THIRTY POUNDS REWARD ;

A CONDITIONAL PARDON.

WHEREAS it has been represented to the Government that Serjeant James Fox, of the 80th Regiment, about eight o'clock in the morning of the 30th of December last, was attacked at a place called Lennox Bridge, between Emu Plains and the Pilgrim Inn, on Mitchell's Pass, by two armed men, (one of whom has been apprehended) having their faces covered with pieces of striped cotton cloth, and was robbed of money to a considerable amount ; and whereas a man named Thomas Williams (whose description is annexed) supposed to be the other offender, is still illegally at large :

Notice is hereby given, that a Reward of **THIRTY POUNDS** will be paid to any Person, if free, who will give such information as will lead to the apprehension and conviction of the said Thomas Williams, or if a Prisoner of the Crown, he will be recommended to Her Majesty for a **CONDITIONAL PARDON**.

General Remarks.—Nose cocked, rather larger than common, light sandy whiskers, original trade a Potter, he has been employed since he obtained his freedom as a sawyer, and was lately employed along with Stokes, by Mr. Henry Hall, of Emu Plains, in sawing timber for him in the Bush, about three miles from Lapstone Hill, Bathurst Road.

COURT OF CLAIMS.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the following CLAIMS for DEEDS of GRANT of Land and Town Allotments, will be ready for the examination of the Commissioners appointed for that purpose, under the Act of Council 5th William IV., No. 21, at the expiration of two months from this date; before which day any Caveat or Counter-claim must be entered at this Office. Due notice will be given of the days appointed for the hearings.

Case No. 198.—A. B. SPARK and SAMUEL ASHMORE, Esquires, Executors of GEORGE BALLARD VINE, deceased.

Two thousand five hundred and sixty acres, in the county of Argyle, parish unnamed, at *Cottle Wolley, Upper Wollondilly*, commencing on the Wollondilly River opposite to the north-west corner of Major D'Arcy's 2560 acres; and bounded on the north by a line bearing west 298 chains; on the west by a line bearing south 80 chains; on the south by a line bearing east to the Wollondilly River; and on the east by that river to the commencing point.

The above description of this land was advertised by the Colonial Secretary in the Gazette of 18th November, 1835, page 820, with a view to the preparation of a Deed of Grant in the name of the Promisee, G. B. Vine, but, he being deceased, a Deed is now claimed by the Executors.

Case No. 199.—THOMAS EVERNDEN, Esq., J. P., of Bathurst.

Ninety acres, in the county of Bathurst, parish of Bathurst, allotment No. 19; bounded on the north by allotment No. 18 east 78 chains from the Vale Creek; on the east by part of Calp's allotment south 11 chains; on the south by a west line 89 chains to the Vale Creek; and on the west by that Creek.

This land was located in pursuance of an Order issued by Governor Darling, of date 17th November, 1830, in favor of Edward White, deceased, who, it is alleged, sold to claimant.

Case No. 200.—WILLIAM COX, Esq., of Hobart Ville, Richmond.

Two thousand five hundred and sixty acres, in the county of Brisbane, parish of Ellis, at *Upper Hunter*; bounded on the south by a line west 181 chains, commencing on Hunter's River, and forming part of the northern boundary of F. Allman's 2560 acres; on the west by a line north 160 chains; on the north by a line east 109 chains to Hunter's River, and forming part of the southern boundary of William Cox's, junior, 1280 acres; and on the east by Hunter's River to the south-east corner, which is opposite the confluence of the Muscle Brook with the Hunter.

On the 3rd May, 1825, the late William Cox was authorised to purchase 4000 acres of land; he completed the purchase of 2560 acres, and sold, it is alleged, to claimant.

Case No. 201.—ALEXANDER BERRY, Esq., M. C.

Four thousand acres, in the county of Camden, parish of *Bunberra*; bounded on the west by a line bearing south to the Shoalhaven River, commencing from the south-west corner of Alexander Berry's 4000 acres purchase; on the south by the Shoalhaven River to the confluence of Broughton's Creek; on the east by Broughton's Creek; and on the north by Berry's 4000 acres

aforsaid, being a line west to the south-west corner thereof as aforsaid.

On the 21st May, 1825, the late Edward Wolstonecroft was authorised to purchase 4000 acres of land, and that above described was located accordingly. Mr. Berry has completed the purchase, and claims, as the sole Executor and legal Representative of Wolstonecroft.

Case No. 202.—RACHAEL MOORE WHITE, of Parramatta.

Two hundred and eighty acres, in the county of Camden, parish unnamed, district of *Illawarra*; bounded on the east by a line bearing south 35 chains, commencing from the south-east corner of Joseph Thompson's farm; on the south by a line bearing west 80 chains; on the west by a line bearing north 35 chains; and on the north by a line bearing east 80 chains to the commencing corner.

A Deed of Grant of this land was prepared in favor of John Drummond, deceased, the original promisee, on the report of the former Commissioners, No. 20, and executed subsequently to his death; it is, therefore, invalid. Drummond, it is alleged, bequeathed to his wife, now deceased, and she bequeathed to claimant.

Case No. 203.—WILLIAM WEBB, of Sydney.

Seventeen and one quarter perches, in the county of Cumberland, town of Sydney, parish of *Saint James*, allotment No. 31, in section No. 41; bounded on the west by the building line of Phillip-street, bearing south 3 degrees 30 minutes east 60 links; on the south by a line bearing east 1 degree north 178 links; on the east by a line bearing north 15 minutes west 58 links; and on the north by a line bearing west 1 degree 15 minutes south 185 links.

This allotment, it is alleged, was in the possession of one John Flood, who, in 1829, authorised possession to one John Caffrey for life. In 1831, Flood and Caffrey sold by auction to Thomas Smithers, who conveyed to claimant.

QUALITIES OF THE SUPPLIES.

1. All the Articles required by this Notice are to be of the best quality of their several kinds.

2. The Bread for all the purposes above stated must be the produce of clean, sound Colonial Wheat, Barley and Maize; from which, on the Military Ration 20 per cent., and on the Convict Ration 10 per cent. has been extracted in bran and waste. GENERAL CONDITIONS.

9. The whole of the Supplies of every description in each District are intended to be included in one Contract; and, therefore, no Tenders can be received unless for supplying the whole without exception that may be required in the entire of a District, and to each District there must be a separate Tender.
