By His Excellency Lieutenant-General Sir Richard Bourke, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Military Order of the Bath, Captain General and Governor in Chief of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, with the Advice of the Legislative Council.

*"An Act for applying certain Sums arising from the Revenue receivable in New South Wales, to the Service thereof, for the Year One thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight; and for further Appropriating the said Revenue."*

**W**HEREAS, by a certain Act of Parliament passed in the Ninth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to provide for the Administration of Justice in New South Wales and Van Diemen's Land, and for the more effectual Government thereof, and for other Purposes relating thereto;" it was amongst other things enacted, That all and every the Powers and Authorities vested by certain other Acts of Parliament therein referred to, or either of them, in the Governor of New South Wales, or the Person administering the Government thereof, should thenceforth be vested in and exercised by the said Governor, acting with the Advice and Consent of the Legislative Council of the said Colony; and that the produce of the several duties imposed and made payable under and by virtue of the said recited Acts therein referred to, and also under and by virtue of that Act, should be applied in such manner and to such purposes as the said Governor and Council should from time to time by any Law or Ordinance appoint: Be it therefore enacted by His Excellency the Governor of New South Wales, with the Advice and Consent of the

Legislative Council thereof, that out of the excess of the amount appropriated out of the produce of the said duties, for the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, there shall and may be issued and applied any sum or sums of money not exceeding nine thousand one hundred and fourteen pounds nineteen shillings and tenpence, to supply the deficiencies in the amount appropriated for certain Departments for that year.

*(There shall be issued and applied £48,913 18s. 3d. for the supplementary expenditure of 1837.)*

**II.** And be it enacted, that out of the produce of the said duties, there shall and may be issued and applied any sum or sums of money not exceeding forty-eight thousand nine hundred and thirteen pounds eighteen shillings and threepence, to defray the Supplementary Charge for the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-seven, as hereinafter more particularly expressed; that is to say, any sum or sums of money not exceeding seven hundred pounds, to defray the expense of the increased salaries to Clerks in the several Public Departments, for the period from the First July to Thirty-first December of the said year; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding two hundred and seventy pounds one shilling and eightpence, to defray the supplementary expense of the Colonial Architect and Surveyor of Buildings; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one thousand six hundred and four pounds seven shillings and sixpence, to defray the supplementary expense of the Department of the Customs; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding nine hundred and thirty-nine pounds seven shillings and sixpence, to defray the supplementary expense of the Postmaster-General's Department; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding eighty-seven pounds ten shillings, to defray the supplementary expense of the Department of the Harbour Master, Sydney; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding seven hundred and forty-seven pounds two shillings, to defray the expense of the Department of the Co-

lonial Storekeeper, for the period from First July, to Thirty-first December of the said year; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding three hundred and eighty pounds, to defray the expense of the Custody and Issue of Stores to Public Departments, from First January to Thirtieth June of the said year; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one hundred and seventy-five pounds, to defray the supplementary expense of the Surveyor-General's Department; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding two thousand five hundred and fifty-seven pounds and twelve shillings, to defray the supplementary expense of the Town Surveyor's Department; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding two thousand pounds, towards defraying the expense of bringing water into the town of Sydney; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding three hundred pounds, to defray the expense of the increase to the salary of the Crown Solicitor, from First January of the said year; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding four hundred and seventy-five pounds, to defray the supplementary expense of Courts of Quarter Sessions; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one thousand two hundred and nineteen pounds, to defray the supplementary expense of the Police Establishments in the said Colony; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding two hundred and five pounds three shillings and elevenpence, to defray the supplementary expense of the Gaol Establishments in the said Colony; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding eight thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine pounds two shillings and tenpence, to defray the expense of compensations in lieu of Grants of Land to Clergymen of the Church of England and their Families; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one hundred and fifty pounds, to defray the expense of one year's salary to the Clerk of the late Church and School Corporation, on the reduction of that establishment; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding five hundred pounds, towards defraying the expense of erecting a dwelling at Goulburn, for the residence of the Clergyman of the Church of England, in fulfilment of a promise made previously to the passing of the Act of Council, seventh William the Fourth, number three; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding two hundred and fifty pounds, in sums not exceeding the amount of private contributions, towards defraying the expense of erecting a chancel to St. Peter's Church, Campbelltown; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding fifty pounds, towards defraying the travelling expenses of the Presbyterian Clergy; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one hundred and fifty pounds, to defray the expense of an increase of fifty pounds each, to the salaries of three Presbyterian Ministers; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one hundred and fifty pounds, to defray the expense of the outfit and passage to the said Colony of the Reverend Mr. Gunther and his family; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding three hundred and three pounds ten shillings and threepence, in aid of private contributions to the same amount for the Sydney Dispensary; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one hundred and fifty two pounds four shillings and sixpence, in aid of private contributions to the like amount for the Australian

School Society; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding twenty-five pounds eighteen shillings and eightpence, in aid of the same amount raised by private contributions for the Wesleyan Sunday Schools; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one thousand pounds, to defray the expense of casual repairs to Government Houses, Courts of Justice, and other Colonial Public Buildings; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding eight hundred pounds, to defray the expense of furniture for Government Houses and Public Offices; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding eight hundred pounds, to defray the expense of additional fencing and painting in Hyde Park, and repairs and work in the outer Domain; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding three hundred and fifty pounds, to defray the expense of erecting a new signal-house, and fencing in the light-house at the South Head of Port Jackson; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding three hundred and fifty pounds, to defray the expense of erecting two obelisks as beacons to vessels entering Sydney harbour; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding three hundred pounds, to defray the expense of repairs to the residence of the Colonial Botanist; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding two hundred pounds, to defray the expense of enclosing the out-houses attached to the Supreme Court-House, Hyde Park, and covering a passage to the same for the use of the Judges; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding two thousand five hundred pounds, to defray the expense of additions to and alterations in the Police-offices, Sydney; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding seven hundred and fifty pounds, to defray the expense of erecting a police-station-house on Goat Island; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding three hundred pounds, to defray the expense of converting the old Sydney toll-house into a watch-house, and building two strong rooms and a wall enclosure; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one thousand five hundred and ten pounds, to defray the expense of completing the Court-house at Berrima; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding five hundred pounds, towards defraying the expense of erecting a new Court-house at Liverpool; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding seven hundred and ninety-six pounds, to defray the expense of erecting a Watch-house at Concord; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding seven hundred and seventy-five pounds, to defray the expense of erecting a Watch-house at Kissing-point; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding five hundred and forty pounds, to defray the expense of erecting a Watch-house on the Windsor Road; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding five hundred and forty pounds, to defray the expense of erecting a Watch-house at Maitland; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one thousand pounds, towards defraying the expense of erecting a Court and Watch-house at Parramatta; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding five hundred pounds, towards defraying the expense of erecting a Court and Watch-house at Newcastle; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding three hundred pounds, towards defraying the expense of erecting Court and Watch-houses at Yass, the Vale of Clwyd, and Patrick's Plains; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding three thousand five

expense of erecting a Gaol at Berrima; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding three hundred and fifty pounds, to defray the expense of constructing solitary cells at Yass; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding three hundred and fifty pounds, to defray the expense of constructing solitary cells at the Vale of Clwyd; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding three hundred and fifty pounds, to defray the expense of constructing solitary cells at Braidwood; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one hundred pounds, to defray the expense of erecting a tomb over the remains of the sufferers by the "Charles Eaton;" and any sum or sums of money not exceeding two hundred and fifty pounds, to defray the expense of repairing the wall of the Cemetery in George-street, Sydney; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding seven thousand nine hundred sixty-one pounds seventeen shillings and fivepence, to defray the expenses unprovided for by previous Votes of Council, for disbursements made by the Colonial Agent-General, on account of the Colony of New South Wales, from first January, One thousand eight hundred and thirty-two, to thirty-first December, One thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, inclusive.

*(There shall be issued and applied £36,579 12s. 1d. for the Civil Establishment for 1838.)*

III. And be it enacted, that out of the produce of the said duties, there shall and may be issued and applied any sum or sums of money not exceeding thirty-six thousand five hundred and seventy-nine pounds twelve shillings and one penny, for defraying the charge of the Civil Establishment of New South Wales, for the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight, as hereinafter more particularly expressed; that is to say, any sum or sums of money not exceeding three hundred and thirty-one pounds eighteen shillings and ninepence, to defray the expenses of the establishment of His Excellency the Governor; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding eight hundred and ninety-two pounds twelve shillings and sixpence, to defray the salaries of the officers, and the contingent expenses of the department of the Executive and Legislative Councils; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding five thousand three hundred and seventeen pounds two shillings and elevenpence, to defray the salaries of the officers, and the contingent expenses of the Department of the Colonial Secretary; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one thousand seven hundred and sixty-four pounds eight shillings and ninepence, to defray the salaries of the officers, and the contingent expenses of the Department of the Colonial Architect and Surveyor of Buildings; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding three hundred and fifty pounds twelve shillings and sixpence, to defray the salaries of the officers, and the contingent expenses of the department of the Commissioner for the Assigment of Convict Servants; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding three thousand six hundred and twenty-five pounds eleven shillings and eightpence, to defray the salaries of the officers, and the contingent expenses of the Department of the Colonial Treasurer, into which that of Collector of Internal Revenue, estimated for in former years, merged on the first day of January, one thousand eight

hundred and thirty-eight; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five pounds eight shillings and ninepence, to defray the salaries of the officers, and the contingent expenses of the Auditor-General's department; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding seven thousand six hundred and twenty-five pounds and fivepence, to defray the salaries of the officers and men, and the contingent expenses of the Department of Customs, Sydney; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding four hundred and ninety-three pounds seven shillings and elevenpence, to defray the salaries of the officers and men, and the contingent expenses of the Department of the Customs, Newcastle; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding six hundred and thirty-five pounds, ten shillings, to defray the salaries of the officers and men, and the contingent expenses of the Department of the Customs, Port Phillip; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding six thousand three hundred and twelve pounds six shillings and threepence, to defray the salaries of the officers, and the contingent expenses of the Department of the Postmaster-General; and any sum or sums of money, not exceeding three hundred pounds, to defray the salary of the Surveyor of the Colonial Distilleries; and any sum or sums of money, not exceeding two hundred pounds, to defray the salary of the Inspector of Slaughter Houses, for the district of Sydney; and any sum or sums of money, not exceeding one thousand two hundred and fourteen pounds three shillings and fourpence, to defray the salaries of the officers and men, and the contingent expenses of the Department of the Colonial Botanist; and any sum or sums of money, not exceeding nine hundred and two pounds eighteen shillings and fourpence, to defray the salaries of the superintendent and men, and the contingent expenses of the Government Domain, Parramatta; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one thousand two hundred and seventy-one pounds fifteen shillings, to defray the salaries of the officers and men, and the contingent expenses of the Department of the Harbour-Master at Sydney, Newcastle, and Port Macquarie; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding three hundred and forty-six pounds, to defray the expense of the Light-house at the South Head of Port Jackson; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding three hundred and eighty-two pounds thirteen shillings and fourpence, to defray the expense of the Floating-light Vessel at the Reef near the Heads of Port Jackson; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one hundred and four pounds thirteen shillings and ninepence, to defray the expense of the Beacon Light at Newcastle; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding two hundred and forty-four pounds, to defray the expense of the Telegraph Stations; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one thousand two hundred and nineteen pounds seven shillings and elevenpence, to defray the salaries of the officers and men, and the contingent expenses of the Department of the Colonial Storekeeper; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding two hundred pounds; towards the support of the Australian Museum; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding nine hundred and fifty pounds, to defray the salaries of the Colonial Agent-General, and of the British Resident at New Zealand, and the

expense of donations of provisions and clothing to New Zealand chiefs and natives.

*(There shall be issued and applied £65,158 1s. 3d. for the Departments of Survey and Public Works for the year 1838.)*

IV. And be it enacted, that out of the produce of the said duties, there shall and may be issued and applied any sum or sums of money not exceeding sixty-five thousand one hundred and fifty-eight pounds one shilling and threepence to defray the charge of the departments of Survey and Public Works, for the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight, as hereinafter more particularly expressed; that is to say, any sum or sums of money not exceeding sixteen thousand one hundred and eight pounds seventeen shillings and sixpence, to defray the salaries of the officers and men, and the contingent expenses of the Surveyor General's Department; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding eight thousand four hundred and forty-two pounds eleven shillings and threepence, to defray the salaries of the officers and men, and the contingent expenses of the Town Surveyor's Department; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding twenty-eight thousand eight hundred and thirty-three pounds twelve shillings and sixpence, to defray the salaries of the officers and men, and the contingent expenses of the Road Branch of the Colonial Royal Engineer's Department; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one thousand and eighty-seven pounds and five shillings, towards completing the Break-water at Newcastle; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding six hundred and eighty-five pounds and fifteen shillings, towards completing the clearing of the Parramatta River; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding five thousand pounds, towards the expense of constructing a circular Quay at the head of Sydney Cove; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding five thousand pounds, towards defraying the expense of conducting Water into the Town of Sydney, and forming an embankment at the head of the Tunnel.

*(There shall be issued and applied £22,174 16s. 8d. for the Judicial Establishment for 1838.)*

V. And be it enacted, that out of the produce of the said duties, there shall and may be issued and applied any sum or sums of money not exceeding twenty-two thousand one hundred and seventy-four pounds sixteen shillings and eightpence, to defray the charge of the Judicial Establishment of the said Colony, for the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight, as hereinafter more particularly expressed; that is to say, any sum or sums of money not exceeding seven thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight pounds one shilling and eightpence, to defray the salaries of the officers and the contingent expenses of the Supreme Court, and of witnesses and jurors attending the same; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding three thousand two hundred and thirty-three pounds seventeen shillings and sixpence, to defray the salaries and the contingent expenses of the law officers of the Crown; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding two thousand nine hundred and six pounds eighteen shillings and ninepence, to defray the salaries and allowances to the officers and the contingent expenses of the Courts of Requests; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding four thousand three

hundred and twenty-six pounds, to defray the salaries and allowances to the officers and the contingent expenses of the Courts of Quarter Sessions; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding two thousand four hundred and ninety-nine pounds eighteen shillings and ninepence, to defray the salaries and allowances to the officers and the contingent expenses of the department of the Sheriff; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one thousand three hundred and fifty pounds, to defray the salaries of Coroners and the contingent expenses of inquests.

*(There shall be issued and applied £52,344 3s. 4d. for the Police and Gaol Establishments for 1838.)*

VI. And be it enacted, that out of the produce of the said duties, there shall and may be issued and applied any sum or sums of money not exceeding fifty-two thousand three hundred and forty-four pounds three shillings and fourpence, to defray the charge of the Police and Gaol Establishments of New South Wales, for the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight, as hereinafter more particularly expressed; that is to say, any sum or sums of money not exceeding fourteen thousand two hundred and fifty pounds, to defray the salaries of the officers and men, and the contingent expenses of the Police Establishment for the town of Sydney; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding twenty-six thousand seven hundred and one pounds ten shillings and fivepence, to defray the salaries of the officers and men, and the contingent expenses of the Police Establishments in Country Districts; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding four thousand two hundred and thirty-seven pounds two shillings and sixpence, to defray the salaries of the officers and men, and the contingent expenses of the Gaol Establishment in the town of Sydney; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding six hundred and twenty-two pounds eighteen shillings and ninepence, to defray the salaries of the officers and men, and the contingent expenses of the Debtors' Prison in the town of Sydney; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding six thousand five hundred and thirty-two pounds eleven shillings and eightpence, to defray the salaries of the officers and men, and the contingent expenses of the Gaol Establishments in the Country Districts.

*(There shall be issued and applied £18,820 for the Church Establishments for 1838.)*

VII. And be it enacted, that out of the produce of the said duties, there shall and may be issued and applied any sum or sums of money not exceeding eighteen thousand eight hundred and twenty pounds, to defray the charge of the Church Establishments of the Colony, for the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight, as hereinafter more particularly expressed; that is to say, any sum or sums of money not exceeding twelve thousand five hundred and seventy pounds, to defray the salaries, allowances, and the contingent expenses of the Episcopalian Clergy and Churches; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one thousand three hundred and fifty pounds, to defray the salaries of the Presbyterian Clergy; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding three thousand five hundred pounds, to defray the salaries and allowances of the Roman Catholic Clergy, and towards the erection of additional chapels and

minister's dwellings; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one thousand four hundred pounds, to defray the expense of the outfit and passage of chaplains expected to arrive in the said year.

*(There shall be issued and applied £9,916 3s. 6d. for the School Establishments for 1838.)*

VIII. And be it enacted, that out of the produce of the said duties, there shall and may be issued and applied any sum or sums of money not exceeding nine thousand nine hundred and sixteen pounds three shillings and sixpence, to defray the charge of the School Establishments of the Colony, for the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight, as hereinafter more particularly expressed; that is to say, any sum or sums of money not exceeding three thousand five hundred and sixty-five pounds, to defray the expense of the Male Orphan School; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding two thousand four hundred and fifty-one pounds three shillings and sixpence, to defray the expense of the Female Orphan School; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding three thousand one hundred and fifty pounds, to defray the expense of the Parochial Schools; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding seven hundred and fifty pounds, to defray the expense of the Roman Catholic Schools.

*(There shall be issued and applied £828 5s. for Pensions for 1838.)*

IX. And be it enacted, that out of the produce of the said duties, there shall and may be issued and applied any sum or sums of money not exceeding eight hundred and twenty-eight pounds and five shillings, to defray the Pensions to retired Officers and Widows, chargeable upon the funds of the Colony, for the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight.

*(There shall be issued and applied £52,226 5s. for Miscellaneous Services for 1838.)*

X. And be it enacted, that out of the produce of the said duties, there shall and may be issued and applied any sum or sums of money not exceeding fifty-two thousand two hundred and twenty-six pounds and five shillings, to defray the charge for Miscellaneous Services of the said Colony, for the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight, as hereinafter more particularly expressed; that is to say, any sum or sums of money not exceeding two thousand five hundred pounds, to defray the expense of Stationery, Printing, Bookbinding, Gazettes, and Almanacs for the several public departments of the said Colony; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding three hundred pounds, to defray the expense of Fuel and Light for the said public departments; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding thirteen thousand pounds, to defray the amount of Drawbacks of Duties paid on goods, wares, and merchandise, imported into the said colony, upon the exportation of the said goods, wares, and merchandise, and to meet the restitution of the Duty on Spirits supplied to His Majesty's troops in the interior of the said colony; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding six hundred pounds, to defray the expenses of the Commission for hearing and determining on Claims to Grants of Land; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding three hundred and eighty pounds, to

defray the expense of the management of the Church and School Estates; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding ninety-one pounds and five shillings, to defray the expense of Forage Allowance to the Military Commandants at Parramatta and Bathurst; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one thousand five hundred pounds, in aid of the Mission by the Church Missionary Society to the Aboriginal inhabitants of New Holland, and to defray the expense of donations of provisions, clothing, and blankets to the same; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding six hundred pounds, towards the support of destitute Roman Catholic children; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding two hundred pounds, towards the support of the Sydney School of Arts; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding two thousand pounds, to defray the expense of casual repairs to government houses, courts of justice, and other colonial public buildings; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one thousand pounds, to defray the expense of furniture for government houses and the several public offices; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding two hundred and fifty pounds, to defray the expense of the rent of the house in Macquarie Place, occupied as public offices; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding five hundred pounds, to defray the expense of lighting the public lamps in the town of Sydney; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one hundred and five pounds, to defray the expense of firemen to work the engines in Sydney, when required; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding five thousand pounds, to defray, in part, the expense of building a new government-house at Sydney; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding four thousand pounds, to defray the expense of building a public library and museum in the town of Sydney; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding two thousand pounds, to defray the expense of completing the Lunatic Asylum at Tarban Creek; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one thousand five hundred pounds, to defray the expense of completing a Court and Watch-house at Parramatta; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one thousand five hundred pounds, to defray the expense of completing a Court and Watch-house at Newcastle; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one thousand pounds, to defray the expense of completing the New Court-house at Liverpool; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one thousand four hundred and fifty pounds, to defray the expense of building a Court-house at Braidwood; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding seven hundred and fifty pounds, to defray the expense of building a Watch-house at Green Hills; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding four thousand pounds, towards building the Gaol at Parramatta; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding four thousand pounds, towards building the Gaol at Berrima; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding four thousand pounds, to meet unforeseen expenses, on occasions of emergency.

*(Treasurer to pay the above at such times as the Governor by warrant shall order.)*

XI. And be it enacted, that the Treasurer of the said Colony shall issue and pay the said several

sums to such persons for the purposes hereinbefore mentioned, upon such days, and in such proportions, as the Governor, for the time-being, by any warrant or order in writing to be signed by him, shall from time to time order and direct; and that the payments so to be made, shall be charged upon and payable out of the revenues of the said Colony.

(And to receive credit in his accounts for the payments made in pursuance thereof.)

XII. And be it enacted, that the said Treasurer shall in his accounts from time to time, be allowed credit for any sum or sums of money paid by him in pursuance of such warrant, or order in writing as aforesaid; and that the receipt or receipts of the respective persons to whom the same shall be so paid, shall be a full and valid discharge to the said Treasurer in passing his said accounts, for any such sum or sums as shall be therein mentioned; and that he shall and do receive credit for the same accordingly.
