ENLARGEMENT OF FIRE DISTRICT.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by the *Fire Brigades Act 1928* it is amongst other things enacted that, on the request of the council of any municipal district outside the metropolitan fire district or any country fire district, and on receiving a certificate from the Metropolitan Fire Brigades Board or the Country Fire Brigades Board (as the case may be) that it is necessary or desirable so to do, the Governor in Council may at any time by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* declare that any such municipal district or any portion thereof shall be added to and form part of such fire district, and that thereupon such municipal district or portion shall for the purposes of the said Act be included in and become part of such fire district: And whereas the council of the municipal district hereinafter mentioned has requested that the portions of such district enclosed within the boundaries set forth hereunder, and not already part of the fire district specified in connexion therewith, be added to and form part

of such fire district: And whereas a certificate has been received from the Country Fire Brigades Board that it is necessary and desirable so to do: Now therefore I, the Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, and in pursuance of the provisions of section 5 (1) of the *Fire Brigades Act 1928*, do hereby declare that the said portions of such municipal district shall be added to and form part of the fire district specified accordingly:—

SOUTHERN FIRE DISTRICT.

Shire of Hampden, Parish of Lismore, County of Hampden: Commencing at the north-eastern angle of Crown allotment 2 of section XVI., Parish of Lismore; thence southerly by the eastern boundary of the last-mentioned allotment, to the northern boundary of the Town of Lismore as proclaimed in the *Government Gazette* of the 25th February, 1861, page 406; thence easterly by the last-mentioned town boundary to the north-eastern angle of the afore-mentioned Town of Lismore; thence southerly by the town boundary and continuing southerly by a line in production thereof to a point on the south boundary of allotment 5 of section XVII.; thence westerly by the last-mentioned boundary, a line, and the south boundary of allotment 2 of section VIII. to the south-western angle of the last-mentioned allotment; thence northerly by allotments 2 and 1 to the south boundary of the Town of Lismore; thence westerly by the boundary last mentioned and northerly by the west boundary of the Town of Lismore and the eastern boundary of allotment 2 of section IV. to a road forming the north boundary of allotment 3 of section IV.; thence easterly by that road to the point of commencement.

## PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by Division 10 of Part I. of the *Land Act* 1928, it is, amongst other things, enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time increase, and, after one month's notice in the *Government Gazette*, diminish, alter, or abolish any common, and may from time to time re-proclaim the whole or any part of any such common for any of the purposes and subject to the provisions of the said Part of the said Act, and that nothing therein contained shall prevent the exercise of the powers conferred by the said Part of the said Act with respect to the leasing or licensing of any land comprised in any common: Now therefore I, the Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, do hereby diminish the under-mentioned common, viz.:—

## BALLAN TOWN COMMON.

By excising therefrom the portions thereof comprised within the boundaries as defined by technical description published in the *Government Gazette* of 15th December, 1943.

## SHIRE OF CHILTERN (CHILTERN WATER SUPPLY DISTRICT).

RATING BY-LAW FOR THE YEAR ENDING 30TH SEPTEMBER, 1944.

THE Chiltern Shire Council, in pursuance and exercise of the powers conferred by the Water Acts, doth hereby make a rate for the supply of water for domestic purposes of Twenty-one pence in the pound of the annual valuation of lands and tenements liable to be rated within the Chiltern Water Supply District.

Provided that in no case shall the amount of rate payable per annum in respect of any tenement (other than land on which there is no building) be less than One pound twelve shillings and six pence, and in respect of land on which there is no building less than Ten shillings.

Such rates are made and shall be levied upon the occupiers or owners of the said lands and tenements for the year ending the 30th September, 1944, and shall be payable on the 25th day of January, 1944, at the office of the said Council, Shire Hall, Chiltern.

The maximum quantity of water to be supplied in any one year, without further charge to any property rated by the Council, is hereby fixed at the quantity which, at a charge of One shilling and nine pence per 1,000 gallons, would produce an amount equal to the amount of the rate levied on such property for the said year.

The charge for water supplied by measure to any property rated by the Council in excess of such maximum quantity, computed as in the last preceding clause, is hereby fixed at One shilling and nine pence per 1,000 gallons.

All water supplied by measure by the Council to be charged for at the rate of One shilling and nine pence per 1,000 gallons.

The charge for water supplied by measure shall be payable on demand, at the office of the Council, Shire Hall, Chiltern.

HOLIDAYS IN CERTAIN TRADES.

UNDER the powers in that behalf conferred by the Factories and Shops Acts, His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, and—

1. On the recommendation of a Wages Board, described as the Shops Board No. 10 (Fish and Poultry), doth hereby make the following Regulation, that is to say:—

The twenty-eighth day of February, 1944, shall, in the Metropolitan District, as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts and the Order in Council made thereunder, and such portions of the City of Sandringham as are not included in the said district; the Cities of Ballarat, Bendigo, Geelong, Geelong West, and Warrnambool, the Town of Newtown and Chilwell, and the Boroughs of Eaglehawk and Sebastopol, be fixed as a holiday for persons wheresoever employed in the business of—

- (a) killing, plucking, dressing poultry or game;
- (b) preparing fish for sale uncooked or for canning, drying, or smoking;
- (c) selling by wholesale or retail (except for consumption on the premises), poultry, game, fish, or oysters;
- (d) marketing (in fish and poultry markets) poultry, game, or fish.

2. On the recommendation of a Wages Board described as the Tinsmiths Board, doth hereby make the following Regulation, that is to say:—

The fourth day of March, 1944, shall, in the Metropolitan District, as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts, be fixed as a holiday for every person employed in the trade or business of manufacturing articles made of tin plate, or other sheet metal, including the japanning of such articles.

3. On the recommendation of a Wages Board, described as the Shops Board No. 2 (Boot Repairers), doth hereby make the following Regulation, that is to say:—

The twenty-eighth day of February, 1944, shall, in the Metropolitan District, as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts, be fixed as a holiday for persons employed in boot repairers' shops.

4. On the recommendation of a Wages Board, described as the Shops Board No. 19 (Confectionery, Pastry, Fruit and Vegetable), doth hereby make the following Regulation, that is to say:—

The eighth day of March, 1944, shall, in the Metropolitan District, as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts, be fixed as a holiday for persons employed in fruit and vegetable shops.

5. On the recommendation of a Wages Board, described as the Brushmakers Board, doth hereby make the following Regulation, that is to say:—

The twenty-sixth day of February, 1944, shall, in the Metropolitan District, as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts, be fixed as a holiday for every person employed in the process, trade, or business of a brush-maker.

6. On the recommendation of a Wages Board, described as the Gas Meter Board, doth hereby make the following Regulation, that is to say:—

The fourth day of March, 1944, shall, in the Metropolitan District, as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts, be fixed as a holiday for every person employed in the process, trade, business, or occupation of making or repairing gas meters.

7. On the recommendation of a Wages Board, described as the Hairdressers Board, doth hereby make the following Regulation, that is to say:—

The fifteenth day of February, 1944, shall, in the Metropolitan and Geelong Districts, as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts, be fixed as a holiday for persons employed in the business of a hairdresser or barber, or other workers of hair, or employed at—

- (a) hair or scalp treatment;
- (b) toilet work.

8. On the recommendation of a Wages Board, described as the Shops Board No. 8 (Dairy Produce and Cooked Meat), doth hereby make the following Regulation, that is to say:—

The twenty-first day of February, 1944, shall, in the Metropolitan District, as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts, be fixed as a holiday for persons employed in dairy produce or cooked meat (other than tinned meat) shops.

11. On the recommendation of a Wages Board, described as the Shops Board No. 3 (Butchers), doth hereby make the following Regulation, that is to say:—

The nineteenth day of January, 1944, shall, in the Metropolitan District, as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts, be fixed as a holiday for persons employed—

- (a) in the process, trade, or business of a butcher or seller of fresh uncooked meat, or maker or seller of small goods;
- (b) delivering fresh uncooked meat or small goods.

12. On the recommendation of a Wages Board, described as the Ice Board, doth hereby make the following Regulation, that is to say:—

The nineteenth day of January, 1944, shall, in the Metropolitan District, as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts, be fixed as a holiday for persons employed in the business of a maker of ice for trade or sale (other than persons employed solely in issuing ice for distribution).

13. On the recommendation of a Wages Board, described as the Ice Cream Board, doth hereby make the following Regulation, that is to say:—

The nineteenth day of January, 1944, shall, in the Metropolitan District, as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts, be fixed as a holiday for persons employed in the trade of making edible ices, ice cream, or any frozen article of which ice cream is the principal ingredient.

14. On the recommendation of a Wages Board, described as the Frozen Goods Board, doth hereby make the following Regulation, that is to say:—

The nineteenth day of January, 1944, shall, in the Metropolitan District, as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts, be fixed as a holiday for persons employed in the trade of freezing, refrigerating, packing, or grading goods of any kind (other than ice cream) for the purpose of trade or sale in a frozen or refrigerated condition but not including—

- (a) persons subject to the Determination of the Ice Board;
- (b) any person or persons engaged in the slaughtering and boning departments of meat works or abattoirs in the preparation and packing of meats, offals, and by-products in a fresh condition.

## SHIRE OF BRAYBROOK.

### BUILDING BY-LAW No. 69.

A By-law of the Shire of Braybrook, made under the provisions of the Local Government Acts and every other power it thereto enabling, and numbered 69, for the purpose of amending By-law No. 48 and By-law No. 62 of the Shire.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the Local Government Acts and every other power it thereunto enabling, the President, Councillors, and Ratepayers of the Shire of Braybrook, with the approval of the Governor in Council, order as follows:—

1. That Part 1 of By-law No. 48 shall be and is hereby repealed, and in lieu thereof the following part is hereby enacted:—

#### Part 1.—Definitions.

In this By-law, unless inconsistent with the context or subject-matter—

“Alteration” includes alteration, addition, or extension; and “to alter” has a corresponding interpretation.

“Approved” means approved by the Surveyor.

“Area,” when applied to a building, means the superficies of the horizontal section thereof made at a point of its greatest surface, inclusive of its external walls, and of such portion of the party walls as belongs to the building.

“Building” includes shed, outhouse, stable, workshop, garage, water-closet, and any other building, whether used for human habitation or not.

“New building” means any building erected or commenced to be erected after the date of this By-law coming into operation.

“Person” means the master builder or other person employed to erect or construct any building or structure, or to demolish, alter, or execute any work on a building or structure already erected, and shall include the owner or occupier of the land upon which any such building or structure is or is intended to be erected or constructed, or the person by whom or for whom, or by whose order, or under whose direction and control such alteration or work was done or is intended to be done.

“Surveyor” means the building surveyor or other officer for the time being authorized to discharge the duties of Building Surveyor for the Municipality.

Words importing the plural shall include the singular, and words importing the singular shall include the plural.

For the purposes of this By-law, buildings shall be divided into the following classes:—

Class “D.”—Outbuildings.

2. That in sub-section (a) of clause 1 of By-law No. 62, for the words “no person shall commence or cause to be commenced the erection of any building” there shall be substituted the words “no person shall commence or cause to be commenced the erection of any new building, erection, or structure, or alter or add to any existing building, erection, or structure.”

3. That sub-section (c) of clause 1 of By-law No. 62 shall be and is hereby repealed, and in lieu thereof the following sub-section is hereby enacted:—

(c) “No person shall hereafter commence, or cause to be commenced, the erection of any new building, erection, or structure, or the alteration or addition of any existing building, erection, or structure, without having first obtained from the Council such written permit for the commencement of the same as aforesaid.”

## DETERMINATION OF THE WICKER AND BABY CARRIAGE BOARD.

NOTE.—This Determination applies to the following parts of Victoria, namely:—The Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts and the Order in Council thereunder; such portions of the city of Sandringham as are not included within the said Metropolitan District; the cities of Ballarat, Bendigo, Geelong, Geelong West, and Warrnambool; the town of Newtown and Chilwell; and the boroughs of Eaglehawk and Sebastopol.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts the Wages Board which now has power to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the trade of—

(a) Manufacturing—

- (i) baby carriages or dolls' carriages, or parts thereof (other than wheels);
- (ii) reed tex, hy-tex, or similar materials;
- (iii) any goods made of wicker, bamboo, cane, reed tex, hy-tex, or similar materials;

(b) Assembling or putting together any parts of baby carriages or dolls' carriages—  
has made the following Determination, namely:—

1. That, on the 28th December, 1943, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

## WEEKLY HOURS.

3. That the number of hours to constitute an ordinary week's work shall be 44 to be worked in five days.

## TIMES OF BEGINNING AND ENDING WORK.

4. That the times of beginning and ending work shall be :—

Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday or Friday .. 7.45 a.m. ..	.. 5.30 p.m.

## OVERTIME.

5. That the following rates shall be payable for overtime :—

(a) Within the times of beginning and ending work prescribed in Clause (4) herein, but in excess of 44 hours in any week .. .. . } Time and a quarter.

(b) Outside the times of beginning and ending work prescribed in Clause (4) herein—

(i) On Saturday until 12 noon .. .. . } time and a quarter.

(ii) On Saturday after 12 noon .. .. . } time and a half.

(iii) On Monday to Friday, between 5.30 p.m. and 7 p.m., or before 7.45 a.m. .. time and a quarter.

(iv) On Monday to Friday, after 7 p.m. .. .. . } time and a half.

Provided that no person shall be employed working overtime at less than 9d. per hour.

## HOLIDAYS.

6. The following days shall be observed as holidays for all weekly wage and piece-work employees :—The days observed as New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Anzac Day, King's Birthday, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day.

All work done on any of the said holidays shall be paid for at ordinary rates in addition to the provisions of the loaded rate.

## SPECIAL RATES FOR SUNDAYS.

7. All work done on Sundays shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

## ANNUAL LEAVE.

8. All weekly wage and piece-work employees shall be entitled to be absent on the ordinary days between Christmas Day and New Year's Day, but should the employers so require, they shall work on such ordinary days and shall be given a full week's leave at some other period of the year after the completion of twelve months continuous service at a time to be arranged by mutual consent between the employer and employees and shall be paid for such period a sum equal to the difference between three days' pay and one week's pay (in addition to the provisions of the loaded rate).

## LOADED RATE IN LIEU OF PAYMENT FOR HOLIDAYS, ANNUAL LEAVE BETWEEN CHRISTMAS AND THE NEW YEAR, AND SIX DAYS' SICK PAY PER YEAR.

9. Each weekly wage employee and piece-work employee shall be credited by the employer with a sum equal to three hours' pay at ordinary rates for each week of 44 hours' service, provided that if any such employee be absent for any cause for more than four days in any quarter of a year (other than days covered by the loaded rate), the employer may reduce the amount to be credited to such employee by an amount pro rata to any time so lost in excess of such four days. The amount standing to the credit of each employee on the last pay day of each quarter of a year shall be paid to such employee upon such pay day, provided that in the first quarter of any year in which Good Friday falls before the last pay day in such quarter payment of the amounts standing to the credit of each employee shall be made to such employee on the pay day preceding Good Friday; provided further that should any employee so desire the amount standing to his or her credit on the last pay day in September of any year may be left so standing until the last pay day in December of such year, when the full amount then standing to such employee's credit shall be paid to such employee.

## PAY DAY.

10. All employees shall be paid weekly on any other day than Saturday.

No employer shall hold more than two days' pay in hand.

Any employee kept waiting for his or her pay on pay day for more than a quarter of an hour after the usual time for ceasing work shall be paid overtime rates after that quarter of an hour and as for a quarter of an hour at least.

## TIME BOOK OR RECORD.

11. (a) Employers shall provide at each shop, factory, or place where work is being carried on, a time book or record which shall contain a correct account of the hours worked and the wages received by each employee. Such time book or record shall be kept correctly entered up in ink and shall be open for inspection by a duly accredited official of the Federated Furnishing Trade Society of Australasia during the usual office hours at the office or other convenient place.

## \* PIECE-WORK PRICES.

12. (a) That the lowest piece-work price payable to any person for wholly or partly preparing or manufacturing any article of the description referred to in the following schedules shall be the price fixed by such schedules in respect of such article.

(b) Where the material is not stated in the schedules the article may be made of willow or cane.

(c) Any piece-worker who works more than 44 hours in any week within the times of beginning and ending work, as set forth in Clause 4 of this Determination, shall be paid for such extra time 7d. per hour in addition to piece-work earnings.

(d) For work done outside the times of beginning and ending work, as set forth in Clause 4 of this Determination, piece-workers shall be paid, in addition to piece-work earnings, as follows :—

Before 7.45 a.m. or between 5.30 p.m. and 7 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, or Friday,  
and on Saturday until 12 noon .. .. . 7d. per hour.

After 12 noon on Saturday or 7 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, or Friday, or before  
7 a.m. on any day .. .. . 3s. 6d. per hour.

(e) Every piece-worker shall complete in their entirety all processes or operations necessary for the production of the article in the manufacture of which he or she is engaged.

PERIODICAL ADJUSTMENT OF WAGES RATES AND PIECE-WORKERS' EARNINGS.

13. The wages rates for males set out in clause 2 (c) are based upon the following basic wage, and pursuant to and in accordance with the provisions of section 21 of the *Factories and Shops Act 1934*, the Board hereby determines that such wages rates and the weekly earnings of piece-workers shall be automatically increased or decreased by the same amount, and at the same time as such basic wage. Provided that the wages of juniors and of females shall be adjusted proportionately to adjustments of the basic wage, such adjustments to be to the nearest 3d., half or less than half of 3d. to be disregarded.

The basic wage shown hereunder shall be adjusted as prescribed in clause 14.

ADJUSTMENT OF BASIC WAGE.

14. (a) Until the beginning of the first pay period to commence in February, 1944, the amount of the basic wage shall be as prescribed in clause 13.

(b) During each future successive period beginning with the first pay period to commence in a February, a May, an August, or a November, the amount of the basic wage shall be adjusted by the following method according to the position and fluctuations (if any) of the Commonwealth Statistician's "All Items" retail price index numbers.

For the purposes of this Determination the expression "Commonwealth Statistician's retail price index numbers" or any like expression means the numbers stated to be such index numbers in any document purporting, and not proved to be wrongly so purporting, to be printed by the Commonwealth Government Printer or to be signed by or on behalf of the Commonwealth Statistician:—

- (1) The index number set to be applied is that assigned to Melbourne.
- (2) The index number for the calendar quarter next preceding the period of or near a quarter for which the adjustment is made is to be ascertained.

## DETERMINATION OF THE SHOPS BOARD No. 18 (MISCELLANEOUS SHOPS).

NOTE.—This Determination applies to the following parts of Victoria, namely:—The Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts and the Order in Council thereunder, and such portions of the city of Sandringham as are not included within the said district; the cities of Ballarat, Bendigo, Geelong, Geelong West, and Warrnambool; the town of Newtown and Chilwell; and the boroughs of Eaglehawk and Sebastopol.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board, which has the power to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person (including an outside salesman) employed in or in connexion with any shop other than shops of the following classes, that is to say:—

- a) A Butcher's shop, a Bookseller's and Newsagent's shop, a Confectionery and Pastry Shop, a Cooked Meat Dealer's shop, a Fish and Oyster shop, a Fruit and Vegetable shop, a Hairdresser's shop, a Tobacconist's shop;
- (b) A Boot Dealer's shop, a Boot Repair shop, a Bread shop, a Chemist's shop, a Dairy Produce Dealer's shop, a Draper's shop, a Dyer's and Clothes Cleaner's shop, a Fuel and Fodder Dealer's shop, a Furniture Dealer's shop, a Grocer's shop, a Haberdasher's shop, a Hardware shop, a Hatter's shop, a Men's Clothing shop, a Mercer's shop, a Milliner's shop, an Underclothing shop, a shop for the sale of petrol, benzine, or other motor spirit, motor oils, or motor car or motor cycle accessories, a shop for the sale of electrical goods or for the sale of wireless (radio) sets, parts, or accessories;

has made the following Determination, namely:—

1. That as from the beginning of the first pay period to commence on or after the 4th January, 1944, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

OVERTIME.

- \*4. The rate of time and a half shall be paid for all time worked by persons employed in—
  - (a) Shops and departments of shops where paints, colour, or wall-paper is sold—
    - (i) Within the times fixed for beginning and ending work—
      - In excess of 3 hours 55 minutes on the usual half-holiday.
      - In excess of 10 hours 25 minutes on the usual late trading night of the night previous to a Public Holiday.
      - In excess of 8 hours 10 minutes on all other working days of the week.
    - (ii) Outside the times of beginning and ending work.
  - (b) Other shops and departments of shops—
    - (i) Within the times fixed for beginning and ending work in excess of 46 hours.
    - (ii) Outside the times of beginning and ending work

\* NOTE.—Section 117 (2) Act 3677 provides that:—Any person may, if notice in writing has previously been sent to the chief inspector, be employed in any shop or at any work in connexion with a shop for any time not exceeding three hours in any one day beyond the ordinary working hours, provided that the total number of days in any one year on which in any shop or at any work in connexion with a shop any such person is so employed shall not exceed twenty-one. Section 105, however, makes it an offence for any employer to detain an employee later than half an hour on a half holiday.

DAY'S WORK TO BE CONTINUOUS.

5. No employee, except in a case where he has been guilty of a misdemeanour, having commenced work, shall be required to take any time off (exclusive of intervals for meals) until he has completed the full number of hours for that day's work.

TIME RATE.

6. Any person employed on time wages for less than the number of hours fixed for an ordinary week's work shall be paid, for time worked up to one-half the number of hours fixed for such ordinary week's work, as follows:—

- (a) In any week in which two or more Public Holidays occur .. . . . At the ordinary wages rate with an addition of fifty per centum.
- (b) In any other week .. . . . At the ordinary wages rate with an addition of thirty-three and one-third per centum.

and for time worked beyond the one-half aforesaid, shall be paid the ordinary wages rate up to but not exceeding ordinary wages rates for an ordinary week's work, together with any overtime rate which is applicable.

SICK PAY.

7. (a) Any employee not attending for duty who has had not less than twelve months' service with the same employer shall not lose his pay for the actual time lost if such employee produces or forwards within 24 hours of the commencement of such absence, evidence satisfactory to the employer that his non-attendance was due to personal ill-health or accident necessitating such absence but such employee shall not be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the grounds of personal ill-health or accident for more than five days in each year.

(b) If the full period of sick leave as prescribed above is not taken in any year such portion as is not taken shall be cumulative from year to year up to a period not exceeding 15 days, which shall be the maximum amount of leave to which an employee may be entitled in any year of service without deduction of pay.

MEAL ALLOWANCE.

8. For each day upon which more than one hour's overtime is worked, each person who works such overtime shall be paid 2s. meal money in addition to the prescribed overtime rate.

## MEAL INTERVALS.

9. All employees shall be allowed the following meal intervals with permission to leave the shop for the whole of such intervals, viz.:—From Monday to Friday, one hour for lunch between noon and 3 p.m. and, in addition, on the usual late shopping night three-quarters of an hour between the hours of 5 p.m. and 7.15 p.m.

## REST INTERVALS.

†10. Any employee who works four hours or longer without a meal interval shall be allowed a rest period of not less than ten minutes after two and a half hours' work. Such rest period shall be counted as time worked.

During such rest period the employee shall be permitted to take morning or afternoon tea as the case may be.

† NOTE.—Section 117 (8) of the *Factories and Shops Act 1928* (No. 3677) provides that no person shall be employed in any shop more than five hours without an interval for a meal.

## CLOTHING ALLOWANCE.

11. Where any employee is required by his employer to wear any special uniform, dress or clothing, of some colour other than black or black and white it shall be supplied, paid for, and, if necessary, laundered by the employer. Provided that, subject to the approval in writing of an official representative of the Shop Assistants and Warehouse Employees' Federation of Australia, an employer may substitute some other colour for black, or black and white, for any employee or section of employees, and under such circumstances the employer shall not be required to supply, launder or pay for such special uniform, dress or clothing.

## NOTICE OF INTENTION TO RATION.

12. Where an employer owing to slackness of trade desires to ration his employees, he shall give at least two clear working days' notice to each employee of his intention to ration such employee.

## ANNUAL HOLIDAYS.

13. (i) For each completed period of twelve months' continuous service, up to five years, with any employer, an employee shall be granted one week's holiday on full pay.

(ii) Any employee who has been in the service of the same employer for a period of five years or more shall be granted two weeks' holiday on full pay for his sixth and each subsequent year of service with that employer.

(iii) The appropriate annual holiday shall become due on the completion of each year of service with the same employer, and shall be given and taken within three months of its becoming due.

(iv) At least seven days' notice shall be given by the employer to the employee before the latter commences annual holidays which shall be exclusive of the holidays mentioned in clause 15.

(v) Any employee who leaves his employment or is dismissed for any cause other than misconduct, after six months' continuous service in any qualifying twelve-monthly period, shall be entitled to appropriate pro rata holiday payment for the period concerned.

## TERMINATION OF EMPLOYMENT.

14. Seven days' notice of termination of employment shall be given by either employer or worker.

## SPECIAL RATES FOR SUNDAYS AND HOLIDAYS.

15. The special rates for all work done on Sundays or the undermentioned Public Holidays shall be—

If, by Act of Parliament or Proclamation, any other day be substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall be payable only for work done on the day so substituted.

## PAYMENT OF WAGES.

16. Payment of all moneys due shall be made not later than Thursday of each week, and during working hours.

## REFERENCE.

17. An employee, on severing his or her connexion with an employer, shall be entitled to and shall receive from such employer a reference in writing, stating his or her period of service and duties performed. This provision shall apply only in the case of an employee who has been employed continuously for three months or more.
