Labour and Industry Acts.

AMENDING DETERMINATION OF THE TAR AND BITUMEN BOARD.

Note.—This Determination applies to the whole of the State of Victoria.

 \mathbf{I}^N accordance with the provisions of the Labour and Industry Acts, the Wages Board which now has the power to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons (other than persons subject of the jurisdiction of the Excavation or Roadwork Board) wheresoever employed in the process, trade, business, or occupation of—

- (i) tar distilling;
- (ii) manufacturing or preparing bituminous emulsions, tar distillates, asphaltic concrete, or other road-surfacing preparations;
- (iii) manufacturing or preparing enamel made from tar pitch;

has made the following Determination, namely:-

That, on the 3rd September, 1956, the Determination made on the 8th December, 1953, and published in Government Gazette No. 58 of the 16th February, 1954, shall be amended by adding the following new clause:—

OLYMPIC GAMES HOLIDAY.

7. In connextion with the holding of the Olympic Games in Victoria during the months of November and December, 1956, where a holiday or half holiday is proclaimed by Order in Council throughout any Municipality or part thereof, or within any defined area, such holiday or half-holiday shall, so far as such Municipality or part thereof, or such defined area is concerned be deemed to be included in the list of holidays prescribed in clauses 9 and 10.

Provided that no employee shall be entitled to the conditions prescribed by this clause for more than the equivalent of one working day.

Provided further that an employee who fails to attend for work on the day before and/or after such holiday or half-holiday without reasonable excuse shall not be entitled to be paid for such holiday or half-holiday.
