Prices Regulation Acts.

PRICES REGULATION ORDER No. 483.

CORRUGATED AND PLAIN ZINCANEAL AND GALVANISED IRON
OF AUSTRALIAN MANUFACTURE.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the Prices Regulation Acts, I, John Francis Waldron, Prices Commissioner, hereby make the following Order:—

Citation.

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 483.

Revocation.

2. Prices Regulation Order No. 119 as amended by Prices Regulation Orders Nos. 289 and 344 is hereby revoked.

Definitions.

3. In this Order, unless the contrary intention appears—

“Manufacturer’s Selling Price” means the approved price to the manufacturer published in list form by John Lysaght (Australia) Pty. Ltd.

“Sales by Wholesale” means sales to recognized resellers such as timber merchants, storekeepers, and hardware stores, but does not include sales to plumbers, builders or users.

“Sales by Retail” means sales to contracting plumbers, builders, and users.

“Loose Sheets” means sales of less than one half-ton in any size.

“Point of Delivery” means—

(a) in relation to sales by wholesale—

the place at which liability for transport charges passed to the wholesale trader from the manufacturer; and

(b) in relation to sales by retail—

(i) in the case of a sale by a retail trader who purchased the iron direct from the manufacturer—the place at which such liability passed to the retail trader; and

(ii) in the case of a sale by a retail trader who purchased the iron from a wholesale trader—the place at which such liability passed to that wholesale trader.

“Prevailing Rate” in relation to the cartage of corrugated and plain zincaneal and galvanized iron by any person on any terms or conditions, means the rate approved to the Victorian Road Transport Association at the time of the sale.

“Ton” means a weight of 2,240 lb. avoirdupois.

Maximum Wholesale Price.

4. I fix and declare the maximum price at which corrugated or plain zincaneal or galvanized iron of Australian manufacture may be sold by wholesale to be:—

(i) Manufacturer’s selling price plus 10 per centum thereof;

(ii) Plus the cost actually incurred in respect of and properly attributable to the transport of such corrugated or plain zincaneal or galvanized iron from the point of delivery into the wholesale trader’s store.

Maximum Retail Price.

5. I fix and declare the maximum price at which corrugated or plain zincanneal or galvanized iron of Australian manufacture may be sold by retail to be :—

- (i) The price determined under clause 4 (i) of this Order plus 10 per centum thereof ;
- (ii) Plus the cost actually incurred in respect of and properly attributable to the transport of such corrugated or plain zincanneal or galvanized iron from the point of delivery into the retail trader's store.

Sale of Loose Sheets.

6. I fix and declare the maximum price at which corrugated or plain zincanneal or galvanized iron of Australian manufacture may be sold by retail in loose sheets to be the price determined under clause 5 of this Order, plus 5 per centum thereof.

7. I fix and declare the maximum rate which may be charged for the cartage of corrugated or plain zincanneal or galvanized iron from store to place of delivery to be the prevailing rate.

8. Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore in this Order contained, I fix and declare that where payment is made not later than the last day of the month immediately succeeding the month in which delivery is made, the maximum prices and rates fixed by the foregoing provisions of this Order, shall in each case, be subject to a reduction of 2½ per centum thereof.

Fixation of Maximum Prices by Notice in Writing.

9. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I declare the maximum price at which corrugated or plain zincanneal or galvanized iron, specified in a Notice in Writing given in pursuance of this clause may be sold by any person to whom such Notice is given to be such price as is fixed by the Commissioner by notice in writing to that person.

Exhibition of Price Tickets.

10. (1) Every person who sells or has for sale by retail any corrugated or plain zincanneal or galvanized iron, the maximum price of which is fixed by or under the provisions of this Order, shall at all times, whilst such goods are in his possession, keep attached to or displayed with such goods, a ticket or label setting forth his selling price thereof.

(2) Any ticket or label required by sub-clause (1) of this clause to be attached to or displayed with any goods shall be in such form as to be easily legible to any person inspecting or viewing those goods and so as to be properly associated with such goods.

Application for Maximum Prices.

11. Any person who purchases for resale any corrugated or plain zincanneal or galvanized iron for which a maximum price is not fixed by or under the provisions of this Order shall not sell that corrugated or plain zincanneal or galvanized iron, unless and until that person has made a written request to the Commissioner to fix the maximum price at which that corrugated or plain zincanneal or galvanized iron may be sold, and the Commissioner has fixed the maximum price accordingly.

Delivery of Invoices.

12. Every person who sells corrugated or plain zincanneal or galvanized iron shall deliver with those goods an invoice or docket specifying the following particulars :—

- (i) Name of seller ;
- (ii) Address of seller ;
- (iii) Date of sale ;
- (iv) Name of purchaser ;
- (v) Address of purchaser ;
- (vi) Quantity of corrugated or plain zincanneal or galvanized iron sold ;
- (vii) Full description of goods showing gauge, width, and length ;
- (viii) Price at which these goods are sold.
