ACTS OF PARLIAMENT.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

I, THE Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, do hereby declare that I have this day assented, in His Majesty's name, to the Bills passed by the Parliament of the said State, the titles whereof are hereunder set forth, that is to say:—

- No. 5508. "An Act relating to Sports in connexion with the Celebration of the Jubilee of the Commonwealth of Australia and the Centenary of Government in Victoria."
- No. 5509. "An Act to provide for the Dismantling of Sections of certain Railways, and for other purposes."
- No. 5510. "An Act to adjust the Common Boundaries of Two Reserves in the City of Geelong."
- No. 5511. "An Act to amend the Coal Mine Workers Pensions Acts."
- No. 5512. "An Act to increase the Fees for Licences to drive Motor Cars, to make Provision in respect of the Finances of Municipalities the Country Roads Board and other Public Authorities, and for other purposes."
- No. 5513. "An Act relating to the Salaries of certain Public Officers."
- No. 5514. "An Act to make further provision with respect to the Scheme for the Development of the Brown Coal Briquette Industry in the Latrobe Valley, and to increase the Borrowing Powers of the State Electricity Commission of Victoria, and for other purposes."

No. 5524. "An Act to remove Doubts as to the Validity of the Trusts of a Pension Fund established under a Trust Instrument of McPherson's Proprietary Limited, to provide for the Alteration of the said instrument and to incorporate the Trustees of the said Fund."

No. 5525. "An Act to amend Section Seventy-one of the Landlord and Tenant Act 1948."

No. 5526. "An Act to enable the Governor in Council to declare the Shire of Braybrook a City, and for other purposes."

No. 5527. "An Act to apply a sum out of the Consolidated Revenue to the service of the year ending on the thirtieth day of June One thousand nine hundred and fifty-one, and to appropriate the Supplies granted in this Session of Parliament."

At wrapping or packing washing soap or soap extract.

In the Candles section of the industry—

At packing candles in boxes or wrapping or labelling candles.

In the Polishing Materials section of the industry—

At wrapping, packing, bottling, labelling, tinning or putting up, filling, weighing or closing.
