Prices Regulation Acts.

PRICES REGULATION ORDER No. 256.

COOKING AND KITCHEN UTENSILS.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the Prices Regulation Acts, I, John Francis Waldron, Prices Decontrol Commissioner, hereby make the following Order:—

Citation.

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 256.

Definitions.

2. In this Order unless the contrary intention appears—

“Cooking and Kitchen Utensils” means any cooking or kitchen utensil other than utensils of china, glass, or earthenware which is or may be used in the kitchen, including—

“Cost” means the purchase price paid or payable for these cooking or kitchen utensils after deduction of any trade discount but before deduction of any cash discount plus packing charges and the cost of transporting (if any) such cooking or kitchen utensils from the point of delivery to the seller's premises and attributable to those cooking or kitchen utensils and properly recorded in his books.

“Landed cost” means in relation to the sale of any cooking or kitchen utensils imported from a source outside the Commonwealth of Australia and purchased from other than a retail trader in the country of export the aggregate of—

- (i) the purchase price paid or payable for those cooking or kitchen utensils after deduction of trade discount, but before deduction of any cash discount;
- (ii) inland carriage charges;
- (iii) outside packing charges;
- (iv) overseas office or forwarding agent's commission actually incurred (but not in excess of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per centum of the gross invoice price of the goods after deduction of trade discount but before deduction of cash discount);
- (v) bill of lading and shipping charges;
- (vi) insurance and freight paid (but not in excess of current standard sea freight rates);
- (vii) exchange and bank fees actually incurred (but not in the case of exchange in excess of mail steamer sight draft rates, and in the case of bank fees three-eighths of 1 per cent.);
- (viii) duty and primage paid;
- (ix) wharfage and stacking charges paid;
- (x) harbour dues stevedoring commission levy paid;
- (xi) customs entry and customs agent's charges paid (but not including any charges for costing or any percentage surcharge on cost); and
- (xii) cartage actually incurred in transporting goods from wharf to store or from wharf to bond only (but not in excess of current standard Master Carriers' Rates).

“Point of delivery” means in relation to the sale of any kitchen or cooking utensils, the place at which liability for payment of transport charges in conveying such cooking or kitchen utensils to his store passed to the wholesale merchant or retail trader (as the case may be) from the person from whom such goods were purchased.

“Cost of transport” means in relation to the sale of cooking or kitchen utensils, the cost of transporting such kitchen or cooking utensils from the point of delivery to the store of the wholesale merchant or retail trader (as the case may be) but, where alternative means of transport are available to such wholesale merchant or retail trader, such cost shall not exceed the cost of the cheapest form of transport so available.

“Wholesale merchant” means in relation to cooking and kitchen utensils a person who purchases cooking or kitchen utensils in a manufactured state and who customarily resells those cooking or kitchen utensils by wholesale.

“Retail trader” means in relation to cooking and kitchen utensils, a person who purchases cooking or kitchen utensils and who customarily sells those cooking or kitchen utensils by retail.

“Prevailing price” means in relation to the sale of kitchen and cooking utensils by any person on any terms and conditions the price at which that person sold kitchen and cooking utensils on the 6th day of April, 1951, upon substantially the same terms and conditions or if no sale of kitchen and cooking utensils was made by that person on that date on substantially the same terms and conditions, then the expression shall mean the price on the last date prior to the 6th April, 1951, upon which a sale of kitchen and cooking utensils was made by that person upon substantially the same terms and conditions.

Maximum Prices—Sales by Manufacturers.

3. I fix and declare the maximum price at which any cooking or kitchen utensils may be sold by any person being a manufacturer to be the prevailing price.

Maximum Prices—Sales by Wholesale Merchants.

4. I fix and declare the maximum price at which any cooking or kitchen utensils may be sold by a wholesale merchant to be the sum of—

- (i) the cost or the landed cost thereof; and
- (ii) 20 per centum of (i).

Maximum Prices—Sales by Retail Traders.

5. I fix and declare the maximum price at which any cooking or kitchen utensil may be sold by a retail trader to be—

(a) in respect of any cooking or kitchen utensil purchased by a retail trader from a wholesale merchant other than the manufacturer, the sum of—

- (i) the cost thereof;
- (ii) sales tax paid or payable thereon; and
- (iii) 25 per centum of the totals of (i) and (ii); and

(b) in respect of any cooking or kitchen utensil purchased by a retail trader from a manufacturer (within Australia) the sum of—

- (i) the cost of that cooking or kitchen utensil, including sales tax paid or payable; and
- (ii) 50 per centum of (i);

(c) in respect of any cooking or kitchen utensil imported by a retail trader from a source outside the Commonwealth of Australia, the sum of—

- (i) the landed cost thereof;
- (ii) sales tax paid or payable thereon; and
- (iii) 50 per centum of the total of (i) and (ii).

Application of Maximum Prices.

6. Any person who purchases for re-sale any cooking or kitchen utensil for which a maximum price is not fixed by or under the provisions of this Order shall not sell such cooking or kitchen utensil unless and until that person has made a written request to the Commissioner to fix the maximum price at which such cooking or kitchen utensil may be sold, and the Commissioner has fixed the maximum price accordingly.

Exhibition of Price Tickets.

7. (1) Every person who sells or has for sale by retail any cooking or kitchen utensil, the maximum price of which is fixed by or under the Prices Regulation Act, shall attach to or display with these goods a ticket or label setting forth his selling price thereof.

(2) Any ticket or label required by sub-clause (1) of this clause to be attached to or displayed with any goods shall be in such form as to be easily legible to any person inspecting or viewing these goods, and as to be properly associated with such goods.

Discounts.

8. Notwithstanding anything contained in this Order, where a seller of cooking or kitchen utensils by wholesale or by retail has customarily allowed any difference in price—

- (a) to any person or to persons included in any class of persons;
- (b) in respect of sales of certain quantities of cooking or kitchen utensils; or
- (c) in respect of sales of cooking or kitchen utensils under certain conditions of sale or upon certain conditions of payment—

the maximum price fixed by or under this Order in respect of these cooking or kitchen utensils shall, in the case of sales to any such person or persons, or of such quantities, or under such conditions, or upon such terms of payment, be reduced by the allowance of that difference.

Fixation of Maximum Prices by Notice.

9. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I declare the maximum price at which cooking or kitchen utensils specified in a notice given in pursuance of this clause may be sold by any person to whom such notice is given to be such price as is fixed by the Commissioner by Notice in Writing to that person.

SPOUTING, RIDGING, DOWNPIPE, SQUARE PIPE OR FITTINGS,
MANUFACTURED FROM GALVANIZED IRON:

Citation.

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 257.

Part Amendment.

2. (1) Prices Regulation Order No. 73 as amended by Prices Regulation Order No. 158 is hereby further amended by omitting the Schedule thereto and inserting in its stead the Schedule to this Order, which Schedule may be cited as the Schedule to Prices Regulation Order No. 73.

(2) Prices Regulation Order No. 158 is hereby revoked.

PRICES REGULATION ORDER No. 258.

BLANKETS, BUNNY RUGS, TRAVELLING RUGS, AND BUSH RUGS—
SALES BY WHOLESALE MERCHANTS AND SALES BY RETAIL.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the Prices Regulation Acts, I, John Francis Waldron, Prices Decontrol Commissioner, hereby make the following Order:—

Citation.

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 258.

Sales by Wholesale Merchants.

2. Prices Regulation Order No. 112 is hereby amended by deleting in Column 2 of The Schedule the figures "10" appearing against item 6 in Column 1 of that Schedule and inserting in its stead the figures "7½".

Sales by Retail.

3. Prices Regulation Order No. 236 is hereby amended—
- (a) by deleting in Column 2 of the First Schedule to that Order the figures "27½" appearing against item 13 in Column 1 of that Schedule and inserting in their stead the figures "20"; and
- (b) by deleting in Column 3 of the First Schedule to that Order the figures "32½" appearing against item 13 in Column 1 of that Schedule and inserting in their stead the figures "25".
