THE GOVERNOR directs it to be notified that, by desire of His Majesty's Government, as intimated to His Excellency in a recent Despatch from the Secretary of State, the Bounty granted under the Government Notices of the 28th of October, 1835, and 25th of September, 1837, is not, in future, to be considered as extending to Emigrants from Foreign Countries.

IS Excellency the GOVERNOR has directed L it to be notified that His Majesty's Government has been pleased to extend to the Retired Officers of the East India Company's Navy a participation in the advantages accorded to Officers having served in the British Army and Navy, in regard to the purchase of Land in the Australian Colonies, as laid down in the Notice issued from the Office of the Secretary of State on the 15th August, 1834, which is republished hereunder.

The Officers of the East India Company's Navy will be allowed the indulgence in question on producing to this Government the necessary certificates of their rank and length of service, signed by competent authorities.

(COPY.) Information for the use of Military and Naval Officers, proposing to Settle in the British Colonies.

COLONIAL OFFICE, 15th August, 1834.

1. Annexed is a statement of the Regulations, according to which, with such modifications as belonging to the Crown are disposed of in the of absence from the Admiralty.

several British Colonies in North America, as well as a statement of the Regulations in force in the Australian Colonies.

2. Under these Regulations, Military and Naval Officers cannot receive Free Grants of Land; but, in buying Land, they are allowed a remission of the Purchase-money, according to the undermentioned scale:-

Field Officers of twenty-five years' service and upwards, in the whole, £300.

Field Officers of twenty years' service and upwards, in the whole, £250.

Field Officers of fifteen or less years' service, in the whole, £200.

Captains of twenty years' service and upwards, in the whole, £200.

Captains of fifteen years' service or less, in the whole, £150.

Subalterns of twenty years' service and upwards, in the whole, £150.

Subalterns of seven years' service, or less, in the whole, £100.

Regimental Staff Officers, and Medical Officers of the Army and Navy will be deemed to come within the benefit of this Rule.

3. Officers of the Army and Navy who propose to proceed to the Colonies, in order to take advantage of this indulgence, should provide themselves with Certificates from the Office of the General Commanding-in-Chief, or of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, shewing that their Emigration has been sanctioned, and stating exactly their rank and length of Service. No document from the Office of the Secretary of State is neces-

sary 4. Officers on Half-pay, residing in the Colony where they propose to settle, may be admitted to the privileges of Military and Naval Settlers, without referring to this Country for Testimonials. provided they can satisfy the Governor that there is no objection to their being allowed the indulgence, and that their return of rank and length of service is accurate; and provided, if they belong local circumstances may render necessary, Lands to the Navy, that they produce their letter of leave 5. Military Chaplains, Commissariat Officers, and Officers of any of the Civil Departments, connected with the Army, cannot be allowed any privileges on the subject of Land. Pursers, Chaplains, Midshipmen, Warrant Officers of every description, and Officers of the Civil Departments connected with the Navy, must also be considered as not qualified for those privileges.

Although numbers of these classes may have been admitted formerly, and under a different state of circumstances, they must new be excluded.

6. Gentlemen who have ceased to belong to His Majesty's Service, cannot be allowed the advantages to which they were entitled, while in the Army or Navy. It is not, however, proposed to affect by this rule Officers who desire to quit the service for the express purpose of settling in the Colonies: it is only required, that when they resign their commissions, they should apply for a certificate from the General Commanding-in-Chief, or from the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that they do so with a view of emigrating; and such certificate, if produced to the Governor of any Colony, within one year from its date, but not otherwise, will be a sufficient warrant for allowing the bearer the same advantages as Officers still in His Majesty's Service.

Officers who have sold out within the last twelve months, preceding the date of this memorandum, will be allowed the usual privileges, notwithstanding their want of the certificate required by these Regulations, if they present themselves to the Governor of the Colony within a year from the present date; and all Officers who have already been recommended by the General Commanding-in-Chief will be entitled to their privileges, without regard to any obstruction which might otherwise be offered by the Regulations now established.

7. Officers cannot be allowed advantages in the acquisition of Land in any Colony, unless it be their intention to fix their residence in that Colony. In order to insure the observance of this rule, it has been determined that the Titles to Lands, obtained by Officers who take advantage of the peculiar Regulations existing in their favor, shall be withholden for a period sufficient to prove that they have not repaired to the Colony for the mere purpose of gaining possession of a portion of land and then departing.

Two years is the period for which it has been decided that the Titles shall be kept back: this delay will be sufficient for the salutary object in view, and will not constitute any serious incon-

venience to the bond fide Settler.

8. By the annexed Regulations for the disposal of Crown Lands, it will be observed that the General Sales will take place periodically; but in order to prevent inconvenience to Officers who may arrive in the intervals between those Sales, and be desirous at once to obtain an allotment, the Governors of the Colonies are authorised to allow Officers to acquire, at any time, on payment of the upset price, Lands which have previously been offered for sale at some General Sale and not been bought.

Officers will thus be relieved from delay at the time of establishing themselves in the Colony. They will also be enabled, by this arrangement, which will permit them to obtain their Land at a fixed price, to choose such a quantity as shall be exactly equivalent to the amount of the remission

5. 9. There being little or no Crown Land available in Prince Edward's Island, Officers cannot be offered any privileges in the acquisition of Land in that Colony. In Cape Breton, an Island in which the natural inducements for settlement of Officers are not very considerable, it is necessary, from local circumstances, that there should not be a remission of purchase money as in other Colonies; to such Officers as may wish to settle in this Island, Allotments of Land will be granted on the same Scale and Conditions as before the general introduction of the system of selling the Crown Lands, viz:—

NONVEYANCE being required for the Postoffice Mails, from and to the undermentioned places, for one or two years, (to be decided on opening the Tenders) from the 1st January, 1838; Persons disposed to Contract for providing the same are invited to transmit their offers, in writing, to this Office, before Twelve o'clock, on Monday, the 6th of November next, endorsed-"Tender for Conveyance of Mails."

From and to Windsor, Parrramatta, and Sydney, daily (Sundays excepted.)

From and to Windsor, Pitt Town, Wilberforce, Richmond, and North Richmond, three times a-week; and from and to Windsor and Wiseman's Ferry once a-week.

From and to Penrith and Parramatta, daily (Sundays excepted.)

From and to Penrith, Hassan's Walls, and Bathurst, two or three times a-week.

From and to Bathurst and O'Connell, twice a-week. From and to Campbelltown, Liverpool, and Sydney, daily (Sundays excepted.)

It is to be understood that the Mail is invariably to start on days as now, or hereafter to be fixed, and the Contractor to carry all bags or letters which may be delivered to him under authority of the Postmaster General, or any of the Postmasters.

Each Contractor will be bound under a penalty of £5, for each and every offence (over and above the penalties provided by the Act of Council) for the receipt or conveyance of any letter or packet by himself, or by any of his servants or passengers, to the prejudice of the Post-office Revenue.

It will be optional with the Parties offering, whether for one or more of the above line of stages to propose the mode of Conveyance; but on all roads where Mail-carriages can travel, a preference will be given to that mode of Conveyance; and the Contractors will be held strictly bound to use the Conveyance they propose, and to provide secure lockers and dry covering for the Mail-bags. Mail-carts drawn only by one horse, must not carry more than one passenger; by two horses, not more than three passengers; and by three or more horses, not more than six passengers, exclusive of the drivers, under a penalty for each offence of not less than £1 nor more than £5.

All vehicles and horses employed in the Conveyance of Mails, to be at all times subject to the inspection and approval, or rejection, of the Postmaster General, or person appointed for that purpose. The drivers and postmen to be free men, and of certified good character.

The Contractor will be liable to a fine of five shillings for every five minutes delay, after the specified time of starting.

The rate of travelling will not be less than six miles per hour, including all stoppages, under a penalty of five shillings for every ten minutes delay after the specified time of arrival.

All fines and penalties incurred under the agreement to be deducted by the Post-master General from the next quarterly payment falling due to the Contractor.

It is requested that each party Tendering, or an agent for him, will attend at this Office on the appointed day for opening the Tenders; and that each Tender may specify the names of two respectable and solvent persons, willing to enter into a bond with the Contractor for the safety of the Mails and the due performance of the Contract.

The hours of starting from each Post-office, and other particulars, may be ascertained at the General

Post-office, where parties proposing to Tender are invited to apply; and where also printed forms of

Tender may be obtained.

N.B .- Tenders for a three years' Contract for Conveyance of the Mails daily (Sundays excepted) -from and to Sydney and Windsor, Parramatta and Penrith, and Sydney and Campbelltown, will be entertained, if submitted, should parties consider it advisable thus to lengthen the term of their engagement to ensure a more complete establishment of carriages and horses.

Provisions and Forage being required by Rations, according to the scales under their respective heads, the Tenders are required to express the

IT is with extreme sorrow that His Excellency the Governor directs to be published, for general information, the following extract from a Despatch addressed to His Excellency, on the 21st June last, by the Right Honorable Lord Glenelg, Secretary of State for the Colonies.

"Downing-street, 21st June, 1837.

"SIR.

"It is with the greatest regret that I have to communicate to you the melancholy intelligence of the demise of His late Most Gracious Majesty KING WILLIAM THE FOURTH.

His Majesty expired at his Castle at Windsor, on the morning of the 20th instant, at twelve minutes past two o'clock, to the great affliction of the Royal Family, and of all classes of His Majesty's Subjects.

Her present Majesty was this day proclaimed QUEEN VICTORIA, with all the solemnities used on the like occasions."
