim and declare that I have this day taken the prescribed oaths before His Honour Mr. Justice Lowe, a Judge of the Supreme Court of the said State, and before the Executive Council thereof, at Parliament House, Spring Street, Melbourne, and I have assumed the said office of Governor in and over the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia under and by virtue of His Majesty's said Commission.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the State of Victoria, at Melbourne, this seventeenth day of July, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and thirty-nine, and in the third year of the reign of His Majesty King George VI.

COMMISSION passed under the the Royal Sign Manual and Signet, appointing Major-General Sir Winston Joseph Dugan, K.C.M.G., C.B., D.S.O., to be Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia.

George the Sixth, by the Grace of God of Great Britain, Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the Seas King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India: To Our Trusty and Well-beloved Sir Winston Joseph Dugan, Knight Commander of Our Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Companion of Our Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Companion of Our Distinguished Service Order, Major-General in the Reserve of Officers of Our Army. Greeting.

Appointment of Major-General Sir W. J. Dugan, K.C.M.G., C.B., D.S.O., to be Governor.

W E do, by this Our Commission under Our Sign Manual and Signet, appoint you, the said Sir Winston Joseph Dugan, to be, during Our pleasure, Our Governor in and over Our State of Victoria and its Dependencies, in the Commonwealth of Australia, with all the powers, rights, privileges, and advantages to the said Office belonging or appertaining.

Recites Letters Patent constituting the Office of Governor.

II. And We do hereby authorise, empower, and command you to exercise and perform all and singular the powers and directions contained in certain Letters Patent under the Great Seal, bearing date at Westminster the Twenty-ninth day of October 1900, constituting the Office of Governor in and over Our State of Victoria and its Dependencies, in the Commonwealth of Australia, and in certain other Letters Patent under the Great Seal, bearing date at Westminster the Thirtieth day of April 1913, amending the same, or in any other Letters Patent adding to. amending or substituted for the same, according to such Orders and Instructions as the Governor for the time being of Our said State hath already received, or as you may hereafter receive from Us.

Commission of 20th March, 1034, superseded.

III. And We do hereby appoint that so soon as you shall have taken the prescribed Oaths and have entered upon the duties of your Office, this Our present Commission shall supersede the Commission under the Sign Manual and Signet of His late Majesty King George the Fifth bearing date the Twentieth day of March, 1934, appointing Our Right Trusty and Well-beloved William Charles Arcedeckne, Baron Huntingfield, Knight Commander of Our Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Captain in Our Army (Retired), to be Our Governor of Our State of Victoria and its Dependencies.

Officers, &c., to obey the Governor.

IV. And We do hereby command all and singular Our Officers, Ministers, and loving subjects in Our said State and its Dependencies, and all others whom it may concern, to take due notice hereof, and to give their ready obedience accordingly.

Given at Our Court at Saint James's, this Second day of May, 1939, in the Third Year of Our Reign.

### DETERMINATION OF THE PLUMBERS BOARD.

Notes .- (1) This Determination applies to the whole of the State of Victoria.

(2) Plumbing and Gasfitting were proclaimed on the 10th October, 1928, as Apprenticeship Trades under the Apprenticeship Act 1928, for the Metropolitan District, and on the 23rd March, 1938, for the City of Ballarat and the borough of Sebastopol, and the cities of Geelong and Geelong West, the town of Newtown and Chilwell, and the Moorpanyal riding of the shire of Corio.

Full particulars of the Apprenticeship Regulations for these trades may be obtained on application to the Secretary, Apprenticeship Commission, Gisborne-street, Melbourne, C.2.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board, which, since the 24th April, 1939, has had the power to "determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons wheresover employed in any plumbing work (including electrical or gashtting) or employed in fixing any material used instead of metal for pipes, guttering, or roof covering (other than slates or tiles) in connexion with the erection or repair of buildings"—has made the following determination, namely:—

(1) That on the 11th July, 1939, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

the employer and the workmen be unable to agree whether or not any work cone by the natter is such as entitles him to the additional wage provided by this paragraph, the question is to be submitted to a Referce, chosen by the parties, whose decision will be binding on both of them. In the event of the parties being unable to agree on a Referce, application is to be made to the Secretary of the Department of Labour of the State of Victoria to appoint an Inspector to determine the matter in dispute, and the decision of such Inspector will be binding on both of them.

(13) DAY FOR PAYMENT OF WAGES.—Wages, allowances and other moneys due shall be paid not later than 5 p.m. on Thursday of each working week. On termination of employment by the employer, all wages, allowances and other moneys shall be paid at the time of dismissal. The employee shall not be deemed to have ceased employment until he has been paid.

The provisions of this clause shall not apply in respect to persons employed by the Metropolitan Gas Company.
