PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir GEORGE GIPPS, Knight, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS, by a certain Act or Ordinance of the GOVERNOR and Legislative Council, passed in the third Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King WILLIAM the Fourth, intituled "An Act to consolidate and amend the Laws for the Transportation and Punishment of Offenders in New South Wales, and for defining the respective Powers and Authorities of General Quarter Sessions, and of Petty Sessions, and for determining the Places at which the same shall be holden; and for better regulating the Summary Jurisdiction of Justices of the Peace; and for repealing certain Laws and Ordinances relating thereto," it was amongst other things enacted, That Courts of General Quarter Sessions for the Colony of New South Wales should be held at Sydney, Parramatta, Campbelltown, Windsor, Maitland, and Bathurst, and at such other places within the said Colony, and at such times, as the Governor for the time-being should by any Proclamation duly issued for such purpose appoint: Now therefore, I, the Governor, in pursuance of the Power and Authority so vested in me by the said recited Act, by this my Proclamation, do hereby appoint and direct, that Courts of General Quarter Sessions shall be holden at the Towns of MELBOURNE and PORT MACQUARIE respectively, and at such times as shall be hereafter fixed, of which all Persons concerned are hereby required to take Notice.

COUNCIL.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR is pleased to direct that the general objects of the following Bill, now under the consideration of the Legislative Council, be published for general information.

By His Excellency's Command,

E. DEAS THOMSON.

"A Bill for consolidating and amending the Laws relating to the Licensing and Regulation of Public Houses, and for further regulating the Sale and Consumption of Fermented and Spirituous Liquors in New South Wales."

It is proposed to reduce into one Act, all the Laws relating to the Licensing and Regulation of Public Houses; and also to restrict the Sale of Fermented and Spirituous Liquors, in whatever quantity, as well by wholesale as retail, to persons duly licensed thereto; and further to alter and amend the Laws relating to the Sale and Consumption of such Liquors in New South Wales.

It is proposed that Licenses shall be of five kinds, namely,—a "Publican's General License," to be granted to Innkeepers and Publicans for the Sale of Liquors of every description;—a "Wine and Beer License," to be granted to Publicans and others, for the Sale of Wine, Beer, and Fermented Liquors only;—a "Storekeeper's License," to be granted to Storekeepers, Dealers, and others, not being Publicans;—a "Packet License," to be granted to Steam or other vessels conveying Passengers;—and a "Confectioner's License," to be granted to Confectioners or Pastry Cooks, for the Sale of Ginger Beer, and Liqueurs or Spirituous Syrups.

It is proposed that all such Licenses shall commence from the first day of July next following their respective dates, and shall be in force for one year, then next ensuing (unless sooner forfeited), and no longer.

It is proposed that Licenses may be extended to Fairs, &c., by authority of the Petty Sessions.

It is proposed that Licenses shall neither be granted nor transferred to persons holding office under Government.

It is proposed that persons desirous of obtaining Licenses shall on or before the first Tuesday in the month of April in every year, deliver to the Clerk of the Petty Sessions of their respective Districts, notice, in writing, of their intention to apply for the same; and if the application be for a Publican's General License, that the applicant shall also deliver a certificate with such notice, signed by a certain number of known and respectable housekeepers residing within such Town or District as aforesaid.

It is proposed that all applications for Licenses for Vessels conveying Passengers, shall be made to the Justices for the District of Sydney.

It is proposed that an Annual General Licensing Meeting shall be holden in each District on the third Tuesday in the month of April, in each year, for the special purpose of taking into consideration all such applications for Licenses; and that notice of such Annual General Licensing Meeting shall be published in the *Government Gazette* by the respective Clerks of Petty Sessions.

It is proposed that all Applicants for Licenses shall enter into Recognizances before the Justices shall deliver the certificates authorising the issue thereof; and that lists of all certificates, so issued by the Justices, shall be sent by them to the Colonial Secretary's Office within fourteen days after the granting thereof.

It is proposed that the Certificates shall be null and void unless lodged in the Office of the Colonial Treasurer, together with the money to be paid for the License, on or before the thirtieth day of June next ensuing, each Annual General Licensing Meeting.

It is proposed to empower the Governor to authorise the issuing of a License to a defaulter, upon payment of an additional sum.

It is proposed that Special Petty Sessions shall be holden for the Transfer of Licenses; and that the Clerk of Petty Sessions shall report all such Transfers to the Colonial Secretary.

It is proposed that any licensed person having or keeping in or about his house, or at any place connected therewith, in any way whatsoever, any skittle-ground or ball-court, or any dice, cards, balls, billiards, quoits, or other implements used in gaming, or suffering any person resorting thereto to use or exercise any kind of the said games, or any other unlawful game or sport, within his said house, or within any house in any manner connected therewith, shall forfeit and pay for the first offence any sum not less than — pounds, nor more than — pounds; and for the second, or any subsequent offence, any sum not less than ten pounds nor more than one hundred pounds; or, at the discretion of the Justices, forfeit his Recognizance and lose his License: Provided always, that no Recognizance shall be declared forfeited unless upon adjudication of the Court of Quarter Sessions, or three Justices, upon such second or subsequent conviction.

It is proposed that any licensed person, upon any line of road in the Colony, who shall refuse

to receive a traveller, or the horse of a traveller, whether the owner of such horse lodge in his house or not, shall forfeit and pay any sum not less than five, nor more than twenty pounds for every such offence.

It is proposed that the property of strangers shall not be distrained or seized for rent.

It is proposed that no house in Sydney, for which either a Publican's General License, or a Wine and Beer License shall be granted, shall have any but the front entrance from the street named in the license; and that this provision may be extended to any other town by proclamation of the Governor.

It is proposed that no action shall be maintained on account of liquors illegally supplied, nor on account of debts contracted for spirits sold in quantities less than — gallons, except when such claim shall be in part of an Inn-keeper's general bill for lodging.

It is proposed that licensed persons shall receive payment in money only.

It is proposed that all liquors shall be sold by the imperial measure.

It is proposed that no licensed person in Sydney shall sell spirits in a Tap; and that this provision may be extended to other Towns by proclamation of the Governor.

It is proposed that no licensed person shall employ convicts in the management of his house.

It is proposed that convicts shall not be received into public houses, except in presence of, or by written permission from, his master or mistress.

It is proposed that no person, whether licensed or unlicensed, shall sell or supply spirits to a convict, or an aboriginal native, in any quantity whatsoever, without special permission.

It is proposed that no Public House shall be open before the hour of four o'clock in the morning, nor after the hour of nine in the evening; and that no liquors shall be served or drunk therein before or after those hours respectively.

It is proposed that all liquors hawked about shall be seized and condemned.

It is proposed that all persons found drinking in unlicensed houses shall be apprehended.

It is proposed to empower Justices to prohibit the supply of spirits to any person known to have injured his health, or wasted his estate through excessive drinking.

ASSIGNMENT REGULATIONS.

IN consequence of the numerous complaints on the subject of Assignments, His Excellency the GOVERNOR has laid the matter before the Executive Council, and with their advice directs that the following Alterations with regard to MALE

CONVICTS, be adopted from the present date, in order to restore the principle of equal distribution intended by the former Regulations, which in some cases the Applicants appear to have found means of evading, and to ensure a more perfect Convict Discipline in certain instances.

1. No preference is to be given, under the thirteenth Article of the Regulations of 9th May, 1835, to Persons occupying Land for the first time, on *Leasehold Qualification*, unless the said Land be under Hoe or Plough Culture.

2. All Applications under the same thirteenth Article are to be made to the Police-Magistrate (or where there is no such Officer, to the Bench of Magistrates) of the District in which the land is situated, and must each set forth that the Applicant has attained the full age of twenty-one years, the circumstances under which the land has been acquired, and full information as to his condition in life. These Applications are to be transmitted, by the Magistrates, to the Colonial Secretary; and when approved by the Governor, but not before, are to be registered by the Commissioner of Assignment.

3. All other Applications for Assigned Servants are to be made, as heretofore, to the Magistrates in Petty Sessions, or Magistrate acting singly, as the case may require, and acted on in the way pointed out by the General Regulations.

4. No Person who may have in his service two-thirds of the number of Assigned Servants which he may claim under the Regulations of 15th December, 1835, is to have any more men Assigned to him, until all other Persons are completed to the same proportionate extent. Provided, however, that this Rule be not applied to any Person who has less than ten Servants actually in his employment.

5. No Person is to be considered entitled to become an Assignee of Convicts, who has not been free for six years, unless such Person shall have received a Free Pardon.

6. No Person who shall have been twice convicted of any Capital or Transportable Offence, is to be eligible as an Assignee in future.

7. The Assignment of Convict Mechanics, of any description whatever, in *Sydney*, is to be discontinued forthwith.

8. The Assignment of Male Convicts in *Sydney* and the other Towns of the Colony is to be discontinued on 1st January, 1839; and of Male Domestic Servants throughout the Colony, on 15th August, 1839.

9. All Male Convicts, Mechanics as well as Laborers, are in future to be Assigned by lot, in the mode pointed out for Laborers in the eleventh Article of the Regulations of 9th May, 1835, separate lists being made of the Persons entitled to receive Mechanics of each Trade.

10. All future Assignments of Male Convicts are to be made for the period only for which the persons assigned may have to serve, in order by good conduct to be eligible for a Ticket-of-Leave. If at the end of that period, they be not (in consequence of misbehaviour) deemed worthy of Tickets-of-Leave, they will be taken into the service of Government, or disposed of as the Governor may direct; their places being supplied under the existing Regulations in the same manner as if they had actually received their Tickets.

This Principle will also be acted on, as far as

possible, with respect to Servants already in Assignment.

11. The principal object in the Assignment Regulations being the distribution of Convict Servants with fairness and impartiality, they will be altered and amended as often as they may be found insufficient for that purpose.

12. It is also to be distinctly understood, that there neither is, nor ever has been any engagement on the part of the Government, to keep Proprietors supplied with Servants up to the full numbers authorised by the Regulations of 15th December, 1835, and that at the present moment it is quite impossible to do so.

Parties are reminded that all Applications for Agricultural Labourers and Mechanics must be renewed at these Sessions as after 1st day of October ensuing, all former Applications for Convicts of that description will be cancelled in conformity with existing Regulations.

The Magistrates will take particular care to point out to Applicants any informality in their Forms of Application, in order that the same may

be corrected before transmission to the Commissioner, and to remind them, where necessary, to require their Overseers to send in their Returns in Form B, to the Sessions of the District in which they reside. The Magistrates are also requested to see that all the particulars required in terms of the Regulations are duly filled up in the several Forms, to avoid the inconvenience and delay in returning them for correction.

The greatest accuracy will be required on the part of the Applicants in filling up the Returns, as the best means of avoiding confusion and inconvenience in the Public Service.

Applications for domestic Servants and Convicts of the same trade as the parties applying, do not require to be renewed at these Sessions.

Those Magistrates who were authorised to employ Assessors last year for taking into consideration Applications for Servants, will be allowed; if still necessary, to retain the same parties on the present occasion; but where the employment of other parties in lieu should be requisite, the Magistrates will immediately report the names to this Office.
