Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE PHOTOGRAPHERS BOARD.

Note.—This Determination applies to the following parts of Victoria, namely:—The Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Act 1928 (No. 3677) and the Order in Council thereunder, and such portion of the City of Sandringham as is not included within the said District: the cities of Ballarat, Bendigo, Geelong, Geelong West, and Warrnambool: the town of Newtown and Chilwell; and the boroughs of Eaglehawk and Sebastopol.

In accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts the Wages Board which since the 20th February, 1940, has had the power to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of taking, making, or doing any other work in the production of photographs, has made the following Determination, namely:—

(1) That on the 8th April, 1940, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

(3) Ordinary Week's Work.—The number of hours which shall constitute an ordinary week's work shall be as set out hereunder :-

> lst November to the last day of February next following ... 1st March to 31st October next following 44 hours. ..

- (4) OVERTIME.—All work done in excess of the number of hours fixed for a week's work shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.
- (5) SPECIAL RATES.—Double time shall be the rate for all work done on Sunday, Christmas Day, Anzac Day, or Good Friday; and time and a half shall be the rate for all work done on New Year's Day, Australia Day, Labour Day, Easter Monday, King's Birthday, or Boxing Day; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rates shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.
- (6) Annual Leave.—Any employee who has been in the service of an employer for a period of not less than twelve months shall be granted one week's holiday, exclusive of the holidays mentioned in clause (5), in each year on full pay, and such holiday shall be given within three months of the completion of twelve months' service, provided that, for the purpose of this clause, any service prior to the 8th April, 1940, shall not be taken into account.
- (7) Time AND WAGES RECORD.—The employer shall keep a time and wages record showing the name of each employee, the number of hours worked each week, and the wages and overtime paid each week.
- (8) PREMITMS OR BONUSES.—No person shall, either directly or indirectly, request or permit any other person to pay or give or shall receive from any other person, any premium, bonus, consideration or payment for employing or teaching or purporting to employ or teach any person subject to this Determination any of the callings to which the Determination applies.
- (9) PIECE-WORK PRICES.—That the lowest piece-work prices payable to any person engaged in the following kinds of work shall

DETERMINATION OF THE BRICK TRADE BOARD.

Note,-(a)-This-Determination-applies-to-the-whole of-the-State-of-Victoria.

(b) On 21st February; 1911, the powers of the Brick Trade Board were extended so that it might fix "the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of sand, lime, or cement brickmaking."

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts the Wages Board appointed to "determine the lowest prices or for rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of brickmaking (including clay-digging)" has made the following Determination, namely:—

(1) That on the 3rd April, 1940, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

(3) Time of Beginning and Ending Work.—For any persons except burners, machine drivers, machine riggers, and pan

(4) Overtime.—(a) Any employee who works for any time in excess of the maximum number of hours per week fixed by this Determination shall be paid for such extra time at the rate of time and a half.

(b) Any employee (other than a burner, machine driver, machine rigger, or pan or crusher attendant) who works outside the hours fixed in clause 3 shall be paid for such time at the rate of time and a half.

(c) All work done by machine drivers, machine riggers, and pan or crusher attendants either before or after the ordinary starting and finishing time of the factory shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half irrespective of the number of hours worked.

- (5) SUNDAYS AND HOLIDAYS.—Time and a half shall be the special rate for all work done on New Year's Day, Australia Day (28th January), Labour Day (21st April), Good Friday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, King's Birthday, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.
 - (6) PAYMENT FOR HOLIDAYS.—All employees shall be granted the holidays mentioned in clause 5 without deduction of pay.
- (7) PAYMENT OF WAGES.—All wages due shall be paid not later than Friday in each week, except where otherwise mutually agreed between employer and employee.
- (8) TERMINATION OF EMPLOYMENT.—Except when the conduct of an employee justifies instant diamissal or the conduct of to I LEMINATION OF EMPLOYMENT.—Except when the conduct of an employee justifies an employee ceasing work without giving notice, seven days' notice of termination of employment shall be given by either employee or employer and any employee or employer failing to give such notice shall be liable to forfeit or pay respectively one week's pay in lieu thereof.

 This clause shall not apply to any employee who is employed for less than three months.

- (9) MORNING TEA INTERVAL.—A morning tea interval of seven minutes shall be allowed employees each morning during ordinary working hours without deduction of pay, such interval shall be arranged by the employer so as to avoid the necessity for a stoppage of operations in the establishment.
 - (10) Assistance for Truckers, .-- Truckers wheeling 75 yards or over shall be supplied with assistance.

PIECE-WORK PRICES WHICH MAY BE FIXED BY AN EMPLOYER.

(12) The Board determines under the provisions of Section 150 of the Factories and Shope Act 1928 that any employer may fix and pay piece-work prices to any person employed in fire-brick making, or as a clayholeman, machine driver, machine rigger, wheeler of green bricks, or trucker, provided that any such employer shall base such piece-work prices on the earnings of au average worker working under like conditions, and such piece-work prices shall be fixed so that an average worker can earn not less than the wages rates that are fixed by the Board for such work.
