Provided that except as to dragline excavators these rates shall not be cumulative to the extent of increasing the wage of an employee more than 61s. above the rate for "All Others," and provided further that an engine-driver attending a refrigerating compressor shall be paid a rate not less than 41s. above that fixed for "All Others".

Extra rates payable under this sub-clause shall be regarded as part of an employee's ordinary wage for the purposes of this Determination.

(b) Any engine-driver and/or fireman in a bush sawmill who is required to do saw sharpening shall be paid a further additional rate, viz:—

(c) Attending to switchboard where the generating capacity is 350 kilowatt or over 6 0

JUNIOR LABOUR.

4. (a) The minimum rates of wage to be paid to juniors working as greasers or oilers, other than on shafting, or as cleaners or as motor drivers or attendants where the motor does not exceed 50 horse-power in all shall be the under-mentioned percentages of the contemporaneous needs basic wage prescribed for the area in which they are employed, and in addition thereto the constant loading specified.

LEADING HANDS.

Leading hands in charge of not less than three and not more than ten employees, 9s. per week extra; more than ten and not more than twenty employees, 18s. per week extra; more than twenty employees, 27s. per week extra.

Provided that an employee in an electrical supply undertaking detailed to act as leading hand in charge of two other adult employees working away from power station or workshop (one of whom is of the same classification as himself) shall be paid 6s. per week extra.

TRADESMEN IN LARGE POWER HOUSES.

Tradesmen and/or welders, and their assistants employed in large operating power houses (i.e., power houses developing more than 8,000 kilowatts), other than those not on the regular staff, engaged on new construction work, shall be paid 6s. per week extra, and other apprentices and unapprenticed juniors 3s. per week extra; such amount shall be deemed to include all special rates prescribed in clause 6.

This allowance shall continue to be payable to tradesmen attached to the staffs of such power houses while carrying out repairs or maintenance in rotary converter sub-stations which are in regular operation.

APPRENTICESHIP.

3. (Other than those covered by the Apprenticeship Commission.)

Apprenticeship Trades.

(a) An employer shall not employ minors in the following trades or occupations otherwise than under a contract of apprenticeship as hereinafter provided:—

- (i) Brassfinisher (except the making of parts by specialized processes and the assembling thereof)
- (ii) Electrical fitter and/or armature winder (except the winding of armatures by specialized processes).
- (iii) Electrical mechanic.
- (iv) Fitter and/or turner.
- (v) Locksmith—making and/or repairing locks, including those of safes and strong-room doors, but not including the making of parts by specialized processes and the assembling thereof.
- (vi) Machinist—1st and 2nd class.
- (vii) Motor mechanic.
- (viii) Moulder and/or coremaker—jobbing.
- (ix) Patternmaker.
- (x) Refrigeration mechanic or serviceman.
- (xi) Safe and strong-room maker.
- (xii) Scale maker (except the making of parts by specialized processes and the assembling thereof).
- (xiii) Scientific instrument maker.
- (xiv) Smithing—Blacksmith, copper and/or brass smith.
- (xv) Welder—Special class.
- (xvi) Window frame fitter.
- (xvii) Brass polishing.
- (xviii) Adding machine, calculating machine, book-keeping machine, cash register, or first-class mechanic.

Contract of Apprenticeship.

(b) Every contract of apprenticeship hereinafter made shall contain—

- (i) the names of the parties;
- (ii) the date of birth of the apprentice;
- (iii) a statement of the trade or trades to which the apprentice is to be bound and which he is to be taught during the course and for the purpose of the apprenticeship;
- (iv) a covenant by the master to teach and instruct or cause the apprentice to be taught or instructed in the trade to which the apprentice is bound;
- (v) the date at which the apprenticeship is to commence or from which it is to be calculated;
- (vi) all other conditions of apprenticeship.

Cancellation or Suspension of Indenture.

(c) Subject to the approval of the Secretary for Labour and Industry, but not otherwise, an indenture of apprenticeship may be suspended or cancelled—

- (i) by mutual consent;
- (ii) if through lack of orders or financial difficulties an employer is unable to find suitable employment for an apprentice and a transfer to another employer cannot be arranged.
- (iii) if, in the opinion of the Secretary for Labour and Industry, circumstances exist which render such suspension or cancellation necessary or desirable.

Any covenant in an indenture inconsistent with the provision of this clause shall be null and void and of no force or effect while this Determination remains in force and applies to the parties to the indenture.

Instruction in Welding.

(d) The training of apprentices to blacksmithing, structural steel works, fitting or fitting and turning shall include instruction in electric welding and/or oxy-acetylene welding as far as is practicable with the facilities available in the shop in which they are trained.

Proportion.

(e) (i) An employer shall not employ apprentices in excess of the proportion hereinafter prescribed.

Subject to this sub-clause the proportion of apprentices who may be taken by an employer shall not exceed one apprentice to every three or fraction of three tradesmen in the trade concerned.

In the trades of—

- Welder—Special class;
- Motor mechanic; and
- Moulder and/or coremaker—jobbing;

the proportion of apprentices who may be taken by an employer shall not exceed one apprentice for every two or fraction of two tradesmen in the trade concerned.

For the purpose of ascertaining the number of apprentices, the number of tradesmen shall be deemed to be the average number working during the immediately preceding six months, and in ascertaining such proportion an employer actually working in any workshop shall be deemed to be a tradesman.

A person who is, for a term not exceeding two years, taking practical training in a workshop in continuance of a course of training for professional work shall not be taken into account in calculating the proportion of apprentices to journeymen.

(ii) Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore provided in the trades of—

- Fitter and/or turner,
- Machinist—1st and 2nd class,
- Motor mechanic, and
- Refrigeration mechanic or serviceman,

an employer may with the consent of an apprenticeship authority and upon satisfying that authority that he has the plant, equipment and staff necessary for the proper tuition of each apprentice concerned take apprentices in excess of the proportion herein prescribed. Until further order apprentices so taken shall not be counted in future calculations of the proportion of apprentices to journeymen authorized by the Determination.

Period of Apprenticeship.

(f) The periods of apprenticeship, except as to those marked (i), (xi), (xii), and (xvi), shall be as follows:—

If the apprentice, when indentured, is under the age of seventeen years—five years; if over the age of seventeen—four or five years, at the option of the contracting parties.

For the trades marked (i), (xi), (xii), and (xvi)—four or five years at the option of the contracting parties.

Adult Apprentices.

(g) Any apprentice who cannot complete his full term of apprenticeship before reaching his 22nd birthday may, by agreement with his master, serve as an apprentice until he reaches the age of 23 years.

Probationary Period.

(h) Minors may be taken on probation for three months, and if apprenticed such three months shall count as part of their period of apprenticeship. An employer shall within fourteen days of employing a probationer notify the appropriate apprenticeship authorities of the employment of such probationer to any of the trades mentioned herein.

Wages.

(i) The minimum weekly rates of wage for apprentices shall be the under-mentioned percentages of the basic wage prescribed for the area in which they are employed, and in all contracts of apprenticeship hereafter made, the employer shall covenant to pay wages of not less than such rates.

The total wages of apprentices and improvers shall be calculated to the nearest sixpence, any broken part of sixpence in the result not exceeding threepence to be disregarded.

Hours.

(k) The ordinary hours of employment of apprentices shall not in each workshop exceed those of the journeymen.

Overtime and Shift Work.

(l) No apprentice under the age of 18 years shall be required to work overtime or shift work unless he so desires.

No apprentice shall except in an emergency work or be required to work overtime or shift work at times which would prevent his attendance at technical school as required by any statute, Determination or regulation applicable to him.

Payment by Results.

(m) An apprentice shall not work under any system of payment by results.

Lost Time.

(n) The apprentice at the end of the calendar period of any year in which he has actually given service to the master upon less than the ordinary working days prescribed in this Determination, or in which he has unlawfully absented himself without the master's consent, shall, for every day short of the said number of working days, and for every day of such absence, serve one day, and the calendar period of the succeeding year of his service shall not be deemed to begin until the said additional day or days shall have been served. Provided that in calculating the extra time to be so served the apprentice shall be credited with time which he has worked during the relevant year in excess of his ordinary hours.

Prohibition of Premiums.

(o) An employer shall not, either directly or indirectly, or by any pretence or device receive from any person or require or permit any person to pay or give any consideration in the nature of a premium or bonus for the taking or binding of any probationer or apprentice.

Attendance at Technical Schools.

(p) Apprentices attending technical colleges or schools and presenting reports of satisfactory conduct shall be reimbursed all fees paid by them.

Annual and Sick Leave.

(q) Apprentices shall be entitled to sick and annual leave in accordance with the provisions of clauses 17 and 18 hereof respectively.

Leading hands in charge of not less than three and not more than ten employees, 9s. per week extra; more than ten and not more than twenty employees, 18s. per week extra; more than twenty employees, 27s. per week extra.

Ship Repairing.

Employees covered by this Determination who are engaged on ship repairs shall receive an additional margin of 3s. per week.

TRADESMEN IN LARGE POWER HOUSES.

Tradesmen and/or welders, and their assistants employed in large operating power houses (i.e., power houses developing more than 8,000 kilowatts), other than those not on the regular staff, engaged on new construction work, shall be paid 6s. per week extra, and other unapprenticed juniors 3s. per week extra; such amount shall be deemed to include all special rates prescribed in clause 4.

This allowance shall continue to be payable to tradesmen attached to the staffs of such power houses while carrying out repairs or maintenance in rotary converter sub-stations which are in regular operation.

Provided that an employee detailed to act as leading hand in charge of two other adult employees working away from power station or workshop (one of whom is of the same classification as himself) shall be paid 6s. per week extra.

FEMALES AND UNAPPRENTICED MALE JUNIORS.

3. (a) Subject to the exceptions hereinafter provided, the minimum rates of wage for adult and junior females employed in manufacturing and assembling of small parts of electrical and other machinery and appliances, and in core making, in which females were employed on the 15th May, 1935, and for unapprenticed male juniors employed in occupations for which apprenticeship is not provided by this Determination, shall be as follows:—

The total wage shall be calculated to the nearest sixpence, any broken part of sixpence in the result not exceeding threepence to be disregarded.

(b) Except in the case of employees in foundries, the minimum rate payable to a junior female of any age or a junior male of eighteen years or more each with less than six months' experience under this Determination shall, until he or she has had six months' experience, be 10 per cent. less than the amount represented by the percentage of the basic wage hereby prescribed for a junior employee of his or her age and in addition thereto the additional amount prescribed for such an employee.

(c) Junior employees employed on the following machines or operations shall be paid at not less than the appropriate adult minimum rates:—

- (i) Angle-iron cropping where the material weighs more than 3½ lb. per foot and is not clamped.
- (ii) Assisting steel furnace ladleman other than in daubing or repairing ladles.
- (iii) Assisting storeman racking and/or loading and/or unloading off vehicles of heavy steel plates, bars or sections.
- (iv) Breaking up pig iron.
- (v) Carrying material to or from cupola forge or electric steel furnace or using the slicer or hanging on to end of a bloom. This shall not apply in the case of junior moulders.
- (vi) Cutting out and punching rivets on plates.
- (vii) Cutting plates by means of hammer and cold set.
- (viii) Holding up rivets over ½ in. diameter.
- (ix) Plate edge planers in structural steel or shipbuilding yards where the operator travels on the machine.
- (x) Punching machines handling plates weighing more than 84 lb.
- (xi) Shearing machines other than guillotine plate shearers, handling plates weighing more than 84 lb.

(d) Junior employees shall not be employed:—

- (i) if under the age of 16 years—
 - on oil or gas burners or fires used for heating of small articles or
 - using electric arc or oxy-acetylene blow-pipe; or
- (ii) if under 18 years of age—
 - as furnaceman or assistant to furnaceman; or
 - as a roller, extrusion press operator, pipe trap machine operator, roller's assistant or as a melter.

Clauses, other than clauses 2 and 3, of the said Determination shall remain in force.

Labour and Industry Act 1953.

DETERMINATION OF THE POTTERY BOARD.

NOTE.—(a) This Determination applies to the whole of the State of Victoria.

(b) By Orders in Council of the 11th June, 1946, and the 27th December, 1946, the Board was deprived of the powers to provide for any person or persons or classes of persons employed in—

(i) the process, trade, or business of making roofing tiles (other than roofing tiles made of cement), and all accessories for such roofing tiles; air vents, chimney pots, agricultural pipes, terra cotta lumber and flower pots;

(ii) the digging of clay incidental to the manufacture of the above-mentioned articles;
and such powers were conferred on the Roofing Tiles Board.

IN accordance with the provisions of the *Labour and Industry Act 1953*, the Wages Board which, since the 27th day of November, 1939, has had the power "to determine the lowest price or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of—

(a) making pottery, tiles, or pipes, except where such work is subject to the Determination of any Wages Board heretofore appointed;

(b) digging clay, except where such work is subject to the Determination of any Wages Board heretofore appointed" has made the following Determination, namely:—

1. That, as from the beginning of the first pay period to commence on or after the 6th October, 1954, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

2. TIME OF BEGINNING AND ENDING WORK.

3. The ordinary hours for a week's work shall be 40 to be worked by all persons except burners and other shift workers within the following hours:—

Time of Beginning.	Time of Ending.
7.15 a.m.	5 p.m. Monday to Friday inclusive.

OVERTIME.

4. (a) By persons employed as burners in excess of 8 hours on any one day or shift.—Time and a half for the first four hours and double time thereafter.

Provided that for any shift or shifts in excess of five in any week, time and a half shall be paid for the first four hours' work and double time thereafter.

This shall not apply to cases due to arrangements made between employees in regard to exchange of shifts.

(b) By persons employed on shift work other than burners in excess of 8 hours on any one shift and 80 hours in any two consecutive weeks, or 44 hours in any one week.—Time and a half.

(c) By any other person.—Outside the hours fixed as the times of beginning and ending work.—Time and a half. Provided that any work done, whether inside or outside the times of beginning and ending work, in excess of 8 hours on any day shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four hours and double time thereafter.

Provided further that the ordinary week of 40 hours is not exceeded an agreement may be entered into between an employer and an employee whereby the daily hours of work may be extended within the prescribed times of beginning and ending work and in such case the overtime rates herein prescribed shall not apply.

Work done on a Saturday shall be deemed to be overtime and shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four hours and double time thereafter.

For the purposes of calculating overtime under this sub-clause, time lost because of—

- (i) sick leave prescribed in clause 10 hereof;
- (ii) any of the holidays prescribed in clause 8 hereof;
- (iii) absence, for any reason, with the approval of the employer; or
- (iv) being stood down by the employer for any reason other than misconduct—

shall be regarded as having been worked.

MIXED FUNCTIONS.

5. On any day or shift any employee required to perform work of a higher grade, shall be paid, whilst so employed, the wages attaching to such higher grade but, in the case of any such employee being required to perform the work of a lower grade to that to which he is classed, he shall not suffer any reduction of pay by reason only of his working temporarily out of his grade. Such work shall not be considered temporary if it continues for more than one week.

EXTRA RATES FOR SHIFT WORKERS.

6. An addition of 10 per cent. to the ordinary rates prescribed in clause 2 hereof for the occupation concerned shall be payable to shift workers for any work, including overtime, performed by them between 6 p.m. and 6 a.m.; and any extra payment, as prescribed in clause 4 hereof, for overtime performed by such workers between the said hours, shall be calculated on the aforesaid ordinary rates.

SPECIAL RATES.

7. Double time shall be the penal rate payable to all employees for all work done on Sundays, New Year's Day, Australia Day, Labour Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Queen's Birthday, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day, but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.

HOLIDAYS.

8. (a) All employees shall be entitled to the nine holidays or day or days substituted by Act of Parliament or Proclamation in lieu of such public holidays hereinafter mentioned without deduction of pay:—New Year's Day, Australia Day, Labour Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Queen's Birthday, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day.

Provided that an employee shall not be entitled to pay for any of the above holidays if absent from employment without leave on the working day immediately preceding and/or following a holiday or group of holidays unless he or she produces to the employer a certificate of a legally-qualified medical practitioner, or failing the production of such certificate, such other evidence as shall be satisfactory to the employer.

(b) *Terminating Employment in Relation to a Holiday.*—Where the employer terminates the employment of an employee within fourteen days of a day on which a holiday occurs, and such employee is re-employed by the same employer within a period of fourteen days after such holiday, the employee shall be paid for such holiday or holidays prescribed by this Determination, provided that such employee has been employed by the same employer for a period of at least one month immediately prior to the termination of employment.

ANNUAL HOLIDAY.

9. (a) The annual holiday shall be as prescribed by the provisions of the *Labour and Industry Act 1953*, and any amendments which may be made thereto from time to time.

(b) In addition to the above, seven-day shift workers, that is, shift workers who are rostered to work regularly on Sundays and holidays, shall be allowed for each twelve monthly qualifying period one week's leave including non-working days.

(c) Where an employee with twelve months' continuous service is engaged for part of the twelve-monthly period as a seven-day shift worker, he shall be entitled to have the period of two weeks' annual leave prescribed by the said Act increased by $3\frac{1}{2}$ hours for each month he is continuously engaged as aforesaid.

(d) If, in any twelve-monthly qualifying period, a seven-day shift worker lawfully leaves his employment or his employment is terminated by the employer through no fault of the employee, the employee shall be paid, in addition to all other amounts (including any payment in lieu of annual leave as prescribed by sub-clause (a) hereof) due to him, an amount equal to one-fiftieth of his ordinary pay for the period of employment as a seven-day shift worker.

(e) For the purpose of administering sub-clauses (b) and (d) hereof service prior to the 1st January, 1953, shall be disregarded.

SICK LEAVE.

10. (a) Any employee who has been in the industry for a period of not less than three months during the previous twelve months, or with his or her present employer for at least three months, and is disabled by personal ill-health or accident, proof of which is given to the employer by the production of a certificate from a legally-qualified medical practitioner, statutory declaration, or other satisfactory evidence, within 48 hours of the employee's consequential absence, shall, on account thereof, be entitled to sick pay as follows:—

(i) During the first year, $3\frac{1}{2}$ hours' ordinary pay for each completed month of service;

(ii) During any subsequent year of service, 40 hours' ordinary pay.

Provided that any employee who is in his or her first year in the industry on the 1st April, 1953, shall at that date be entitled to have had or be credited with $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours' sick pay for each completed month of service, provided that such employee shall be entitled to not more than 40 hours' sick leave for such first year.

(b) For the purpose of administering sub-clause (a) hereof an employer may, within two weeks of the employee entering his employment, require such employee to make a sworn declaration or provide other satisfactory evidence as to what employment and paid sick leave he or she has had with any employer in the industry during the previous twelve months, and upon such statement or other evidence the employer shall be entitled to rely and act.

(c) If the full period of sick leave as prescribed above is not taken in any year such portion as is not taken shall, provided an employee remains in the service of the one employer, or any successor of such employer, be cumulative from year to year. For the purposes of this sub-clause, service prior to the 1st July, 1943, shall be disregarded.

(d) Any accumulated sick leave not exceeding 320 hours, standing to the credit of any employee on the 1st April, 1953, shall not be increased by virtue of sub-clause (a) (ii) hereof.

(e) No employer shall terminate the services of an employee during the currency of any period of sick leave with the object of avoiding his obligations under sub-clause (c) hereof.

MORNING TEA INTERVAL.

11. A morning tea interval of seven minutes shall be allowed employees each morning during ordinary working hours without deduction of pay, and such interval shall be arranged by the employer so as to avoid the necessity of a stoppage of operations in the establishment.

TEA MONEY.

12. An allowance of 3s. 6d. for tea money shall be made where work extends for more than two hours beyond the usual time of ending work provided the employer has not given notice the day before of intention to work overtime.

Any such allowance shall be made prior to the meal interval on the day on which such overtime is worked.

If an employee, pursuant to notice, has provided a meal and is not required to work overtime, or is required to work less than the amount advised, he shall be paid as above prescribed for the meal which he has provided but which is surplus.

BURNERS.

13. A burner shall be paid for the full number of hours of the shift worked.

WET PLACES.

14. (a) Clayhole men working underground in shaft and/or tunnel, who are required to work in a "wet place" for at least one hour during the shift, shall be paid 1s. extra for such shift, unless the wet conditions occur only in the last two hours of the shift. A place shall be deemed to be wet when water other than rain is flowing or dripping from overhead to such an extent as to saturate the clothing of the worker, or when the worker is required to work in water more than 2 inches deep.

(b) Employees, other than clayhole men, required to do wet work, such as hosing down and cleaning for different clays, shall be provided with gum boots.

CRIB TIME.

15. A crib time not exceeding 30 minutes in a working shift of 8 hours shall be allowed clayhole men working underground in shaft or tunnel at a depth of 100 feet or over from the surface. Such crib time shall be counted as time worked.

PAYMENT OF WAGES.

16. Wages may be paid either weekly or fortnightly, but shall be paid not later than the first or second Thursday, respectively.

DIRTY WORK.

17. Where an employee is engaged on work which the employer, or in his absence his accredited representative, agrees is of an unusually dirty or offensive nature, he shall be allowed reasonable time off during working hours to enable him to cleanse himself by means of a shower, or other washing facilities, reasonably sufficient to accomplish such purpose.

CLOTHING ALLOWANCE.

18. (i) An allowance of 6d. per day or part thereof shall be paid for wear and tear on boots to—
 (a) a burner or his assistant engaged at a periodic kiln fired with coal, coke, briquettes, or other solid fuel;
 (b) a drawer, other than one working at an electric or tunnel kiln;
 (c) a setter, placer, or employee wheeling into or out of a kiln, who, in the performance of his duties, has to wheel or carry over gritty kiln waste;
 (d) an employee working on a wet, muddy surface in a clayhole.
- (ii) An amount of 6d. per day or part thereof shall be paid as a clothing allowance to a pipe-machine operator whilst required to oil dies, and to a Mandril operator, other than on an automatic pipe machine.

FIRST-AID ROOM.

19. In any establishment with more than five employees, the employer shall provide a cubicle or room for the sole purpose of treating injuries. Such cubicle or room shall be equipped with first-aid facilities.

CHANGE AND DINING ROOMS.

20. Adequate change rooms, lockers, and dining rooms, and at least one hot shower shall be provided for employees.

PIECEWORK.

21. That the lowest piecework prices payable for the following kinds of work shall be as prescribed hereunder.

Within the Metropolitan District as defined in the Labour and Industry Act 1953, and the Orders in Council thereunder; such portions of the City of Heidelberg, and of the Shires of Broadmeadows, Doncaster, and Templestowe, as are not within the said District; the Cities of Chelsea and Mordialloc; and the Shires of Berwick, Bulla, Cranbourne, Dandenong, Eltham, Ferntree Gully, Gisborne, Kellor, Lilydale, Melton, Mulgrave, Romsey, Werribee, and Whittlesea.

PIECEWORK WHICH MAY BE FIXED BY AN EMPLOYER.

22. The Board determines that any employer may fix and pay piecework prices to any person employed in the glazed pipes and salt-glazed ware, general pottery and insulator making, and tile sections of the trade at work for which piecework prices have not been specified above, provided that any such employer shall base such piecework prices on the earnings of an average worker working under like conditions, and such piecework prices shall be fixed so that an average worker can earn not less than the wages rates that are fixed by the Board for such work.

PERIODICAL ADJUSTMENT OF WAGES.

23. The wages rates for males set out in clause 2 are based upon the following basic wage and, pursuant to the provisions of Section 33 of the *Labour and Industry Act 1953*, the Board hereby determines that such rates shall be automatically adjusted by the same amount and at the same time as such basic wage as prescribed in clause 24. Provided that adjustments to the rates for adult females, apprentices, and improvers and to the piecework prices, shall be made as follows:—

- (a) The basic wage for adult females shall be 75 per cent. (to the nearest 6d., half or less than half of 6d. to be disregarded) of the basic wage prescribed hereunder.
- (b) The wages rates for apprentices and improvers shall be adjusted according to the percentages set out in clause 25 of the respective basic wage for the sex and area in which they are employed; such adjustments shall be calculated to the nearest 6d., half or less than half of 6d. to be disregarded.
- (c) The earnings of pieceworkers shall be adjusted by adding or subtracting, as the case may be, to the amount set out in the margin the amount of the rise or fall in the basic wage.

ADJUSTMENT OF BASIC WAGE.

24. (a) For the purposes of this Determination, the expression "Commonwealth Statistician's 'all items' retail price index numbers" or any like expression, means the numbers stated to be such index numbers in any document purporting, and not proved to be wrongly so purporting, to be printed by the Commonwealth Government Printer or to be signed by or on behalf of the Commonwealth Statistician.

(b) Until the beginning of the first pay period to commence in November, 1954, the amount of the basic wage shall be as prescribed in clause 23.

(c) During each future successive period beginning with the first pay period to commence in a November, a February, a May, or an August, the amount of the basic wage shall be adjusted by the following method, namely, by multiplying the last published Commonwealth Statistician's "all items" retail price index number by the factor 103 taken to one place of decimals, the resultant whole number being the amount of the basic wage expressed in shillings, but should the decimal number reach .5 or more the basic wage shall be taken to the next higher shilling.

APPRENTICESHIP.

(Other than those covered by the Apprenticeship Commission.)

Apprenticeship Trades.

(a) An employer shall not employ minors in the following trade or occupations otherwise than under a contract of apprenticeship as hereinafter provided:—

Boilermaker and/or structural steel tradesman and/or welder special class.

Period of Apprenticeship.

(b) If the apprentice when indentured is under the age of seventeen years—five years; if over the age of seventeen years—four or five years, at the option of the contracting parties.

Contract of Apprenticeship.

(c) Every contract of apprenticeship hereinafter made shall contain—

- (i) the names of the parties;
- (ii) the date of birth of the apprentice;
- (iii) a statement of the trade or trades to which the apprentice is to be bound and which he is to be taught during the course and for the purpose of the apprenticeship;
- (iv) a covenant by the master to teach and instruct or cause the apprentice to be taught or instructed in the trade to which the apprentice is bound;
- (v) the date at which the apprenticeship is to commence or from which it is to be calculated;
- (vi) all other conditions of apprenticeship.

Cancellation or Suspension of Indentures.

(d) Subject to the approval of the Secretary for Labour and Industry, but not otherwise, an indenture of apprenticeship may be suspended or cancelled—

- (i) by mutual consent;
- (ii) if through lack of orders or financial difficulties an employer is unable to find suitable employment for an apprentice and a transfer to another employer cannot be arranged;
- (iii) if in the opinion of the Secretary for Labour and Industry, circumstances exist which render such suspension or cancellation necessary or desirable.

Any covenant in an indenture inconsistent with the provisions of this clause shall be null and void and of no force or effect while this Determination remains in force and applies to the parties to the indenture.

Instruction in Welding.

(e) The training of apprentices to boilermaking or structural steel work shall include instruction in electric welding and/or oxy-acetylene welding as far as is practicable with the facilities available in the shop in which they are trained.

Proportion.

(f) (i) The proportion of apprentices who may be taken by an employer shall not exceed one apprentice for every two or fraction of two tradesmen.

For the purpose of ascertaining the number of apprentices, the number of tradesmen shall be deemed to be the average number working during the immediately preceding six months, and, in ascertaining such proportion an employer actually working in any workshop shall be deemed to be a tradesman.

A person who is, for a term not exceeding two years, taking practical training in a workshop in continuance of a course of training for professional work shall not be taken into account in calculating the proportion of apprentices to journeymen.

(ii) Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore provided in the trade of boilermaker an employer may with the consent of the Apprenticeship Commission and upon satisfying that authority that he has the plant, equipment and staff necessary for the proper tuition of each apprentice concerned take apprentices in excess of the proportion herein prescribed. Until further order apprentices so taken shall not be counted in future calculations of the proportion of apprentices to journeymen authorized by this Determination.

Adult Apprentices.

(g) Any apprentice who cannot complete his full term of apprenticeship before reaching his twenty-second birthday may by agreement with his master, serve as an apprentice until he reaches the age of 23 years.

Probationary Period.

(h) Minors may be taken on probation for three months, and if apprenticed such three months shall count as part of their period of apprenticeship. An employer shall within fourteen days of employing a probationer notify the apprenticeship authorities of the employment of such probationer to any of the trades mentioned herein.

Wages.

(i) The minimum weekly rates of wage for apprentices shall be the under-mentioned percentages of the basic wage prescribed for the area in which they are employed, and in all contracts of apprenticeship hereafter made the employer shall covenant to pay wages of not less than such rates:

An employee who is under 21 years of age on the expiration of his apprenticeship and thereafter works as a minor in the occupation to which he has been apprenticed shall be paid at not less than the adult rate prescribed for that classification.

Hours.

(j) The ordinary hours of employment of apprentices shall not in each workshop exceed those of the journeymen.

Overtime and Shift Work.

(k) No apprentice under the age of eighteen years shall be required to work overtime or shift work unless he so desires.

No apprentice shall except in an emergency work or be required to work overtime or shift work at times which would prevent his attendance at technical school as required by any statute, determination, or regulation applicable to him.

Payment by Results.

(l) An apprentice shall not work under any system of payment by results.

Lost Time.

(m) The apprentice at the end of the calendar period of any year in which he has actually given service to the master upon less than the ordinary working days prescribed in this Determination, or on which he has unlawfully absented himself without the master's consent shall, for every day short of the said number of working days, and for every day of such absence, serve one day, and the calendar period of his service shall not be deemed to begin until the said additional day or days shall have been served. Provided that in calculating the extra time to be so served the apprentice shall be credited with time which he has worked during the relevant year in excess of his ordinary hours.

Prohibition of Premiums.

(n) An employer shall not, either directly or indirectly, or by any pretence or device receive from any person or require or permit any person to pay or give any consideration in the nature of a premium or bonus for the taking or binding of any probationer or apprentice.

Attendance at Technical Schools.

(o) Apprentices attending technical colleges or schools and presenting reports of satisfactory conduct shall be reimbursed all fees paid by them.

Annual and Sick Leave.

(p) Apprentices shall be entitled to sick and annual leave in accordance with the provisions of clauses 16 and 17 hereof respectively.

A junior employee of eighteen years or more shall be paid 3s. per week in addition to the rates prescribed herein while he is employed as a furnaceman or assistant to a furnaceman.

(b) The minimum rate payable to a junior employee of eighteen years or more with less than six months' experience under this Determination shall, until he has had such six months' experience, be 10 per cent. less than the amount represented by the percentage of the basic wage hereby prescribed for a junior employee of his age and in addition thereto the additional amount prescribed for such an employee.

(c) Junior employees employed on the following machines or operations shall be paid at not less than the appropriate adult minimum rates:—

- (i) Angle-iron cropping where the material weighs more than 3½ lb. per foot and is not clamped.
- (ii) Assisting steel furnace ladleman other than in daubing or repairing ladles.
- (iii) Assisting storemen racking and/or loading and/or unloading off vehicles of heavy steel plates, bars or sections.

APPRENTICESHIP.

5. (a) Youths shall not be engaged in the following occupations except under indentures of apprenticeship for the periods and subject to the conditions hereinafter prescribed :—

Patternmaking, electrical fitting, engineering fitting and turning, first and second class engineering machining, first-class welding, engineering blacksmithing, jobbing moulding and/or coremaking, sheet metal (first-class bench work) motor mechanic.

(b) In the trades immediately hereinafter mentioned the proportion of apprentices which may be taken by any employer shall be as follows :—

Mechanical engineering—one apprentice for every 3, or fraction of 3, tradesmen.

Electrical fitting—one apprentice for every 3, or fraction of 3, tradesmen.

Electrical mechanic—one apprentice for every 2, or fraction of 2, tradesmen.

Patternmaking—one apprentice for every 3, or fraction of 3, tradesmen.

Smithing—one apprentice for every 3, or fraction of 3, tradesmen.

Moulding—one apprentice for every 2, or fraction of 2, tradesmen.

(c) For the purpose of ascertaining the number of apprentices, the number of tradesmen shall be deemed to be the average number working during the immediately preceding six months, and in ascertaining such proportion, an employer actually working in any workshop shall be deemed to be a tradesman.

(i) The period of apprenticeship shall be as follows :—

If the apprentice when articulated is under the age of 17 years, five years; if over the age of 17 years, four or five years, at the option of the contracting parties.

(ii) An employer especially qualified to teach apprentices may, with the consent of the Secretary for Labour, or of the State Apprenticeship Commission, employ a greater proportion of apprentices to tradesmen than hereinbefore specified.

(iii) Minors may be taken on probation for three months, and, if apprenticed, such three months shall count as part of their period of apprenticeship.

(iv) Until further order, any contract of apprenticeship hereafter made may contain the following provision :—

If through lack of orders or through financial difficulties, the employer is unable at any time to find employment and training for an apprentice, and if a transfer to another employer cannot be arranged, the obligations and duties imposed by the indenture may with the concurrence of the apprentice and his guardian be suspended for a period agreed upon, or if no such agreement is arrived at, may be cancelled by the employer. The onus of proof of circumstances justifying such cancellation shall be on the employer.

This clause shall not apply to apprenticeship controlled by the State Apprenticeship Commission, but such Commission shall be free to adopt such schemes for suspension or cancellation of indentures as it may deem reasonable.

The sum of 4s. per week shall be added to the above rates in the case of apprentice patternmakers.

The total wages of apprentices shall be calculated to the nearest sixpence, any broken part of sixpence in the result not exceeding threepence to be disregarded.

An employee who is under 21 years of age on the expiration of his apprenticeship and thereafter works as a minor in the occupation to which he has been apprenticed shall be paid at not less than the adult rate prescribed for that classification.

- (vi) The ordinary hours of employment of apprentices shall be the same in each workshop as those of journeymen in the trade the apprentice is learning.
- (vii) No apprentice under the age of 18 years shall be liable to work overtime unless he so desires.
- (viii) No apprentice shall work under any system of payment by results.
- (ix) Any apprentice who cannot complete his full term of apprenticeship before reaching his 22nd birthday may, by agreement with his master, serve as an apprentice until he reaches the age of 23 years.
- (x) The apprentice at the end of the calendar period of any year in which he has actually given service to the master upon less than the ordinary working days prescribed in the Determination for the trade, or in which he has unlawfully absented himself without the master's consent shall, for every day short of the said number of working days, and for every day of such absence, serve one day, and the calendar period of the succeeding year of his service shall not be deemed to begin until the said additional day or days shall have been served.
- (xi) No employer shall, either directly or indirectly, or by any pretence or device, receive from any person or require or permit any person to pay or give any consideration in the nature of a premium or bonus for the taking or binding of any probationer or apprentice.
- (xii) Apprentices attending technical colleges or schools and presenting reports of satisfactory conduct shall be reimbursed all fees paid by them.
- (xiii) Apprentices shall be entitled to annual leave and sick leave in accordance with the provisions of clauses 10A and 14A of this Determination respectively.

(b) Except in the case of employees in foundries, the minimum rate payable to a junior female of any age or a junior male of eighteen years or more each with less than six months' experience in the Metal Trades industry shall, until he or she has had six months' experience, be 10 per cent. less than the amount represented by the percentage of the basic wage prescribed for a junior employee of his or her age, and, in addition thereto, the additional amounts set out in clause 25 (d).

Clauses, other than clauses 2, 5 and 6, of the said Determination shall remain in force.

RULES OF THE SUPREME COURT.







CITY OF WARRNAMBOOL.

BY-LAW No. 106.

A By-law of the City of Warrnambool, made under section 197 of the *Local Government Act* 1946, and numbered 106, for appointing, in streets and roads standing places for motor-cars, for regulating the use of such standing places, for prohibiting the leaving (whether unattended or not) of motor-cars and other vehicles standing in any street or road or part thereof specified in this By-law and for requiring information as to the identity of persons committing offences; for the regulation of traffic and generally for maintaining the good rule and government of the Municipality.

Summary of Contents of the By-law.

1. Definitions.
2. Clause 2 prescribes standing places for motor-cars called "parking areas."
3. Clause 3 prescribes the days and hours during which parking areas shall be available for parking.
4. Clause 4 prescribes the matter of parking vehicles generally.
5. Clause 5 prescribes the manner in which vehicles shall be placed when parked on the southern side of Raglan-parade between Banyan-street and Fairy-street.
6. Clause 6 makes provision for the discontinuance of parking areas and for the employment of officers and attendants.
7. Clause 7 prohibits the use of parking areas for certain purposes.
8. Clause 8 prohibits the parking of vehicles in certain places.
9. Clause 9 prohibits interference with marks and signs in parking areas and elsewhere.
10. Clause 10 regulates the parking of caravans or caravan trailers.
11. Clauses 11 to 15 inclusive prescribe areas for the picking up and setting down of passengers by commercial passenger vehicles and areas set aside as standing places for hire cars.
12. Clause 16 provides for the furnishing of information relating to contraventions of the By-law.
13. Clause 17 authorizes, in certain circumstances the parking of a commercial goods vehicle in manner which would otherwise be a breach of clause 4 (c) of the By-law.
14. Clauses 18 and 19 relate to offences against the By-law and prescribe a penalty not exceeding £10 for an offence.

First Schedule contains a list of parking areas.

Second Schedule contains a list of places in front of which parking is prohibited.

Third Schedule contains a list of areas set aside for picking up and setting down of passengers by commercial passenger vehicles.

Fourth Schedule contains a list of areas set aside as standing places for hire cars engaged in plying for hire.

Minimum Area, Depth, Width of Frontage, and Minimum Distance of Outer Walls from Boundaries.

1. By-law No. 68 of this Town is hereby repealed.
2. The minimum area, depth, width of frontage, and the minimum distance of outer walls from boundaries specified in column 3 of Table 803 of the *Uniform Building Regulations*, Victoria, as amended by the *Uniform Building Regulations Amending Regulations No. 4* (hereinafter called the *Regulations*) are hereby adopted as the minimum area, depth, width of frontage, and minimum distance of outer walls from boundaries for land on which a building shall be constructed throughout the municipality. Provided that should the Council in open meeting and by a simple majority so determine the minimum block frontage so specified may be reduced to not less than 49 feet, providing the minimum area of the site be not reduced below 6,300 square feet. This proviso, however, shall only extend to bona fide cases where a subdivision of the land in the possession of the one owner would, if 50 feet frontage were insisted upon, have the effect of creating lots of greater frontage than reasonably required, having regard to the locality and general purpose of the subdivision.

Sites Below Minimum Requirements.

3. Notwithstanding anything contained in the *Regulations*, the Council, on application in writing by the owner of the land falling within the classes hereinafter mentioned, may, by resolution carried by a majority of the Council, issue a permit to such owner to:—

- (a) construct a building of Class I. or II. occupancy on land of a lesser area, depth, or width of frontage, or at a lesser distance from the boundaries than those specified in column 3 of Table 803 of the *Regulations*, or
- (b) construct a building of Class III., IV., V., VI., VII., or VIII. occupancy on land having an area, depth, or width of frontage less than that prescribed in clause 808 of the *Regulations*—

in any case where, on the date of the commencement of the *Regulations* such land existed as a separate allotment and has not since been reduced in area, or is shown on any plan of subdivision approved by the Council and lodged in the Office of Titles.

Rear Access.

4. In the case of a building on any land forming part of a subdivision approved by the Council and lodged with the Office of Titles prior to the date of the commencement of the *Regulations*, the requirements of clause 811 of the *Regulations* are hereby dispensed with.

5. This By-law shall have effect throughout the whole of the Municipal District of the Town of Portland.

6. This By-law shall come into operation when confirmed by the Governor in Council and immediately after publication in the *Victoria Government Gazette*.

- (d) shall be distant not less than 5 feet from any other street or road of a lesser width than 25 feet or from the boundary of any adjoining allotment of land;
- (e) shall be distant not less than 40 feet from any dwelling, whether on the same or adjoining land;
- (f) shall be covered and roofed with a material approved by Council's building surveyor.
