AREAS OF LANDS COMPRISED IN CERTAIN CLASSES DIMINISHED OR INCREASED.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia,
&c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by the *Land Act 1928* it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may, by Proclamation to be published in the *Government Gazette*, at any time diminish or increase the area of land comprised in any of the classes mentioned in Part I., Division 1, section 5, of the said *Land Act 1928*, but that the area of lands which may be sold by auction (Class 6) shall not be increased except as in certain cases in the said Act provided: Now therefore I, the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, and in accordance with the provisions of sections 94 and 117 of the *Land Act 1928* aforesaid, do hereby diminish or increase (as the case may be) the areas of Crown lands comprised in Classes 3, 4 and 4A respectively of the classes mentioned in section 5 of the *Land Act 1928* aforesaid to the extent set forth in the subjoined Schedule (that is to say):—

PROCLAMATION RESPECTING LONG LINES IN WESTERN PORT BAY.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

I, THE Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, and in pursuance of the provisions of the Fisheries Acts, and all other powers me enabling in that behalf, do by this my Proclamation revoke the Proclamations made the twenty-seventh day of December, 1928, and the eighth day of February, 1937, and published in the *Government Gazette* of the fourth day of January, 1929, and the seventeenth day of February, 1937, respectively, regarding long lines in Western Port Bay, and prohibit in the waters of Western Port Bay within or inside an imaginary line running from Shoreham to the Nobbies and an imaginary line running West-North-West and East-South-East through the flashing southern light of the inner passage situated approximately 1,000 yards, 60 degrees from the head of Newhaven Jetty, or of any river or creek flowing into such bay at any time during the period from the first day of November in each year to the thirty-first day of March next following, inclusive, any person from having in his possession any long line in or upon the said waters or within two hundred yards thereof, or doing any or all of the following things:—

- (a) Using a long line and the method of fishing known as "long lining";
- (b) taking a boat with a long line on board or attached thereto on to any of the said waters; permitting a long line to be on or attached to any boat on such waters; allowing a long line to be in or upon such waters or within two hundred yards thereof;

and further prohibit during the period in any year from the first day of April to the thirty-first day of October (both dates inclusive) any person from having in his possession in or upon the said waters or within two hundred yards thereof a long line or lines having attached thereto a total of more than 1,500 hooks, or doing any or all of the following things:—

- (a) Using a long line or lines with a total of more than 1,500 hooks attached thereto;
- (b) permitting a long line or lines with a total of more than 1,500 hooks attached to be on or attached to any boat on such waters;
- (c) taking a boat having thereon or attached thereto a long line or lines with a total of more than 1,500 hooks attached on to the said waters; or allowing such a boat to be on the said waters.

POLICE REGULATION ACT 1946.

DATE OF OPERATION.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament of the State of Victoria passed in the tenth year of the reign of His Majesty King George VI. intituled the *Police Regulation Act* 1946 it is amongst other things enacted by sub-section (2) of section 1 thereof that, save as otherwise expressly provided, the said Act shall come into operation on a day to be fixed by Proclamation of the Governor in Council and published in the *Government Gazette*:

Now therefore I, the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria in the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, do by this my Proclamation fix the seventeenth day of July, 1946, as the day upon which so much of the *Police Regulation Act* 1946 as is not already in operation shall come into operation.

PUBLIC HIGHWAY.—SHIRE OF TOWONG.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by the *Local Government Act* 1928 (No. 3720), section 518, it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council at any time, and from time to time, upon the request of the Council of any municipality, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, to declare any land reserved, used, or by purchase or exchange acquired for a street, road, highway, thoroughfare, bridge, square, court, alley, or right-of-way to be a public highway, and that such land shall thereupon and thenceforth from the date of such Proclamation become and be absolutely dedicated to the public as a public highway within the meaning of any law then or thereafter in force: And whereas the Council of the Shire of Towong has requested that the land hereinafter mentioned, which has been reserved as a road by the said Council within the said Shire, be so declared to be a public highway: Now therefore I, the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, do by this Proclamation declare the land reserved as a road hereinafter described, and situated within the Shire of Towong aforesaid, to be a public highway within the meaning of the said Act, viz.:—

PUBLIC HIGHWAY.—SHIRE OF TOWONG.

All that piece and parcel of land, being part of Crown allotment 15, section 6, Parish of Wyeebo, County of Benambra, commencing at the south-east corner of the said allotment 15; thence W. 60 links; thence N. 20 deg. 40 min. E. 103.9 links; thence S. 13 deg. 29 min. E. 100 links back to the point of commencement.

RAILWAYS CLASSIFICATION BOARD.

AWARD No. 89, 3RD JULY, 1946.

THE Railways Classification Board, in pursuance of the powers in that behalf conferred by the provisions of the *Railways Act 1928* (No. 3759), hereby determines and awards as follows (that is to say):—

That Award No. 8, as amended to date, be further amended as set out hereunder:—

By inserting after Division 6—Suburban Broken Shifts—the following new Division:—

"Division 6.—Broken Shifts—Other than Suburban.

In the case of broken shifts worked in connexion with traffic, other than suburban, or by employees in Refreshment Rooms, Fruit and Drink Stalls, other than those in the suburban area, but excluding broken shifts worked on a Sunday, the following provisions shall apply:—

- (a) A broken shift shall mean a shift with a continuous book-off period at headquarters, without pay, of more than 2 hours.
- (b) No meal interval on any such broken shift shall exceed 1 hour, but no portion of the continuous book-off period aforesaid shall be treated as a meal interval in computing the length of such period.
- (c) Any officer or employee working a broken shift shall be paid a minimum of a day's pay for such shift."

DECLARATION OF RATES.

Local Government Acts.

MUNICIPAL CLERKS BOARD.

REGULATIONS FOR EXAMINATION FOR CERTIFICATE OF COMPETENCY AS MUNICIPAL CLERK.

PURSUANT to the provisions of the Local Government Acts, the Municipal Clerks Board appointed under the said Acts hereby rescinds all previous Regulations, and in lieu thereof makes the following Regulations governing examinations of such persons as desire to qualify themselves to hold the office of municipal clerk.

1. Examinations shall be conducted in writing, and shall be held in the month of February in each year, at such place or places and at such times as the Board may from time to time determine: Provided that an additional examination may be held in the month of August in any year, if, in the opinion of the Board, such additional examination is warranted. At

least one month's notice of intention to hold an examination shall be advertised in the *Government Gazette* and in at least two Melbourne daily newspapers.

2. The subjects of examination shall be:—

- (a) Local Government Bookkeeping.
- (b) Law, embracing—
 - (i) The Local Government Acts;
 - (ii) All other Acts which confer powers or impose duties on the council of a municipality.

3. Every applicant for permission to present himself for examination shall, not less than 14 days prior to the examination, pay the prescribed fee, and furnish the following:—

- (a) Documentary evidence of having passed the School Intermediate Examination of the University of Melbourne, or such other examination as, in the opinion of the Board, is its equivalent.
- (b) Two recent testimonials relating to conduct and character.
- (c) Evidence of age and place of birth.
- (d) Particulars of experience.

4. The Board may waive the requirements of clause (a) of Regulation 3 hereof, and otherwise satisfy itself as to the standard of education of any applicant who produces evidence—

- (a) that he served with His Majesty's naval, military, or air forces, or the naval, military, or air forces of the Commonwealth of Australia in the war which commenced in September, 1939; or
- (b) that he is over 35 years of age.

5. The Board will grant to any applicant who complies, to its satisfaction, with the provisions of Regulation 3 hereof, permission to present himself at the examination for which application has been made.

6. The Board may exempt from any of the requirements of Regulation 3 hereof any person who had been granted permission to sit for a previous examination of the Board.

7. Every candidate shall be required to present himself for examination in all subjects in which he is required to pass.

8. Any candidate who fails in one subject shall be permitted to present himself for examination in that subject only at any subsequent examination within a period of three years.

9. (a) If the supervisor of the examination considers the conduct of any candidate at the examination to be inconsistent with generally accepted ethical standards, he shall suspend that candidate, and shall report the matter to the Board, which shall take such action as it deems appropriate.

(b) The supervisor shall certify that the examination has been conducted in accordance with these Regulations and any instructions which may be given by the Board.

10. (a) A certificate of competency shall not be issued to any person until he has attained the age of 21 years.

(b) The Board may require any applicant for a certificate to produce further evidence of good conduct and character, and may refuse to grant a certificate of competency to any person if, in its opinion, his general conduct and character do not entitle him to receive such certificate.

(c) No person shall be eligible to receive a certificate of competency unless he is a natural born or naturalized subject of His Majesty.

11. Subject to the provisions of clause 10 hereof, the Board will issue a certificate of competency to any candidate who has passed the prescribed examination.



PRESCRIPTION OF METROPOLITAN MOTOR OMNIBUS ROUTE No. 113A (MAIDSTONE-SEDDON).

HIS Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, and in pursuance of the powers conferred by the Motor Omnibus Act 1928 (No. 3742), doth by this Order prescribe, as set out hereunder, a certain route, i.e., No. 113A, within the metropolitan area, along which motor omnibuses for which "regular service" licences are granted may ply for hire, viz.:—

Description of Route, including Commencing and Terminal Points.—Commencing in Summerhill-road, adjacent to the corner of Ballarat and Summerhill roads, Maidstone, thence via Summerhill-road, Suffolk, Church, Suffolk, Stanley, Essex, Argyle, Barkly, and Ashley streets, Sunshine-road, Tottenham, Currajong-street, Robbs-road, across Geelong-road, Wales-street, Webb-street, Williamstown-road, Charles, Albert and Hobbs streets, to a point adjacent to Seddon Railway Station, returning via Hobbs-street, Pentland-parade, Charles-street, Williamstown-road, Shackell-street, and Wales-street, &c.

Sections on Route.—(1) Ballarat-road to corner of Argyle and Barkly streets; (2) corner of Argyle and Barkly streets, to Tottenham Railway Station, Ashley-street; (3) Tottenham Railway Station, Ashley-street, to corner of Webb-street (or Shackell-street) and Williamstown-road; (4) corner of Webb-street (or Shackell-street) and Williamstown-road, and corner of Albert and Hobbs streets (Seddon Railway Station).

Fares to be Charged.—Any one section, 2d.; each additional section, 1d.; through fare, 5d.

Time-tables to be Observed.—Minimum service, 15 minutes—7 a.m. to 12 midnight, week days; 2 p.m. to 11 p.m., Sundays.

REGULATIONS AMENDING REGULATIONS FOR THE
ELECTION OF COMMISSIONERS.

UNDER the powers conferred by the *Geelong Waterworks and Sewerage Act 1928* (hereinafter termed "the Act") and all other powers enabling him in that behalf, His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, doth hereby make the following Regulations for the election of commissioners for the Geelong Waterworks and Sewerage Trust:—

1. The Regulations for the election of commissioners made the 11th July 1932 and published in the *Government Gazette* No. 115 dated 20th July 1932 at page 1593 shall be and the same are hereby amended as follows:—

(a) for Regulation Eighteen there shall be substituted the following Regulation:—

"18. The returning officer or his deputy shall deliver to every voter who requires the same a ballot-paper, or if such voter appears by the roll to be entitled to give more votes than one then so many ballot-papers not exceeding three as may be equal to the number of votes which such voter so appears to be entitled to give, such ballot-papers being in the form of the Fourth Schedule hereto, and initialled by the returning officer or his deputy and every such voter shall without leaving the booth mark his vote on any or all of such ballot-papers by placing (i) the figure 1 opposite the name of the candidate for whom he votes as his first preference and (ii) the figures 2, 3, 4 (and so on as the case requires) opposite the respective names of all the remaining candidates so as to indicate by such numerical sequence the order of his preference for each such candidate: Provided that at any election where there are only two candidates a ballot-paper shall be deemed to be sufficiently marked if marked so as to indicate the voter's first preference only and in case any voter is unable to read or write the returning officer or his deputy if so required shall in view of such one of the scrutineers as the voter may desire mark such voter's ballot-paper or ballot-papers (as the case may be) in such manner as such voter indicates or shall at the request of such voter permit some other person appointed by such voter to mark such voter's ballot-paper or ballot-papers (as the case may be) for such voter and after the ballot-paper or ballot-papers (as the case may be) have been so marked such ballot-paper or ballot-papers shall forthwith be deposited in the said box: Provided that all ballot-papers to which any person may be entitled at the polling booth shall be demanded and received by him at one and the same time and no person having once demanded and received any such ballot-paper or papers and voted by the same shall at the same election receive any further ballot-papers or exercise any further right of voting. Notwithstanding anything in these Regulations contained as to the time of closing the poll any person entitled to vote who at such time is within any room or booth for taking the poll shall be permitted to vote."

(b) In the Fourth Schedule for the expression beginning "the voter is to strike out" and ending "will be invalid" there shall be substituted the following expression:—

"The voter must not strike out the name of any candidate and must (i) place the figure 1 opposite the name of the candidate for whom the voter wishes to vote as his first preference and then (ii) place opposite the respective names of all the remaining candidates the figures 2, 3, 4 (and so on as the case requires) so as to indicate by such numerical sequence the order of the voter's preference for each such candidate."

(c) In Regulation Nineteen—

- (i) For the title thereto shall be substituted the words
“Ballot-papers to be checked with roll.”
- (ii) For the words “write upon the back of each such ballot-paper as near as practicable to the lower edge thereof the number set opposite to the voter’s name in the roll and shall thereupon upon a copy of such roll” there shall be substituted the words
“upon a copy of the roll.”

(iii) The expression—

“and

“(b) In addition to writing the number upon the back of such ballot-paper, place some special mark thereon so as to enable it to be identified”

shall be repealed.

(d) For Regulation Twenty there shall be substituted the following Regulation:—

“20. A ballot-paper shall be rejected at the close of the poll if it does not indicate the voter’s first preference for one candidate, and, in the case of any election where there are more than two candidates, a vote for each one of the remaining candidates in the order of the voter’s preference; but except as otherwise expressly provided by or under this Regulation a ballot-paper shall not be rejected for any reason other than the reasons enumerated in this paragraph, but shall be given effect to according to the voter’s intention so far as his intention is clear.”

(e) In Regulation Twenty-one—

- (i) Next after Question No. 3 therein shall be inserted the following paragraph:—“No. 4. Are you a natural born or naturalized subject of His Majesty?”
- (ii) For the words “Questions Nos. 1 and 2” in the last paragraph there shall be substituted the words “Questions Nos. 1, 2 and 4.”

(f) For Regulation Twenty-three there shall be read and substituted the following Regulation:—

“23 (1) (a). Immediately upon the close of the poll the returning officer or deputy and the poll clerks (if any) at each polling booth shall in the presence and subject to the inspection of any one scrutineer for each candidate who may choose to be present but of no other person—

- (i) open each ballot-box at such polling booth;
- (ii) arrange the ballot-papers by placing in a separate parcel all those on which a first preference is indicated for the same candidate and (if there are more than two candidates) preference votes are also duly given for all the remaining candidates, omitting ballot-papers which require to be rejected;
- (iii) count all first preference votes given for each candidate respectively;
- (iv) make and keep a record of the number of votes counted from each ballot-box.

(b) Each deputy shall in respect of the polling booth at which he presides—

- (i) certify a list of the number of such first preference votes given for each candidate verified as well by the signature of the deputy and the poll clerks (if any) as by the signatures of such of the scrutineers as are present and consent to sign the same;
- (ii) make out an account verified as aforesaid in which such deputy shall charge himself with the number of ballot-papers originally delivered to him specifying therein the number thereof delivered to and used by voters and the number not so delivered or left unused;

- (iii) make up—
in one parcel the ballot-papers which have been used in voting at the said polling booth during the election;
in another separate parcel the ballot-papers which have remained unused thereat; and
in another separate parcel all copies of voters' rolls and papers used during the polling by the said deputy;
- (iv) seal up the said several parcels and permit any scrutineer who desires so to do to affix his seal to such parcels;
- (v) endorse the said parcels severally with a description of the contents thereof and with the name of the municipality or municipalities to the election of a commissioner or commissioners for which the ballot-papers relate and the name of the polling booth and the date of polling and sign his name to such endorsement; and
- (vi) transmit such list and such account and such sealed parcels to the returning officer.
- (c) The returning officer shall in respect of the polling booth (if any) at which he presides—
- Duties of returning officer at the booth at which he presides.
- (i) make out a list of the number of first preference votes given for each candidate respectively and a like account of the ballot-papers as hereinbefore required in the case of deputies duly verified by the signatures of the returning officer the poll clerks (if any) and such of the scrutineers as are present and consent to sign the same; and
- (ii) seal up in separate parcels in respect of the said polling booth the ballot-papers rolls and papers used by him during the polling and endorse the same in like manner as is hereinbefore required in the case of deputies.
- (d) The returning officer shall as soon as practicable—
- Further general duties of returning officer to ascertain the result of the voting.
- (i) ascertain from the list (if any) made out as aforesaid and the certified lists received from the deputies the number of first preference votes given for each candidate; and
- (ii) add the first preference votes so given for each candidate to the first preference votes given for each candidate by the allowed postal ballot-papers (if any) so as to ascertain the total number of first preference votes given for each candidate respectively.
- (2) At an election where only one commissioner is to be elected and there are only two candidates the result of the poll shall be ascertained as follows:—
- Ascertaining result of poll where only one commissioner to be elected and only two candidates.
- (a) The candidate who has received the greater number of first preference votes (including the casting vote of the returning officer if necessary) shall by the returning officer be declared duly elected as hereinafter provided.
- (b) If the two candidates have received an equal number of votes the returning officer shall in such case have the casting vote.
- Casting vote.
- (3) At an election where only one commissioner is to be elected and there are more than two candidates the result of the poll shall be ascertained as follows:—
- Ascertaining result of poll where only one commissioner to be elected and more than two candidates.
- (a) The candidate who has received the greatest number of first preference votes, if that number constitutes an absolute majority of votes (including the casting vote of the returning officer if necessary) shall by the returning officer be declared duly elected as hereinafter provided.
- Where result ascertained on first count.

Declaration as to defeated candidate and first distribution of preferences.

(b) If no candidate has an absolute majority of votes (including the casting vote of the returning officer if necessary) the returning officer upon receipt of the several sealed parcels from the deputies or other persons so appointed and with the assistance of such officers as he deems necessary and in the presence and subject to the inspection of any one scrutineer (if present) appointed by each candidate but of no other person shall—

- (i) open all the sealed parcels containing used ballot-papers;
- (ii) arrange such ballot-papers together with the allowed postal ballot-papers (if any) by placing in a separate parcel all those on which a first preference is indicated for the same candidate and preference votes are also duly given for all the remaining candidates, omitting ballot-papers which require to be rejected;
- (iii) declare the candidate who has received the fewest first preference votes a defeated candidate;
- (iv) distribute the ballot-papers counted to such defeated candidate amongst the non-defeated candidates next in order of the voters' preference; and
- (v) after such distribution again ascertain the total number of votes given to each non-defeated candidate.

Candidate successful on second count to be declared elected.

(c) The candidate who has then received the greatest number of votes, if such number constitutes an absolute majority of votes (including the casting vote of the returning officer if necessary) shall by the returning officer be declared duly elected as hereinafter provided.

Further declarations and distributions of preferences.

(d) If no candidate then has an absolute majority of votes (including the casting vote of the returning officer if necessary) the process of declaring the candidate who has the fewest votes a defeated candidate and distributing the ballot-papers counted to such defeated candidate amongst the non-defeated candidates next in order of the voter's preference shall be repeated, and the votes shall be recounted after every such redistribution until one candidate has received an absolute majority of votes (including the casting vote of the returning officer if necessary), and such candidate shall by the returning officer be declared duly elected as hereinafter provided.

Provision for equality of votes and casting vote.

(e) If on any count two or more candidates have an equal number of votes and one of them has to be declared a defeated candidate the returning officer shall decide which is to be declared a defeated candidate, and if on the final count two candidates have received an equal number of votes the returning officer shall in such case have the casting vote.

Ascertaining result of poll where two or more commissioners to be elected. First vacancy.

(4) At an election where two or more commissioners are to be elected the result of the poll shall be ascertained as follows:—

(a) The first vacancy shall be filled in the manner provided in the last preceding sub-section for ascertaining the result of the poll where only one commissioner is to be elected and there are more than two candidates:

Provided that, for the purposes of this paragraph, any reference in the last preceding sub-section to a defeated candidate or a non-defeated candidate shall be read and construed as if such reference were a reference to an excluded candidate or a continuing candidate respectively.

(b) The second vacancy shall be filled in the following ^{Second} manner:— ^{vacancy.}

- (i) The returning officer, with the assistance of such officers as he deems necessary and in the presence and subject to the inspection of any one scrutineer (if present) appointed by each candidate but of no other person shall—

rearrange all the ballot-papers, other than the ballot-papers which require to be rejected, under the names of the respective candidates in accordance with the first preference indicated thereon, except that each ballot-paper on which a first preference for the elected candidate is indicated shall be placed in the parcel of the candidate next in order of the voter's preference; and

ascertain the total number of votes given to each continuing candidate;

- (ii) The candidate who has received the greatest number of votes, if such number constitutes an absolute majority of votes (including the casting vote of the returning officer if necessary), shall by the returning officer be declared duly elected as hereinafter provided; ^{Where result ascertained on first count.}

- (iii) If no candidate has an absolute majority of votes (including the casting vote of the returning officer if necessary) the returning officer, with the assistance of such officers as he deems necessary and in the presence and subject to the inspection of any one scrutineer (if present) appointed by each candidate but of no other person, shall— ^{Further declarations and distributions of preferences.}

declare the candidate who has received the fewest votes an excluded candidate;

distribute the ballot-papers counted to such excluded candidate amongst the continuing candidates next in order of the voters' preference; and

after such distribution again ascertain the number of votes given to each continuing candidate;

- (iv) The candidate who has then received the greatest number of votes, if such number constitutes an absolute majority of votes (including the casting vote of the returning officer if necessary), shall by the returning officer be declared duly elected as hereinafter provided; ^{Candidate successful on second count to be declared elected.}

- (v) If no candidate then has an absolute majority of votes (including the casting vote of the returning officer if necessary) the process of declaring the candidate who has the fewest votes an excluded candidate and distributing the ballot-papers counted to such excluded candidate amongst the continuing candidates next in order of the voters' preference shall be repeated, and the votes shall be recounted after every such redistribution until one candidate has received an absolute majority of votes (including the casting vote of the returning officer if necessary) and such candidate shall by the returning officer be declared duly elected as hereinafter provided. ^{Further declarations and distributions of preferences.}

Third and subsequent vacancies.

(c) The third and every subsequent vacancy shall be filled in the manner provided in the last preceding paragraph for filling the second vacancy: Provided that every ballot-paper on which the first preference for any elected candidate is marked shall be placed in the parcel of the continuing candidate next in order of the voter's preference.

Provision for equality of votes and casting vote.

(d) If on any count two or more candidates have an equal number of votes and one of them has to be declared an excluded candidate the returning officer shall decide which is to be declared an excluded candidate, and if on the final count for filling any vacancy two candidates have received an equal number of votes the returning officer shall in such case have the casting vote.

Adjournment of count of votes.

(5) If on the day of the poll the count of the votes by the returning officer cannot be completed he shall adjourn such count and inform the scrutineers and the officers appointed to assist him at such count as regards the time and place when and where such count will be continued and conducted by him.

Further adjournments.

(6) The count of the votes may from time to time be adjourned as the returning officer deems necessary until it has been duly completed; and each adjournment shall be announced by the returning officer to the scrutineers and the officers assisting him.

Before adjournment ballot-papers, &c., to be sealed in ballot-boxes.

(7) Before every adjournment of the count of the votes—

(a) all ballot-papers and other documents connected with such count shall be placed in one or more ballot-boxes; and

(b) the returning officer shall in the presence of such scrutineers and officers as are present seal such ballot-box or boxes; and before recommencing the count the seal on such ballot-box or boxes shall be exhibited unbroken to such of the scrutineers and officers as are present.

Declaration of result of poll.

(8) The returning officer shall as soon as conveniently may be on or after the day of the poll publicly declare the number of first preference votes given for each candidate and (if the case so requires) the details of the distribution of preference votes and the name or names of the candidate or candidates elected and (if more than one candidate is elected) the order in which such candidates were elected; and such candidate or candidates so named shall, subject to the provisions of the Act, be deemed to be then duly elected accordingly, and the returning officer shall forthwith publish in some newspaper generally circulating in the neighbourhood the name or names of the commissioner or commissioners so elected and (if more than one commissioner is elected) the order in which such commissioners were elected.

Interpretation.

(9) In this Regulation:—

'Absolute majority of votes.'

'Absolute majority of votes' means a number of votes greater than one-half of the total number of ballot-papers (excluding ballot-papers which require to be rejected).

'Continuing candidate.'

'Continuing candidate' means a candidate not already elected or excluded from the count."

(g) For Regulations Twenty-nine and Thirty there shall be substituted the following Regulation:—

Application of moneys deposited on nomination.

"29. (1) The moneys paid to the returning officer by for or on behalf of a candidate at the time of the delivery to the returning officer of the nomination paper of such candidate in respect of any election of commissioners shall—

(a) If such candidate is declared elected; or

(b) If such candidate has retired as hereinbefore provided; or.

- (c) (in the case of an election where only one commissioner is to be elected) if the number of first preference votes received by such candidate is not less than one-fifth of the number of first preference votes received by the candidate declared elected; or
- (d) (in the case of an election where two or more commissioners are to be elected) if after distributing to each candidate all preference votes cast in his favour (excluding preference votes numbered higher than the total number of candidates to be elected) the number of preference votes received by such candidate is not less than one-fifth of the average number of preference votes so distributed received by the candidates declared elected—
- be repaid by the returning officer to such candidate and in default of such repayment may be recovered before a court of petty sessions.

(2) Subject to the provisions of the last preceding subsection the returning officer shall apply the said moneys in and towards defraying the necessary reasonable expenses "incident to such election whether incurred before or after such moneys were paid to the returning officer."

And the Honorable Leslie William Galvin, His Majesty's Minister of Water Supply for the State of Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

REGULATIONS.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Marketing of Primary Products Act 1935* (No. 4337), His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof and on the recommendation of the Egg and Egg Pulp Marketing Board, doth hereby amend the Egg and Egg Pulp Marketing Board Regulations 1941 made under the said Act on the 13th May, 1941, as follows (that is to say):—

In Regulation 19, sub-clauses (iii), (iv), and (v) shall be deleted and the following sub-clauses substituted in lieu thereof:—

- "(iii) Payments to producers in respect of eggs delivered to the Board shall be made by cheque signed by the Secretary or other officer authorized by the Board.
- (iv) All accounts paid out of the Manager's Advance Account shall be paid by cheque signed by the Manager, Secretary, or other person authorized by the Board.
- (v) Subject to the provisions of sub-clauses (iii) and (iv) of this Regulation—
- (a) all accounts exceeding Two pounds (£2) due by the Board shall be paid by cheque signed by any one member of the Board and countersigned by the Secretary or Accountant;
- (b) all accounts not exceeding Two pounds (£2) due by the Board may be paid from a petty cash account, the standing balance of which shall not at any time exceed the sum of One hundred and fifty pounds (£150)."

POLICE DISCIPLINE REGULATIONS.

WHEREAS by the Police Regulation Acts it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may make regulations for or with respect to the matters set forth therein: Now therefore His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, and in pursuance of the powers conferred by section eighty-six of the *Police Regulation Act 1928*, as amended by section twenty-three of the *Police Regulation Act 1946*, and all other powers in that behalf him enabling, doth hereby make the Regulations following (that is to say):—

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Police Discipline Regulations, and shall come into operation on the seventeenth day of July, 1946.

2. The Police Magistrate nominated by the Governor in Council to act on the Police Discipline Board shall be nominated for a period of three years, and shall be eligible for re-nomination.

3. Should such Police Magistrate cease so to act for any cause whatsoever the Governor in Council may nominate another Police Magistrate to act for the remainder of the term for which the former Police Magistrate was nominated.

4. The Superintendent nominated by the Chief Commissioner to act on the said Board shall be nominated for a period of three years, and shall be eligible for re-nomination.

5. Should such Superintendent cease so to act for any cause whatsoever the Chief Commissioner may nominate another Superintendent to act for the remainder of the term for which the former Superintendent was nominated. Where a member of the Force, who is stationed in a district under the control of the Superintendent nominated to such Board is charged with a breach of duty or any misconduct which is dealt with by the Board, the Chief Commissioner shall nominate some other Superintendent to act on the Board to hear such charge.

6. Where any member of the Force is charged with breach of duty or any misconduct he shall also be served with a notice in the form contained in the First Schedule hereto, or to the like effect, requiring him to plead to such charge within seven days from the date of service of such notice upon him, and also to state whether though denying the truth of the charge he desires to have the charge dealt with by the Chief Commissioner, and not by the Police Discipline Board. If no reply is received within the time stated the member shall be regarded as having denied the truth of the charge.

7. The charge to be dealt with by the Police Discipline Board shall be forwarded to the Police Discipline Board, which will appoint a date and place for the hearing of such charge.

8. At least seven days before the date appointed for the hearing of the charge the Secretary shall forward notice, in writing, thereof to the Chief Commissioner and to the member charged.

9. The most convenient place shall be selected for the hearing of the charge, but generally the place selected should be in the District in which the member of the Force is stationed.

10. The room or place in which a charge against a member of the Force is investigated shall not be, or be deemed to be an open Court, and the Chairman shall have a discretion as to the persons to be admitted during the hearing. The Police Discipline Board may at any time direct that an inquiry shall be open to the public.

11. Where a member of the Force is charged with a breach of duty or any misconduct he may be assisted in his defence at the inquiry by another member of the Force hereinafter described as "friend," and thus avoid the expense of engaging counsel.

12. Such member of the Force, and also his "friend" shall conduct the defence with strict observance of the deference and respect which are required of them by the Police Regulations in their intercourse with a superior officer.

13. Such member, at his own expense, may be represented by counsel at the inquiry by the Police Discipline Board.

14. Before taking evidence in any case the chairman shall cause the charge to be read, and call upon the member of the Force to plead to such charge, and cause him to write his plea in the column provided in the charge sheet, and also sign his name in the same column.

15. The Police Discipline Board shall have the same power to amend charges as that possessed by a Court of Petty Sessions in regard to informations for an offence.

16. Where a charge is amended by the Police Discipline Board, the member of the Force charged shall be furnished with a copy of such amended charge, if he applies for it, and sufficient time shall be allowed him to prepare his defence to the charge as amended. For this purpose the hearing shall be adjourned, if necessary.

17. The Police Discipline Board shall, when inquiring as to the truth of any such charges, inquire as to the truth of the same without regard to legal forms and solemnities, and shall be directed by the best evidence procurable, whether the same is such evidence as the law requires or admits in other cases or not, and it shall be lawful for the Police Discipline Board to receive or reject as it deems fit any evidence that may be tendered.

18. The Police Discipline Board shall cause all evidence at an inquiry to be taken down in writing in the form of depositions or question and answer. At the conclusion of a witness's evidence, if it has been taken down in longhand, it shall be read over to him and signed by him, but if such evidence has been taken down in shorthand it need not be read over to him unless he signifies his desire that it be done, but he shall sign his name on the last page of the shorthand notes of his evidence. The Police Discipline Board shall cause a jurat to be added and signed by the Police Magistrate.

19. Where a member of the Force is charged with a breach of duty or any misconduct he may cross-examine witnesses brought against him, and may give evidence on his own behalf, in which case his attention shall, prior to his giving such testimony, be drawn to section 431 of the *Crimes Act 1928*, and he shall be asked if he still desires to give evidence.

20. An accused member of the Force giving evidence on his own behalf may be asked any question in cross-examination, notwithstanding that it would tend to incriminate him as to the offence charged, but shall not be required to answer any question tending to show that he has committed, or has been convicted of, or been charged with, any offence other than that with which he is then charged, or is of bad character, unless (a) he has personally or by his counsel or "friend" asked questions of the witnesses for the prosecution with a view to establishing his own good character, or has given evidence of his good character, or the nature or conduct of the defence is such as to involve imputations on the character of the prosecutor or the witnesses for the prosecution; or (b) he has given evidence against any other person charged with the same offence.

21. If a member of the Force desires to make a statement on his own behalf in answer to a charge brought against him, he shall be permitted to do so, and such statement shall be taken down in writing and signed by the defendant.

22. Any member of the Force may call evidence as to character; but, if he elects to do so, the prosecutor may, in reply to such witnesses, produce evidence of former convictions and unfavourable entries on the record sheet of the accused.

23. Except as provided in the last preceding clause, the record sheet of the member of the Force who is charged with a breach of duty, or any misconduct, shall not be produced for the inspection of the Police Discipline Board until after it is satisfied as to the truth of the charge.

24. If a member of the Force who is charged with a breach of duty, or any misconduct, supplies to the Officer in Charge of the District the names and addresses of witnesses whom he desires to call to give evidence on his behalf, reasonable steps shall be taken by the said Officer in Charge to procure the attendance of such witnesses.

25. The prosecuting officer at any inquiry by the Police Discipline Board as to the truth of any charge shall assist the Board to reach just conclusions, and for that purpose may examine and cross-examine all witnesses to elicit and place before the Board all facts connected with the charge, whether in favour of or against the member of the Force against whom the charge has been laid.

26. The fees and expenses payable to witnesses shall be those that apply in Courts of Petty Sessions.

27. The Chief Commissioner or the Superintendent, Inspector or Sub-Inspector nominated by the Chief Commissioner, pursuant to sub-section (2) of section sixty-one of the *Police Regulation Act 1928*, as re-enacted by section twenty-two of the *Police Regulation Act 1946* to hear charges, shall follow as nearly as possible the procedure hereinafter provided to be followed by the Police Discipline Board.

28. No officer shall be so nominated if such officer—

- (a) is the prosecutor or a witness for the prosecution;
or
- (b) investigated the charges before the holding of the inquiry; or
- (c) prepared the brief of the case for the prosecution;
or
- (d) has perused or dealt with the file relating to the charges; or
- (e) has a personal interest in the case.

29. Notice of appeal, under section sixty-four of the *Police Regulation Act 1928*, as re-enacted by section twenty-two of the *Police Regulation Act 1946*, shall be given in the form contained in the Second Schedule hereto, or to the like effect.

30. When costs are awarded to or against an appellant they shall be those that apply in County Courts.

REGULATIONS.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Discharged Servicemen's Preference Act 1943*, the *Acts Interpretation Act 1928*, and all other powers thereto enabling, His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby make the following Regulations, that is to say:—

1. Regulation 2 of the *Discharged Servicemen's Preference Regulations*, made on the 28th day of February, 1944, as amended by a Regulation made on the 10th day of April, 1945, is revoked, and the following Regulation inserted in its stead:—

2. For the purposes of the *Discharged Servicemen's Preference Act 1943* a "Theatre of War" shall be deemed to mean—

(a) in the case of a person who was appointed, enlisted, enrolled, or called up for continuous full-time service in the naval, military, or air forces of the Commonwealth, or any of the women's services, or bodies auxiliary to any of those forces, and who has completed his war service—

1. (a) in respect of the war which commenced in the year One thousand nine hundred and fourteen any area beyond the limits of the Commonwealth; or

(b) in respect of the war which commenced in the year One thousand nine hundred and thirty-nine—

(1) any area beyond the limits of the Commonwealth between 3rd September, 1939, and 2nd September, 1945 (both days inclusive);

(2) any area in the Northern Territory of the Commonwealth north of parallel 14° 50' south between 19th February, 1942, and 1st March, 1945 (both days inclusive).

(b) In the case of a person who was appointed, enlisted, or enrolled for continuous full-time service in the naval, military, or air forces of His Majesty in Great Britain or any of His Majesty's Dominions other than the Commonwealth, or any of the women's services or bodies auxiliary to any of those forces and who has completed his war service—

1. in respect of the war which commenced in the year One thousand nine hundred and fourteen—any area beyond the limits of Great Britain if he was so appointed, enlisted, or enrolled in Great Britain, or any area beyond the limits of the Dominion of His Majesty in which he was so appointed, enlisted, or enrolled; or

2. in respect of the war which commenced in the year One thousand nine hundred and thirty-nine—any area beyond the limits of Great Britain if he was so appointed, enlisted, or enrolled in Great Britain, or any area beyond the limits of the Dominion of His Majesty in which he was so appointed, enlisted, or enrolled, between the 3rd September, 1939, and 2nd September, 1945 (both days inclusive).

And the Honorable John Cain, His Majesty's Premier for the State of Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

REGULATIONS TO PROVIDE FOR PREFERENTIAL VOTING AT THE ELECTION OF COMMISSIONERS.

WHEREAS by the *Mildura Irrigation and Water Trusts Act 1928* it is enacted that the Governor in Council may, subject to the provisions of the said Act, from time to time make Regulations for the purposes following:—

- (a) For determining the period or different periods, not exceeding three years, for which Commissioners of any Trust, including Commissioners for Urban districts, shall hold office, the time of their election and the order of their retirement from office.
- (b) For determining the manner, in which elections of Commissioners shall be held, and in which lists or rolls of voters thereat shall be prepared, and the mode of voting thereat, and the time, mode, place, and all other matters connected with the nomination of Commissioners.
- (c) For determining the mode of appointment or election of returning officers and their deputies, and their powers and duties.
- (d) For determining the manner in which any vacancies in the office of any such Commissioners shall be filled up.
- (e) For determining questions as to the due election of any such Commissioner.
- (f) For prescribing any other matters necessary for giving effect to the said Act.

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, acting by and with the advice of the Executive Council, and in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act, doth, so far as regards the First Mildura Irrigation Trust under the said Act, make the Regulations following, viz.:—

1. The Regulations made on the fourth day of August, 1941, providing for the election of Commissioners of the said Trust (which Regulations are hereinafter referred to as the "principal Regulations") shall be amended in manner following:—

2. (a) For sub-paragraph 2 of paragraph 22 of the principal Regulations there shall be substituted the following sub-paragraph:—

2. (a) Every ballot-paper delivered as aforesaid shall be initiated by the Returning Officer or his deputies.

(b) Every voter shall without leaving the booth mark his vote on any or all of such ballot-papers by placing—

- (i) the figure 1 opposite the name of the candidate for whom he votes as his first preference; and
- (ii) the figures 2, 3, 4 (and so on as the case requires), opposite the respective names of all the remaining candidates so as to indicate by such numerical sequence the order of his preference for each such candidate:

Provided that at any election where there are only two candidates a ballot-paper shall be deemed to be sufficiently marked if marked so as to indicate the voter's first preference only.

(c) A ballot-paper shall be rejected at the close of the poll if it does not indicate the voter's first preference for one candidate, and, in the case of any election where there are more than two candidates, a vote for each one of the remaining candidates in the order of the voter's preference; but except as otherwise expressly provided by the Act or under the principal Regulations a ballot-paper shall not be rejected for any reason other than the reasons enumerated in this paragraph, but shall be given effect according to the voter's intention so far as his intention is clear.

(b) In sub-paragraph 3 of the said paragraph 22 for the words "strike out the name or names of such candidate or candidates as such voter may designate" there shall be substituted the words "mark such voter's ballot-paper or ballot-papers (as the case may be) in such manner as such voter indicates"; and

(c) in sub-paragraph (4) of the said paragraph 22 for the expression "after such name or names have been so struck out the ballot-paper or ballot-papers (as the case may be)" there shall be substituted the expression "after the ballot-paper or ballot-papers (as the case may be) have been so marked such ballot-paper or ballot-papers."

3. In the Fourth Schedule to the principal Regulations for the expression beginning "The voter is to strike out" and ending "will be invalid" there shall be substituted the following expression:—

"The voter must not strike out the name of any candidate.

The voter must place the figure 1 opposite the name of the candidate for whom the voter wishes to vote as his first preference.

The voter must then place opposite the respective names of all the remaining candidates the figures 2, 3, 4 (and so on as the case requires) so as to indicate by such numerical sequence the order of the voter's preference for each such candidate."

4. For paragraph 27 of the principal Regulations there shall be substituted the following paragraph:—

1. (a) Immediately upon the close of the poll the returning officer shall in the presence and subject to the inspection of such of the scrutineers as choose to be present, but of no other person—

- (i) open each ballot-box;
- (ii) arrange the ballot-papers by placing in a separate parcel all those on which a first preference is indicated for the same candidate and (if there are more than two candidates) preference votes are also duly given for all the remaining candidates, omitting ballot-papers which require to be rejected;
- (iii) count all first preference votes given for each candidate respectively;
- (iv) make and keep a record of the number of votes counted from each ballot-box; and
- (v) abstain himself from inspecting the writing upon the back of the ballot-papers and take care that the same is not seen by any person.

(b) The returning officer shall—

- (i) make out a list of the number of first preference votes given for each candidate respectively, duly verified by the signatures of the returning officer and such of the scrutineers as are present and consent to sign the same; and
- (c) The returning officer shall as soon as practicable—

(i) ascertain from the list made out by him as aforesaid the number of first preference votes given for each candidate; and

- (ii) add the first preference votes so given for each candidate to the first preference votes given for each candidate by the allowed postal ballot-papers (if any) so as to ascertain the total number of first preference votes given for each candidate respectively.

2. At an election where only one Commissioner is to be elected and there are only two candidates the result of the poll shall be ascertained as follows:—

- (a) The candidate who has received the greater number of first preference votes (including the casting vote of the returning officer if necessary) shall by the returning officer be declared duly elected as hereinafter provided.
- (b) If the two candidates have received an equal number of votes the returning officer shall in such case have the casting vote.

3. At an election where only one Commissioner is to be elected and there are more than two candidates the result of the poll shall be ascertained as follows:—

- (a) The candidate who has received the greatest number of first preference votes, if that number constitutes an absolute majority of votes (including the casting vote of the returning officer if necessary), shall by the returning officer be declared duly elected as hereinafter provided.
- (b) If no candidate has an absolute majority of votes (including the casting vote of the returning officer if necessary) the returning officer, with the assistance of such officers as he deems necessary and in the presence and subject to the inspection of any one scrutineer (if present) appointed by each candidate, but of no other person shall—

- (i) open all the sealed parcels containing used ballot-papers;
- (ii) arrange such ballot-papers together with the postal ballot-papers (if any) by placing in a separate parcel all those on which a first preference is indicated for the same candidate, and preference votes are also duly given for all the remaining candidates, omitting ballot-papers which require to be rejected;
- (iii) declare the candidate who has received the fewest first preference votes a defeated candidate;

- (iv) distribute the ballot-papers counted to such defeated candidate amongst the non-defeated candidates next in order of the voter's preference; and
 - (v) after such distribution again ascertain the total number of votes given to each non-defeated candidate.
- (c) The candidate who has then received the greatest number of votes, if such a number constitutes an absolute majority of votes (including the casting vote of the returning officer if necessary), shall, by the returning officer, be declared duly elected as hereinafter provided.
- (d) If no candidate then has an absolute majority of votes (including the casting vote of the returning officer if necessary) the process of declaring the candidate who has the fewest votes a defeated candidate and distributing the ballot-papers counted to such defeated candidate amongst non-defeated candidates next in order of the voters' preference shall be repeated, and the votes shall be recounted after every such redistribution until one candidate has received an absolute majority of votes (including the casting vote of the returning officer if necessary), and such candidate shall by the returning officer be declared duly elected as hereinafter provided.
- (e) If on any count two or more candidates have an equal number of votes and one of them has to be declared a defeated candidate the returning officer shall decide which is to be declared a defeated candidate, and if on the final count two candidates have received an equal number of votes the returning officer shall in such case have the casting vote.
4. At an election where two or more Commissioners are to be elected the result of the poll shall be ascertained as follows:—
- (a) The first vacancy shall be filled in the manner provided in the last preceding sub-paragraph for ascertaining the result of the poll where only one Commissioner is to be elected and there are more than two candidates.
- Provided that, for the purposes of this paragraph, any reference in the last preceding sub-paragraph to a defeated candidate or a non-defeated candidate shall be read and construed as if such reference were a reference to an excluded candidate or a continuing candidate respectively.
- (b) The second vacancy shall be filled in the following manner:—
- (i) The returning officer, with the assistance of such officers as he deems necessary and in the presence and subject to the inspection of any one scrutineer (if present) appointed by each candidate but of no other person, shall re-arrange all the ballot-papers, other than the ballot-papers which require to be rejected, under the names of the respective candidates in accordance with the first preference indicated thereon, except that each ballot-paper on which a first preference for the elected candidate is indicated shall be placed in the parcel of the candidate next in order of the voter's preference; and ascertain the total number of votes given to each continuing candidate;
 - (ii) the candidate who has received the greatest number of votes, if such number constitutes an absolute majority of votes (including the casting vote of the returning officer if necessary), shall by the returning officer be declared duly elected as hereinafter provided;
 - (iii) if no candidate has an absolute majority of votes (including the casting vote of the returning officer if necessary) the returning officer, with the assistance of such officers as he deems necessary and in the presence and subject to the inspection of any one scrutineer (if present) appointed by each candidate, but of no other person, shall—
 - declare the candidate who has received the fewest votes an excluded candidate;
 - distribute the ballot-papers counted to such excluded candidate amongst the continuing candidates next in order of the voters' preference; and
 - after such distribution again ascertain the number of votes given to each continuing candidate;
 - (iv) the candidate who has then received the greatest number of votes, if such number constitutes an absolute majority of votes (including the casting vote of the returning officer if necessary), shall by the returning officer be declared duly elected as hereinafter provided;
 - (v) If no candidate then has an absolute majority of votes (including the casting vote of the returning officer if necessary) the process of declaring the candidate who has the fewest votes an excluded candidate and distributing the ballot-papers counted to such excluded candidate amongst the continuing candidates next in order of the voters' preference shall be repeated, and the votes shall be recounted after every such redistribution until one candidate has received an absolute majority of votes (including the casting vote of the returning officer if necessary), and such candidate shall by the returning officer be declared duly elected as hereinafter provided.
- (c) The third and every subsequent vacancy shall be filled in the manner hereinafter provided for filling the second vacancy: Provided that every ballot-paper on which the first preference for any elected candidate is marked shall be placed in the parcel of the continuing candidate next in order of the voter's preference.
- (d) If on any account two or more candidates have an equal number of votes and one of them has to be declared an excluded candidate the returning officer shall decide which is to be declared an excluded candidate, and if on the final count for filling any vacancy two candidates have received an equal number of votes the returning officer shall in such case have the casting vote.
- (e) If on the day of the poll the count of the votes by the returning officer cannot be completed he shall adjourn such count and inform the scrutineers and the officers appointed to assist him at such count as regards the time and place when and where such count will be continued and conducted by him.
- (f) The count of the votes may from time to time be adjourned as the returning officer deems necessary until it has been duly completed, and each adjournment shall be announced by the returning officer to the scrutineers and the officers assisting him.
- (g) Before every adjournment of the count of the votes—
- (a) all ballot-papers and other documents connected with such count shall be placed in one or more ballot-boxes; and
 - (b) the returning officer shall in the presence of such scrutineers and officers as are present seal such ballot-box or boxes, and before recommencing the count the seal on such ballot-box or boxes shall be exhibited unbroken to such of the scrutineers and officers as are present.
- (h) The returning officer shall as soon as conveniently, may be on or after the day of the poll, publicly declare the number of first preference votes given for each candidate and (if the case so requires) the details of the distribution of preference votes and the name or names of the candidate or candidates elected and (if more than one candidate is elected), the order in which such candidates were elected; and such candidate or candidates so named shall, subject to the provisions of the Act and of the principal Regulations, and these Regulations be deemed to be then duly elected accordingly.
- (i) In this paragraph—
- "Absolute majority of votes" means a number of votes greater than one-half of the total number of ballot-papers (excluding ballot-papers which require to be rejected).
 - "Continuing candidate" means a candidate not already elected or excluded from the count.
5. In sub-paragraph (2) of paragraph 40 of the principal Regulations for the expression "write on the ballot-paper the surnames of the candidates for whom he votes" there shall be substituted the expression "write on the ballot-paper the surnames of all the candidates and indicate the order of his preference by placing the figures 1, 2, 3, 4, and so on opposite the candidates' name. Provided that where there are only two candidates a ballot-paper shall be deemed to be sufficiently marked if marked so as to indicate the voter's first preference only."

6. In the Sixth Schedule to the principal Regulations, under the heading "Instructions to Voter," for the expression "write the surnames of the candidates for whom he votes" there shall be substituted the expression "write the surnames of the candidates on the ballot-paper and place the figure 1 opposite the name of the candidate for whom he wishes to vote as his first preference and the figures 2, 3, 4 (and so on as the case requires) to indicate the order of the voter's preference for all the remaining candidates."

7. Paragraph 24 of the principal Regulations is hereby repealed.

For every pig	0	9

3. In the event of a butcher keeping the carcasses of animals slaughtered at the abattoirs in the chilling chambers for any period longer than 100 hours, it shall be within the powers of the Superintendent or other officer to demand and receive payment in advance for the second or any subsequent period of 100 hours, or part thereof, at the same rate or rates specified in clause 2 of this By-law.

4. In the event of a butcher failing to pay the dues for the use of the chilling chambers, the Superintendent may, at the expiration of the second period of 100 hours, call upon such butcher to remove forthwith such carcasses, and, in the event of the butcher failing to remove such carcass or carcasses within 24 hours of the delivery of the notice signed by the Superintendent, the Superintendent or the employees under his direction may remove such carcasses and place same in one of the other buildings at the abattoirs.

5. The removal of such carcasses shall not absolve the butcher from any liability for payment of the dues for use of the chilling chambers.

6. No person shall operate, attempt to operate, or interfere with the machinery or plant provided for the chilling chambers other than the shift attendants employed by the Council.
