Vegetation Diseases (Fruit Fly) Act 1947 (No. 5258). DECLARING A PROCLAIMED AREA.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by section 3 of the Vegetation Diseases (Fruit Fly) Act 1947 (No. 5258), it is provided that, where the Governor in Council is of opinion that it is necessary the Governor in Council is of opinion that it is necessary to protect the fruit industry against the introduction or spread of the insects of the family Trypetidae (commonly known as fruit flies), he may by Proclamation declare any portion of Victoria specified therein to be a proclaimed area, and prohibit the planting on any land in the proclaimed area of any plant or vegetable specified, and prohibit the removal from any property within the proclaimed area to any other property within the area and from any place in the proclaimed area to any place outside the area of any fruit or vegetable, and require occupiers and owners of land in the proclaimed area to take such action for the eradication or prevention of the spread of fruit fly as is specified in the Proclamation: Now, therefore, I, the Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, being of opinion that it is necessary to protect the fruit industry of Victoria against the introduction or spread of the insects of the family Trypetidae (commonly known as fruit flies), and by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, do by this my Proclamation hereby—

1. Declare that portion of Victoria—

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In the City of Coburg and the Shires of Broadmeadows and Keilor, commencing at the intersection of Sussex-street and Boundary-road; thence westerly along Boundary-road, Stephens-street, Pascoe-street, Rhodes-parade, and Barina-road to the Melbourne-Albury railway line; thence westerly across the Melbourne-Albury railway line to Cartwright-street; thence southerly and westerly along Cartwright-street; thence southerly and westerly along Cartwright-street to Pascoe Vale-road; thence northerly along Pascoe Vale-road to Willet-avenue; thence westerly along Willet-avenue to Josephine-street; thence northerly along Josephine-street to Devereaux-street; thence westerly along Devereaux-street to the Moonee Ponds Creek; thence northerly along the Moonee Ponds Creek to the Albion-Broadmeadows railway line;

thence southerly along the Albion-Broadmeadows railway line to Bulla-road; thence southerly along Bullaroad to Devonshire-parade; thence easterly along Devonshire-parade to Birdwood-street; thence northerly along Birdwood-street to Kerferd-street; thence south-easterly along Kerferd-street and Orange-grove to Bulla-road; thence across Bulla-road to Woodlands-street; thence easterly along Woodlands-street to the Moonee Ponds Creek; thence southerly along Gordon-street; thence easterly along Gordon-street to Murray-street; thence easterly along Murray-street to Flinders-street; thence northerly along Murray-street to Flinders-street; thence northerly along Dawson-street to Bakers-road; thence westerly along Bakers-road to Sussex-street; thence northerly along Sussex-street to Boundary-road at the commencing point, to be a proclaimed area.

- 2. Prohibit the removal from any property within the proclaimed area to any other property within the area and from any place within the proclaimed area to any place outside the proclaimed area of any fruit or vegetable excepting fruit and vegetables removed on the instruction of an inspector, provided the Superintendent of Horticulture of the Department of Agriculture may approve of the occupier or owner of a commercial orchard, as defined in the Act, situated not less than 1 mile from where fruit fly is known to have occurred, removing any of the foregoing fruit and/or vegetables to a specified place outside the proclaimed area if each fruit and/or vegetable in the consignment from such commercial orchard is examined by an inspector immediately prior to despatch and every such fruit and/or vegetable is found to be free from fruit fly, and may further approve of the movement of fruit in retail trade which is subject to such inspection as to ensure that the fruit is free from fruit fly. fruit fly.
- 3. Require occupiers and owners of land in the pro-claimed area to give access to such land at all times to an inspector and/or his assistants for the purpose of inspection and/or applying to trees and plants on such properties any spray material which, in the opinion of an inspector, is necessary for the eradication or prevention of the spread of fruit flies and/or for the purpose of removing any fruit or vegetables or prohibited plant.

- 4. Require occupiers and owners of land in the proclaimed area to take action as and when directed by a notice served on such occupier or owner by an inspector and within the time specified in such notice-
 - (a) To remove all plants of-

Tomato (Lycopersicum sp.), Tomato (Lycopersicum sp.),
Pepper (Capsicum sp.),
Egg Plant (Solanum melongena),
Ornamental Solanum (Solanum sp.),
Rock Melon (Cucumis sp.),
Sweet Melon (Cucumis sp.),
Cucumber (Cucumis sp.),
Cape Gooseberry (Physalis edulis),
Brambles (except cultivated varieties),
Box Thorn, provided that where box thorn is
grown as a hedge along a boundary or grown as a hedge along a boundary or dividing fence the occupier or owner may continue to so grow it on the following conditions:—

- (i) Cut back the hedge forthwith and periodically as necessary to retain it within a height not exceeding six (6) feet from the ground level and a width not exceeding two (2) feet.
- (ii) That when such hedge has been cut back to within the foregoing dimensions, he shall thoroughly spray it forthwith to cover all parts of the plants forming the hedge with a solution containing two thousand (2,000) parts of two-four Dichloro-phenoxy-acetic acid (2-4D), or one of its derivatives, to one million (1,000,000) parts of water (0.2 per cent.) and he shall spray it thereafter as often as is necessary to prevent the plants from forming fruit.

and refrain from planting such plants while this Proclamation remains in force.

(b) To remove from all trees and plants growing upon the said land and to pick up from the said land all of the following fruits and/or

Apples, apricots, brambles and other berry fruits, cape gooseberries, cherries, citrus fruits, cucumbers, egg fruit, figs, gooseberries, grapes, guavas, loquats, medlars, nectarines, passion fruit, peaches, pears, peppers, persimmons, plums, prunes, quinces, rock melons, sweet melons, tomatoes, and all edible fruits of all trees and plants, including all such fruit and vegetables which shall form on such trees and plants after the service of the said notice during such time as this Proclamasaid notice during such time as this Proclama-tion remains in force.

 (c) To dispose of all such fruits and/or vegetables by boiling for fifteen (15) minutes, or burning them so as to destroy all eggs and larvae of the fruit fly or burying them under a depth of soil of at least 3 feet after having applied to the upper layer of such buried fruit or vegetables D.D.T. at the rate of not less than one half-ounce per square yard in the form of a spray containing not less than 0.2 per cent. of the pure para para isomer of D.D.T. or in the form of a dust containing not less than 2 per cent. of the pure para para isomer of D.D.T., or by otherwise treating them as an inspector may direct, in such a manner as to kill all eggs, larvae and pupae of fruit flies.
- eggs, larvae and pupae of fruit files.

 (d) To spray all trees and plants growing on the said land with a solution containing two thousand (2,000) parts of Dichloro-diphenyl-trichloro-ethane (D.D.T.) to one million parts of water (0.2 per cent.) or, in the case of a commercial orchard equipped with a power spraying plant approved by an inspector, with a solution containing one thousand (1,000) parts of D.D.T. to one million parts of water (0.1 per cent.) at intervals not exceeding twenty-one (21) days during the period specified in such notice.
- (e) To treat the soil beneath and around trees suspected by an inspector to be infested or to have been infested with fruit fly by applying uniformly to the surface of an area or areas marked by an inspector a dust containing 1 per cent. of the pure gamma isomer of benzene hexachloride at the rate of not less than (2) two ounces per square yard.

- (f) To reduce, if necessary, all tall growing trees and plants covered by this Proclamation, except when grown as a commercial orchard or plantation, to a height which will permit them to be stripped of fruit and/or sprayed to the satisfaction of an inspector.

2. That Award No. 34, dated 7th December, 1936, as varied, be further varied as set out hereunder by deleting all the provisions headed "Shift Work" and substituting therefor the following:—

" Afternoon and Night Shifts.

- (a) For all time worked on afternoon or night shifts by workers in continuous process 7½ per cent. shall be added to ordinary rates;
- (b) For all time worked on afternoon or night shifts by workers on other than continuous work 10 per cent. shall be added to ordinary rates;
- (c) A worker who-
 - (i) during a period of engagement on shift, works night shift only; or
 - (ii) remains on night shift for a longer period than four consecutive weeks; or
 - (iii) works on a night shift which does not rotate or alternate with another shift or with day work so as to give him at least one-third of his working time off night shift in each shift cycle;

shall during such engagement, period, or cycle be paid at the rate of time and one-quarter for all time worked during ordinary working hours on such night shifts;

- (d) Where a colliery is hauling and tipping coal on day and afternoon shift 12½ per cent. shall be added to ordinary rates for all time worked on afternoon shift provided that such percentage shall not be additional upon the percentages prescribed in sub-clauses (a), (b), and (c) hereof;
- (e) If a worker who ordinarily works a day shift only is required to work shift work on at least three successive working days he shall be paid at overtime rates for the first

afternoon or night shift he works and thereafter he shall be paid in accordance with the foregoing provisions of this clause for such other shifts.

If such worker be required to work shift work for a period less than three consecutive working days overtime rates shall be paid for such afternoon or night shift work unless such requirement be caused by the failure of any other worker to come on duty at the proper time."

- 3. That Award No. 76, dated 6th July, 1951, be varied as set out hereunder by inserting after Clause 2 (b) the following:—
 - 3. (a) Each adult male worker in any of the classifications in clause 1 (a) hereof who becomes entitled to the bonus payment prescribed in sub-clause (a) of clause 1 hereof, shall in addition thereto be entitled to payment of bonus payment allowance loadings in accordance with the following scale:—
 - (i) An adult male worker in receipt of a weekly marginal rate of 57s. or more—a fortnightly loading of 15s.;
 - (ii) An adult male worker in receipt of a weekly marginal rate of less than 57s.—a fortnightly loading of 5s.
 - (b) Each adult male worker in any of the classifications mentioned in clause 1 (a) hereof who becomes entitled to a payment of a proportion only of the bonus payment prescribed in sub-clause (a) of clause 1 hereof shall in addition thereto be entitled to payment of bonus payment loadings in accordance with the following scale:—
 - (i) An adult male worker in receipt of a weekly marginal rate of 57s. or more—a shift loading of 1s. 6d. for each production day worked by him;
 - (ii) An adult male worker in receipt of a weekly marginal rate of less than 57s.—a shift loading of 6d. for each production day worked by him.
- 4. That the provisions of this award shall come into operation as on and from the nineteenth day of September, 1954, and shall remain in force until the eighth day of January, 1955.

- (b) Adult male workers whilst engaged in the classifications provided for hereunder shall be paid the minimum adult wage prescribed in sub-clause (a) of this clause and in addition the appropriate margin prescribed in the following table:—

- (c) The appropriate daily wage per shift shall be ascertained by dividing the total weekly wage in accordance with the following:—

When working on a basis of 5 shifts per week .. by 5

When working on a basis of 6 shifts per week ... by 6 When working on a basis of 11 shifts per fortnight ... by $5\frac{1}{2}$

Provided that the total rate per shift shall be calculated to the nearest penny per day.

ORDINARY Hours.

2. (a) The ordinary hours of duty of workers in the under-mentioned grades shall be 80 per fortnight, comprising 10 shifts of 8 hours each, to be worked on Mondays to Fridays, inclusive:—

Deputy Dirt Inspector Weighman Wheeler (Boss)

(b) The ordinary hours of duty of workers in the following grades shall be 80 per fortnight:—

Car Driver Foreman Carpenter
Caretaker Foreman Drills
Gardener Foreman Electrical Fitter
Sanitaryman-in-charge Foreman Fitter

Storeman Stables
Weighbridge Attendant Foreman Stables
Foreman Town Electric Supply

Oversman Foreman Yards

OVERTIME.

- 3. (a) All time worked in excess of or outside the ordinary hours of work shall be paid for at the rate of time and one-half for the first four hours and double time thereafter on any day.
- (b) When a worker is required to work in such a way that he cannot commence his crib by the usual time or within a period of not less than one hour after such commencement, he shall be paid at overtime rates from the commencement of his usual meal time until he is permitted to commence his crib.
- (c) When a worker is required to continue his shift for more than two hours beyond the usual termination thereof without being notified in time to enable him before leaving home for work to provide himself with a meal, provision shall be made to procure a meal for him, or else he shall be paid 3s. in lieu thereof. When it appears that such overtime work will extend over a long period provision shall be made to procure a meal for him as soon as possible after the usual termination of his shift; thereafter he shall be dealt with in accordance with sub-clause (d) hereof.
- (d) A worker working overtime shall be allowed a crib time of 30 minutes without deduction of pay after each four hours of overtime worked and provision shall be made to procure a meal for him at each such crib interval, or else he shall be paid 3s. in lieu thereof.

- (e) When a worker is required to hold himself in readiness for a call to work after ordinary hours, a time shall be stated from which he is to hold himself in readiness; and unless such call has been previously countermanded, he shall be paid at ordinary rates for the time he has held himself in readiness.
- (f) When a worker, having left the employer's premises after completion of his ordinary shift, is recalled to work he shall be paid at least as for four hours' work at ordinary rates, except where otherwise provided in any other award of this Tribunal.
- (g) The provisions of sub-clause (f) hereof are not to be applied to workers in the grades of foreman carpenter, foreman electrical fitter, foreman fitter, foreman stables, or foreman yards.

AFTERNOON AND NIGHT SHIFTS.

- 4. (a) For all time worked on afternoon or night shifts by workers in continuous process $7\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. shall be added to ordinary rates.
- (b) For all time worked on afternoon or night shifts by workers on other than continuous work 10 per cent. shall be added to ordinary rates.
 - (c) A worker who-
 - (i) during a period of engagement on shift, works night shift only; or

(ii) remains on night shift for a longer period than four consecutive weeks; or

(iii) works on a night shift which does not rotate or alternate with another shift or with day work so as to give him at least one-third of his working time off night shift in each shift cycle;

shall during such engagement, period, or cycle be paid at the rate of time and one-quarter for all time worked during ordinary working hours on such night shifts.

- (d) Where a colliery is hauling and tipping coal on day and afternoon shift, 12½ per cent. shall be added to ordinary rates for all time worked on afternoon shift provided that such percentage shall not be additional upon the percentages prescribed in sub-clauses (a), (b), and (c) hereof.
- (e) If a worker who ordinarily works a day shift only is required to work shift work on at least three successive working days he shall be paid at overtime rates for the first afternoon or night shift he works and thereafter he shall be paid in accordance with the foregoing provisions of this clause for such other shifts.

. If such worker be required to work shift work for a period less than three consecutive working days overtime rates shall be paid for such afternoon or night shift work unless such requirement be caused by the failure of any other worker to come on duty at the proper time.

SUNDAY AND HOLIDAY WORK.

- 5. (a) Where the work of any grade of workers is so continuous over the whole week as to necessitate their being rostered for work regularly on Sundays and/or holidays, the rate for such work shall be time and a half; provided that any grade of workers who are at present being paid on the basis of a 6-hour shift for such work shall continue to be so paid.
- (b) The rate for all other Sunday and holiday work shall be double time

(c) Any worker called on to work on Sunday or a holiday shall be paid for at least four hours at ordinary rates, except where otherwise provided in any other Award of this Tribunal.

- "Holidays" shall mean the holiday specified in the Coal Mines Regulation Act or any other Act forbidding work at the State Coal Mine on any other day and shall include Anzac Day.
- (d) Any worker covered by Part III. of the Schedule to the State Coal Mine Industrial Tribunal Act 1932 (No. 4030) not required to work on Good Friday, Easter Monday, or Anzac Day shall be paid for each of the said days the day-shift rate prescribed for his classification.

TRAVELLING TIME AND EXPENSES.

6. (a) When a worker is required to work away temporarily from his ordinary location, all time reasonably spent outside his ordinary hours of work in travelling between his home and his temporary location on the State Mine coal field, in excess of ten minutes beyond the time usually spent in travelling between his home and his ordinary

location shall be paid for at ordinary rates; and/or any expense reasonably incurred in such travelling, in excess of the expense usually incurred in travelling between his home and his ordinary location, shall be refunded to him.

(b) The following allowances for travelling shall be paid to Drill Foremen, Drill Sub-foremen, and Drill Assistants when—

 (i) working at a location at least three miles in a direct line from the Wonthaggi Post Office—1s. per shift;

(ii) working at a location in the Kirrak Area within the three miles above specified—6d. per shift.

WET PAY.

7. (a) Any surface worker who is required to work in a wet place for at least one hour during a shift, if not provided with clothing and/or footwear so as to protect him from getting wet, shall be paid 1s. extra for such shift, unless the wet conditions occur in the last two hours of the shift.

• (b) Any worker underground (other than a worker engaged in driving stone drives) who is required to work in a wet place for at least one hour during a shift, shall be paid 1s. 3d. extra for such shift unless the wet conditions occur in the last two hours of the shift; but this provision shall not apply to cases where at present workers are provided with protective clothing and/or footwear, which protects them from becoming wet.

(c) A place shall be deemed to be wet when water other than rain is flowing or dripping from overhead to such an extent as to saturate the clothing of the worker and/or when the worker is required to

work in water more than two inches deep.

(d) The present practice relating to the payment of workers engaged in driving stone drives, working in wet places shall continue, except that the rates in such cases shall be 1s. 3d. in wet places and 2s. 6d. in extra wet places, unless altered by any award of the Tribunal referring specifically to such rates.

Provision Against Wet Weather.

8. Workers (except those the nature of whose duties ordinarily requires them to work out in the open throughout the shift) who are required to work in the rain shall, as far as practicable, be provided with suitable clothing to protect them therefrom, but this provision shall not be construed in such a way as to deprive any other worker, at present provided with waterproof clothing, from such protection.

DIRT ALLOWANCE.

9. Dirt money at the rate of 1s. per shift or part thereof shall be paid to workers on the surface whilst engaged in stripping and replacing gear wheels of pumps and haulages which are covered with oil or grease, also stripping, repairing, and replacing sprocket wheel of creeper chains and for work on creeper chains, soreens, and conveyors whilst in position, and which are covered with oil or grease, and for work done inside crank-case engines, and generally for all work of a similar nature where the parts are covered with oil or grease; or when working in the inside of any furnace, boiler pass, flue, up-take, or combustion chamber which is in a dirty condition.

HEAT ALLOWANCE.

10. Should any metal trade worker be required to perform work in any place where the shade temperature is raised by artificial means to 115 degrees Fahr. or more, he shall be paid 1s. 6d. per hour in addition to his ordinary rates.

WORK IN CONFINED SPACES.

11. Workers on the surface, working in a space, the dimensions of which necessitate their working in a stoped or otherwise cramped position or without proper ventilation, or where confinement within a limited space is productive of unusual discomfort, shall be paid 3d. per hour in addition to the ordinary rates.

BONUS PAYMENT.

12. (a) Each adult male worker in any of the under-mentioned classifications—

Wheeler (boss) Car Driver Deputy Caretaker Oversman Dirt Inspector Foreman Carpenter Gardener Foreman Electrical Fitter Sanitaryman-in-charge Foreman Fitter Storeman Foreman Stables Weighbridge Attendant Foreman Yards Weighman

who works for the ten ordinary days comprising a pay period shall in respect of that period, if at the pit at which he is stationed there has been production on each of the said days, or if he is not stationed at any particular pit there has been production at the State Coal Mines on each of the said days, be entitled (in addition to his ordinary earnings) to payment as for a shift at the appropriate rate for him.

- (b) Each adult male worker as set out in sub-clause (a) of this clause who is absent from work for portion of a pay period on paid sick leave or on workers' compensation but who works on all other ordinary working days during the said period shall, in respect of that period, if at the pit at which he is stationed there has been production on each of the said days, or if he is not stationed at any particular pit there has been production at the State Coal Mines on each of the said days, be entitled (in addition to his ordinary earnings) to payment of one-tenth of a shift at the appropriate rate for him for each day worked by him.
- (c) Where during a pay period a pit has, or the whole of the pits at the State Coal Mines have been out of production through the occurrence of a recognized holiday, a mechanical breakdown, a fire, a flood, or through a strike by other employees, subject to there being work for the production of coal on all other ordinary working days during the said period, each adult male worker, provided for in the terms of sub-clause (a) of this clause, who on all of the working days comprising the said pay period attends for work and is available to perform such work as the management may reasonably require shall be entitled in respect of that period (in addition to his ordinary earnings) to payment of one-tenth of a shift at the appropriate rate for him for each production shift worked by him.
- (d) Where during a pay period a pit has, or the whole of the pits at the State Coal Mines have been out of production through the occurrence of a recognized holiday, a mechanical breakdown, a fire, a flood, or through a strike by other employees, subject to there being work for the production of coal on all other ordinary working days during the said period, each adult male worker provided for in the terms of sub-clause (a) of this clause, who is absent from work for portion of the said pay period on paid sick leave or workers' compensation but who on all other ordinary working days of the said period attends for work and is available to perform such work as the management may reasonably require shall be entitled in respect of that period (in addition to his ordinary earnings) to payment of one-tenth of a shift at the appropriate rate for him for each production day worked by him.

This Award shall not apply to any worker engaged at the Montague Coal Depot, or to Clerks.

This Award shall come into operation as on and from the ninth day of January, 1955.

"No split paling or sawn hardwood paling fence and no close fence of iron or other material exceeding 4 feet in height above the footpath level shall be erected abutting on or within 10 feet of any street or road except that in the case of a corner allotment this clause shall apply only to the fence abutting on one of the streets and the first 30 feet of the other fence measured from the intersection of the building lines of the two streets, provided however that where an allotment of land is not on the corner of two streets a close fence not exceeding 6 feet in height above footpath level may be constructed along the frontage of any public hall, factory, school or church if same is constructed in accordance with the following specifications:—Posts shall consist of 8 ft. 5 in. x 3 in. redgum or jarrah spaced 9 feet centre to centre and properly fitted with 3 in. x 2 in. jarrah sole plates 2 ft. 9 in. long, and 3 in. x 2 in. jarrah struts, and sunk 2 feet into the ground. Top and bottom rails shall be of 3 in. x 2 in. hardwood, and a centre rail of 3 in. x 1 in. hardwood. The plinth shall be of 6 in. x 1 in. palings shall be spaced 2 inches apart and securely nailed to each rail. The 4 in. x 1 in. palings shall be lapped 1 in. over every 6 in. x 1 in. palings and shall be nailed securely to each rail. The tops of all palings shall be cut to neat lines."

Leading hands in charge of not less than three and not more than ten employees, 15s. per week extra; more than ten and not more than twenty employees, 30s. per week extra; more than twenty employees, 45s. per week extra.

Provided that an employee in an electric supply undertaking detailed to act as leading hand in charge of two other adult employees working away from power station or workshop (one of whom is of the same classification as himself) shall be paid 6s. per week extra.

Tradesmen and/or welders, and/or apprentices in the fourth and fifth years of their apprenticeship employed in large-operating thermal power houses (i.e., power houses developing more than 8,000 kilowatts) other than those not on the regular staff engaged on new construction work shall be paid 15s. per week extra; assistants and unapprenticed juniors nineteen years of age and over shall be paid 7s. 6d. per week extra and other apprentices and unapprenticed juniors shall be paid 8s. per week extra; such amounts shall be deemed to include all special rates prescribed in clause 5 of this Determination. This allowance shall continue to be payable to tradesmen attached to the staffs of such power houses while carrying out repairs or maintenance in rotary converter sub-stations which are in regular operation.

Apprenticeship Trades.

(a) An employer shall not employ minors in the following trade or occupations otherwise than under a contract of apprenticeship as hereinafter provided:-

Boilermaker and/or structural steel tradesman and/or welder special class.

Period of Apprenticeship.

(b) If the apprentice when indentured is under the age of seventeen years—five years; if over the age of seventeen years—four or five years, at the option of the contracting parties.

Contract of Apprenticeship.

- (c) Every contract of apprenticeship hereinafter made shall contain-

 - (i) the names of the parties;
 (ii) the date of birth of the apprentice;
 (iii) the date of birth of the apprentice;
 (iii) a statement of the trade or trades to which the apprentice is to be bound and which he is to be taught during the course and for the purpose of the apprenticeship;
 (iv) a covenant by the master to teach and instruct or cause the apprentice to be taught or instructed in the trade to which the apprentice is bound;
 (v) the date at which the apprenticeship is to commence or from which it is to be calculated;
 (vi) all other conditions of apprenticeship.

Cancellation or Suspension of Indentures.

- (d) Subject to the approval of the Secretary for Labour and Industry, but not otherwise, an indenture of apprenticeship may be suspended or cancelled—
 - (i) by mutual consent;
 - (ii) if through lack of orders or financial difficulties an employer is unable to find suitable employment for an apprentice and a transfer to another employer cannot be arranged;
 - (iii) if in the opinion of the Secretary for Labour and Industry, circumstances exist which render such suspension or cancellation necessary or desirable.

Any covenant in an indenture inconsistent with the provisions of this clause shall be null and void and of no force or effect while this Determination remains in force and applies to the parties to the indenture.

Instruction in Welding.

(e) The training of apprentices to boilermaking or structural steel work shall include instruction in electric welding and/or oxy-acetylene welding as far as is practicable with the facilities available in the shop in which they are trained.

Proportion.

(f) (i) The proportion of apprentices who may be taken by an employer shall not exceed one apprentice for every two or fraction of two tradesmen.

For the purpose of ascertaining the number of apprentices, the number of tradesmen shall be deemed to be the average number working during the immediately preceding six months, and, in ascertaining such proportion an employer actually working in any workshop shall be deemed to be a tradesman.

- A person who is, for a term not exceeding two years, taking practical training in a workshop in continuance of a course of training for professional work shall not be taken into account in calculating the proportion of apprentices to journeymen.
- (ii) Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore provided in the trade of boilermaker an employer may with the consent of the Apprenticeship Commission and upon satisfying that authority that he has the plant, equipment and staff necessary for the proper tuition of each apprentice concerned take apprentices in excess of the proportion herein prescribed. Until further order apprentices to taken shall not be counted in future calculations of the proportion of apprentices to journeymen authorized by this Determination.

Adult Apprentices.

(g) Any apprentice who cannot complete his full term of apprenticeship before reaching his twenty-second birthday may by agreement with his master, serve as an apprentice until he reaches the age of 23 years.

Probationary Period.

(h) Minors may be taken on probation for three months, and if apprenticed such three months shall count as part of their period of apprenticeship. An employer shall within fourteen days of employing a probationer notify the apprenticeship authorities of the employment of such probationer to any of the trades mentioned herein.

Wages.

(i) The minimum weekly rates of wage for apprentices shall be the under-mentioned percentages of the basic wage prescribed for the area in which they are employed, and in all contracts of apprenticeship hereafter made the employer shall covenant to pay wages of not less than such rates:

An employee who is under 21 years of age on the expiration of his apprenticeship and thereafter works as a minor in the occupation to which he has been apprenticed shall be paid at not less than the adult rate prescribed for that classification.

Hours.

(j) The ordinary hours of employment of apprentices shall not in each workshop exceed those of the journeymen.

Overtime and Shift Work.

(k) No apprentice under the age of eighteen years shall be required to work overtime or shift work unless he so desires. No apprentice shall except in an emergency work or be required to work overtime or shift work at times which would prevent his attendance at technical school as required by any statute, determination, or regulation applicable to him.

Payment by Results.

(1) An apprentice shall not work under any system of payment by results.

Lost Time.

(m) The apprentice at the end of the calendar period of any year in which he has actually given service to the master upon less than the ordinary working days prescribed in this Determination, or on which he has unlawfully absented himself without the master's consent shall, for every day short of the said number of working days, and for every day of such absence, serve one day, and the calendar period of the succeeding year of his service shall not be deemed to begin until the said additional day or days shall have been served. Provided that in calculating the extra time to be so served the apprentice shall be credited with time which he has worked during the relevant year in excess of his ordinary hours.

(n) An employer shall not, either directly or indirectly, or by any pretence or device receive from any person or require or permit any person to pay or give any consideration in the nature of a premium or bonus for the taking or binding of any probationer or apprentice.

Attendance at Technical Schools.

- (o) Apprentices attending technical colleges or schools and presenting reports of satisfactory conduct shall be reimbursed all fees paid by them. Annual and Sick Leave.
- (p) Apprentices shall be entitled to sick and annual leave in accordance with the provisions of clauses 16 and 17 hereof respectively. UNAPPRENTICED MALE JUNIORS.
- 4. (a) Subject to the exceptions hereinafter provided, the minimum rates of wage for unapprenticed male juniors employed in occupations for which apprenticeship is not provided by this Determination shall be the undermentioned:—

A junior employee of eighteen years or more shall be paid 3s. per week in addition to the rates prescribed herein while he is employed as a furnaceman or assistant to a furnaceman.

(b) The minimum rate payable to a junior employee of eighteen years or more with less than six months' experience under this Determination shall, until he has had such six months' experience, be 10 per cent. less than the amount represented by the percentage of the basic wage hereby prescribed for a junior employee of his age and in addition thereto the additional amount prescribed for such an employee.

(c) Junior employees employed on the following machines or operations shall be paid at not less than the appropriate adult minimum rates:—
