**I**T having been represented that much inconvenience has been experienced from outward bound vessels being brought to an anchor in Watson's Bay, His Excellency the Governor directs the attention of the Pilots of Port Jackson to the 6th section in the schedule A of the Act of Council, 3 William IV., No. 6; and in cautioning them against this practice in future, strictly enjoins them, on no account whatever, to bring up any vessel to the north-eastward of Bradley's Head, or to take any vessel to sea which shall have anchored to the north-eastward of that Head land, on pain of removal from Office, unless, however, as provided for by the law, the vessel shall have been compelled to anchor from stress of weather.

**PRESENT,**

The QUEEN's most excellent Majesty in Council.

Whereas by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament, holden in the third and fourth Years of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "*An Act to regulate the Trade of the British possessions abroad,*" it was, amongst other things enacted, that no Goods should be imported into, nor should any Goods, except the produce of the Fisheries in British Ships, be exported from any of the British Possessions

other than the United Kingdom, or some other of such possessions, excepting to or from the several Ports in such possessions called free Ports, enumerated or described in the table in the said Act contained, and that if any Goods should be imported into any Port or Place in any of the said Possessions, contrary to the said Act, such Goods should be forfeited; provided always, that if His Majesty should deem it expedient to extend the provisions of the said Act to any Port or Ports not enumerated in the said table, it should be lawful for His Majesty, by Order in Council, to extend the provisions of the said Act to such Port or Ports; and that from and after the day mentioned in such Order in Council, all the privileges and advantages of the said Act, and all the Provisions, Penalties, and Forfeitures therein contained, subject, nevertheless, to the limitations and restrictions thereafter provided, should extend, and be deemed and construed to extend, to any such Port or Ports respectively, as fully as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in the said table at the time of passing the said Act.

And whereas, Her Majesty doth deem it expedient to extend the before-mentioned provisions of the said Act respecting such free Ports, to the Ports of *Windsor, Parsboro', Cumberland, Shelburne, and Lunenburg*, in the province of *Nova Scotia*.

Now, therefore, under and by virtue of the said Act of Parliament, and in exercise of the powers thereby in Her Majesty in Council in that behalf vested, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the provisions of the said Act, as far as the same relate to the Free Ports respectively therein-mentioned, shall be, and the same are hereby extended to the Ports of *Windsor, Parsboro', Cumberland, Shelburne, and Lunenburg*, in the province of *Nova Scotia*; and that, from and after the First day of December, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, all the privileges and advantages of the said Act conferred upon the free Ports therein-mentioned, and all the Provisions, Penalties, and Forfeitures, in the said Act contained, subject to the limitations and restrictions therein provided, shall extend to the said Ports of *Windsor, Parsboro', Cumberland, Shelburne, and Lunenburg*, in the province of *Nova Scotia*, as fully and effectually, as if such Ports had been inserted and enumerated in the said Table at the time of passing the said Act.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

whereas by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament, held in the third and fourth years of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "*An Act for the General Regulation of the Customs*," it is amongst other things enacted, that Goods, of places within the limits of the East India Company's Charter, shall be imported into such Ports of the United Kingdom as shall be approved of by the Lords of the Treasury, and declared by an Order in Council, to be fit and proper for such importation.

And whereas the several Ports herein after-mentioned, that is to say, *Dover*, in the county of Kent; *Aberdeen*, in the county of Aberdeen; *Dundee*, in the county of Angus; *Exeter*, in the county of Devon; *Goole*, in the county of York; *Lancaster*, in the county of Lancaster; *Londonderry*, in the province of Ulster, in Ireland; *Portsmouth and Southampton*, both in the county of Hants; *Sunderland*, in the county of Durham; and *Yarmouth*, in the county of Norfolk; have been approved of by the Lords of Her Majesty's Treasury for that purpose.

Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is thereupon pleased to declare, and it is hereby declared, that the said Ports of *Dover, Aberdeen, Dundee, Exeter, Goole, Lancaster, Londonderry, Portsmouth, Southampton, Sunderland, and Yarmouth*, are fit and proper for the importation of Goods from places within the limits of the East India Company's charter.

#### NOTICE TO MARINERS.

PROPOSED LIGHT ON THE *LEMAN AND OWER SANDS.*

*Trinity House, London,  
November 26th, 1839.*

This Corporation having, in compliance with the request of the Owners and Masters of Vessels, and other persons using or interested in the Navigation of the North Sea, caused a Light Vessel to be prepared, for the purpose of exhibiting a Floating Light near to the *Leman and Ower Sands*, Notice is hereby given, that the said Vessel will be placed thereat previously to Wednesday, the 1st day of January next, and the Lights exhibited therein on the evening of that day, and thenceforth continued every night from sunset to sunrise.

This Light Vessel will be placed in 16 fathoms at low water spring-tides, about two miles to the westward of the shoal part of the *Ower*, and in latitude  $53^{\circ} 9' N.$ , and longitude  $2^{\circ}$  East of Greenwich. The Lights will be exhibited from two lanterns, placed on separate masts, the foremost of which will revolve and burn at an elevation of 38 feet above the water's edge; while the after-

most will be a fixed light, and burn at an elevation of 27 feet above the same level.

Mariners are to observe, that the Light at the Leman and Ower is to be used only as a Warning Light, to indicate the position of those dangerous Shoals, and the Vessel must not be approached in any direction, either by night or by day.

NOTE.—From this light Vessel, the shoalest part of the Ower will bear North by West  $\frac{1}{2}$  W., distant about two miles; and the shoalest part of the Lemau W. by N., distant about four miles.

Such account will then be referred to some competent Architect appointed on behalf of the Government, who will be required to examine the building, and certify that the workmanship and materials are good and sufficient, and conformable to the plan and elevation laid before the Governor and Council, and that he believes the specified sum to have been actually laid out. One half of the amount of any sums so expended and certified, will be issued to the Trustees from time
