DETERMINATION OF A WAGES BOARD ADJUSTED PURSUANT TO SECTION 21 OF THE FACTORIES AND SHOPS ACT 1934 (No. 4275).

I, Henry Norman Jones, Acting Secretary for Labour, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the Factories and Shops Acts, hereby make and issue the following adjusted Determination of the Wages Board referred to hereunder showing adjusted rates and prices to operate from the beginning of the first pay period to commence in August, 1952.

APPRENTICESHIP.

3. (a) An employer may employ any minor as an apprentice in any work covered by the Determination provided that no minor shall be employed in the trade or occupation of a spinner—lst class otherwise than under a contract of apprenticeship as hereinafter provided.

Period of Apprenticeship.

(b) If the apprentice when indentured is under the age of seventeen years—five years; if over the age of seventeen years—four or five years, at the option of the contracting parties.

Contract of Apprenticeship.

- (c) Every contract of apprenticeship hereinafter made shall contain-

(i) the names of the parties; (ii) the date of birth of the apprentice;

- (iii) a statement of the trade or trades to which the apprentice is to be bound and which he is to be taught during the course and for the purpose of the apprenticeship;
 (iv) a covenant by the master to teach and instruct or cause the apprentice to be taught or instructed in the trade to which the apprentice is bound;
 (v) the data at which the apprentice is formulated in the companion of the contraction of th
- (v) the date at which the apprenticeship is to commence or from which it is to be calculated; (vi) all other conditions of apprenticeship.

Cancellation or Suspension of Indentures.

(d) Subject to the approval of the Secretary for Labour but not otherwise, an indenture of apprenticeship may be suspended or cancelled—

- (i) by mutual consent;
 (ii) if through lack of orders or financial difficulties an employer is unable to find suitable employment for an apprentice and a transfer to another employer cannot be arranged;
 (iii) if in the opinion of the Secretary for Labour circumstances exist which render such suspension or cancellation
- necessary or desirable.

Any covenant in an indenture inconsistent with the provisions of this clause shall be null and void and of no force or effect while this Determination remains in force and applies to the parties to the indenture.

Proportion.

- (e) An employer shall not employ apprentices in excess of the proportion hereinafter prescribed :-

(i) In the trade of a spinner—1st class.—One apprentice for every three or fraction of three tradesmen;
 (ii) In all other cases.—Three apprentices and two improvers or two apprentices and three improvers to every three or fraction of three workers receiving not less than the rate prescribed for "all others".

For the purpose of ascertaining the number of apprentices, the number of tradesmen shall be deemed to be the average number working during the immediately preceding six months, and, in ascertaining such proportion an employer actually working in any workshop shall be deemed to be a tradesman.

A person who is, for a term not exceeding two years, taking practical training in a workshop in continuance of a course of training for professional work shall not be taken into account in calculating the proportion of apprentices to journeymen.

Adult Apprentices.

(f) Any apprentice who cannot complete his full term of apprenticeship before reaching his twenty-second birthday may by agreement with his master, serve as an apprentice until he reaches the age of 23 years.

Probationary Period.

(g) Minors may be taken on probation for three months, and if apprenticed such three months shall count as part of their period of apprenticeship. An employer shall within fourteen days of employing a probationer notify the apprenticeship authorities of the employment of such probationer to any of the trades mentioned herein.

Wages.

(h) The minimum weekly rates of wage for apprentices shall be the under-mentioned percentages of the contemporaneous basic wage, and in addition thereto the constant and war loadings specified, and in all contracts of apprenticeship hereafter made the employer shall covenant to pay wages of not less than such rates.

An employee who is under 21 years of age on the expiration of his apprenticeship and thereafter works as a minor in the occupation to which he has been apprenticed shall be paid at not less than the adult rate prescribed for that classification.

Hours.

⁽j) The ordinary hours of employment of apprentices shall not in each workshop exceed those of the journeymen.

Overtime and Shift Work.

(k) No apprentice under the age of eighteen years shall be required to work overtime or shift work unless he so desires. No apprentice shall except in an emergency work or be required to work overtime or shift work at times which would prevent his attendance at technical school as required by any statute, determination, or regulation applicable to him.

Payment by Resulte.

(1) An apprentice shall not work under any system of payment by results.

(m) The apprentice at the end of the calendar period of any year in which he has actually given service to the master upon less than the ordinary working days prescribed in this Determination, or on which he has unlawfully absented himself without the master's consent shall, for every day short of the said number of working days, and for every day of such absence, serve one day, and the calendar period of the succeeding year of his service shall not be deemed to begin until the said additional day or days shall have been served. Provided that in calculating the extra time to be so served the apprentice shall be credited with time which he has worked during the relevant year in excess of his ordinary hours.

Prohibition of Premiums.

(n) An employer shall not, either directly or indirectly, or by any pretence or device receive from any person or require or permit any person to pay or give any consideration in the nature of a premium or bonus for the taking or binding of any probationer or apprentice.

Attendance at Technical Schools.

(a) Apprentices attending technical colleges or schools and presenting reports of satisfactory conduct shall be reimbursed all fees paid by them.

(p) Apprentices shall be entitled to sick and annual leave in accordance with the provisions of clauses 15 and 16 hereof respectively.

FEMALES AND UNAPPRENTICED MALE JUNIORS.

4. (a) Subject to the exception hereinafter provided, the minimum rates of wage for adult and junior females and for unapprenticed male juniors employed in occupations other than that of a spinner—lat class, shall be as follows:—

(b) The minimum rate payable to a junior female of any age or a junior male of eighteen years or more each with less than six months' experience under this Determination shall, until he or she has had six months' experience, be 10 per cent. less than the amount represented by the percentage of the basic wage hereby prescribed for a junior employee of his or her age and in addition thereto the additional amount prescribed for such an employee:

Prohibited Occupations.

- (c) Junior employees shall not be employed :-
 - (i) if under the age of 16 years—
 on oil or gas burners or fires used for heating of small articles; or
 using electric are or oxy acetylene blow pipe, or
 - (ii) if under 18 years of age-die setting on power presses.

Clauses, other than clauses 2, 3 and 4, of the said Determination shall remain in force.

APPRENTICES.

An amended form of Indenture was prescribed by the Board on 12th July, 1950.

- 4. (a) Minors may be taken as indentured apprentices to one or more of the trades of-
 - (i) Smith, including coach smith, spring maker and spring fitter, wheelwright smith and general smith.
 - (ii) Trimmer (Production).
 - (iii) Axle maker.
 - (iv) Saw doctor.
- (b) Minors other than indentured apprentices shall not be kept at the following occupations:-
 - (i) Electrical fitter.
 - (ii) Electrical mechanic.
 - (iii) Electro-plater, first class.
 - (iv) Fitter and/or turner.
 - (v) Metal machinist, first class.
 - (vi) Pattern maker.
 - (vii) Welder (first class only).
 - (viii) Body maker, first class.
 - (ix) Painter (i.e., tradesman who mixes, matches and applies paint).
 - (x) Tradesman panel worker and panel beater (first class).
 - (xi) Trimmer, development and/or repair work.
 - (xii) Wood machinist (first class).
- (c) The proportion of apprentices that may be taken by any employer shall be one to three or fraction of three tradesmen in each section of the industry.

In the trade of electrical mechanic, the proportion of apprentices who may be taken by an employer shall not exceed one apprentice for every two or fraction of two tradesmen.

The number of tradesmen shall be deemed to be the average number working during the immediately preceding six months and in ascertaining such proportion an employer actually working in any workshop shall be deemed to be a tradesman.

- (d) The periods of apprenticeship shall be as follows:—

 If the apprentice when articled is under the age of 17, five years; if over the age of 17, four or five years at the option of the contracting parties.
- (c) Minors may be taken on probation for three months, and if apprenticed such three months shall count as part of their period of apprenticeship.

Cancellation or Suspension of Indenture.

- (f) Subject to the approval of the Secretary for Labour, but not otherwise, an indenture of apprenticeship may be suspendedor cancelled-
 - (i) by mutual consent:
 - (ii) if through lack of orders or financial difficulties an employer is unable to find suitable employment for an apprentice and a transfer to another employer cannot be arranged;
 - (iii) if in the opinion of the Secretary for Labour circumstances exist which render such suspension or cancellation necessary or desirable.

Any covenant in an indenture inconsistent with the provisions of this clause shall be null and void and of no force or effect while this Determination remains in force and applies to the parties to the indenture.

Instruction in Welding.

(g) The training of apprentices to smithing, fitting, and turning or panel working shall include instruction in electric welding and/or oxy-acctylene welding as far as is practicable with the facilities available in the shop in which they are trained.

The training of apprentices to body making or electrical fitting shall include sufficient instruction in welding to enable them to perform the work of their trade in the shop in which they are trained.

The sum of 4s, per week shall be added to the above rates in the case of apprentice patternmakers.

Apprentices to body-making first class shall be supplied by their employers at the end of each quarter with an order for a sum equivalent to 2s. 6d. per week as a tool allowance.

(b) An employee who is under 21 years of age at the expiration of his apprenticeship and thereafter works as a minor in the occupation to which he has been apprenticed shall be paid at not less than the adult rate prescribed for that classification.

Sick Leave, Public Holidays, and Annual Leave.

(i) Apprentices shall be entitled to sick leave, public holidays, and annual leave as prescribed by clauses 8, 13, and 14 hereot.

Hours.

(j) The ordinary hours of employment of apprentices shall be the same in each workshop as those of journeymen.

Overtime and Shift Work.

- (k) Where practicable no apprentice under the age of 18 years shall be required to work overtime or shift work provided that no apprentice shall except in an emergency work or be required to work overtime or shift work at times which would prevent his attendance at technical school as required by any statute, Determination, or regulation applicable to him.
 - (1) No apprentice shall work under any system of payment by results.
- (m) Any apprentice who cannot complete his full term of apprenticeship before reaching his 21st birthday may with the approval of the Secretary for Labour and by agreement with his employer serve as an apprentice until he reaches the age of 23 years.
- (n) An apprentice at the end of the calendar period of any year in which he has actually given service to the employer upon less than the ordinary working days prescribed in the Determination for the trade or in which he has unlawfully absented himself without the employer's consent may for every day short of the said number of working days and for every day of such absence be required by his employer to serve one day in which case the calendar period of the succeeding year of his services shall not be deemed to begin until the said additional day or days shall have been served provided that in calculating the extra time to be so served the apprentice shall be credited with time which he has worked during the relevant year in excess of his ordinary hours.
- (o) No employer shall either directly or indirectly or by any pretence or device receive from any person or require or permit any person to pay or give any consideration in the nature of a premium or bonus for the taking or binding of any probationer
- (p) Apprentices attending technical colleges or schools for prescribed courses and presenting reports of satisfactory conduct shall be reimbursed all fees paid by them.
- (q) A person who is for a period not exceeding two years taking practical training in a workshop in continuance of a course of training for professional works shall not be taken into account in calculating the proportion of apprentices to journeymen.

MALE JUNIOR WORKERS.

- 5. (a) For the duration of the present war, the system of calculating the wages of male junior workers on the basis of age plus experience shall be suspended. At the conclusion of the war, that system shall be reverted to, but without prejudice to the right of the Unions, or any of them, to seek alterations thereto.
 - (b) Unapprenticed male junior workers may be employed in any occupation covered by this Determination,

PRICES REGULATION ORDER No. 456.

SCHOOL STATIONERY BOOKS-SALES BY RETAIL.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the Prices Regulation Acts, I, John Francis Waldron, Prices Commissioner, hereby make the following order:—

Citation .-

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 456.

Revocation.

2. Prices Regulation Order No. 342 is hereby revoked.

Definitions and Interpretations.

- 3. In this Order, unless the contrary intention appears-
 - "Allowance for cost of transport" means, in relation to the sale of any specified goods, the allowance specified in the second column of the Second Schedule to this Order.
 - "Cost of transport" means, in relation to the sale of any specified goods, the cost of transporting such goods from the point of delivery to the store of the retail trader, but, wherever alternative means of transport are available to such retail trader, such cost shall not exceed the cost of the cheapest form of transport so available.
 - "Metropolitan Area" means all that area of Victoria comprised within a radius of 25 miles from the General Post Office, Melbourne.
 - "Point of delivery" means, in relation to the sale of any specified goods by a retail trader, the place at which liability for payment of transport charges in conveying those specified goods to his place of business passed to that retail trader from the person from whom the retail trader purchased such goods.
 - "Retail trader" means a person who purchases any specified goods in a manufactured state, and resells or offers for sale such goods by retail.
 - "Specified goods" means any of the goods specified in the first column of the First Schedule to this Order.

Maximum Prices.

- 4. I fix and declare the maximum price at which any of the specified goods may be sold by a retail trader to be— $\,$
 - (a) for sales in the Metropolitan Area, the price set opposite thereto in the second column of the First Schedule to this Order;
 - (b) for sales outside the Metropolitan Area, the sum of-
 - (i) the price set out opposite thereto in the second column of the First Schedule to this Order; and
 - (ii) the appropriate allowance for the cost of transport specified in the second column of the Second Schedule to this Order.

Fixation of Maximum Prices by Notice.

- -5. (1) Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I declare the maximum price at which any specified goods may be sold by any person to whom a notice in pursuance of this paragraph is given to be such price as is fixed by the Prices Commissioner by notice in writing to that person.
- (2) All notices in writing issued prior to this Order which operate to fix a lower maximum price for the sale of any specified goods by any person than the maximum price fixed by the foregoing provisions of this Order, and which are in force immediately before the commencement of this Order, shall be deemed to have been given under this Order.

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No: 457.

Revocation.

2. Prices Regulation Order No. 73, as amended by Prices Regulation Order No. 388, is hereby revoked.

Definitions.

- 3. In this Order, unless the contrary intention appears-
 - "Metropolitan Area" means all that area comprised within a radius of 20 miles from the General Post Office, Melbourne.
 - "Length" means, in relation to spouting, ridging; downpipe, and square-pipe manufactured from galvanized iron, a length of 6 feet.

Maximum Prices.

- 4. (1) I fix and declare the maximum prices at which spouting, ridging, downpipe, square-pipe, or fittings manufactured from galvanized iron may be sold, by retail, to be—
 - (a) in respect of sales for delivery within the Metropolitan Area, the prices specified in the Schedule to this Order;
 - (b) in respect of sales outside the Metropolitan Area, the prices specified in the Schedule to this Order, plus the cost actually incurred in respect of and properly attributable to the transport of such spouting, ridging, downpipe, square-pipe, or fittings to the retailer's place of business.

(2) I fix and declare the maximum rates which may be charged for the cartage of spouting, ridging, downpipe, square-pipe, or fittings manufactured from galvanized iron, from any retailer's place of business to the place of delivery to the purchaser to be the current standard Victorian Road Transport Association's rates.

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 459.

Revocation.

2. Prices Regulation Order No. 286 is hereby revoked...

Definitions.

- 3. In this Order, unless the contrary intention appears:-
 - "No. 1 Area" means the Area specified in Part 1 of the Second Schedule to this Order;
 - "No. 2 Area." means the Area specified in Part 2 of the Second Schedule to this Order;
 - "No. 3 Area" means the Area specified in Part 3 of the Second Schedule to this Order;
 - "bulk" means, in relation to the sale of any butter, that such butter is not sold in prints as defined in this paragraph;
 - "prints" means, in relation to the sale of any butter, that such butter is sold pre-wrapped in a package of 1 lb. or ½ lb. in weight.

Maximum Prices.

- 4. I fix and declare the maximum prices at which butter may be sold for delivery in Victoria to be:—
 - (a) in respect of sales by wholesale-
 - (i) for bulk sales—3s. 84d. per lb.;
 - (ii) for sales in prints-3s. 9#d. per lb.;
 - (b) in respect of sales by retail—the price specified in the First Schedule to this Order.

Exhibition of Price List.

5. Every person who sells or has for sale by retail in Victoria any butter, the maximum price of which is fixed by or under the provisions of this Order, shall exhibit and keep exhibited in a prominent position in his place of business, or, if he has more than one place of business, in each of his places of business, and in such manner as to be easily legible to persons contemplating making any purchase or conducting any business at his place or places of business, particulars of the maximum prices fixed by or under the provisions of this Order for the sale by him of such butter.

Fixation of Maximum Prices by Notice.

6. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I declare the maximum price at which any butter, a maximum price for the sale of which is fixed by the foregoing provisions of this Order, and which is specified in a notice given in pursuance of this clause, may be sold in Victoria by any person to whom such notice is given to be such price as is fixed by the Commissioner by notice in writing to that person.
