HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR directs the publication of the following Notice of **ANDREW GIBSON, Esq.**, of Goulburn, offering a reward of Fifty Pounds to any person who may apprehend any of the three armed bushrangers, who on the 5th instant went to his Shepherds at Grabben Gullen, about twenty miles from Goulburn, and in their presence fired two shots at his Superintendent Mr. **OLIVER FRY**. And His Excellency as a further inducement to the guilty parties being brought to justice, is pleased to promise that application shall be made to Her Majesty for a Conditional Pardon, for any Prisoner of the Crown who may apprehend and lodge in either of the Gaols of the Colony any of the said offenders.

FIFTY POUNDS REWARD.

WHEREAS a party of three armed bushrangers came to my Shepherds about three o'clock in the afternoon, of Tuesday the 5th instant, at Grabben Gullen, on the high road from Wheeo to Goulburn, and in their presence fired two shots at my Superintendent Mr. Oliver Fry, I do hereby offer the above reward to any person who may apprehend any of the parties implicated. Two of them are well known as notorious bushrangers, whom Mr. Fry had previously disarmed and captured at my farm on the Fish River, County of King, but afterwards effecting their escape are again returned to his neighbourhood for the avowed purpose of seeking revenge on him and his overseer. One of them can be identified as Andrew Murphy, per *Royal Admiral*, a runaway convict from Mr. S. Blackman, of Biga, and the same who broke out of the Goulburn Lock-up on the 26th ultimo.

STREET LAMPS.

CONTRACTS FOR THE COLONIAL SERVICE FOR 1840.

NOTICE is hereby given, that Tenders will be received at this Office until *Monday the 16th of December next, at noon*, for furnishing, for the Colonial Service, in the several Districts, the Supplies undermentioned, in such quantities as may be required, during twelve calendar months, commencing 1st January 1840, upon the conditions hereafter specified.

PROVISIONS.

1. The Ration for Soldiers of the Mounted Police, or other mounted parties when required—1lb. fresh meat, 1lb. wheaten bread, 1-7th of an imperial quart of rum.

2. The Ration for Emigrants—*For Men*, 24oz. wheat bread, 16oz. fresh meat, 8oz. vegetables, ½oz. salt, ¼oz. tea, 1½oz. sugar, ½oz. soap.—*For Women*, 16oz. wheat bread, 12oz. fresh meat, 6oz. vegetables, ½oz. salt, ¼oz. tea, 1½oz. sugar, ½oz. soap.—Children under ten years to be allowed two-thirds of the Ration of Female Adults; above that age and under fifteen the same as Adults.

3. The Ration for Prisoners of the Crown, and others in the employment of Colonial Departments, when authorised to receive it, with the exceptions specified in Nos. 2, 3, and 4—20oz. wheat bread, 8oz. maize meal, 16oz. fresh beef, ¼oz. salt, 1oz. sugar, ½oz. soap.

4. The Ration to Officers in charge of Survey-

ing Parties, when in the Field, and men composing such Parties—24oz. flour, 16oz. fresh beef, $\frac{3}{4}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, $2\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tobacco, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.

5. The Ration to the Superintendent and Crew of the Floating Light Vessel, Sydney Harbour—16oz. wheat bread, 8oz. flour, 16oz. fresh beef, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 3oz. sugar, $2\frac{1}{2}$ oz. raisins, 1-14 pint oatmeal, 1-14 pint vinegar.

6. The Ration to Men attending the Light-house South-head, and Boatmen in the Department of Customs, Harbour Master, and Police—24oz. wheat bread, 16oz. fresh beef, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.

7. Flour, tea, sugar and tobacco, bread or meat, in such quantities as may be required, for deserving Mechanics and others, in the Department of the Colonial Engineer, and other Colonial Establishments when authorised.

8. To Prisoners confined in Gaol—12oz. wheat bread, 12oz. maize meal, 4oz. fresh beef, 8oz. vegetables, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap—(Ration No. 3 is issued to Gaol Attendants, aid to Witnesses, and others awaiting bail; and if confined in solitary cells, Ration No. 10.)

9. To Children of Female Prisoners confined in Gaol—8 oz. wheat bread, 4 oz. fresh beef, 1 pint milk, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. yellow soap.

10. Prisoners confined in Lock-up or Watch-houses—24oz. wheat bread—(Ration No. 3 is occasionally issued at Watch-houses, to Prisoners of the Crown, when travelling from one station to another, and in other cases when sanctioned by a Magistrate.)

11. Forage for Horses and Oxen—8lbs. maize, barley or oats, 4lbs bran, 12lbs. oaten or cultivated grass hay, and 4lbs. wheat straw, for each horse daily, and half that quantity for each bullock.

12. For the Light-house South-head, and Floating-light, Sydney Harbour—Best sperm oil, per imperial gallon; patent wicks, each.

13. Fuel and Light—Firewood per 100lbs.; sperm oil, common oil, per gallon imperial; mould candles, dip candles, cotton wick, per lb.

14. For Emigrants or other Persons or Establishments in Sydney, when ordered—Fresh beef, fresh mutton, maize meal, the best wheaten bread, bread of 2nd and 3rd quality, ditto flour, arrowroot, sago, rice, tea, sugar, oatmeal, salt, yellow soap, pearl barley, tobacco, vegetables, per lb.; milk per quart; Port wine per dozen; vinegar per imperial gallon; roach lime per bushel; straw for bedding per 100lbs.

MALE ORPHAN SCHOOL, LIVERPOOL.—Daily Rations of Provisions.

No. 1. To the Master, Schoolmaster, and Men employed as servants or labourers and to every two of the Master's Children—22oz. flour, 16 oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{3}{8}$ oz. tea, 2oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.

No. 2. To the Wives of the Master and Store-keeper, and Female Servants entitled to Rations—16oz. flour, 12oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, $2\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $\frac{3}{4}$ oz. soap.

No. 3. Children above six years of age—On Holidays, 20oz. flour, 12oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. raisins or currants, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. suet, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap. On Thursdays, 16oz. flour, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. raisins or currants, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. suet, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap. On other days, 16oz. flour, 12oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.

No. 4. Nursery Children under six years of

age—On Holidays, 16oz. flour, 4oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, 1oz. raisins or currants, 1oz. suet, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap. On Thursdays, 12oz. flour, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, 1oz. raisins or currants, 1oz. suet, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap. On other days, 12oz. flour, 4oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.

SUPPLIES.

No. 5. For the use of the Establishment— $3\frac{1}{2}$ pints of oil, and $1\frac{1}{2}$ pint of vinegar, daily.

No. 6. For Artificers and Laborers— $\frac{3}{8}$ oz. of tobacco daily, when authorised.

No. 7. Forage for a Horse—10lbs. of Maize, daily.

No. 8. Flour, tea, sugar, salt, pearl barley, sago, rice, oatmeal, arrow-root, yeast, lard, candles, and soap, as required.

FEMALE ORPHAN SCHOOL, PARRAMATTA.—Daily Rations of Provisions.

No. 1. To the Superintendent, and Men employed as laborers, or servants, the same as No. 1 of the Male Orphan School.

No. 2. To the Matron and Female Servants, entitled to Rations, the same as No. 2 of the Male Orphan School.

No. 3. To each of the Female Orphans and Children—On Holidays, 16oz. flour, 8oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. raisins or currants, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. suet, $\frac{3}{4}$ oz. soap. On Sundays, 12oz. flour, 8oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{3}{4}$ oz. soap. On Tuesdays and Fridays, 16oz. flour, 4oz. maize meal, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, 1oz. sugar, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. raisins or currants, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. suet, $\frac{3}{4}$ oz. soap. On other days, 12oz. flour, 4oz. maize meal, 8oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{3}{4}$ oz. soap.

For Children, under seven years of age, best wheaten bread is to be substituted, at the discretion of the Superintendent, in the proportion of 8oz. of bread for 12oz. of flour.

No. 4. For the use of the Establishment— $1\frac{1}{2}$ pints of oil, and $1\frac{1}{2}$ pints vinegar daily.

No. 5. For Artificers and Laborers—The same as No. 6 of the Male Orphan School.

No. 6. Forage—The same as No. 7 of the Male Orphan School.

No. 7. Best wheat bread, flour, tea, sugar, salt, pearl barley, rice, oatmeal, arrowroot, yeast, lard, candles, and soap, as required.

The Holidays at these Schools are New Year's Day, Easter Day, Christmas Day, and the Queen's Birth Day.

DISTRICTS.

1. *Sydney*.—Consisting of the Hundreds of Sydney and Packerham, excepting the Parish of Concord.

2. *Parramatta*.—Consisting of the Hundreds of Parramatta and Dundas, and the Parish of Concord.

3. *Liverpool*.—Consisting of the Hundred of Liverpool, and Parishes of Cabramatta and Watramole.

4. *Campbelltown*.—Consisting of the Hundreds of Southend and Campbelltown, and the Parishes of Cook, Heathcote, and Bulga, in the Hundred of Warranora; then by the left bank of the Nepean River to the eastern boundary of Clifton; thence by the south boundary of the Church and School Estate to the head of the Werriberri Creek; and by that Creek to the northern boundary of the Parish of Werrombi; cross the Nepean River, and

by the Bringelly Creek, the Bringelly and the Cowpasture Roads.

5. *Stonequarry*—Bounded by the south boundary of Campbelltown Police District, to the head of the Cataract River, thence by the range to the head of the Cordeaux, and by a line to Lupton's Inn; from that Inn to Jellore, Colong, down the Kowming, Coxe, and Warragamba Rivers, to its junction with the Werriberri Creek.

6. *Illawarra*—Bounded on the west by the eastern boundary of Berrima and Goulburn Police Districts; on the south by the northern boundary of Braidwood Police District, and the range separating the waters of Jervis Bay and St. George's Basin, and by the north shore of the latter to the sea; on the east by the coast to Bulli.

7. *Berrima*—Bounded by the Police Districts of Stonequarry and Illawarra and by the west boundary of the County of Camden.

8. *Goulburn*—Contained within the boundary of the County of Argyle, and the south-east portion of the County of Georgiana, situated to the east of a line from Kangaloola Creek to the Village Reserve on the Abercrombie River near Bingham, and thence by the left bank of the Abercrombie River to its rise.

9. *Braidwood*—Bounded on the west by the Gourock Range, including Long Swamp to Wollolar, thence by the Boro Creek and the Shoalhaven River to the foot of the range north of Eudrick River; on the east by the crest of the range dividing the Shoalhaven Waters from those of the Clyde to the junction of the Araluen Creek with the Dena River.

10. *Broulee*—Bounded on the west by Braidwood, on the north by Illawarra Police Districts; on the east by the sea; on the south by the Murrumbidgee River.

11. *Queanbeyan*—Bounded on the east by the Braidwood Police District; on the north by the south portion of Lake George to the Gap on its west side; thence by a line to Bywong, and the crest of the range at the head of the Gundaroo Waters to the Murrumbidgee River, including the various places on the Gininderry Creek.

12. *Yass*—Bounded on the east by the Goulburn Police District; on the north by the Crookwell to its junction with the Narrawa, thence by a line to the Burrowa River, at the junction with the Pudman Creek; on the south by the Queanbeyan Police District.

13. *Windsor*—Bounded on the south by Penrith Police District; on the east by that of Parramatta; on the north by the Hawkesbury, and across it at Wiseman's, thence up the valley of Webb's Creek, and by the range to the junction of Wollun Creek with the Colo; on the west by the Hartley Police District.

14. *Penrith*—Bounded on the west by Jamison's Valley to the Weatherboard Hut, and thence by a line to Mount Hay; on the north by the Grose River, and by a line crossing the Nepean, by Richmond Parish to the crossing of Rickaby's Creek; on the east by the Richmond Road to Eastern Creek, by that creek to the old Cowpasture Road, and by the boundaries of Cabramatta to the Bringelly Road; on the south by the Bringelly Road to the Bringelly Creek across the Nepean, and by the boundary of the Parish of Worrondi, the Werriberri Creek, thence by the Warragamba and Coxe's River to Jamison's Valley.

Beef and Mutton to be issued in such proportions as may be required for the Ration to Emigrants, and, when the quantity admits of it, this, as well as the Convict Ration of Beef, to be deliverable in fore and hind quarters alternately.

Beef to be issued to the Orphan Schools on five days, and Mutton on two days of the week.

The Maize Meal to be similar in quality to the Wheat Meal, and to be twice ground.

When it may be necessary to substitute one article for another, the following proportions are

to be observed, viz.—1 lb. wheat flour or 1 lb. biscuit, equal to $1\frac{1}{4}$ of bread; 1 lb. salt beef or 1 lb. mutton or 10oz. salt pork, equal to 1 lb. of fresh beef.

These substitutions are not to be made except on the requisition of the officer authorised to draw the several Rations.

Hospital Bread is to be supplied to the Children of the Female Orphan School, when required by the Surgeon, in lieu of the ordinary Ration.

Vegetables to be supplied in reasonable proportions of potatoes, greens, pumpkins, onions, &c. &c.

The supplies for Road and other Parties are to be delivered at the nearest fixed Stations to the places where the party may be employed, on the requisition of the Officer in charge; and in case the whole Ration of Forage be not required or delivered, each of the species to be reckoned as the portion of the Ration undermentioned:—The maize or barley 4-12, the hay 5-12, the bran 2-12, the straw 1-12.

The Supplies (not specified in the preceding paragraph) are to be delivered direct to the Parties or Establishments entitled thereto, on the written order of the person duly authorised for the purpose.

Separate Tenders will be required for the Forage in the District of Sydney; but the other supplies for that district are to be tendered for together.

The supplies for each of the other Districts, with the exception of those for the Orphan Schools, are intended to be included in one Contract; and therefore no Tenders can be received unless for supplying the whole that may be required in the entire of a District, and to each District there must be a separate Tender.

Separate Tenders to be made for each of the Orphan Schools.

Provisions and Forage being required by Rations, according to the scales under their respective heads, the Tenders are required to express the price per ration only.

The Tenders for Forage are not required to state the price of the Ration for Oxen, as when the latter is required, one half of the allowance fixed for Horses will be drawn, and one half the price allowed to the Contractor, whose engagement is to provide for both Horses and Oxen.

In the event of a difference of opinion between the Contractor and the party receiving the supplies, as to the quality, the same is to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a Board of Survey, according to the practice of the service. But in country districts where a Board of Survey cannot be conveniently assembled, the party objecting will name one person as arbitrator, the Contractor or his agent another, and these two will (previously to any other proceeding on their part) concur in naming a third as umpire, who in the event of the arbitrators not agreeing in opinion, will be called upon for his decision, which shall be final.

If the board, arbitrators, or umpire, shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the Contractor, failing of which it will be procured by the Department requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

In the event of any unnecessary delay or failure of the Contractor to supply the articles when required, they will be otherwise procured in like manner.

In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or from some other cause, injury would be sustained either by the parties to whom the Rations are due, or to the Contractor, by waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of the department, or officer in charge of the party or parties for whom the Rations are to be received, shall have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality; it being distinctly understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and that the Contractor will have a right to appeal to the Governor, although, in the mean time, he must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead.

A repetition of irregularity in the quality or quantity of the supplies, or of any delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the Contractor, upon the report of the officer in charge of the parties or establishment, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth the amount of his monthly account, as the Governor may direct. It will also be in the power of the Governor, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract.

It will be in the power of either party to limit the duration of the contract, by giving in writing a notice of three full calendar months to the opposite party, and to end the contract at the expiration of that period.

The Contractor will be required to prepare his own account, monthly or quarterly, in the prescribed form; and on the production thereof, with the requisite vouchers, in a complete state, to the officer receiving the supplies, the same will be forwarded by the latter to the Auditor-General, in order that a warrant may be prepared, and payment made from the Colonial Treasury.
