Land Act 1928.

AREA OF LAND COMPRISED IN CERTAIN CLASSES DIMINISHED OR INCREASED.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by the *Land Act 1928* it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may, by Proclamation to be published in the *Government Gazette*, at any time diminish or increase the area of land comprised in any of the classes mentioned in Part I, Division I, section 5, of the said *Land Act 1928*, but that the area of lands which may be sold by auction (Class 6), shall not be increased except as in certain cases in the said Act provided: Now, therefore, I, the Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, and in accordance with the provisions of sections 94 and 117 of the *Land Act 1928* aforesaid, do hereby diminish or increase (as the case may be) the areas of Crown lands comprised in Classes 2, 3, 4, 6, and 7 of the classes mentioned in section 5 of the *Land Act 1928* aforesaid, to the extent set forth in the subjoined Schedule (that is to say):—

PUBLIC HIGHWAY.—CITY OF HAWTHORN.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by the *Local Government Act* 1946, section 518, it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council at any time, and from time to time, upon the request of the Council of any municipality, by notice published in the *Government Gazette*, to declare any land reserved, used or by purchase or exchange acquired for a street, road, highway, thoroughfare, bridge, square, court, alley or right-of-way to be a public highway, and that such land shall thereupon and thenceforth from the date of such Proclamation become and be absolutely dedicated to the public as a public highway within the meaning of any law then or thereafter in force:

And, whereas the Council of the City of Hawthorn has requested that the land hereinafter mentioned which has been used for a road within the said City, be so declared to be a public highway:

Now, therefore, I, the Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, do, by this Proclamation, declare that all that piece of land used for a road, being part of Crown portion 14, Parish of Boroondara, and being the land more particularly described hereunder, shall be a public highway within the meaning of the said Act:—

All that piece of land commencing at the south-western angle of lot 21 shown on lodged plan of subdivision No. 4695, bounded thence by lines bearing respectively north 0 deg. 1 min. east 76 ft. 5½ in., north 89 deg. 57 min. west 10 feet, south 0 deg. 1 min. west 61 ft. 5½ in., south 45 deg. 2 min. west 7 ft. 1 in., north 89 deg. 57 min. west 154 ft. 4¼ in., south 12 deg. 19 min. east 10 ft. 2¼ in. and south 89 deg. 57 min. east 167 ft. 2¼ in. to the point of commencement.

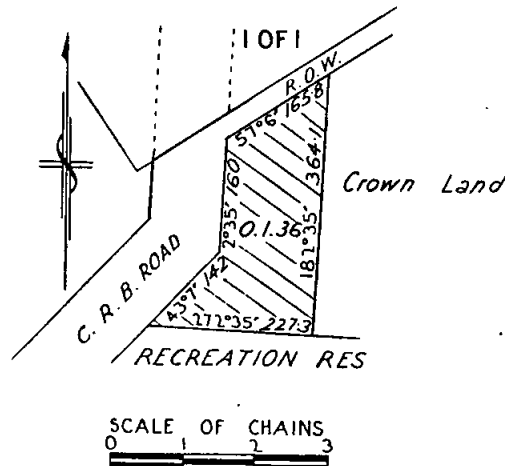

INSTRUMENT MAKING AND/OR REPAIRING TRADES APPRENTICESHIP REGULATIONS.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the Apprenticeship Acts, His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby rescind the Regulations mentioned in the First Schedule hereto, and doth hereby make the following Regulations, that is to say:—

Short Title.

1. These Regulations may be cited as the "Instrument Making and/or Repairing Trades Apprenticeship Regulations."

Interpretation.

2. In these Regulations—
 "Acts" means the Apprenticeship Acts.
 "Prescribed" means prescribed by an appropriate industrial authority or agreement, or by these Regulations, as the case may require.
 "Probationer" means an applicant for apprenticeship employed on probation.

Application of Regulations.

3. These Regulations shall apply only with respect to the following apprenticeship trades, as carried on in the Metropolitan District, viz.:—

*INSTRUMENT MAKING AND/OR REPAIRING.**Educational Qualifications for Entry into Apprenticeship.*

4. Applicants for apprenticeship in the said trades may be required to submit themselves for examination at the time and place determined by the Commission to prove that they possess the preparatory educational qualifications required for entry into apprenticeship in such trades; provided that any such applicant shall be exempted from such examination:—

(1) If he possesses any one of the following educational qualifications, or, in the opinion of the Commission, the equivalent thereof:—

(a) The Intermediate Technical Certificate of the Education Department of Victoria or the School Intermediate Certificate.

(b) In the case of an applicant who is less than seventeen years of age only, the Junior Technical Certificate or the completion, in a manner satisfactory to the Commission, of the third year of the course of study of the Junior Technical Schools of the Education Department of Victoria.

(2) If he satisfies the Commission, in accordance with sub-section (2) of section 18 of the *Apprenticeship Act 1928*, that he has not had sufficient opportunity to obtain the preparatory educational qualifications prescribed for entry into the said trades.

Minimum Age for Entry into Apprenticeship.

5. The minimum age at which persons shall enter the said trades as apprentices or probationers shall be fifteen years: Provided that a person who possesses the Junior Technical Certificate may, subject to the approval of the Commission, so enter the said trades at the age of fourteen years and six months.

Term of Apprenticeship.

6. The term of apprenticeship in the said trades shall be as follows:—

(1) In the case of a person who is less than seventeen years of age at the time of commencement of the term of apprenticeship, a term of five years.

(2) In the case of a person who is seventeen or more years of age at the time of commencement of the term of apprenticeship, a term of four or five years, at the option of the contracting parties.

Form of Indentures of Apprenticeship.

7. The standard form of indentures of apprenticeship in the said trades and the terms, covenants, and conditions thereof shall be in the form contained in the Seventh Schedule to the General Apprenticeship Regulations, with the following additions thereto:—

*Additional Covenants, &c., to General Form of Indentures of Apprenticeship.**EMPLOYER'S COVENANTS.*

(1) After clause (f), the following additional clauses shall be inserted:—

"(g) Not require the apprentice, while under the age of eighteen years, to work overtime or shift work unless he so desires.

(h) Not require or allow the apprentice to work overtime or shift work at times which would prevent his attendance at classes for instruction in the subjects of his apprenticeship course, as required by the General Apprenticeship Regulations.

(i) Provide the apprentice with all tools necessary for carrying out his work, including verniers and micrometers, but excluding all other measuring and precision tools of less than 15 inches."

APPRENTICE'S AND PARENT OR GUARDIAN'S COVENANTS.

(2) After clause (c), the following additional clause shall be inserted:—

"(d) Replace any of the tools supplied for his use, as hereinbefore provided, if they should be lost or broken through his own carelessness."

MUTUAL AGREEMENTS.

(3) In clause 6, the following additional proviso shall be inserted:—

"Provided further, that in calculating time lost to be served, the apprentice shall be credited with any overtime which he has worked in any week during the relevant year."

Minimum Rates of Wages of Apprentices.

8. The minimum weekly rates of wages to be paid to apprentices in the said trades shall be the under-mentioned percentages of the adult male basic wage prescribed from time to time in the Metal Trades Award or in the determination of the Engineers' and Brassworkers' (Skilled) Wages Board, whichever is applicable:—

(1) In a term of apprenticeship of five years:—

Year of Apprenticeship.	Percentage of Adult Male Basic Wage.
1st	39
2nd	50
3rd	58½
4th	89
5th	100 + 22s.

(2) In a term of apprenticeship of four years:—

Year of Apprenticeship.	Percentage of Adult Male Basic Wage.
1st	41
2nd	58½
3rd	89
4th	100 + 22s.

The total wages of apprentices shall be calculated to the nearest 6d., half or less than half of 6d. to be disregarded.

Rates for Overtime and Shift Work.

9. When an apprentice works under conditions for which, or at any time when, a journeyman employed at the aforesaid trades would be entitled to overtime or special rates for doing work under the same conditions or at the same time, then such apprentice shall be paid by the employer for any such work at a rate or rates of wages which shall bear the same proportion to the prescribed minimum rate of wages of such apprentice as the wages of such journeyman for such work would bear to the prescribed minimum rate of wages of such journeyman. Provided, however, that an apprentice shall be paid for overtime worked at a rate not less than 2s. 3d. per hour and for shift work at a rate not less than 1s. 6d. per hour.

Proportion of Apprentices to Journeymen.

10. (1) Subject to sub-regulation (2) of this Regulation, the number of apprentices who may be employed by any employer at any time in the said trades shall not exceed the proportion of one apprentice to every three or fraction of three journeymen employed by such employer in such trades.

(2) With the consent of the Commission and upon satisfying the Commission that he has the training facilities deemed adequate by the Commission for the training of each apprentice concerned, an employer may employ in the said trades such number of apprentices as the Commission may determine in excess of the proportion prescribed by sub-regulation (1) hereof. Any apprentice employed pursuant to this sub-regulation shall not be included for the purpose of ascertaining the number of apprentices who may otherwise be employed, in accordance with the provisions of sub-regulation (1) hereof.

(3) For the purposes of this Regulation—

(a) an employer working at the trades shall be deemed to be a journeyman;

(b) the number of journeymen employed at any time shall be deemed to be the average per working day of the number of journeymen employed in the said trades by such employer during the period of six months immediately preceding such time;

(c) "apprentices" means apprentices or probationers.

Trade Experience to be Given to an Apprentice.

11. The employer shall, by the best means in his power and to the extent to which his facilities permit, give or cause to be given to the apprentice gradual and complete instruction to the satisfaction of the Commission, in the following processes:—

The design and development and/or the theory and practice of maintenance of scientific and industrial instruments, and associated devices, where such involves testing, repairing, or calibrating.

Classes for Instruction.

12. The classes for instruction in the subjects of the apprenticeship course for the said trades shall be as set out in the Second Schedule hereto, but any apprentice or probationer who has the necessary qualifications may, subject to the approval of the Commission, be permitted to enter the classes prescribed for any year of the said course.

Standard of Education to be Attained by an Apprentice.

13. The standard of education to be attained by an apprentice—

- (1) in the subjects of the first, second, or third year of his apprenticeship course in order that he may qualify to proceed to the classes for instruction prescribed for the next succeeding year; and
- (2) in the subjects of the final year of his apprenticeship course in order that he may qualify in respect to education for the "final certificate" of the Commission—

shall be not less than 50 per cent. of the possible marks allotted at the annual examinations approved by the Commission in each of the subjects prescribed for such year of the said course or such average percentage of marks in all of the said subjects as is deemed by the Commission to be equivalent thereto.

Standard of Proficiency.

14. Should the apprentice in any year pass at the first attempt in each of the subjects prescribed for that year of his apprenticeship course and attain a standard as certified by the Commission of not less than an average of 75 per cent. of the possible marks allotted at the annual examinations approved by the Commission to the subjects of Trade Theory and Trade Practice prescribed for that year of such course, he shall be deemed to have attained the standard or proficiency for such year.

Increased Rates of Pay for Proficiency.

15. When an apprentice attains in any year the standard of proficiency prescribed for that year of his apprenticeship course, he shall—

- (1) for the first occasion on which he attains such standard be paid for the next succeeding year the sum of 4s. 0d. per week, in addition to the prescribed minimum weekly wage;
- (2) for the second occasion on which he attains such standard be paid for the next succeeding year the sum of 5s. 0d. per week, in addition to the prescribed minimum weekly wage;
- (3) for the third occasion on which he attains such standard be paid for the next succeeding year the sum of 6s. 0d. per week, in addition to the prescribed minimum weekly wage;
- (4) for the fourth occasion on which he attains such standard be paid for the next succeeding year the sum of 6s. 0d. per week, in addition to the prescribed minimum weekly wage.

Payment of School Fees.

16. (1) The school fees of apprentices for attendance at the prescribed classes for instruction shall be paid by such apprentices, but on receipt by the employer of a report from the Commission that any such apprentice has secured during the period covered by the report a record of not less than 100 per cent. of the possible attendances at the prescribed day classes and not less than 80 per cent. of the prescribed evening classes, the employer shall refund to the apprentice the school fees paid by him for such period of instruction. Provided, however, that if such report states that the apprentice has, in the opinion of the Commission, failed to be diligent, or has behaved in an indecorous manner while in attendance at the prescribed classes for instruction during such period, the employer shall not be required to make the refund as aforesaid.

(2) In cases where the apprentice is prevented from attendance at the said classes through illness or accident, or for other reasons accepted by the Commission, such occasions shall not be included as possible attendances in determining the aforesaid percentages; provided that the employer may require the apprentice to produce a medical certificate as proof of such illness or accident and in that case, if the apprentice fails to produce such certificate, such occasions shall be included as possible attendances in determining the aforesaid percentages.

(3) For the purposes of this Regulation, "apprentices" means apprentices or probationers.

SHIRE OF DANDENONG.

BY-LAW No. 7.

A By-law of the Shire of Dandenong, made under section 197 of the Local Government Acts, and numbered 7, for the purposes of prohibiting, regulating, and controlling excavating operations.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the Local Government Acts, the President, Councillors, and Ratepayers of the Shire of Dandenong order as follows:—

1. By-law No. 85 of the Shire of Springvale and Noble Park so far as it relates to the Shire of Dandenong is hereby repealed.

2. No person shall upon any land situate within the municipal district of the Shire of Dandenong commence or carry on any excavating operations for the removal of rock, stone, gravel, clay, soil or sand from such land unless such person is the holder of and except within the limits of a current permit so to do issued to him by the Council of the Shire of Dandenong prescribing—

- (a) the area to which the permit relates;
- (b) the duration of the permit; and
- (c) the depth above sea level to which excavating operations may be carried on upon the area described in the permit (such depth to be ascertained by reference to and on the basis of the levels shown on contour survey plans published by the Melbourne and Metropolitan Board of Works or the State Rivers and Water Supply Commission in respect of their respective areas).

3. Every person to whom any permit may be issued by the Council to commence or carry on excavating operations shall within three months after the expiration of such permit (unless in the meantime a new permit shall have been issued to him in respect of the same area) fill

in the area excavated under such permit with such material and to such level as the Council by its Municipal Clerk or Engineer may prescribe by notice in writing given to the holder of such permit within one calendar month after the expiration thereof.

4. The Council may before issuing any permit to commence and carry on excavating operations require the person applying for the permit to enter into such bond or deposit or give such security as it may think sufficient to secure compliance with the requirements of paragraph 3 hereof.

5. No excavating operations shall be carried on within a distance of 50 feet from any street or road or any land set out or reserved as a street or road on any plan of subdivision lodged in the Office of Titles or any land which is in fact used as a street, road, lane, or passage, or within a distance of 30 feet from any land the ownership or occupation whereof is in some person other than the owner of the land on which such excavating operations are being carried on.

6. Every person carrying on excavating operations (hereinafter called the excavator) shall observe the following rules as to such operations:—

(a) If such excavating operations are carried on by manual power the excavator shall carry on the same using either one of the following methods:—

- (i) the wall or face of such excavation may be terraced, but the vertical wall or face of each step in such terrace shall not be more than 6 feet in height and the horizontal face of every terrace other than the step at the floor of such excavation shall be of not less width than one-half of the height of the vertical wall or face immediately above it; or
- (ii) the banks or sides of all such excavations shall be sloped down so that the batter of such banks or sides shall be maintained at a slope ratio of one horizontal to one vertical.

(b) If such excavations shall be carried on by means of a hydraulic nozzle or power shovel or similar method then the excavator may work with a vertical wall or face, subject to the following conditions:—

- (i) The excavator shall not permit any person whether employee or otherwise to be within a distance of 10 feet from such wall or face; and
- (ii) the excavator shall not allow any overhang to exist in such wall or face;
- (iii) every excavator working upon a vertical wall or face of a greater depth than 6 feet shall erect a fence of not less than 4 feet in height either upon the boundary line of the land occupied by the excavator or in such position in relation to the brink of such wall or face as will protect persons on ground level from falling into the pit worked by the excavator. Such fence shall be of substantial construction and may be of posts and rails or of posts not less than 22 feet apart with two droppers equally spaced between posts and of not less than three strands of wire (two of barb and one of eight-gauge plain). The top wire shall be barbed and shall be not more than 6 inches from the top of each post. The bottom wire shall be not more than 15 inches above ground level and the intermediate wire shall be equidistant from the top and bottom wires. The bottom wire may be barbed or plain—according to the option of the excavator;
- (iv) a wall or face which is not sloped down so that the batter of the banks or sides of the excavations shall be maintained at a slope ratio of one horizontal to one vertical shall be deemed a "vertical wall or face."

7. Every person carrying on excavating operations and using any mechanical or hydraulic power for such operations shall within fourteen days from the publication of this By-law in the *Government Gazette* notify the Council in writing of the place where such power is used or intended to be used, and in such notice shall furnish the Council with full information of the type and nature of such power.

8. Every person carrying on excavating operations and whether using manual power or mechanical or hydraulic power and whether working upon a vertical or a sloped or a terraced face shall work or carry on all such excavations in such a manner that when any part of any excavation made by him is at ground surface level 50 feet from a street or road or 30 feet from land not in the ownership or occupation of such person (which are the limits provided in clause 5 hereof) the banks or sides of such excavations and of all parts of such excavations shall be sloped down so that a slope or batter of one horizontal to one vertical is maintained.

9. Any person guilty or any wilful breach of any of the provisions of this By-law shall be liable for every such breach to a penalty of not less than Five pounds nor more than Twenty pounds, and if such offence be a continuing offence to a further penalty of not more than Five pounds per day for each day on which such offence is continued after a conviction or order by a court.

Carrying on excavating operations without a permit or otherwise than in accordance with the limits of a permit (where a permit is required) shall be deemed a continuing offence.

10. Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore contained this By-law shall not apply to any land on which any excavating operations were commenced before the 10th day of November, 1938, and have since that date continued without substantial interruption nor to any other land on which excavating operations were carried on at the commencement of the *Local Government (Amendment) Act 1954*, unless the Minister in writing approves of the application of this By-law to such other land.

11. In this By-law "excavating operations" means excavating operations other than quarrying or blasting operations.

12. This By-law shall apply to and have operation throughout the whole of the municipal district of the Shire of Dandenong.

4. The slaughtering of animals on Sundays, Saturdays, or Public Holidays is prohibited except with the written consent of the Meat Inspector and upon payment of the fee prescribed in clause 7 hereof.
5. The times of inspection shall be as appointed by the Meat Inspector between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m.
6. The fees which shall be demanded and paid to the Council shall be as follows:—

"Bobby-calf" means a calf not more than six weeks old.

7. Where consent of the Meat Inspector is given to slaughtering on any Sunday, Saturday, or Public Holiday a fee of £1 shall be payable in addition to any fees payable under the preceding clause.

8. Any person who commits a breach of this By-law shall be liable to a penalty of not more than £20, and in the case of a continuing offence to a further daily penalty of not more than £5.

9. By-law No. 16 is hereby repealed.

A junior employee of eighteen years or more shall be paid 3s. per week in addition to the rates prescribed herein while he is employed as a furnaceman or assistant to a furnaceman.

The total wage shall be calculated to the nearest sixpence, any broken part of sixpence in the result not exceeding threepence to be disregarded.

(b) Except in the case of employees in foundries, the minimum rate payable to a junior female of any age or a junior male of eighteen years or more each with less than six months' experience under this Determination shall, until he or she has had six months' experience, be 10 per cent. less than the amount represented by the percentage of the basic wage hereby prescribed for a junior employee of his or her age and in addition thereto the additional amount prescribed for such an employee.

(c) Junior employees employed on the following machines or operations shall be paid at not less than the appropriate adult minimum rates:—

- (i) Angle-iron cropping where the material weighs more than 3½ lb. per foot and is not clamped.
- (ii) Assisting steel furnace ladleman other than in darning or repairing ladles.
- (iii) Assisting storeman racking and/or loading and/or unloading off vehicles of heavy steel plates, bars or sections.
- (iv) Breaking up pig iron.
- (v) Carrying material to or from cupola forge or electric steel furnace or using the slicer or hanging on to end of a bloom. This shall not apply in the case of junior moulders.
- (vi) Cutting out and punching rivets on plates.
- (vii) Cutting plates by means of hammer and cold set.
- (viii) Holding up rivets over ¼ in. diameter.
- (ix) Plate edge planers in structural steel or shipbuilding yards where the operator travels on the machine.
- (x) Punching machines handling plates weighing more than 84 lb.
- (xi) Shearing machines other than guillotine plate shearers, handling plates weighing more than 84 lb.

(d) Junior employees shall not be employed:—

- (i) if under the age of 16 years—
 - on oil or gas burners or fires used for heating of small articles; or

(ii) The term to be served at the industry by female apprentices or improvers shall be not more than four years.

(b) **PROPORTION (IN ANY FACTORY OR PLACE).
Apprentices or Improvers.**

- (i) Not more than one male apprentice or improver shall be employed in any section to every journeyman tailor therein employed.
- (ii) Not more than one male apprentice or improver shall be employed pressing to every four or fraction of four journeymen in Group A.
- (iii) Not more than one male apprentice or improver shall be employed on any section (other than the sections set out in sub-clauses (i) and (ii) hereof) of Group A to every three or fraction of three journeymen in the same section.
- (iv) Not more than one male apprentice or improver shall be employed to every two or fraction of two journeymen in all groups of the industry other than those set out in sub-clauses (i), (ii), and (iii) hereof.
- (v) Not more than one female apprentice or improver shall be employed in any section to every journeywoman in the same section of Group A.
- (vi) Not more than three female apprentices or improvers shall be employed in all groups other than those set out in sub-clause (v) hereof to every journeywoman.
- (vii) For the purpose of all clauses relating to apprentices and improvers, each class of employee as set out in the weekly wage schedules to this Determination shall be taken separately, and each such class shall be deemed to be a distinct section.

Prohibition of Employment of Males over Seventeen Years Entering any Section of the Industry.

(c) No male (other than one to be employed at order cutting) who is over the age of seventeen years shall enter any section of the industry for which provision is made in this Determination for compulsory apprenticeship according to the Schedule referred to in the indenture of apprenticeship prescribed by this Determination.

Female Improvers over Eighteen Years of Age may be Employed.

(d) Any female without previous experience who has attained the age of eighteen years may be employed in any section of the industry as an improver, and shall be paid at least the minimum rate prescribed by this Determination for a female of her experience.

Persons Eligible for Apprenticeship.

(e) All apprentices shall be indentured in accordance with the form of indenture prescribed by the Board on the 23rd May, 1950, provided that the said person may serve an employer as a probationer for a period not exceeding three months. During the said three months, he or she shall be paid at least the minimum rates prescribed by this Determination for the first six months of apprenticeship. If the probationer becomes indentured, his or her indentures shall be taken to have commenced from the commencement of the period of probation.

Indenture Completed.

(f) It shall be the duty of the employer to see that the form of indenture of any apprentice is duly completed and to deliver to the apprentice a complete original copy thereof.

Completion of Apprenticeship.

(g) In the event of the employer to whom an apprentice is bound ceasing to carry on business, such apprentice may be bound to another employer for the remainder of the term to be served, provided that if such apprentice be over the age of seventeen years at the time of the original employer ceasing to carry on business, such apprentice may complete the time to be served as an improver.

Apprentices in any Group of the Industry already Bound.

(h) Within three months of the commencement of this Determination every employer shall, in respect of male or female apprentices already indentured, be bound to observe the full terms of the indentures prescribed by this Determination as to the term of apprenticeship, hours, wages, overtime, and all other conditions. Where the existing indentures are inconsistent with indentures herein prescribed, the existing indentures shall be deemed to be amended accordingly.

Time Served in any Group to Count.

(i) (i) Notwithstanding anything contained in this Determination the time served by an apprentice or improver in any occupation for which a classification is prescribed by this Determination in any group of this Determination shall be counted as experience for the purpose of apprenticeship indentures or the continuance of improvership, both as regards wages and the term to be served in respect of the continuation of the employment of such apprentice or improver in the occupation covered by such classification.

(ii) Notwithstanding anything contained in this Determination, any person who, at the date of the coming into force of this Determination, is employed in the industry and whose engagement or continued employment as an improver is by this Determination forbidden shall be entitled to be employed and shall be paid the scale of wages prescribed for an apprentice or improver of like experience.

Prohibition of Employment of New Male and Female Improvers in Group A.

- (j) After the commencement of this Determination no male or female in Group A shall—
 - (i) be engaged to work as an improver in any such section of the industry; or
 - (ii) be transferred from one section to another such section to work there as an improver; or
