AMENDMENT OF THE SIXTH SCHEDULE TO THE POISONS ACT 1928 (No. 3748), AS AMENDED BY ACT No. 3918.

### PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

BY virtue of the powers conferred by section thirty-eight of the *Poisons Act* 1928 (No. 3748) as amended by section five of the *Poisons Act* 1930 (No. 3918), I, the Governor of the State of Victoria by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State and on the recommendation of the Pharmacy Board of Victoria do by this my Proclamation add to paragraph (2) of the Sixth Schedule to the *Poisons Act* 1928, as amended by the *Poisons Act* 1930, the names of the following substances or preparations, namely:—

- \* "Thiacetazone and all other derivatives of benzaldehyde thiosemicarbazone and their preparations and admixtures."

And declare that Division 2 of Part III. of the *Poisons Act* 1928 as amended by the *Poisons Act* 1930 shall apply to the substances or preparations named herein in the same manner as it applies to substances or preparations mentioned in the said paragraph (2) of the Sixth Schedule and the provisions of the said Division shall apply accordingly.

### PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

BY virtue of the powers conferred by section thirty-eight of the *Poisons Act* 1928 (No. 3748) as amended by section five of the *Poisons Act* 1930 (No. 3918), I, the Governor of the State of Victoria in the Commonwealth of Australia by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State and on the recommendation of the Pharmacy Board of Victoria do by this my Proclamation add to paragraph (1) of the Sixth Schedule to the *Poisons Act* 1928 as amended by any Act or enactment, the names of the following substances and preparations, namely:—

- Dihydrohydroxymorphine, its salts and all preparations thereof.
- 4, 4-diphenyl-6-dimethylamino-3 hexanone, its salts and all preparations thereof.

And declare that Division 2 of Part III. of the *Poisons Act* 1928 as amended by the *Poisons Act* 1930 shall apply to the substances and preparations named herein in the same manner as it applies to substances or preparations mentioned in the said paragraph (1) of the Sixth Schedule and the provisions of the said division shall apply accordingly.

## Poisons Acts.

## AMENDMENT OF PART I. OF THE SECOND SCHEDULE TO THE POISONS ACT 1928 (No. 3748) AS AMENDED BY ACT No. 3918.

## PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by section four of the *Poisons Act* 1928, the Governor in Council by Proclamation on the recommendation of the Pharmacy Board of Victoria may transfer any article from any part of the Second Schedule to the *Poisons Act* 1928 to another part of such Schedule:

And whereas ointments containing not more than one half of 1 per centum of any water soluble synthetic substitute for cocaine are included in the articles mentioned in the first part of the said Schedule and the Pharmacy Board of Victoria desires that such ointments should be transferred to the second part of such Schedule.

Now therefore I the Governor of the State of Victoria in the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State and on the recommendation of the Pharmacy Board of Victoria, do by this my Proclamation transfer the articles—ointments containing not more than one half of 1 per centum of any water soluble synthetic substitute for cocaine—from the first part of the Second Schedule to the second part of such Schedule by adding at the end of paragraph (a) of the item commencing "14. Cocaine, synthetic substitutes for,—" in the Second Schedule, List of Poisons, first part of the *Poisons Act* 1928 as amended by any Act or enactment the expression—

"except ointments containing not more than 0.5 per centum of such water-soluble synthetic substances"

and by adding at the end of the item commencing "17. Cocaine, synthetic substitutes for,—" in the Second Schedule, List of Poisons, second part, of the *Poisons Act* 1928 as amended by any Act or enactment, the following expression:—

"(iv) Ointments containing not more than 0.5 per cent of water-soluble synthetic substances capable of use for local anaesthesia such as Procaine Hydrochloride, Novocaine, Borocaine, Benzamine Lactate, Amethocaine Hydrochloride, Tetracaine, Amylocaine Hydrochloride, Stovaine, Nupercaine Hydrochloride, Butacaine Sulphate, Butyn."

## PUBLIC HIGHWAY.—SHIRE OF CRANBOURNE.

## PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by the *Local Government Act* 1946, section 518, it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council at any time, and from time to time, upon the request of the Council of any municipality, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, to declare any land reserved, used or by purchase or exchange acquired for a street, road, highway, thoroughfare, bridge, square, court, alley or right-of-way to be a public highway, and that such land shall thereupon and thenceforth from the date of such Proclamation become and be absolutely dedicated to the public as a public highway within the meaning of any law then or thereafter in force:

And whereas the Council of the Shire of Cranbourne has requested that the land hereinafter mentioned, which has been reserved for a street within the said shire, be so declared to be a public highway:

Now therefore, I, the Governor of the State of Victoria in the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, do, by this Proclamation, declare that all that piece of land reserved for a street and described hereunder shall be a public highway within the meaning of the said Act, viz.:—

## HOMEWOOD-ROAD

All that piece or parcel of land commencing at a point on a line bearing north 8 deg. 23 min. 30 sec. east 1,989 links from the south-west corner of Crown allotment 18, Parish of Langwarrin thence bounded by lines bearing south 81 deg. 0 min. 30 sec. east 5,599.7 links, north 8 deg. 24 min. 30 sec. east 100 links, north 81 deg. 30 min. west 5,599.7 links and south 8 deg. 23 min. 30 sec. west 100 links to the commencing point.

## Local Government Act.

## PROCLAMATION EXTENDING THE OPERATION OF THE UNIFORM BUILDING REGULATIONS

By His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS section 900 (2) of the *Local Government Act* 1946 provides, *inter alia*, that the Governor in Council may, by Proclamation published in the *Government Gazette*, at the request of the council of any municipality, not being a city or town, extend the operation of the Regulations made under Part XLIX. of the Act to the municipal district of such municipality or any part thereof:

And whereas the Council of the Shire of Winchelsea requested that the operation of the said Regulations be extended to the Township of Lorne in the municipal district of such municipality:

Now, therefore, I, the Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, by this, my Proclamation, do hereby extend the operation of the Regulations made under Part XLIX. of the *Local Government Act* 1946 to the Township of Lorne in the municipal district of the Shire of Winchelsea and order that the said Regulations shall come into operation in the said Township of Lorne on publication of this Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, provided that Parts I. and II. of Chapter 8 thereof shall not be deemed to come into operation till the 28th September, 1955, except insofar as may be necessary to enable the Council of the said municipality to make by-laws pursuant to the powers conferred by Part III. of the said Chapter, and provided, further, that no such by-law shall come into operation before the 28th September, 1955.

ORDER MADE BY THE COUNCIL OF THE SHIRE OF ARARAT UNDER SECTIONS 521 AND 525 OF THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT 1946.

## PHARMACY BOARD OF VICTORIA.

## PHARMACY REGULATIONS 1955 (No. 3).

**U**NDER the powers in that behalf conferred by Part III. of the *Medical Act 1928* (No. 3730) as amended by any Act, the Pharmacy Board of Victoria subject to the approval of the Governor in Council doth make the Regulations set forth hereunder, that is to say:—

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Pharmacy Regulations 1955 (No. 3) and shall be read and construed as one with the Pharmacy Regulations 1930 and all Regulations amending the same.

2. For Regulation 53. Reports on Papers—there shall be substituted the following Regulation:—

“53. Reports on Papers—Any Candidate who desires a report upon any of the written papers submitted by him at any examination shall within fourteen days of the publication of the results of such examination lodge with the Registrar an application therefor and shall pay a fee of Two pounds two shillings (£2 2s.) for each paper upon which a report is desired.”

3. These Regulations shall come into operation on publication in the *Government Gazette*.

The preceding Regulations were made at a meeting of the Pharmacy Board of Victoria held at Melbourne in the State of Victoria on Wednesday the twenty-fifth day of May, One thousand nine hundred and fifty-five.

# PORTLAND HARBOR TRUST COMMISSIONERS.

## REGULATIONS.—AMENDMENT No. 8.

IN pursuance of the *Portland Harbor Trust Act 1949*, the Portland Harbor Trust Commissioners make the following Regulations:—

1. In section 1 of Regulation No. 138 the definition of "Oil" is repealed and the following definition is substituted in lieu thereof:—

"Oil—means oil of any description having a true flashing point of not less than one hundred and fifty degrees Fahrenheit (150°F.), and for the purposes of section II, paragraphs (4), (10), (11), and (12) includes oils of every description irrespective of flashing point."

2. In section II. of Regulation No. 138, paragraph (4) is repealed and the following paragraph inserted in lieu thereof:—

"4. The Owner or Master of a vessel, the Owner, Occupier or Person in Charge of an oil terminal, or depot, or storage tank, or oil pipe line or other apparatus, or any place on land, or any servant or agent of any of them and who is engaged thereon

or in connexion therewith as the case may be, shall be and is hereby made responsible for preventing inflammable liquid, dangerous goods, or any liquid derived from petroleum, shale or coal from draining, escaping or flowing, or for allowing or suffering any of the same to drain or to escape or to flow therefrom, whether directly or indirectly, into the waters of the port, or on to a vessel, or any property of the Commissioners. If any inflammable liquid, or dangerous goods, or any liquid derived from petroleum, shale or coal, so drains, escapes or flows or is allowed or suffered so to drain or to escape or to flow, the said Owner, Master, Occupier, Person in Charge, Servant or Agent shall be guilty of a breach of this Regulation."

3. In section IV. of Regulation No. 138 after paragraph (2), the following paragraph is inserted:—

"2. (a) The Master or Agent of every vessel having inflammable liquid and/or oil in bulk on board shall sign a declaration before berthing that to the best of his knowledge and belief the vessel is free from tank and container leakages. Such declaration shall be in the hands of the Harbor-master at least 24 hours before the berthing of the vessel."

4. In section IV. of Regulation No. 138, paragraph (17) (i) is amended by deleting the figures and words "95 per cent." in the third line and substituting in lieu the figures and words "96 per cent."

5. In section IV. of Regulation No. 138, paragraph (37), sub-sections (a) and (b) are deleted, and sub-sections (c) and (d) become sub-sections (a) and (b).

Subdivision 1.—Lay linings, tingle and trim, shanking and tacking on soles, first and second lasting and Wurt heeling; and, in addition, where the employer makes pumps only, the processes prescribed below for Finishing, Subdivision 1, or, where the employer makes pumps and does cement process, the processes prescribed below for Finishing, Subdivision 1, or for Making—Cement Process, Subdivision 1.

Subdivision 2.—Lay linings, tingle and trim, shanking and tacking on soles, first and second lasting and pump sewer; and, in addition, where the employer makes pumps only, the processes prescribed below for Finishing, Subdivision 1, or, where the employer makes pumps and does cement process, the processes prescribed below for Finishing, Subdivision 1 or for Making—Cement Process, Subdivision 1."

2. By rescinding Regulation 15 and substituting therefor the following:—

## "Increased Rates of Pay for Proficiency.

15. When an apprentice attains in any year the standard of proficiency prescribed for that year of his apprenticeship course, he shall—

- (1) for the first occasion on which he attains such standard be paid for the next succeeding year the sum of 4s. per week, in addition to the prescribed minimum weekly wage;
- (2) for the second occasion on which he attains such standard be paid for the next succeeding year the sum of 5s. per week, in addition to the prescribed minimum weekly wage;
- (3) for the third occasion on which he attains such standard be paid for the next succeeding year the sum of 6s. per week, in addition to the prescribed minimum weekly wage."

3. By rescinding Regulation 16 and substituting therefor the following:—

#### WATCHMAKING TRADES APPRENTICESHIP REGULATIONS.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the Apprenticeship Acts, His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby rescind the Regulations mentioned in the First Schedule hereto, and doth hereby make the following Regulations, that is to say:—

#### Short Title.

1. These Regulations may be cited as the "Watchmaking Trades Apprenticeship Regulations."

#### Interpretation.

2. In these Regulations—

"Acts" means the Apprenticeship Acts.

"Prescribed" means prescribed by an appropriate industrial authority or agreement or by these Regulations, as the case may require.

"Probationer" means an applicant for apprenticeship employed on probation.

#### Application of Regulations.

3. These Regulations shall apply only with respect to the following apprenticeship trades, as carried on in the Metropolitan District, viz.:—

- (1) Watch Making;
- (2) Clock Making;
- (3) Watch and Clock Making.

#### Educational Qualifications for Entry into Apprenticeship.

4. Applicants for apprenticeship in the said trades may be required to submit themselves for examination at the time and place determined by the Commission to prove that they possess the preparatory educational qualifications required for entry into apprenticeship in such trades; provided that any such applicant shall be exempted from such examination—

(1) If he possesses any one of the following educational qualifications, or, in the opinion of the Commission, the equivalent thereof:—

(a) The Intermediate Technical Certificate or Junior Technical Certificate of the Education Department of Victoria or the School Intermediate Certificate.

(b) The completion, in a manner satisfactory to the Commission, of the third year of the course of study of the Junior Technical Schools of the Education Department of Victoria.

(2) If he satisfies the Commission, in accordance with sub-section (2) of section 18 of the *Apprenticeship Act 1928*, that he has not had sufficient opportunity to obtain the preparatory educational qualifications prescribed for entry into the said trades.

#### Minimum Age for Entry into Apprenticeship.

5. The minimum age at which persons shall enter the said trades as apprentices or probationers shall be fifteen years.

#### Term of Apprenticeship.

6. The term of apprenticeship in the said trades shall be six years.

#### Form of Indentures of Apprenticeship.

7. The standard form of indentures of apprenticeship in the said trades, and the terms, covenants and conditions thereof, shall be in the form contained in the Seventh Schedule to the General Apprenticeship Regulations, with the following additions thereto:—

#### Additional Covenants, &c., to General Form of Indentures of Apprenticeship.

##### EMPLOYER'S COVENANTS.

(1) After clause (f), the following additional clauses shall be inserted:—

"(g) Not require the apprentice, while under the age of eighteen years, to work overtime or shift work, unless he so desires.

(h) Not require the apprentice to work overtime or shift work at times which would prevent his attendance at classes for instruction in the subjects of his apprenticeship course, as required by the General Apprenticeship Regulations.

(i) Provide the apprentice, during the first and second years, with all necessary tools, with the exception of tweezers, gravers, screw-drivers and eye glass and, during the third and fourth years, with a lathe only."

##### APPRENTICE'S AND PARENT'S OR GUARDIAN'S COVENANTS.

(2) After clause (c), the following additional clauses shall be inserted:—

"(d) Supply his own lathe by the beginning of the fifth year.

(e) Replace any of the tools supplied for his use, as hereinbefore provided, if they should be lost or broken through his own carelessness."

#### Minimum Rates of Wages of Apprentices.

8. The minimum rates of wages to be paid to apprentices in the said trades shall be the under-mentioned percentages of the rate of wages prescribed for a watchmaker from time to time in the determination of the Watchmakers Board, calculated to the nearest 6d., half or less than half of 6d. being disregarded:—

Year of Apprenticeship.	Percentage of Watchmakers' Rate.
1st .. .. .	20
2nd .. .. .	30
3rd .. .. .	40
4th .. .. .	55
5th .. .. .	70
6th .. .. .	85

#### Rates for Overtime and Shift Work.

9. When an apprentice works under conditions for which, or at any time when, a journeyman employed at the aforesaid trades would be entitled to overtime or special rates for doing work under the same conditions or at the same time, then such apprentice shall be paid by the employer for any such work at a rate or rates of wages which shall bear the same proportion to the prescribed minimum rate of wages of such apprentice as the wages of such journeyman for such work would bear to the prescribed minimum rate of wages of such journeyman.

#### Proportion of Apprentices to Journeymen.

10. (1) Subject to sub-regulation (2) of this Regulation, the number of apprentices who may be employed by any employer at any time in the said trades shall not exceed the proportion of one apprentice to every two or fraction of two journeymen employed by such employer in such trades.

(2) With the consent of the Commission and upon satisfying the Commission that he has the training facilities deemed adequate by the Commission for the training of each apprentice concerned, an employer may employ in the said trades such number of apprentices as the Commission may determine in excess of the proportion



prescribed by sub-regulation (1) hereof. Any apprentice employed pursuant to this sub-regulation shall not be included for the purpose of ascertaining the number of apprentices who may otherwise be employed in accordance with the provisions of sub-regulation (1) hereof.

(3) For the purposes of this Regulation—

- (a) an employer working at the trades shall be deemed to be a journeyman;
- (b) the number of journeymen employed at any time shall be deemed to be the average per working day of the number of journeymen employed in the said trades by such employer during the period of six months immediately preceding such time;
- (c) "apprentices" means apprentices or probationers.

*Trade Experience to be Given to an Apprentice.*

11. The employer shall, by the best means in his power and to the extent to which his facilities permit, give or cause to be given to the apprentice gradual and complete instruction, to the satisfaction of the Commission, in the following processes (as the case may require)—

- (1) *Watch Making*.—The repairing of watches and the making of parts incidental to such repairing.
- (2) *Clock Making*.—The repairing of clocks and the making of parts incidental to such repairing.
- (3) *Watch and Clock Making*.—The repairing of watches and clocks and the making of parts incidental to such repairing.

*Classes for Instruction.*

12. The classes for instruction in the subjects of the apprenticeship course for the said trades shall be as set out in the Second Schedule hereto, but any apprentice or probationer who has the necessary qualifications may, subject to the approval of the Commission, be permitted to enter the classes prescribed for any year of the said course.

*Standard of Education to be Attained by an Apprentice.*

13. The standard of education to be attained by an apprentice—

- (1) in the subjects of the first, second, third or fourth year of his apprenticeship course in order that he may qualify to proceed to the classes for instruction prescribed for the next succeeding year; and
- (2) in the subjects of the final year of his apprenticeship course in order that he may qualify in respect to education for the "final certificate" of the Commission—

shall not be less than 50 per cent. of the possible marks allotted at the annual examinations approved by the Commission in each of the subjects prescribed for such year of the said course or such average percentage of marks in all of the said subjects as is deemed by the Commission to be equivalent thereto.

*Standard of Proficiency.*

14. Should the apprentice in any year pass at the first attempt in each of the subjects prescribed for that year of his apprenticeship course and attain a standard as certified by the Commission of not less than an average of 75 per cent. of the possible marks allotted at the annual examinations approved by the Commission to the subjects of Trade Theory and Trade Practice prescribed for that year of such course, he shall be deemed to have attained the standard of proficiency for such year.

*Increased Rates of Pay for Proficiency.*

15. When an apprentice attains in any year the standard of proficiency prescribed for that year of his apprenticeship course, he shall—

- (1) for the first occasion on which he attains such standard be paid for the next succeeding year the sum of 4s. per week, in addition to the prescribed minimum weekly wage;
- (2) for the second occasion on which he attains such standard be paid for the next succeeding year the sum of 5s. per week, in addition to the prescribed minimum weekly wage;
- (3) for the third occasion on which he attains such standard be paid for the next succeeding year the sum of 6s. per week, in addition to the prescribed minimum weekly wage;
- (4) for the fourth or fifth occasion on which he attains such standard be paid for the next succeeding year the sum of 6s. per week, in addition to the prescribed minimum weekly wage.

*Payment of School Fees.*

16. Council thereof, doth hereby rescind the Regulations mentioned in the First Schedule hereto, and doth hereby make the following Regulations, that is to say:—

*Short Title.*

1. These Regulations may be cited as the "Boilermaking Trades Apprenticeship Regulations."

*Interpretation.*

2. In these Regulations—

"Acts" means the Apprenticeship Acts.

"Prescribed" means prescribed by an appropriate industrial authority or agreement or by these Regulations, as the case may require.

"Probationer" means an applicant for apprenticeship employed on probation.

*Application of Regulations.*

3. These Regulations shall apply only with respect to the following apprenticeship trades, as carried on in the whole of the State of Victoria, viz.:—

- (1) Boilermaker;
- (2) Structural Steel Tradesman;
- (3) Boilermaker and Structural Steel Tradesman.

(a) The Intermediate Technical Certificate or Junior Technical Certificate of the Education Department of Victoria or the School Intermediate Certificate.

(b) The competition, in a manner satisfactory to the Commission, of the third year of the course of study of the Junior Technical Schools of the Education Department of Victoria.

(2) If he satisfies the Commission, in accordance with sub-section (2) of section 18 of the *Apprenticeship Act 1928*, that he has not had sufficient opportunity to obtain the preparatory educational qualifications prescribed for entry into the said trades.

*Minimum Age for Entry into Apprenticeship.*

"(g) Not require the apprentice, whilst under the age of eighteen years, to work overtime or shift work, unless he so desires.

(h) Not require or permit the apprentice to work overtime or shift work at times which would prevent his attendance at classes for instruction in the subjects of his apprenticeship course, as required by the General Apprenticeship Regulations.

(i) Provide the apprentice, during the first, second and third years of the said term, with all tools necessary for carrying out his work."

*APPRENTICE'S AND PARENT'S OR GUARDIAN'S COVENANTS.*

(2) After clause (c), the following additional clause shall be inserted:—

"(d) Replace any of the tools supplied for his use if they should be lost or broken through his own carelessness."

*MUTUAL AGREEMENTS.*

(3) In clause 6, the following additional proviso shall be inserted:—

"Provided further, that in calculating time lost to be served, the apprentice shall be credited with any overtime which he has worked in any week during the relevant year."

*Minimum Rates of Wages of Apprentices.*

8. The minimum rates of wages to be paid to apprentices in the said trades shall be the under-mentioned percentages of the adult male basic wage for the area in which they are employed prescribed from time to time in the Metal Trades Award or in the determination of the Boilermakers' Board, whichever is applicable:—

(1) In a term of apprenticeship of five years—

(2) In a term of apprenticeship of four years—

The total wages of apprentices shall be calculated to the nearest 6d., half or less than half of 6d. to be disregarded.

*Rates for Overtime and Shift Work.*

9. When an apprentice works under conditions for which, or at any time when, a journeyman employed at the aforesaid trades would be entitled to overtime or special rates for doing work under the same conditions or at the same time, then such apprentice shall be paid by the employer for any such work at a rate or rates of wages which shall bear the same proportion to the prescribed minimum rate of wages of such apprentice as the wages of such journeyman for such work would bear to the prescribed minimum rate of wages of such journeyman. Provided, however, that an apprentice shall be paid for overtime worked at a rate not less than 2s. 3d. per hour and for shift work at a rate not less than 1s. 6d. per hour.

*Proportion of Apprentices to Journeymen.*

10. (1) Subject to sub-regulation (2) of this Regulation, the number of apprentices who may be employed by any employer at any time in each of the said trades shall not exceed the proportion of one apprentice to every two or fraction of two journeymen employed by such employer in such trade.

(2) With the consent of the Commission and upon satisfying the Commission that he has the training facilities deemed adequate by the Commission for the training of each apprentice concerned, an employer may employ in the said trades such number of apprentices as the Commission may determine in excess of the proportion prescribed by sub-regulation (1) hereof. Any apprentice employed pursuant to this sub-regulation shall not be included for the purposes of ascertaining the number of apprentices who may otherwise be employed in accordance with the provisions of sub-regulation (1) hereof.

(3) For the purposes of this Regulation—

(a) an employer working at the trades shall be deemed to be a journeyman;

(b) the number of journeymen employed at any time shall be deemed to be the average per working day of the number of journeymen employed in the said trades by such employer during the period of six months immediately preceding such time;

(c) "apprentices" means apprentices or probationers.

*Trade Experience to be Given to an Apprentice.*

11. The employer shall, by the best means in his power and to the extent to which his facilities permit, give or cause to be given to the apprentice gradual and complete instruction, to the satisfaction of the Commission, in the following processes (as the case may be)—

- (1) *Boilermaker*.—All classes of boilermaking and all things incidental thereto, including the fabrication, erection, and all repairing of boilers and other vessels.
- (2) *Structural Steel Tradesman*.—All classes of steel construction and ship construction and all things incidental thereto, including the fabrication, erection and all repairing of steel construction work and steel or iron ships.
- (3) *Boilermaker and Structural Steel Tradesman*.—All processes prescribed above for Boilermaker and Structural Steel Tradesman.

*Classes for Instruction.*

12. The classes for instruction in the subjects of the apprenticeship course for the said trades shall be as set out in the Second Schedule hereto, but any apprentice or probationer who has the necessary qualifications may, subject to the approval of the Commission, be permitted to enter the classes prescribed for any year of the said course.

*Standard of Education to be Attained by an Apprentice.*

13. The standard of education to be attained by an apprentice—

- (1) In the subjects of the first, second, or third year of his apprenticeship course in order that he may qualify to proceed to the classes for instruction prescribed for the next succeeding year; and
- (2) in the subjects of the final year of his apprenticeship course in order that he may qualify in respect to education for the "final certificate" of the Commission—

shall be not less than 50 per cent. of the possible marks allotted at the annual examinations approved by the Commission in each of the subjects prescribed for such year of the said course or such average percentage of marks in all of the said subjects as is deemed by the Commission to be equivalent thereto.

*Standard of Proficiency.*

14. Should the apprentice in any year pass at the first attempt in each of the subjects prescribed for that year of his apprenticeship course and attain a standard as certified by the Commission of not less than an average of 75 per cent. of the possible marks allotted at the annual examinations approved by the Commission to the subjects of Trade Theory and Trade Practice prescribed for that year of such course, he shall be deemed to have attained the standard of proficiency for such year.

*Increased Rates of Pay for Proficiency.*

15. When an apprentice attains in any year the standard of proficiency prescribed for that year of his apprenticeship course, he shall—

- (1) for the first occasion on which he attains such standard be paid for the next succeeding year the sum of 4s. per week, in addition to the prescribed minimum weekly wage;
- (2) for the second occasion on which he attains such standard be paid for the next succeeding year the sum of 5s. per week, in addition to the prescribed minimum weekly wage;
- (3) for the third occasion on which he attains such standard be paid for the next succeeding year the sum of 6s. per week, in addition to the prescribed minimum weekly wage;
- (4) for the fourth occasion on which he attains such standard be paid for the next succeeding year the sum of 6s. per week, in addition to the prescribed minimum weekly wage.

*Payment of School Fees.*

16. (1) The school fees of apprentices for attendance at the prescribed classes for instruction shall be paid by such apprentices, but on receipt by the employer of a report from the Commission that any such apprentice has secured during the period covered by the report a record of 100 per cent. of the possible attendances at the prescribed day classes and not less than 80 per cent. of the possible attendances at the prescribed evening classes, the employer shall refund to the apprentice the school fees paid by him for such period of instruction. Provided, however, that if such report states that the

apprentice has, in the opinion of the Commission, failed to be diligent or has behaved in an indecorous manner while in attendance at the prescribed classes for instruction during such period, the employer shall not be required to make the refund as aforesaid.

(2) In cases where the apprentice is prevented from attendance at the said classes through illness or accident, or for other reasons accepted by the Commission, such occasions shall not be included as possible attendances in determining the aforesaid percentage; provided that the employer may require the apprentice to produce a medical certificate as proof of such illness or accident and in that case, if the apprentice fails to produce such certificate, such occasions shall be included as possible attendances in determining the aforesaid percentage.

(3) For the purposes of this Regulation, "apprentices" means apprentices or probationers.

PLUMBING AND GASFITTING TRADES  
APPRENTICESHIP REGULATIONS.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the Apprenticeship Acts, His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby rescind the Regulations mentioned in the First Schedule hereto and doth hereby make the following Regulations, that is to say:—

*Short Title.*

1. These Regulations may be cited as the "Plumbing and Gasfitting Trades Apprenticeship Regulations."

*Interpretation.*

## 2. In these Regulations—

"Acts" means the Apprenticeship Acts.

"Prescribed" means prescribed by an appropriate industrial authority or agreement or by these Regulations, as the case may require.

"Probationer" means an applicant for apprenticeship employed on probation.

*Application of Regulations.*

3. These Regulations shall apply only with respect to the following apprenticeship trades, as carried on in the whole of the State of Victoria, viz.:—

- (1) Plumbing.
- (2) Gasfitting.
- (3) Plumbing and Gasfitting.

*Educational Qualifications for Entry into Apprenticeship.*

4. Applicants for apprenticeship in the said trades may be required to submit themselves for examination at the time and place determined by the Commission to prove that they possess the preparatory educational qualifications required for entry into apprenticeship in such trades; provided that any such applicant shall be exempted from such examination—

- (1) If he possesses any one of the following educational qualifications, or, in the opinion of the Commission, the equivalent thereof:—

(a) The Intermediate Technical Certificate or Junior Technical Certificate of the Education Department of Victoria or the School Intermediate Certificate.

(b) The completion, in a manner satisfactory to the Commission, of the third year of the course of study of the Junior Technical Schools of the Education Department of Victoria.

- (2) If he satisfies the Commission, in accordance with sub-section (2) of section 18 of the *Apprenticeship Act 1928*, that he has not had sufficient opportunity to obtain the preparatory educational qualifications prescribed for entry into the said trades.

*Minimum Age for Entry into Apprenticeship.*

5. The minimum age at which persons shall enter the said trades as apprentices or probationers shall be fifteen years.

*Term of Apprenticeship.*

6. The term of apprenticeship in the said trades shall be five years.

*Form of Indentures of Apprenticeship.*

7. The standard form of indentures of apprenticeship in the said trades, and the terms, covenants, and conditions thereof, shall be in the form contained in the Seventh Schedule to the General Apprenticeship Regulations, with the following additions thereto:—

ADDITIONAL COVENANTS, ETC., TO GENERAL FORM OF  
INDENTURES OF APPRENTICESHIP.

*EMPLOYER'S COVENANTS.*

- (1) After clause (f) the following additional clause shall be inserted:—

"(g) Provide the apprentice with the following tools during the first, second, and third years of the term of his apprenticeship, viz.:—Hammer, pliers, cold chisel, screw-driver, one pair of snips, soldering iron, two pairs of footprints, shave hook, dresser, hacksaw, two pairs of Stillson wrenches, and bossing mallet."

*APPRENTICE'S AND PARENT'S OR GUARDIAN'S COVENANTS.*

- (2) After clause (c), the following additional clause shall be inserted:—

"(d) Replace any of the tools supplied for his use, as hereinbefore provided, if they should be lost or broken through his own carelessness."

*Minimum Rates of Wages of Apprentices.*

8. The minimum rates of wages to be paid to apprentices in the said trades shall be the under-mentioned percentages of the adult male basic wage for the area in which they are employed prescribed in the determination of the Plumbers' Wages Board, calculated to the nearest 6d., half or less than half of 6d. being disregarded, and in addition thereto the industry loading specified:—

*Rates for Overtime and Shift Work.*

9. When an apprentice works under conditions for which, or at any time when, a journeyman employed at the aforesaid trades would be entitled to overtime or special rates for doing work under the same conditions or at the same time, then such apprentice shall be paid by the employer for any such work at the rate or rates of wages which shall bear the same proportion to the prescribed minimum rate of wages of such apprentice as the wages of such journeyman for such work would bear to the prescribed minimum rate of wages of such journeyman.

*Proportion of Apprentices to Journeymen.*

10. (1) The number of apprentices who may be employed by any employer at any time in the said trades shall not exceed the proportion of one apprentice to every two or fraction of two journeymen employed by such employer in such trades.

- (2) For the purposes of this Regulation—

(a) an employer working at the trades shall be deemed to be a journeyman;

(b) the number of journeymen employed at any time shall be deemed to be the average per working day of the number of journeymen employed in the said trades by such employer during the period of six months immediately preceding such time;

(c) "apprentices" means apprentices or probationers.

*Trade Experience to be Given to an Apprentice.*

11. The employer shall, by the best means in his power and to the extent to which his facilities permit, give or cause to be given to the apprentice gradual and complete instruction, to the satisfaction of the Commission, in the following processes (as the case may be):—

(1) *Plumbing*.—Sanitary plumbing installation; water supply installation; domestic hot-water supply; ventilation and heating installations; roof plumbing.

(2) *Gasfitting*.—The installation of systems for or in connexion with coal gas, air gas, oil gas, acetylene, and similar systems for lighting, warming, cooking, industrial purposes, and motive power.

(3) *Plumbing and Gasfitting*.—All phases of plumbing and of gasfitting, as prescribed above.

*Classes for Instruction.*

12. The classes for instruction in the subjects of the apprenticeship course for the said trades shall be as set out in the Second Schedule hereto, but any apprentice or probationer who has the necessary qualifications may, subject to the approval of the Commission, be permitted to enter the classes prescribed for any year of the said course.

*Standard of Education to be Attained by an Apprentice.*

13. The standard of education to be attained by an apprentice—

- (1) in the subjects of the first, second, or third year of his apprenticeship course in order that he may qualify to proceed to the classes for instruction prescribed for the next succeeding year; and

- (2) in the subjects of the final year of his apprenticeship course in order that he may qualify in respect to education for the "final certificate" of the Commission—

shall not be less than 50 per cent. of the possible marks allotted at the annual examinations approved by the Commission in each of the subjects prescribed for such year of the said course or such average percentage of marks in all of the said subjects as is deemed by the Commission to be equivalent thereto.

*Standard of Proficiency.*

14. Should the apprentice in any year pass at the first attempt in each of the subjects prescribed for that year of his apprenticeship course and attain a standard as certified by the Commission of not less than an average of 75 per cent. of the possible marks allotted at the annual examinations approved by the Commission to the subjects of Trade Theory and Trade Practice prescribed for that year of such course, he shall be deemed to have attained the standard of proficiency for such year.

(a) the number of apprentices who may be employed by any employer at any time in the trades of Electrical Fitter, Armature Winder, or Electrical Fitter and Armature Winder, shall not exceed the proportion of one apprentice to every three or fraction of three journeymen employed by such employer in such trades;

(b) the number of apprentices who may be employed by any employer at any time in the trade of Electrical Mechanic shall not exceed the proportion of one apprentice to every two or fraction of two journeymen employed by such employer in such trade.

(2) With the consent of the Commission and upon satisfying the Commission that he has the training facilities deemed adequate by the Commission for the training of each apprentice concerned, an employer may employ in the said trades such number of apprentices as the Commission may determine in excess of the proportion

prescribed by sub-regulation (1) hereof. Any apprentice employed pursuant to this sub-regulation shall not be included for the purpose of ascertaining the number of apprentices who may otherwise be employed in accordance with the provisions of sub-regulation (1) hereof.

(3) For the purposes of this Regulation—

(a) an employer working at the trades shall be deemed to be a journeyman;

(b) the number of journeymen employed at any time shall be deemed to be the average per working day of the number of journeymen employed in the said trades by such employer during the period of six months immediately preceding such time;

(c) "apprentices" means apprentices or probationers.

*Trade Experience to be Given to an Apprentice.*

11. The employer shall, by the best means in his power and to the extent to which his facilities permit, give or cause to be given to the apprentice gradual and complete instruction, to the satisfaction of the Commission, in the following processes (as the case may be):—

(1) *Electrical Fitter.*—All classes of electrical fitting and all things incidental thereto, including—

The correct methods of use of bench and machine tools commonly used in the trade.

The making, fitting, and repairing of electrical machines, instruments, and apparatus, including the necessary testing of such machines, instruments, and apparatus.

(2) *Armature Winder.*—All classes of armature winding, and all things incidental thereto, including—

The preparation, formation, and winding of all types of coils, including armature field, rotor, stator, transformer, magneto, automobile generator, starter, and electrical control gear coils.

The assembly and testing of windings for direct current and alternating current machines, including the testing of machines after assembly.

The stripping of electrical machines, repairing and rewinding of coils, testing of rewound machines.

(3) *Electrical Fitter and Armature Winder.*—All classes of electrical fitting and armature winding, as prescribed above.

(4) *Electrical Mechanic.*—All classes of electrical mechanic's work and all things incidental thereto, including—

The affixing, placing, jointing, or running of electrical conductors of all kinds and for all purposes from the point of supply to the point of utilization; the fixing of all kinds of conduits, ducts, and other means of protecting and covering electrical conductors; meter fixing; the connecting up of generators, alternators, motors, transformers, electrical control gear, distribution boards, and of electrical instruments and electrical apparatus at the points of supply and utilization for power, lighting, heating, smelting, and safe working, or for any other purpose; the connecting up of radio apparatus, telephones, and bells; the erection, overhauling, and repairing of storage batteries; the installation of electrical plants, including the erection and connecting up of switchboards; and the effecting of repairs of an electrical nature to machines, installations or appliances where it is necessary to carry out the work on the site or where such repairs are incidental to such work; the correct setting out of electrical wiring installations and the testing of electrical installations and electrical appliances.

*Classes for Instruction.*

12. The classes for instruction in the subjects of the apprenticeship course for the said trades shall be as set out in the Second Schedule hereto, but any apprentice or probationer who has the necessary qualifications may, subject to the approval of the Commission, be permitted to enter the classes prescribed for any year of the said course.

*Standard of Education to be Attained by an Apprentice.*

13. (1) The standard of education to be attained by an apprentice in the subjects of the first, second, third, or fourth years of his apprenticeship course, in order that he may qualify to proceed to the classes for instruction prescribed for the next succeeding year, shall be not less than 50 per cent. of the possible marks allotted at the annual examinations approved by the Commission in each

of the subjects prescribed for such year of the said course, or such average percentage of marks in all of the said subjects as is deemed by the Commission to be equivalent thereto.

(2) In order that an apprentice may qualify in respect to education for the "final certificate" of the Commission, he shall, in addition to attaining the standard set out in sub-regulation (1) hereof in the subjects prescribed for the fourth year of the apprenticeship course, make satisfactory progress as approved by the Commission in the subjects prescribed for the fifth year of the said course, until the completion of the term of his apprenticeship.

#### Standard of Proficiency.

14. Should the apprentice in any year pass at the first attempt in each of the subjects prescribed for that year of his apprenticeship course and attain a standard as certified by the Commission of not less than an average of 75 per cent. of the possible marks allotted at the annual examinations approved by the Commission to the subjects of Trade Theory and Trade Practice prescribed for that year of such course, he shall be deemed to have attained the standard of proficiency for such year.

#### Increased Rates of Pay for Proficiency.

15. When an apprentice attains in any year the standard of proficiency prescribed for that year of his apprenticeship course, he shall—

- (1) for the first occasion on which he attains such standard be paid for the next succeeding year the sum of 4s. 0d. per week, in addition to the prescribed minimum weekly wage;
- (2) for the second occasion on which he attains such standard be paid for the next succeeding year the sum of 5s. 0d. per week, in addition to the prescribed minimum weekly wage;
- (3) for the third occasion on which he attains such standard be paid for the next succeeding year the sum of 6s. 0d. per week, in addition to the prescribed minimum weekly wage;
- (4) for the fourth occasion on which he attains such standard be paid for the next succeeding year the sum of 6s. 0d. per week, in addition to the prescribed minimum weekly wage.

#### Payment of School Fees.

16. (2) In cases where the apprentice is prevented from attendance at the said classes through illness or accident, or for other reasons accepted by the Commission, such occasions shall not be included as possible attendances in determining the aforesaid percentage; provided that the employer may require the apprentice to produce a medical certificate as proof of such illness or accident and in that case, if the apprentice fails to produce such certificate, such occasions shall be included as possible attendances in determining the aforesaid percentage.

(3) In the case of an apprentice undertaking a correspondence course, the school fees for the correspondence course shall be paid by the apprentice, but on receipt by the employer of a report from the Commission that the apprentice has completed not less than 80 per cent. of the test papers set for the period of instruction covered by the report and returned the same to the correspondence school, the employer shall refund to the apprentice the school fees paid by him for such period of instruction.

(4) For the purposes of this Regulation, "apprentices" means apprentices or probationers.

1. A fee of £2 2s. for each meeting of the Committee attended provided that no member shall be entitled to be paid a fee in respect of more than one meeting on any one day.

2. Personal expenses when outside a radius of 15 miles from his usual residence at the rates and in accordance with the conditions prescribed in the Regulations under the *Public Service Act 1946*, for personal expenses for officers, other than Permanent Heads, whose standard salaries are more than £728 a year, provided that where a member leaves his house and returns the same day he shall be entitled to receive:—

(a) 5s. 6d. for breakfast where he is required to leave before 7 a.m. and is unable to return until after 9.30 a.m.

(b) (i) 4s. for lunch where he is required to leave before 12 noon and is unable to return until after 2 p.m.

(ii) 5s. 6d. for lunch where he is required to leave before 7 a.m. and is unable to return until after 7 p.m.

(c) 7s. 6d. for tea where he is required to leave before 5 p.m. and is unable to return until after 7 p.m.

3. A mileage allowance in accordance with the scale prescribed in the Regulations under the *Public Service Act 1946*, if it should be necessary for a member to use his own private motor car and reimbursement of any amount reasonably expended on travelling by railway or by other means of transport.

A By-law of the City of Coburg, made under the provisions of the *Local Government Act 1946*, for the purpose of regulating traffic and to amend By-law No. 62 and By-law No. 71 and numbered 78.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Local Government Act 1946*, the Mayor, Councillors, and Citizens of the City of Coburg order as follows:—

1. This By-law shall be read and construed as one with By-law No. 62, a By-law of the City of Coburg, made under section 197 of the *Local Government Act 1928*, for the purpose of regulating traffic and street processions and the prevention of nuisances and accidents.

2. No unauthorized person shall wilfully deface, injure, move, obstruct, or interfere with any traffic-control signal or traffic sign or notice. Penalty £10.

3. Clause 34 of By-law No. 62 is hereby repealed.

4. No driver of a vehicle (other than a tram car) shall leave or allow such vehicle to remain (whether attended or not) standing—

(i) On the west side of that section of Sydney-road from the north building line of Bell-street, to a point 134 feet distant to the north thereof;

(ii) On the east side of that section of Sydney-road from the north building line of Bell-street to the south building line of Urquhart-street;

(iii) On the north side of that section of Moreland-road from the west building line of Sydney-road to the right-of-way, a distance of 132 feet west of such building line;

(iv) On the south side of that section of Bell-street from the west building line of Sydney-road to the right-of-way, a distance of 153 ft. 5 in. west of such building line;

(v) On the north side of that section of Bell-street from the west building line of Sydney-road to the right-of-way, a distance of 244 ft. 2 in. west of such building line;

(vi) On the south side of that section of Reynard-street from the west building line of Sydney-road, to a point 150 feet distant to the west thereof;

- (vii) On the north side of that section of Reynard-street from the west building line of Sydney-road to a point 150 feet distant to the west thereof;
- (viii) On the south side of that section of Munro-street from the west building line of Sydney-road to the east building line of Walker-street;
- (ix) On the north side of that section of Munro-street from the west building line of Sydney-road to the east building line of Louisa-street;
- (x) On the west side of that section of Melville-road from the south building line of Bell-street, to a point 130 feet distant to the south thereof;
- (xi) On the east side of that section of Melville-road from the south building line of Bell-street, to a point 130 feet distant to the south thereof;
- (xii) On the west side of that section of Sydney-road from the south building line of Bakers-road, to a point 150 feet distant to the south thereof;

Provided that this clause shall not apply to any driver of a hackney carriage or licensed motor omnibus standing on any stand duly fixed or appointed by any public authority.

5. Paragraphs (v), (vi), (ix), (xi), and (xii) of clause 2 of By-law No. 71 are hereby repealed.

6. No person between sunset and sunrise, shall without reasonable cause or excuse (the proof whereof shall be upon any person charged), leave or allow a vehicle (other than a tram car), to remain standing in any street in the City of Coburg for a continuous period exceeding two hours.

7. Clause 3 of By-law No. 71 is hereby repealed.

## CITY OF MOORABBIN.

## BY-LAW No. 205.

A By-law of the City of Moorabbin made under the provisions of the Health Acts and numbered 205 for the provision, use, and control of receptacles for the deposit and collection of refuse and prescribing the size and shape of and the materials to be used in the construction of such receptacles.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the Health Acts and every other Act or power enabling it in that behalf, the Mayor, Councillors, and Citizens of the City of Moorabbin order as follows:—

1. In this By-law unless inconsistent with the context or subject matter—

“Council” means the Council of the City of Moorabbin.

“Occupier” includes the person having the management or control of any house, building or premises.

2. By-law No. 51 of the Shire (now City) of Moorabbin is hereby repealed.

3. The occupier of every house building or premises shall provide keep and maintain at all times in or upon such house building or premises a properly constructed receptacle into which he shall cause to be deposited all refuse produced or accumulated in or about such house building or premises in readiness for collection and removal by the Council.

4. Every such receptacle shall be constructed of galvanized iron of not less than 24 gauge or such other material as may from time to time be approved by a resolution of the Council and shall have a capacity of not more than 2½ cubic feet.

5. Every such receptacle shall be constructed with a suitable close fitting lid with a flange overlapping the top of such lid.

## BY-LAW No. 150.

A By-law of the City of St. Kilda, made under the Local Government Acts and numbered 150 for repealing By-law No. 89 and for the care, protection, and management of the reserve known as the Blessington-street gardens.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the Local Government Acts and of every other power it thereunto enabling the Mayor, Councillors, and Citizens of the City of St. Kilda order as follows:—

1. By-law No. 89 is hereby repealed.
2. In this By-law the expression "improvement" shall be deemed to include any fence, gate, post, notice board, seat, building, appliance, equipment, or other property of the Council in the reserve.
3. No person shall, unless authorized by the Council—
  - (a) pluck, cut, remove, interfere with, or damage, any flower, shrub, tree, plant, grass, or other thing growing in the reserve;
  - (b) remove, interfere with, or damage any improvement in the reserve;
  - (c) post, stick, affix, append, set up on, paint, stencil, print, write, carve, cut, delineate, or by any other means make visible, on any improvement or on any tree or other thing growing in the reserve, or on any portion of the reserve, any advertisement, or any poster, bill, sign, placard or notice, or any mark or symbol, or any name, letter, or figure of any kind;
  - (d) light any fire in the reserve;
  - (e) bring any motor-car, motor-cycle, motor-scooter, or other motor vehicle, or any caravan or trailer in to the reserve;
  - (f) ride any bicycle in the reserve;
  - (g) leave or deposit in the reserve (other than in a basket, bin, or other receptacle provided by the Council for the purpose) any bottle, tin, can, container, paper, fruit skins, garbage, litter, or refuse of any kind;
  - (h) consume any intoxicating liquor in the reserve;
  - (i) bring any animal, other than a dog, into the reserve;
  - (j) cause or suffer any dog belonging to him or her or in his or her charge, to enter upon or remain in the reserve for the purpose of being trained or exercised for coursing or other purposes of sport;
  - (k) leave or deposit in the reserve any clothing or dead animals or birds;
  - (l) throw or shoot any stone or other missile in the reserve;
  - (m) have in his or her possession, carry, use, or discharge any firearm in the reserve;
  - (n) offer for sale or hire, or hawk, any goods or articles of any kind, in the the reserve ;
  - (o) camp in the reserve;
  - (p) set up or erect any tent, booth, building, or other structure, or by any other means occupy any site in the reserve;
  - (q) play, engage in, or practice, cricket, football, or any other athletic sport or game of any kind in the reserve;
  - (r) preach, declaim, harangue, or deliver any address of any kind in the reserve;
  - (s) make, or cause to be made, by any means, any violent outcry or loud noise in the reserve;
  - (t) conduct, assist to conduct, or take part in any fête, carnival, concert, band or musical recital, or entertainment of any kind, or any assembly for the purpose of public worship, preaching, or public speaking or any activity or meeting of a like character in the reserve;
  - (u) cause to fly in, through or over, the reserve any model aeroplane, glider, or aircraft, or similar apparatus of any kind.
4. No person in the reserve shall commit any nuisance, or be in a state of intoxication or under the influence of alcohol, or behave in an indecent, threatening, offensive, or disorderly manner, or use obscene, indecent, threatening, offensive, or insulting language, or create or take part in any disturbance, or interfere with the peaceable enjoyment of the reserve by any other person therein.
5. (a) The Council may, from time to time, by notice set up in the reserve, order that dogs shall not be permitted to enter upon or remain in any portion of the reserve specified in the order.
  - (b) No person shall, unless authorized by the Council, cause or suffer any dog belonging to him or her or in his or her charge, to enter upon or remain in—
    - (i) any portion of the reserve so specified;
    - (ii) any portion of the reserve not so specified unless such dog be under his or her effective control by means of a chain, cord, or leash and be effectively restrained from interfering with or causing annoyance to any other person and from damaging or interfering with anything growing or any property of the Council, in the reserve.

6. In respect of any portion of the reserve set apart by the Council as a children's playground, no person—

- (a) shall bring any bicycle, tricycle, scooter, or box on wheels, into the children's playground;
- (b) shall cause or suffer any dog belonging to him or her or in his or her charge, to enter upon or remain in the children's playground;
- (c) shall enter upon or remain in the children's playground, except during such hours as the Council determines the same shall be open for use;
- (d) shall use any improvement in the children's playground—
  - (i) for a purpose other than that for which the improvement is provided;
  - (ii) to an extent or in a manner contrary to the extent or the manner determined or regulated by the Council;
- (e) who has attained the age of fourteen years, shall—
  - (i) use any play appliance or play equipment in the children's playground;
  - (ii) enter upon or remain in the children's playground except for the purpose of watching over a child therein, who is then in his or her charge;
- (f) in a children's playground, shall fail to comply with any direction in respect of his or her conduct, or in respect of the use of any improvement therein, given to him or her by any officer, employee, servant, or authorized agent of the Council.

7. No person in the reserve shall molest, disturb, or obstruct any officer, employee, servant, or authorized agent of the Council in the execution of his work or duty.

8. No person shall enter upon, or remain in, the reserve except during such hours as the Council may from time to time determine that the Reserve shall be open for the use of the public.

9. Any person offending against this By-law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £10.

#### CITY OF ST. KILDA.

##### BY-LAW No. 152.

A By-law of the City of St. Kilda, made under the provisions of the Local Government Acts and all other powers it thereunto enabling, and numbered 152, for the purpose of prohibiting the deposit and leaving of refuse and rubbish on any street within the municipal district of St. Kilda.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the Local Government Acts and all other powers it thereunto enabling the Mayor, Councillors, and Citizens of the City of St. Kilda order as follows:—

1. This By-law shall come into operation and have effect immediately upon its publication in the *Victoria Government Gazette*.
2. This By-law shall apply to and operate in the whole of the municipal district of the City of St. Kilda.
3. In this By-law "Council" means the Council of the Mayor, Councillors, and Citizens of the City of St. Kilda; "street" means and includes any highway, street, road, footpath, lane, or passage within the said municipal district; "refuse" (without limiting the generality of the term) includes dirt, clay, loam, soil, rock, or other like material and vegetable matter of all kinds; "authorized officer" means any person employed or authorized by the Council to take any action or proceedings in connexion with this By-law, or the enforcement thereof.
4. No person shall deposit or leave any refuse or rubbish on any part of any street within the municipal district of St. Kilda.
5. Every person who is guilty of an offence against this By-law, shall be liable for a first offence to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds, and for every subsequent offence to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds. In the event of any offence being continued after a conviction or order imposed or made on or against such person by any court, such person shall be liable to a further penalty of One pound for each day such offence is continued.

6. Notwithstanding the foregoing provision for the recovery of a penalty or penalties the Council may by its authorized officer with a sufficient number of workmen, remove any refuse or rubbish which has been deposited or left on any part of any street, and the cost incurred by the Council in so doing shall be recoverable by the Council in any court of competent jurisdiction as a civil debt, recoverable summarily from any person convicted of an offence against this By-law.

This By-law is to be read and construed as one with By-law No. 18 duly passed by the Municipality on the 11th day of November, 1936, and confirmed on the 9th day of December, 1936, as amended by By-law No. 22 duly passed by the Municipality on the 8th day of November, 1950, and confirmed on the 13th day of December, 1950, and as further amended by By-law No. 27 duly passed by the Municipality on the 9th day of September, 1953, and confirmed on the 14th day of October, 1953 (hereinafter in this By-law called "the said By-law").

2. The said By-law is hereby amended as follows:—

(i) Sub-clause (b) of Clause 19 of the said By-law is hereby repealed and the following sub-clause inserted in lieu thereof:—

(b) Ordinary connexions with water mains shall be made with main-ferrule stop cocks and right-angle bends of copper alloy tested and stamped by the Board. Between the main and the building line or where a meter is fixed between the main and the meter new services and meter connexions with a diameter of two (2) inches and under must be laid in either copper or brass piping of a gauge approved by the Engineer of Water Supply. The remainder of the service inside the property may be laid in either approved copper, brass or galvanized piping.

(ii) Clause 21 of the said By-law is hereby repealed.

(iii) Clause 30 of the said By-law is hereby repealed and the following clause substituted in lieu thereof:

*Quality of Materials.*

No person shall use in connexion with a supply of water of the Council any tap stop-tap bib-tap ball-tap valve closet cistern service box bath tap or valve or other fitting which is not of the best quality, tested, stamped and approved by the Board.

No person shall use any stop or bib-taps which are not screw-down high-pressure taps made of hard brass or gunmetal and in every respect of best quality and workmanship tested, stamped and approved by the Board.

### VOTING BY POST AT MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS (REGULATIONS WHICH MAY BE APPLIED TO ELECTIONS OF COUNCILLORS OF ANY MUNI- CIPALITY).

**HIS** Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, and in pursuance of the provisions of section 149 of the *Local Government Act 1946*, hereby makes the following Regulations which shall apply at all elections of councillors for every municipality to which such Regulations have been applied by an Order of the Governor in Council published in the *Government Gazette* under the powers conferred by the said section 149:

#### *Obtaining of Forms of Application for Postal Ballot-papers.*

1. Any person entitled to vote at an election about to be held in any municipality who satisfies the returning officer—

- (a) that he resides at least 5 miles from the nearest polling place at which he is entitled to vote; or
- (b) that he has reason to believe that on the polling day during the hours of polling he will not be within 5 miles of the nearest polling place at which he is entitled to vote; or
- (c) that on account of ill health or infirmity he will be prevented from voting personally at any such polling place,

may before the polling day make application in the form of the First Schedule hereto or to the like effect to the returning officer for such municipality for a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers enabling him to vote through the post at such election instead of attending personally to tender his vote thereat.

No. 473.—6436/55.

2. In the case of an application on the ground that he has reason to believe that on the polling day, during the hours of polling, he will not be within 5 miles of the nearest polling place at which he is entitled to vote, the applicant shall state in his application the reason for such belief.

#### *Application to be Signed in Presence of Authorized Witness.*

3. With respect to applications for postal ballot-papers the following provisions shall have effect:—

(a) The following directions with respect to such applications shall be substantially observed:—

- (i) When so much of the form of application as precedes the places for the signatures has been filled in and otherwise completed, the applicant shall exhibit his form of application to an authorized witness;
- (ii) The applicant shall then, in the presence of the authorized witness, sign his name in his own handwriting on the form of application in the place provided for the signature of the applicant; and
- (iii) The authorized witness shall then sign his name in his own handwriting in the place provided for the signature of the authorized witness, and shall add the title under which he acts as an authorized witness, his residence, and the date.

#### *Authorized Witness to Satisfy Himself as to Application.*

(b) An authorized witness shall not witness the signature of any applicant on any application for a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers, unless the authorized witness—

- (i) has satisfied himself as to the identity of the applicant;
- (ii) has seen the applicant sign the application in his own handwriting; and
- (iii) knows that the statements contained in the application are true, or has satisfied himself (whether by inquiry from the applicant or otherwise) that the said statements are true.

#### *Authorized Witness Not to Induce, &c., Persons to Apply for Postal Ballot-papers.*

(c) An authorized witness shall not persuade or induce or associate himself with any person in persuading or inducing any person to make application for a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers.

*Authorized Witness Not to Visit Person to Witness Signature to Application except on Account of Ill Health or Infirmary.*

(d) An authorized witness shall not—

- (i) visit any person for the purpose of witnessing the signature of such person to his application for a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers; or
- (ii) witness the signature of any person to any such application in any place other than the ordinary residence or place of business of the authorized witness:

Provided that if any person desires to make application for a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers and is unable on account of ill health or infirmity to present himself before an authorized witness, any authorized witness, when so requested by any such person, in writing, may visit such person for the purpose of witnessing his signature to such application.

*Penalty.*

(e) Every authorized witness guilty of any contravention of or failure to observe any of the provisions of this clause shall be liable to a penalty of not more than One hundred pounds, or to imprisonment for a term of not more than three months.

*Posting of List of Applicants for Postal Ballot-Papers.*

(f) A list containing the names of all applicants for postal ballot-papers, and the respective addresses to which they have been requested to be sent, shall be posted for public inspection outside the office of the returning officer.

*On Application, Returning Officer to Supply Postal Ballot-Paper or Postal Ballot-papers.*

4. (a) On receiving from any applicant an application for a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers, the returning officer, having ascertained that the name of the applicant is upon the voters' roll to be used at the election for the municipality specified in the application, and that the applicant is not prohibited from voting, and if satisfied that the application is properly signed by the applicant and is properly witnessed, and that the applicant is entitled according to the statements contained in his application to a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers, shall deliver to the applicant or post to him at the postal address named in the application a postal ballot-paper (with a counterfoil attached), or if such applicant appears by the voters' roll to be entitled to give more votes than one, then so many ballot-papers as may be equal to the number of votes not exceeding three which such applicant so appears to be entitled to give in the form of the Second Schedule hereto or to the like effect, together with an envelope addressed to such returning officer at the polling place, at which he intends to preside. Such envelope shall be marked "Postal Ballot-paper."

(b) If the returning officer is not satisfied that the application is properly signed by the applicant, or that the application is properly witnessed, or that the applicant is entitled to vote by post, he shall forthwith post to the applicant a notice in the form of the Third Schedule hereto or to the like effect.

*Folding of Ballot-paper.*

(c) Each ballot-paper before being enclosed shall be folded to the counterfoil.

*Effect of Immaterial Error.*

5. No application for a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers shall, if properly signed by the applicant and properly witnessed, be deemed insufficient or invalid by reason only that in such application there is an omission or incorrect or insufficient description or misdescription in respect of any of the particulars required by law to be contained therein, if the returning officer is satisfied that the applicant is entitled to a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers.

*Initialling of Ballot-papers.*

6. (a) The returning officer shall—

- (i) initial each postal ballot-paper issued; and
- (ii) keep and number the applications therefor in consecutive order, writing the corresponding number on the counterfoil of the ballot-paper.

(b) On the counterfoil the returning officer shall also write the number on the voters' roll of the person to whom the postal ballot-paper is issued.

(c) Every postal ballot-paper issued by a returning officer after four o'clock in the afternoon of the day of nomination shall have printed or written thereon, in

alphabetical order of surnames, the surnames and christian or other names of the candidates for election and, in the case of two or more candidates having the same surname and christian or other names, the residence and occupation of each such candidate: Provided that if no two candidates have the same surname, a postal ballot-paper so issued and upon which the candidates' names are written may have the surnames only of the candidates written thereon.

*Record of Issue of Voting by Postal Ballot-paper or Postal Ballot-papers.*

7. (a) The returning officer shall on the voters' roll to be used at the election for the municipality to which such postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers relate note opposite the applicant's name wherever it appears the fact that such postal ballot-paper has or postal ballot-papers have been issued to such applicant, and the date of such issue.

*Notification to Presiding Officers.*

(b) In case there is not time to note the fact of the issue of any postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers on every such roll on which such applicant's name appears which is to be used at the election, the returning officer shall in such manner as he thinks fit immediately notify such issue to the deputy returning officer at every polling place at which a roll is to be used on which such applicant's name appears.

*Mode of Voting by Means of Postal Ballot-papers.*

8. The following directions for regulating voting by means of postal ballot-papers shall be substantially observed:—

(a) The voter shall exhibit his postal ballot-paper unmarked to an authorized witness.

(b) The voter shall in the presence of the authorized witness but so that the witness cannot see the vote—

- (i) write on the ballot-paper the surnames of all the candidates (if the candidates' names are not already printed or written thereon when the ballot-paper is issued to him); and
- (ii) indicate the order of his preference by placing the figures 1, 2, 3, 4 and so on opposite the candidates' names:

Provided that where there are only two candidates, the provisions of paragraphs. (a) and (b) shall be deemed to be sufficiently complied with if the ballot-paper is inscribed or marked in any manner so as clearly to indicate for whom the voter votes.

(c) In the case of a ballot-paper upon which the candidates' names are not printed or written when issued to the voter the voter shall, if more candidates than one have the same surname, also insert in the ballot-paper the christian or other names of each such candidate, and if more candidates than one have the same surname and christian or other names the residence and occupation of each such candidate.

(d) If the voter's sight is so impaired that he is unable to vote without assistance, the authorized witness, at the request of the voter—

- (i) shall mark his vote on the ballot-paper and shall (if the voter so desires) mark the same in the presence of another person; or
- (ii) shall permit some other person appointed by the voter to mark the ballot-paper for him.

(e) The voter shall then refold the ballot-paper and fasten the same.

(f) The voter shall then sign his name in his own handwriting on the counterfoil in the place provided for the signature of the voter.

(g) The authorized witness shall then sign his name in his own handwriting in the place provided for the signature of the witness, and shall add the title under which he acts as an authorized witness, his residence, and the date.

(h) The voter shall then place the ballot-paper with the counterfoil attached, or ballot-papers each with counterfoil attached, into the envelope addressed to the returning officer, fasten the envelope in the presence of the authorized witness and post it.

*Duty of Authorized Witness.*

9. (a) The authorized witness shall—

- (i) see that the foregoing directions are substantially complied with;
- (ii) refrain from looking at the vote given by the voter except where the voter cannot vote without assistance and the voter requests his assistance;

- (iii) not disclose any knowledge officially acquired by him touching the vote of the voter save in answer to some question which he is legally bound to answer or in compliance with the express provisions of the law relating to elections of councillors for municipalities.

*Witnessing Signature to Postal Ballot-Paper or Counterfoil.*

- (b) An authorized witness shall not—
- (i) visit any voter for the purpose of witnessing the signature of such voter to his postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers;
  - (ii) witness the signature of any voter to his postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers at any place other than the ordinary residence or place of business of the authorized witness; or
  - (iii) witness the signature of any voter to his postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers unless the authorized witness has satisfied himself as to the identity of the voter and has seen the voter sign the counterfoil or counterfoils in the voter's own handwriting.

Provided that if any voter has received a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers, and is unable, on account of ill health or infirmity, to present himself before an authorized witness, any authorized witness when so requested by any such voter, in writing, may visit such voter for the purpose of witnessing his signature to such postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers.

*Penalty.*

(c) Every authorized witness guilty of any contravention of any of the provisions of this clause shall be liable to a penalty of not more than One hundred pounds, or to imprisonment, with or without hard labour, for a term of not more than three months.

*Mistakes in Spelling Immaterial.*

10. No postal ballot-paper shall be rejected because of any mistake in spelling the name of the candidate if the intention is clear.

*Person who has Received Postal Ballot-paper or Postal Ballot-papers Not to Vote Personally Without Giving up Same.*

11. (a) Except as provided in the next succeeding section, no person to whom a postal ballot-paper for any election has or postal ballot-papers have been sent shall be entitled to vote personally at any poll unless he previously gives up such postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers unmarked to the returning officer or deputy at the polling place at which he is entitled to vote.

(b) Such officer shall immediately cancel any such postal ballot-paper and retain it.

*Provision when Person claims to vote, although Postal Ballot-paper already issued.*

12. (a) If a person to whom a postal ballot-paper appears to have been sent states that he has not received such postal ballot-paper and claims to vote personally at any polling place within the municipality to which such postal ballot paper relates, the returning officer or deputy at such booth may take from such person a declaration in the form of the Fourth Schedule hereto or to the like effect. Thereupon such person shall be entitled to vote personally at such poll and his vote shall be taken in the ordinary way.

(b) If such vote is received by the deputy returning officer he shall immediately advise the returning officer of the fact of such person having voted personally and shall forward the declaration to the returning officer with the ballot-papers, and if any postal ballot-paper purports to have been received from the same person such postal ballot-paper shall be rejected at the counting of the votes and the returning officer shall state thereon the reason of such rejection.

*Additional Question to be put on Tender of Vote Personally.*

13. (a) The returning officer or deputy shall before any person personally tendering his vote at any election for any municipality receives a ballot-paper or ballot-papers (but not afterwards), put to such person the following question in addition to any others he may lawfully put:—

Have you received a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers enabling you to vote at the election for a councillor or councillors (as the case may be) for the Subdivision of the to-day? (In the case of an adjourned poll the day from which the poll was adjourned should also be named in the question.)

*Refusal, &c., to Answer.*

(b) Every person having tendered his vote when such question is put as aforesaid who refuses or omits distinctly to answer the same, and every person who answers the question in the affirmative but does not deliver up his postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers, unmarked, shall be and be deemed prohibited from voting then and afterwards at such election, and shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable to a penalty of not more than Twenty pounds or to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term of not more than one month.

*Penalty for False Answer.*

(c) Every person who wilfully makes a false answer to such question put as aforesaid shall be guilty of an offence, and shall be liable to a penalty of not more than Fifty pounds or to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term of not more than three months.

*Inclusion of Votes through the Post at close of Poll.*

14. When immediately upon the close of any poll the returning officer is proceeding to ascertain the number of votes for each candidate, the returning officer shall produce unopened all envelopes containing postal ballot-papers received by him through the post up to the close of the poll, and such envelopes shall be opened in the presence of the scrutineers present and poll clerk (if any) but of no other person, and shall be dealt with as follows, namely:—

- (a) The returning officer shall produce all applications for postal ballot-papers;
- (b) The returning officer, without unfolding each postal ballot-paper or allowing it to be inspected, shall compare the signature of the voter on the counterfoil with the signature to the application and allow the scrutineers to inspect the same, and the returning officer shall determine whether or not the signature on the postal ballot-paper is that of the applicant;
- (c) If the postal ballot-paper is allowed by the returning officer he shall tear off the counterfoil without seeing the names of the candidate or candidates voted for, and shall insert the folded postal ballot-paper in a ballot-box separate from that used during the polling, and when all such postal ballot-papers have been so inserted the counting of the votes recorded therein shall commence;
- (d) Any postal ballot-paper not witnessed as required by these regulations shall be disallowed by the returning officer;
- (e) The returning officer shall attach all the counterfoils together;
- (f) The list of the number of votes received by each candidate shall show separately the votes tendered personally and the votes given by postal ballot-papers;
- (g) If the returning officer disallows a postal ballot-paper then such ballot-paper shall be included in a sealed parcel of ballot-papers which shall be set aside for separate custody and transmitted to the clerk of the municipality.

*Applications and Counterfoils to be forwarded to the Clerk of the Municipality after Declaration of Poll.*

15. Notwithstanding anything in the Local Government Act 1946—

(a) All applications for postal ballot-papers and all counterfoils of postal ballot-papers received by a returning officer—

- (i) shall not be made up or enclosed in the sealed parcels as required by sections 144 and 145 of the said Act, but shall be made up and enclosed in a special packet which shall be endorsed with a description of the contents and the name of the subdivision, the name of the municipality, and the date of the polling (which endorsement shall be signed by the returning officer), and forthwith after the declaration of the poll shall be forwarded by the returning officer to the clerk of the municipality;

*Preservation of Applications and Counterfoils.*

- (ii) shall be safely kept by the clerk of the municipality for twelve months; and

*Applications and Counterfoils Open to Public Inspection.*

- (iii) after receipt thereof by the clerk of the municipality shall be open to public inspection at all convenient times during office hours at the office of the municipality until the expiration of the said period of twelve months; and

- (iv) after the period of twelve months referred to the applications for postal ballot-papers and counterfoils of ballot-papers shall be destroyed as provided by section 145 of the Local Government Act.

*Clerk of the Municipality to give Receipt for Packet.*

(b) the clerk of the municipality shall forthwith give or send to the returning officer a receipt under his hand for every such special packet received by him.

(c) The decision of the returning officer as to the allowance or disallowance of any postal ballot-paper shall be subject to review only by a Stipendiary Magistrate on a recount of votes pursuant to the *Local Government Act 1946* or by the Supreme Court on proceedings under Part IV., of the *Local Government Act 1946*.

*Production before Stipendiary Magistrate.*

(d) the clerk of the municipality shall produce any such applications or counterfoils when required to do so by any stipendiary magistrate for the purposes of any recount of votes by such stipendiary magistrate.

*Applications and Counterfoils to be Evidence.*

(e) any application for a postal ballot-paper and any counterfoil of a postal ballot-paper taken from any such special packet and having written thereon respectively under the hand of the clerk of the municipality a certificate of the several particulars required by this section to be endorsed upon such packet, and that the same was taken from such packet shall be evidence in any Court or before any justice—

- (i) that the same was so taken;
- (ii) that the same, if an application was received by the returning officer (at the election to which such endorsement and writing relate), and that a postal ballot-paper the counterfoil of which bears the application number corresponding with the application number written on the application, was issued by the returning officer to the applicant whose name appears on the application; and
- (iii) that the same, if a counterfoil, was the counterfoil of a postal ballot-paper used at the said election.

*Certain Offences to be Bribery.*

16. The following persons shall be deemed guilty of bribery:—

- (a) Every person who directly or indirectly makes overtures to any person for the acquiring by gift or purchase or who acquires by gift or purchase from any person any postal ballot-paper; and
- (b) every person who directly or indirectly makes overtures to any other person for the giving away or parting with the possession of or selling any postal ballot-paper or who gives away any such paper or who sells or (except as in these regulations provided) parts with the possession of any postal ballot-paper.

*Making False Application a Misdemeanour.*

17. If in any application for a postal ballot-paper any person makes any false statement or if any person applies for a postal ballot-paper to which some other person is entitled he shall be guilty of a misdemeanour and shall be liable to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term of not more than two years.

*False Declaration Perjury.*

18. Every person who wilfully makes and subscribes any declaration for the purposes of these regulations, the same being untrue or false in any particular, shall be liable to the penalties of perjury.

*Inducing Disclosure of Vote by Post, &c., an Offence.*

19. Every person who—

- (a) directly or indirectly requires, induces, or attempts to induce any person to show by producing his postal ballot-paper for whom he intends to vote at any election; or
- (b) unless authorized by these regulations writes the name or names of any candidate or candidates or marks any vote in any postal ballot-paper not issued to such person; or

- (c) opens any envelope addressed to a returning officer not being duly authorized so to do by such returning officer—

shall be guilty of an offence, and shall be liable to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term of not more than one year.

*Inducing Persons to Vote for any Particular Candidate by Bribery or Intimidation.*

20. (a) Every person who requires, induces, or attempts to induce any person in his employment to obtain a postal ballot-paper with the intention of influencing such person by bribery or intimidation to record his vote in favour of any particular candidate shall be guilty of an offence, and shall be liable to a penalty of not more than Fifty pounds, to be recovered in a summary way before a court of petty sessions by any person who sues for the same.

(b) Bribery or intimidation shall for the purposes of this section include any promise or threat either expressed, implied, or understood of any benefit or disadvantage to accrue directly or indirectly to such person from such first-mentioned person.

*Authorized Witnesses.*

21. The following persons being resident in Victoria shall be authorized witnesses in and for Victoria within the meaning of these regulations:

- (a) All returning officers and electoral registrars appointed under any Act relating to elections for the Legislative Council or the Legislative Assembly; all postmasters or postmistresses or persons in charge of post offices; all stipendiary magistrates; all justices; all commissioners for taking declarations and affidavits; all head teachers of State schools; all members of the Police Force; all clerks of petty sessions; all railway stationmasters; all councillors of and the clerk or secretary of any city, town, borough, or shire; all barristers and solicitors; and all legally qualified medical practitioners.
- (b) All persons or classes of persons employed in the Public Service of Victoria who are appointed by the Governor in Council to be authorized witnesses within the meaning of these regulations.

22. No person who is a candidate for any election shall be an authorized witness at or in connexion with that election.

- (a) All returning officers and electoral registrars appointed under any Act relating to elections for the Legislative Council or the Legislative Assembly; all postmasters or postmistresses or persons in charge of post offices; all stipendiary magistrates; all justices; all commissioners for taking declarations and affidavits; all head teachers of State schools; all members of the Police Force; all clerks of petty sessions; all railway stationmasters; all councillors of and the clerk or secretary of any city, town, borough, or shire; all barristers and solicitors; and all legally qualified medical practitioners.

- (b) All persons or classes of persons employed in the Public Service of Victoria who are appointed by the Governor in Council to be authorized witnesses.

No person who is a candidate at any election shall be an authorized witness at that election.

#### Instructions to Applicants and Authorized Witnesses.

- (a) When so much of the form of application as precedes the places for the signatures has been filled in and otherwise completed the applicant shall exhibit his form of application to an authorized witness.
- (b) The applicant shall then in the presence of the authorized witness sign his name in his own handwriting on the form of application in the place provided for the signature of the applicant.
- (c) The authorized witness shall then sign his name in his own handwriting in the place provided for the signature of the authorized witness, and shall add the title under which he acts as an authorized witness, his residence, and the date.

#### Offences and Penalties.

- (a) An authorized witness shall not witness the signature of any applicant on any application for a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers unless the authorized witness—
- has satisfied himself as to the identity of the applicant;
  - has seen the applicant sign the application in his own handwriting; and
  - knows that the statements contained in the application are true or has satisfied himself (whether by inquiry from the applicant or otherwise) that the said statements are true.
- (b) An authorized witness shall not persuade or induce or associate himself with any person in persuading or inducing any person to make application for a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers.
- (c) An authorized witness shall not—
- visit any person for the purpose of witnessing the signature of such person to his application for a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers; or
  - witness the signature of any applicant to any such application in any place other than the ordinary residence or place of business of the authorized witness.

Provided that if any person desires to make application for a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers, and is unable on account of ill health or infirmity to present himself before an authorized witness any authorized witness when so requested by any such person in writing may visit such person for the purpose of witnessing his signature to such application.

Every authorized witness guilty of any of these offences is liable to a penalty of not more than One hundred pounds, or to imprisonment for a term of not more than three months.

(ii) place the figure 1 opposite the name of the candidate for whom the voter votes as his first preference and the figures 2, 3, 4 (and so on as the case requires) to indicate the order of the voter's preference for all the remaining candidates.

(c) If the candidates' names are not printed or written under the heading Candidates' Names when the ballot-paper is issued to the voter the voter shall if more candidates than one have the same surname also insert in the ballot-paper the christian or other names of such candidates, and if more candidates than one have the same surname and christian or other names the residences and occupations of such candidates.

(d) If the voter's sight is so impaired that he is unable to vote without assistance, the authorized witness, at the request of the voter, shall mark his vote on the ballot-paper and shall (if the voter so desires) mark the same in the presence of another person, or shall (if the voter so desires) permit some other person appointed by the voter to mark the ballot-paper for him.

(e) The voter shall then re-fold the ballot-paper and fasten the same.

(f) The voter shall then sign his name in his own handwriting on the counterfoil in the place provided for the signature of the voter.

(g) The authorized witness shall then sign his name in his own handwriting in the place provided for the signature of the witness, and shall add the title under which he acts as an authorized witness, his residence, and the date.

(h) The voter shall then place the ballot paper, with the counterfoil attached, into the envelope addressed to the returning officer, fasten the envelope in the presence of the authorized witness, and post it.

(i) This ballot-paper cannot be counted in the election unless it is received by the returning officer before the closing of the poll.

*Instructions to Authorized Witness.*

The authorized witness shall—

- (a) see that the foregoing directions are substantially complied with;
- (b) refrain from looking at the vote given by the voter except where the voter cannot vote without assistance and the voter requests his assistance;
- (c) not disclose any knowledge officially acquired by him touching the vote of the voter save in answer to some question which he is legally bound to answer or in compliance with the express provisions of the law relating to elections of councillors for municipalities.

An authorized witness shall not—

- (a) visit any voter for the purpose of witnessing the signature of such voter to his postal ballot-paper;
- (b) witness the signature of any voter to his postal ballot-paper at any place other than the ordinary residence or place of business of the authorized witness; or
- (c) witness the signature of any voter to his postal ballot-paper unless the authorized witness has satisfied himself as to the identity of the voter and has seen the voter sign the counterfoil in his own handwriting:

Provided that if any voter has received a postal ballot-paper and is unable on account of ill health or infirmity to present himself before an authorized witness, any authorized witness, when so requested by any such voter in writing, may visit such voter for the purpose of witnessing his signature to such postal ballot-paper.

Every authorized witness guilty of a contravention of any of these instructions to authorized witnesses is liable to a penalty of not more than One hundred pounds, or to imprisonment, with or without hard labour, for a term of not more than three months.

**COMPULSORY VOTING AT MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS  
(REGULATIONS WHICH MAY BE APPLIED TO  
ELECTIONS OF COUNCILLORS OF ANY MUNI-  
CIPALITY).**

HIS Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, and in pursuance of the provisions of section 149 of the *Local Government Act 1946*, hereby makes the following regulations, which shall apply at all elections of councillors for every municipality to which such regulations have been applied by an Order of the Governor in Council published in the *Government Gazette* under the powers conferred by the said section 149:

1. Every person whose name is inscribed upon the voters' roll shall record the number of votes set opposite his name on such roll at every election for a councillor for which he is entitled to vote, except that this regulation shall not make it compulsory for any owner of vacant land, whose usual place of residence is outside the municipal district, to vote as such owner.

2. The returning officer, at the close of the poll at every election, shall—

- (a) from every roll used at the election, and from the counterfoils of all postal ballot-papers received before the close of the poll at the election, indicate by a distinguishing mark on a fair copy of the roll used at the election (which copy is hereinafter referred to as the "marked roll") the names of the persons required by clause 1 of these regulations to record their votes at the election for which he is returning officer and who have not recorded such votes;
- (b) certify the marked roll by statutory declaration under his hand in accordance with Form A. of the schedule hereto; and
- (c) forthwith forward such marked roll to the clerk of the municipality.

3. Within three months after the close of the poll at every election the clerk of the municipality—

- (a) shall send by post to each person whose name indicated as aforesaid appears on any such marked roll, at the address therein mentioned, a notice in accordance with Form B. of the Schedule hereto, notifying him that he has failed to record his vote or votes (as the case may be) as required by these regulations at the election specified therein, and requiring him to state the true reason why he failed so to vote; and
- (b) before sending such notice, shall insert therein—
  - (i) the full name of the person as appearing on the roll, and his address as therein mentioned, and the names of the subdivisions (if any) in which he was required to vote but did not vote, and his number on the roll, or (as the case may be) his number on the roll of each such subdivision; and
  - (ii) a date (not being less than twenty-one days after the date of the posting of the notice) before or on which the form at the foot of the notice, duly filled up and signed by the person, is to be in the hands of the clerk of the municipality.

4. (1) Every person to whom such a notice has been sent shall—

- (a) fill up the Form C. at the foot of the notice by stating in it the true reason why he failed so to record his vote or votes (as the case may be);
- (b) sign the form; and
- (c) post or deliver the same so as to reach the clerk of the municipality not later than the date inserted in the notice.

(2) If the person is unable, by reason of absence from his residence or physical incapacity, to fill up, sign, and post or deliver the form within the time allowed pursuant to these regulations—

- (a) any other person over the age of twenty-one years, and who has personal knowledge of the facts, may fill up, sign, and post or deliver within that time the form, duly witnessed by another person over the age of twenty-one years; and
  - (b) such filling up, signing, and delivery or posting of the form may be treated as compliance by the first-mentioned person with the provisions of this clause.
- (3) Upon receipt within the time allowed, pursuant to these regulations, of any such form properly filled up and signed and witnessed (if so required) the clerk of the municipality shall—
- (a) make on the marked roll or rolls opposite the name of the person to whom the form refers a note to that effect; and
  - (b) indicate in writing on the marked roll or rolls opposite the name of the person his opinion whether or not the reason contained in the form is a valid and sufficient reason for the failure of the person to record his vote or votes at the election.

(4) If in the case of any person to whom a notice as aforesaid has been sent such form is not received by the clerk of the municipality within the time allowed pursuant to these regulations, the clerk of the municipality shall make on the marked roll or rolls opposite the name of such person a note to that effect.

(5) Where the reply of any person states for his failure to record his vote or votes a reason which, in the opinion of the clerk of the municipality, is not a valid and sufficient reason for that failure, the clerk of the municipality shall notify such person in accordance with Form D. of the Schedule hereto of his opinion, and inform him that he has the option of having the matter dealt with by the municipal council or by a Court of Petty Sessions. Before sending such notice, the clerk of the municipality shall insert therein a date (not being less than twenty-one days after the date of the posting of the notice) before or on which the form at the foot of the notice duly filled up and signed by the person and witnessed is to be in the hands of the clerk of the municipality.

#### 5. The marked roll or rolls indicating—

- (a) the names of persons required by clause 1 of these regulations to vote at such election who did not vote thereat;
- (b) the names of persons from whom or on whose behalf the clerk of the municipality received within the time allowed pursuant to these regulations forms properly filled up and signed;
- (c) the names of persons from whom or on whose behalf the clerk of the municipality did not within that time receive forms properly filled up and signed; and
- (d) the opinions of the clerk of the municipality, or a copy of any such marked roll, or any extract therefrom certified by the clerk of the municipality under his hand, shall in all proceedings be prima facie evidence of the contents of such marked roll or extract, and of the fact that the persons whose names appear therein marked as aforesaid did not vote at the election and that the notice specified in these regulations was received by those persons and that those persons did or did not (as the case may be) comply with the requisitions contained in the notice within the time allowed pursuant to these regulations.

#### 6. Every person required by clause 1 of these regulations to vote at any election for a councillor who—

- (a) fails to record his vote or votes (as the case may be) at such election without a valid and sufficient excuse for such failure (in this clause the expression "valid and sufficient excuse" includes an honest belief on the part of the person that abstention from voting is part of his religious duty); or
- (b) on receipt of the notice in accordance with Form B. aforesaid, fails, neglects, or refuses to fill up and sign, and post or deliver to the clerk of the municipality so as to reach him within the time allowed pursuant to these regulations the form at the foot of the notice; or
- (c) states in such form a false reason for not having recorded his vote or votes, or in the case of a person filling up or purporting to fill up a form on behalf of any other person pursuant to these regulations states in such form a false reason why the other person did not vote—

shall for each such offence be liable to a penalty of not more than Two pounds, and proceedings for the enforcement of the penalty may be commenced within six months

after the date of the election by the council of the municipality or by some person authorized pursuant to the Local Government Acts.

#### Provided that—

- (a) any person to whom a notice under these regulations has been posted who desires the matter to be dealt with by the council of the municipality, and is prepared to abide by the decision of the council, may notify the clerk of the municipality in accordance with Form E. of the Schedule hereto;
- (b) in any such case the council may make an order in accordance with Form F., requiring the person to pay a sum not being more than Ten shillings; and
- (c) if the said sum is not paid within fourteen days after the date of the order, the clerk of the municipality may forward to the clerk of a Court of Petty Sessions a certificate under his hand in accordance with Form G. of the Schedule hereto, setting out the substance of the order, and stating that the said sum has not been paid; and thereupon payment of the said sum shall be enforceable in the same manner as if the said sum—
  - (i) were a fine adjudged by such Court of Petty Sessions to be paid which the Act of Parliament under which such fine is imposed provides no means of enforcing; and
  - (ii) were ascertained by a conviction.

#### 7. For the purposes of these regulations the returning officer at any election—

- (a) with the assistance of such of the deputy returning officers and poll clerks as he deems necessary shall in the presence of such deputy returning officers and poll clerks, but of no other person, open and, if necessary, break the seal of any parcel containing the rolls used at the election and examine the same for the purpose of indicating on the marked roll aforesaid the names of the persons who have not voted at the election; and
- (b) at the conclusion of the said examination and marking shall replace such rolls in the parcels from which they were taken and re-seal the same and then comply with the provisions of section One hundred and forty-five of the *Local Government Act 1946*.

## LEADING HANDS.

Leading hands in charge of not less than three and not more than ten employees, 15s. per week extra; more than ten and not more than twenty employees, 30s. per week extra; more than twenty employees, 45s. per week extra.

Provided that an employee in an electrical supply undertaking detailed to act as leading hand in charge of two other adult employees working away from power station or workshop (one of whom is of the same classification as himself) shall be paid 15s. per week extra.

## TRADESMEN IN LARGE POWER HOUSES.

Tradesmen and/or welders, and/or apprentices in the fourth and fifth years of their apprenticeship employed in large operating thermal power houses (i.e., power houses developing more than 8,000 kilowatts), other than those not on the regular staff, engaged on new construction work, shall be paid 15s. per week extra; assistants and unapprenticed juniors 19 years of age and over shall be paid 7s. 6d. per week extra, and other apprentices and unapprenticed juniors shall be paid 3s. per week extra; such amounts shall be deemed to include all special rates prescribed in clause 6 of this Determination.

This allowance shall continue to be payable to tradesmen attached to the staffs of such power houses while carrying out repairs or maintenance in rotary converter sub-stations which are in regular operation.

## APPRENTICESHIP.

## 3. (Other than those covered by the Apprenticeship Commission.)

*Apprenticeship Trades.*

(a) An employer shall not employ minors in the following trades or occupations otherwise than under a contract of apprenticeship as hereinafter provided:—

- (i) Brassfinisher (except the making of parts by specialized processes and the assembling thereof)
- (ii) Electrical fitter and/or armature winder (except the winding of armatures by specialized processes).
- (iii) Electrical mechanic.
- (iv) Fitter and/or turner.
- (v) Locksmith—making and/or repairing locks, including those of safes and strong-room doors, but not including the making of parts by specialized processes and the assembling thereof.
- (vi) Machinist—1st and 2nd class.
- (vii) Motor mechanic.
- (viii) Moulder and/or coremaker—jobbing.
- (ix) Patternmaker.
- (x) Refrigeration mechanic or serviceman.
- (xi) Safe and strong-room maker.
- (xii) Scale maker (except the making of parts by specialized processes and the assembling thereof).
- (xiii) Scientific instrument maker.
- (xiv) Smithing—Blacksmith, copper and/or brass smith.
- (xv) Welder—Special class.
- (xvi) Window frame fitter.
- (xvii) Brass polishing.
- (xviii) Adding machine, calculating machine, book-keeping machine, cash register, or first-class mechanic.

*Contract of Apprenticeship.*

(b) Every contract of apprenticeship hereinafter made shall contain—

- (i) the names of the parties;
- (ii) the date of birth of the apprentice;
- (iii) a statement of the trade or trades to which the apprentice is to be bound and which he is to be taught during the course and for the purpose of the apprenticeship;
- (iv) a covenant by the master to teach and instruct or cause the apprentice to be taught or instructed in the trade to which the apprentice is bound;
- (v) the date at which the apprenticeship is to commence or from which it is to be calculated;
- (vi) all other conditions of apprenticeship.

*Cancellation or Suspension of Indenture.*

(c) Subject to the approval of the Secretary for Labour and Industry, but not otherwise, an indenture of apprenticeship may be suspended or cancelled—

- (i) by mutual consent;
- (ii) if through lack of orders or financial difficulties an employer is unable to find suitable employment for an apprentice and a transfer to another employer cannot be arranged.
- (iii) if, in the opinion of the Secretary for Labour and Industry, circumstances exist which render such suspension or cancellation necessary or desirable.

Any covenant in an indenture inconsistent with the provision of this clause shall be null and void and of no force or effect while this Determination remains in force and applies to the parties to the indenture.

*Instruction in Welding.*

(d) The training of apprentices to blacksmithing, structural steel works, fitting or fitting and turning shall include instruction in electric welding and/or oxy-acetylene welding as far as is practicable with the facilities available in the shop in which they are trained.

*Proportion.*

(e) (i) An employer shall not employ apprentices in excess of the proportion hereinafter prescribed.

Subject to this sub-clause the proportion of apprentices who may be taken by an employer shall not exceed one apprentice to every three or fraction of three tradesmen in the trade concerned.

In the trades of—

- Welder—Special class;
- Motor mechanic; and
- Moulder and/or coremaker—jobbing;

the proportion of apprentices who may be taken by an employer shall not exceed one apprentice for every two or fraction of two tradesmen in the trade concerned.

For the purpose of ascertaining the number of apprentices, the number of tradesmen shall be deemed to be the average number working during the immediately preceding six months, and in ascertaining such proportion an employer actually working in any workshop shall be deemed to be a tradesman.

A person who is, for a term not exceeding two years, taking practical training in a workshop in continuance of a course of training for professional work shall not be taken into account in calculating the proportion of apprentices to journeymen.

(ii) Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore provided in the trades of—

- Fitter and/or turner,
- Machinist—1st and 2nd class,
- Motor mechanic, and
- Refrigeration mechanic or serviceman,

an employer may with the consent of an apprenticeship authority and upon satisfying that authority that he has the plant, equipment and staff necessary for the proper tuition of each apprentice concerned take apprentices in excess of the proportion herein prescribed. Until further order apprentices so taken shall not be counted in future calculations of the proportion of apprentices to journeymen authorized by the Determination.

*Period of Apprenticeship.*

(f) The periods of apprenticeship, except as to those marked (i), (xi), (xii), and (xvi), shall be as follows:—

If the apprentice, when indentured, is under the age of seventeen years—five years; if over the age of seventeen—four or five years, at the option of the contracting parties.

For the trades marked (i), (xi), (xii), and (xvi)—four or five years at the option of the contracting parties.

*Adult Apprentices.*

(g) Any apprentice who cannot complete his full term of apprenticeship before reaching his 22nd birthday may, by agreement with his master, serve as an apprentice until he reaches the age of 23 years.

*Probationary Period.*

(h) Minors may be taken on probation for three months, and if apprenticed such three months shall count as part of their period of apprenticeship. An employer shall within fourteen days of employing a probationer notify the appropriate apprenticeship authorities of the employment of such probationer to any of the trades mentioned herein.

*Wages.*

(i) The minimum weekly rates of wage for apprentices shall be the under-mentioned percentages of the basic wage prescribed for the area in which they are employed, and in all contracts of apprenticeship hereafter made, the employer shall covenant to pay wages of not less than such rates.

The total wages of apprentices and improvers shall be calculated to the nearest sixpence, any broken part of sixpence in the result not exceeding threepence to be disregarded.

The sum of 4s. per week shall be added to the above rates in the case of apprentice patternmakers.

An employee who is under 21 years of age on the expiration of his apprenticeship and thereafter works as a minor in the occupation to which he has been apprenticed shall be paid at not less than the adult rate prescribed for that classification.

*Hours.*

(k) The ordinary hours of employment of apprentices shall not in each workshop exceed those of the journeymen.

*Overtime and Shift Work.*

(l) No apprentice under the age of 18 years shall be required to work overtime or shift work unless he so desires.

No apprentice shall except in an emergency work or be required to work overtime or shift work at times which would prevent his attendance at technical school as required by any statute, Determination or regulation applicable to him.

*Payment by Results.*

(m) An apprentice shall not work under any system of payment by results.

*Lost Time.*

(n) The apprentice at the end of the calendar period of any year in which he has actually given service to the master upon less than the ordinary working days prescribed in this Determination, or in which he has unlawfully absented himself without the master's consent, shall, for every day short of the said number of working days, and for every day of such absence, serve one day, and the calendar period of the succeeding year of his service shall not be deemed to begin until the said additional day or days shall have been served. Provided that in calculating the extra time to be so served the apprentice shall be credited with time which he has worked during the relevant year in excess of his ordinary hours.

*Prohibition of Premiums.*

(o) An employer shall not, either directly or indirectly, or by any pretence or device receive from any person or require or permit any person to pay or give any consideration in the nature of a premium or bonus for the taking or binding of any probationer or apprentice.

*Attendance at Technical Schools.*

(p) Apprentices attending technical colleges or schools and presenting reports of satisfactory conduct shall be reimbursed all fees paid by them.

*Annual and Sick Leave.*

(q) Apprentices shall be entitled to sick and annual leave in accordance with the provisions of clauses 17 and 18 hereof respectively.

*IMPROVERS.*

4. Improvers employed at brass polishing or in the making or repairing of typewriters, book-keeping machines, adding machines, calculating machines, cash registers, duplicating machines, and similar machines shall be paid as follows:—

Notwithstanding anything elsewhere in this Determination contained, where an improver is under the age of 21 years after completion of five years at the trade of making or repairing typewriters, book-keeping machines, adding machines, calculating machines, cash registers, duplicating machines, and similar machines, he shall be paid four-fifths of the second-class mechanic's time wage until reaching the age of 21 years.



Proportion of Improvers.—In the making or repairing of typewriters, book-keeping machines, adding machines, calculating machines, cash registers, duplicating machines, and similar machines—one improver to every two or fraction of two workers employed in this section.

Brass polishing.—One improver to every two or fraction of two brass polishers receiving not less than the minimum wage.

#### FEMALES AND UNAPPRENTICED MALE JUNIORS.

5. (a) No junior other than an apprentice or an improver shall be employed at brass polishing or in assembling, making, or repairing typewriters, book-keeping machines, adding machines, calculating machines, cash registers, duplicating machines, and similar machines.

(b) Subject to the exception hereinafter provided, the minimum rates of wage for adult and junior females and for unapprenticed male juniors employed in occupations for which apprenticeship is not provided by this Determination shall be as follows:—

#### Prohibited Occupations.

(d) Junior employees shall not be employed:—

- (i) if under the age of 16 years—  
on oil or gas burners or fires used for heating of small articles or  
using electric arc or oxy acetylene blow pipe, or
- (ii) if under 18 years of age—  
die setting on power presses; or  
as furnacemen or assistants to furnacemen.

Clauses, other than clauses 2, 3, 4 and 5, of the said Determination shall remain in force.

### PAINTERS BOARD.

Clauses 1 and 2 of Part I., and clauses 1 and 2 of Part II. of the Determination published in *Government Gazette* N. 9 of the 20th January, 1955, shall be replaced by the following clauses:—

1. This Part applies only in respect of the employment of persons on the construction renovation alteration repair or demolition of buildings performed on the site thereof, and in particular it shall have no application—

(ii) An employer shall not employ any minor at work covered by this Part unless under a contract of apprenticeship, provided that any person who on or before the 1st June, 1949, was employed as an improver may continue to be so employed and paid at the rate prescribed in sub-clause (i) hereof for an improver of like experience.

(iii) Leading Hand, i.e., a tradesman who is given responsibility of direction and supervision of the work by his employer or by his employer's responsible representative of not fewer than five tradesmen shall receive in addition to his ordinary wage, allowances as follows:—

(a) If in charge of five tradesmen as aforesaid—1s. per day:

(b) If in charge of more than five tradesmen as aforesaid, 1s. per day for being in charge of the first five tradesmen, plus an additional 1s. per day for each additional five, or fraction of five tradesmen in excess of such first five tradesmen.

A Zone Manager shall, in addition to his ordinary wage, be entitled to the following allowance for each additional theatre, theatrette, or concert hall supervised :—

15s. per week with a maximum of £3 per week.

Third Schedule.

10s. per week with a maximum of £2 per week.

(b) *Casual Employees.*

A casual employee is one engaged and paid as such. A casual employee for working ordinary time shall be paid per hour one-fortieth of the appropriate weekly wage with the addition of 20 per cent. with a minimum payment as for 4 hours. Clauses, other than clause 2, of the said Determination shall remain in force.
