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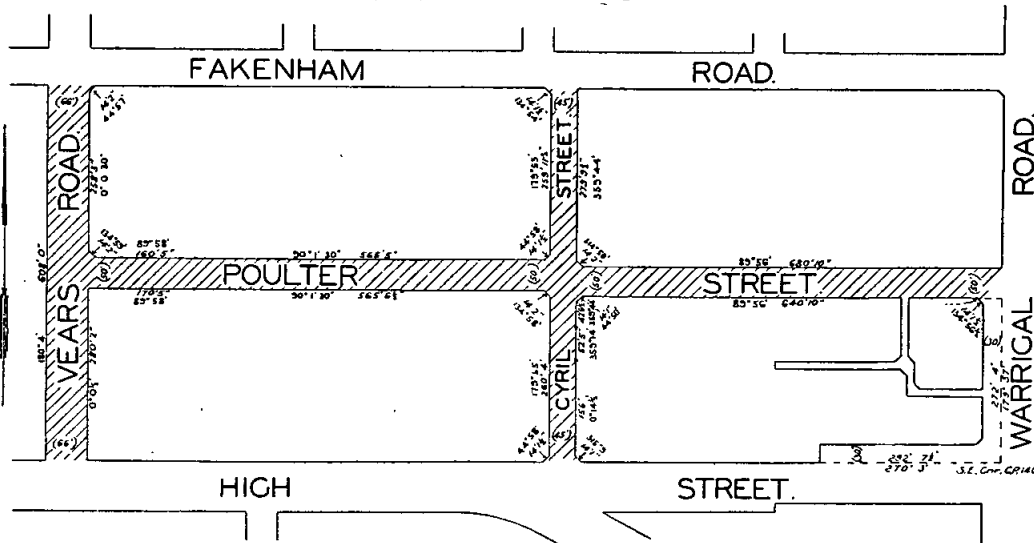

PUBLIC HIGHWAY.—CITY OF CAMBERWELL.

PROCLAMATION

By the Lieutenant-Governor, as Deputy for His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by the *Local Government Act 1946* (No. 5203), section 518, it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council at any time, and from time to time, upon the request of the council of any municipality, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, to declare any land reserved, used, or by purchase or exchange acquired for a street, road, highway, thoroughfare, bridge, square, court, alley, or right-of-way to be a public highway, and that such land shall thereupon and thenceforth from the date of such Proclamation become and be absolutely dedicated to the public as a public highway within the meaning of any law then or thereafter in force: And whereas the Council of the City of Camberwell has requested that the lands hereinafter mentioned, which have been reserved, used or acquired for streets within the City, be so declared to be public highways: Now therefore, I, the Lieutenant-Governor, as Deputy for His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, do, by this Proclamation declare that all those pieces of land being parts of Crown portion 140, Parish of Boroondara, County of Bourke, known as Cyril-street, Vears-road, and Poulter-street, and indicated by hachure on the plan hereunder, shall be public highways within the meaning of the said Act.

PROCLAMATION

PROCLAMATION

SWAN HILL WATERWORKS TRUST.

By-LAW No. 4.

A By-law (No. 4) of the Swan Hill Waterworks Trust made under the powers conferred by the Water Acts for prohibiting the use of water for the operation of automatic water ejectors.

IN pursuance of the powers aforesaid, the Chairman and Commissioners of the Swan Hill Waterworks Trust order as follows:—

1. Interpretations.—In this By-law, unless inconsistent with the context or subject-matter—

“The Act” means the *Water Act 1928*.

“Trust” means the Swan Hill Waterworks Trust.

“Automatic water ejector” means any automatic syphon or cellar pump worked by water pressure from any of the Trust's water mains and used for the removal of water from any cellar, basement or excavation.

“Water main” means any pipe belonging to or under the control of the Trust and used for the conveying or supplying of water.

All words used in this By-law which are also used in the Act shall have the meanings assigned to them by the Act.

2. No person shall use or permit or suffer to be used, any water supplied by the Trust for the operation of any automatic water ejector for the removal of water from any cellar, basement, or excavation.

3. This By-law shall come into operation on the first day of January, 1953, and shall apply to and have operation throughout the whole of the Waterworks District of the Swan Hill Waterworks Trust.

4. Any person who is guilty of any breach of any of the provisions of this By-law shall be liable to a penalty of not more than £5 (Five pounds), and in the case of a continuing offence to a further penalty not exceeding £5 (Five pounds) for every day after notice of the offence from the Trust.

BUILDING OPERATIONS AND BUILDING MATERIALS CONTROL ACTS.

NOTICE OF EXEMPTION.

PURSUANT to the powers conferred by sub-section (2) (j) of section 3 of the *Building Operations and Building Materials Control Act 1946*, I hereby declare that the following classes of building operations are exempt from the provisions of sub-section (1) of section 3 of the said Act:—

1. The erection of, any alteration of, any addition to, or the construction, reconstruction, rebuilding, re-erection, renovation, repair, plastering, panelling, lining, decoration, painting, colouring, whitewashing, or papering of any structure of any of the following kinds (whether carried on at the site or elsewhere and whether above or below the surface) viz.:—

- (a) Any dwelling-house, flat, or other residence;
- (b) any structure used for or in connexion with primary production, or the storage, treatment, or processing of primary products;
- (c) any shop, factory, warehouse, garage, or other commercial building;
- (d) any hospital, school, church, health centre, clinic, or other like premises;
- (e) any theatre, cinema, hall, or clubroom;
- (f) any hotel or boarding-house, or any structure used for the accommodation for rent, hire, gain, or reward of travellers, guests, or holiday makers.

2. The affixing to any structure of any fixtures or fittings.

3. Any work for the provision of water, gas, electricity, sewerage, drainage, heating, ventilation, cooling, refrigeration, or air conditioning, or for the installation of a lift or an escalator.

HOSPITALS AND CHARITIES COMMISSION STAFF ORDERS, 1952.

PURSUANT to the provisions of section 14 of Act No. 5300, His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, hereby approves of the following Orders, fixed by the Hospitals and Charities Commission as the conditions for the employment of the members of its staff:—

1. These conditions of employment shall be known as the "Hospitals and Charities Commission Staff Orders, 1952," and shall, on publication in the *Government Gazette*, be substituted for the "Hospitals and Charities Commission Staff Orders, 1951," as amended by the Governor in Council on the 5th February, 1952.

2. Recreation Leave—

(a) Every officer of the Commission shall be entitled to leave of absence, with pay, for recreation purposes for a period of three weeks in respect of each year; and in respect of part of a year, he shall be entitled to a proportionate period of leave.

(b) The Commission may at such times as may be convenient grant to every officer such leave of absence for recreation purposes, and, when practicable, such leave shall be taken in the year in which it falls due, unless the Commission otherwise directs.

3. Sick Leave—

In the case of illness of an officer, the conditions under which the Commission may grant leave of absence shall be as follows:—

(a) The basis for determining the amount of leave with pay which may be granted shall be ascertained by crediting the officer with the following periods, such leave to be cumulative:—

	Leave on Full Pay.	Leave on Half Pay.
At commencement of duty	16 days.	16 days.

On completion of two years' service and each year's service thereafter	8 days.	8 days.
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On the appointment to the Commission immediately after having been employed by any institution, society, service instrumentality, or authority referred to in Order 3 (e) of these Orders.	The amount of leave to the credit of the officer at the time he ceased to be so employed.	
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(b) If any officer is certified by a legally qualified medical practitioner to be suffering from Poliomyelitis, or the after affects thereof, and to be unfit for duty, leave of absence may be granted on the following terms, viz., six months on full pay and three months on half pay. Any leave so granted in excess of the amount standing to his credit shall not be regarded as a debit against such officer, and on his resumption of duty he shall be entitled to a total initial credit of not less than sixteen days on full pay and sixteen days on half pay.

(c) To determine the leave for which an officer is eligible at any time, all leave granted during his service at rates of full pay and half pay respectively shall be deducted from the appropriate period ascertained under the provisions of the preceding paragraph and the period remaining at each rate of pay shall be the amount of leave for which an officer is eligible; provided that notwithstanding the amount of sick leave standing to the credit of any officer, continuous leave with pay shall not be granted for any period longer than fifty-two weeks inclusive of any recreation leave which may be granted. Where an officer has had fifty-two weeks' continuous leave with pay no further leave with pay shall be granted until such officer has completed a period of duty of not less than four weeks.

- (d) For each week an officer is absent on leave with full pay the amount of leave on full pay standing to his credit shall be reduced by five days.
- (e) For each week an officer is absent on leave with half pay the amount of leave standing to his credit shall be reduced by five days notwithstanding that his pay is reduced to half pay for seven days.
- (f) Where the absence exceeds one or more weeks but does not extend to a further week the number of weeks shall be recorded as hereinbefore provided, and the remaining days shall be debited as a period of less than a week.
- (g) When the period of leave granted to an officer with pay (whether full pay or half pay) does not extend to a week, his appropriate credit shall be reduced by the number of days he would have been required to be on duty if he had not been absent on sick leave.
- (h) For the purposes of these Orders, so far as they relate to sick leave—
- (i) a week shall be deemed to be any period of seven consecutive days inclusive of Sunday;
 - (ii) "service" means continuous service, inclusive of any period of absence on leave, provided that, in determining at any time the amount of leave standing to the credit of an officer who has been absent on leave without pay (other than for the purpose of serving with the Commonwealth Defence Forces) continuously for a period extending beyond six months, such period as is in excess of six months shall not be counted as service.

4. Long-service Leave—

- (a) Every officer of the Commission who has served for twenty years shall be entitled to be granted by the Commission six months' long-service leave with pay in respect of that period of twenty years' service, and one and a half month's long-service leave with pay in respect of each additional period of five years' completed service.
- (b) Where—
- (i) an officer retires on account of age or ill health or dies; or
 - (ii) the appointment of a female officer is terminated on account of or in anticipation of marriage—
- that officer shall be entitled, or (in the case of death) shall be deemed to have been entitled, to be granted by the Commission—
- where the completed years of service are not less than five but are less than twenty, then in respect of such completed years of service;
- where the years of service are more than twenty, then (in addition to any entitlement under clause (a) of this Order) in respect of such completed years of service (not exceeding four) as exceed the next lower multiple of five—
- long-service leave with pay on the basis of one-twentieth of six months' leave for each such completed year.
- (c) The Commission shall have discretion as to the time of granting any leave under this Order.
- (d) Where on account of age or ill health an officer retires, that officer may, by notice in writing to the Commission, elect to take pay in lieu of the whole or any part of any such leave to which he is then entitled, and the Commission shall grant him pay in lieu thereof accordingly.
- (e) Where the appointment of any female officer is terminated on account of or in anticipation of marriage, she may, by notice in writing to the Commission, elect to take pay in lieu of the whole or any part of such leave, and the Commission, on her marriage or in such other special circumstances as the Commission in its discretion determines, shall grant her pay in lieu thereof accordingly.
- (f) Where an officer entitled to any such leave or to pay in lieu thereof dies before or while taking such leave, or (as the case may be) before such pay in lieu is paid, the Commission shall to the extent that pay in lieu

thereof has not already been paid to that officer, grant pay in lieu of the whole or part of the leave not taken, or (as the case may be) grant the pay in lieu to the legal representative of the deceased officer.

- (g) In determining the eligibility of an officer for long-service leave, pursuant to the provisions of these Orders, the aggregate periods of service of such officer shall be taken into consideration.
- (h) For the purposes of this and the preceding Order; "service" of an officer shall include any period or periods of service or employment—
- (i) in the Public Service within the meaning of Part II. of the *Public Service Act 1946*;
 - (ii) in any institution or benevolent society within the meaning of section 3 of the *Hospitals and Charities Act 1948*;
 - (iii) in the Railways Service, as defined in sub-section (4) of section 2 of the *Railways (Long-service) Act 1942*; or
 - (iv) where so determined by the Minister, on the recommendation of the Commission, under any other Victorian Government instrumentality or authority.
- (i) In computing the duration of the service of an officer there shall not be included as a part of service any period or periods of service served by him—
- (i) prior to his having voluntarily left (except for the purposes of being appointed forthwith to any position within the service) or having been dismissed for causes within his own control from any such service; or
 - (ii) prior to his absence from any such service or employment for any continuous period of five years or more (otherwise than on special leave, or on such other leave as the Commission may determine, or by reason of retirement on account of ill health).

5. Cost of Living Allowances—

Every officer of the Commission shall receive, in addition to salary, a cost of living allowance at the same rate as that received by male or female officers (which-ever is appropriate) of the Public Service.

6. Overtime Allowances—

As circumstances require, any officer of the Commission may be directed to remain on duty beyond the normal office hours. Every such officer shall receive, in addition to salary, payment for overtime work at the same hourly rates and subject to similar conditions as those that are applicable to officers of the Public Service under the provisions of the *Public Service Act 1946* and Regulations thereunder.

7. Travelling Expenses—

Every officer of the Commission shall be reimbursed in respect of personal expenses and all costs of conveyance at the same rates and subject to similar conditions as those that are applicable to officers of the Public Service under the provisions of the *Public Service Act 1946*, and Regulations thereunder.

8. Higher Duties Allowances—

- (a) Where an officer is assigned the duties of a position higher than that in which he is classified and the Commission has consented to such duties being so assigned for a period longer than one month, such officer shall be paid an allowance to increase his remuneration to the minimum rate of salary of the higher position, provided that no such allowance shall be paid until the officer has served in that position for a period of one month.
- (b) In all other respects any such officer shall receive payment in respect of the time served in the higher position at the same rates and subject to similar conditions as those that are applicable to officers of the Public Service under the provisions of the *Public Service Act 1946*, and Regulations thereunder.

And the Honorable William Oliver Fulton, Her Majesty's Minister of Health for the State of Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by sections 21 and 58 of the *Country Roads Act 1928* (No. 3662) it is amongst other things enacted that when the Country Roads Board under the provisions of the Country Roads Act has by Resolution declared a deviation to be a Main Road the said Board may also declare that such deviation shall be in lieu of any existing road or part thereof named in such Resolution and that on publication in the *Government Gazette* of the Order confirming such Resolution the existing road or part thereof shall cease to be a main road or be discontinued as provided in the Resolution: And whereas the said Board has by Resolution declared the deviation on the land described in the First Schedule to such Resolution to be a main road and has also declared that such deviation shall be in lieu of the part of the existing road being the land described in the Second Schedule to the said Resolution and that such part of the said existing road shall be discontinued: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof doth hereby confirm the said Resolution.

Resolution for Declaration of a Deviation under the
Country Roads Act.

Whereas the land the site of the road the course of which is below set out was taken by the Board under the provisions of the *Country Roads Act 1928* for the purpose of constructing such road deviation which road deviation has now been laid out and formed on the same: And whereas the said Board (being the Country Roads Board incorporated under the said Act) thinks that the road aforesaid is fit to be used as a public highway such Board at a meeting now holden acting under the authority conferred upon it by sections 21 and 58 of the said Act doth by this present Resolution hereby declare the said road deviation the course of which is described in the First Schedule hereto with the commencing and terminating points thereof respectively specified to be part of a main road within the meaning and for the purposes of the *Country Roads Act 1928*: And the said Board doth also declare that such deviation shall be in lieu of the existing road or part thereof described in the Second Schedule hereto and that such part of the said existing road shall be discontinued.

RADIO TRADESMAN TRADE APPRENTICESHIP REGULATIONS.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the Apprenticeship Acts and the Acts Interpretation Acts, the Lieutenant-Governor, as Deputy for His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby make the following Regulations, that is to say:—

Short Title.

1. These Regulations may be cited as the "Radio Tradesman Trade Apprenticeship Regulations."

Interpretation.

2. In these Regulations—

"Acts" means the Apprenticeship Acts.

"Prescribed" means prescribed by an appropriate industrial authority or agreement or by these Regulations, as the case may require.

"Probationer" means an applicant for apprenticeship employed on probation.

Application of Regulations.

3. These Regulations shall apply only with respect to the following apprenticeship trade, as carried on in the Metropolitan District, viz:—

RADIO TRADESMAN.

Educational Qualifications for Entry into Apprenticeship.

4. Applicants for apprenticeship in the said trade may be required to submit themselves for examination at the time and place determined by the Commission to prove that they possess the preparatory educational qualifications required for entry into apprenticeship in such trade; provided that any such applicant shall be exempted from such examination—

(1) If he possesses any one of the following educational qualifications or, in the opinion of the Commission, the equivalent thereof:—

(a) The Intermediate Technical Certificate or Junior Technical Certificate of the Education Department of Victoria or the School Intermediate Certificate.

(b) The completion, in a manner satisfactory to the Commission, of the third year of the course of study of the Junior Technical Schools of the Education Department of Victoria.

(2) If he satisfies the Commission, in accordance with sub-section (2) of section 18 of the Apprenticeship Act, 1928, that he has not had sufficient opportunity to obtain the preparatory educational qualifications prescribed for entry into the said trade.

Minimum Age for Entry into Apprenticeship.

5. The minimum age at which persons shall enter the said trade as apprentices or probationers shall be fifteen years.

Term of Apprenticeship.

6. The term of apprenticeship in the said trade shall be five years.

Form of Indentures of Apprenticeship.

7. The standard form of indentures of apprenticeship in the said trade, and the terms covenants and conditions thereof, shall be in the form contained in the Seventh Schedule to the General Apprenticeship Regulations, with the following additions thereto:—

Additional Covenants, &c., to General Form of Indentures of Apprenticeship.

EMPLOYER'S COVENANTS.

(1) After clause (f), the following additional clauses shall be inserted:—

- "(g) Not require the apprentice, while under the age of eighteen years, to work overtime or shift work unless he so desires.
- (h) Not require or allow the apprentice, except in an emergency, to work overtime or shift work at times which would prevent his attendance at classes for instruction in the subjects of his apprenticeship course, as required by the General Apprenticeship Regulations.
- (i) Provide the apprentice during the said term with all hand tools necessary for carrying out his work."

APPRENTICE'S AND PARENT'S OR GUARDIAN'S COVENANTS.

(2) After clause (c), the following additional clause shall be inserted:—

- "(d) Replace any of the tools supplied for his use, as hereinbefore provided, if they should be lost or broken through his own carelessness."

MUTUAL AGREEMENTS.

(c) In clause 6, the following additional proviso shall be inserted:—

"Provided further, that in calculating time lost to be served, the apprentice shall be credited with any overtime which he has worked in any week during the relevant year."

Minimum Rates of Wages of Apprentices.

8. The minimum rates of wages to be paid to apprentices in the said trade shall be as follows:—

- 1st year—at the rate of 71s. 6d. per week.
 2nd year—at the rate of 96s. 6d. per week.
 3rd year—at the rate of 121s. 0d. per week.
 4th year—at the rate of 186s. 0d. per week.
 5th year—at the rate of 230s. 0d. per week.

Rates for Overtime and Shift Work.

9. When an apprentice works under conditions for which, or at any time when, a journeyman employed at the aforesaid trade would be entitled to overtime or special rates for doing work under the same conditions or at the same time, then such apprentice shall be paid by the employer for any such work at a rate or rates of wages which shall bear the same proportion to the prescribed minimum rate of wages of such apprentice as the wages of such journeyman for such work would bear to the prescribed minimum rate of wages of such journeyman. Provided, however, that an apprentice shall be paid for overtime worked at a rate not less than 2s. 3d. per hour and for shift work at a rate not less than 1s. 6d. per hour.

Proportion of Apprentices to Journeymen.

10. (1) The number of apprentices who may be employed by any employer at any time in the said trade shall not exceed the proportion of one apprentice to every three or fraction of three journeymen employed by such employer in such trade.

(2) For the purposes of this Regulation—

- (a) an employer working at the trade shall be deemed to be a journeyman;
- (b) the number of journeymen employed at any time shall be deemed to be the average per working day of the number of journeymen employed in the said trade by such employer during the period of six months immediately preceding such time;
- (c) "apprentices" means apprentices or probationers.

And the Honorable Trevor Harvey, Her Majesty's Minister of Labour for the State of Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

A By-law of the Shire of Creswick, made under the Health Acts, and numbered 15, for the regulating or prohibiting of the keeping in any place of any animals, including birds and poultry, within the boundaries of the Town of Creswick, being part of the Borough Riding of the Shire of Creswick.

IN pursuance of the powers contained in the Health Acts and of every other power enabling them on that behalf, the President, Councillors, and Ratepayers of the

Shire of Creswick, for the purpose of carrying the said Acts into execution within their jurisdiction, make the following By-law, that is to say:—

1. All former By-laws, so far as they relate to the matters and things provided for in this By-law, shall be and are hereby repealed.

2. This By-law shall come into full force and operation immediately after its publication in the *Government Gazette* of Victoria.

3. This By-law shall apply to the area defined as the Town of Creswick, in the Parish of Creswick, County of Talbot, and being that part of the Borough Riding of the Shire of Creswick bounded on the north, east, and south by the former Borough of Creswick boundary and on the west by the town boundary commencing at the south-west corner of allotment 14, section A, and extending northerly to meet the borough boundary at its intersection with Clunes-road near the Cemetery Reserve.

4. In this By-law, unless inconsistent with the context or subject matter, "Council" means the Council of the Shire of Creswick; "Inspector" means any officer authorized by the Council, and includes any acting or assistant Inspector; "poultry" means and includes any domestic fowl raised for the table or for their eggs or feathers, and includes cocks, hens, capons, turkeys, ducks, ducklings, geese, and goslings; "poultry yard" includes buildings, pens, roosts, yards, nests, or other places wherein poultry are kept or congregate.

5. If, in the opinion of the Council or its Inspector, the removal of a poultry yard, any part of which is within 25 feet of a house, is necessary for the health of any of the residents in its vicinity, the Council or its Inspector may order the owner or occupier of the premises whereon such poultry yard is situated to remove such portions as may be within 25 feet of any house.

6. No person shall within 25 feet of a house establish or construct or cause, permit, or suffer any poultry yard to be newly constructed or established or within such distance cause, permit, or suffer any land or place to be used afresh or for the first time as a poultry yard.

7. No person shall allow, cause, permit, or suffer any poultry to wander either at large or under control in or upon any street or water course within the defined area.

8. All premises used, kept, or erected in connexion with the keeping or feeding of any animal or any poultry shall at all times be maintained to the satisfaction of the Inspector in a clean and sanitary manner, and in a state of good repair.

9. (a) Any person who fails to do anything directed to be done or does anything forbidden to be done by or under this By-law shall be guilty of an offence against this By-law.

9. (b) Any person guilty of an offence against this By-law shall be liable to a penalty of not more than Twenty pounds, and in the case of a continuing offence to a further daily penalty of not more than Five pounds.

Prices Regulation Acts.

PRICES REGULATION ORDER No. 435.

TOBACCO, CIGARETTES, AND CIGARETTE PAPERS.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the Prices Regulation Acts, I, John Francis Waldron, Prices Commissioner, hereby make the following Order:—

Citation.

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 435.

Revocation.

2. Prices Regulation Order No. 396 is hereby revoked.

Definition and Interpretation.

3. In this Order, unless the contrary intention appears—
 - (a) "Area No. 1" means all that area of Victoria comprised within a radius of 50 miles from the General Post Office, Melbourne.
 - (b) "Area No. 2" means all that area of Victoria not included in Area No. 1.

Maximum Prices—Tobacco, Cigarettes, and Cigarette Papers.

4. I fix and declare the maximum price at which any kind or brand of tobacco, cigarettes, or cigarette papers specified in the Schedule to this Order may be sold by retail to be—

- (a) In Area No. 1, the prices specified in that Schedule; and
- (b) in Area No. 2, the prices specified in that Schedule, provided that in respect of packs of tobacco containing 2 ounces or more, an amount of One halfpenny may be added to the said price.

Maximum Prices—Tobacco and Cigarettes not Specified in the Schedule.

5. I fix and declare the maximum price at which any kind or brand of tobacco and cigarettes not specified in the Schedule to this Order may be sold by retail in Victoria to be—

- (a) in respect of tobacco—1s. 1d. per oz.;
- (b) in respect of cigarettes— $\frac{1}{2}$ d. each.

Exhibition of Price List.

6. Every person who sells or has for sale by retail in Victoria any kind or brand of tobacco, cigarettes, or cigarette papers, the maximum retail selling price of which is fixed under the Prices Regulation Acts, shall exhibit and keep exhibited in a prominent position in his place of business, or if he has more than one place of business, in each of his places of business, a notice or notices setting forth the maximum retail prices fixed by this Order for the sale by him by retail of such tobacco, cigarettes, or cigarette papers. Such notice or notices shall be exhibited in such a place or places in the trader's place of business and be prepared in such a manner as to be easily legible to persons contemplating making any purchase or conducting any business at the trader's place of business.

Fixation of Maximum Prices by Notice.

7. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I declare the maximum prices at which any tobacco, cigarettes, or cigarette papers specified in a notice given in pursuance of this clause may be sold by retail in Victoria by any person to whom such notice is given to be such price as is fixed by the Commissioner by notice in writing to that person.

PRICES REGULATION ORDER No. 436.

BOARD AND LODGING.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the Prices Regulation Acts, I, John Francis Waldron, Prices Commissioner, hereby make the following Order:—

Citation.

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 436.

Revocation.

2. Prices Regulation Order No. 2426, as amended by Prices Regulation Order No. 2486, made under the Commonwealth National Security (Prices) Regulations is hereby revoked.

Definitions.

3. In this Order, unless the context otherwise requires—

“Board and lodging” means—

- (a) board;
- (b) lodging; or
- (c) board and lodging;

“Prescribed date” means, in relation to the supply by any person of any kind of board and lodging, the First day of January, 1951, or if substantially the same kind of board and lodging was not supplied by that person on that date, the last preceding date upon which substantially the same kind of board and lodging was supplied by that person;

“Prevailing rate” means, in relation to the supply of any kind of board and lodging by any person, the rate at which substantially the same kind of board and lodging was supplied by that person on the prescribed date.

Maximum Rate—Board and lodging of a kind supplied on the prescribed date.

4. I fix and declare the maximum rate at which any person may supply any board and lodging of substantially the same kind as board and lodging supplied by that person on the prescribed date to be the prevailing rate for the supply of that kind of board and lodging by that person.

Maximum rates—Board and lodging of a kind different from that supplied on the prescribed date.

5. I fix and declare the maximum rate at which any person may supply board and lodging—

- (a) where on the prescribed date that person did not supply any board and lodging; or
- (b) which is not of substantially the same kind as board and lodging supplied by that person on the prescribed date—

to be such rate as, after application by that person, is fixed by the Commissioner by notice in writing to such person or, until such rate has been fixed by notice as aforesaid, the following rates—

- (i) in respect of any kind of full board and lodging, including the supply of not less than 21 meals weekly—the rate of 42s. per week, or 6s. per day;
- (ii) in respect of any kind of lodging with any meals—the rate of 17s. 6d. per week, or 2s. 6d. per day plus 1s. 3d. for each meal; and
- (iii) in respect of any kind of lodging—the rate of 17s. 6d. per week, or 2s. 6d. per day.

Transfer of business or assets thereof—Transferees' Maximum rates.

6. If any boarding house, lodging house or hotel business or the assets thereof are sold or otherwise transferred after the first day of January, 1951, and the transferee carries on such business, or carries on a boarding house, lodging house or hotel on the same premises, then, notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I fix and declare the maximum rate at which the transferee may supply board and lodging of any kind, to be the maximum rate fixed by the foregoing provisions of this Order for the supply of that kind of board and lodging by the transferor.

Fixation of Maximum Rates by Notice.

7. Notwithstanding anything contained in this Order, I declare that the maximum rate at which any kind of board and lodging specified in a notice given in pursuance of this clause may be supplied by any person to whom such notice is given, to be such rate as is fixed by the Commissioner by notice in writing to that person.

Exhibition of Maximum Rates.

8. (1) Every person who supplies any board and lodging shall exhibit and keep exhibited in a prominent position on the premises in which such board and lodging is supplied, a notice setting forth particulars of the maximum rates fixed by or under the provisions of this Order for the supply by him of any kind of board and lodging.

(2) Any such notice shall be exhibited and kept exhibited in such a manner and shall be in such a form as to be easily legible to any person being supplied with board and lodging on those premises or to any person contemplating being so supplied.

(3) Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore contained, where the maximum rate for the supply by any person of any kind of board and lodging has been fixed by notice in writing given or deemed to have been given under the provisions of this Order, that person shall exhibit and keep exhibited that notice in writing or a true copy thereof in such a manner as to be easily legible to any person being supplied with board and lodging on the premises to which the notice in writing relates or to any person contemplating being so supplied.

This clause shall not apply to any person who accommodates no more than four boarders or lodgers.

9. All Notices in Writing issued prior to the making of this Order which fix or purport to fix rates for the supply of any kind of board and lodging and which have not been specifically revoked prior to the date on which this Order takes effect, shall be deemed to have been given under the provisions of this Order.

CANNED FRUITS—SALES OTHER THAN BY RETAIL.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the Prices Regulation Acts, I, John Francis Waldron, Prices Commissioner, hereby make the following Order:—

Citation.

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 437.

Definitions.

2. In this Order unless the contrary intention appears—
 - “Metropolitan Area” means all that area comprised within a radius of 25 miles from the General Post Office, Melbourne;
 - “16-oz. tin” means any tin holding 16 ounces or more but less than 20 ounces;
 - “20-oz. tin” means any tin holding 20 ounces or more but less than 30 ounces;
 - “30-oz. tin” means any tin holding 30 ounces or more but less than 4 pounds;
 - “4-lb. tin” means any tin holding 4 pounds or more but less than 6½ pounds;
 - “6½-lb. tin” means any tin holding 6½ pounds or more but less than 7 pounds;
 - “7-lb. tin” means any tin holding 7 pounds or more.

Maximum Prices.

3. I fix and declare the maximum prices at which canned fruits of any of the descriptions specified in the Schedule to this Order may be sold to wholesalers or to retailers to be the prices specified in the Schedule to this Order.

Provided that in respect of all sales where payment by the purchaser is made within seven days of the receipt of the invoice, a discount of 5 per cent. shall be allowed from the maximum prices specified in the Schedule to this Order.

Delivery of Invoice.

4. Any person who sells any canned fruits of any of the descriptions specified in the Schedule to this Order shall deliver with such canned fruit an invoice or docket containing the following particulars:—

- (i) Name and address of the seller;
- (ii) Name and address of the purchaser;
- (iii) Date of sale;
- (iv) The quantity and description of the canned fruit contained in the sale;
- (v) Price per unit charged;
- (vi) Total price charged; and
- (vii) That if payment is made within seven days, a discount of 5 per cent. is allowable.

5. Notwithstanding anything contained in the foregoing provisions of this Order, I declare the maximum price at which canned fruit, a maximum price for the sale of which is fixed by the foregoing provisions of this Order and which is specified in a notice given in pursuance of this clause, may be sold by any person to whom such notice is given, to be such price as is fixed by the Commissioner by notice in writing to that person.

TEA.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the Prices Regulation Acts, I, John Francis Waldron, Prices Commissioner, hereby make the following Order:—

Citation.

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 440.

Revocation.

2. Prices Regulation Order No. 329 is hereby revoked.

Definitions.

3. In this Order, unless the contrary intention appears—

“Primary Wholesaler” means a wholesaler who buys tea from the Tea Importation Board established under the *Tea Importation Act 1951* of the Commonwealth of Australia.

“Sub-Primary Wholesaler” means a wholesaler who buys tea in unopened original packages from a Primary Wholesaler.

“Secondary Wholesaler” means a wholesaler who buys tea not in unopened original packages from a Primary Wholesaler or from a Sub-Primary Wholesaler.

“First Grade Tea” means tea of the same grade, quality, brand or description as that for which the maximum net selling price to retailers as fixed under the Prices Regulation Acts on the first day of July, 1952, was—

(a) where such tea was sold in packages not exceeding 14 lb. net weight 3s. 6d. per lb.

(b) where such tea was sold in packages exceeding 14 lb. net weight, such packages being unopened original packages .. 3s. 2½d. per lb.
and

(c) where such tea was sold in packages exceeding 14 lb. net weight, such packages not being unopened original packages .. 3s. 4½d. per lb.

“Second Grade Tea” means any tea other than First grade tea.

“The Metropolitan Area” means that area enclosed in the circumference of a circle having as its centre the General Post Office, Spencer-street, Melbourne, and having a radius of 25 miles therefrom.

4. Notwithstanding anything contained in this Order, any person who is both a Sub-Primary Wholesaler and a Secondary Wholesaler as defined in clause 3 hereof shall be deemed to be—

(a) a Sub-Primary Wholesaler in respect of sales of tea received by him in its original package direct from a Primary Wholesaler and blended and packed for sale by him; and

(b) a Secondary Wholesaler in respect of all other sales of tea made by him.

Maximum Prices.

5. I fix and declare the maximum price at which tea may be sold to a retailer to be—

(a) Where such tea is sold in packages not exceeding 14 lb. net weight—

(i) First Grade Tea 3s. 8d. per lb.

(ii) Second Grade Tea 3s. 4d. per lb.

(b) Where such tea is sold in packages exceeding 14 lb. net weight, such packages being unopened original packages—

(i) First Grade Tea 3s. 5½d. per lb.

(ii) Second Grade Tea 3s. 1½d. per lb.

(c) Where such tea is sold in packages exceeding 14 lb. net weight, such packages not being unopened original packages—

- (i) First Grade Tea 3s. 6 $\frac{3}{4}$ d. per lb.
- (ii) Second Grade Tea 3s. 2 $\frac{3}{4}$ d. per lb.

Provided that where payment of the purchase price of such tea is made within ten days from date of delivery, such maximum prices shall be reduced by 1d. per lb.

6. I fix and declare the maximum price at which tea may be sold by a Primary Wholesaler or a Sub-Primary Wholesaler to a Secondary Wholesaler to be—

(a) Where such tea is sold in packages not exceeding 14 lb. net weight—

- (i) First Grade Tea 3s. 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ d. per lb.
- (ii) Second Grade Tea 3s. 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ d. per lb.

(b) Where such tea is sold in packages exceeding 14 lb. net weight, such packages being unopened original packages—

- (i) First Grade Tea 3s. 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ d. per lb.
- (ii) Second Grade Tea 2s. 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ d. per lb.

(c) Where such tea is sold in packages exceeding 14 lb. net weight, such packages not being unopened original packages—

- (i) First Grade Tea 3s. 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ d. per lb.
- (ii) Second Grade Tea 3s. 0 $\frac{1}{2}$ d. per lb.

7. Where any tea, the maximum price for the sale of which is fixed by clauses 5 and 6 of this Order, is sold to any person for delivery to a purchaser in the Metropolitan Area, the maximum price fixed in relation thereto shall be deemed to include the costs of delivery to such purchaser.

8. In respect of tea, the maximum price of which is fixed by clauses 5 and 6 of this Order, sold to any person for delivery to a purchaser at any place other than in the Metropolitan Area, I fix and declare the maximum price at which such tea may be sold and delivered to the place of delivery to be that specified in clauses 5 and 6 of this Order, plus the costs properly incurred in and attributable to the transporting of each pound of such tea (calculated in relation to each such pound to the nearest upward farthing).

Provided that no amount may be added for costs of transport under the provisions of this clause unless such amount is properly recorded and vouched for in the books of the seller.

9. I fix and declare the maximum price at which tea may be sold by a Primary Wholesaler to a Sub-Primary Wholesaler to be—

- (i) First Grade Tea 3s. 2d. per lb.
- (ii) Second Grade Tea 2s. 10d. per lb.

Provided that where payment of the purchase price of any such tea is delayed beyond the period of thirty days from the date of delivery thereof, the vendor may charge a further $\frac{1}{2}$ d. per lb. for such tea, which aggregate price I hereby fix and declare to be the maximum price thereof.

10. I fix and declare the maximum price at which tea may be sold by retail to be—

- (i) First Grade Tea 4s. 0d. per lb.
- (ii) Second Grade Tea 3s. 8d. per lb.

Provided that where such tea is sold by retail in a place outside the Metropolitan Area, the costs properly incurred in and attributable to the delivery of such tea into the store of the retailer and clearly recorded and vouched for in the retailer's book (calculated to the nearest upward $\frac{1}{2}$ d. per lb.) may be added to the prices fixed and declared by this paragraph, which aggregate prices I hereby fix and declare to be the maximum prices for such tea.

11. Notwithstanding anything contained in this Order, I fix and declare the maximum price at which tea packed by a Primary Wholesaler in packages supplied by the purchaser of such tea may be sold to be the maximum price fixed in accordance with the provisions of this Order, less the cost to the purchaser of such packages.

12. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I fix and declare the maximum price at which tea may be sold to the Commonwealth or the State of Victoria to be—

(a) in respect of sales by Wholesalers—

(i) bulk unblended tea	3s. 3½d. per lb.
(ii) bulk blended tea	3s. 4½d. per lb.
(iii) tea in 1-lb. packets	3s. 4¾d. per lb.

(b) in respect of sales by Retailers—
