Labour and Industry Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE KNITTING TRADE BOARD.

NOTES.—(a) This Determination applies to the whole of the State of Victoria.

(b) Work on Sunday, except in certain prescribed circumstances, is prohibited by Section 76 of the *Labour and Industry Act, 1953*.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Labour and Industry Acts, the Wages Board which now has the power "to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons, or classes of persons, employed in the process, trade, or business of—

- (i) knitting or crocheting fabric, or any article of human wear;
- (ii) mending or repairing any knitted or crocheted fabric, or any knitted or crocheted article of human wear;
- (iii) spinning or preparing silk yarn;
- (iv) the printing of jersey piece goods or the like knitting materials"—

has made the following Determination, namely:—

1. That on the 1st June, 1957, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

NOTE.—The rates prescribed in this Determination are based upon a basic wage of £13 3s. for males and £9 17s. for females.

(b) The total wage shall be calculated to the nearest sixpence, any fraction of sixpence in the result not exceeding threepence to be disregarded.

(c) Changes in rates shall be effective from the beginning of the first pay period to commence after the attainment of the prescribed age.

(d) Notwithstanding anything elsewhere in this clause contained, a junior female, after four years' experience in the industry covered by this Determination, shall be paid the rates prescribed for an adult female in the classification in which she is employed.

Proportion of Juniors.

(e) In any factory the proportion of juniors shall not exceed two to each employee receiving not less than the minimum adult rate. In determining the proportion of juniors to employees receiving the adult rate, each shift shall be taken into account separately. Provided that, in the full-fashioned department of the knitting section, the proportion of females shall be one junior female to each female receiving the adult wage, and the proportion of males shall be two junior males to each three males receiving the adult wage. Provided also that, in computing the proportion of juniors in the full-fashioned department of the knitting section, employees in the throwing department shall not be counted and the count for the remainder of the full-fashioned department shall be taken over all the shifts.

ADDITIONAL PAYMENTS.

4. (a) An employee who is employed as first-aid man or woman and who holds a first-aid certificate shall be paid 10s. per week extra.

(b) Employers shall provide proper facilities for the protection of employees engaged in loading and unloading soda ash from delivery vehicles by hand; in the event of such facilities not being so provided, the employer shall pay each employee whilst so engaged the sum of 1s. per hour extra.

(c) Employees engaged in dye-houses, operators of machines in wet-finishing departments, and employees on liquor tanks in bleaching department shall be paid an additional allowance at the rate of 5s. per week.

PAYMENT OF WAGES.

5. (a) Wages shall be paid weekly not later than Friday.
- (b) Wages shall be paid during working hours; shift workers finishing work on Friday mornings shall be paid their wages before ceasing work; any employee kept waiting for his or her wages beyond the ordinary working hours shall be paid at overtime rates for such waiting time.
- (c) Where the services of an employee are dispensed with wages shall be paid to him on the day of dismissal or forwarded to him by post on the day following.
- (d) Not more than two days' pay of each employee shall be kept in hand by an employer.

DEDUCTIONS FROM WAGES.

6. No deductions shall be made from the wages of any employee for any purpose except with the written consent of the employee or by reason of statutory compulsion or any order of a Court.

PAYMENT BY RESULTS SYSTEM.

Piecework.

7. (a) Any employer may fix piecework rates for any process: Provided such rates enable adult employees of average capacity to earn at least the minimum weekly rate prescribed for their respective classes with the addition of 15 per cent. A schedule of such piecework rates shall be posted in the mill or factory.
- (b) Piecework rates now paid may be re-adjusted by employers to meet new circumstances created by this Determination before the expiry of six months from the date on which this Determination comes into force, but thereafter such rates shall not be altered except by mutual agreement between the employer and pieceworkers concerned.
- (c) Effect shall be given in piecework earnings to alterations of the male basic wage and the female basic wage made in accordance with the provisions of clauses 29 and 30 of this Determination. For that purpose, an employer may alter his piecework rates in accordance with paragraph (b) hereof or he may observe the following provisions:—
- At the end of each working week the aggregate earnings of each pieceworker for such week shall be ascertained, and, where such pieceworker has worked on each and every day ordinarily worked in such week, such aggregate earnings shall be increased or decreased—
- (i) in the case of males, by the sum by which the male basic wage has been increased or decreased in accordance with the provisions of clause 30 of this Determination; and
- (ii) in the case of females, by the sum by which the female basic wage has been increased or decreased in accordance with the provisions of clause 29 of this Determination;
- but, where the pieceworker has not worked on each and every day ordinarily worked in such week, then the aggregate earnings shall be increased or decreased by a part of such sum proportionate to the number of days worked, calculated to the nearest penny.
- (d) Where an employee has worked part of the week on piecework, he or she shall be entitled to his or her earnings in full for the actual time worked on piecework if the earnings are higher than the minimum rate for such time.
- (e) Adults and juniors doing the same operations shall be paid the same piecework rates.
- (f) As far as practicable, different grades of work shall be equitably divided between pieceworkers.
- (g) A pieceworker who also instructs learners shall receive 15s. per week in addition to piecework earnings for the first week, 12s. 6d. for the second week, and 10s. for the third week, but, at the end of the third week, shall not be called upon to continue instructing a learner unless paid 10s. per week in addition to his piecework earnings.
- (h) A pieceworker (adult or junior) called upon to perform work before the usual starting time or after the usual finishing time on any day Monday to Saturday (inclusive) shall be paid in addition to his or her normal piecework rate—
- (i) for the first three hours on any one of such days—at a rate per hour equivalent to $\frac{1}{80}$ th of the weekly rate prescribed for an adult employee of the same sex employed on the same work; and
- (ii) for any overtime extending beyond such three hours—at a rate per hour equivalent to $\frac{1}{40}$ th of the weekly rate prescribed for an adult employee of the same sex employed on the same work.
- Youths under eighteen years of age and females who work overtime extending over ten hours in any week shall, for any overtime beyond such ten hours, be paid the rate prescribed by paragraph (ii) hereof.
- (i) Pieceworkers on the employer's premises at the employer's request ready and willing to work shall, for each pay period, receive at least the time rate prescribed for their occupations.

Bonus Payments.

- (j) In all establishments in which tasks are set and employees are paid for extra production, the tasks shall be so set as to permit adults of average capacity and juniors of average capacity over the age of seventeen years to earn at least 15 per cent. above the respective rates prescribed by this Determination, and so as to permit juniors of average capacity in the age group under sixteen years and up to seventeen years inclusive to earn at least 20 per cent. in addition to the respective rates prescribed by this Determination.
- (k) Adjustments and/or alterations of the bases of bonus rates shall be subject to mutual agreement between the employer and the bonus workers concerned.

MIXED FUNCTIONS.

8. An employee engaged for more than half of one day or shift on duties carrying a higher rate than his or her classification shall be paid the higher rate for such day or shift. If for less than one half of one day or shift, he or she shall be paid the higher rate for the time so worked.

HOURS.

9. Forty hours shall constitute a week's work. Such hours are to be worked by day workers in five days, Monday to Friday inclusive (but this shall not apply to oilers and/or cleaners or men engaged on maintenance work) and by shift workers in accordance with clause 11 hereof.

OVERTIME.

10. (a) Overtime shall be paid for work performed before the usual starting time or after the usual finishing time of each shift at time and a half for the first three hours on any one day Monday to Saturday (inclusive) and double time thereafter.
- (b) The usual starting and/or finishing time in any factory or part thereof shall not be altered except on seven days' notice to the appropriate shop steward.
- (c) Employees required to work overtime for more than two hours without being notified on the previous working day or earlier that they will be required to work shall either be supplied with a meal by the employer or paid 5s. each. When the employee so requests such payment shall be made before the overtime is worked. If the notice is given and overtime is not worked (except as a result of a breakdown in machinery or plant) the tea money prescribed herein shall be paid.

(d) Juniors under eighteen years of age for each period of overtime worked shall be paid 6d. up to two hours and 3d. for each additional hour or part of an hour in addition to their overtime earnings, and any tea money to which they might be entitled. Provided that the said sums of 6d. and 3d. shall not be payable to pieceworkers working overtime.

(e) Youths under eighteen years of age and females required to work overtime shall be paid overtime at the rate of time and a half to a maximum of three hours in any one day Monday to Saturday inclusive, and ten hours in one week, and double time thereafter.

Compulsory Overtime.

(f) An employer may require any employee to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates, and such employee shall work overtime in accordance with such requirement.

SHIFTS.

11. Shifts as hereunder set forth may be worked in the industry:—

(a) A day shift (except those provided for in sub-clause (c) hereof) shall be worked between the hours of 7 a.m. and 6 p.m. Monday to Friday, inclusive, and between the hours of 7 a.m. and 12 noon on Saturday.

(b) By mutual arrangement between employer and his employees, the hours of duty proscribed herein for night-shift workers may be worked in four shifts.

Under any such arrangement, all hours of duty beyond nine hours, even if they come within the starting and finishing time of a shift, shall be paid for at overtime rates.

(c) Subject to the provisions hereafter appearing, females shall be prohibited from working between the hours of 9 p.m. and 7 a.m.

Male juniors under eighteen years of age are prohibited from working after 9 p.m.

Female employees and male juniors under eighteen years may be required to work between the hours of 6 a.m. and 9 p.m. subject to the following conditions:—

(i) Payment at the rate of 3s. 6d. per shift extra shall be paid for each shift other than day shift.

(ii) Time and a half shall be paid for all work performed between 6 a.m. and 7 a.m.

(iii) Time and a half shall be paid for all time worked after noon on Saturday.

(iv) No employee under the age of sixteen years shall be employed before 7 a.m.

(v) (1) No short shift for females under these provisions shall be substituted for any existing afternoon or night shift carried on by male labour.

(2) Where two shifts of females are employed by virtue of these provisions as well as a night shift of males, at least one shift of females shall be dispensed with, if and when it is desired to work only two shifts.

(d) Male employees engaged on shifts other than day shift, shall be paid at the rate of 22s. 6d. per week in addition to the ordinary rates payable to day workers, irrespective of whether such shift is regarded as intermediate, afternoon, or night shift, whether permanent or rotating.

Provided that employees engaged on a permanent night shift shall be paid at the rate of 30s. per week in addition to the ordinary rates payable to day workers.

(e) Short shifts of male employees over eighteen years of age may be worked at the discretion of the employer. For work done on such shifts (other than work done between noon on Saturday and midnight on Sunday) payment shall be made at the rate of 22s. 6d. per week of 40 hours, in addition to the rates payable to day-shift workers.

(f) As far as practicable, employees shall work shifts in rotation.

(g) Subject to the provisions of sub-clause (e) hereof, all work done by a shift worker on Saturday afternoon, time and a half shall be paid until 5 p.m. and double time thereafter. All time worked by a shift worker between midnight on Sunday and 7 a.m. on Monday shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first three hours and double time thereafter.

(h) An employee who is required to change from one shift to another without two days' notice of such change of shifts shall be paid 10s. extra as compensation, but this shall not apply during day periods when power restrictions are in operation.

(i) Shift workers may be required to work until the completion of their shifts on holidays without the payment of holiday rates; provided they are not required to work on the night shift commencing on a holiday.

Where a holiday prescribed by this Determination is observed on a Monday, shift workers may be given time off on the shift commencing on the Sunday night preceding a holiday and, in such event shall be required to work on the usual night shift commencing on the holiday, without additional pay:

Provided that where an employee works two complete shifts on a holiday, both shifts shall be paid for as holiday shifts.

(j) Except for the regular change-over of shifts, no employee shall be required to change from one shift to another without a break of at least twelve hours.

Definitions.

(k) "Day shift" shall mean a shift worked between the hours of 7 a.m. and 6 p.m.

"Afternoon or intermediate shift" shall mean a shift finishing after 6 p.m. but not later than 12 o'clock midnight.

"Night shift" shall mean a shift the finishing time of which shall be after midnight but not later than 8 a.m.

TERMS OF ENGAGEMENT.

Contract of Employment.

12. (a) Employment in the industry covered by this Determination shall be by the week, except in the case of part-time workers.

(b) An employee to become entitled to payment under this Determination shall be ready, willing and available for work at the times and during the hours usually worked by him. Provided that any worker starting work shall be entitled to at least half a day's pay and any pieceworker to half a day's work.

Termination of Employment.

(c) Employment shall be terminated by a week's notice on either side given at any time during the working week, or by the payment or forfeiture of a week's wages, as the case may be.

(d) Notwithstanding anything elsewhere contained in this clause, the employer shall have the right to dismiss an employee without notice for inefficiency, neglect of duty, malingering, or misconduct, in which case wages shall be paid up to the time of dismissal only, or to deduct payment for any time the employee cannot be usefully employed because of any strike or through any breakdown of machinery or any stoppage of work by any cause for which the employer cannot reasonably be held responsible, or for a stand down of employees at any time when no work is offering. Provided that, when a weekly employee has been given notice of termination, he shall not be stood down when no work is offering.

Subject to the continuance of existing practices in the weaving section of the industry, any worker starting work shall be entitled to at least half a day's pay and any pieceworker to half a day's work.

Power Stoppages.

(e) In the case of any power stoppage, any employee required to attend for work in accordance with this clause and does so attend shall be paid as for at least two hours' work at time rates, and provided that payment shall be made at time rates to an employee who is kept on the employer's premises at the direction of the management in excess of two hours.

Termination of Employment prior to a Holiday.

(f) Where the employer terminates the employment of an employee within two weeks prior to a day on which a holiday occurs, and such employee is re-engaged within a period of two weeks after such holiday or holidays, the employee shall be paid for such holiday or holidays prescribed by this Determination; provided that such employee has been employed by the employer for a period of at least two weeks prior to the termination of employment.

Part-time Employment.

(g) A part-time employee is one engaged as such. Such an employee for working ordinary time shall be paid per hour one-fortieth of the weekly rate prescribed by this Determination for work which he or she performs.

MEAL HOURS.

13. (a) A meal interval of not less than 45 minutes and not more than one hour shall be allowed each day: Provided that, by mutual arrangement between the employees and the employer, a shorter meal time may be fixed, in which case it shall not be less than 30 minutes.

(b) Time and a half rates shall be paid to any employee required to work during his meal hour. No employee shall be compelled to work more than five hours without a break for a meal. Provided, however, that, where two or three shifts are worked and it is mutually arranged, there shall be no break for meals, but employees may take their meals in the employer's time as opportunity offers.

(c) An employee engaged in the maintenance of plant shall, when breakdowns occur, work meal hours at the ordinary rates herein prescribed whenever instructed so to do.

(d) Each employee shall have a meal interval fixed and, having been fixed, it shall not be altered except by mutual agreement.

HOLIDAYS AND SUNDAY WORK.

14. (a) Subject to the limitations mentioned hereinafter, employees shall be entitled to the following public holidays without deduction of pay:—New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday (in establishments working a six-day week), Easter Monday, Labour Day, Queen's Birthday, Anzac Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day or any other day observed in lieu thereof, or observed by local custom and substituted for one of the days hereinbefore mentioned. In the metropolitan district of Melbourne, Melbourne Cup Day shall be substituted for Queen's Birthday.

(b) Pieceworkers shall be paid for such holidays even though not worked at the ordinary rates payable to employees on time work doing the same class of work.

(c) Where an employee is absent from his or her employment on the working day or part of the working day before or after a holiday without reasonable excuse or without the employer's consent, the employee shall not be entitled to payment for such holiday.

(d) When an employee is absent through illness or other reasonable cause from his or her employment for a period exceeding fourteen days, the employee shall not be entitled to payment for any holidays occurring during such period of absence:

Provided that, where an employer consents to an employee having leave beyond fourteen days above-mentioned, payment shall be made for such holiday or holidays occurring in the period of absence.

(e) Production work in any factory is prohibited on Sundays unless in extraordinary circumstances.

(f) All work done by time workers on the holidays prescribed in sub-clause (a) hereof and all work done by time workers on Sundays shall be paid for at the rate of ordinary time in addition to the ordinary rate; all such work done by pieceworkers shall be paid for at the ordinary rate payable to employees on time work doing the same class of work in addition to such piecework earnings.

(g) All employees engaged on repairs or renewals of the employer's plant or machinery necessary for the resumption of work the next following working day, or for maintaining the continuity of electric light and power (not including the installation of new machinery) shall, if worked on holidays and Sundays, be paid at the rate of time and a half.

(h) Part-time employees shall, in respect of public holidays, be paid only at the rate actually being received by them at such time.

SICK LEAVE.

15. (a) An employee who is absent from work on account of personal illness or on account of injury by accident arising out of and in the course of his employment, shall be entitled to leave of absence, without deduction of pay, subject to the following conditions and limitations:—

(i) He shall not be entitled to paid leave of absence unless he has been in the service of the employer concerned for at least three months immediately prior to such absence.

(ii) He shall not be entitled to paid leave of absence for any period in respect of which he is entitled to workers' compensation.

(iii) He shall, within 24 hours of the commencement of such absence, inform the employer of his inability to attend for duty and, as far as practicable, state the nature of the injury or illness and the estimated duration of the absence.

(iv) He shall prove to the satisfaction of the employer that he was unable on account of such illness or injury to attend for duty on the day or days for which sick leave is claimed. For such purpose the employer may require an employee to make a statutory declaration verifying the cause of his absence.

(v) He shall not be entitled in any year (whether in the employ of one employer or of several) to leave in excess of 40 hours of working time nor to payment in excess of 40 hours at ordinary rates nor in the case of an employee working short shift, payment in excess of a week's wages for such shift.

For the purpose of administering paragraph (v) hereof an employer may within one month of this Determination coming into operation or within two weeks of the employee entering his employment, require an employee to make a sworn declaration or other written statement as to what paid leave of absence he has had from any employer during the then current year; and upon such statement the employer shall be entitled to rely and act.

(b) A pieceworker entitled to paid leave of absence under this clause shall be paid at the time-work rate applicable to his classification.

(c) For the purpose of this clause, a year shall be deemed to be from the 1st day of January, to the 31st day of December, inclusive.

(d) Part-time employees shall, in respect of sick leave, be paid only at the rate actually being received by them at such time.

Cumulative Sick Leave.

(e) Sick leave allowable under this clause to an employee which is not availed of during the year in which it accrues shall, whilst an employee is employed by the same employer, be allowed to accumulate. Provided that sick leave which accumulates pursuant to this sub-clause shall be available to the employee for a period of two years, but no longer from the end of the year in which it accrues.

ANNUAL LEAVE.

16. The annual holiday shall be as prescribed by the provisions of the Labour and Industry Acts.

LIMITATIONS.

17. (a) Where practicable each machine must be stopped when being cleaned, the cleaning to be done in his or her working hours by the employee whose duty it is to do so.

(b) No female shall be required to lift or carry any article or goods weighing more than 30 lb. without one assistant for every 30 lb. weight.

(c) No female shall be employed operating a manual screw-press other than those now employed and the margin now paid to females for such work shall be continued.

(d) No female shall be required to use an iron weighing more than 8 lb.

(e) No male employee under eighteen years of age shall be permitted to operate the rotary hydros in the finishing department.

(f) (i) On all full-fashioned multiple head machines of 18 heads or more, one male operator receiving not less than the male operator's rate shall be employed.

(ii) On all full-fashioned machines having less than 18 heads, or on groups of such machines not exceeding a total of 24 heads, one male operator receiving not less than the male operator's rate shall be employed in accordance with the following scale of experience in relation to number of heads:—

An operator having less than three months' experience	Up to 16 heads.
An operator having three months' but less than twelve months' experience	20 heads.
An operator having not less than twelve months' experience	24 heads.

(g) An employer shall not require or permit any female employee to work after 6 p.m. on any day unless one other person is in close association with her or another person is on the premises within ready call.

(h) An employer shall not require or permit a male employee to work after 6 p.m. on any day or on a night shift in connexion with power driven machinery unless he works in close association with one other person or another person is on the premises within ready call.

(i) Whilst existing practices continue no female shall be employed upon the work under male classification "Pleating machine operator".

GENERAL.

Hot Water.

18. (a) Employees shall be provided with hot water free of charge.

Seats for Female Employees.

(b) When requested by employees, and where practicable, suitable seats shall be provided by the employer for female employees in positions handy to their work.

Rest Room.

(c) In factories where ten or more female employees are employed a properly ventilated rest room shall be provided by the employer for the use of such female employees. It shall contain a suitable couch, stretcher, two easy chairs, and a rubber hot-water bag.

Dining Room.

(d) Proper dining-room accommodation shall be provided by the employer for the use of the employees.

First Aid.

(e) In each mill or establishment the employer shall provide a properly equipped first-aid chest at a place or places reasonably accessible to all employees. Such chest shall, as to its contents, comply with any State Acts or Regulations in force from time to time. Such chest shall be in charge of a responsible person nominated by the employer, preferably a first-aid attendant.

Clothing.

(f) When requested by the Union representative, the employer shall provide employees working in the dye house, bleach house, and yarn-dyeing departments with suitable protective clothing, such as gloves and top boots or clogs and (when working with acids or employed on acid tanks) aprons. Employees shall take reasonable care of clothing so provided.

Cleaning Materials.

(g) All materials and appliances required for the cleaning of machinery shall be supplied by the employer free of charge.

Changing Accommodation.

(h) Separate dressing accommodation shall be provided by the employer for male and female employees.

An employer shall, at some reasonably convenient place on his premises, provide a suitable locker for each employee in his mill, or hanging facilities which afford reasonable protection for employees' clothes.

Washing Facilities.

(i) Adequate washing and sanitary facilities shall be provided in all factories and, where possible, warm running water shall be available for washing.

Tea Break.

(j) Female employees shall be allowed a period of not less than ten minutes in the employer's time for rest and refreshment during each day or shift, to be taken at times to be mutually arranged. Reasonable facilities shall be provided by the employer for female employees to have refreshments during such intervals if they so desire:

Provided—

(i) that such period shall not be allowed within one hour of commencing or finishing work for the day or for a meal break; and

(ii) this sub-clause shall not apply to employees working a short shift who are allowed crib time without deduction of pay; and

(iii) that employees shall conform to such arrangements as the employer may make to ensure the continuity of machine operations.

Garbage Utensils.

(k) The employer shall provide utensils for the removing and containing of floor sweepings and garbage. All such utensils shall be kept in an hygienic condition and employees are required to see that refuse is placed in those containers.

Floor Coverings.

(l) Where practicable, suitable floor coverings shall be placed before machines, and no employee shall be called upon to stand on a bare concrete, or brick or stone floor when operating or attending to a machine.

Guarding Machinery.

(m) Nothing in this Determination shall be deemed to over-ride or limit any State law relating to the safeguarding of machinery for the protection of employees from accident.

Lighting Facilities.

(n) Adequate lighting facilities shall be provided in all factories.

Drinking Water.

(o) Cool, clean and wholesome drinking water shall be provided in places easily accessible to all employees.

Heating and Cooling Facilities.

(p) Adequate heating systems shall be provided in all factories to maintain satisfactory working conditions during cold weather.

Provision shall be made in all factories to maintain air movement in order to keep temperatures as low as practicable during hot weather.

Where steam pipes are installed in close proximity to the work place or machines of employees, such pipes shall be covered in such a way as to protect employees from risk of injury.

NOTICE BOARDS.

19. The employer shall permit a notice board to be erected in a prominent position in his establishment upon which representatives of the Union shall be allowed to post notices in connexion with union meetings or other legitimate business of the Union, provided such notices are not objected to by the management.

DETERMINATION POSTED.

20. A copy of this Determination shall be posted by each employer in a prominent and accessible place on the factory premises.

SHOP STEWARDS.

21. Shop stewards to the number of one in each department shall be recognised by the employer, and not more than three of such shop stewards shall be allowed time off during working hours to interview the employer if there is any legitimate complaint.

RIGHT OF ENTRY.

22. The Secretary or Branch Secretary of the Union or any person authorized by the Union, shall have the right to enter any factory or workshop for the purpose of interviewing and conversing with employees during the lunch hour or non-working time.

If any official so authorized makes himself objectionable during any such visit, his right to visit may be determined by the employer affected.

UNION CONFERENCE DELEGATES.

23. Delegates of the Union not exceeding two from each factory shall be granted leave without pay to attend Union conferences, provided that reasonable notice has been given to the employer and that such absence will not unduly interfere with the business of the employer.

CERTIFICATE OF SERVICE.

24. An employee, if he or she asks for it, shall be entitled on termination of service, to a certificate of length of service with an employer and the nature of the work which he or she was employed upon.

TIME AND WAGES BOOK.

25. (a) An employer shall keep a time and wages book or record in English showing the name of each employee, the age and/or experience of each employee paid as a junior under clause 2 of this Determination, the occupation of each employee, the hours worked each day or each week, and the wages and/or allowance paid each week.

(b) (i) When any junior employee is engaged, the employer shall obtain and file in his records a certificate or declaration as to the age and experience of such junior employee, which shall be open for inspection as provided herein.

(ii) Any employee giving misleading or false information as to his or her experience and/or age shall be liable to penalties for breach of this Determination.

(c) The time occupied by an employee in filling in time books or in the making of records shall be treated as time of duty, but this does not apply to checking in or out at the beginning or end of duty.

(d) The time and wages book or record shall be open for inspection to a duly accredited official of the Union during the usual office hours at the employer's office or other convenient place: Provided that no inspection shall be demanded unless the Secretary of the Union or the Branch Secretary or Organiser of any Division suspects that a breach of this Determination is being or has been committed: Provided also that only one demand for such inspection shall be made in any one fortnight at the same establishment.

OUTSIDE WORKERS.

26. (a) No work of any description or class covered by this Determination shall be done or performed outside the employer's factory or workshop, except by a person who holds an outside worker's licence issued by the Secretary for Labour and Industry. Provided that no such outside worker shall employ any other person or persons whatsoever, save and except members of such worker's own family.

(b) An employer shall not have more than one outside worker for every twenty inside workers or fraction thereof.

(c) An outside worker shall be deemed to be a person who works by himself or herself, except as provided in sub-clause (a), and is not employed in a workshop or factory.

(d) The outside worker shall not work during any part of the day inside a workshop or factory.

(e) Outside workers shall be paid at the rates provided in this Determination.

(f) Outside workers shall be provided free of charge with all yarn and/or other materials used in connexion with their work.

(g) Where an employer delivers and/or collects the work of such outside workers the outside workers shall not be charged for such delivery and/or collection.

(h) Every employer who has work done elsewhere than in his factory or workshop shall complete, each calendar month, in respect of each outside worker in his employ, a return in the form prescribed by Schedule "A" to this Determination. Such return shall be lodged with the Secretary for Labour and Industry within seven days after the end of the calendar month to which it refers.

Every outside worker shall complete, each calendar month, in respect of the work done by him or her, a return in the form prescribed by Schedule "B" to this Determination. Such return shall be lodged with the Secretary for Labour within seven days after the end of the calendar month to which it refers.

(i) No employer shall, except as provided in this clause, require or order or cause to be performed or contract for the performance of work of any class covered by or referred to in this Determination (including the work or preparing any material for manufacture or materials so prepared)—

- (1) in any place other than his usual workshop or factory; and/or
- (2) by any person or persons other than his employees usually employed at such workshop or factory.

(j) Nothing herein contained shall affect the right of the employer covered by this Determination to contract, sub-contract, let, or sub-let to any person employing not less than four persons (exclusive of members of his or her own family) who conducts a workshop or factory, and is affected by this Determination.

LIMITATION OF EMPLOYER'S LIABILITY.

27. Where an employer has made a payment to an employee, which payment purports to be a payment of the wages payable under this Determination to the employee for any period such employee shall not recover from his employer any further sums prescribed by this Determination in respect of any services rendered to such employer during such period, unless within a period of three calendar months after the last day of such period a demand in writing of such further sum claimed has been given to the employer by the employee.

DEFINITIONS.

28. (a) An "assistant foreman" is a male employee who, under the direction of the management, supervises the work of eight or more other employees.

(b) An "assistant forewoman" is a female employee who, under the direction of the management, supervises the work of eight or more other employees where no assistant foreman is employed.

(c) A "leading hand" is an employee who, under the direction of the management, supervises the work of a shift or gang of other employees not exceeding seven in number.

(d) "Machine operator and/or attendant" means an employee who, in the course of his duty, is called upon to operate a machine and does not include an employee whose sole duty is carrying material to and from a machine.

(e) "Continuous process" means the working of three shifts per day between midnight on Sunday and noon on the following Saturday.

(f) "Experience" for the purpose of calculating rates under clause 3 of this Determination shall include all experience in the classification concerned, whether as a junior or as an adult.

Labour and Industry Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE BULK GRAIN WORKERS BOARD.

NOTE.—This Determination applies to the whole of the State of Victoria.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Labour and Industry Acts, the Wages Board appointed to "determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons (other than persons employed in any trade, process, business, or occupation which is subject to the jurisdiction of any Board heretofore appointed) employed in the trade, process, business, or occupation of receiving, weighing, moving, and despatching grain in bulk or in any work incidental thereto at any seaboard terminal", has made the following Determination, namely:—

1. That as from the 19th June, 1957, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

2.

WAGES.

(i) *Junior Employees.*

(a) Subject to sub-clause (c) hereof, junior employees shall be entitled to payment as follows:—

(b) A junior employee shall be entitled to the same dust allowance as an adult filling a corresponding position.

(c) A junior employee working in the "Track shed" shall be entitled to be paid the appropriate rate prescribed for a classification under the heading "Other Employees" in sub-clause (ii) hereof.

(iii) *Leading Hand.*

A leading hand in any section shall be paid 3d. per hour more than the rate paid to employees whose work he is required to supervise.

SEASONAL WORKER'S ALLOWANCE

3. A weekly employee whose employment is terminated by the employer within six successive months of such employment for any cause, other than for dishonesty, misconduct, neglect of duty, or for absence from work without reasonable cause, shall on such termination be entitled to be paid for each week of his period of weekly employment an allowance of five per cent. of the total of—

- (i) so much of his earnings as does not exceed the total basic wage on which each week's earnings were based, and
- (ii) an amount of twenty-five shillings.

DUST ALLOWANCE.

4. In addition to the wage rate prescribed in clause 2 hereof any person employed at the work described hereunder shall be paid an allowance of 1s. per hour:—

- (i) Track shed employee during wheat receiving operations, employee cleaning out track hoppers, dust-house operator, employee engaged in cleaning bins or garners, bagging weevily wheat from a wheatpile.
- (ii) Any employee, other than an employee covered by placitum (i), working in the terminal during wheat handling operations.
- (iii) Any employee working in any portion of the terminal when wheat is not being handled, but when general cleaning down is being effected at the direction of the Superintendent.

JUNIOR LABOUR.

5. (a) No person under the age of sixteen years shall be employed at the trade.
- (b) The proportion of junior labour shall not exceed one junior to each eight persons receiving not less than the minimum wage.

ORDINARY HOURS (OTHER THAN FOR SHIFT WORK).

6. The ordinary hours Monday to Friday, both inclusive, shall (except for shift work) be from 8 a.m. to noon and 1 p.m. to 5 p.m., unless otherwise agreed upon between the employer or his representative and a majority of the employees concerned.

The ordinary hours for a week's work shall be 40 except in the case of any week in which any of the holidays specified in clause 17 occur. In any such week the ordinary hours of work shall be reduced by the number of hours regarded as an ordinary day's work for any day on which any of the said holidays occur.

OVERTIME (OTHER THAN FOR SHIFT WORK).

7. Payment and conditions for all time worked outside ordinary hours shall be as follows:—

- (a) Between 5 p.m. on an ordinary working day and 8 a.m. on the following day time and a half for the first four hours and double time thereafter, such double time shall continue until the employee is relieved from duty for a period of at least eight consecutive hours;
- (b) Before noon on Saturday time and a half for the first four hours and double time thereafter;
- (c) After noon on Saturday double time;
- (d) Periods of work performed before 8 a.m. and after 5 p.m. on any ordinary working day shall be cumulative and paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four hours and double time thereafter;
- (e) Employees other than shift workers shall be entitled to a meal break of one hour without pay after the expiration of four hours on duty, subject, however, to the exception provided in sub-clause (g) hereof;
- (f) Where an employee is required to work outside ordinary hours he shall be paid the appropriate overtime rate as for a minimum period of one hour and where the work exceeds one hour he shall be paid as for not less than half an hour for each subsequent half hour's work entered upon;
- (g) Where an employee is called upon to work through a meal break to finish a ship he shall be paid the appropriate rate plus 5s. per hour until such time as work finishes or a meal break is allowed. Provided that the minimum rate payable shall be not less than double time.

SHIFT WORK.

8. (a) The employer shall have the right to require any employee to work in shifts where, in the opinion of the employer it is not reasonably practicable to carry on the operations of the employer without such shift work.
- (b) The ordinary hours for a shift shall not exceed eight on any day, Monday to Friday inclusive, and any excess shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four hours and double time thereafter.
- (c) Except as provided in sub-clauses (d) and (e) hereof employees engaged on shift work shall be paid the sum of 12s. 6d. per week in addition to the rates prescribed in clause 2 hereof. Provided that such additional rate shall not apply to employees engaged solely upon day work.
- (d) Employees engaged on afternoon and night shifts only, that is when they are not changed to day shifts, afternoon shifts, and night shifts in regular rotation shall be paid a sum of 18s. 6d. per week in addition to the rates prescribed in clause 2 hereof.
- (e) Employees engaged on day and night shift only shall, for the week in which they are employed on the night shift, be paid a sum of 18s. 6d. per week in addition to the rates prescribed in clause 2 hereof.
- (f) Provided that any employee instructed by his employer to change shifts during any week shall be paid an additional 2s. 6d. for each change but not for the change back again.
- (g) Employees working on shifts shall be allowed crib time not exceeding thirty minutes in each shift at such times as may be fixed by the employer and such crib time shall be counted as time worked.

SPECIAL RATES FOR PUBLIC HOLIDAYS AND SUNDAYS.

9. (a) Double time shall be the rate for all work done on New Year's Day, Australia Day, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Queen's Birthday, and Boxing Day, and all other gazetted or statutory holidays which are observed by the Railways Department so far as goods traffic is concerned in the location where a seaboard grain terminal exists, provided that if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays the special rate shall be payable for work done only on the day so substituted.
- (b) Two and a half times the ordinary rate shall be payable for all work done on Sunday, Christmas Day, Good Friday and the days observed at Geelong as Labour Day and Union Picnic Day, provided that if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays the special rate shall be payable for work done only on the day so substituted.

MIXED FUNCTIONS.

10. An employee engaged for more than half of one day or shift on duties carrying a higher rate than his ordinary classification shall be paid the higher rate for such day or shift. If for less than half of one day or shift he shall be paid the higher rate for the time so worked with a minimum of one hour.

TIMES AND PLACES OF ENGAGEMENT.

11. Employees may be engaged at a point adjacent to the track shed. The times for engaging labour at such place shall be between the hours of 7.45 a.m. and 8 a.m., Monday to Saturday inclusive. This clause shall not preclude the right of the employer from engaging employees at another place subsequent to 8 a.m. provided there is insufficient suitable labour available at the pick-up point at that hour.

TERMS OF ENGAGEMENT.

12. (a) Employees are to be engaged as weekly or casual employees. A weekly employee is one engaged by the week and paid by the week and whose engagement shall be terminable by one week's notice on either side, such notice may be given at any time (but not continued from week to week) or one week's wages paid or forfeited as the case may be in lieu thereof.
- (b) Except for overtime work as provided for in clauses 7 and 9 hereof, a casual employee shall be guaranteed not less than four hours' engagement on any day provided that should his time of commencement be earlier than twelve noon, he shall, if required to work after the midday meal break, be guaranteed at least four hours' work after such break unless he leaves of his own accord before the completion of such period.
- (c) Where a weekly employee is engaged to begin work on any day other than the commencing day of a weekly pay period he shall be entitled to be paid at casual rates for the broken portion of the week worked by him.
- (d) A weekly employee to be entitled to the weekly wage shall be available ready and willing to perform his usual work during the days and hours usually worked by such class of employee, and may be summarily dismissed for dishonesty, misconduct, neglect of duty or for absence from work without reasonable cause, and in the event of such dismissal the employee shall be paid only for the time actually worked. Provided that the employer may deduct for time lost during which the employee cannot be usefully employed by reason of any strike, breakdown of machinery, or other cause for which the employer cannot reasonably be held responsible.
- Where an employer or his representative is insulting or uses abusive language to an employee, or where an employer or his representative acts violently towards an employee or threatens violence to an employee, then the employee shall be under no obligation to give a week's notice of termination of employment but may leave the employment instantly.
- (e) Subject to the provisions of clause 13 hereof any weekly employee not attending for duty shall lose his pay for the actual time lost.

SICK LEAVE.

13. (a) Any weekly employee who, having had at least three months' service with the employer, is absent from duty as a result of personal ill health or accident shall be entitled to sick pay as follows:—
- (i) during the first year—3½ hours' ordinary pay for each complete month of service;
- (ii) during any subsequent year of service—40 hours' ordinary pay.
- Provided that, in either case such employee produces or forwards within 48 hours of the commencement of such absence evidence satisfactory to the employer that his non-attendance was due to personal ill health or accident necessitating such absence; and provided further that he shall not be entitled to paid leave of absence for any period in respect of which he is entitled to workers' compensation.
- For the purpose of administering this sub-clause "year" means a period of twelve calendar months, commencing from the first day of weekly employment of an employee, and commencing from the anniversary of such date in subsequent years.
- (b) In the case of an employee who claims to be allowed paid sick leave in accordance with this clause for an absence of one day only such employee if in the year he has already been allowed paid sick leave on more than one occasion for one day only, shall not be entitled to payment for the day claimed unless he produces to the employer a certificate of a duly-qualified medical practitioner that in his, the medical practitioner's opinion, the employee was unable to attend for duty on account of personal illness or on account of injury by accident. Nothing in this sub-clause shall limit the employer's rights under sub-clause (a) hereof.
- (c) Notwithstanding anything contained in sub-clause (a) hereof an employee suffering injury through an accident arising out of and in the course of his employment (not being an injury in respect of which he is entitled to workers' compensation) necessitating his attendance during working hours on a doctor, chemist, or trained nurse, or at a hospital, shall not suffer any deduction from his pay for the time (not exceeding four hours) so occupied on the day of the accident, and shall be re-imbursed by the employer all expenses reasonably incurred in connexion with such attendance.

(d) Where an employee is engaged for broken periods of service in successive years with the same employer, each period including and subsequent to a qualifying period of three months' service shall be added for the purpose of calculating credit of sick leave as prescribed herein.

(e) If the full period of sick leave as prescribed above is not taken in any year such portion as is not taken shall be cumulative from year to year. For the purposes of this sub-clause service prior to the 28th April, 1950, shall be disregarded.

(f) The employer shall not terminate the services of an employee during the currency of any period of sick leave with the object of avoiding his obligations under this clause.

CASUAL EMPLOYMENT.

14. Subject to the provisions of clause 12 sub-clause (b) hereof, the engagement of any casual employee may be terminated at any moment without notice.

MEAL ALLOWANCE.

15. (a) An employee called upon to work overtime except as provided in clause 7 sub-clause (g) hereof, shall be paid a meal allowance of five shillings for each meal occurring in the overtime period or provided with a meal not to exceed a cost of five shillings for each such meal.

(b) Provided that when it is necessary to work overtime to clear the line, and the work by mutual consent is carried on through the meal hour and does not exceed one hour's duration, the meal allowance is not to be paid.

TRANSPORT.

16. (a) Transport if required at the Geelong Grain Terminal will be provided without charge from the terminal to the corner of Moorabool and Rylie streets, Geelong for all employees who are required to work overtime at the terminal and who cease work at or after 8 p.m. Provided that where the men concerned cannot be transported from the terminal to the above-mentioned point in Geelong in sufficient time to enable them to catch their last trams home from Geelong the men shall be provided with transport, if required, to their homes.

(b) Where work is performed on a Sunday at the Geelong Grain Terminal the employer shall provide transport from and to the Belmont Bridge at Geelong.

HOLIDAYS.

17. Weekly employees shall be granted the following holidays without deduction of pay:—

New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Anzac Day, Queen's Birthday, Christmas Day, Boxing Day, Union Picnic Day, and all other gazetted or statutory holidays which are observed by the Victorian Railways Department so far as goods traffic is concerned in the location where a seaborne grain terminal exists. Union Picnic Day shall be observed on a day to be mutually agreed upon between the Federated Storemen and Packers' Union and the employer concerned.

Provided that an employee who fails to attend for work on the working day immediately preceding, and the working day immediately following a prescribed holiday or holidays without reasonable excuse, or without the consent of the employer, shall not be entitled to payment for such holiday or holidays.

PAYMENT OF WAGES.

18. Wages of employees shall be paid not later than Thursday in each week and shall include payment for all time worked up to and including midnight on the preceding Tuesday. Upon termination of his employment all monies due to an employee shall be paid to him on the day of such termination or forwarded to him by post on the next working day provided that, in the case of a casual employee leaving the job before the completion of his engagement, he shall not be entitled to payment until the next succeeding pay day.

ANNUAL HOLIDAY.

19. (a) The annual holiday shall be as prescribed by the provisions of the Labour and Industry Acts.

(b) Upon completion by an employee of four years of continuous service with an employer, such employee shall be granted by the employer within six months of the completion of the year of service, a total of three weeks' annual recreation leave in respect of such fourth year of continuous service and each subsequent year of continuous service with that employer.

Provided that the additional annual recreation leave shall not be granted unless such employee has been available for work when required by the employer during the Christmas to Easter public holiday period occurring during each such year or subsequent year of service by the employee.

HOT WATER.

20. The employer shall provide free of charge hot water for the use of employees at the midday meal hour.

SMOKE-OHS.

21. Employees shall be entitled to a smoke-oh of 10 minutes in the morning and afternoon and at intervals of two hours during shift or overtime work.

RIGHT OF ENTRY OF UNION OFFICIAL.

22. A duly accredited representative of the Federated Storemen and Packers' Union of Australia shall have the right to enter employers' establishments during the midday meal hour for the purpose of interviewing employees on legitimate Union business on the following conditions:—

- (i) That he produces his authority to the employer or his representative;
- (ii) That he interviews employees only at the place where they are taking their meal;
- (iii) That not more than one representative in all be in any establishment at any one time;
- (iv) That no one representative visit an establishment more than once a fortnight;
- (v) That if an employer alleges that a representative is unduly interfering with his establishment or is creating dissatisfaction amongst his employees or is offensive in his methods or is committing a breach of any of the previous conditions, such employer may refuse the right of entry.

EMPLOYER TO PROVIDE TOOLS.

23. All tools which employees are required to use in the course of their work shall be provided by the employer.

ORDINARY PAY.

24. For the purposes of this Determination "ordinary pay" shall not include any dust allowance, premium for shift work, overtime pay, or seasonal worker's allowance.

OVERALLS.

25. After three months' continuous service with an employer, an employee shall be supplied with a pair of overalls, and at the conclusion of each subsequent period of six months' continuous service shall be supplied with a further pair. Such clothing shall remain the property of the employer.

AMENDING DETERMINATION OF THE PORT PHILLIP SEAMEN'S BOARD.

NOTE.—The area or locality within which the Determination of such Wages Board shall be operative shall be Port Phillip Bay, Hobson's Bay, Corio Bay, the Port of Melbourne, the Port of Geelong, and the Geelong Harbor.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Labour and Industry Acts, the Wages Board which has the power to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons "employed as seamen in vessels working exclusively in and around Port Phillip Bay" has made the following amending Determination namely:—

1. That as from the beginning of the first pay period to commence on or after the 4th July, 1957, the Determination made on the 7th March, 1957, and in force as from the beginning of the first pay period to commence on or after the 22nd March, 1957, shall be amended in the following manner.

2. Sub-clause (b) of Clause 11 of Part III., shall be deleted and the following inserted in lieu—

(b) Shift Workers.

Thirty minutes shall be allowed for crib, but no employee shall be required to work more than five hours without a break for a meal. The dredging plant may continue to operate during periods of crib time. No reduction of wages shall take place in lieu of time taken off for a meal.

DETERMINATION OF THE MANUFACTURING CHEMISTS BOARD.

NOTE.—This Determination applies to the whole of the State of Victoria.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Labour and Industry Acts, the Wages Board appointed to "determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any persons employed in the trade of—

- (a) a wholesale or a manufacturing chemist;
- (b) manufacturing toilet preparations, perfumery, essences, essential oils, food preservatives, branding fluids, deodorants, disinfectants, fungicides, insecticides, vermin destroyers, weed destroyers,"

has made the following Determination, namely:—

1. That on the 24th June, 1957, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

2. WAGES.

Note:—Rates prescribed in this Determination are based upon a basic wage of £13 3s. 0d. for males and £9 17s. 0d. for females.

3. (a) Employees engaged in processing and/or repacking in bulk Gentian Violet, Methylene Blue, Acriflavine, or similar substances shall be paid 6d. per hour extra with a minimum payment of 1s. 6d. per day.

(b) Employees whilst engaged in manufacturing and/or processing, filling and/or sealing, and/or de-contaminating containers of organic phosphorus pesticides as covered by the first schedule of "Use of Pesticides Regulations, 1953" under the Health Acts, shall be paid an allowance of 9d. per hour or part thereof extra with a minimum payment of 2s. 3d. per day.

OVERTIME.

5. (a) The following rates shall be paid for all work done :—

 (iii) On Saturday }

(b) An employer may require any employee to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates and such employees shall work overtime in accordance with such requirement.

MEAL MONEY.

6. An employee required to work overtime for any period in excess of two hours after the usual hour of ceasing duty or after 6 p.m., whichever is the earlier, shall be supplied with an adequate meal from the employer's canteen or paid a meal money allowance of 5s.

Provided that when any employee is notified the previous day of the intention to work overtime and overtime is not worked he shall be entitled to the appropriate meal allowance as herein provided.

TERMS OF EMPLOYMENT.

7. (a) All employees shall be engaged by the week, and shall be paid weekly. A week's notice shall be given by the employer or employee to determine employment, or, in lieu of such notice, a week's wages shall be paid or forfeited, as the case may be. Such notice shall be given at the end of a working week, but an employee may be dismissed summarily for dishonesty, misconduct, neglect of duty, or for absence from work without reasonable cause, and in the event of such dismissal the employee shall be paid only for the time actually worked. All time of absence from work shall be deducted from the employee's wages, except absence on the holidays hereinafter mentioned and except absence without deduction of pay in accordance with clause 10.

(b) Notwithstanding the provisions of sub-clause (a) hereof the employer may deduct payment for any time during which the employee cannot be usefully employed because of any strike, or any other cause for which the employer cannot reasonably be held responsible; but any such employee shall be entitled to payment for any of the holidays named in clause 8 which occur during such period.

(c) Where an employee is stood down under the provisions of sub-clause (b) hereof, the time lost to the employee shall not affect the continuity of employment.

HOLIDAYS.

8. All employees shall be entitled to the holidays hereinafter mentioned without deduction of pay:—New Year's Day, Australia Day, Union Picnic Day, Labour Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Queen's Birthday, Melbourne Cup Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day, but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays this provision shall apply only to the day so substituted. Provided that any employee absenting himself or herself from work without reasonable excuse or without permission of the employer for any portion of the working day proceeding or following a holiday provided for in this clause, shall not be entitled to payment for such holiday.

ANNUAL HOLIDAY.

9. (a) The annual holiday shall be as prescribed by the provisions of the Labour and Industry Acts.

(b) In addition to the annual holidays prescribed in sub-clause (a) hereof, seven-day shift workers, that is shift workers who are rostered to work regularly on Sundays and holidays, shall be allowed seven consecutive days' leave including non-working days.

Where an employee with twelve months' continuous service is engaged for part of the twelve-monthly period as a seven-day shift worker, he shall be entitled to have the period of annual holidays prescribed in sub-clause (a) hereof increased by half a day for each month he is continuously engaged as aforesaid.

SICK LEAVE.

10. (a) Any employee who, having had at least three months' service with the same employer, is absent from duty as a result of personal ill health or accident shall be entitled to sick pay as follows:—

(i) During the first year—3½ hours' ordinary pay for each complete month of service;

(ii) During any subsequent year of service—40 hours' ordinary pay.

Provided that in either case such employee produces or forwards within 48 hours of the commencement of such absence evidence satisfactory to the employer that his or her non-attendance was due to personal ill health or accident necessitating such absence.

(b) If the full period of sick leave, as prescribed above is not taken in any year such portion as is not taken shall, provided an employee remains in the service of the one employer, or any successor of such employer, be cumulative from year to year. For the purposes of this sub-clause, service prior to the 1st June, 1948, shall be disregarded.

DEFINITION OF FOREMAN.

11. Where three or more adults are employed in any department of a warehouse, one shall be deemed to be a foreman and entitled to the rate prescribed for such a foreman.

MEAL INTERVAL.

12. No employees shall be required to work for a longer period than five hours without an interval of at least half an hour for a meal.

SPECIAL RATES.

13. All work done on Sundays, New Year's Day, Australia Day, Easter Monday, Good Friday, Labour Day, Queen's Birthday, Melbourne Cup Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day shall be paid for at the rate of double time, but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above holidays, the special rates shall be payable only for the days so substituted.

SHIFT WORK.

14. By mutual agreement between an employer and his employees shifts may be worked subject to the following conditions:—

(a) The rates of pay for shift workers shall be:—

(i) On afternoon shift, 7½ per cent. in excess of ordinary rates.

(ii) On night shift, 10 per cent. in excess of ordinary rates.

(b) Overtime shall be paid at the rate of time and a half for all time worked in excess of 8 hours per shift in any week in which six or more shifts are worked and in excess of 8 hours 48 minutes per shift in any week in which less than six shifts are worked.

(c) Shift workers who work on any afternoon or night shift which does not continue for at least five successive afternoon or nights in a five-day workshop or for at least six successive afternoons or nights in a six-day workshop shall be paid at the rate of time and a half.

(d) For the purposes of this clause "afternoon shift" means any shift finishing after 6 p.m. and at or before midnight and "night shift" means any shift worked wholly or partly between midnight and 7.30 a.m.

PROTECTIVE CLOTHING.

15. (a) Waterproof boots and protective clothing shall be provided by the employer when employees are required to work in wet places, and when employees are employed in a room where powders are being mixed or employed in the handling of acids or other materials injurious to clothing they shall be provided with overalls or dust coats, whichever is the most suitable.

(b) Not more than two sets of overalls or other protective clothing per year shall be supplied by the employer, when necessary, free of cost to the employee.

(c) Persons employed in sterile areas shall be supplied with overalls which shall be laundered by the employer, free of cost to the employee.

(d) Waterproof boots, protective clothing and overalls as provided in this clause shall remain the property of the employer.

REST PERIOD.

16. A rest period of ten minutes shall be allowed all employees in the forenoon, such period to count as time worked.

PAYMENT OF WAGES.

17. Wages shall be paid, in the employer's time, not later than Thursday in each week.

RIGHT OF ENTRY OF UNION OFFICIAL.

18. A duly accredited representative of the Federated Storemen and Packers' Union of Australia shall have the right to enter employers' establishments during the midday meal hour for the purposes of interviewing employees on legitimate Union business on the following conditions:—

(a) That he produces his authority to the employer or his representative.

(b) That he interviews employees only at the place where they are taking their meal.

(c) That not more than one representative in all be in any establishment at any one time.

(d) That no one representative visit an establishment more than once a fortnight.

(e) That if an employer alleges that a representative is unduly interfering with his establishment or is creating disaffection amongst his employees or is offensive in his methods or is committing a breach of any of the previous conditions, such employer may refuse right of entry.

FIRST-AID OUTFITS.

19. In each place where employees are regularly employed, the employer shall provide and continuously maintain, at a place or places reasonably accessible to all employees, an efficient first-aid outfit, consisting of the following articles:—

Now therefore I, the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, do by this my Proclamation declare that, as from the first day of August, 1957, the Borough of Maryborough and the Shire of Tullaroop shall be added to and form part of such Union and do fix as follows the apportionment among such municipalities of the expenses devolving on the Union under the said Acts:—

1. The amount to be contributed by each municipality of the Union as reconstituted in accordance with this Proclamation shall bear the same proportion to the expenses devolving on the Union as the number of persons residing in each such municipality bears to the total number of persons residing in all the municipalities of the Union.
2. The number of persons residing in each such municipality shall be deemed to be the number of persons residing therein as disclosed by the last periodical census conducted by or on behalf of the Government of the Commonwealth of Australia.
3. The provisions set forth in paragraphs (1) and (2) hereof shall have effect from the first day of October next after the declaration or publication by or on behalf of the Commonwealth of Australia of the result of the periodical census showing the number of persons residing in each such municipality.

Provided that from the first day of August, 1957, until the thirtieth day of September next after the declaration or publication of the result of the census aforesaid, the apportionment among such municipalities of the expenses devolving upon the Union shall be as follows (that is to say):—

Marketing of Primary Products Act 1935 (No. 4337).

DECLARING THAT EGGS SHALL BECOME THE PROPERTY OF THE EGG AND EGG PULP MARKETING BOARD FOR A FURTHER PERIOD OF TWO YEARS.

PROCLAMATION

By the Honorable Sir Charles Lowe, as Deputy for His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by sub-section (1) of section 16 of the *Marketing of Primary Products Act 1935* it is enacted that where a product has been declared a commodity and a board has been appointed in relation thereto, the Governor in Council may by Proclamation—

(a) provide and declare that the commodity shall forthwith, upon the date of publication of the Proclamation or on from and after a later date specified in the Proclamation, be divested from the producers of the commodity and become vested in and be the absolute property of the board as the owner thereof and that upon any of the commodity coming into existence within a time specified in the same or a subsequent Proclamation it shall by virtue of this Act become vested in and be the absolute property of the board as the owner thereof; and

(b) make such further provision as will enable the board effectively to obtain possession of the commodity as such owner, and to deal with the same: And whereas by a Proclamation made on the 16th day of June, 1936, under the provisions of section 6 of the said Act, the Governor in Council declared eggs to be a commodity under and for the purposes of the said Act: And whereas by an Order made on 8th February, 1937, the Governor in Council appointed a marketing board in relation to eggs and egg pulp and assigned to such board the name of "The Egg and Egg Pulp Marketing Board": Now therefore I, Sir Charles Lowe,

as Deputy for His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, do by this my Proclamation hereby provide and declare that on from and after the sixteenth day of August, 1957, all eggs shall, subject to and in accordance with the *Marketing of Primary Products Act 1935*, be divested from the producers of eggs and become vested in and be the absolute property of The Egg and Egg Pulp Marketing Board as the owner thereof and that upon any eggs coming into existence within two (2) years from the sixteenth day of August, 1957, they shall by virtue of and subject to and in accordance with the said Act become vested in and be the absolute property of The Egg and Egg Pulp Marketing Board as the owner thereof, and to enable The Egg and Egg Pulp Marketing Board as owners of the above-mentioned commodity effectively to obtain possession thereof and to deal with the same I do further provide that all such eggs shall subject to and in accordance with the provisions of the said Act be delivered by the producers thereof to The Egg and Egg Pulp Marketing Board or its authorized agent within such times at such places and in such manner as The Egg and Egg Pulp Marketing Board by public notice, or in a particular case in writing, directs or as are prescribed by regulations made under the said Act.

BOOLLARRA WATERWORKS TRUST.

BY-LAW No. 1.

Standing Orders for Regulating and Appointing the Place and Hour of Meetings of the Boolarra Waterworks Trust and Providing for Management and Conduct of Business thereat.

THE Boolarra Waterworks Trust, in pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities conferred by the Water Acts, doth hereby make the By-law following for its Waterworks District:—

1. In all cases not provided for by the Acts of Parliament of Victoria relating to authorities, or by this By-law resort shall be had to the rules, forms, and usages of the Parliament of Victoria, which shall be followed so far as the same are applicable to the proceedings of the Trust.

2. *Place and Hour of Meeting.*—Meetings of the Trust shall be held periodically on the first Friday in February, May, August, and November commencing at 8 o'clock p.m. at the Boolarra Mechanics' Institute Hall Reading Room. Upon notice of motion of the time, day and hour of the meeting may be altered by a majority of the Commissioners. A notice of every regular meeting shall be by the Trust Secretary, delivered or sent by post, addressed to the usual address of the Commissioners, three clear days at least prior to the day on which such intended meeting is to be held.

3. *Meeting, Resolutions at, Not to be Revoked.*—No Resolution at any meeting of the Commissioners shall be revoked or altered at any subsequent meeting, unless notice of intention to propose such revocation or alteration be given by the Trust Secretary to each of the Commissioners seven days at least before holding the meeting, nor unless such revocation or alteration be determined upon by a majority consisting of at least two-thirds of the Commissioners present at such subsequent meeting (if the number of the Commissioners present at such subsequent meeting be not greater than the number present when such Resolution was come to), or by majority if the number of Commissioners present at such subsequent meeting be greater than the number present at such former meeting.

4. *Business, &c., Order of Minutes.*—At every meeting of the Commissioners the first business thereof shall be reading and putting a question for the confirmation of the minutes of the proceedings at the preceding meeting, and no discussion shall be permitted thereon, except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings, and the rough minutes of the proceedings of the Commissioners at any meeting shall be read at the close of such meeting, if required by any Commissioner present at such meeting.

5. After the signing of the minutes by the Chairman, the order of the business of any ordinary meeting shall be as follows, or as near thereto as may be practicable; but for the greater convenience of the Commissioners at any particular meeting thereof it may be altered by Resolution to that effect:—

- (1) Reading of copies of letters sent by the authority of the Commissioners, if called for.
- (2) Reading letters, received, and considering and ordering thereon.
- (3) Reception and reading of petitions and memorials.
- (4) Receiving deputations from the ratepayers.
- (5) Presentation of reports of committees and officers.
- (6) Payments.
- (7) Orders of the day, including subjects continued from proceedings of former meetings, and any business the Chairman may think desirable.
- (8) Other motions of which previous notice has been given.
- (9) Notices of motion and the order of business at a special meeting shall be the order in which such business stands in the notice thereof.

6. *Titles, Official.*—The Commissioners, in meeting, shall designate each other by their official titles, namely, that of Chairman or Commissioner, as the case may require.

7. *Who to Speak.*—If two or more Commissioners rise to speak at the same time the Chairman shall decide which is entitled to priority.

8. *Chairman to Rise Whilst Addressing Meeting.*—The Chairman shall rise in addressing the Commissioners to discuss any question, and shall not leave the Chair on such occasions.

9. *Commissioners Not to Speak Twice on the Same Question.*—No Commissioner shall speak twice on the same question, unless entitled to reply, or in the explanation when he has been misrepresented or misunderstood.

10. *Points of Order.*—The Chairman, when called upon to decide on points of order or practice, shall state the provision, rule or practice which he deems applicable to the case, without discussing or commenting on the same, and his decision as to order or explanation in each case shall be final.

11. *Commissioners Not to Digress or Impute Improper Motives.*—No Commissioner shall digress from the subject matter of the question under discussion, nor impute improper motives, and all personal reflections on Commissioners shall be deemed disorderly, and every Commissioner so doing shall, upon being called to order by the Chairman, apologize for such conduct, and withdraw such imputations or reflections, as the case may be.

12. A Commissioner called to order shall sit down unless permitted to explain.

13. *Persons Not Commissioners to Leave when Requested.*—No person not being a Commissioner who, having been admitted to any meeting of the Commissioners, shall be guilty thereof of any improper or disorderly conduct, and every such person shall leave such meeting when requested by the Chairman to do so.

14. *Call of the Commissioners.*—No Commissioner shall absent himself from any meeting held in compliance with an order for a call of the whole Commissioners without reasonable excuse to the satisfaction of the majority thereof.

15. *Documents to be Produced.*—Any Commissioner may of right demand the production of any of the documents of the Trust applying to the question under discussion.

16. *Motions, Amendments, and Notice Thereof.*—All notices of motion shall be in writing, dated, and numbered, and given by the intending mover to the Trust Secretary at the close of the meeting of the Commissioners, or if not given at the meeting then seven days prior to the day which the next meeting of the Commissioners is to take place, and the Secretary shall enter the same in the notice of motion book, in the order in which they may be received.

17. *No Motion Without Notice.*—No commissioner shall make any motion initiating a subject for discussion, except in pursuance of notice given as prescribed in the last preceding clause.

18. *Motions on Petitions.*—No motion, except that for receiving the same, shall, unless under most urgent circumstances, be made on any petition, memorial or other like application until the next ordinary meeting of the Commissioners after that at which it has been presented.

19. *Motions to be Moved in Order.*—Except by leave of the Commissioners motions shall be moved in order in which they have been received and recorded by the Trust Secretary in the notice of motion book, and if not so moved or postponed shall be struck out.

20. *Motions Not to be Proceeded with in the Absence of the Mover.*—No motion entered in the notice of motion book shall be proceeded with in the absence of the Commissioner who gave the notice of the same, unless by some other Commissioner producing written authority from him to that effect.

21. No motion for an address or petition shall be entertained unless the mover shall, at some previous meeting, have submitted a draft of the same.

22. *Mover of Motion or Amendment Not to be Interrupted.*—Any Commissioner desirous of making a motion or amendment, or taking part in discussion thereon, shall rise and address the Chairman, and shall not be interrupted unless called to order when he shall sit down until the Commissioner calling to order shall have been heard thereon, and the question or order disposed of, when the Commissioner in possession of the Chair may proceed with the subject.

23. *Nature of Motion to be Stated.*—Any Commissioner desirous of proposing an original motion or amendment must state the nature of the same before he addresses the Commissioner thereon.

24. *Leave to be Obtained before Motion Withdrawn.*—No motion or amendment shall be withdrawn without the leave of the Commissioners.

25. *Motions to be Seconded Prior to Discussion.*—No motion or amendment shall be discussed or put to the vote of the Commissioners unless it be seconded; but a Commissioner may, however, require the enforcement of any standing order of the Commissioners by directing the Chairman's attention to the infraction thereof.

26. *Mover and Not the Seconder Held to Have Spoken.*—A Commissioner moving a motion shall be held to have spoken thereon, but a Commissioner merely seconding shall not be held to have spoken upon it.

27. *Motion to be in Writing.*—At every meeting of the Commissioners, all motions, whether original motions or amendments, shall be reduced to writing signed by the mover, and be delivered to the Chairman immediately on their being moved and seconded.

28. *Amendments.*—No second or subsequent amendment, whether upon an original proposition or on an amendment, shall be taken into consideration until the previous amendment is disposed of.

29. *Amendments to Become the Question.*—If an amendment be carried, the amendment shall become itself the question, whereupon any further amendment upon any portion of the question may be moved.

30. *Second Amendment may be Moved.*—If an amendment be negative, then a second may be moved to the question, to which the first-mentioned amendment was moved, but only one amendment shall be submitted to the Commissioners for discussion at a time.

31. *Right of Mover to Reply.*—The mover of every original proposition but not of any amendment, shall have a right to reply, immediately after which the question shall be put from the Chair, but no Commissioner shall be allowed to speak more than once on the same question unless permission be given to explain or the attention of the Chair be called to a point of order.

32. *Adjournment Motion.*—No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment of the Commissioners, but if, on the question being put, the motion be negatived, the subject then under consideration, the next on the notice paper shall be discussed, or any other that may be allowed precedence before any subsequent motion of adjournment be made.

33. *Protest, Commissioners May.*—Any Commissioner may protest against any Resolution of the Commissioners, and notice of intention to protest shall, in every case, be given forthwith on the adoption of the Resolution protested against, and the protest shall specify the reason for protesting, and shall be entered three days at least before the next ordinary meeting of the Commissioners by the protesting Commissioner in a book to be kept for that purpose in the Trust Secretary's office, and signed by such Commissioner, and shall also be entered in the minutes of the meeting at which notice of the intention to protest shall have been given previously to the confirmation thereof; but such protest may be expunged from the minutes if declared by a majority of the Commissioners to be not in accordance with truth or in its term disrespectful to the Commissioners.

34. *Lapsed Questions.*—If a debate on any motion moved and seconded be interrupted by the number of Commissioners present becoming insufficient for the transaction of business, such debate may be resumed at the point where it was so interrupted on motion upon notice.

35. *Order of the Day to be Restored.*—If a debate on any order of the day be interrupted by such insufficiency of numbers as aforesaid happening, such order may be restored to the notice book for a future day on motion upon notice, and then such debate shall be resumed at the point where it was so interrupted.

36. *Voting.*—Whenever a division shall be demanded by any Commissioner, the Commissioners voting in the affirmative shall first hold up their hands, and all those voting in the negative shall then hold up their hands, and the result be declared by the Chairman. The Chairman shall have a deliberate vote, and in case of an equal division he shall have a casting vote, and every Commissioner present shall vote except he be disabled by law from doing so.

37. *Questions to be Put.*—The Chairman shall, in taking the sense of the Commissioners, put the question first in the affirmative, then in the negative, and the result thereof shall be recorded in the minutes.

38. *Contents of Petitions.*—It shall be incumbent on every Commissioner presenting a petition to acquaint himself with the contents thereof, and to ascertain that it does not contain language disrespectful to the Commissioners, and that the contents do not violate any By-law or any provision thereof.

39. *Name at Beginning of Petition.*—Every Commissioner presenting a petition to the Commissioners shall write his name at the beginning thereof.

40. *Petition to be in Writing.*—Every petition shall be in writing and not printed or lithographed, and shall contain the prayer of the petitioner at the end thereof, and be signed by at least one person on every sheet on which it is written.

41. *How Signed.*—Every petition shall be signed by the persons whose names are appended thereto by their names or marks and by no one else except in cases of incapacity by sickness.

42. *No Letters, &c., to be Attached.*—No letters, affidavits, or other documents shall be attached to any petition.

43. *Presentation of Petitions.*—Every Commissioner presenting a petition to the Commissioners shall confine himself to a statement of the persons from whom it comes, of the number of signatures attached to it, of the material allegations contained in it, and to the reading of the prayer thereof.

44. *Deputations.*—Deputations from the ratepayers wishing to be heard before the Commissioners in support of any petition, or otherwise, must send in an application in writing, to the Trust Secretary, at least three clear days before the meeting of the Commissioners at which such petition is intended to be presented.

45. *Cheques to be Signed.*—All cheques shall be signed by two Commissioners, and countersigned by the Secretary.

46. *Appointment to Permanent Office.*—No appointment to any permanent office at the disposal of the Commissioners shall take place until seven clear days' public notices shall have been given by advertisement in one or more newspapers circulating in the township of Boolarra, inviting applications from qualified candidates for same.

47. *Salaries to be Fixed.*—The salary or allowance attached to all offices and places at the disposal of the Commissioners shall, in all cases, be fixed before they proceed to appoint any person to fill the same.

48. *Commissioners, &c., Not to be Surety.*—No Commissioner or officer of the Commissioners, and no assessor or auditor shall be received as a surety, for any officer appointed by the Commissioners, or for any work to be done for the Commissioners.

49. *Contracts.*—In all cases of security being given for the faithful performance of any contract, the expenses of preparing such security shall be borne by the person providing the same.

50. *Plans, &c.*—All the plans and specifications for any public work shall be laid before the Commissioners at least six days prior to the same being considered and ordered upon, and be open for inspection by any Commissioner during that time, except in cases of emergency.

51. *Secretary to Expend Moneys.*—It shall be lawful for the Secretary from time to time, on the written order of the Chairman, to disburse such moneys as shall have been appropriated by the Commissioners for the purposes of this clause, and as shall be required for any necessary occasion, not exceeding in the whole in an interval between two ordinary meetings of the Commissioners the sum of Ten pounds.

52. *Addresses to the Governor, &c.*—All addresses to the Governor shall be presented by the Chairman and Trust Secretary, unless otherwise ordered by the Commissioners.

53. *Suspension of Regulations.*—Any one or more of the rules and provisions herein contained may be suspended for a special purpose on motion upon notice being given, and shall not otherwise be suspended except by a unanimous vote of the Commissioners.

54. *Penalty.*—Every person who shall so offend against this By-law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for each such offence.

55. *Common Seal.*—The Common Seal of the Trust shall be kept in a locked box, of which the key shall be kept by the Trust Secretary, and the corporate seal shall not be affixed to any documents unless the Chairman of the Trust and the Secretary, or in the absence of the Chairman, unless two Commissioners and the Secretary be present.

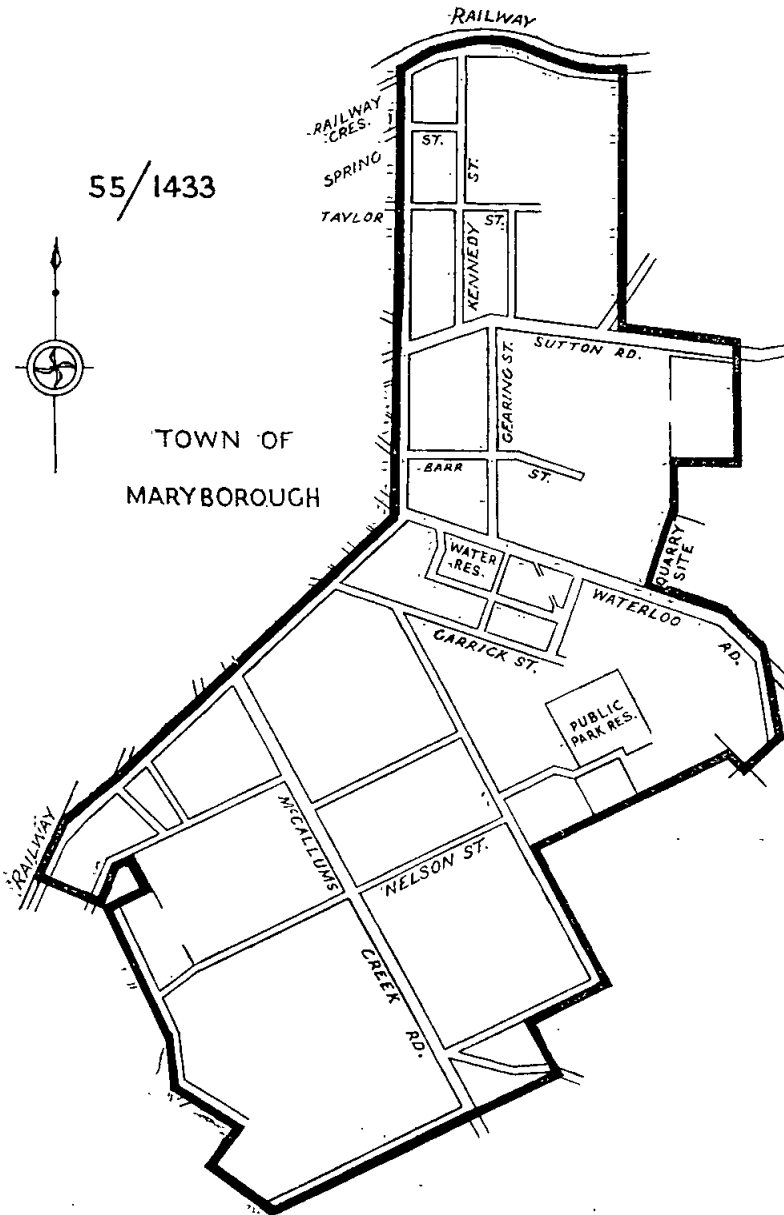

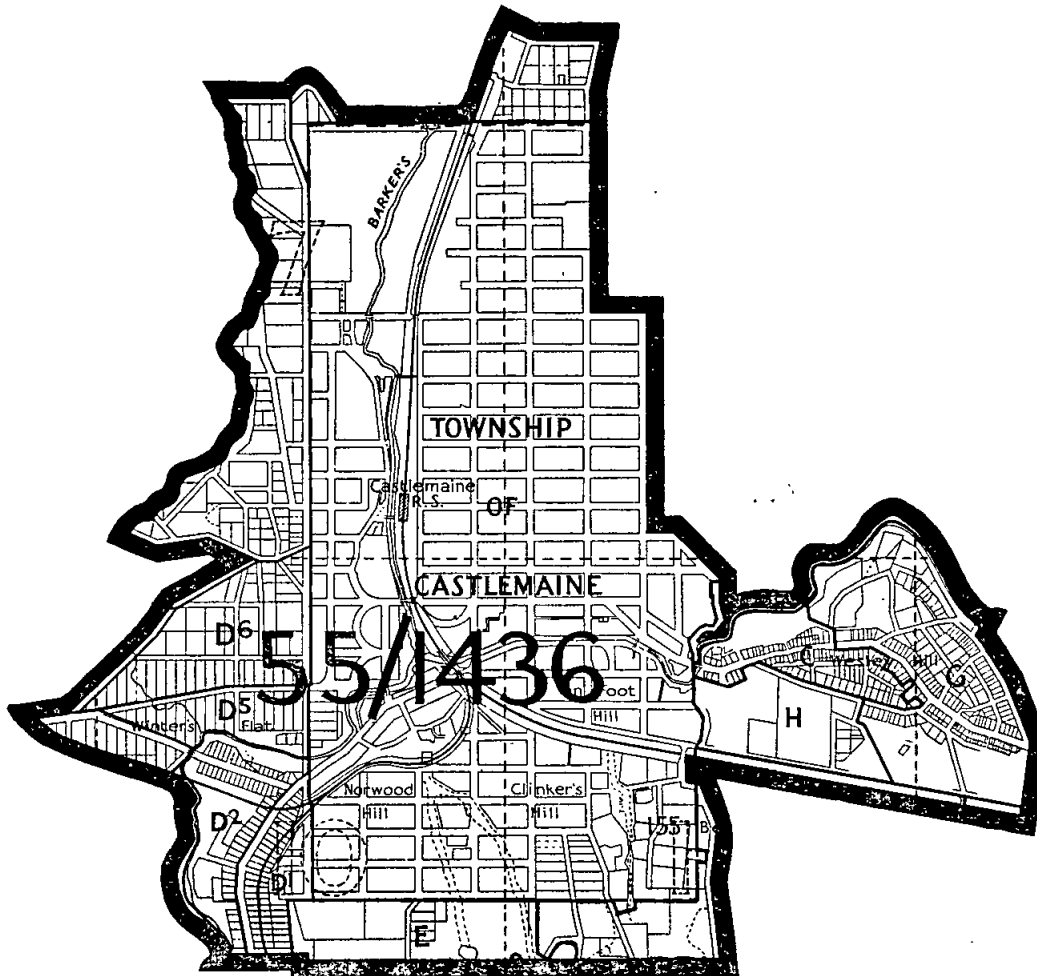

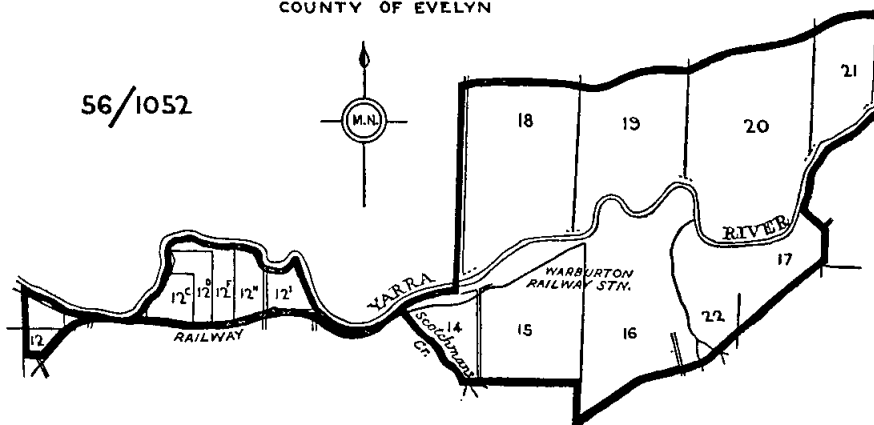

AMENDMENT OF THE STAMPS REGULATIONS 1948.

(4) A fee of five shillings shall be chargeable for every one hundred forms and also for every fraction of one hundred forms required to be impressed in color.

WHEREAS by the *Cemeteries Act 1928* (No. 3652) it is among other things enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time make such Regulations in relation to all or any cemeteries, burial grounds, or places of burial as to him seem proper for the protection of the public health and the maintenance of public decency, and may impose such penalty, not exceeding Five pounds, to be recovered before any Court of Petty Sessions, for the breach of any such Regulation as to the Governor in Council seems fit: Now therefore the Honorable Sir Charles Lowe, as Deputy for His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby make the following Regulation, that is to say:—

REGULATION.

Whenever a coffin is buried otherwise than in a vault, there shall be at least 6 inches of closely packed earth between every part of it and every part of any other coffin below or alongside it, and it shall be so buried that no part of it shall be within 4 feet of the ordinary level of the ground, unless it contain the body of a child under twelve years of age, when it shall be so buried that no part of it shall be within 3 feet of that level. Any workman digging or filling in a grave, or any foreman or person in charge of such work, who shall disobey this Regulation or give a direction contravening it shall be guilty of a breach of this Regulation, and shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Five pounds.

Any trustees, manager, secretary, or person having the care of a cemetery or burial ground who shall in any way sanction or permit or order a contravention of this Regulation shall be guilty of a breach of this Regulation and shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Five pounds.

PENTAL ISLAND RIVER IMPROVEMENT TRUST.

The general Regulations made in pursuance of the provisions of the Act, for the qualification, disqualification, election, appointment, removal, and term of office of Commissioners of River Improvement Trusts shall be read and construed as one with these Regulations.

2. Period for which elected Commissioner shall hold office—

The period for which an elected Commissioner shall hold office shall be until the Saturday next following the fourth Thursday in the month of August in the third year after the year of his election.

3. Date of ordinary election of Commissioners—

The ordinary election, other than the first election, of Commissioners under these Regulations shall be held on the Saturday next following the fourth Thursday in the month of August in each triennial year succeeding the year 1957.

4. Voters' list to be prepared annually—

For the purposes of any election, other than the first election, of Commissioners, the Trust shall cause a list of voters to be prepared on or before the seventh day of July in each year, in like manner to that provided by section 117 of the *Water Act* 1928, as amended by section 2 of the *Water Act* 1936, in so far as circumstances will admit, which shall, upon the approval by the Commissioners under the common seal of the Trust, be the list of voters for any election of Commissioners for the twelve months then next ensuing.

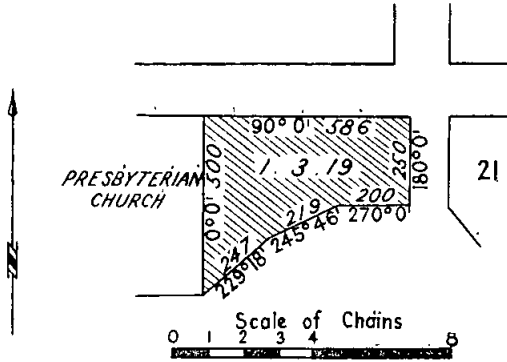

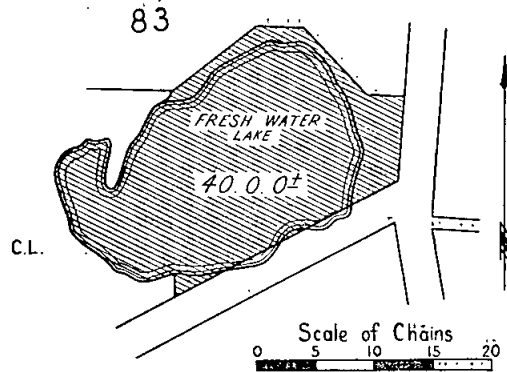

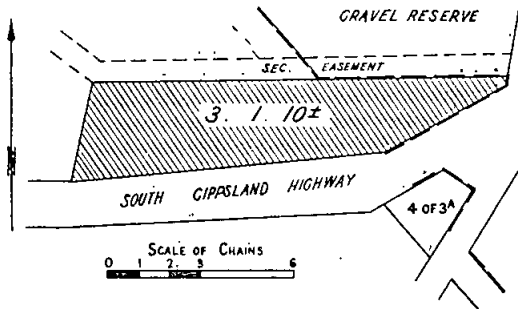

REGULATIONS RELATING TO THE SUPPLY OF ELECTRICITY AND TO CONSTRUCTION IN CONNEXION THEREWITH.

WHEREAS by Order in Council made the 6th day of March, 1928, and published in the *Government Gazette* on the 14th day of March, 1928, pages 955 and following, Regulations (now cited as "Electricity Supply and Construction Regulations") were made by the Governor in Council on the recommendation of the State Electricity Commission of Victoria for securing the adoption of such standards of plant and equipment and of system frequency and pressure for the generation, distribution, and supply of electricity as will admit of the efficient inter-connexion of electricity supply undertakings and inter-change of electricity throughout the same and generally the safe, economical, and effective supply of electricity throughout Victoria, and for securing the persons and property of the public from injury by fire or otherwise, and for other purposes: And whereas the aforesaid Regulations were amended by Order in Council made the 14th day of October, 1935, and published in the *Government Gazette* on the 16th day of October, 1935, and were further amended by Order in Council made the 2nd day of July, 1940, and published in the *Government Gazette* on the 3rd day of July, 1940; His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby, on the recommendation of the State Electricity Commission of Victoria, make further amendments and additions to the aforesaid Regulations in manner following, that is to say:—

DATE OF OPERATION.

1. These Regulations shall come into force on the date of publication thereof in the *Government Gazette*.

AMENDMENT AND ADDITION TO REGULATION 2.

2. Clause (ix) in Regulation 2 of the said Electricity Supply and Construction Regulations shall be deleted and the following clause substituted therefor:—

"(ix) *Earth Return*.—An earth return shall be used on an electric circuit only as provided in clause (xiii) of Regulation 2, except that on an electric circuit in a single-wire earth-return high-pressure alternating current system where the prior consent in writing of the Commission, setting out the conditions to be observed, has been obtained, an earth return may be used in accordance with those conditions."

AMENDMENT OF SPECIFICATION.

3. The Specification for Overhead Line Construction contained in Regulation 4 (Aerial Lines) of the said Electricity Supply and Construction Regulations shall be modified as follows:—

(1) *Clause (ii)—Supports*.—The third paragraph of this clause commencing "In urban areas" and terminating "on the anchor structure" shall be deleted.

(2) *Clause (iii)—Conductors*.—Clause (iii) shall be deleted and the following clause substituted therefor:—

"(iii) *Conductors*.

(a) Conductors shall be of hard-drawn copper, hard-drawn copper alloy, hard-drawn aluminium, steel-cored aluminium, galvanized steel, or such other metals or alloys or combinations of metals or alloys as the Commission approves for conductors for the purpose of these Regulations.

(b) Where a galvanized steel conductor is used, it may be either a stranded conductor, or a solid conductor, not less than 0.160 inch in diameter. Where a conductor of any other metal or combination of metals is used, it shall be stranded.

- (c) Conductors shall be capable of withstanding any stresses to which they are likely to be subjected, including stresses caused by wind pressure calculated in accordance with these Regulations.
- (d) The ultimate tensile strength of any conductor having a voltage to earth of 650 volts or less shall be not less than 700 lb.
- (e) The ultimate tensile strength of any conductor having a voltage to earth exceeding 650 volts shall be not less than 1,250 lb.
- (f) The normal current to be conveyed by any conductor shall not cause it to be so heated as to cause a reduction in the clearances specified in these Regulations, or the annealing of the metal of the conductor.
- (g) Intra-span joints shall have an ultimate tensile strength of not less than 90 per cent. of that of the conductor which they join and shall have conductivity not less than that of the conductor."

(3) *Clause (vii)—Spacing of Conductors.*—The note at foot of table (reading—"NOTE: For unreinforced aluminium cable, spacings shall be increased 50 per cent. beyond those of the preceding table.") shall be deleted.

(4) *Clause (xii)—Angle of Crossing Thoroughfares.*—Clause (xii) shall be deleted.

THE APSLEY ELECTRIC LIGHTING ORDER No. 297—1956.—AMENDMENT TO TARIFF.

WHEREAS on the 10th day of July, 1956, Leslie Malcolm Brooksby, of Apsley, in the State of Victoria, was granted an Order in Council, under the *Electric Light and Power Act 1928*, cited as the *Apsley Electric Lighting Order No. 297—1956* (hereinafter called "the said Order"), authorizing him to supply electricity within an area comprising all that land contained within a circle of three-quarters of a mile radius the centre being at the post office at Apsley, for a period of ten years, commencing on the 10th day of July, 1956: And whereas the aforesaid Leslie Malcolm Brooksby has made application to have an amendment made to the Fourth Schedule annexed to the said Order to vary the maximum rates which may be charged for electricity supplied: Now therefore His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, acting pursuant to the provisions of section 13 of the *Electric Light and Power Act 1928*, doth hereby vary the maximum rates set forth in the said Order by substituting the following section for section 1 of the Fourth Schedule thereto, that is to say:—

SECTION 1.

Where the undertakers charge any consumer by the electrical quantity supplied to him, they shall be entitled to charge him at the following rates:—

For electricity supplied—
First 15 units per month .. 1s. 9d. per unit.
All over 15 units per month .. 1s. 0d. per unit.

And the foregoing amendment shall be effective as from the date on which the Governor in Council approves of such amendment.

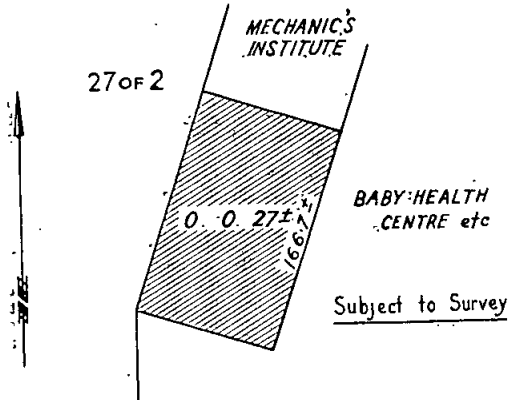

REGULATIONS FOR THE CARE, PROTECTION AND MANAGEMENT OF THE "BENALLA RECREATION RESERVE."

WHEREAS by section 181 of the *Land Act 1928* as re-enacted by section 9 of the *Land Act 1941*, power is given to the Board of Land and Works to make Regulations in respect of the care, protection and management of any Crown land which has been reserved under the Land Acts for any public purpose whatsoever, and which has not been conveyed to or vested in trustees, and for the further purposes as enacted: Now therefore the Board of Land and Works, in pursuance of the power conferred as aforesaid, doth hereby make the following Regulations in respect of the land in the Township of Benalla, temporarily reserved by Order in Council of the 2nd April, 1957, as a site for Public Recreation together with the abutting permanent reservation along the Broken River, both areas together known as the Benalla Recreation Reserve, hereinafter referred to as the "Reserve."

REGULATIONS.

1. The Reserve shall be open to the public from sunrise to sunset free of charge, except on such days (not exceeding twenty-four in any one year) as the Reserve may be set apart for cricket or football matches, fêtes, sports, or holiday amusements, on any of which occasions a sum not exceeding Seven shillings and six pence (7s. 6d.) may be taken and charged for the admission of every adult to the Reserve, and for admission to any grandstand or enclosure in the Reserve a further sum of Two shillings and six pence for every adult.
2. No person shall enter or remain in the Reserve who may offend against decency as regards dress, language, or conduct.
3. No person shall damage in any way the trees, shrubs, or flowers in the Reserve, nor shall fires be lighted therein. No minor games to be played outside the area allotted for the specific purpose.
4. No person shall climb or jump over the gates or fences in or around the Reserve, stick bills thereon, or cut names on, or in any way damage or injure any of the buildings, gates, fences, seats, or trees, in the Reserve; nor leave or deposit any glass, paper, or rubbish; nor roll or throw stones or any missiles of any kind therein.
5. No person shall put in the Reserve any cattle, horses, sheep, goats, pigs, or other animals without the permission, in writing, of the Committee of Management first obtained. Any person obtaining permission to graze cows on the Reserve shall obtain chains and tags, pay agistment at the rate of 2s. per week for the first cow, and 2s. 6d. per week for each additional cow and 2s. 6d. for each chain and tag. Provided always that the moneys received for agistment shall be expended in the maintenance and improvement of the Reserve, and that an account thereof shall be forwarded annually to the Department of Crown Lands and Survey.
6. No person shall bring into the Reserve any dog, unless controlled by a leash.

7. No person shall camp in the Reserve, nor erect therein any building, nor any booth, or other structure for the purpose of offering for sale any article, without the permission, in writing, of the Committee of Management first obtained.

8. No person shall conduct any public entertainment of any sort in the Reserve without the permission, in writing, of the Committee of Management first obtained.

9. No person shall spit or expectorate on the paths or in any structure or erection in the Reserve.

10. No person shall bet in any part of the Reserve, and every person infringing this Regulation shall be liable to expulsion from the enclosures and Reserve.

11. No person shall play, practice or engage in any sport within the Reserve on Sundays without the permission, in writing, of the Committee of Management first obtained.

12. Persons renting or hiring any stand, building, erection, or enclosure on the occasions of any fetes, sports, or holiday amusements may be required to deposit any sum which the Committee of Management may at any time determine not exceeding Ten pounds (£10), by way of guarantee that due care shall be taken of such stand, building, erection, or enclosure, and such Committee, in its absolute discretion may make good any damage or injury sustained by such stand, building, erection, or enclosure, or anything contained therein, during such occupancy or hiring, and deduct the cost of making good such loss or damage from the sum of money deposited by way of guarantee, and all persons so renting or hiring shall abide by these Regulations and by any order given by the Committee of Management.

13. The Committee of Management may set apart any portion of the Reserve for the purpose of any lawful game or sports, and from time to time grant to any club or association of clubs upon such terms and conditions as the Committee of Management may deem to be consistent with these Regulations, the use of the grounds so set apart.

14. The amount to be paid by way of rental for the use of the enclosure and buildings in the Reserve by any person or club granted permission to conduct any public entertainment, sports, fetes, or holiday amusements shall be at the rate of Ten pounds per centum of the gross receipts for admission to the entertainment, sports, fetes, or holiday amusements, and Ten pounds per centum of the value of all tickets issued for admission to the entertainments, sports, fetes, or holiday amusements.

15. No person, except workmen and labourers employed in the Reserve, shall enter any plots for plantations for young trees, or shrubs, or flowers.

16. No person or persons shall park a motor car or motor cycle within the Reserve, except at such parking areas as are set apart by the Committee of Management for that purpose, and every person using such parking areas shall, on demand, pay a fee not exceeding Three shillings per motor car or motor cycle per day for entrance to and use thereof of such days as a charge is being made for admission as provided in clause 1.

17. All fees payable and received in accordance with these Regulations shall be expended in the maintenance, upkeep, and improvement of the Reserve, and an account thereof furnished annually to the Department of Lands and Survey.—(Corres. Rs.804.)

Every person who contravenes or fails to comply with these Regulations shall, in accordance with the provisions of section 181 of the *Land Act 1928*, as re-enacted by section 9 of the *Land Act 1941*, for each offence be liable to a penalty of not more than Five pounds and every person who contravenes or fails to comply with any such Regulation, and who, after he has been warned by any bailiff or member of the Police Force, does not desist therefrom may be forthwith apprehended by such bailiff or member of the Police Force and taken before some justice to be dealt with according to law and shall be liable to a penalty of not more than Ten pounds.

The Reserve has been placed under the control of the Committee of Management with power and authority to enforce the foregoing Regulations and Survey.

"82. (1) Where an officer of the Supervisory Staff of the Government Printing Office is assigned by the Government Printer to perform the duties of a position

higher than that in which he is classified for a period of at least one day, such officer shall be paid an allowance to increase his remuneration to the yearly rate of salary of the higher position, but the allowance shall not in any case be less than at the rate of £13 a year.

(2) Where an officer of the General Staff of the Government Printing Office is assigned by the Government Printer to perform the duties of a position on the Supervisory Staff for a period of at least one hour, such officer shall be paid an allowance to increase his yearly rate of salary plus the service increments to which he is entitled to the yearly rate of salary of the higher office.

(3) Where an officer of the General Staff of the Government Printing Office is assigned by the Government Printer to perform the duties of a position on the General Staff higher than that in which he is classified for a period of at least one hour, he shall be paid an allowance equal to the difference between the yearly rate of salary of the higher position and the officer's salary exclusive of any service increments to which the officer is entitled, but the allowance shall not in any case be less than at the rate of £13 a year.

This sub-regulation shall apply, *mutatis mutandis*, to employees of the Government Printing Office.

(4) The payment of a higher duties allowance to any officer of the Supervisory Staff or the General Staff under this Regulation shall not continue for a period longer than one month without the approval of the Public Service Board.

(5) Nothing in the foregoing shall affect the application of sub-regulations (2) to (8) of Regulation 81 to any officer to whom this Regulation applies.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Local Government Act 1946*, and every other power thereunto enabling, the President, Councillors and Ratepayers of the Shire of Warracknabeal order as follows:—

1. By-law No. 25 is hereby repealed.

2. No person shall sell any goods from stalls motor cars carts trucks barrows boxes baskets crates bags or other vehicles or receptacles standing or placed on any street road or public place as set forth in Schedule "A" hereunder.

3. No person shall without consent of the Council—

(a) erect or use on any land within the Township of Warracknabeal tents or other temporary structures or buildings for the sale of goods therein or therefrom, or

(b) sell goods in or from such tents structures or buildings.

4. No person shall sell any goods from any stall motor car cart truck barrow or other vehicle, box basket crate bag or other receptacle standing or placed on vacant land (not being Crown land or land under the care and management of the municipality or a public place within the meaning of section 3 of the *Police Offences Act 1928*) within the areas set forth in Schedule "B" hereunder.

5. The prohibitions contained in clauses 2 and 4 of this By-law shall not apply to fêtes, carnivals, or bazaars or other functions (to be approved by the Council of the Shire of Warracknabeal) for charitable purposes or for assisting any church, Sunday school, religious organization, returned servicemen's or servicewomen's organization, boy scout or girl guide organization, school committee, or for the purposes of any hospital auxiliary or for the purposes of any other organization, body, or society approved by the Council.

Any person who is guilty of any act of default in contravention of the provisions of this By-law shall be liable, on conviction, in the case of a first offence to a penalty of not less than £2 and not exceeding £20, and for every subsequent offence to a penalty of not less than £5 and not exceeding £20.
