Prices Regulation Acts.

PRICES REGULATION ORDER No. 213.

CANNED MEATS.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the Prices Regulation Acts, I, John Francis Waldron, Prices Decontrol Commissioner, hereby make the following Order:—

Citation.

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 213.

Definition.

2. "Prevailing price" means in relation to the sale of canned meats by any person the price at which that person sold canned meats on the 26th day of January, 1951, upon substantially the same terms and conditions, or if no sale of canned meats was made by that person on that date, on substantially the same terms and conditions, then the expression shall mean the price on the last preceding date upon which a sale of canned meats was made by that person upon substantially the same terms and conditions.

Maximum Price.

3. I hereby fix and declare the maximum price at which any canned meats may be sold to be the prevailing price.

Maximum Prices for Canned Meats not Previously Sold.

4. I fix and declare the maximum price at which any person may sell any canned meats, which are not substantially identical with any canned meats which he sold on or prior to the twenty-sixth day of January, 1951, to be the cost of the goods to that person: Provided that on application by any person the maximum price at which those canned meats may be sold shall be such price as is fixed by notice by the Prices Decontrol Commissioner in writing to that person.

General.

5. Every person, other than a retailer, who sells canned meats for which a maximum price is fixed by or under the provisions of this Order shall deliver with the canned meats an invoice or docket containing the following particulars:—

- (a) His name and place of business;
- (b) the name and address of the purchaser of the canned meats;
- (c) the date of the sale of the canned meats;
- (d) the number and class of canned meats comprised in the sale;
- (e) the price per dozen or per unit as the case may be at which each lot of each class is sold.

Fixation of Maximum Price by Notice.

6. Notwithstanding anything contained in the foregoing provision of this Order, I declare the maximum price at which any canned meats may be sold by any person to whom a notice in pursuance of this clause is given to be such price as is fixed by the Prices Decontrol Commissioner by notice in writing to that person.
