- (b) Every employer within the meaning of this clause shall keep a record book, which shall contain a correct account written in ink as follows:—

- (i) The name and full address of the person to whom material is issued or given out;
 (ii) The number of articles and description of work issued or given out;
 (iii) The time spent in carrying out and the price paid for such work;
 (iv) The record book shall be signed each week by each person to whom material is issued or given out, verifying the accuracy of the amount of wages received.
- (c) The record book mentioned in the preceding sub-clause shall be open for inspection at any time by any authorized officer of the Department of Labour. SUPPLY OF MILE.
- 13. Any person engaged for the greater part of his day's work at cleaning off joints by any method other than filing, shall be supplied free of charge by the employer with one pint of milk each day he is so engaged.

MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

14. (a) Tools.—The employer shall provide for each employee all necessary tools.

- (b) Sanitation, &c.—The employer shall provide proper washing and sanitary conveniences. In any workshop in which employees, through a shop steward, or committee, ask for the provision of lockers, and an undertaking is given that the lockers will be properly cared for, a locker shall be installed by the employer for each workman.
- (c) Protective Apparatus.—Suitable asbestos sheets and coloured glasses shall be provided by the employer for the protection of electric-arc and oxy-acetylene operators and their assistants, and suitable mica or other goggles for emerywheel operators.

DEFINITIONS.

- 15. (a) "Afternoon shift" shall mean any shift finishing after 6 p.m., but not later than midnight.
- (b) "Night shift" shall mean any shift finishing later than midnight, but not later than 8 a.m.
- (c) "Year" means the period between the 1st day of June in each year and the next 31st day of May.

PERIODICAL ADJUSTMENT OF WAGES.

16. The wages rates set out in clause 2 (c) are based upon the following basic wage and, pursuant to the provisions of section 21 of the Factories and Shops Act 1934, the Board hereby determines that such rates shall be automatically increased or decreased by the same amount, and at the same time as such basic wage. The wages of apprentices and improvers shall be adjusted proportionately to adjustments of the basic wage—such adjustments to be to the nearest 3d. half or less than half of 3d. to be disregarded.

The basic wage shown hereunder shall be adjusted as prescribed in clause 17.

Adjustment of Basic Wage.

- 17. (a) Until the beginning of the first pay period to commence in August, 1946, the amount of the basic wage shall be as prescribed in clause 16.
- (b) During each future successive period beginning with the first pay period to commence in an August, a November, a February, or a May, the amount of the basic wage shall be adjusted by the following method according to the position and fluctuation (if any) of the Commonwealth Statisticians' "All Items" retail price index numbers.

For the purposes of this Determination the expression "Commonwealth Statistician's retail price index numbers" or any like expression means the numbers stated to be such index numbers in any document purporting, and not proved to be wrongly so purporting, to be printed by the Commonwealth Government Printer or to be signed by or on behalf of the Commonwealth Statistician:—

(i) The index number set to be applied to a place is that assigned to Melbourne.
(ii) The index number for the calendar quarter next preceding the period of or near a quarter for which the adjustment is made is to be ascertained.
(iii) The amount assigned in the following table (or in any extension thereof) to the index number division comprising that number is to be ascertained.
(iv) The basic wage shall be of that amount assigned during such successive period.
