**T**HE following Address was presented to His EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR, at Government House, Sydney, on Tuesday, the 20th instant, viz :—

To His Excellency Sir George Gipps, Knight, Governor of New South Wales, &c. &c. &c.

*May it please Your Excellency,*

We, the undersigned, being a deputation appointed at the last General Meeting of the Sydney Mechanics' School of Arts, beg most respectfully to tender our congratulations to Your Excellency upon the occasion of your accession to the government of this Colony; at the same time we venture to bring under Your Excellency's notice an Institution, the objects and influence of which, we doubt not are such, as will command Your Excellency's approval.

Established for the purpose of creating and diffusing a taste for scientific pursuits among the operative branches of the community, and of thus at once superseding habits of dissipation and the evils consequent upon ignorance (the incentives to which are so numerous, and the means of counteracting them so scanty in this metropolis), the School of Arts has been found to exercise an influence much more extended and beneficial than was contemplated by its founders.

From the absence of any similar Institution of higher pretensions, the list of members, comprising three hundred and eighty individuals, includes not only a large proportion of the mechanics of Sydney, but also a great number of persons of mercantile, professional, and other callings, who have evinced the greatest anxiety to attend the lectures, the reading-rooms, and library of the Institution.

The extent and prevalence of the zeal thus manifested cannot fail, it is respectfully suggested, of being highly instrumental in promoting the moral and intellectual improvement of the present and rising population of this town.

The chief appliances whereby the promoters of the School of Arts hoped to realise the objects anticipated in its formation, were the delivery of lectures on Natural and Experimental Science;

the establishment of a library, the contents of which should be restricted to works of a scientific kind, and the formation of classes for mutual instruction.

Through the liberal assistance of the government the members have been enabled to erect a building adapted to the above purposes, comprising a Theatre capable of holding five hundred persons with necessary subordinate apartments. Lectures and demonstrations in various branches of Natural and Mechanical Philosophy have been delivered, a library containing upwards of thirteen hundred volumes formed, and various apparatus procured for the purpose of illustrating the several lectures. The commencement of a Museum of Natural History has also been attempted. The inadequacy of funds, and the remoteness of the Colony from Europe, where many of the materials for scientific demonstrations are alone procurable, have limited the efforts of the members in giving greater efficiency to some of the subjects enumerated above.

The School of Arts was established at the direct instance of Your Excellency's predecessor Sir Richard Bourke, and to his favorable auspices and kind patronage it owes in a great measure its existing prosperity. The present deputation have the honor to request most respectfully in the name of the members that Your Excellency will be pleased to accept the office of their Patron.

In soliciting this honor they beg most respectfully to observe they seek the sanction by Your Excellency of the character and objects of the Institution. Among the manifold and important cares incident to Your Excellency's high office, the deputation feel assured that any attempts however humble to promote the social, the intellectual, or the moral improvement of the people, constituting this distant section of the British Empire, will not fail to meet Your Excellency's distinguished approval and support.

HIS EXCELLENCY'S REPLY.

GENTLEMEN,—I thank you sincerely for this Address, and for the high honor you do me, in

desiring to place my name at the head of the list of Members of the Sydney Mechanics' School of Arts. I accept Gentlemen with the greatest pleasure your kind invitation, and beg to assure you, that you may reckon on my cordial support and assistance in all measures tending to follow up the views of my predecessor with respect to your establishment.

There is, I am willing to hope, no longer any difference of opinion, as to the value of institutions whose object it is to spread amongst mechanics and artisans, a knowledge of the scientific principles on which the various operations of their callings are conducted—for we happily live in days, when in order to make men contented and happy, it is no longer thought necessary to keep them ignorant—and when it is not only recognised that knowledge is power, but recognised also that it is by a general diffusion of knowledge alone that the power of right over wrong, and of reason over prejudice in the world can be established or maintained.

Gentlemen, not having had as yet an opportunity of visiting your establishment, I must content myself with this general expression of my approbation of it.

I shall take an early opportunity of becoming better acquainted with it, and better acquainted also, I hope, with the Gentlemen who are its ornament and support.

**T**HE following Address was presented to His EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR, at Government House, Sydney, on Wednesday, the 21st instant, viz:—

To His Excellency Sir George Gipps, Knight, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, &c. &c. &c.

*May it please Your Excellency,*

We, the Ministers of the people called Methodists, in New South Wales, late in connexion with the Rev. John Wesley, A.M., deceased, beg leave to present to Your Excellency our most respectful congratulations on the safe arrival of yourself and family on the shores of Australia, and on Your Excellency's accession to the distinguished office to which Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to appoint you.

It has ever been recognised by the religious body with which we are connected, as a duty not less incumbent on their christian character than on their civil relations to the State, cheerfully to obey the laws of their country, to honour and respect all the constituted authorities of the realm, and especially to approve themselves the loyal and dutiful subjects of the Crown. As members of that body, resident in the remotest of all the British Colonies, we therefore feel it to be our duty to avail ourselves of the present auspicious opportunity of testifying to your Excellency our humble but heartfelt devotion to the person and government of our most gracious Sovereign, Queen Victoria, and to Your Excellency as Her Majesty's Representative in this part of Her Majesty's dominions.

We cannot allude to our geographical distance

from the mother country, without expressing to Your Excellency our grateful sense of the full measure of religious liberty, which, even at the Antipodes, has been uniformly secured to us by the mild spirit of the British laws, and by the enlightened and liberal policy of the British and Colonial governments. But whilst we are bound thankfully to acknowledge, that neither in New South Wales nor in any of its Dependencies have we at any time been subject to persecution for conscience sake, we are equally bound to assure Your Excellency, that the more formal and express recognition of our religious rights and immunities which has been accorded by Her Majesty's present government, has enhanced our admiration of the glorious constitution of our country, and strengthened our attachment to the Christian Sovereign under whose sceptre we have the happiness to live.

We beg further to assure Your Excellency, that it will ever be our earnest prayer, and that also, we are persuaded, of our societies and congregations throughout the Colony, that the Almighty Ruler of nations may, by His grace, enable Your Excellency so to administer the government committed to your hands, as that this important section of our Queen's dominions may become as distinguished for its spiritual as it already is for its temporal prosperity; that Your Excellency, and family, during the whole period of your residence amongst us, may be blessed with health and happiness; and that the name of your Excellency may be known to our posterity as that of one of the most eminent and successful promoters of the intellectual, moral, and religious welfare of this rising land:—

#### HIS EXCELLENCY'S REPLY.

GENTLEMEN,—It is with no ordinary feeling of respect, that I receive from the Ministers of the Methodist persuasion in New South Wales, this Address; marked as it is with the fervent spirit of devotion to God; of goodwill towards men, and of attachment to the laws and institutions of the British Empire, which have ever distinguished the followers of John Wesley;—a man revered throughout the Christian World, and whose name stands high upon the honored list of the benefactors of mankind. Brought up in the doctrines of the Church of England; and the son of one of her Ministers, I shall not expose myself to your reproaches, by avowing that I am attached to her communion; but I intreat you Gentlemen to believe, that I am no less attached to the principles of civil and religious liberty, which I believe to be firmly established in the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ; and without which I believe it to be impossible for men to know how good and joyful a thing it is to dwell together in unity.

I thank you Gentlemen, very sincerely for the kind congratulations which you have offered to me, on the arrival of myself and family in Australia; and I beg to assure you, that to become a fellow laborer with you, and with good men of all persuasions, in the establishment of peace, morality, and christian piety, in this rising land, is the chief object of my ambition, and will ever be held in view in all my undertakings.

THE following Address was presented to His Excellency the GOVERNOR, at Government House, Sydney, on Tuesday, the 27th of March instant, viz:—

To His Excellency Sir George Gipps, Knight, Captain-General and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, &c. &c. &c.

*May it please Your Excellency,*

We, the Ministers and Elders of the Synod of New South Wales, beg leave most respectfully to approach Your Excellency, to express our sincere congratulations on Your Excellency's safe arrival in this Colony, as also on Your Excellency's auspicious assumption of its government under the benign sway of our most gracious Sovereign.

Having been already entrusted by His late Majesty with a high and responsible Commission in one of the other Colonies of this vast Empire, and having fulfilled the important duties of that Commission so as to merit the unqualified approbation of His Majesty's government, Your Excellency has arrived in this Colony possessed of that intimate knowledge and matured experience, in regard to the habits and feelings, the interests and prospects of the Colonies generally, which are so peculiarly desirable in the Governor of this remote but important dependency of the Crown; and it is therefore with entire confidence, as well as with sincere pleasure, that, in humble dependence on the blessing of Almighty God, we look forward to the rapid advancement of our adopted country not only in agriculture, in commerce, and in population, but in general intelligence, in morality, and in religion, under Your Excellency's administration.

We beg leave to assure Your Excellency of our cordial, although humble, co-operation in promoting the peace, good order, and prosperity of the Colony; and while earnestly endeavouring to teach the people committed to our pastoral care, the doctrines and duties of our holy religion, we pledge ourselves zealously to inculcate upon them loyalty to our most gracious Sovereign, respect for Your Excellency, and obedience to the laws of the land.

As this is the first opportunity which the Synod of New South Wales have had of approaching the Representative of Her Majesty the Queen, we beg to inform Your Excellency that, sincerely and conscientiously attached to the doctrine, discipline, and worship of the Church of Scotland—to which we belong, and to promote the influence and observance of the hallowed institutions of which we have been sent forth, under the sanction of Her Majesty's government, to this distant territory—it shall ever be our object and desire to transmit that doctrine, discipline, and worship, pure and entire to the latest posterity in this land of our adoption. We beg leave at the same time to apprise Your Excellency that the Synod already comprises four Presbyteries, or subordinate Courts of Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, and that it has under its inspection twelve ordained Ministers and Licentiates; several students of theology, of whom one is at present under examinations for license to preach the gospel; fifteen catechists, both male and female; and fifteen schoolmasters; and that

during the last three months it has established ten schools and has five others in progress.

That Your Excellency may be guided in all your measures by that "wisdom which cometh from above," and that these measures may prove uniformly conducive to the promotion of that "righteousness which exalteth a nation," is our sincere desire and shall ever be our earnest prayer.

#### HIS EXCELLENCY'S REPLY.

GENTLEMEN,—I beg to make my sincere acknowledgments for the honor that is conferred upon me, by the presentation of this Address, and I beg you will accept my thanks for the cordial offer of support in carrying on the business of my government, which you and the Ministers and Elders of the Presbyterian Church, whom you represent, have voluntarily stepped forward to make me.

Deeply as I feel Gentlemen, that in no part of the world can the Executive government stand more in need, than in New South Wales, of the support and assistance of all Christian Ministers, and happy therefore am I in the persuasion, that the measures which under the sanction of Her Majesty's government, have lately been introduced into this Colony, are well calculated to secure to me these advantages; calculated also I must say, as far as any measures of mere human device can be, to preserve amongst the sons of Europe in this distant land, all that is pure, all that is holy, all that is marked in their faith, with the true spirit of godliness, and to set far apart from them, whatever in less happy times, may have produced strife, anger, or vexation, amongst the brotherhood of Christ.

Having Gentlemen, come amongst you with these hopes and expectations, it is not without deep sorrow I have learned, that a difference of opinion upon some matters of Church government, has sprung up between yourselves, and other members of the Presbyterian Church, in this Colony: I cannot be ignorant of these circumstances, and being acquainted with them, I feel that it would be unmanly, even in answering a congratulatory Address, to shrink from alluding to them; but Gentlemen, I intreat you to believe, that I do it not, for the purpose of pronouncing an opinion on matters connected with the discipline of your Church, but solely to guard against the wrong impression that might otherwise be produced, by my receiving an Address from a body, not yet recognised, by any formal act of the government.

I beg to assure you Gentlemen, that all the energies I possess, shall be exerted to promote the moral and religious welfare of the people of this land, and that the unceasing object of my prayers to the Almighty, will be that His peace may be shed abundantly amongst us.

**CROWN LANDS.**

**P**URSUANT to the Act of the Governor and Council passed in the present year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "*An Act to restrain the unauthorised occupation of Crown Lands*," His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, directs it to be notified, that from and after the first day of January next, any person who shall be found occupying any Crown Lands within the limits of location fixed by the Government Order of the 14th October, 1829, either by residing, or by erecting any tent, hut, or building thereon, or by clearing, enclosing, or cultivating any part thereof, without holding a lease under the Regulations of the 1st August, 1831. And any Person who shall be found occupying any Crown Lands beyond the said limits of location without holding a license for depasturing cattle and other animals, under these Regulations, will be liable, upon the complaint of any Commissioner of Crown Lands, to the penalties imposed by the said Act: that is to say, for the first offence, any sum not exceeding Ten Pounds, at the discretion of the Justice before whom the complaint is heard; for the second offence, Twenty Pounds; and for the third and any subsequent offence, Fifty Pounds: Provided always, that no information shall lie for any second or subsequent offence until one month after a conviction for the former offence.

2. Leases of vacant Crown Lands within the limits for location established by the same Government Order of the 14th October, 1829, will continue to be given in the terms and under the Regulations prescribed by the Government Order of the 1st August, 1831; the proper Officer being instructed not to permit any Person to become a Lessee of Crown Lands, unless he shall be satisfied that such Person is of honest and respectable character.

3. Licenses to depasture the vacant Crown Lands beyond the limits of location will be granted on application to the Colonial Secretary, according to the annexed form marked A, which is to be accompanied by a certificate of character from the nearest Justice of the Peace, or Commissioner of Crown Lands; in the terms therein set forth. Persons desirous of depasturing in distinct parts of the Colony will be required to take out a separate License for such District. Every such License will be chargeable with a fee of Ten Pounds to be paid to the Colonial Treasurer previously to its issue.

4. The Licenses will be executed by the Colonial Treasurer, or other Officer of Government

acting for and on behalf of His Majesty, and will be in the form hereunto annexed marked B.

5. The Licenses will be granted for one year, commencing on the 1st January, and renewable for the ensuing year in the months of November and December following, upon the application of the holder, and with the approval of the Governor. Such as are granted subsequently to the 1st July in any year will be chargeable with half the amount of the regulated fee, but will determine in like manner as other Licenses on the 31st of December next ensuing. Applications for the renewal of Licenses are to be made to the Colonial Secretary in the annexed form marked C, and are to be accompanied by a certificate from the nearest Commissioner of Crown Lands in the terms specified therein.

6. Any improvement effected upon Crown Land depastured under the authority of a License will be at the risk of the party holding the same, as such land, whenever it may be deemed expedient to extend the boundaries of location, will be liable to be put up to competition at public auction, in the same manner as other unalienated Crown Lands.

7. Any person who shall be convicted of any breach of law, whereby the objects of these Regulations may be defeated or endangered, will be liable, on the report of a Commissioner of Crown Lands, to have his License cancelled, and will be considered disqualified from holding one in future, if the circumstances of the case appear to the Governor to require it.

8. Commissioners of Crown Lands will be required to visit their several Districts annually, or oftener if necessary, in order to carry these Regulations into full effect.

9. It is to be distinctly understood that the Issue of Licenses to depasture Lands beyond the limits of location, gives to the holders no claim to any greater protection by the Civil or Military Force of the Colony than is now enjoyed by persons residing in those parts. The Act of the Governor and Council above referred to has been passed, and these Regulations consequent upon it are now promulgated, as the fittest mode of putting an end to the mischief arising from unauthorised occupation; and the Fee to be paid for the License can only be considered as a necessary recognition of the rights of the Crown, and as the means of procuring funds for carrying these Regulations into effect.

7 GUL. IV. CAP. VII.

An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters.—(21st April, 1837.)

SEC. 65.—PENALTY ON PURCHASING SOLDIERS' NECESSARIES, STORES, &c.

AND be it enacted, that any Person who shall unlawfully have in his or her Possession or Keeping, or who shall knowingly detain, buy, exchange, or receive from any Soldier or Deserter, or any other Person, on any pretence whatsoever, or shall solicit or entice any Soldier, or shall be employed by any Soldier, knowing him to be such, to sell any Arms, Ammunition, Clothes, or Military Furniture, or any Provisions, or any Sheets or other Articles used in Barracks, provided under Barrack Regulations, or Regimental Necessaries, or any Article of Forage provided for any Horses belonging to His Majesty's Service, or shall change the colour of any Clothes as aforesaid, shall forfeit for every such Offence any Sum not exceeding Twenty Pounds nor less than Five Pounds, together with Treble Value of all or any of the several Articles of which such Offender shall so become possessed; and if any credible Person shall prove on Oath before a Justice of the Peace a reasonable Cause to suspect that any Person has in his or her Possession, or on his or her Premises, any Property of the description herein-before described, on or with respect to which, any such Offence shall have been committed, the Justice may grant a Warrant to search for such Property, as in the case of Stolen Goods; provided always, that it shall be lawful for the Legislature of each or of any of His Majesty's Colonies, on the recommendation of the Officer for the Time being administering the Government of any such Colony, but not otherwise, to make Provisions by Law for reducing such pecuniary Penalty if not exceeding Twenty Pounds nor less than Five Pounds to such Amount as may to any such Legislature appear to be better adapted to the ability and pecuniary means of His Majesty's Subjects and others inhabiting the same, which reduced Penalty shall be

sued for and recovered in such and the same manner as the full Penalty hereby imposed; provided always that it shall be competent to His Majesty, or to the Person administering the Government of any such Colony on His Majesty's behalf, to exercise, in respect of the Laws so to be passed as aforesaid, all such Powers and Authorities as are by Law vested in His Majesty or in any such Officer as aforesaid in respect of any other Law made or enacted by any such Colonial Legislature.
