BUTTER QUOTA.

I. E. J. HOGAN, Minister of Agriculture in the State of Victoria, after consultation with the Victorian Dairy Products Board, and after ascertaining that the supply and distribution of butter at reasonable prices to consumers thereof in Victoria will be ensured, hereby determine a quota for butter as follows:—

The proportion shall be Fifty per cent.

The period for which this quota is to operate shall be the month of March, 1939.

CHEESE QUOTA.

I. E. J. HOGAN, Minister of Agriculture in the State of Victoria, after consultation with the Victorian Dairy Products Board, and after ascertaining that the supply and distribution of cheese at reasonable prices to consumers thereof in Victoria will be ensured, hereby determine a quota for cheese as follows:—

The proportion shall be Thirty-six per cent.

The period for which this quota is to operate shall be the month of March, 1939.

(3) TIME OF BEGINNING AND ENDING WORK.—For any persons except burners, machine drivers, machine riggers, and pan or crusher attendants—

(4) OVERTIME.—(a) Any employee who works for any time in excess of the maximum number of hours per week fixed by this Determination shall be paid for such extra time at the rate of time and a half.

(b) Any employee (other than a burner, machine driver, machine rigger, or pan or crusher attendant) who works outside the hours fixed in clause 3 shall be paid for such time at the rate of time and a half.

(c) All work done by machine drivers, machine riggers, and pan or crusher attendants either before or after the ordinary starting and finishing time of the factory shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half irrespective of the number of hours worked.

(5) SUNDAYS AND HOLIDAYS.—Time and a half shall be the special rate for all work done on Sundays, and double time for all work done on New Year's Day, Australia Day (26th January), Labour Day (21st April), Good Friday, Easter Monday, King's Birthday, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.

(6) PAYMENT FOR HOLIDAYS.—All employees shall be granted the holidays mentioned in clause 5 without deduction of pay.

(7) PAYMENT OF WAGES.—All wages due shall be paid not later than Friday in each week, except where otherwise mutually agreed between employer and employee.

PIECE-WORK PRICES WHICH MAY BE FIXED BY AN EMPLOYER.

(9) The Board determines under the provisions of Section 150 of the *Factories and Shops Act 1928* that any employer may fix and pay piece-work prices to any person employed in fire-brick making, or as a clayholeman, machine driver, machine rigger, wheeler of green bricks, or trucker, provided that any such employer shall base such piece-work prices on the earnings of an average worker working under like conditions, and such piece-work prices shall be fixed so that an average worker can earn not less than the wages rates that are fixed by the Board for such work.

Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE FIBROUS PLASTERERS BOARD.

NOTE.—(1) This Determination applies to the whole of the State of Victoria.

(2) Fibrous Plastering was proclaimed on 17th February, 1937, as an Apprenticeship Trade under the *Apprenticeship Act 1928* for the Metropolitan District.

Full particulars of the *Apprenticeship Regulations for this trade* may be obtained on application to the Secretary, *Apprenticeship Commission, Gisborne-street, Melbourne, C.2.* (Price 3d.)

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board which since the 14th April, 1937, has had the power to "determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of—

- (a) manufacturing fibrous plaster, or making architectural ornaments of fibrous plaster, plaster, or cement;
- (b) fixing fibrous plaster on walls or ceilings of buildings;
- (c) architectural modelling;
- (d) preparing material for or making or fixing acoustic tiles moulded into slab form, and having an earth base,"

has made the following Determination, namely:—

(1) That on the 23rd February, 1939, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

No person under the age of 18 years shall be employed on a single bench in the manufacture of plain fibrous plaster sheeting unless in association with a person over 18 years of age.

No person under the age of eighteen years shall be employed operating a hemp teasing machine in a fibrous plaster mill.

No person under the age of eighteen years shall be employed with only one adult worker in the process of lifting or fixing panelling or sheeting having an area of 4 square yards or more.

*(a) Except those covered by the *Apprenticeship Act 1928*.

(b) The Board has determined that no person shall be taken as an apprentice in connexion with preparing material for or making or fixing acoustic tiles moulded into slab form and having an earth base.

EXTRA RATES.—(a) Foremen, i.e., employees in charge of work and who issue instructions to four or more men under them shall be paid as above with 6s. per week additional.

(b) Employees { (i) Demolishing old ceilings, or } shall, whilst employed at either class of work have 3d. per square yard distributed equally between them, in addition to the ordinary rates.
 (ii) Erecting new ceilings on sites of old ceilings that have been demolished, or partly demolished or that collapse
 (iii) Employees demolishing or partly demolishing old walls shall have 1d. per square yard distributed equally between them in addition to the ordinary rates.

(3) PRO RATA PAYMENT.—Any person who works less than 44 hours in any week shall be paid not less than the ordinary wages rate calculated pro rata according to the number of hours worked.

(4) ALLOWANCES.—The following allowances shall be paid to persons employed outside the employer's usual place of business in connexion with the fixing of fibrous plaster or acoustic tiles :—

- (a) For work done at such distance as prevents the employee from returning to his home the same night—
 - (i) 6s. 6d. per day extra, with a maximum of 35s. 9d. per week.
 - (ii) all fares necessarily incurred in travelling by the most economical means of transport by train or other public conveyance.
- (b) For any other work—
 - (i) An amount equal to the fare, by the most economical means of travel, from and to the "centre" to and from the place of employment.
 - (ii) Where an employee goes direct from his home to a job which is situated more than 12 miles from the "centre" he shall be paid in respect of time lost in travelling, a daily sum of 1s. "Centre" shall mean the Flinders-street Railway Station if the employer's usual place of business is within a radius of 10 miles therefrom, and shall, in all other cases, mean the employer's usual place of business.

The fare shall be deemed to have been necessarily incurred even if the employee uses a bicycle or other means of locomotion, or walks instead of using a public conveyance.

(5) TIME OF BEGINNING AND ENDING WORK.—The time of beginning and ending work shall be—

(6) OVERTIME.—That the following rate shall be paid for all work done—

- (a) Outside the hours fixed in Clause (4)
- (b) Within the hours fixed in Clause (4) in excess of 44

} Time and a half for the first two hours and thereafter double time.

(7) SPECIAL RATES.—

- (a) An allowance, as per Clause 2b, shall be made in addition to the wages set out in Clause 2, as compensation for time lost on prescribed holidays. Such an allowance to be paid proportionately to the number of hours worked per week.
- (b) For all work done on Sundays and prescribed holidays employees shall be paid at the rate of double time.

The following are the prescribed holidays, viz. :—New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays double time shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.

(8) PAYMENT OF WAGES.—(a) Except in the case of persons employed outside a radius of 20 miles from the Flinders-street Railway Station, all payments of wages shall be made not later than five minutes after the time of ceasing work on Thursday. In the event of payment being made more than five minutes later than the time fixed above, the employee shall be paid all reasonable travelling expenses incurred and shall also receive payment at the prescribed rate for the time lost as a result of such delay in payment.

(b) Any employee whose service ends before pay time shall be paid at or before the time of its ending or by post or otherwise within 24 hours thereafter. If wages are not paid in accordance with this provision an employee shall be paid as for ordinary working hours at the ordinary rate fixed in this Determination from the expiration of the said 24 hours until the wages are paid to the employee or his order or posted to his last known address.

(9) PAYMENT WHEN REQUESTED TO ATTEND FOR ENGAGEMENT.—Any employee who has presented himself for work, as requested by the employer or his responsible representative, shall—

- (a) If not engaged, be paid a sum equal to the rate for two hours' work in addition to any expense necessarily incurred in travelling to and from the job; or,
- (b) if engaged, be deemed to have commenced work at the hour he presents himself for engagement.

(10) TRANSPORT AT NIGHT.—Any employee who completes his work during the night after trams and other public conveyances have ceased to run shall, unless provided with means of transport by the employer, be reimbursed for any expense necessarily incurred in reaching his home.

(11) MEAL MONEY.—Any employee who is required to work overtime for more than two hours on any day and who has not been notified on the previous day that he would be required to work such overtime shall, unless provided with a reasonable meal by the employer, be paid an allowance of Two shillings.

(12) HOT WATER IN FACTORIES.—During the months of May to September, inclusive, provision shall be made by employers in every factory for the provision and maintenance of an adequate supply of hot water in some central position for the benefit of employees engaged in hand mixing plaster in cold water.

(13) GRINDING AND CLEANING TOOLS.—When an employee is discharged he shall be allowed a half hour at ordinary rates for the purpose of grinding and cleaning his tools. This clause shall only apply to employees whose tools are in good order when commencing work for any employer.

(14) TERMINATION OF EMPLOYMENT.—Except where the conduct of an employee justifies instant dismissal, one hour's notice of termination of employment shall be given by either employer or employee, or one hour's pay shall be paid or forfeited in lieu thereof.

(15) DRESSING AND DINING ROOM.—A room for employees to use as a dressing and dining room shall be provided at all fibrous plaster mills.

PERIODICAL ADJUSTMENT OF WAGES.

(16) The wages rates set out in clause (2) are based upon the following basic wage and, pursuant to and in accordance with the provisions of section 21 of the *Factories and Shops Act 1934*, the Board hereby determines that such rates shall be automatically increased or decreased by the same amount, and at the same time as such basic wage. Provided that the wages of apprentices and improvers shall be adjusted proportionately to adjustments of the basic wage, such adjustments to be to a 3d., 6d., 9d., or 1s., any fraction of 3d. to be taken to the next higher 3d.

The basic wage shown hereunder shall be adjusted as prescribed in clause (17).

ADJUSTMENT OF BASIC WAGE.

(17) (a) Until the beginning of the first pay period to commence in June, 1939, the amount of the basic wage shall be as prescribed in clause (16).

(b) During each future successive period beginning with the first pay period to commence in a June, a September, a December, or a March, the amount of the basic wage shall be adjusted by the following method according to the position and fluctuations (if any) of the Commonwealth Statistician's "All Items" Retail Price Index Numbers.

For the purposes of this Determination the expression "Commonwealth Statistician's Retail Price Index Numbers" or any like expression means the numbers stated to be such Index Numbers in any document purporting, and not proved to be wrongly so purporting, to be printed by the Commonwealth Government Printer or to be signed by or on behalf of the Commonwealth Statistician.

- (1) The Index Number set to be applied is that assigned to Melbourne.
- (2) The index number for the calendar quarter next preceding the period of thirteen weeks for which the adjustment is made is to be ascertained.
- (3) The amount assigned in the following table (or in any extension thereof) to the Index Number Division comprising that Number is to be ascertained.
- (4) The basic wage shall be of that assigned amount during such successive period.

DETERMINATION OF THE SLATERS AND TILERS BOARD.

NOTE.—This Determination applies to the whole of the State of Victoria.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board appointed to "determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons wheresoever employed in the process, trade, or business of a slater, roof-tiler, ridger, shingler, or cement tiler (other than a tiler laying verandah or flooring tiles)" has made the following Determination, namely:—

(1) That on the 24th February, 1939, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

(3) TIME OF BEGINNING AND ENDING WORK—

8 a.m. 5 p.m. on five days in the week.

8 a.m. 12 noon on the other working day of the week on which the half-holiday is locally observed.

(4) OVERTIME.—All work done outside the hours specified as the times of beginning and ending work, or for any work done within such hours in excess of 44 hours in any week, shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.

(5) ALLOWANCES FOR FARES, TRAVELLING TIME AND COUNTRY WORK.—The following allowances shall be paid:—

(a) For work done within such area as may be reached from Melbourne by tram or electric railway train—

The actual workman's fare from Melbourne to and from the job.

(b) For work done outside the area mentioned in clause (a)—

For all time actually travelling to and from the job 2s. 7½d. per hour shall be paid in addition to fares. Where the job necessitates the employee being away from home for a night, he shall be paid 6s. per day for the first four days of such absence. If he is absent from his home for a longer period than four days an allowance of 25s. per week shall be paid.

(6) SPECIAL RATES.—Double time shall be the rate for all work done on Sunday, New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.

(7) BOOK OR RECORD.—Each employer shall keep a book or record showing the name and occupation of each employee, the place of working, the hours worked, the wages rate or piecework price paid and, in respect of piecework, the number of squares and the number of feet of ridging in the roof.

Such book or record shall be filled in and signed by the employee each week and shall be kept by the employer for a period of twelve months at his place of business. During such period it may be inspected during the ordinary working hours by any official of the Slaters, Tilers and Shinglers' Union of Australia duly authorized in writing by the Secretary of such Union, provided that three days' notice of intention to make such inspection has been given to the employer.

(8) PIECEWORK PRICES.—The lowest piecework prices payable to any person engaged in the following kinds of work shall be:—

Fifty per cent. extra on all above prices shall be paid for all work done on roofs of a pitch of 45° or over; 6d. per square foot extra shall be paid for work done on roofs where double batten is used.

(9) DEFINITION.—Slater's or tiler's measurement is the net square measurement of the roof with 1 square foot extra for every lineal foot of eaves, hips, valleys, gutters, and gables.
