### REWARD

The co-operation of the general public is sought with a view to establishing the identity of the person or persons responsible for the murder of Allison Rooke, 59 years, whose body was found in bushland off McClelland Drive, Frankston, on 5 July 1980.

A reward of fifty thousand dollars (\$50 000) will be paid at the discretion of the Chief Commissioner of Police by the Government of Victoria, for information leading to the apprehension and conviction of the person or persons responsible for the murder.

## DATE OF COMING INTO OPERATION IN PART

### PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

Whereas by an Act of Parliament of the State of Victoria passed in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of Her Majesty Elizabeth the Second, Queen of Australia, entitled the *Town and Country Planning (Amalgamation) Act 1980*, it is amongst other things enacted that Parts III, IV and V of the said Act shall come into operation on a day to be fixed by Proclamation of the Governor in Council published in the *Government Gazette*.

Now therefore I, the Governor of the State of Victoria in the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State do by this Proclamation fix 2 February 1981, as the second commencement day on which Parts III, IV and V. of the *Town and Country Planning (Amalgamation) Act 1980, No. 9425*, shall come into operation.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the State of Victoria aforesaid, at Melbourne, this twenty-eighth day of January, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and eighty-one and in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of Her Majesty Elizabeth the Second, Queen of Australia.
