Provided that all other adult females employed on work for which a male margin of 40s, or over is prescribed in clause 40 of the Determination published in Government Gazette No. 236, of the 12th April, 1954, shall receive a margin equal to 50 per centum of the male margin, but, if the male margin was less than 40s., they shall receive a margin equal to 25 per centum of the male margin.

Where there is no male margin prescribed for their work they shall be paid a margin of 4s. per week.

#### PART III.-SAVING.

No employee shall have his or her rate reduced merely as a result of this Determination.

#### SPECIAL RATES.

- 3. (a) Leading hands.—In addition to the margins prescribed in clause 2 herein leading hands shall be paid the following allowances:—
  - (1) Fifteen shillings per week if in charge of not less than three and not more than ten employees including apprentices;
  - (2) Thirty shillings per week if in charge of not less than ten and not more than twenty employees including apprentices.
  - (3) Forty-five shillings per week if in charge of more than twenty employees including apprentices.
  - (b) In addition to the rates set out in clause 2 herein the following additional rates shall be paid: --
    - (i) Sixpence per hour to employees working in confined spaces;

Confined space means a compartment, space or place the dimensions of which necessitate an employee working in a stooped or otherwise cramped position or without proper ventilation.

(ii) Four-pence per hour to employees working in any place where clothing or boots become saturated, whether by water, oil or otherwise. Provided that this extra rate shall not be payable to an employee who is provided by the employer with suitable and effective protective clothing and/or footwear. And provided further that any employee who becomes entitled to this extra rate shall be paid such extra rate for such part of the day or shift as he is required to work in wet clothing or boots.

- (iii) Sixpence per hour to employees handling loose slag wool, loose insul wool or other loose material of a like nature used for providing insulation against heat, cold or noise;
- (iv) Fourpence per hour where a foreman and workman shall agree that the work is of an unusually dirty or offensive nature.

In case of disagreement between the foreman and workman, the workman or a shop steward on his behalf shall be entitled within 24 hours, to ask for a decision on the workman's claim by the employer's Industrial Officer if there be one, or otherwise by the employer or the executive officer responsible for the management of superintendence of the plant concerned. In such case a decision shall be given on the workman's claim within 48 hours of its being asked for (unless that time expires on a non-working day, in which case it shall be given during the next working day) or else the said allowance shall be paid.

#### Special Rates Not Cumulative.

(c) Where more than one of the disabilities entitling a workman to extra rates exist on the same job the employer shall be bound to pay only one rate, namely, the highest rate for the disabilities so prevailing.

#### Rates Not Subject To Penalty Additions.

(d) The special rates herein prescribed shall be paid irrespective of the times at which the work is performed, and shall not be subject to any premium or penalty additions.

#### MIXED FUNCTIONS.

4. Where an employee is engaged in any one week for more than half of such week at work in a higher class than he or she is employed to perform, he or she shall be paid for the full week at the highest rate payable for any such work under this Determination; but if he or she is engaged for more than half of any one day he or she shall be so paid for the whole day. If the period on the higher class of work is half or less than half a week or half or less than half a day then he or she shall be paid at the rate fixed for the work he or she actually performs.

- 3. In paragraphs (5) and (6) of Part II. of the Second Schedule to the Dangerous Drugs Regulations 1930 as substituted by the Dangerous Drugs Regulations 1931, the expression "diacetylmorphine" is hereby repealed.







Regulating the Supply and Distribution of Water at Diamond Creek.

A By-law of the City of Heidelberg, made under the provisions of the Local Government Act 1946, section 197 (1) (iv) and section 228, and numbered 192, for regulating the supply and distribution of water at Diamond Creek.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Local Government Act* 1946 and all other powers enabling, the Mayor, Councillors, and Citizens of the City of Heidelberg order as follows:—

1. That By-laws 56, 57, 131, and 183 be repealed as from the date of coming into operation of this By-law.

2. In this By-law unless inconsistent with the subject-. matter or context-

(a) "Council" means the Council of the City of

(a) "Council" means the Council of the City of Heidelberg.
(b) "Town Clerk" means the Town Clerk of the City of Heidelberg for the time being or the Acting Town Clerk of the City of Heidelberg for the time being, and shall also mean and include any other officer or person appointed by the Council for the purpose of exercising the powers of the Town Clerk under this By-law.
(c) "City Engineer" means the City Engineer of the City of Heidelberg for the time being or the Acting City Engineer of the City of Heidelberg for the time being, and shall also mean and

for the time being, and shall also mean and include any other officer or person appointed by the Council for the purpose of exercising the powers of the City Engineer under this

(d) "Daily Newspaper" means "The Age," "Argus,"
"Herald," "Sun," or other daily newspaper
circulating in the water supply area of Diamond

(e) "Period" means a succession of days whether broken or not commencing at a specified hour of a specified day and concluding at a specified hour of a specified day or at such hour of such day as shall subsequently be specified.

- 3. That the charge for water shall be at the rate of not less than One shilling and nine pence per 1,000 gallons, with a maximum of not more than Two shillings and six pence.
- 4. That the supply of water shall in all cases be by measure, and the Council may by notice, in writing, specify the size and type of meter or meters to be fixed to measure the quantity of water supplied to any premises.
- 5. Applications for water service must be made to the Council by the plumber laying such service, and three days' notice thereof, in writing, must be given. He shall also lodge with such application 10s. for 1-in. service, and 20s. for 1-in. service, in addition to the usual deposit required for opening the road. The amount thus lodged shall entitle the consumer of 8,000 gallons of water for 1-in.
- 6. All connexions shall be paid for by the consumer, and shall be made under the supervision and subject to the approval of the City Engineer.
- 7. No person shall, without notice in writing to Council, interfere with any pipe or connexion between the main and the meter.
- 8. Every consumer shall, at his own expense, provide a meter to Melbourne and Metropolitan Board of Works specifications, and maintain the same in good working order to the satisfaction of the City Engineer; such meter shall not be placed at a greater distance than 3 feet from the street or road frontage.
- A high pressure screw-down stopcock, properly fitted, shall be placed on each service between the meter and the street or road frontage.
- 10. All connexions, meters, taps, &c., must be approved by the City Engineer, and any connexion, service pipe, meter taps, or other fittings that, in the opinion of the City Engineer, have become corroded or otherwise defective shall be renewed forthwith on receipt of notice, in writing, from him.
- 11. Any person desiring to remove or alter the position of a meter must give three days' notice, in writing, and the registration of the quantity of the water used shall be taken before such removal or alteration.
- 12. The Council may by notice, in writing, order any type and size of meter to be fixed in lieu of any other type or size of meter already fixed.
- 13. No person shall affix any service pipe to any of the Council's mains, or alter or repair, or in any manner interfere with, any pipe belonging to the Council or any service pipe, tap, or fitting except he shall be a licensed
- .14. Any alteration, removal, or work to be done under-clauses 10 and 12 of this By-law shall be at the cost of the owner or occupier of the tenement supplied with water, each of whom shall be liable.
- 15. No person, whether licensed as aforesaid or not, shall uncover any pipe without giving three days' notice to the Council, or shall tamper with or alter any pipe without permission, in writing, or shall wilfully or negligently break, injure, or open any lock, cock, valve pipe, work, or injure the property of the Council.
- 16. All connexions with the Council's mains must be made in the same manner as required by the Melbourne and Metropolitan Board of Works.

  17. The person appointed by the Council may at any time enter into any house or premises supplied from the Council's main, in order to examine if there be any misuse of water, or for the purpose of checking the meter, and if such person be refused admission or prevented from entering any such house or premises, the Council may refuse to continue the supply of water to such premises, and the occupier of the said premises shall, in addition, be liable to the penalties hereunder.
- 18. If, in the opinion of the Council, or the Town Clerk, it is necessary to reduce the consumption of water supplied by the Council within the whole of the water supplied by the Council within the whole of the water supply area of Diamond Creek, or within any area comprised therein, the Council or Town Clerk (as the case may be) may at any time, or from time to time, declare that in respect to the whole of the area, or in respect to such part, as are specified in the declaration-
  - (a) Any period to be a period of restricted use of water; or
- (b) any period to be a period of limited use of water. 19. If, in the opinion of the Council, or the Town Clerk. it is still necessary to reduce the consumption of water within the whole of the water supply area of Diamond Creek, or within any area comprised therein, specified in a declaration made pursuant to clause 18 hereof, the

- Council, or the Town Clerk, may in respect to the whole of the water supply area of Diamond Creek, or in respect to any area comprised therein—
  - (a) during a period declared to be a period of limited use of water, terminate such period and declare the period commencing from the time of such termination to be a period of restricted use of
  - water;
    (b) during any period declared to be a period of restricted use of water or a period of limited use of water, declare any immediately ensuing period to be a period of restricted use of water or a period of limited use of water.
- 20. Any declaration made pursuant to clauses 18 or 19 hereof shall be in form or to the effect set forth in the Schedule hereto, and shall be signed by the Town Clerk, and shall be published in a daily newspaper.
- and shall be published in a daily newspaper.

  21. Save as hereinafter provided, during any period declared to be a period of restricted use of water or a period of limited use of water, no person shall, in the whole of the water supply area of Diamond Creek, or where any declaration made pursuant to clauses 18 or 19 hereof specifies any portion of such water supply area, use or cause or permit to be used for the watering of any garden, lawn, or vegetation or of any ground used or adapted for use in connexion with any sport, game, or other form of recreation, water supplied directly, or indirectly, by the Council: Provided, however, that—
  - (a) During any period declared to be a period of restricted use of water, water supplied by the Council may be used for such watering if the watering be carried out by means of a watering
  - can or other similar container held in the hand.

    (b) During any period declared to be a period of limited use of water, water supplied by the Council may be used for watering if the water.
  - touncil may be used for watering it the watering be carried out by means of a watering can or hose held in the hand.

    (c) During any period declared to be a period of restricted use of water, or a period of limited use of water, water supplied by the Council may be used for watering of any garden or any portion of any garden used wholly for the growing for sale of vegetables, fruit, seedlings, or flowers.
- 22. Any person committing any breach of this By-law shall be guilty of an offence and shall, upon conviction, be liable to a penalty not exceeding £20.
- 23. Before any period declared pursuant to clauses 18 and 19 hereof to be a period of restricted use of water or a period of limited use of water has expired, the Council or the Town Clerk, having regard to the water supply then available may, by declaration published in accordance with clause 20 hereof, terminate such period.

A By-law of the City of Melbourne, made under Part VII., Division 1, of the Local Government Acts and numbered 357, requiring the destruction of Argentine ants and providing that in the event of failure of any owner or occupier of any property or premises to comply with the requirements of this By-law, the Council may cause measures to be taken to destroy such Argentine ants at the expense of the owner or occupier and recover the cost thereof as a civil debt recoverable summarily.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the Local Government Acts and every other Act or power enabling it in that behalf, the Council of the City of Melbourne doth hereby order as follows:—

1. In this By-law, unless inconsistent with the context or subject matter "Argentine ants" means the species of ants known by the entomological name of Iridomyr-

of ants known by the entomological name of tracomynmex humilis Mayr.

"Council" means the Council of the City of Melbourne.

"Inspector" means any person appointed by the Council to carry out the duties of an inspector.

"Premises" includes messuages buildings land and hereditaments of every tenure and also any machinery plant appliance or vehicle used in connexion with any trade carried on at any premises.

2. (a) It shall be lawful for an Inspector to enter from time to time at any reasonable hour without notice upon any premises in the City of Melbourne for the purpose of ascertaining whether there are Argentine ants in or

about such premises.

(b) If the Inspector finds or believes that there are Argentine ants in or about any premises, he may give notice to the owner or occupier thereof, requiring him forthwith to destroy all Argentine ants in or upon such premises.

(c) Any owner or occupier so notified who, within seven days after service of the notice, does not destroy all Argentine ants in or about his premises shall be guilty of an offence against this By-law.

3. If after three days from the date of expiry of any notice served under clause 2 (b) hereof on any owner or occupier of any premises, such owner or occupier has not compiled with the requirements thereof, the Council may—

- (i) cause measures to be taken to destroy all Argentine ants in or about any such premises at the expense of the owner or occupier thereof;
- (ii) recover the cost thereof from such owner or occupier as a civil debt recoverable summarily.
- 4. Every person guilty of a breach of this By-law shall be liable to a penalty of not less than Five pounds or more than Twenty pounds, and in the case of continuing offence to a penalty of not more than Five pounds for each day

on which an offence against this By-law is continued after a conviction or order by any court.

5. This By-law shall apply to and have operation throughout the whole of the municipal district of the City of Melbourne.

- (c) Any owner or occupier so notified who within seven days after service of the notice has not effectively destroyed all Argentine ants in or about his property or premises shall be guilty of an offence against this By-law.
- 3. If after seven days from the date of the service of any notice under clause 2 (b) hereof on any owner or occupier of any property or premises such owner or occupier has not complied with the requirements thereof the Council may-
  - (i) cause measures to be taken to effectively destroy any Argentine ants existing in or about any such

- With each application for registration or renewal of registration there shall be lodged with the Council a fee as prescribed in the Schedule hereunder.
- 7. Where application for renewal of registration is not lodged with the Council until after the last day fixed by this By-law for the lodging thereof, an additional fee equal to one-half of the relevant prescribed fee otherwise payable for renewal of registration shall be paid.

#### Rubbish Tips, &c.

A By-law of the Shire of Avon, made under section 197 of the Local Government Act 1946, and every other power thereunto it enabling, and numbered 21, for suppressing nuisances, preventing fires, and generally for maintaining the good rule and government in the municipality.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Local Government Act* 1946, the President, Councillors, and Ratepayers of the Shire of Avon order as follows:—

- 1. No person shall do or permit to be done any of the following matters at any refuse tip or incinerator under the control of the Council of the Shire of Avon:—
  - (a) Trespass on any part of such area.
  - (b) Deposit or leave any refuse or rubbish except as directed by the Council's engineer or other officer in charge of any such areas.
  - (c) Obstruct, disturb, interrupt, or annoy any person lawfully using such area.
  - (d) Neglect or refuse to obey the lawful directions of the Council's Engineer or other officer or employee in charge of any such areas.
  - (e) Deposit or leave any rubbish, refuse, factory waste, or any other material which, in the opinion of the Council's Engineer or other officer in charge of any such areas is inflammable or

- subject to spontaneous combustion, or liable to ignite or if ignited to cause smoke or fumes. Provided that this prohibition shall apply for only such period of the year as the Council or its Engineer or other officer in charge of any such areas shall determine.
- (f) Bring, deposit, or leave any refuse or rubbish obtained from any place outside the municipal district of the Shire of Avon without the written authority of the Shire Secretary of the Shire of Avon.
- (g) Remove any sand or material.
- (h) Interfere with the surface of the tip or with any materials deposited or about to be deposited at the tip.
- (i) Behave in an unseemly, indecent, or improper manner, or use any profane or indecent language, or commit any nuisance at the tip.
- (j) Disfigure, damage, destroy, or interfere with any notice board, post, fence, building, appllance, tree, gate, or other equipment at the tip.
- 2. No person in or upon any road, street, footway, or public place within the municipal district of the Shire of Avon shall drive any vehicle laden with sand, dust, paper shavings, iron, steel or metal shavings, or waste or any other material which may drop or be blown about, unless such vehicle is provided with adequate sides and, where necessary, completely enclosed to the satisfaction of an officer of the Council.
- 3. This By-law shall apply to and have operation throughout the whole of the municipal district of the Shire of Avon.
- 4. Any person doing any act forbidden to be done or failing to do any act directed to be done by this By-law shall be liable to a penalty of not more than £20.


