## DETERMINATION OF ENTERTAINMENT EMPLOYEES (PERFORMERS) BOARD.

NOTE.—This Determination applies to the whole of the State of Victoria.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Act, the Wages Board appointed to “determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons (other than persons subject to the jurisdiction of any Wages Board heretofore appointed) engaged as performers in radio or other entertainments conducted for private gain has made the following determination, namely:—

1. That as from the beginning of the first pay period to commence on or after the 5th July, 1946, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

### PART I.—Theatrical Entertainments.

#### RATES OF PAY.

2. The minimum rates of pay to be paid by an employer to an employee for work, inclusive of work in or incidental to either performances or rehearsals or both shall subject to reduction under clause 12 of this Determination be as set out hereunder.

(c) Children under 14 years of age who are engaged in pantomime who do not appear in the night performances shall be paid £1 per week and shall perform one rehearsal on the stage before commencement of production without payment. The material for the wardrobe for these children will be supplied by the employers; if the employer makes the costume it shall remain the employer's property but otherwise it shall be the property of the child.

(vii) A member of the ballet or chorus who acts as deputy ballet or chorus master or mistress or who, under the instructions and supervision of the producer or stage manager supervises the numbers or acts to be performed by the ballet or chorus during a performance shall be paid not less than 16s. per week in addition to the per week rate.

(viii) If an employee is required by his or her employer to act as understudy he or she shall be paid an additional 5s. per week for each part understudied as required except that in cases where the part or one of the parts understudied is that of the leading actor or comedian or leading actress or comedienne 10s. per week shall be paid for that part instead of or in addition to the 5s. as the case may be.

(ix) A person who is attending rehearsals at the direction of an employer for a future production and who is not at that time employed in any current production by that employer shall for the period between the first date upon which such person is directed to attend for rehearsal and the commencement of the production be paid one half of the rates mentioned in sub-clause (a) (i), (ii), (iii), (iv) and (vi) (plus the full on tour allowance where applicable) for any week in which the number of hours worked at such rehearsals does not exceed 24 and full rates for any week in which such number of hours is 24 or more but if such period exceeds four weeks full rates shall be paid for each week in excess of four.

For any number of performances above one on any one day for the same employer a further quarter of the above rates shall be paid for the second performance and full rate for each performance above two. If the employee be engaged by more than one employer on any one day the above full rates shall be paid by each employer. Performances at different places on the same day for the same employer shall not be deemed to be employment by different persons.

(b) An employee who lives in and is under casual engagement to perform any work at any place outside the metropolitan area shall have first class rail or other transport provided by the employer and if required to travel at night shall be provided with a sleeping compartment in the case of rail travel. Should the employer not provide such sleeping compartment the employer shall pay to the employee the sum usually charged to the employer by the railway authorities therefor.

The employer shall provide reasonable accommodation at a hotel or boarding house for any such casual employee who is obliged to remain and lodge overnight at any place other than his usual place of abode and in default thereof shall pay such employee the sum of 12s. 6d.

Should the total time of the outward and return journey of a casual employee travelling to and from employment outside the metropolitan area exceed twenty-four hours such employee shall be paid one half of the abovementioned rates for each period of twenty-four hours or part thereof in such excess in addition to the provision of lodging.

(c) Employees engaged by the week while on tour shall be paid their weekly wages from the time the employees leave the place of engagement until they return to that place at the end of the tour, broken weeks at the beginning or end of the tour to be paid for *pro rata*, and the days of departure and return other than Sundays to be each counted as one day worked;

Provided that such employees whilst travelling on ship, if the employer provide passage, including bed and board, shall in respect only of each complete calendar day of such travelling be entitled only to one-twelfth of their weekly wage.

(d) Notwithstanding any contract or arrangement no employee engaged by the week shall be paid or receive from his employer in respect of the whole period of his employment an aggregate of payments and allowances less than the aggregate of the minimum payments and allowances for ordinary work, overtime work, extra performances, and travelling fares and expenses payable to or receivable by an employee under this Determination in respect of similar employment in the absence of any such contract or arrangement.

SPECIAL ATTENDANCES.

3. If for the purpose of wardrobe, photography, or any other matter connected with an employer's business, he requires an employee to attend at any place before the commencement of his period of employment, he shall pay the employee for the time of such attendance *pro rata* at the minimum rate prescribed for the employee by clause 2 of this Determination with a minimum payment as for three hours.

This time of any such attendance during the period of employment shall be counted as time worked.

WAGES WHEN PAID.

4. Wages shall be paid to an employee without any deduction (other than advances on account of wages, fines or tax or other deductions which the employer is bound by law to deduct) not later than 10 p.m. on the Friday of each week, except in the case of a broken week, when payment shall be made not later than the same hour on the night of the last performance: Provided that should any employee be short paid or over paid in any week, in the case of short payment he shall receive the amount short paid on the following pay day or as soon thereafter as possible, and in the case of over payment, the amount over paid shall be deducted from the employee's wage on the following pay day or as soon thereafter as possible: Provided further that this clause shall not affect sub-clause (f) of clause 5 and clauses 7 and 17 of this Determination.

ENGAGEMENT.

5. (a) In the case of employees not engaged for a tour and not paid the rates for those casually engaged, the employment shall be terminated on either side only by a week's notice, either given in writing or plainly posted up on the call board or other place seen by the employees in the ordinary course of their employment, which notice may be given at any time during the week, and the employee shall only be entitled to payment *pro rata* for the time up to the expiration of the notice.

(b) In the case of an employee engaged for a tour the employment shall continue until the employee is returned to the place of engagement, but may, in the absence of any agreement to the contrary, be then terminated without notice. Should the employee leave the employer's employ during the course of the tour such employee shall be responsible for his own return fare unless such leaving be justified by and directly attributable to a breach of this Determination by the employer with respect to such employee during the employment, in which case the fare shall be payable by the employer.

(c) If any work is done by an employee for the employer after the time of the expiration of the notice under sub-clause (a) hereof or after the termination of a touring engagement under sub-clause (b) hereof otherwise than in pursuance of a separate weekly or touring engagement, it shall be paid for at casual rates.

(d) Employees, to become entitled to be treated as being engaged by the week must perform such work as the employer shall from time to time require on the days and during the hours usually worked by the class of employees affected.

(e) Nothing in this Determination shall affect any legal right of an employer to dismiss without notice any employee, whether on tour or not, for malingering, neglect of duty or misconduct; and in case of such dismissal, wages shall be payable for the employment up to, but not after, the time of the dismissal.

(f) Notwithstanding anything contained in this Determination an employer may deduct payment of wages for any day on which an employee cannot be employed in his usual class of employment because of—

- (i) any strike;
- (ii) any breakdown of machinery;
- (iii) any stoppage of work unavoidable by the employer.

#### TRY-OUTS.

6. The engagement shall not be deemed to have commenced until after a "try-out" if such "try-out" is desired; and an employee shall not be entitled to any payment until he or she is definitely engaged, except as prescribed herein and for rehearsals as prescribed in paragraph (ix) of sub-clause (a) of clause 2 of this Determination. Any "try-out" involving an appearance in public shall be paid for at the rate of one-sixth of the prescribed minimum weekly rate for the class of employee in question and any "try-out" not involving such public appearance shall not be paid for unless the number thereof exceeds three in any calendar month in which case there shall be paid for each "try-out" in excess the one-sixth rate aforesaid. No "try-out" shall be held on a Sunday.

#### ABSENCE FROM DUTY.

7. (a) Any employee paid per week absent from duty shall lose pay proportionate to the time of such absence unless he produces or forwards to his employer within twenty-four hours of the commencement of such absence evidence satisfactory to the employer that the absence was reasonable, because of either—

- (i) any illness of himself due neither to his own default nor to accident arising otherwise than out of and in the course of his employment; or
- (ii) any bodily injury to himself caused by accident arising out of and in the course of his employment.

(b) If any dispute shall arise as to the deduction of pay on the ground that satisfactory evidence has not been produced or forwarded, the question whether the evidence should have been accepted by the employer as satisfactory may be determined by the local secretary or other authorized representative of the Actors' Equity of Australia and the employer or his representative and if they do not agree shall be determined by the Wages Board, and the employer and the employee shall treat the evidence as satisfactory or not satisfactory for the purpose of sub-clause (a) hereof according to the tenor of the determination, which determination shall be conclusive and subject to no appeal.

(c) This clause shall not affect any right of the employer to determine the employment in accordance with clause 5 of this Determination.

#### HOURS.

8. Hours of duty shall not exceed  $8\frac{1}{2}$  in any one day nor 96 in any one fortnight, including both performances and rehearsals.

#### OVERTIME.

9. (a) For all time worked over  $8\frac{1}{2}$  hours in any one day or 96 hours in any one fortnight, the employee shall be paid at the rate of time and a quarter.

(b) If an employee is detained in the theatre by the employer or his representative until after 11.30 p.m. he or she shall be paid for the time he or she is detained after 11.30 p.m. at the rate of time and a half.

(c) If a female employee is detained too late to travel by the last tram, train or vessel to her home (temporary or permanent), as the case may be, the employer shall provide for her proper conveyance to her home. This provision shall also apply to a male employee if his home is more than a mile from the theatre.

#### DEFINITION.

(d) "Time and a quarter" and "time and a half" used in relation to pay, respectively mean at the rate of one and a quarter and one and a half the actual pay of the employee in question, calculated *pro rata* for the time for which the payment is to be made.

#### TIMES OF PERFORMANCE AND REHEARSAL.

10. (a) Where a rehearsal is held on the same day as a performance the rehearsal shall not exceed  $4\frac{1}{2}$  hours in duration. Such rehearsal shall not commence before 10 a.m. and shall finish at or before 4 p.m., with an interval of at least one hour, or at the employer's option the rehearsal may commence at 10 a.m. and continue until 1.30 p.m. without any interval. If no performance is held on the same day as a rehearsal, such rehearsal shall not exceed  $8\frac{1}{2}$  hours in duration, with an interval of at least one hour. The employee shall be dressed and ready to begin rehearsal at the time fixed to start. Each of the intervals shall contain at least one continuous hour clear of any dressing, undressing, re-dressing, making-up or other work. The said intervals shall be given during the period between the hours of noon and 2 p.m. and 6 p.m. and 8 p.m. as the case may be. If the aforesaid hours are exceeded or the said continuous clear hour is curtailed, overtime shall be paid for the extra time worked or for the time of the curtailment.

(b) Where in the ordinary course of business not more than eight performances are given in any one week, no call of any kind shall be made on a day where more than one performance is given except in case of emergency.

#### TIME FOR DRESSING.

11. Thirty minutes shall be allowed an employee for preparatory duties incidental to a performance such as undressing, making-up and re-dressing, and fifteen minutes shall be allowed after a performance for undressing, washing off grease paint, and re-dressing; such time shall count as working time.

#### NUMBER OF PERFORMANCES.

12. (a) The wages prescribed in paragraphs (i), (ii), (iii), (iv) and (vi) of sub-clause (a) of clause 2 of this Determination, shall be the weekly wage for the purposes of calculating hourly rates, overtime, Sunday and holiday rates, rehearsal rates under paragraph (ix) of sub-clause (a) of clause 2 of this Determination and any other rates of pay based on the weekly wage.

(b) The number of ordinary performances for employees engaged in vaudeville and vaudeville revue and other entertainments not of a substantially whole time nature shall in any one week not exceed twelve. For each extra performance beyond twelve the employee shall be paid one-tenth of the weekly wage in addition to such wage.

(c) (i) Except as herein provided the number of ordinary performances per week for employees engaged in grand opera, drama, comedy, comic opera, musical comedy, revue, pantomime or other substantially whole time entertainments shall in any one week not exceed eight and in each such week in which such number is not exceeded the employer shall be entitled to deduct the sum of 10s. from the said amounts mentioned in paragraphs (i), (ii), (iii), (iv) and (vi) of sub-clause (a) of clause 2 of this Determination.

(ii) In the following cases the number of ordinary performances in the week may exceed eight but not exceed twelve namely—

- (a) in any week in which a public holiday or holidays occur one extra ordinary performance may be given on each such holiday;
- (b) during Easter week and Christmas week;
- (c) during the pantomime season in December and January.

In such circumstances such employees shall be paid the full amounts mentioned in sub-clause (a) of clause 2 of this Determination without deduction of the sum of 10s. or any part thereof and in addition the holiday pay under clause 13 of this Determination.

(iii) In any other circumstances in which such employees may give more than eight ordinary performances in any one week they shall be paid one-eighth of the weekly wage for each such performance in addition to such weekly wage.

(d) If an employee is engaged on weekly engagement to appear in two or more different contemporaneous productions for the same employer each production shall be deemed to be a separate week's engagement for the purposes of this Determination and the number of performances in each shall be counted separately for the purposes of this clause but this provision shall not apply—

- (i) When one of the productions is the pantomime during December and January : or
- (ii) when any of the performances are short time appearances at picture theatres, cabarets and other like entertainments.

#### SUNDAYS AND PUBLIC HOLIDAYS.

13. For any work done on Sundays or public holidays, payment shall be made at least as follows :—

(a) *On Sundays—*

- (i) If the engagement is by the week, one-third of the weekly wage received by the employee in addition to his wage for the week.
- (ii) If the engagement is not by the week, at least double the prescribed minimum per day rate.

(b) *On Good Friday, Christmas Day and Eight Hours Day—*

- (i) If the engagement is by the week, one-sixth of the weekly wage received by the employee in addition to his wage for the week or tour.
- (ii) If the engagement is not by the week, double the prescribed minimum per day rate.

(c) *On other holidays—*

- (i) If the engagement is by the week, one-twelfth of the weekly wage received by the employee in addition to his wage for the week or tour.
- (ii) If the engagement is not by the week, one and a half times the prescribed minimum rate per day.

The said other holidays are the days observed in the State where the employment occurs as New Year's Day, Australia Day, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, King's Birthday, Boxing Day and all other days regarded as holidays throughout the State.

(d) In the case of employees engaged by the week, if by reason of any of the holidays referred to in this clause being a holiday no work is done thereon, the wage for the week or tour shall nevertheless be paid without deduction therefor, and such holiday shall, for the purpose of clause 12 of this Determination be treated as if there had occurred thereon one of the eight or two of the twelve performances for which that clause provides.

(e) If an employee is required by his employer to travel on a Sunday, he shall, unless he is paid in pursuance of this clause for working on the said Sunday, receive therefor, if engaged by the week one-twelfth, or if not so engaged, one-half of the prescribed minimum per week or per day rate appropriate for him.

#### TRAVELLING.

14. (a) An employee engaged by the week, when travelling on duty, shall be provided by his employer with first-class accommodation both by rail and boat, but when travelling by a vessel carrying one class only, or by a vessel carrying two classes only, for which the lower class fare is at least 75 per cent. of the higher class fare or by a vessel of at least 6,000 tons carrying first second and third class passengers, in any of which cases he shall, if required, accept the only or the lower or the second-class accommodation as the case may be.

(b) An employee, when travelling on duty at night by train, shall be provided with sleeping accommodation, and if such sleeping accommodation is not available the employee shall be paid the sum which would be charged to the employer by the appropriate railway department for such sleeping accommodation if it were available.

#### TRANSPORTATION OF LUGGAGE.

15. All luggage required by the employee in the execution of his duties shall be taken from the wharf or railway station to the theatre and from the theatre to the wharf or railway station, and from theatre to theatre, at the employer's expense. All reasonable care, but no responsibility, shall be taken by the employer.

In the case of canvas theatres (country touring tent shows) if the employer's canvas theatre or other place of performance is over half a mile by the shortest available route from the wharf or railway station and there are no trams or other public transport services readily available at the time of arrival or departure of the employees for the commencement or at the conclusion of the show in the town the employer shall at his expense provide transport for the employees and their luggage to and from the station or wharf and the place of performance.

#### WARDROBE AND MAKE-UP.

16. (a) The employer shall provide make-up in the case of supernumeraries.

(b) Actors and actresses shall provide their own make-up. When the employer requires the employee to use special body make-up (other than facial or in cases of specialty acts) the employer shall provide such make-up.

(c) The employer shall provide wardrobe "wigs" and appurtenances required by him to be used in performance or rehearsal and they must be clean when so provided.

(d) All laundry made necessary by the work of the employee for the employer shall be done at the employer's expense.

#### PENALTY FOR BREACH OF DUTY.

17. An employer may at his discretion inflict a fine of 5s. upon an employee or suspend him for one performance with loss of pay or instantly dismiss him for any unpunctuality or missing of an entrance, or any dereliction of duty during a performance and/or rehearsal :

Provided that whenever a penalty as aforesaid has been imposed the employer shall when paying the employee give a written notice to the employee so penalized stating the amount of the fine, and the offence committed and the date thereof, and the employee shall have the right of appeal to a committee of two, one to be nominated by the employee and the other by the employer or his representative, and should they fail to agree they shall refer the matter for final decision to the Wages Board.

#### TIME BOOKS TO BE KEPT, ETC.

18. (a) The employer shall keep a time book or time sheet properly posted in ink, showing the names of and times worked by each employee, and the wages paid to each employee from week to week.

(b) The time book or time sheet shall, after all the time worked previous to the entry by an employee has been entered therein, be produced to such employee, and such entry if correct, shall be vouched by his signature in the time book or time sheet, and the entries of the time so worked may be checked by an accredited representative of the Actors' Equity of Australia if he be available at the place of business and by the employer's representative who shall, if the entries be correct, vouch for them by their signatures in the time book or time sheet.

(c) The time book or time sheet, with all the entries therein, shall, on demand, be produced by the employer for inspection at the place where it is kept, at any time between the hours of 10 a.m. and 1 p.m. during any day except pay day to an official of the Actors' Equity of Australia who has been authorized in writing to inspect the same by the general secretary or secretary of a State branch of the said Equity. One clear day's notice, setting out the grounds for desiring such inspection, shall be given to the employer of any intended inspection. No authority to inspect shall be given by the said Equity unless the general secretary or State branch secretary has good reason to suspect that a breach of this Determination has been committed by the employer whose time book or time sheet is to be inspected.

## ACCESS FOR UNION REPRESENTATIVE.

19. The president or general secretary or an official of the Actors' Equity of Australia duly authorized in writing shall not more than twice in any one week have access to any employer's premises to interview members of the Equity on union matters when they are off duty, the place of interview to be chosen by the employer. Such interviews shall take place between 4.30 p.m. and 6 p.m. on Wednesdays, or upon such other days as may be agreed upon between the Equity and the employer concerned and the Equity shall have the right within the week immediately preceding the day of the interview to put a notice on the notice board of the premises that the representative of the Equity will be at the premises on the particular Wednesday, or other day so agreed upon.

## SUB-CONTRACT, ETC.

20. (a) If work of any of the kinds covered by this Determination is done by an employee or arranged to be so done, in the interest in any way of an employer, this Determination shall apply to such work, employee and employer, notwithstanding that the employer causes or permits such work to be done for, or through, or by means of a contractor or other person, and the employer and employee shall have the same rights and obligations to each other as if they were in respect of such work directly employer and employee.

(b) An employer shall not permit any of the work covered by this Determination to be done by employees in any place under his control through a contractor or other person, except in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Determination as if the contractor or other person were himself a party and bound by this Determination.

(c) No employer shall enter into any contract for the carrying on of any of the work covered by this Determination by means of employees unless the contract contains a clause binding the contractor to pay the rates and observe the conditions prescribed in this Determination in respect of the work contracted for so long as this Determination remains in operation.

(d) Provided an employer shall have complied with sub-clauses (b) and (c) hereof and shall pay to the contractor at least such sum in the aggregate as the employees would be entitled to hereunder such employer shall not be under any responsibility that the contractor pays to each employee the minimum sum to which he would be entitled under this Determination nor be under any liability to any such employee for any payment nor be deemed to have committed a breach of this Determination in the event of the contractor not paying any such employee such minimum sum.

(e) If the whole or part of any performance of actors, actresses or choristers engaged otherwise than exclusively for broadcasting is broadcast each of the said employees shall be paid, in addition to his prescribed rate, 5s. for each performance.

## DEFINITIONS.

21. "Engaged by the week" means being engaged for at least a week of employment terminable only in the manner prescribed by clause 5 of this Determination or being engaged for employment to last longer than a week.

"Engaged casually" means being engaged otherwise than by the week.

"Actor or actress" means a person who takes part in a performance and is required to speak in the aggregate more than five lines, or to sing by himself or herself, or to dance solo during any performance, or to perform any specialty.

"Supernumerary" means a person who takes part in a performance but is not required therein to speak by himself or herself in the aggregate more than two, or in Shakespearean productions more than five lines, exclusive of shouts, exclamations and utterances marked by authors or stage direction for all (omnes) the players on the stage to speak at the same time, nor required to sing in the aggregate more than sixteen, or in Shakespearean productions more than thirty-two bars of the musical score, if any, and includes anyone appearing as extra lady, show girl or mannequin.

## PART II.—Radio Entertainments.

## RECORDING.

## Casual Employees.

22. (a) These, whether actors, actresses, singers, vaudeville artists, comperes, or other entertainers taking part in recorded transcriptions for use in Commercial Broadcasts, shall be paid as follows:—

Any such employee who in any week takes part in more than twelve (12) broadcasts or performances of fifteen (15) minutes shall for each broadcast or performance in excess of that number be paid at the rate herein fixed for casual employees.

If any such employee in addition to working on the other six (6) days of any week is required to work on the Sunday he shall be paid at the rate of double time for such Sunday work.

If the hours of work of any such employee on any one day are “scattered” so as to cover a period exceeding twelve (12) hours he shall be paid at the rate of time and a half for that day.

When in any recording or broadcast a singer appears as a solo performer for a period exceeding fifteen (15) minutes or one “side,” such singer shall be paid for each solo item beyond the first in the same programme the sum of .....

Rehearsal time for each such solo item beyond the first shall be one half ( $\frac{1}{2}$ ) the rehearsal time allowed for the first period of fifteen (15) minutes or one “side.”

AUDITIONS, SAMPLE RECORDINGS, OR TRIAL BROADCASTS.

25. These according to their specific type as set out in this Determination, and whether broadcast for public or private purposes, or recorded for any reason whatever, shall be paid for in full, but this shall not apply to any voice test in private unless it entails a previous rehearsal.

REMAKES OF RECORDINGS.

26. Should a remake be necessary owing to the mistake of any member of the cast, the remake shall be made by the cast without charge provided that no longer interval occurs than is necessary for a replay of the disc, for which time the cast shall remain in attendance.

If the necessity for a remake owing to such mistake is not discovered until later than as aforesaid the cast shall perform the remake at half rates, and if the remake is necessary owing to any technical fault or to any mistake other than that of one of its members, the cast shall be paid as for a new recording.

PERFORMANCES BY MEMBERS OF STAFF.

27. Where a member of the management's staff, other than an actor, or actress, is called upon to perform any duty within the scope of this Determination he shall be paid a sum not less than that payable under this Determination for the particular duty so performed, except where such member receives a staff salary or wages greater than the minimum weekly pay herein prescribed for an actor or actress. Provided that when process discs are being recorded he shall be paid the sum as prescribed in clause 22 in addition to his ordinary salary or wages.

BROADCASTS OR RECORDING IN THE PRESENCE OF AN AUDIENCE.

28. Where a broadcast or a recording is made before an audience, members generally of which have paid for admission, each employee taking part in such broadcast or recording shall be paid the additional sum of one quarter ( $\frac{1}{4}$ ) the rate to which he is otherwise entitled, but this shall not apply to community singing advertised and/or announced as such, or to performances of which fifty per cent. at least of the proceeds is donated to charity.

MAKE-UP.

29. (a) Make-up in excess of that normally provided by an actor, or actress, shall be provided at the expense of the management and all dress other than that usually and ordinarily worn by the employee (i.e., such dress as would be worn to and from the place of employment) shall be provided by the management in a clean and fresh condition. The employee shall nevertheless, if so required by the management, provide one dinner dress in a reasonably good condition.

(b) Any cleaning or laundering made necessary by such make-up or by “Business” occasioned for the management's benefit shall be at its expense, but cleaning or laundering which in the ordinary course of events is necessary is excluded from this rule.

LATE ARRIVALS.

30. If an employee is late for a call, the burden shall be borne by the cast. If a producer or any person other than one of the actors, or actresses, delays the rehearsal or recording the burden shall be borne by the management.

## CANCELLED CALLS.

31. Should a call be cancelled within twelve (12) hours of the time of such call for any reason other than the non-attendance of an employee the call shall be paid for in full.

## MEAL BREAKS.

32. One hour shall be allowed for lunch between 12 o'clock noon and 2 p.m. and one hour for dinner between 5 p.m. and 7 p.m. or at a time to be agreed upon. Should the cast require a "break" for morning or afternoon tea, the time thus occupied shall not be counted as in the time of employment.

## PHOTOGRAPH CALLS.

33. All photograph and publicity calls shall be paid for at rehearsal rates.

## TIME SHEETS.

34. Every employee shall sign a time sheet provided by the management whereon shall be shown the time occupied, number of records, and footage of films. A copy of this time sheet, together with pay sheets, shall be open for inspection by Actors' Equity representatives if required for checking purposes.

## NOTICE BOARD.

35. The management shall provide and place in a position a suitable and easy of access notice board for the display of announcements and notices, and on which the Actors' Equity shall have the right to place relevant notices.

## ACCESS.

36. Actors' Equity officials, provided they are duly authorized in writing, shall have access to broadcasting or recording premises for the purpose of interviewing members, when off duty, on union matters, the place of the interview to be arranged between the Actors' Equity and the management, and to be reasonably suitable for the purpose.

## ACTORS' EQUITY MEMBERSHIP.

37. No objection shall be taken to nor shall any discrimination be exercised against any employer because of Equity membership or activity.

## ONE EMPLOYEE—ONE PART.

38. A broadcast or recording shall be taken as the performance by an employee of one part or character only. In the event of an employee being required to perform more than one part or character he shall be paid an additional sum of one quarter ( $\frac{1}{4}$ ) the prescribed amount, but only if and when the additional part or parts consists of more than 25 words in the aggregate.

## SOUND EFFECTS.

39. Should an actor be required to produce sound effects not incidental to his particular part in the broadcasting or recording he shall be paid an additional sum of one quarter ( $\frac{1}{4}$ ) the prescribed amount.

## TRAVELLING.

40. First class return fares and reserved seats, wherever obtainable, shall be provided by the management for all employees who may be required to travel in the management's interests. When such travel involves any employee spending the night in the train he shall be provided with a sleeping berth at the expense of the management wherever such berth is procurable, and where not procurable the employee shall be paid the sum usually charged to the public by the Railway Commissioners.

## PRODUCERS AND ASSISTANT PRODUCERS.

41. These shall be paid at not less than actors' rates.

## STAR ARTISTS.

42. Where an artist is announced as "starred" in any broadcast or recording he shall be paid an additional sum of not less than one quarter ( $\frac{1}{4}$ ) the prescribed rate.

## PAYMENT OF WAGES.

43. Casual employees shall be paid within 24 hours after the termination of their work. Weekly employees shall be paid weekly and not later than Friday of each week.

## RATES FOR CHILDREN.

44. Children shall be paid at one half ( $\frac{1}{2}$ ) the rates specified in clauses 22 to 24 inclusive.

## DETENTION.

45. If a female employee is detained by the employer beyond the hour of 11.30 p.m. the employer shall provide for her proper conveyance to her home whether temporary or permanent. This provision shall apply also to a male employee who is so detained after the hour of midnight.

## BROADCAST OF RELIGIOUS SERVICES.

46. Nothing in this Determination shall apply to the broadcasting of religious services.

## DEFINITIONS.

47. "Actor" or "Actress" means a person who, having previously so appeared three times within any period of twelve months, appears in any broadcast or recording in which he is required to speak in the aggregate more than five words, or to sing by himself during any such broadcast or recording, or to perform any speciality.

"Casual Employee" means an employee engaged otherwise than as a weekly employee.

"Child" or "Children" means a person or persons under the age of sixteen years.

"Legitimate" or "Straight Presentation" means tragedy, drama, comedy drama, farce comedy, cavalcade of events presented in play form, presentation of events past, present, and future (actual or fictional), presented in play form in which the instrumental music used is only incidental to the presentation for theme, bridge, or link, or to heighten the dramatic value or create atmosphere, and any other presentation other than musical presentation.

"Musical Presentation" means grand opera, opera bouffe, light opera, musical comedy, musical farce, vaudeville, revue, minstrel show, pantomime, or any other presentation in which the dialogue is interspersed with either vocal solos, duets, trios, quartettes, quintettes, octettes, or chorus.

"Time and a half" used in relation to pay means at the rate of one and a half ( $1\frac{1}{2}$ ) times the actual pay of the employee in question, and calculated *pro rata* for the time for which the payment is to be made.

"Weekly Employee" means an employee engaged on a weekly basis, and for a minimum period of eight consecutive weeks.

**PART III.**

**This Part applies to all persons covered by the Determination.**

**PERIODICAL ADJUSTMENT OF WAGES.**

48. The wages rates set out in clause 2 (i), (ii), (iii), and (iv) and those for weekly employees in clauses 22 and 24 are based upon the following basic wage, and pursuant to and in accordance with the provisions of section 21 of the *Factories and Shops Act 1934*, the Board hereby determines that such rates shall be automatically increased or decreased by the same amount and at the same time as such basic wage.

The basic wage shown hereunder shall be adjusted as prescribed in clause 49.

**ADJUSTMENT OF BASIC WAGE.**

49. (a) Until the beginning of the first pay period to commence on August, 1946, the amount of the basic wage shall be as prescribed in clause 48.

(b) During each future period of or near a quarter beginning with the first pay period to commence in an August, a November, a February, or a May, the amount of the basic wage shall be adjusted by the following method according to the position and fluctuations (if any) of the Commonwealth Statistician's "All Items" Retail Price Index Numbers.

For the purposes of this Determination the expression "Commonwealth Statistician's Retail Price Index Numbers," or any like expression, means the numbers stated to be such index numbers in any document purporting and not proved to be wrongly so purporting, to be printed by the Commonwealth Government Printer or to be signed by or on behalf of the Commonwealth Statistician:—

- (1) The Index Number set to be applied to a place is that assigned thereto in clause 48.
- (2) The Index Number for the calendar quarter next preceding the period of or near a quarter for which the adjustment is made is to be ascertained.
- (3) The amount assigned in the following table (or any extension thereof) to the Index Number Division comprising that number is to be ascertained.
- (4) The basic wage shall be of that assigned amount during such successive period.

Factories and Shops Acts.

## DETERMINATION OF THE PLATE GLASS BOARD.

NOTES—(a) This Determination applies to the whole of the State of Victoria.

(b) On the 18th December, 1939, the Board was deprived of the power to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed fixing in position glass sheets or pieces, of surface area not exceeding 2½ square feet each, as substitute for tiles, and conferring such power exclusively on the Tilelayers Board.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board which since the 5th November, 1924, has had the power to "determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any persons employed in the trade of—

(a) designing, bevelling, cutting, embossing, glazing, painting, silvering, or otherwise working all kinds of plate, sheet, or stained glass, or glass lenses or prisms;

(b) fixing in position all kinds of plate, sheet, or stained glass, or glass lenses or prisms;

(c) packing all kinds of plate, sheet, or stained glass, or glass lenses or prisms;

including any labouring work in connexion with any such operations," has made the following Determination, namely:—

1. That on the 1st March, 1946, the adjusted Determination, which came into force as from the beginning of the first pay period to commence in August, 1944, shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

4. The number of hours to constitute a week's work shall be 44, to be worked between the times of beginning and ending work shown below:—

OVERTIME.

5. Except in the case of shift work—

(i) All time worked—

- (a) before or after the usual times of beginning and ending work;
- (b) in excess of nine hours per day;
- (c) in excess of 44 hours in any week;

shall be paid for at the rate of time and one-half for the first four hours and double time thereafter, provided that all time worked between the hours of 9 p.m. and 7.30 a.m. shall be paid for at double time.

(ii) All work done outside the times of beginning and ending work on any holiday specified in clause 16 shall be paid for at the rate of double ordinary time.

(iii) No person under the age of seventeen years shall be permitted to work more than four hours' overtime in any week.

SHIFT WORK.

6. Shift work may be worked subject to the following conditions:—

- (a) Any afternoon or night shift which does not continue for five successive shifts shall be paid at the rate of time and a half.
- (b) Except as hereinafter provided, for any afternoon or night shift which has been in operation for five successive shifts or more and less than one month 10 per cent. more than ordinary rates shall be paid and after such shifts have continued for more than one month 7½ per cent. more than ordinary rates shall be paid.
- (c) Shift workers shall be paid overtime at the rate of time and a half for the first four hours and double time thereafter for all time worked in excess of shift hours.
- (d) Employees who during a period of engagements work only on night shifts shall be paid at the rate of time and a quarter.
- (e) When employees are called upon to work afternoon and night shifts only they shall change over week and week about and shall be paid 10 per cent. above ordinary rates for both shifts.
- (f) When employees work day and afternoon shifts only they shall change over week and week about and shall be paid 10 per cent. extra for afternoon shifts.
- (g) The ordinary hours of actual work or duty exclusive of meal breaks off duty (if any) of employees working on shift shall not exceed—
  - (i) eight in any one day, or,
  - (ii) 48 in any one week, or
  - (iii) an average of 44 per week during any period of three weeks of such employment upon such shifts.

**TEA MONEY.**

7. All employees required to work beyond the usual time of ending work shall be allowed 2s. tea money in addition to overtime rates as prescribed for in this Determination when the usual time of ending work is exceeded by two hours.

**TERMS OF ENGAGEMENT.**

8. Except as herein in this Determination provided, all employees shall be employed by the week. Employees to become entitled to the weekly wage prescribed by this Determination must be available and ready and willing to perform such work as the employer shall from time to time require on the days and during the hours usually worked by the class of employee affected. Where the majority of the employees of any establishment or of any department of such establishment agree to work part time for any period or to close down for any period on days other than the prescribed holidays, the provisions of the weekly wage shall not apply to any employee of such establishment or department during such periods.

Employment for the first two weeks of service at any time shall be from hour to hour at the weekly rate fixed.

**CASUAL LABOUR.**

9. Casual labour at hourly rates may be engaged, provided the rates are 10 per cent. higher than those prescribed for weekly hands.

Casual labour means labour where an employer does not provide a full week's work, but does not include a weekly hand whose engagement is terminated in the middle of a week.

**TERMINATING EMPLOYMENT.**

10. Employment to be terminated only by a week's notice on either side, and such notice may be given at any time during the week. This shall not affect the right of the employer to dismiss any employee without notice for malingering, inefficiency, neglect of duty, or misconduct, or to deduct payment for any time the employee cannot be usefully employed because of any strike, or through any breakdown of machinery, or any stoppage of work by any cause for which the employer cannot reasonably be held responsible.

An employer shall not terminate the employment of an employee for the purpose of evading payment for the holidays prescribed by this Determination.

Where an employee is dismissed within seven days prior to any such holiday, the re-engagement of such employee within seven days after such holiday shall be prima facie evidence that the employment was terminated for the purpose of evading payment for such holiday.

Where the employer terminates the employment within one week of a day on which a holiday occurs, the employee shall be paid for such holiday or holidays prescribed by this Determination, provided that such employee has been employed by the employer for a period of at least one week prior to the termination of the employment.

Should an employee be dismissed during the course of a week any wages due to him or her shall be paid to him or her forthwith, or shall be posted to him or her within 24 hours.

**SPECIAL RATES FOR SUNDAYS AND HOLIDAYS.**

11. Any employee who is employed on any holiday specified in clause 16 shall be paid at the rate of the ordinary time in addition to the usual rate.

All work done on Sundays shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

**MIDDAY MEAL.**

12. An interval of not less than 30 minutes shall be allowed for the midday meal between the hours of 12 noon and 2 p.m.

**REST PERIOD.**

13. When any spell of duty is for more than four hours an interval of ten minutes, to be selected by the employer, shall be allowed in the third hour to females for refreshment. The interval shall be as part of the time of duty, without deduction of time-work pay. During such rest period the employees may leave their seats, but not the premises.

**MIXED FUNCTIONS.**

14. Where an employee is engaged in any one week for more than half of such week at work in a higher class than he or she is employed to perform, he or she shall be paid for the full week at the highest rate payable for any such work under the Determination; but if he or she is engaged for less than half of any such week, he or she shall only be paid at the rates fixed by this Determination for the work he or she actually performs.

**ALLOWANCES FOR TRAVELLING TIME AND BOARD.**

15. All time reasonably occupied by an employee in travelling to or from work outside the shop and outside ordinary hours and in travelling to and from work in a country district if engaged in the metropolitan district for employment in a country district, shall be treated as time of duty and paid for at ordinary rates up to a maximum of eight hours for the journey, except on Sundays when time and a half rates shall be paid up to a maximum of eight hours for the journey. Provided that, where an employee proceeds direct from his or her home to a job outside the factory, he or she shall be paid for all time reasonably occupied in travelling to the job in excess of the time usually taken to go from his or her home to the factory.

All fares and reasonable travelling expenses incurred by an employee in such travelling, including the cost (if any) incurred for meals—together with the reasonable cost of board and lodging if the employee has to be away from his or her home for a night—shall be paid to the employee.

The fares allowed shall be first class where the employee has to travel all night in connexion with his or her employer's business and in other cases the fares shall be second class.

The foregoing travelling and accommodation allowances shall be paid additional to the usual rates for the time employees are working.

When it is more convenient for the employee to go direct to the job from his or her home he or she shall do so, and start and cease work at the usual times customary at the factory, provided that any extra expense incurred by him or her in travelling shall be borne by the employer.

**HOLIDAYS, ANNUAL LEAVE AND SICK PAY.***Holidays.*

16. (a) The following days shall be observed as holidays for all weekly wage employees—the days observed as New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Anzac Day, King's Birthday, Melbourne Cup Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day. All work done on the said holidays shall be paid for at ordinary rates in addition to the provisions of sub-clause (c) hereof.

*Annual Leave.*

(b) All weekly wage employees shall be granted their annual leave at Christmas time. Such leave shall consist of fourteen consecutive days which shall be exclusive of any of the holidays prescribed by sub-clause (a) hereof and if any of such holidays falls within the period of annual leave and is observed on a day which would have been an ordinary working day there shall be added to the period of annual leave one working day for each such holiday falling as aforesaid.

The representatives of the parties shall meet not later than three months before Christmas for the purpose of determining the date on which the factories shall close down for the annual leave and Christmas-New Year holidays, provided that employers in the glass trade may arrange for annual leave to be taken in such manner as may permit skeleton staffs to be available during the period of general closing covered by this paragraph for the purpose of dealing with any emergency replacements of glass.

*Loaded Rate to provide Credits from which Payment for Holidays, Annual Leave and Sick Pay shall be Made.*

- (c) (i) Each weekly wage employee shall be credited by the employer with a sum equal to 4½ hours' pay for each week of continuous service.
- (ii) On or before the pay preceding a holiday, the amount of time that the employee will work short because of the holiday and the wage equivalent of such time shall be ascertained.
- (iii) If on such pay day there is standing to the credit of the employee an amount equal to or exceeding the amount of such wage equivalent, the employer shall on the next succeeding pay day pay to the employee an amount equal to that wage equivalent and the employee's credit shall be reduced by the amount so paid. Provided that the payments from credits in respect of Good Friday and Easter Monday shall be made on the pay day immediately preceding Good Friday.
- (iv) If on such pay day the amount standing to such credit is less than such wage equivalent the employer shall on that pay day pay to the employee the amount then standing to such credit and the employee's credit shall be reduced by the amount so paid.
- (v) In the event of an employee being absent owing to personal sickness or personal accident arising out of or in the course of his employment, the employer shall on or before the pay day following the commencement of such absence ascertain the amount standing to the credit of such employee and shall if there be sufficient standing to the employee's credit to cover him for such absence not in excess of the number of ordinary working hours in a week's pay, pay to him such amount and if there be not sufficient for this purpose then the employer shall pay to the employee such amount as is standing to his credit and such credit shall be reduced by the amount paid pursuant to this sub-clause. If the credit is insufficient to cover the employee for his absence through sickness or accident as above stated the employer may at his own request be paid the difference when he has accumulated sufficient credit to cover the necessary amount.
- (vi) On the pay day preceding the Christmas holidays the employer shall pay to the employee such amount as is then standing to the employee's credit, plus credits up to the end of the 52nd week in the year.
- (vii) In the event of an employee being absent for any cause (other than statutory holidays, annual leave, personal sickness or personal accident arising out of or in the course of his employment not in excess of the number of ordinary working hours in a week in any year) the employer may reduce the amount to be credited to such employee by an amount *pro rata* to such absence.
- (d) The provisions of this clause shall operate from the 1st January, 1946.

## PAY DAY.

17. All employees shall be paid weekly on any other day than Saturday. No employer shall hold more than two days' pay in hand.

Any employee kept waiting for his pay on pay day for more than a quarter of an hour after the usual time for ceasing work shall be paid overtime rates after that quarter of an hour, and as for a quarter of an hour at least.

## TIME BOOK OR RECORD.

18. (a) Employers shall provide at each shop, factory, or place where work is being carried on a time book or record which shall contain a correct account of the hours worked and the wages received by each employee. Such time book or record shall be kept correctly entered up in ink and shall be open for inspection by a duly accredited official of the Federated Furnishing Trade Society of Australasia during the usual office hours at the office or other convenient place.

Provided that no inspection shall be demanded unless the accredited official of the said Society suspects that a breach of this Determination has been or is being committed and provided also that only one demand for such inspection shall be made in any one fortnight at the same establishment. The official making such inspection shall be entitled to take a copy of entries in any time and wages book relating to the suspected breach of this Determination.

(b) The time occupied by an employee in filling in any time book or cards, or in making any records, shall be treated as time of duty; but this clause does not apply to "checking" in or out at beginning or end of duty.

## RIGHT OF ENTRY OF UNION OFFICIALS.

19. A duly accredited representative of the Federated Furnishing Trade Society of Australasia shall have the right to enter employers' workshops during the midday meal hour for the purpose of interviewing employees on legitimate Union business on the following conditions:

- (a) That he produces his authority to the gatekeeper or such other person as may be appointed by the employer.
- (b) That he interviews employees only at the places where they are taking their meal.
- (c) That not more than one representative in all be at any workshop at any one time.
- (d) That no one representative visit a workshop more than once in each week.
- (e) That if any employer alleges that a representative is unduly interfering with his workshop or is creating disaffection amongst his employees or is offensive in his methods or is committing a breach of any of the previous conditions, such employer may refuse the right of entry but the representative shall have the right to bring such refusal before the Wages Board.

## DILUTION OF LABOUR.

20. For the period of the war employers may engage unskilled adult male labour at operations for which this Determination provides margins, subject to the following conditions:—

- (a) Dilutees may be introduced into the industry to a maximum extent of 10 per cent. of all adult male employees in any factory.
- (b) Dilutees shall be called trainees.
- (c) The basic wage shall be paid to trainees for the first three months of their employment and thereafter they shall be classified according to the particular work for which they appear most suitable and be paid as follows:—
  - Second three months—Basic wage and 25 per cent. of the appropriate margin.
  - Third three months—Basic wage and 50 per cent. of the appropriate margin.
  - Fourth three months—Basic wage and 75 per cent. of the appropriate margin.
- (d) At the end of twelve months, trainees shall be paid the full Determination rates unless the employer desires to extend the period of training. In such case he shall have the right of appeal to a joint committee composed of four representatives respectively of employees and employers, appointed under the provisions of the Federal Award for the Federated Furnishing Trade Society of Australasia. In the event of such committee failing to agree on any matter, the members thereof shall have the right to submit any matter in dispute to the Wages Board.

## PIECE-WORK.

21. The Board determines under the provisions of the Factories and Shops Act that any employer may fix and pay piece-work prices to any person employed at any work for which the Board has a fixed minimum wage, provided that any such employer shall base such piece-work prices on the earnings of an average worker working under like conditions, and such piece-work prices shall be fixed so that an average worker can earn not less than 10 per centum in addition to the wages rates that are fixed by the Board for such work.

## PERIODICAL ADJUSTMENT OF WAGES.

22. The wages rates set out in clause 3 are based upon the following basic wage for adult males and minimum wage for adult females, and, pursuant to the provisions of section 21 of the *Factories and Shops Act 1934*, shall be automatically increased or decreased by the same amount and at the same time as such basic wage and minimum wage.

The basic wage rates and minimum wage rates shown hereunder shall be adjusted as prescribed in clause 23.

ADJUSTMENT OF BASIC WAGE FOR ADULT MALES AND MINIMUM WAGE FOR ADULT FEMALES.

23. (a) Until the beginning of the first pay period to commence in August, 1946, the amounts of the basic wage and the minimum wage for females shall be as prescribed in clause 22.

(b) During each future period of or near a quarter beginning with the first pay period to commence in an August, a November, a February, or a May, the amounts of the needs basic wage shall be adjusted by the following method according to the position and fluctuations (if any) of the Commonwealth Statistician's "All Items" Retail Price Index Numbers.

For the purpose of this Determination the expression "Commonwealth Statistician's Retail Price Index Numbers" or any like expression means the numbers stated to be such Index Numbers in any document purporting, and not proved to be wrongly so purporting, to be printed by the Commonwealth Government Printer or to be signed by or on behalf of the Commonwealth Statistician.

(1) The Index Number set to be applied to a place is that assigned thereto in Clause 22.

(2) The Index Number for the calendar quarter next preceding the period of or near a quarter for which the adjustment is made is to be ascertained.

(3) The amounts assigned in the following table (or any extension thereof) to the Index Number Division comprising that Number are to be ascertained.

(4) The needs basic wage and minimum wage for adult females shall be those assigned amounts during such period of or near a quarter.

(c) The amounts of the weekly rates for apprentices and improvers shall be adjusted proportionately to the basic wage, and shall accord with the rates payable from time to time under the appropriate Award of the Commonwealth Court of Conciliation and Arbitration.

(d) The rates for piece-workers shall be increased or decreased in the same proportion as the rate for the journeymen or journeywomen in the respective classes.

Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE FURNITURE BOARD.

NOTE.—This Determination applies to the whole of the State of Victoria.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board which has the power to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to:—

- (1) any person employed in wholly or partly preparing or manufacturing any article of furniture or in repairing any new or secondhand article of furniture, usually made or partly prepared by cabinet-makers, chair and couch makers, upholsterers, wood carvers, french-polishers, and wood turners;
- (2) any person or persons or classes of persons employed in—
  - (a) fixing or repairing new or secondhand furniture or seating in buildings; or
  - (b) french, wax, or lacquer polishing, new or secondhand furniture or fittings in or in connexion with buildings;
- (3) any person or persons, or classes of persons, employed in the trade of designing, making, painting, or decorating—
  - (a) furnishing accessories or novelties, wholly or partly made of wood, such as nut bowls, smokers' or ornamental stands, or fancy boxes;
  - (b) domestic woodware, such as bread boards or salt boxes;
  - (c) walking sticks;
- (4) any person employed in wholly or partly preparing or manufacturing furniture timbers cut to size, veneers, veneered panels, plywood or coreboard, but not including persons subject to the determination of any other Wages Board heretofore appointed;
- (5) any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the manufacturing processes of a maker of overmantels and of wood mantelpieces (other than wood mantelpieces to be painted, such as usually made in sawmills) or in repairing any such overmantels or wood mantelpieces;
- (6) any persons or persons, or classes of persons, employed in the manufacturing of wire mattresses;
- (7) any person employed in the manufacture of mattresses or bedding;
- (8) females employed as upholstresses, whether as carpet hands, table hands, or drapery hands; and males employed in planning and laying floor coverings, or fixing draperies, blinds, or screens; and males or females employed in making blinds; but not including persons subject to the jurisdiction of the Tentmakers Board;
- (9) any person or persons or classes of persons employed either inside or outside a factory or workroom in the process, trade, or business of a maker of picture frames, including art pictures frames, framed mirrors, and overmantels other than overmantels usually made by cabinet-makers,

has made the following Determination namely:—

1. That on the 1st January, 1946, the last previous Determination of this Board (previously issued in six separate sections viz:—Bedding, General Furniture, Picture Frame, Planning Carpets &c., Wire Mattress, and Wood Mantelpiece or Overmantel Sections), shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

DEFINITIONS.

4. A chairmaker is an employee who makes any class of chairs other those in which the woodwork is wholly prepared by machines and set up by assemblers.

A stuffer chair and couch frame maker is a person who makes frames on which the upholsterers cover all the woodwork except the legs or feet and of which the woodwork is prepared by machines.

A varnisher is a person employed solely coating with a brush or dipping parts of or completed articles of furniture of any class covered by this Determination with any oil or spirit varnish, lacquer, or substitute for such oil or spirit varnish or lacquer.

ORDINARY WEEK'S WORK.

5. The number of hours to constitute a week's work shall be as follows:—

OVERTIME.

6. Except in the case of shift work all time worked—

- (a) Before or after the usual times of beginning and ending work;
- (b) In excess of nine hours per day;
- (c) In excess of 44 hours in any week;

shall be paid for at the rate of time and one half for the first four hours and double time thereafter, provided that all time worked between the hours of 9 p.m. and 7.30 a.m. shall be paid for at double time.

All work done outside the times of beginning and ending work on any holiday specified in clause 18 shall be paid for at the rate of double ordinary time.

No person under the age of seventeen years shall be permitted to work more than four hours overtime in any week.

## SHIFT WORK.

7. Shift work may be worked subject to the following conditions :—

- (a) Any afternoon or night shift which does not continue for five successive shifts shall be paid at the rate of time and a half.
- (b) Except as hereinafter provided, for any afternoon or night shift which has been in operation for five successive shifts or more and less than one month ten per cent. more than ordinary rates shall be paid and after such shifts have continued for more than one month seven and one-half per cent. more than ordinary rates shall be paid.
- (c) Shift workers shall be paid overtime at the rate of time and a half for the first four hours and double time thereafter for all time worked in excess of shift hours.
- (d) Employees who during a period of engagements work only on night shifts shall be paid at the rate of time and a quarter.
- (e) When employees are called upon to work afternoon and night shifts only they shall change over week and week about and shall be paid ten per cent. above ordinary rates for both shifts.
- (f) When employees work day and afternoon shifts only they shall change over week and week about and shall be paid ten per cent. extra for afternoon shifts.
- (g) The ordinary hours of actual work or duty exclusive of meal breaks off duty (if any) of employee working on shift shall not exceed—
  - (i) Eight in any one day ; or
  - (ii) 48 in any one week ; or
  - (iii) an average of 44 per week during any period of three weeks of such employment upon such shifts.

## TEA MONEY.

8. All employees required to work beyond the usual time of ending work shall be allowed 2s. tea money in addition to overtime rates as prescribed for in this Determination when the usual time of ending work is exceeded by two hours.

## TERMS OF ENGAGEMENT.

9. Except as herein in this Determination provided, all employees shall be employed by the week. Employees to become entitled to the weekly wage prescribed by this Determination must be available and ready and willing to perform such work as the employer shall from time to time require on the days and during the hours usually worked by the class of employees affected. Where the majority of the employees of any establishment or of any department of such establishment agree to work part time for any period or to close down for any period on days other than the prescribed holidays, the provisions of the weekly wage shall not apply to any employee of such establishment or department during such periods.

Employment for the first two weeks of service at any time shall be from hour to hour at the weekly rate fixed.

Notwithstanding anything herein contained employees engaged on the making of refrigerators may be employed on hourly hiring provided that they are paid at the rate of 5s. per week extra (with a proportionate amount added to the wages of juveniles) when so employed, such payment to be compensation for sick pay and public holiday pay, but such amount shall not be taken into account in computing overtime, Sunday, and holiday rates.

## CASUAL LABOUR.

10. Casual labour at hourly rates may be engaged, provided the rates are 10 per cent. higher than those prescribed for weekly hands.

Casual labour means labour where an employer does not provide a full week's work, but does not include a weekly hand whose engagement is terminated in the middle of a week.

## TERMINATING EMPLOYMENT.

11. Employment to be terminated only by a week's notice on either side, and such notice may be given at any time during the week. This shall not affect the right of the employer to dismiss any employee without notice for malingering, inefficiency, neglect of duty, or misconduct, or to deduct payment for any time the employee cannot be usefully employed because of any strike, or through any breakdown of machinery, or any stoppage of work by any cause for which the employer cannot reasonably be held responsible.

An employer shall not terminate the employment of an employee for the purpose of evading payment for the holidays prescribed by this Determination.

Where an employee is dismissed within seven days prior to any such holiday the re-engagement of such employee within seven days after such holiday shall be prima facie evidence that the employment was terminated for the purpose of evading payment for such holiday.

Where the employer terminates the employment within one week of a day on which a holiday occurs, the employee shall be paid for such holiday or holidays prescribed by this Determination provided that such employee had been employed by the employer for a period of at least one week prior to the termination of the employment.

Should an employee be dismissed during the course of a week, any wages due to him or her shall be paid to him or her forthwith or shall be posted to him or her within 24 hours.

## SPECIAL RATES FOR SUNDAYS AND HOLIDAYS.

12. Any employee who is employed on any holiday specified in clause 18 shall be paid at the rate of the ordinary time in addition to the usual rate.

All work done on Sundays shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

## MIDDAY MEAL.

13. An interval of not less than 30 minutes shall be allowed for the midday meal between the hours of 12 noon and 2 p.m.

## REST PERIOD.

14. When any spell of duty is for more than four hours, an interval of ten minutes, to be selected by the employer, shall be allowed in the third hour to females for refreshment. The interval shall be as part of the time of duty, without deduction of time-work pay. During such rest period the employees may leave their seats, but not the premises.

## MIXED FUNCTIONS.

15. (a) Where an employee is engaged in any one week for more than half of such week at work in a higher class than he or she is employed to perform, he or she shall be paid for the full week at the highest rate payable for any such work under this Determination ; but if he or she is engaged for less than half of any such week, he or she shall only be paid at the rates fixed by this Determination for the work he or she actually performs.

(b) An assembler engaged up to twenty-five per cent. of his time in trimming straight square edges and making minor adjustments shall be paid the rate prescribed for an assembler. If so engaged more than twenty-five per cent., and not more than fifty per cent. of his time he shall be paid cabinet makers' rates for the time so engaged. If more than fifty per cent. of his time is so occupied he shall be paid cabinet makers' rates for the full time worked.

## MATERIALS TO BE PROVIDED.

16. Any person employed in wholly or partly preparing or manufacturing any article of furniture or in preparing any new or secondhand article of furniture shall be paid 6d. per hour in addition to the lowest rate fixed by this Determination, unless the following are provided by the employer if required in the performance of the work:—Benches, wood or iron clamps over 2ft. 6 in. hand screws (in excess of four), glue pots, and glue brushes and varnish brushes. Any employee engaged at french-polishing shall be supplied with all materials, including rags, brushes, and kit-box.

## ALLOWANCES FOR TRAVELLING TIME AND BOARD.

17. All time reasonably occupied by an employee in travelling to or from work outside the factory and outside ordinary hours and in travelling to and from work in a country district if engaged in the metropolitan district for employment in a country district shall be treated as time of duty and paid for at ordinary rates up to a maximum of eight hours for the journey, except on Sundays, when time and a half rates shall be paid up to a maximum of eight hours for the journey. Provided that, where an employee proceeds direct from his or her home to a job outside the factory, he or she shall be paid for all time reasonably occupied in travelling to the job in excess of the time usually taken to go from his or her home to the factory.

All fares and reasonable travelling expenses incurred by an employee in such travelling, including the cost (if any) incurred for meals—together with the reasonable cost of board and lodging if the employee has to be away from his or her home for a night shall be paid to the employee.

The fares allowed shall be first class where the employee has to travel all night in connexion with his or her employer's business, and in other cases the fares shall be second class.

The foregoing travelling and accommodation allowances shall be paid additional to the usual rates for the time employees are working.

When it is more convenient for the employee to go direct to the job from his or her home, he or she shall do so, and start and cease work at the usual times customary at the factory, provided that any extra expense incurred by him or her in travelling shall be borne by the employer.

## HOLIDAYS, ANNUAL LEAVE AND SICK PAY.

*Holidays.*

18. (a) The following days shall be observed as holidays for all weekly wage employees—the days observed as New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Anzac Day, King's Birthday, Melbourne Cup Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day. All work done on the said holidays shall be paid for at ordinary rates in addition to the provisions of sub-clause (c) hereof.

*Annual Leave*

(b) All weekly wage employees shall be granted their annual leave at Christmas time. Such leave shall consist of fourteen consecutive days which shall be exclusive of any of the holidays prescribed by sub-clause (a) hereof and if any of such holidays falls within the period of annual leave and is observed on a day which would have been an ordinary working day there shall be added to the period of annual leave one working day for each such holiday falling as aforesaid.

The representatives of the parties shall meet not later than three months before Christmas for the purpose of determining the date on which the factories shall close down for the annual leave and Christmas—New Year holidays.

*Loaded Rate to Provide Credits from which Payment for Holidays, Annual Leave and Sick Pay shall be Made.*

(c) (i) Each weekly wage employee shall be credited by the employer with a sum equal to  $4\frac{1}{4}$  hours pay for each week of continuous service.

(ii) On or before the pay preceding a holiday, the amount of time that the employee will work short because of the holiday and the wage equivalent of such time shall be ascertained.

(iii) If on such pay day there is standing to the credit of the employee an amount equal to or exceeding the amount of such wage equivalent, the employer shall on the next succeeding pay day pay to the employee an amount equal to that wage equivalent and the employee's credit shall be reduced by the amount so paid. Provided that the payments from credits in respect of Good Friday and Easter Monday shall be made on the pay day immediately preceding Good Friday.

(iv) If on such pay day the amount standing to such credit is less than such wage equivalent the employer shall on that pay day pay to the employee the amount then standing to such credit and the employee's credit shall be reduced by the amount so paid.

(v) In the event of an employee being absent owing to personal sickness or personal accident arising out of or in the course of his employment, the employer shall on or before the pay day following the commencement of such absence ascertain the amount standing to the credit of such employee and shall if there be sufficient standing to the employee's credit to cover him for such absence not in excess of the number of ordinary working hours in a week's pay to him such amount and if there be not sufficient for this purpose then the employer shall pay to the employee such amount as is standing to his credit and such credit shall be reduced by the amount paid pursuant to this sub-clause. If the credit is insufficient to cover the employee for his absence through sickness or accident as above stated the employee may at his own request be paid the difference when he has accumulated sufficient credit to cover the necessary amount.

(vi) On the pay day preceding the Christmas holidays the employer shall pay to the employee such amount as is then standing to the employee's credit, plus credits up to the end of the 52nd week in the year.

(vii) In the event of an employee being absent for any cause (other than statutory holidays, annual leave, personal sickness or personal accident arising out of or in the course of his employment not in excess of the number of ordinary working hours in a week in any year) the employer may reduce the amount to be credited to such employee by an amount pro rata to such absence.

## PAY DAY.

19. All employees shall be paid weekly on any other day than Saturday.

No employer shall hold more than two days' pay in hand.

Any employee kept waiting for his or her pay on pay day for more than a quarter of an hour after the usual time for ceasing work shall be paid overtime rates after that quarter of an hour and as for a quarter of an hour at least.

## TIME BOOK OR RECORD.

20. (a) Employers shall provide at each shop, factory or place where work is being carried on a time book or record which shall contain a correct account of the hours worked and the wages received by each employee. Such time book or record shall be kept correctly entered up in ink and shall be open for inspection by a duly accredited official of the Federated Furnishing Trade Society of Australasia during the usual office hours at the office or other convenient place.

Provided that no inspection shall be demanded unless the accredited official of the said Society suspects that a breach of this Determination has been or is being committed and provided also that only one demand for such inspection shall be made in any one fortnight at the same establishment. The official making such inspection shall be entitled to take a copy of entries in any time and wages book relating to the suspected breach of this Determination.

(b) The time occupied by an employee in filling in any time book or cards, or in making any records, shall be treated as time of duty; but this clause does not apply to "checking" in or out at beginning or end of duty.

RIGHT OF ENTRY OF UNION OFFICIAL.

21. A duly accredited representative of the Federated Furnishing Trade Society of Australasia shall have the right to enter employers' workshops during the midday meal hour for the purpose of interviewing employees on legitimate Union business on the following conditions :—

- (a) That he produces his authority to the gatekeeper or such other person as may be appointed by the employer ;
- (b) That he interview employees only at the places where they are taking their meal ;
- (c) That not more than one representative in all be in any workshop at any one time ;
- (d) That no one representative visit a workshop more than once in each week ;
- (e) That if any employer alleges that a representative is unduly interfering with his workshop or is creating disaffection amongst his employees or is offensive in his methods or is committing a breach of any of the previous conditions, such employer may refuse the right of entry, but the representative shall have the right to bring such refusal before this Wages Board.

DILUTION OF LABOUR.

22. For the period of the war employers may engage unskilled adult male labour at operations for which this Determination provides margins, subject to the following conditions :—

- (a) Dilutees may be introduced into the industry to a maximum extent of 10 per cent. of all adult male employees in any factory.
- (b) Dilutees shall be called trainees.
- (c) The basic wage adjusted in accordance with clause 25 shall be paid to trainees for the first three months of their employment and thereafter they shall be classified according to the particular work which they appear most suitable and be paid as follows :—

Second three months—Basic wage referred to above and 25 per cent. of the difference between such basic wage and the appropriate rate fixed for the class of work performed.

Third three months—Basic wage referred to above and 50 per cent. of the difference between such basic wage and the appropriate rate fixed for the class of work performed.

Fourth three months—Basic wage referred to above and 75 per cent. of the difference between such basic wage and the appropriate rate fixed for the class of work performed.

- (d) At the end of twelve months, trainees shall be paid the full Determination rates unless the employer desires to extend the period of training. . In such case he shall have the right of appeal to a joint committee composed of four representatives respectively of employees and employers, appointed under the provisions of the Federal Award for the Federated Furnishing Trade Society of Australasia. In the event of such committee failing to agree on any matter, the members thereof shall have the right to submit any matter in dispute to this Wages Board.
- (e) All trainees engaged under this clause shall be registered by the joint committee.

PIECEWORK.

23. The employer may fix his own piecework prices or task rates, provided such prices or rates enable an employee of average capacity working under like conditions to earn at least 10 per cent. more than the minimum weekly wage prescribed for the class of work performed. The same piecework prices shall be paid to all pieceworkers doing the same operation in the factory, whether they be apprentices or improvers on piecework, or otherwise.

All pieceworkers who are available and ready and willing to work during the ordinary working hours shall be paid in each week, in the case of males not less than 101s., and in the case of females not less than 63s.

PERIODICAL ADJUSTMENT OF WAGES.

24. The wages rates set out in clause 3 are based upon the following basic wage for adult males and minimum wage for adult females, and, pursuant to the provisions of section 21 of the *Factories and Shops Act 1934*, shall be automatically increased or decreased by the same amount and at the same time as such basic wage and minimum wage.

The basic wage rates and minimum wage rates shown hereunder shall be adjusted as prescribed in clause 25.

ADJUSTMENT OF BASIC WAGE FOR ADULT MALES AND MINIMUM WAGE FOR ADULT FEMALES.

25. (a) Until the beginning of the first pay period to commence in August, 1946, the amounts of the basic wage and the minimum wage for females shall be as prescribed in clause 24.

(b) During each future period of or near a quarter beginning with the first pay period to commence in an August, a November, a February, or a May, the amounts of the needs basic wage shall be adjusted by the following method according to the position and fluctuations (if any) of the Commonwealth Statistician's "All Items" Retail Price Index Numbers.

For the purposes of this Determination the expression "Commonwealth Statistician's Retail Price Index Numbers" or any like expression means the numbers stated to be such Index Numbers in any document purporting, and not proved to be wrongly so purporting, to be printed by the Commonwealth Government Printer or to be signed by or on behalf of the Commonwealth Statistician.

(1) The Index Number set to be applied to a place is that assigned thereto in clause 24.

(2) The Index Number for the calendar quarter next preceding the period of or near a quarter for which the adjustment is made is to be ascertained.

(3) The amounts assigned in the following table (or any extension thereof) to the Index Number Division comprising that Number are to be ascertained.

(4) The needs basic wage and minimum wage for adult females shall be those assigned amounts during such period of or near a quarter.

(c) The amounts of the weekly rates for apprentices and improvers shall be adjusted proportionately to the basic wage, and shall accord with the rates payable from time to time under the appropriate Award of the Commonwealth Court of Conciliation and Arbitration.

(d) The rates for pieceworkers shall be increased or decreased in the same proportion as the rate for the journeymen or journeymen in the respective classes.

3. "Confectioner" means an adult male, not expressly included in the definition of a machinist or general hand employed—
- (i) handling or dealing with confectionery in any process of manufacture from raw materials such as sugar, glucose, gelatine, gum, or licorice, chocolate or similar material to the finished article, and includes an employee who runs by hand with any kind of funnel or bag jubes, jellies, cream fondant, snowballs, or other articles which are run into stamped or moulded starch trays or other moulded receptacles; or
  - (ii) operating or controlling any of the following machines :—  
 Chocolate dipping or covering machines.  
 Licorice making or shaping machine.  
 Depositing machine.  
 Cocoa bean roaster.  
 Milk chocolate condenser.  
 Lozenge stamping machine.  
 Lozenge cutting machine.  
 Mogul depositing machine.
  - (iii) any male employee engaged continuously tempering chocolate in quantities in excess of one cwt. at a time.

"Machinist" means an adult male employed operating any one or more of the following machines :—

- Combined refiner and melanguer.
- Melanguer.
- Refiners.
- Conches.
- Cocoa mill.
- Cocoa butter press.
- Neat work mill.
- Liquor mill.
- Gum refining.

"General hand" means a male employee engaged on one or more of the following operations :—

- Grinding nuts.
- Stirring gum or syrup.
- Smoothing, emptying, sieving starch trays.
- Cleaning confectionery.
- Washing tins or bottles with a capacity of over 4 lb.
- Stamping lozenges.
- Marking toffee on slabs.
- Rolling confectionery, sticks or balls.
- Blanching nuts by machine.
- Cutting confectionery by hand or vertical or circular cutting machine.
- Grinding figs, acids, and other ingredients used in the trade.
- Weighing confectionery and ingredients (over 30 lb.).
- Straining syrup or other material used in the trade.
- All handling of confectionery or ingredients in the manufacture of confectionery.
- Up-ending sugar or lumping sugar.
- Glazing confections.
- Cutting neat work.
- Coating boiled goods with such ingredients as dry sugar or cocoanut, &c.
- Feeding Forgrove and similar machines (except universal type).

**GENERAL WORKERS.**—Means a female employed at nailing up boxes, except in the despatch or bulk or receiving store, tying up boxes, bottles, tins or parcels, tinning up, boxing or packing under 30 lb. in weight; wrapping; packing stock boxes or tins or bottles; labelling; picking nuts or fruit or confection; spreading pool or confections; sieving; cutting fruit or ginger; cleaning; washing tins or bottles with a capacity of 4 lb. or under; plain piping or dotting or glazing novelties; marking confectionery; blanching nuts by hand; separating confectionery; cutting confectionery (excepting lozenges or goods of similar nature); coating jellies or other confections with such ingredients as dry sugar or cocoanut; all handling of confectionery directly it leaves the confectioner or the machine; packing confections; stirring confectionery or ingredients (if over 30 lb. to be done by males only); icing novelties; carrying goods, materials, or utensils; filling dates with cream; placing nuts on paste; and other unskilled or labouring work, except in the despatch or bulk receiving store.

**CHOCOLATE OR FRENCH CREAM DIPPERS.**—Means a female engaged in dipping by hand or fork goods in chocolate, French cream, or other substance, or covering by hand or fork goods with chocolate, French cream, or other substance.

**BULK DIPPERS OR NOVELTY DIPPERS.**—Means a female who at one operation dips or covers a number of confections in or with chocolate or other material by means of wire frames, strainers, or other utensils, or persons filling or turning out chocolate goods moulded in or on metal.

## STARCH WORK.

4. (a) Any employee whether an adult or junior employed on starch boxes shall be paid 2s. 6d. per week in addition to the prescribed rate.
- (b) An employer shall not employ any person under 18 years of age on starch boxes.
- (c) An employer shall not employ females on smoothing starch trays or emptying or sieving starch trays with or without confections in them.

## SPECIAL RATES.

5. (a) All female employees employed on any work which is usually performed by males, according to the classifications and definitions, shall be paid at the rate of wages operating for males for such work.

(b) A dust allowance of 2s. 6d. per week shall be paid to employees working in the following sections of the plant :—

- Chocolate mixing from powder in werner mixers and melanguer.
- V.G. crumb platform in chocolate mill.
- Feeding cocoa weighing room weighing machines.
- Icing sugar mill.
- Cocoa mill.
- Mogul machine work.

## PROHIBITED WORK.

6. (a) No female under the age of eighteen (18) years shall be permitted to lift or carry more than 25 lb. in weight, and no female over eighteen (18) years shall be permitted to lift or carry more than 30 lb. in weight or stir confectionery or any other ingredients over 30 lb. in weight.

(b) Males under 18 years of age shall not be permitted to pull trucks or other conveyances of a greater load than 5 cwt. gross weight.

## HOURS.

7. The ordinary working hours shall not exceed 44 per week to be worked in five days of 8 hours 48 minutes each to be worked continuously, except for a meal break as prescribed, between 7 a.m. and 5.30 p.m. on Monday to Friday inclusive.

Provided that the spread of hours herein prescribed may be altered by mutual agreement between an employer and his employees.



## MEAL BREAKS.

8. (a) Employees shall be allowed a meal break of not less than half an hour between the hours of noon and 2 p.m. on each day Monday to Friday inclusive.

(b) An employee shall not be worked for more than five hours without a break for a meal.

(c) All time worked during the time ordinarily observed by an employee as his or her meal break shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

## SMOKO OR REST PERIOD.

9. All employees shall be allowed a ten minute smoko or rest period each morning.

## CONTRACT OF EMPLOYMENT.

10. (a) Employment shall be by the week and shall be terminated by a week's notice on either side, such notice to be given at any time during the week. This shall not affect the right of an employer to dismiss an employee without notice for malingering, inefficiency, neglect of duty, or misconduct (and in such cases wages shall be paid up to the time of dismissal only), or to deduct payment for any day the employee cannot be usefully employed because of any strike by the Association or any other organization or association or through any breakdown of machinery or any stoppage of work by any cause which the employer cannot reasonably prevent, or through slackness of work, or through the closing of factories between Christmas and New Year. This clause shall not apply to workers on night shift.

(b) Any employee not attending for duty shall lose his or her pay for the actual time of such non-attendance unless he or she produces or forwards within 48 hours of the commencement of such absence evidence satisfactory to the management that his or her non-attendance was due to personal accident arising out of and in the course of his or her employment or to personal ill health necessitating such absence:

Provided that an employee shall not be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal accident or personal ill health or both for more than 44 hours of working time in each year.

## SHIFT WORK.

11. For the purposes of this clause:—

(1) "Afternoon shift" means any shift finishing after 6 p.m. and at or before midnight.

"Night shift" means any shift finishing subsequent to midnight and at or before 9 a.m.

"Rostered shift" means a shift of which the employee concerned has had 48 hours notice.

(2) (a) The ordinary hours of shift workers shall not exceed—44 in any week to be worked in five shifts of 8 hours 48 minutes on Monday to Friday inclusive.

(b) Such ordinary hours shall be worked continuously except for meal breaks at the discretion of the employer. An employee shall not be required to work for more than five hours without a break for a meal.

(c) Except at regular change-over of shifts an employee shall not be required to work more than one shift in each 24 hours.

(d) Shift workers whilst on afternoon or night shifts shall be paid 10 per cent. more than ordinary rates for such shifts. The minimum payment for an adult on afternoon or night shift shall be 10s. per week. Juniors shall receive the adult general hand rate.

(e) Subject to this sub-clause shift workers for all time worked on a Sunday or holiday shall be paid at the rates prescribed for holidays and Sunday work. Where shifts commence between 11 p.m. and midnight on Sundays and/or holidays, the time so worked before midnight shall not entitle the employee to the Sunday or holiday rate; provided that the time worked by an employee on a shift commencing before midnight on the day preceding a Sunday or holiday and extending into a Sunday or holiday shall be regarded as time worked on such Sunday or holiday.

(f) Shift workers for all time worked in excess of or outside the ordinary working hours or on a shift other than a rostered shift shall be paid at the rate of time and a half for the first four hours and double time thereafter except when the time is worked

(i) by arrangement between the employees themselves;

(ii) for the purpose of effecting the customary rotation of shifts.

(g) Shift workers who work on any afternoon or night shift which does not continue for at least five successive afternoons or nights shall be paid at the rate of time and a half.

(h) Female shift workers whilst on afternoon and night shifts, shall be paid not less than the rates hereinbefore prescribed or 1s. per shift whichever is the higher.

(i) The method of working shifts may in any case be varied by agreement between the employer and the union to suit the circumstances of the establishment.

## OVERTIME AND SUNDAY WORK.

12. (a) All time worked outside the ordinary hours shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four hours and double time thereafter.

(b) All time worked on a Sunday shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

(c) A male employee who is called upon to work overtime beyond one hour and who has not been notified when ceasing work on the previous day that he is required to work overtime shall be supplied with a meal or be paid an allowance of 1s. 6d. If such notice as aforesaid is given and the employee attends and is not required to work overtime he shall be paid the 1s. 6d. allowance. A female employee shall be paid 1s. 6d. meal allowance on any day which she is required to work overtime.

## HOLIDAYS.

13. (a) All employees shall be entitled without loss of pay to the following holidays or any days observed in lieu thereof:—New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, King's Birthday, Christmas Day, Boxing Day, Melbourne Cup Day, and Union Picnic Day.

(b) "Union Picnic Day" shall be a day (other than a Saturday or Sunday) set apart for the holding of a picnic, and such day shall be arranged between the employers and the Union and no employee shall be entitled to payment for such day unless a ticket for the picnic has been purchased.

(c) Employees working on any of the holidays mentioned in sub-clause (a) hereof shall in addition to the prescribed wage be paid at the rate of ordinary time for the time worked with a minimum payment as for four hours.

(d) An employer shall not terminate the employment of an employee for the purpose of evading payment for the holidays mentioned in sub-clause (a) hereof.

(e) Employees shall be entitled to and receive payment for the holidays as prescribed in sub-clause (a) hereof, provided that they shall be available for duty on the last working day their services are required preceding and the first working day following such holiday, provided that the employees may be absent with the consent of either the manager or the head of the department in which the employee is working.

(f) Pieceworkers working on any of the holidays mentioned in sub-clause (a) hereof shall in addition to the piecework earnings be paid at the rate of ordinary time for such holiday.

## ANNUAL LEAVE.

14. (a) Except as hereinafter provided, a period of 14 consecutive days' leave shall be allowed annually to an employee after twelve months' continuous service (less the period of annual leave) as an employee in any one or more of the occupations to which this Determination applies.

*Seven-day Shift Workers.*

(b) In addition to the leave hereinbefore prescribed seven-day shift workers, that is shift workers who are rostered to work regularly on Sundays and holidays shall be allowed seven consecutive days' leave including non-working days.

Where an employee with twelve months' continuous service is engaged for part of the twelve-monthly period as a seven-day shift worker, he shall be entitled to have the period of fourteen consecutive days' annual leave prescribed in sub-clause (a) hereof increased by half a day for each month he is continuously engaged as aforesaid.

*Annual Leave Exclusive of Public Holidays.*

(c) Subject to this sub-clause the annual leave prescribed by this clause shall be exclusive of any of the holidays prescribed by clause 13 of this Determination and if any such holiday falls within an employee's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that employee would have been an ordinary working day there shall be added to that period one working day for each such holiday falling as aforesaid.

Where a holiday falls as aforesaid and the employee fails without reasonable cause proof whereof shall be upon him to attend for work on the working day immediately preceding the first day or at his ordinary starting time on the working day immediately following the last day of the period of his annual leave he shall not be entitled to be paid for any such holiday.

*Broken Leave.*

(d) The annual leave shall be given and taken in a continuous period or, if the employer and employee so agree, in two separate periods and not otherwise.

*Calculation of Continuous Service.*

(e) For the purpose of this clause service shall be deemed to be continuous notwithstanding—

- (i) any interruption or determination of the employment by the employer if such interruption or determination has been made merely with the intention of avoiding obligations hereunder in respect of leave of absence;
- (ii) any absence from work on account of sickness or accident or on account of leave lawfully granted by the employer; or
- (iii) any absence with reasonable cause proof whereof shall be upon the employee.

In calculating the period of twelve months' continuous service any such absence as aforesaid shall not except to the extent of not more than 14 days in a twelve-monthly period in the case of sickness or accident, be taken into account in calculating the period of twelve months' continuous service.

In cases of personal sickness or accident or absence with reasonable cause the employee to become entitled to the benefit of this clause shall, within 48 hours of the commencement of his absence, submit evidence satisfactory to the employer that his absence is due to personal sickness, accident or reasonable cause and shall if practicable inform the employer in writing of the nature of the illness injury or other cause of absence and the estimated duration of absence.

Any absence from work by reason of any cause not being a cause specified in this clause shall not be deemed to break the continuity of service for the purposes of this clause unless the employer during the absence or within 14 days of the termination of the absence notifies the employee in writing that such absence will be regarded as having broken the continuity of service.

In cases of individual absenteeism such notice shall be given in writing to the employee concerned, but in cases of concerted or collective absenteeism notice may be given to employees by the posting up of a notification in the plant, in the manner in which general notifications to employees are usually made in that plant and by posting to the union whose members have participated in such concerted or collective absenteeism a copy of same not later than the day it is posted up in the plant.

A notice to an individual employee may be given by delivering same to him personally or by posting it to his last recorded address in which case it shall be deemed to have reached him in due course of post.

*Calculation of Service.*

(f) Service before 1st January, 1946, shall be taken into consideration for the purpose of calculating annual leave but an employee shall not be entitled to leave or payment in lieu thereof for any period in respect of which leave or a payment in lieu thereof has been made under the clause hereby varied. Provided however, that in respect of service before the 1st January, 1946, the annual leave shall be allowed at the rate of 3½ hours for each completed one month of continuous service and in respect of service after that date at the rate of 7½ hours for each completed one month of service. Any broken part of a month served before the 1st January, 1946, shall for the purpose of this clause be deemed to be service after the 1st January, 1946. The period of annual leave to be allowed under this sub-clause shall be calculated to the nearest day any broken part of a day in the result not exceeding half a day to be disregarded.

Where the employer is a successor or assignee or transferee of the business if an employee was in the employment of the employer's predecessor at the time when he became such successor or assignee or transferee the employee in respect of the period during which he was in the service of the predecessor shall for the purpose of this clause be deemed to be in the service of the employer.

*Calculation of Month.*

(g) For the purpose of this clause a month shall be reckoned as commencing with the beginning of the first day of employment or period of employment in question and as ending at the beginning of the day which in the latest month in question has the same date number as that which the commencing day had in its month and if there is no such day in such subsequent month shall be reckoned as ending at the end of such subsequent month.

*Leave to be Taken.*

(h) The annual leave provided for by this clause shall be allowed and shall be taken and except as provided by sub-clause (l) hereof payment shall not be made or accepted in lieu of annual leave.

*Time for Taking Leave.*

(i) Annual leave shall be given at a time fixed by the employer within a period not exceeding six months from the date when the right to annual leave accrued and after not less than two weeks' notice to the employee.

*Leave Allowed Before Due Date.*

(j) An employer may allow annual leave to an employee before the right thereto has accrued due but where leave is taken in such a case a further period of annual leave shall not commence to accrue until after the expiration of the twelve months in respect of which annual leave has been taken before it is accrued.

Where leave has been granted to an employee pursuant to this sub-clause before the right thereto has accrued due and the employee subsequently leaves or is discharged from the service of the employer before completing the twelve months continuous service in respect of which the leave was granted the employer may for each one complete month of the qualifying period of twelve months not served by the employee deduct from whatever remuneration is payable upon the termination of the employment one twelfth of the amount of wage paid on account of annual leave, which amount shall not include any sums paid for any of the holidays prescribed by clause 13 of this Determination.

*Payment for Period of Leave.*

(k) Each employee before going on leave shall be paid two weeks' wages except a seven-day shift worker who shall be paid the amount of wage he would have received in respect of the ordinary time which he would have worked had he not been on leave during the relevant periods. For the purpose of this sub-clause and sub-clause (l) hereof wages shall be at the rate prescribed by clauses 2, 4 and 5 of this Determination for the occupation in which the employee was ordinarily employed prior to the commencement of his leave or the termination of his employment as the case may be. Payment in the case of employees employed on piece or bonus work or any other system of payment by results shall be at time rates.

*Proportionate Leave on Dismissal.*

(l) If after one month's continuous service in any qualifying twelve-monthly period an employee lawfully leaves his employment or his employment is terminated by the employer through no fault of the employee the employee shall be paid at his ordinary rate of wage for 3½ hours in respect of each completed one month of continuous service before the 1st January, 1946, and for 7½ hours at the same rate in respect of each completed month of continuous service after that date, the service in each case being service in respect of which leave has not been granted hereunder.

*Annual Close Down.*

- (m) Where an employer closes down his plant, or a section or sections thereof, for the purpose of allowing annual leave to all or the bulk of the employees in the plant, or section or sections concerned, the following provisions shall apply—
- (i) He may by giving not less than one month's notice of his intention so to do, stand off for the duration of the close down all employees in the plant or section or sections concerned, and allow to those who are not then qualified, for two full weeks' leave paid leave on a proportionate basis of one-sixth of a week's leave for each completed month of continuous service.
  - (ii) An employee who has then qualified for two full weeks' leave and has also completed a further month or more of continuous service shall be allowed his leave and shall also be paid one-sixth of a week's wages in respect of each completed month of continuous service performed since the close of his last twelve-monthly qualifying period.
  - (iii) The next twelve-monthly qualifying period for each employee affected by such close down shall commence from the day on which the plant, or section or sections concerned is reopened for work.
  - (iv) If in the first year of his service with an employer an employee is allowed proportionate annual leave under paragraph (i) hereof, and subsequently within such year lawfully leaves his employment or his employment is terminated by the employer through no fault of the employee, he shall be entitled to the benefit of sub-clause (i) of this clause subject to adjustment for any proportionate leave which may have been allowed as aforesaid.

*Disputes.*

- (n) Any dispute arising in connexion with annual leave shall be referred to the Wages Board for decision.

## PAYMENT OF WAGES.

15. (a) All wages shall be paid not later than Friday in each week.  
 (b) An employer shall not keep more than two days' pay in hand:  
 Provided that in those cases in which three days' pay was on the 20th day of November, 1939, kept in hand the employer may continue to keep not more than that number of days' pay in hand.  
 (c) If an employee leaves his or her employment or is dismissed he or she shall, provided that the necessary money is then available at the factory office be paid his or her wages upon leaving or being dismissed.  
 (d) All wages shall be paid during working hours.

## MIXED FUNCTIONS.

16. When an employee is put to work temporarily on work of a classification higher than that under which he or she was engaged or deemed to be working, he or she shall be paid the higher rate prescribed for the higher classification for the time he or she is occupied upon such work.

## DINING ROOM ACCOMMODATION.

17. The employer shall provide for employees proper dining room accommodation and a sufficient quantity of boiling water at meal hours. The employer shall also provide a heating apparatus in the dining room where more than three females are employed.

## WASHING FACILITIES.

18. The employer shall provide suitable washing facilities for employees.

## LOCKERS AND DRESSING ROOM.

19. The employer shall provide a cloak and dressing room, and suitable lockers for the use of female employees.

## OVERALLS AND TOOLS OF TRADE.

20. (a) Where an employee is required by the employer to wear overalls, caps, uniforms, aprons, &c., other than those normally worn in his or her occupation the employer shall supply the same.  
 (b) The employer shall provide all tools of trade required and used by employees in the course of their employment.

## SEATING ACCOMMODATION (FEMALES ONLY).

21. Where practicable the work of the employee shall be performed sitting or standing, whichever is the more convenient. Where practicable the employees shall have the right to change the position of the work either from sitting to standing or from standing to sitting position at any time they feel disposed during working hours unless impracticable owing to the nature of the work.

## FIRST AID.

22. The employer shall provide and maintain in every factory or workshop a properly equipped first aid ambulance chest, which shall be a suitable dustproof receptacle made of either metal or wood and shall make it available for the use of employees in some accessible place in the said factory or workshop.

## UNION BUSINESS.

23. (a) Officials of the Federated Confectioners Association of Australia and The Federated Storeman and Packers Union of Australia may absent themselves from work without pay to attend to the business of the Association, or Union if they give at least one day's notice to the employer.  
 (b) An employer shall not prevent the secretary of such Association or Union or any official thereof authorized by the Association or Union from visiting or conversing with the members of the Association or Union at meal times or before or after the hours of work in a place mutually agreed upon by the employer or his works manager and the Association or Union secretary or other authorized official.

## FACILITIES FOR UNION OFFICERS AND MEMBERS (FEMALES ONLY).

24. At each factory reasonable facilities shall be afforded members and officers of the Female Confectioners Union to interview the employees during lunch time, and for the necessary working connexion with the Union, and the Union shall be permitted to post a copy of the Determination and the Union notices on a board in a prominent position in each factory.

## TIME AND WAGES BOOK.

25. (a) Each employer shall keep at his factory or at an office convenient thereto a time and wages book in which he shall enter or cause to be entered the name and classification of each employee, the times of starting and ceasing work each day, the amount of overtime worked and the wages and overtime paid to each employee.  
 (b) Such book shall, on demand, be produced by the employer for inspection to an official of the Federated Confectioners Association of Australia, Female Confectioners Union, or The Federated Storeman and Packers Union of Australia duly authorized in writing, by the president or secretary of the local branch of the Association or Union concerned at the place where the book is kept at any time between the hours of 10 a.m. and noon on any day except pay day or the day before pay day between the 1st to the 27th inclusive of each calendar month.

No authority to inspect shall be given by the Association or Union concerned unless the president or secretary has good reason to suspect that the employer, whose book is to be inspected, is committing or has committed a breach of this Determination.

(c) Any employer who provides a mechanical clock for the purpose of recording the time of employees may for the purpose of this clause and in lieu of a time and wages book keep the cards or check used in connexion with such clock if such card or check contain the particulars prescribed by sub-clause (a) hereof.

PIECEWORK (FEMALES ONLY).

26. Any employer may fix and pay piecework prices to any person or class of persons employed at any work which the minimum wage has been provided for under this Determination, provided that any such employer shall base such piecework prices on the earnings of an average adult worker, with reasonable effort, working under like conditions, at the weekly adult minimum rate and such piecework prices shall be fixed so that an average worker can earn no less than 10 per cent. above the adult wages that are fixed by this Determination for such work.

Any alteration to the minimum wage shall apply to pieceworkers by adding to, or subtracting from the same amount to the pieceworkers wage.

(c) In the event of a pieceworker being placed on new work not earning the adult minimum wage through no fault of her own, she shall be paid the existing adult wage.

WAITING TIME FOR PIECEWORKERS (FEMALES ONLY).

27. Pieceworkers who are waiting for work on or about the factory or workshop of the employer must be paid for such waiting time a sum calculated on the basis of the weekly wage.

OVERTIME RATES FOR PIECEWORKERS (FEMALES ONLY).

28. All work performed before or after the regular working hours as per clause 7 shall be paid for at piecework rates plus 50 per centum for the first four hours and thereafter at double the ordinary piecework rates.

All overtime rates earned by a pieceworker shall be paid in full and no deduction shall be made from such overtime rates by reason of any time not worked by such employee.

PERIODICAL ADJUSTMENT OF WAGES.

29. The wages rates for adults set out in clause 2 are based upon the following basic wage for adult males and minimum wage for adult females, and, pursuant to the provisions of Section 21 of the *Factories and Shops Act 1934* the Board hereby determines that such wages rates shall be automatically increased or decreased by the same amount and at the same time as such basic wage and minimum wage.

The basic wage rates and minimum wage rates shown hereunder shall be adjusted as prescribed in clause 30.

ADJUSTMENT OF BASIC WAGE FOR ADULT MALES AND MINIMUM WAGE FOR ADULT FEMALES.

30. (a) Until the beginning of the first pay period to commence in August, 1946, the amounts of the basic wage for adult males and minimum wage for adult females shall be as prescribed in clause 29.

(b) During each future period of or near a quarter beginning with the first pay period to commence in an August, a November, a February, or a May, the amounts of the needs basic wage for adult males and minimum wage for adult females shall be adjusted by the following method according to the position and fluctuations (if any) of the Commonwealth Statistician's "All Items" Retail Price Index Numbers.

For the purposes of this Determination the expression "Commonwealth Statistician's Retail Price Index Numbers" or any like expression means the numbers stated to be such Index numbers in any document purporting, and not proved to be wrongly so purporting, to be printed by the Commonwealth Government Printer or to be signed by or on behalf of the Commonwealth Statistician.

- (1) The Index Number set to be applied to a place is that assigned thereto in clause 29.
- (2) The Index Number for the calendar quarter next preceding the period of or near a quarter for which the adjustment is made is to be ascertained.
- (3) The amounts assigned in the following table (or any extension thereof) to the Index Number Division comprising that Number are to be ascertained.
- (4) The needs basic wage for adult males and minimum wage for adult females shall be of those assigned amounts during such period of or near a quarter.
